ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Scottish Terrier Club took place at the home of the president, Mr. Francis G. Lloyd, 157 East 71st Street, New York City, on Friday, February 21st, at noon.

The Secretary-Treasurer, Miss Brigham, being unexpectedly absent on account of illness at home, Mrs. Saunders was requested to act as Secretary, pro tem., and presents the following minutes:

The Secretary-Treasurer's report was read, and it was moved and carried that it be accepted as soon as it should be audited by the President.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

With so many of our members in our country's service, 1918 was naturally a quiet year for the Scottish Terrier Club. It started sadly for us with the illness and death of one who for many years was a devoted officer, member, and friend. I think there is no one among us who has known or known of Miss Fanny Brooks but appreciates how great is our loss.

We have gained two new members and lost five by resignation. Several more are behind two or three years with dues and I await your desire in regard to this.

Our trophies were offered at all shows where our Club judges officiated save one, where, unfortunately, letters requesting them were not received. On learning who was to judge I telephoned the Superintendent to see if something

could be done, but was told the list had gone to press. I wrote to the judge expressing regret from the Club and myself. All correspondence in regard to this is on file, including her reply. A good many shows did not include Club judges, resulting in disappointment to members who wished to compete for our specials. In the summer Bulletin I suggested it might be desirable to drop the list during the war and asked for opinions in regard to it. None being given I could only abide by our rules. Specials went up at twelve shows, resulting as follows:

Open—Ch. Walescott Whim—4 wins.

Reserve—Ch. Walescott Albourne Crow.

American Bred—Walescott Whim—5 wins.

Reserve—Morning Nip's Nosegay.

Bred by Exhibitor—Walescott Whim—5 wins.

Reserve—Boglebrae Racoon.

Puppy Trophy—Boglebrae Racoon—2 wins.

Trap Rock Trophy—no wins.

Ch. Dog Trophy—no wins.

Ch. Bitch Trophy—Glenmanor Smiling morn—1 win.

Our rules being, three wins or more are necessary to deliver a trophy; I suppose the last five are void. Acting on this supposition, I again offered the Brooks Trophies, the cash for which is in the Club funds, so that in this victory year our members might all compete for them in her memory. If I have done wrong I will gladly reimburse the Club and offer them myself as a memorial to one who loved clean sport and competition.

The Glenmanor Trophy was won once at New York. Our Specialty Show and the Boston Show were cancelled. Upon receipt of the quest from

Mr. Gall for specials for New York and our President's letter asking for a large entry, I wrote Mr. Hall asking if it might go up under the same conditions for 1919, foolishly saying if I heard nothing I would do so. After waiting several days, I wired Mr. Gall to put it up. Mr. Hall has since written that he did not receive this letter nor did he believe it had been written, and that he had written to Mr. Gall withdrawing the Trophy. Mr. Gall wired me for confirmation of this and I replied, "If Mr. Hall wishes Trophy withdrawn would advise doing so."

Our Specialty Show was given up with regret on account of the distance from New York and the war time expenses. In regard to the Produce Stakes, we had three stud dogs represented by five of their get and five brood bitches with nine of their produce, and I await your instructions in regard to their continuance.

We still have \$600.00 in Liberty Bonds all coupons attached and a working balance of about \$250.00 in the Old Colony Trust Co., Boston. Nearly \$200.00 are still out in unpaid dues.

The renomination of officers was much appreciated by the old board and the election results as follows:

In closing my report I would like to call the attention of the Club to one of our ex-officers and valued members, who, whether in the Navy,

Aviation, or civil life, has always cheerfully given time, thought and service to our Club and its members; we all have the habit of turning to him for advice, and I ask you to join me in gratefully thanking Lieut. Sedgwick for his many courtesies.

The following motions were made and carried:

That Mr. Little outline for the Club a scheme he proposes, that met with great favor, of having a local group in each large centre, in charge of the local interests of Scotties, with responsibility for them.

That Mr. Little bring before the Club members some temporary scheme to that end, that may, if approved by them, be tried out this year.

That the Club hold this year a Specialty Show. The Committee appointed to take charge was Messrs. Little and Sedgwick. It was the sense of the meeting that this Show be held in or near New York, at about the time of the L. K. C. Show, early in June.

That the Produce Stakes be continued another year. Mr. Hall was the committee appointed in charge of this.

That, on account of unsettled conditions of past years, members with dues in arrears shall have one more notice sent them, that if dues are not paid in, they will be dropped from the Club; and that, in case of no reply, they be automatically dropped.

That an up-to-date list of members with their addresses be printed and sent to each member (preferably in some issue of the Bulletin).

That a committee be appointed to investigate recent matters of controversy between members, affecting the welfare of the Club, and to report to the Governors, who shall take action on such report to any extent which comes within their province.

The Editors of the Bulletin made an eager appeal for a more generous supply of material.

Mr. Little presented a particularly earnest plea that the members of the Club should furnish him with scientific data about breeding. For this he has prepared blanks with certain questions from the breeder's, not the fancier's, viewpoint. The Carnegie Institute is already back of him in collecting these data, and he begs the Club to cooperate, and to keep records carefully for him. No single dog will be revealed as to identity, being represented solely by a number. Those present, he claimed, could send in, within a year, information that it would cost from \$75,000 to \$100,000 to collect by experimentation.

WESTMINSTER SHOW

Lieut. Sedgwick was asked to write up the New York Show for us and has sent in a characteristically open-minded review.

SCOTTISH TERRIERS AT WESTMINSTER SHOW

The entry was a poor one numerically, due largely to curtailment of breeding because of the war, but there is no blinking the fact that the other rough-coated terrier varieties, with only two or three exceptions, made much better showings than did the Scots and it is right up to every member of the Club to do his or her utmost to put our favorite breed back in its rightful place.

Quality was rather good in the main, the dogs better than the bitches, which is to be deplored, for in the goodness of the latter lies the strength of a kennel, and there is a most unfortunate lack of big, sturdy bitches capable of producing and rearing the right sort of pups. There were plenty of inquiries for youngsters but the casual show-goer seems to have little idea of what it costs to breed and rear, or try to, in these days and that in order to run a kennel on a business basis, breeders cannot be expected to sell at least average young stock for such a price as \$25.00.

A brief review of the classes follows and, as always, when I write one, it is not intended as a criticism of the judges' work but merely as an

expression of opinion given for what it may be worth.

"There were only three dog puppies but if the winner, Walescott Solomon, goes on well he should make a name for himself. Just over seven months old, he is hard to fault though of course he will need to thicken and let down. He was not right in coat and at first did not show very well, but his capital head, short body, big quarters, and soundness carried him to the top. The second, Norman, only a few days under a year old, was more matured but is a bit coarse, big enough in ear, and could be shorter in back. He has a long head and good bone but lacks the finish and outline of the other. Glenmanor Tartan, third, is a smart shower, with a good expression, but is light all through and lacks the sturdiness a real Scott must have.

Novice was a repeat.

American-bred went to Town Tickler, a showy dog, well put down, but too much on the leg for my fancy and might well have given way to Boglebrae McTavish, a low-set little chap, a bit plain in head and does not move quite right behind but with a deep, short body and a lot of real character. Nosegay Crowfoot, third, has a good head but is too far from the ground and quite long enough in back. Gael Random Rough, reserve, has a good front but rather light in eye and common in ear, and could have been much better with more flesh and coat on him.

Limit brought out a new one in Taybank Leader, a rather small but well-knit dog, very clean in skull, good in eye and ear, but could be tighter in shoulders and harder in coat. Walescott Wag, second, stood out in this class and though his coat

had begun to break, should have won easily. He has a grand head, short deep body, big ribs and quarters, a neat tail, and is a real Scot all over, to my mind the best one shown with a bit to spare. Ornsay Jack, third, is a corky little dog, but there isn't enough of him anywhere and McTavish, reserve, should easily have been over him.

Open saw Albourne Jack at the top, a very lucky but popular win, for Mrs. Evans has not shown much of late and everyone was glad to see her and the old warrior again. Robert Irvine had him in fine form but despite his good head, coat, and short tail, he shows his age fore and aft and got much higher than anyone expected. Wag, who should have won, was second with Ch. Maister Wullie, looking and showing well, third, and another and better champion, Walescott Whim, reserve, though I made him second best here. Just on the big side, he excels in head and front, has huge short bone, and is a grand shower, trying every minute. Wag beats him in eye and ear, and for his size is just a little shorter in back, but Whim is hard to get away from and it is a treat to see this brace showing against each other.

Winners and Reserve went to Albourne Jack and Taybank Leader, both very lucky indeed.

Puppy bitches were only two, Walescott Susan, a smart little one, good in head and jacket, winning rather handily from Glenmanor Girvan, a quality bitch but lacking substance. Susan won again in novice with two of Mr. Bixby's, Raksha and Rarebit, second and third, both promising young bitches but rather overwhelmed by the crowd around the ring. Girvan got reserve.

American-bred was won well by Walescott Winkie, a good headed and bodied bitch, in fine form

and a great shower, could be better in front. Susan was second, Hillcot Hottentot, a smart bitch, too fat and not right in coat, third, and Raksha reserve.

Glenmanor Lovely, first in limit, is a very fair sort but was lucky here, for though a stylish shower she is a bit wide in ear placement, and should be lower to ground and darker in eye. Walescott Reba, second, also lucky, needs more length of head, is long in back and rather light in eye, but is a good mover and was well put down. Winkie, third, might have won here, and reserve went to Glenmore Louise, good in head and expression but stands over a lot of ground and is not too good in shoulders, should have been higher than she got.

In open, Reba, Winkie, and Louise filled the first three places, with Talisker Bagpipes, a smart, showy little one, needing substance, reserve.

In winners and reserve, the judge reversed his original placings and put Reba over Lovely, which occasioned a technically correct but not very sporting protest, the rosette subsequently went back to Lovely.

Team and brace were easy wins for the Walescotts, Albourne Jack was best of the breed, and Reba best American-bred.

There were eight, six females, and they certainly looked like a good bet but for some reason they did not pull through. I do not know what the trouble was as they seemed perfectly healthy up to the time they died."

Nosegay Kennels has sold a grand dog pup named Nosegay-Meadow-Sage, by Ch. Ems Morning Nip x Bannockburn Rosie, to R. G. Hertzler, Lancaster, Pa. Bannockburn Rosie is dam of Nosegay Crowfoot, also Bannockburn Chief, he also by Morning Nip, before his importation. Chief is a noted English winner. Mr. Hertzler also bought a bitch pup by Morning Nip x Bonnacord Dora.

Mr. Lloyd's news, received before the New York Show, was as follows:

"Yours asking for copy for the next Bulletin at hand and I'm afraid I haven't much to offer—I put all my cards on the table when I announced that I thought Walescott Solomon, who is to be shown at Westminster, 'the best Scottie ever whelped,' but he is still a puppy and will be until cherry time; or perhaps I was a bit previous and

have another think coming."

(From what Mr. Sedgwick writes of this puppy it would seem that Mr. Lloyd's "cards" will prove trumps.)

Miss Newton is "looking for a nice tried young brood bitch, and also a young dog to show. I should want a bitch to breed this spring as my 'kennel,' due to war conditions, is in a state ludicrous or pathetic, dependent on the point of view."

Gael Kennels wishes to announce a new litter of six pups x Gail Yately Belle, by Champion Walescott Whim. Gael Yately Bairn also has been bred to Whim. Gael Fife, of the same mating, is developing, as we hope, into a very promising specimen.

Mrs. Saunders has written since that she has a beautiful litter of pups born March 2nd, by Champion Whim x Yately Bairn.

Here is Mr. Sedgwick's news: "Have bought from Mr. A. G. Hertzler, Hillcote Hottentot, giving in part payment a dog pup by Walescott Sirdar x Coomassie. Have sold a dog of this litter to Mrs. Donald Parson, of Pinehurst, N. C., and have for sale a very smart bitch puppy. Have sold Coomassie to Mr. Prentice Talmadge, Bernardville, N. J., and Hottentot has been bred to Walescott Sirdar."

Mrs. Zug's "Highland Mary" had one brindle bitch pup on December 28th, by Bunt Lad, a son of Champion Conqueror. Mary is a daughter of Walescott Merlewood Laddie and Lochiel Bunt.

Mr. C. C. Little has moved to Huntington, L. I., and hopes to have some of his favorites with him ere long.
