

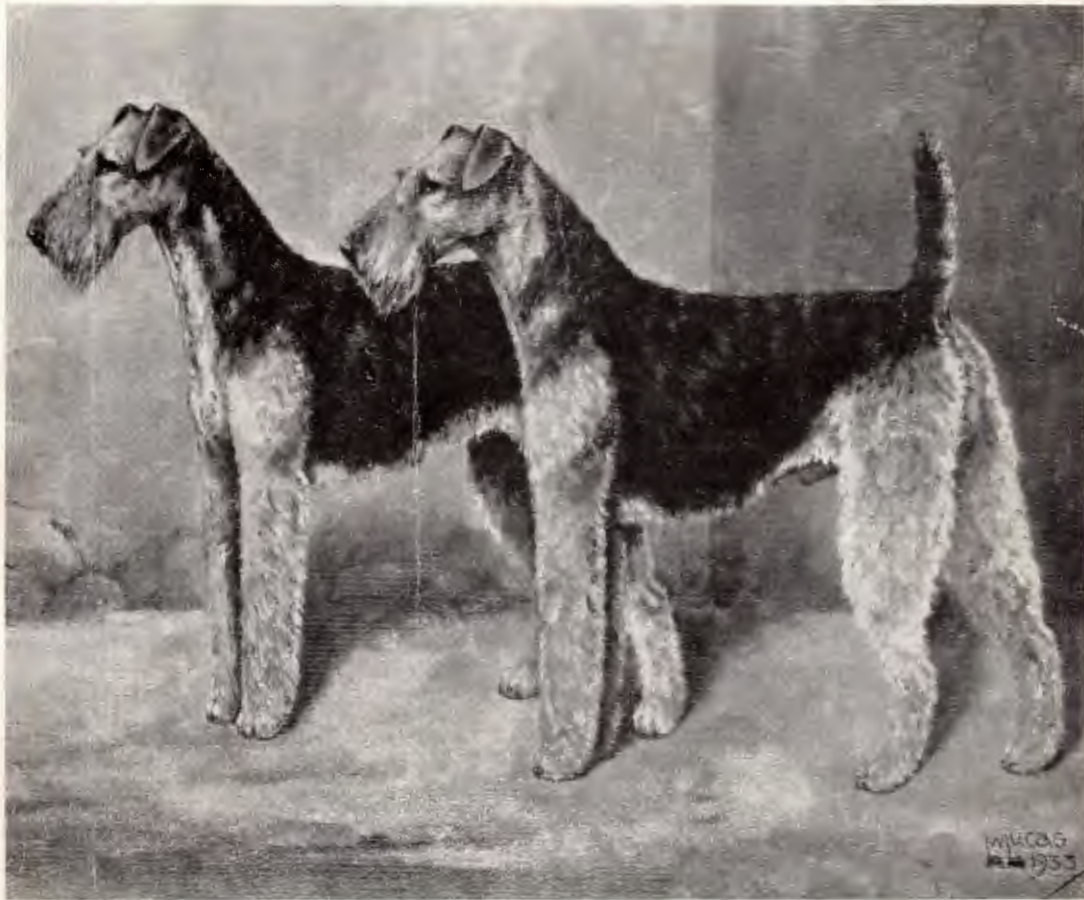

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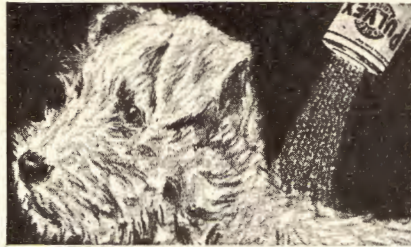
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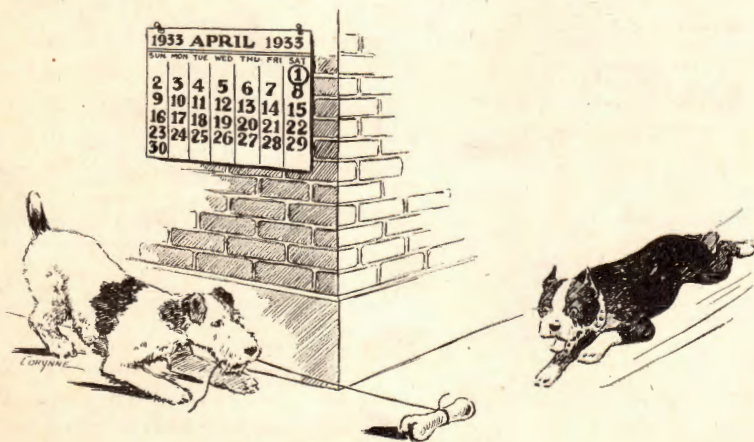
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New Features

never have enough money for beefsteaks and clothes. Now the situation is changing. Don't be surprised—and don't be caught without stock to sell this summer and next fall. People who want dogs are going to buy them, and the fellow who has them and advertises them is going to be the one to profit.

So if you'll take my advice—if you'll take my opinion as being worth anything at all—I'll say, breed your bitches—rear your puppies—advertise your dogs, and you'll find plenty of purchasers in the very near future.

TERRIERS

TERRIERS—there is something in the very name suggesting vivacity, keenness, friendliness—a desire to be a pal and a companion; and these qualities all Terriers surely possess. If you remember your eighth grade Latin you will know that the word “Terrier” comes from the Latin “Terra” or “earth” so a Terrier is really a dog that goes to earth—that likes to dig in the ground.

Originally Terriers dug for their food; for rats and mice, squirrels and ground-hogs, fox and badger; for a thousand and one furry creatures that buried themselves under the earth for protection. If your pet Terrier digs up the yard, don't be too severe on him, remember he is but obeying an old inherited instinct. Bull-dogs, you know, were originally used as “bull-baiters” and although this sport has not been followed for hundreds of years, to this day the average Bulldog hates a cow and the most phlegmatic of them will usually growl and make a dash for a cow's throat.

There are many different kinds of Terriers. Foxterriers, originally bred to dig for fox, hence the name. Cairn Terriers—Cairn in the old English vernacular is a “pile of stone” so this interesting

Cairn Terrier, hailing from Scotland gets his name from the fact that the Highlanders used to take him along to dig in the stone fence corners which abound in that country—the Terriers rummaging and digging for ground-hogs, snakes, squirrels and tiny field mice which made their homes in the crevices of these stone fences.

A Bullterrier—well one never heard of a Bullterrier digging for a bull, and where his name came from is a bit of a mystery. The West Highland White Terrier takes his name from the location from which he came and this applies to many of the other Terrier breeds—the Scottish Terrier, the Welsh Terrier, the Manchester, the Irish and the Border Terriers.

The Kerry Blue takes his name from County Kerry, Ireland, and is blue in color, so they combined geography and art in this case.

There are eighteen different varieties of Terriers recognized by the A. K. C. The best known is probably the Foxterrier or possibly the Airedale. Enthusiasts claim “the Airedale is the biggest and best of all the Terriers.” Certainly he is the biggest and whether or

not you consider him the best depends on whether you own one.

The unusual Terriers—that is, unusual to the average person—include the Dandie Dimont, the Schnauzer, Skye Terrier, Kerry Blue and several others.

The Irish and the Welsh look a bit like the Airedale. They are smaller, differ more in color and of course they differ materially in fine points but to the uninitiated and to the novice, the Airedale, the Irish and the Welsh look a good bit alike except in size.

Most Terriers originated in the British Isles and have their family-tree in England, Scotland, Wales or Ireland. Possibly centuries ago they started from a common ancestry.

Many of the Terriers are square in outline—as long as they are tall and in this category fall the Irish, Airedale and Welsh, the Smooth and Wirehaired Foxterriers and several others.

The low-to-the-ground Terriers—and by the way it is interesting to note that this group is low to the ground for a definite purpose—so they can go into small holes when chasing out game where longer legs would be a definite disadvantage—include the Sealyham, Scottie, the West Highland White and one or two more.

One could write for hours on Terriers, they are the most popular group of dogs, according to the American Kennel Club registration books in America. They seem to fill most any all-round purpose. They are a hardy lot of fellows, requiring very little pampering and coddling. They make wonderful companions, great pals and they all know how to take care of themselves if the occasion demands. They differ quite materially in certain ways but all possess definite Terrier characteristics in common.

All are intelligent, alert dogs, possessing outstanding intelligence. All are hardy, self-reliant dogs with an abundance of affection in their make-up. Just the sort of dogs that make splendid companions for youngsters and oldsters too.

WE are especially proud this month to be able to present on our outside cover a picture of the two Airedales recently imported by Sheldon W. Stewart of the famous Shelterock Kennels, Montclair, N. J. The pair have already made history. The dog, Warland Protector of Shelterock was Winners and Best of Winners at the Airedale Specialty Show of America; the bitch, Covert Dazzle of Shelterock, was Winners bitch, bowing to her kennel mate for top honors.

Following the Specialty Show the pair appeared at Westminster and at this greatest of all American events Warland Protector captured the Group and finally swept through to be judged Best of All Breeds. At Newark the following day the pair again repeated their wins, and at Boston once again they were Winners Dog, and Winners Bitch—with Best of Winners going to Warland Protector.

The picture used on this month's cover was made from a painting by the famous British Animal painter, L. W. Lucas, which was quite the sensation of a recent art exhibition in New York City. Capt. Lucas is famous for his "Terrier" paintings and so true to type are they that the expression "Lucas type" has become a real slogan on both sides of the Atlantic.

Airedales Description And Standard of Points

By Courtesy of the Airedale Terrier Club of America.

Head.—Long, with flat skull, not too broad between the ears and narrowing slightly to the eyes, free from wrinkle. Stop hardly visible, and cheeks free from fullness. Jaw deep and powerful, well filled up before the eyes, lips tight.

Ears.—V-shaped with a side carriage, small but not out of proportion to the size of the dog. The nose black. The eyes small and dark in color, not prominent, but full of Terrier expression. The teeth strong and level.

Neck.—Should be of moderate length and thickness, gradually widening toward the shoulders and free from throatiness.

Shoulders and Chest.—Shoulders long and sloping well into the back, shoulder-blades flat. Chest deep, but not broad.

Body.—Back short, strong and straight. Ribs well sprung.

Hindquarters.—Strong and muscular, with no droop. Hocks well let down. The tail set on high and carried gaily, but not curled over the back.

Legs and Feet.—Legs perfectly straight, with plenty of bone. Feet small and round, with a good depth of pad.

Coat.—Hard and wiry, and not so long as to appear ragged; it should also lie straight and close, covering the dog well all over the body and legs.

Color.—The head and ears, with the exception of dark markings on each side of skull, should be tan, the ears being of a darker shade than the rest, the legs up to the thighs and elbows being also tan, the body black or dark grizzle.

Size.—Dogs, 40 to 45 pounds weight. Bitches slightly less.

It is the unanimous opinion of the club that the size of the Airedale Terrier as given in the above standard is one of, if not, the most important, characteristics of the breed; all judges who shall henceforth adjudicate on the merits of the Airedale Terrier shall consider the undersized specimens of the breed severely handicapped when competing with dogs of the standard weight.

The Radio Dog Club

I AM already receiving hundreds of letters from people who "listen in" to "The Dog Magazine of the Air." In the future this department will answer the numerous doggy questions which are put to me by these listeners. As time goes on the department will be enlarged and articles giving basic facts about dogs will be included. You old time breeders may not care for this—but you could be mighty helpful in it if you would send in some of the ideas which have helped you in the past. The one-dog owner of today is the novice breeder of tomorrow, and to-day's novice is tomorrow's old-timer—with a string of show dogs and maybe a champion or two to his credit. The beginner deserves all the help we can give him—and this department will be devoted to that end.

Questions and Answers

Q: How can I keep my dog from jumping up on me when I come home after being out some time?

A: Hold his front paws firmly in your hand and at the same time reach forward with your foot and press on his hind foot. This will teach the dog that you do not like his too exuberant welcome. Have your callers do the same thing if he jumps on them.

Q: I have a pure white Collie that seems to be absolutely deaf. What can be the cause? The dog has never been injured.

A: The condition is one that is quite common among pure white dogs. The real cause baffles science but is well recognized.

Q: How can I teach my dog to fight? He is always in a good humor and just plays with other dogs when he meets them on the street.

A: For which you should be duly thankful. If you have ever owned a dog that "loved to fight" you would know just how troublesome one can be.

Usually your entire neighborhood winds up hating you, and eventually somebody has you hauled into court. Don't worry—the dog could probably hold his own if the necessity arose.

Q: How often should you feed a puppy?

A: It depends on the age—four or five times a day at eight weeks; three times a day from three or four months up to six or seven months. From that time on two meals a day with possibly a biscuit or a bone at noon. After a year, one main meal a day—preferably in the evening. In the morning a grown dog may have his bones or a handful of biscuits to chew on.

Q: How can I make my dog cross?

A: Why do you wish to make him cross? There is a vast difference between a dog that is a good watch dog and one that is cross. Most dogs are instinctively good watch dogs unless they are allowed to run at large and mingle too much with strangers. Cross dogs are something else

again. Don't try to make your dog cross—just be glad he isn't.

Q: How can you keep a white dog from shedding and do white dogs shed more than others?

A: Some dogs irrespective of color or breed naturally shed more than others—white dogs only seem to do so because their hair, being white is more noticeable. If a dog is in prime condition and sheds there is little you can do about it. If he is run down proper conditioning may help the shedding.

Q: My dog seems to smell so badly—what causes this?

A: It may be due to bad teeth—if so, extraction of any decayed teeth will clear up the trouble. If it is just a general "doggy odor" give the dog a weekly bath with a good dog soap. Cedar Shavings, used as bedding in the kennel will also help to destroy unpleasant odors. Be sure your dog is given a good daily grooming with a stiff, clean brush—this does much to allay any odors.

Here's the kind of a puppy anybody could love—a Wire-Haired Foxterrier, apparently thinking longingly of pumpkin pie—which he certainly shouldn't have. He'll have to be satisfied with hamburger and dog biscuits and leave the pie for his master.

Non-Sporting went to the Chow, East is West, owned by Livingston Osborne. Best Toy was Mrs. Quick's Pekingese, Ch. Fu Yen Shang.

The parade of champions was especially interesting with fifteen specimens strutting before the crowd.

This children's class brought out a number of youthful handlers. R. L. Davis judged this feature. The Boy's class was won by Billy Birtcher handling

a Boston Terrier; the Girl's class went to Barbara Hiatt handling an English Springer Spaniel.

The Cincinnati Show

The 14th Annual Dog Show given by the Cincinnati Kennel Club at Xavier Field House on March 17, 18 and 19, while not so large as some of Cincinnati's past events, was, all in all, a very successful show. The new setting to my mind, at least is far more attractive than Music Hall. There were some 394 entries.

Sporting Dogs was won by the Pointer, Elstone Spring owned by Mr. and Mrs. Frank H. Dayton, Middletown, N. Y. Sporting Dogs—Hounds—went to the Beagle, Ch. Marietta Queen owned by Dr. E. L. Cornman, Marietta, Pa. The Working Dog Group (and one of the best Groups in the show) went to Mr. and Mrs. Harkness Edwards' Great Dane, Gunar v. Hollergarten of Walnut Hall.

The Terrier Group was also an ex-

ceptionally nice one with top honors finally going to the Airedale, Warland Prefect, recently imported by Harold M. Florsheim of Chicago.

Toys went to the Pomeranian (the only one entered in the show) Canberra Allgold owned by Mrs. Leona H. Dengler, Comstock Park, Mich.

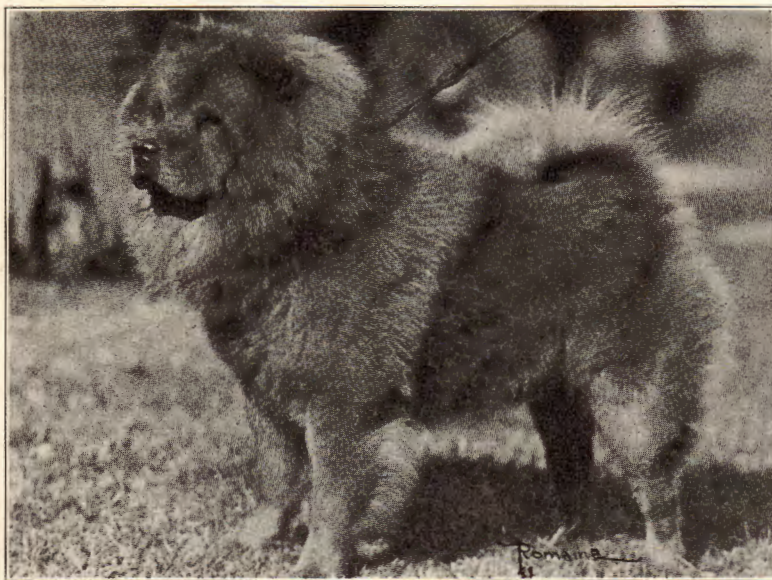

The Best In Show Group narrowed down to the two that had topped the Terrier and the Working Dog Group. Gunar, the Dane, was not in top form, as he was just recovering from a very serious illness contracted at the Detroit show. However, he put up his usual beautiful ring performance and to my mind there are few dogs in this country that have the superb ring presence of Gunar. The Airedale, Warland Prefect, was not to be denied and was the eventual choice for Best Dog in Show. He is an extremely fine specimen, one that should be quite a boon to the mid-western breeders.—A. R.

What Is a Dog Worth?

If not, \$500.00 will seem too high but if you have ever known and appreciated the love and devotion of a dog you will be apt to wonder why the Chicago woman did not sue for more.

Since the death of John Galsworthy recently, many lovely tributes to his memory have appeared. Most of us knew Galsworthy as the author of some of the finest English fiction, but few of us knew his tender little dog story "Memories" as published in "The Inn of Tranquillity in 1912." It is one of the finest stories ever written and if you have never read it, you have a treat in store for you. Look it up.

BIG Balto, the famous sled dog that on February 2, 1925, staggered into the stricken city of Nome, Alaska, carrying a 20 pound package of life-giving serum to the distraught health authorities, has passed away.

When a man dies, someone can always be found who will tell the good he has done, but when a dog sinks into his last sleep no one but his master gives him a single thought. It is seldom that the understanding, self-sacrificing love and devotion of any dog becomes apparent to the world at large. Only on rare occasions is the whole world brought cheering to its feet by the sheer drama and audacity of some dog's heroism.

It was such a day when Big Balto, the finest sled dog of the North lead the way through the blinding snow and knife-edged blizzard and finally nosed his way into the frantic and helpless city of Nome, Alaska. Long before, the driver had lost his way but Balto, with nose to the ground had clambered over the ice-blocked and invisible trail and finally brought his precious cargo safely home. Now Balto is dead. He died recently in the fullness of his years and in the warmth of human protection and love.

Is it not fitting that we should all pause a moment and recall his brave deed? No one knows how many lives he saved. One would have been enough and we can all pay tribute to Balto, as did the dog's master when he sat on the half frozen ground at the end of the trail in Nome.

That the Peke can almost invariably sit up on his hind legs or "chin chin" without being taught? 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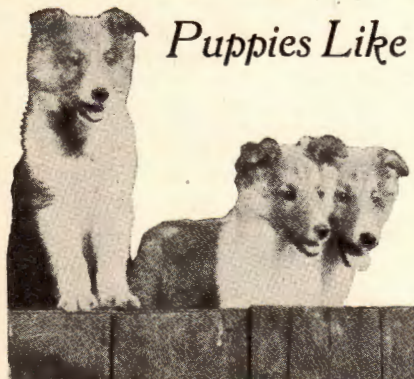
