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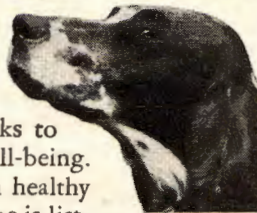

bitches for the upper classes. Elself Kennels are sending Can. and Am. Ch. Haldon Minstrel. His owners, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Fitz-Simmons, are making a visit to Tucson and have entered Minstrel for exhibition only at both the Tucson and Phoenix Shows.

Two of the best looking brindle bitches ever seen in the west are being brought out this late winter and spring by J. H. Tovrea, formerly of Tucson and now of Collidge, Arizona. This pair is sired by Ch. Heather Goldfinder ex Tovrea's good brindle bitch, Glendhu Gwennie (Ch. Walnut Aristocrat ex Heather Elizabeth). This pair are known as Glendhu Trinket and G. Grew. Trinket, at eight and a half months, was second in the Open and Reserve Winners Bitch at San Francisco under Dr. Henry Jarrett.

Mr. Finney tells us that he has a nice pair of black six month old bitches upon which he is building 1936 Spanish air castles. They are Jabberwock of Harken and Gossip of Harken and are by Ch. Pobble of Harken.

Shadow of Harken (Ch. Rosehall Roamer ex Ch. Pobble of Harken) was bred to Ch. Hallcrest Buccaneer, a breeding in which Mr. Finney has rather large expectations.

Shadow's litter brother, Master of Harken, stood at stud for the first time this January with two visitors, Fairwold Princess Pennac and Mrs. Robert Cairn's Flirt O'Ruchill. Flirt you will remember was Best in Show

at the October 1935 Tucson Charity Sanction match under Dr. H. E. Punchard of Denver.

A recent addition to the Scottie clan in Tucson is Mrs. Harriet Landon Smith of New York and Charleston, W. Va. Mrs. Smith recently acquired Crummet of Harken, a nice little bitch by Albourne Wattadorg O'Minebrook ex Malibu Heather Lassie.

Mr. Finney was especially elated with the showing made at Westminster by a favorite of his, Ch. Waldon Warrior. You will recall Mr. Finney stated in an article written for DOG NEWS last fall that Warrior was the best dog he had ever seen in the West. It is gratifying to read that of the first four in the Open, two were American-bred.

Mrs. John W. Blechaz of Tucson has a litter of six sired by Ch. Heather Goldfinder and out of Dancer of Harken that will bear watching. This is believed to be the second Goldfinder litter whelped in Arizona.

Rev. Wm. J. Macaulay has at the present time two especially fine daughters of Malony's Tibbie (Tibbie you will remember was killed accidentally by an auto early in the winter), with which he expects to carry on. Rev. Macaulay's son has another daughter. Rev. Macaulay bred one of the bitches to Int. Ch.

Talvera Ian. This bitch was by Ch. Red Gauntlet's Friar Tuck. Then the other bitch by Int. Ch. Albourne Sandman was allowed to go over her first season. Both of these should give top notchers. Mack's Welton Lassie has had a great litter to Ch. Walnut Aristocrat, one of the litter being Wynnewyre Walnutmaide.

Mack's Welton Daffin (Heather Romancer ex Mack's Betty Gow) has been bred to Ch. Dandy of Docken and is due to whelp the last week in March.

Tibbie's last litter was to Ch. Heather Goldfinder of which Mack's Welton Goldgetter and Mack's Goldtip are a part. Goldgetter was sold to Hal J. Ross of Hollywood, where he has received the acclamation of the most fanciers. Mr. Macaulay considers him to be the best bodied, boned and balanced dog he has ever seen. Goldtip who was sec-

Prepotency, Synonym: Polhill Prudence

PREPOTENCY in breeding Scotties for the desired type is an oft-heard word, and I fear oftener misused and abused than not. I think we will agree that it is surely the *summum bonum* of those fortunate breeders who chance to have one of those very occasional animals discovered to their uses. A peculiar thing holds fairly true of these fabled specimens: Many of them are *bought*, NOT BRED by those who reap the golden harvests from them.

The immortal Albourne Annie Laurie might well be termed the patron saint of prepotency, yet the woman who bred her, Mrs. R. Scrase-Dickens (nee Miss Wijk) never once bred from her, but the bitch was sold through Mr. Brosnan's and Mr. Cowley's hands before she came to rest with Mr. Lloyd, who kept her until she died. Necessity is perhaps the most successful sire in the world today, but the man who has realized the most from his prepotency, Mr. Chapman, bought him from a comparatively unknown breeder, whose name I have to look for in "The Book of Pedigrees," Caspersz, to find, a Mr. Walker. Conrad Bremer had bred Scotties for some years with only a modicum of success until he bought Ortley Violet Ray, which bitch at once began in connection with the Heather studs, Necessity, Fashion Hint, etc., to hurl the Ortley prefix to the forefront of fame. She is now the progenitress of seven champions, and what is to my mind one of the greatest feats of a Scottie breeder's life: Bremer has bred three champion bitches in tail-female, one right after another, as Ch. O. Elegance whelped Ch. O. Carmen who whelped Chs. O. Angela and O. Marion. Then Elegance has three champion daughters, all by Fashion Hint, but each one of a separate mating, another feat! And yet he himself admits that Violet Ray did it for him. Look what Ch. Walsing Whisper has done

from her, and this distinction is enjoyed by Mrs. Baker of England, whose "Polhill" prefix has played a sometimes quiet, but nonetheless eventful part in the making of many present-day great Scotties.

It is with pleasure I am able to give the life story of the bitch who has given us

again with Pollhill Dinkie, by Tattenham Tetrarch out of an Irish bred bitch. I mated her to Tetrarch's son, Tipler, and the resulting litter contained a lovely black bitch Pollhill Pert, with perfect body, ears, coat, and substance; she was a big winner as a puppy, including a third, at Cruft's. I mated her to

much of greatness, Polhill Prudence, in Mrs. Baker's own writing, thus:

Surrey, England,
8/11/35.

"Dear Mr. Horton,

"Many thanks for your letter and the very

Marksman of Docken—on Mr. Brosnan's advice, as he said: 'A lovely bitch but wants more head.'—and in the litter were five beautiful puppies: Prudence, Ch. Albourne Black Knight, a small black dog which went to France, a brindle dog too big for show, and another fine bitch that was never bred from, and which I tried in vain to buy back.

"I think you will see now why Prudence produces such fine puppies: Marksman was noted for his long head, quite exceptional in his day, and Tetrarch for producing beautiful bodies.

"Unfortunately Pert had only the one litter when, although she whelped easily and was not ill, my 'vet' said her womb must have become diseased; this was a great disappointment to me as she was, and still is, the most intelligent animal I have ever owned, and was a wonderful shower.

"Prudence was shown only twice, as she did not like it. A third at Croydon Open Show and V. H. C. (or fifth) in a class of nearly thirty under McCandlish at the S. T. C. Show, and much admired by Miss Wijk and Mr. Cowley who wanted to buy her. I have always tried to mate her to a son or grandson of Annie Laurie. She first went to Ch. Albourne Reveller and had six healthy puppies, but owing to excessively cold weather lost three of them. The others became Albourne Reveller's Replica, Polhill Progress—a beautiful brindle bitch, a winner and much admired, but a bad mother so did not rear

for the Singletons, who bought her for a companion for their son, originally!

It is no reflection on these people that they bought rather than bred their respective "Annie Lauries," and they are to be congratulated on having the good sense to make the most of their good fortune, but it is something of an added honour to have bred your prepotent bitch, as well as to have bred

nice things you have said about my kennel of Scotties. Unfortunately I have two businesses to look after so have had to give up nearly all breeding and showing, but I still have Prudence; her mother Pert; and a few of the younger generations.

"Although I have owned and bred Scotties in a very small way since I was quite young, I gave it up during the War and started

1935 English Show Scotties

ANOTHER year having rolled along, and the time seems opportune to review the happenings of Scottish Terriers on this side of the Atlantic and to take another glimpse at some of the most prominent dogs who have made another memorable year in the history of the ever popular Scottie. Is he still popular?—well who dare deny it! He now averages third place in the bred registrations at the Kennel Club. At any big show if you are not at the ring side about half an hour before the time for judging you would look for a seat in vain and if you are very much later you must be content to stand at the back of a crowd three of four deep and the one who can balance on his toes most skillfully sees more than the rest. A critical crowd too nowadays! Notice the new faces at the ring side and the newcomers handling their own dogs in the ring. At every show we see more and more who are being attracted to the cult of this "wee black devil." Many of them are taking up dog showing as a new and always fascinating game, several others are coming along from other breeds—just cannot resist keeping a Scottie or two—then, of course, it "gets 'em" and they're right into it before they know just what's happening.

This year of 1936 will see Three Specialist Championship Shows for Scottish Terriers. The Scottish Terrier Club of England hold their's as usual and Championship Status has also been granted to the Northern Counties Club at Manchester and the North of England Club at Leeds; these in addition to Challenge Certificates at all other championship events catering for the breed should

keep us all busy trying to breed that very often elusive good one of sufficient merit to do well in want promises to be a very keen hunt after the highest honours. New judges

are appearing too; some with just that difference of opinion on this point or that to keep us guessing as to what may happen. One hears many of them expressing very definite views on type or balance or—well we must not enter into all that now but perhaps it would be interesting to talk about it later;

many of these topics are becoming subjects of such heated argument they deserve special treatment.

Now let us look at this parade of 1935 or at least at the individual dogs and bitches which by their merit have reached the top or been very nearly there. Many deserve mention but time and space are against recalling them all. In England we Scottie breeders in the show game mark the beginning of the year by the National Terrier Show at Olympia and the end by the great event at the Bingley Hall, Birmingham in late November. The National comes along as a welcome opportunity, after six or seven weeks rest from championship events, to take stock and hazard a guess at those dogs most likely to create a stir during the first few months of the year. Mr. George Davidson, judging at this first show of 1935 attracted a large and representative entry as was to be expected under so popular and capable a judge. His methods are good to watch and he is not very long in finding the dogs to put "in the money." In the dog classes Sandheys Steady Lad came supreme; a good Terrier of the right size showing and looking well. He was strongly challenged by Walsing Whirligig and the minor dog classes were won by Walsing Wagtail—of these latter I ought not nor do I propose to say much. Wagtail, after running Reserve Champion at Crufts, where Steady Lad secured his qualifying certificate, was exported to America and from what I have heard of him since he is likely to keep the flag flying over there.

Standard of the Scottish Terrier

Description and Standard of Points

(Courtesy of The Scottish Terrier Club of America.)

SKULL: Long, of medium width, slightly domed and covered with short, hard hair. It should not be quite flat as there should be a slight stop or drop between the eyes.

MUZZLE: In proportion to the length of skull, with not too much taper toward the nose. Nose should be black and of good size. The jaws should be perfectly level and teeth square, although the nose projects somewhat over the mouth giving the impression that the upper jaw is longer than the lower.

EYES: Set wide apart, small and of almond shape, not round. Color to be dark brown or nearly black. To be bright, piercing and set well under the brow.

EARS: Small, prick, set well up on the skull, rather pointed but not cut. The hair on them should be short and velvety.

NECK: Moderately short, thick and muscular, strongly set on sloping shoulders, but not so short as to appear clumsy.

CHEST: Broad and very deep, well let down between the fore legs.

BODY: Moderately short and well ribbed up with strong loin, deep flanks and very muscular hind quarters.

LEGS AND FEET: Both fore and hind-legs should be short and very heavy in bone in proportion to the size of the dog. Fore legs straight or slightly bent with elbows close to the body, as Scottish Terriers should not be out at the elbows. Stifles should be well bent and legs straight from hock to heel. Thighs very muscular. Feet round and thick with strong nails, forefeet larger than the hind feet.

TAIL: Never cut and about seven inches long carried gaily with a slight curve but not over the back.

COAT: Rather short, about two inches, dense undercoat with outer coat intensely hard and wiry.

SIZE: About ten inches high at the shoulder and weight about 18 or 20 pounds for both sexes. The correct size must take into

consideration height fully as much as weight.

COLOR: Steel or iron grey, brindled or grizzled, black, sandy or wheaten. White markings are objectionable and can be allowed only on the chest and that to a slight extent only.

GENERAL APPEARANCE: The face should wear a keen, sharp and active expression. Both head and tail should be carried well up. This dog should look very compact, well muscled and powerful, giving the expression of immense power in a small size.

FAULTS: Eyes large, round or light colored. Light bone. Out at elbows. Ears round, drop or too large. Coat soft, silky or curly. Jaw over or undershot. Over or under size.

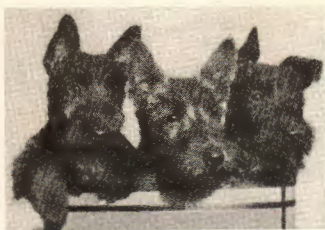

HAIL TO THE CHIEF! At Crufts, greatest of all general shows, Ch. Albourne Admiration won his 21st certificate, eclipsing the hitherto superlative show record of that superlative getter of champions, Ch. Heather Necessity, who holds 20 challenge certificates. And this eclipsing certificate was handed to Admiration by none other than Robert Chapman, the judge, and himself the owner of Ch. Heather Necessity. This situation might have put some men "on the spot" and the fact that Captain de Mowbray staked the game is testimony to his confidence in the high integrity and capability of Robert Chapman.

Unsoundness: When this writer visited Albourne Kennels in 1934, knowing Mr. Cowley's keen ability to judge, he asked him this direct question in these words: "What proportion of the British champions do you think are absolutely sound in movement?"



CH. ALBOURNE ADMIRATION

The winner of 21 challenge certificates, his last having been acquired at the 1936 Crufts event. This certificate puts Admiration one ahead of Necessity who holds 20 certificates.

He replied in these words: "Not over 1 per cent—in fact, I know of only one, Ch. Albourne Admiration. In her report of Crufts shows, Our Dogs, February 14th, Mrs. D. S. Caspersz comments upon Admiration as follows:

"Ch. Albourne Admiration won his 21st ticket amid loud applause, and right well did he deserve it; the best mover present, and retaining his clean skull permanently."

This writer thought Admiration the most nearly perfect show Scottish that came under his eye in Britain, and he saw all those of greatest reputation. He commends Mr. Cowley's statement to all those inexperienced judges of Scotties who criticize some great dog out of countenance because his toes turn in, or out, a bit, forgetting his great type.

Colour-Blindness: There are still those so sunk in darkness, in relation to Scotties, that they think Scotties should be black or their value is depreciated, and, as for a wheaten, which color was recognized in the first created Standard more than half a century ago, and has continued to be recognized in the several successive revisions here and

abroad—why, a wheaten Scottie is no Scottie at all. The writer had an amusing experience at the New Orleans show the other day when he exhibited a puppy, a pale wheaten, named Nosegay Gold Standard. The class was pretty hot and the chief competitors of Gold Standard were prepared and handled by experts, but the judge, Mr. S. H. Beddow, "knew his onions" well enough to be led astray on a feature that counts only 2½ points in the Standard, and he handed the Blue to Gold Standard. Forthwith a lady rushed up to the professional handler of the pup that went Second and explained: "Did you see THAT—was there ever such a decision?" The professional nonchalantly replied: "Yes, I saw it, and I think I would have done the same thing myself had I been the judge." Neither this professional nor the judge were color-blind. Ringsiders commented on the fact that there appeared to be more brindles, and some of them light-brindles, than blacks in this show; and it is a fact that both dog and bitch Winners were brindles.

New Orleans: The New Orleans show is distinct in that it is set in the midst of the Mardi Gras festivities and not in any circuit. The officers who put on this show, headed by D. F. Petipain, President, and R. C. Duncan, Secretary-Treasurer, deserve great credit for assuming the risks year after year and making a success of it sufficient to justify continuance. Mr. S. H. Beddow did most of the classes and Best in Show, with W. A. E. Woods officiating for Irish and Welsh Terriers. There were no complaints that this writer heard. Mr. Beddow took infinite pains. Winners Dog went to Nosegay Vitex, and Best of Breed to Nosegay Anchusa (each 3 points, fresh from her Scottie clean-up in San Francisco, and her great Reserve Winners success in the Specialty Show of the Scottish Terrier Club of America, in New York, under the British judge, Dr. Stuart Twigg. I am told that in the Specialty about 60 bitches competed, and the quality may be assumed. Anchusa is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Hal J. Ross, Hollywood, California. Winning five points in the Golden Gate show, February 2nd, she was rushed across the continent for the Specialty show, February 9th, and then taken to New Orleans. What bitch, not as game as the devil and sound as a dollar, could stand up under such a racket? Congratulations, Mr. Ross; and to John Banks her handler, though it was Ben Brown who put her over in Frisco. Anchusa now has eleven points.

Belated: Just why the American Kennel Club, after nearly 38 years, should send to me a nicely engraved certificate stating that prefix number 98 was awarded to "Nosegay," December 8th, 1898, I don't know. I don't recall that they ever sent me one nearly four decades ago when I registered "Nosegay" and paid \$3.00 for the award. The fee now is \$25.00 and I know that about a year ago nearly 5,000 kennels had been registered. I suspect that I am growing old.

Days of Grace: The impression among many inexperienced fanciers that bitches are standardized physically in the menstrual cir-

many puppies—and Pixie of Ralc, a winning small black bitch which died whelping her first litter.

"Prudence's next litter by Rookery Robin arrived five days early and two of five died; one was a poor specimen (she had very few like that), one Albourne All Scotch, and the other Pollhill Pepperbox, a champion in Holland.

"Prudence was next sent to Doctor of Delph and was his first bitch. She had seven puppies, six alive—the finest litter I have ever seen. One black bitch had a deformed front leg, so I put her to sleep, which I often regret doing. All the others I think were winners: Albourne Petronella, Albourne Pugilist, Croindene Concoction, Pollhill Pilgrim, and Pollhill Polly Perkins; the last named is still with me, and has just been mated to Pollhill Playboy (by Admiration out of Prudence).

"Prudence next missed, for the only time in her life, to Ch. Heather Necessity, Mr. Chapman returning the fee, saying it would be wasting his time to send her again.

"She was then sent to Ch. Sandheys Silver-tip and had two weak puppies which died the following day.

"Being thoroughly fed up with these results I sent her again to Doctor of Delph and she had five healthy puppies; three were sold as pets, a black bitch became a winner in Mr. Ford's Boldmere Kennels, and a black dog became Albourne Foresight (champion in France).

"The last litter Prudence reared was by Ch. Albourne Admiration: Two black dogs, and two black bitches, winners of first prize as a litter at the S. T. C. Show. One dog, Pollhill Playboy I still have—he was severely frightened as a puppy by a motor bus back-firing in his face, so he has not been shown; Pollhill Pamela, a big winner as a puppy, went to the Midlands; one dog sold young to Mr. Howard of Liverpool; and the bitch Glenshee Adoration is well on her way to being a champion in Switzerland.

"Prudence had one other litter by Ch. Albourne Admiration, but was so long whelping that her six puppies died, and my 'vet' advised me not to breed from her again, although she was then only six years old.

"All this goes to show that black predominates in her litters, with one of two brindles, but in each mating to Doctor of Delph she has produced one and two wheaten puppies. Prudence still has a perfect mouth, but Pert has not.

"I have not had a light eye or bad ears, but should have liked a wee bit shorter tails on some of them and as very short backs are needed in England today to win, I am trying to breed for that. I think I am rather old-fashioned in one respect, but personally think the Scottie is being spoilt with such a short back as it tends to make them look artificial. Prudence is dark brindle, thoroughly sound, has a good body, coat, ears, and eyes, perfect front, is low to ground and the correct size. Her head would not be considered long enough nor her back quite short enough for present day winners. In character Prudence is a true Scot, she is my bitch and does not want anyone else,

unless at meal times and then she will accept the rest of the family as she is rather greedy. She has unbounded pluck and would fight anything if I would let her. She is an excellent guard and most obedient and I have found, with very few exceptions, her progeny have been blessed with wonderful dispositions and keen intelligence. She is now eight years old.

"I quite agree with you that Prudence has not had her just dues but I have not had enough time to show or breed, either with her or her daughters to do justice to their undoubted possibilities.

"I have never had professional photos taken of any of my dogs, but have a few snaps, which I enclose, which may just be of interest to you.

"You will, I hope, excuse this welter of explanation, but as your letter indicates a wish for full particulars I don't think you will mind, as no doubt you will know where to use the pruning knife.

Certainly a very real achievement for any bitch, all this, but the thing of much greater importance is that Prudence is carrying on today through several of her progeny.

Several years ago Mr. Cowley offered Albourne Petronella for sale in *Our Dogs* for £100 with the statement that she was one of the best bitches in the Kingdom, and could easily become a champion. He described her as a grey brindle then. She dropped out of print for some time, and evidently he found no purchaser at the time. However she got busy in the nursery and in 1934 the Albourne prefix began accumulating challenge certificates with a lovely black bitch called A. Veronica, who was out of Petronella. A little later a brindle dog came out called A. Sandman, also out of this bitch, and after a good show career in which he was variously written about by many of the judges as being a most unusually high class specimen, he got his three c. c.'s. I saw him in his kennel, and the next day at Brighton Championship Show in September, 1934, and

has been but a succession of triumphs. He has gone Best of Breed twice at Portland, Longbeach, Santa Barbara and Omaha and was Best of Winners at Chicago. Sent east in February under the care of Leonard Brumby he placed Best Opposite Sex at the New York Specialty under the English judge, Dr. J. S. Twigg in an entry of 119. At the Garden the following day he placed second in the open class to Flornell Soundfella, the latter eventually being Best of Breed. He was Best Opposite at New Haven and Reserve, (Soundfella being Winners,) at Boston.

Shown in Canada three times, he was Best of Breed once, and twice Best in Show, all breeds, acquiring fourteen points at the three events.

Warrior's latest win was at the Cleveland Classic, where in an entry of 53 he placed Best of Breed under Judge Caswell Barrie.

It is said that no Scottie on the west coast, home-bred or otherwise, has ever equalled Warrior's record.

He is described as a black dog with a very short back, great spring of ribs, a beautiful head, and very well balanced. In addition he is a dog that really *likes* to show. Warrior will return from the east to his home at the Iron Hill Kennels where he holds sway at top stud dog in May.

won first American Bred at Westminster and second American Bred at the New York Specialty.

Mr. Jim Horton spent the past weekend with Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Cooper of Memphis, whose "Craignish" prefix is finding itself on some good Scotties. They have had the rare intelligence to send their best bitches off to the best dogs available, not just to secure the prestige of champion-bred puppies, but in order to improve, and they have gotten steady improvement to a most gratifying extent. One litter from Ch. Walnut Aristocrat out of their good Ch. Bullthistle of Nosegay daughter, "Craignish Cuddler," contained three superlatively good ones. A grey bitch, "Craignish Grey Mist" is of high show quality and a potential dam of champions. Her

brother, "Craignish Crusader," a very black-brindle, is one of the best young dogs Mr. Horton has ever seen anywhere, and is of such quality as to be fit to show to the title. Having only four broods they are using now, this dog will be sold; none of the four can be bred to him because of being a sister, mother, and grandmother, etc. Mr. Horton believes that to be a pity, as he is a dog who would be more than useful to them.

Mack's Welton Goldgetter whose picture appears in this issue is owned by Hal J. Ross of Hollywood. Mr. Ross who recently made his advent into Scottiedom, is one of the world's greatest showman, having staged successful shows all over Europe and the United States. A visit to Dr. Fayette C. Dr. Fayette C. Ewing has been unanimously elected honorary president of the Scottish Terrier Club of America. H. Alvin McAleenan is the new secretary, and Messrs. Hartshorne, Leib, Moran and Statler make up the new board of governors.

The annual club trophies for 1935 were awarded as follows: The Francis G. Lloyd memorial trophy (to be awarded annually to the dog or bitch scoring the greatest number of points) went to the Braw Bright Kennels of Mr. and Mrs. Donald D. Voorhees. Braw Bright also won the puppy dog class trophy, the puppy bitch class trophy, and the American-bred class trophy. The American-bred dog class trophy went to Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Stalter.

The remaining three awards were accounted for by Ch. Ramoan Certainty who at the time was owned by Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Voorhees and has since been sold, and who topped all breeds at Skytop; Ch. Heather Wee Gilpie, owned by T. W. Bennet, who won at Ottumwa, Iowa; and Ch. Nosegay Cuckoo Bud, owned by Dr. F. C. Ewing, who was the Best in Show Winner at El Paso, Texas.

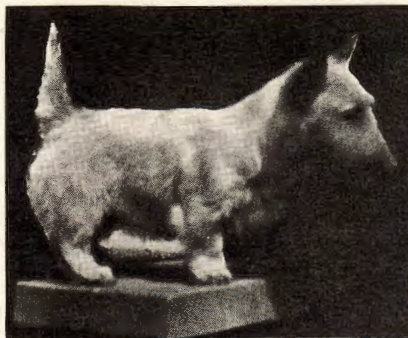

Dominant, Albourne Samson and Malgen Dhu, all dogs which have consistently been well in the awards, were making the going good and strong. The bitch classes too were most interesting and included Gaisgill Minnie, Gleniffer Titbit, Rachael of Rookes, Broxtton Brand and the eventual certificate winner Malgen Dainty Damozel who gained her first certificate. Damozel is just the type to appear to Mr. Davidson, and when he placed her over such a collection of high class bitches it was evident that he had fallen for her charms. This little lady came out again in May superbly handled by Arthur Wade and looking better than ever and at the L. K. A. at Olympia I had the pleasure of giving her a second certificate to have the decision confirmed the following day at the Great Joint Terrier Show by no less an authority than Major Johnson. Damozel had been thereabouts on quite a number of occasions but she only needed to be dressed in the right garb and made to stand up to her job to pull off the honours she so richly deserved. Gleniffer Tit-Bit quite deserved the title which she attained, possessing a good head with beautiful eye and expression and a most typical body, she proved a most popular champion.

Sam Bamford judged at Manchester in March and the competition here proved exceptionally keen. Albourne Black Magic emerged victorious in dogs over such strong contestants as Randolph of Rookes, Ch. Albourne Admirer, Albourne Late Addition and Albourne Samson—a great collection to be sure but on the day Black Magic thoroughly deserved his certificate. The bitches too were worth going miles to see. From a collection including Damozel, Broxtton Brand and Ch. Scotia Generous Gift, Rosehall Ideal was high in favour and she was well within reach of the certificate until Gleniffer Tit-Bit came out in most marvellous form and ran to victory in the Open Class. Rosehall Ideal had not long to wait, however, for the distinction which such a high class bitch deserved. At Leeds in the summer she won a fourth certificate and if I remember rightly brought further honour to herself and the breed by going Best All Breeds in Show.

Another dog we must recall is Albourne Late Addition, after taking his first two certificates in quick style he had to remain content to wait awhile for his third but he managed it before the year was out and a most creditable champion he is too, his glorious head, eye and expression are almost unbeatable in the breed today. This dog joined the stud of Mr. William Crawford who has created quite a stir in the ranks of Scottie people by making a very determined, and let it be said, very successful bid to acquire a collection of stud dogs of the highest class. Late Addition, Samson and Black Magic are all at Falkirk together with the sensational little dog Malgen Juggernaut, who is without doubt one of the soundest and best balanced Scottish Terriers in this country.

The sensational dog of 1934 was Heather Realization and he made a number of appearances during the past year to prove that he was well worthy of the distinction which he gained. His greatest win was no doubt the Challenge Certificate followed by Best in Show All Breeds at the Great Scottish Show at Edinburgh in September. Many were the

congratulations extended to Mr. Robert Chapman on that memorable occasion.

Ortley Marion was proof that the Ortley Kennel still produces champions with unflinching regularity but it fell to the lot of Miss Lowe to upset the cynics and it is possible for a newcomer to the breed and to the show ring to pilot a bitch to Championship honors in the face of really hot competition. The bitch is Sparkle Noless, bred by Mrs. Knowles and sold to Miss Lowe as a puppy. Although Sparkle was not always a trier when in the ring she could, on certain occasions be prevailed upon to make a really determined effort to prove herself the high class bitch she undoubtedly is and very worthily joined the ranks of the elite. Walsing Waterlily won four certificates at successive shows during September and has now crossed the Atlantic to join the kennel of Dr. Flora Pedicord in Zanesville.

Mrs. Scrase-Dickens wound up the year's Championship events at Birmingham and a very good entry turned out, but it was left to two almost fresh faces to upset form by emerging triumphant over many of the old favorites. The Dog certificate fell to Heather Beau Ideal and although I have not seen this dog I hear good reports of him; the bitches were headed by Brantvale, owned

handled and put down in immaculate form by George Barr. We are looking forward to the re-appearance of these young Scotties during this year.

It does not seem necessary, nor can I think it would be of very great interest to set out in detail each show with its separate winners but it can perhaps be appreciated that the dogs to reach the top of the prize lists have had to fight really hard. We have not this year been able to go along to any particular show and feel that a certain dog or bitch would be there and the result a foregone conclusion. The standard has been uniformly high and many have been the hard tussles for first place. It cannot be denied that the general quality is improving still further and many classes at the shows have brought out five or six and even more exhibits that have all been worthy of winning the certificate, as in fact many of them have done at some later fixture. Another interesting fact which appears worthy of note is that the honor of siring winners has fallen to a greater number of dogs that has usually been the case, and if my figures are correct we have had three dogs and six bitches attain the title of champion during the year but only two of these have been sired by the same dog.

cle; that they have just so many "days of grace" from the time they begin menstruating to the time when they will accept the dog, and that the acceptance period is definitely the same in all, should be corrected. Not a few bitches have I had to send back in my time because they were too late and the matter is now brought unfortunately to my mind by my having to return a bitch 500 miles and her worthy owner compelled to stand expense of shipment and the heavy loss of a litter of pups. Bitches vary greatly both in "coming in" and in "going out." They may go more than two weeks before "Barkis is willing," and some-

times they are not "willing" for more than about 48 hours, though they may accept the dog throughout ten days. Unless delivery can be made in 24 hours, ship your bitch on first "signs."

The Cleveland Classic

NEVER before, has the mid-west had as successful a show as that held on March 14 and 15 by the Western Reserve Kennel Club in Cleveland. The entry was huge—1592 representing 1370 actual dogs. Springer Spaniels set an all-time high for American shows with 117 Springers competing, and to this breed goes the honor of having the largest entry in the show. The gate was enormous—twice as large as in 1935 and on Sunday especially the huge hall was jammed to capacity from noon until closing time.

It has been said time and time again that Westminster has a flavor all its own and the same can truly be said for the Cleveland Classic. The moving spirit at the event is "Bill"—(Little Black Bag) Breed and he seems to have a perfect genius for anticipating and fulfilling exhibitors' and spectators'

wants. Nothing that would add to one's comfort or pleasure is overlooked. Undoubtedly this spirit has helped to bring the Cleveland Show from 38th place some six years ago up to 5th in 1935. So far this year Cleveland holds second position, having passed Boston in number of entries for the first time. Right now it looks as though she would wind up in third position for the year although the Detroit crowd are a live one and may spring a surprise on April 11 and 12. Last year they slipped into fourth position—30 dogs ahead of Cleveland. This year's Western Reserve entry of 1370 however is a tough mark to beat. Whether Cleveland winds up in third or fourth place makes little difference, the real point being that in the past few years the Western Reserve Kennel Club has made the greatest progress with its annual show of any club in America.

This year the auditorium where the show was held was beautifully decorated in silver and blue—the combination giving the huge room a delightfully light and airy appearance. Vases of flowers in the judging rings and in the many booths around the outer walls added to the fresh and spring-like appearance of the show setting.

There were parties galore—a dinner for the judges and ring stewards on Saturday and a supper the same night when Mrs. Breed entertained. Exhibitors were wine and dined at luncheons, dinners and suppers by the various breed clubs in the Cleveland vicinity. In fact, festivities of every sort kept up until the very closing of the show.

One could go on and on recounting the many pleasant innovations of the Cleveland show—but on to the winners.

Quality in the groups was unusually high and one saw many of the Garden winners competing again at Cleveland. In fact three of the groups were taken by dogs which had taken these same honors at Westminster in February. We again had the Irish Setter Ch. Millson O'Boy topping the Sporting Dogs. In Non-Sporting the Poodle, Ch. Nunsoe Duc de la Terrasse of Blaken came through, as at the Garden, to head the group. In Terriers, the Sealyham, Ch. St. Margaret Magnificent of Clairedale repeated his New York win.

Sporting Dogs, Hounds, went to the splendid Beagle, W. C. Edmiston's Merry Hicks. Toys found the Pekingese John B. Royce's Ch. Kai Lung of Remenham heading the group and the Working Dog honors were carried off by the Doberman Pinscher, Brunhilde v. Petershoff, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Biery.

The Best in Show class was judged by Mr. David Wagstaff and he went over each entrant in a very thorough and painstaking manner. Interest at the ring-side was at high pitch while this class was being judged for here real quality was represented—The Irish Setter had been Best in Show at the May Morris and Essex event; the Poodle had topped all breeds at the Garden in '35 and the Sealyham was fresh from his two Best in Show wins within a month—Westminster and New Haven.

Judge Wagstaff lined them up, sorted them out and finally placed Ch. St. Margaret Magnificent of Clairedale at the head of the class. This Sealyham, owned by the Clairedale Kennels of Riverside Long Island is certainly making history. He had already gone Best in Show at 1936's two largest events to date.

News From England

By Garth Whittaker, "Marsdene," Primley Park Mount, Alwoodley, Leeds, Eng.

WITH his Golden Jubilee Show Mr. Charles Cruft realised his great ambition—a ten thousand entry. Since the middle '20's he has been aiming at this mark and on several occasions he has only missed by a few hundreds. Now he has achieved it, and in doing so has set up a new world's record entry of 10,650 which, one imagines, is likely to stand for a long time. These entries were made up by 4,388 exhibits, which is also a world's record.

Perhaps even more astonishing than the total entry was the figure set up by a single breed. Labrador Retrievers, who do not usually figure at the head of a show entry in Britain although they invariably do well at Cruft's, made no fewer than 898 entries, which, I think I am safe in saying, is an easy world's record. Altogether there were 200 Labradors entered for the show so that the average number of entries per dog was the extraordinarily good one of 4½. Cocker

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Spaniels also did brilliantly, 250 Cockers making 766 entries, but of course great entries from this breed—now the most popular in the country—are taken as a matter of course at British shows. Pekingese, like Cockers, had more dogs in the show than had the Labradors, but whereas the Labradors averaged 4½ per exhibit, the Pekingese only made 359 entries with 208 dogs. Among the other big entries were Alsations 255 (dogs 154), Bulldogs 250 (dogs 80), Cairn Terriers 296 (dogs 148), Chows 371 (dogs 111), Smooth-haired Dachshunds 252 (dogs 143), Dalmations 200 (dogs 81), Wire-haired Foxterriers 281 (dogs 113), Pomeranians 201 (dogs 42), Golden Retrievers 226 (dogs 102), Scottish Terriers 230 (dogs 84), Sealyham Terriers 213 (dogs 83), Irish Setters 252 (dogs 126), and English Springer Spaniels 239 (dogs 74). At the other end of the list we have such entries as Boxers 10 (dogs 9), Boston Terriers 34 (dogs 17), and Chesapeake Bay Retrievers 11 (dogs 7). There may be more encouragement for the future in these last totals than might appear at first glance, however. There certainly seems some hope for Bostons.
