

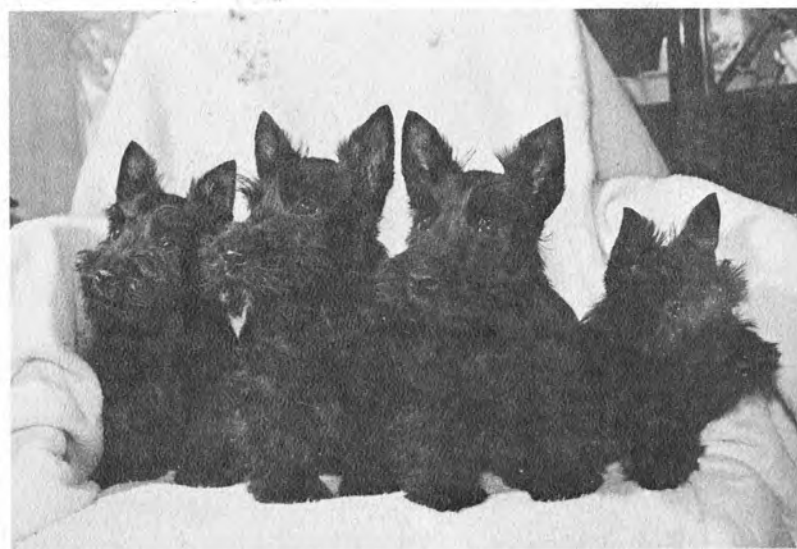

SUMMARY OF THE MINUTES OF THE S.T.C.A. BOARD OF DIRECTORS' MEETING – CRANFORD, NEW JERSEY, FEBRUARY 6, 1982

The President called the Meeting on order at 9:40 A.M.

Present were: Catherine Ridgley, President; J.E. Ingram, Vice-President; Kathi Brown, Corresponding Secretary; Marjorie Cohen, Recording Secretary; Robert Marshall, Treasurer; Dr. T. Allen Kirk, Jr., Delegate to A.K.C.; Nancy Fingerhut, Sandi Hach, Bill Justus, Helen Prince, Dr. Alan Riga, Danalee Saar, Jackie Seelbach.

Mr. Marshall moved, seconded by Dr. Kirk to dispense with reading the minutes of the October 3, 1981 Meeting. Carried unanimously; the Minutes were approved as distributed.

RECORDING SECRETARY'S REPORT: As of a current date there are 324 individual memberships, 176 family memberships and 8 Honorary memberships, a total of 508.

The 1982 Roster will be available in approximately a month from the date of the Meeting.

TREASURER'S REPORT: The Bank balance, exclusive of the Stalter bequest, is about \$8,000. A budget has been proposed for the 1981-82 fiscal year.

PUPPY TRAINING

E.M. GILDOW, D.V.M.

The old adage "You can't teach an old dog new tricks" has in recent years gained added importance as the result of studies made at the Roscoe B. Jackson Memorial Laboratory at Bar Harbor, Maine, and at Guide Dogs for the Blind, Inc., at San Rafael, California. Results of these studies have not only added materially to the general knowledge of dog training, but have made some spectacular findings—among which is that puppies permitted to be with their mother and littermates up to sixteen weeks of age with little contact or attention from the caretaker can NEVER be properly trained subsequently, regardless of their intelligence.

One can recollect favorable impressions made by dogs that seemed to have been superior in training and manners as contrasted to others that were impossible to tolerate. A dog that observes restrictions both inside and outside of the house, who respects the owner's and the neighbor's property and yet is friendly and companionable is a joy to all with whom he comes in contact.

A particular set of circumstances usually has been fulfilled in the development of such a dog. This includes: first, the selection (intentionally or otherwise) of an intelligent young dog of the proper type, class or breed for its intended use; and second, an interested person who will be consistent and regular in a training program.

TIME TABLE

The workers at Bar Harbor have used hundreds of puppies of several breeds in the study of puppy behavior and management. They have found four distinct periods in the life of a puppy and have established the time when special training and socialization with people are needed.

The first period is from birth to three weeks of age. During this time when his senses of seeing, hearing and smelling are just developing, when his time is spent sleeping and eating, he is incapable of any measure of learning.

From three to seven weeks of age he stays with his mother and littermates, learning to play and fight—and is disciplined by his mother. During this period he learns to socialize with his kind. Puppies weaned and removed from contact with dogs at four weeks of age often will never associate with dogs at a later time, but will prefer people. Many naturalists and scientists have shown that young animals and birds, when raised by humans, accept them as their parents.

The next period, from weaning at seven or eight weeks to twelve weeks, is a period when the pup should be separated from his mother and littermates and training started. It is difficult or impossible to properly train puppies that are left with their mother or with littermates during this time. It is essential that a bond of affection and understanding be developed between the pup and his master during this period. He can be trained to lead, come, sit, stay and fetch. About fifteen minutes a day is sufficient to accomplish this. As far as possible, this should be fun training. He can be "whistle trained" by using this means of calling him for his feedings.

From twelve to sixteen weeks of age, serious training is instituted. It is during this period that the pup becomes independent and the matter of who is to dominate—the pup or his master—is settled. If socialization with people and training are not begun before the end of this period, it becomes practically impossible to train the pup.

The sooner in this period that training is started, the better. At the Friskies Research Kennel, Carnation Milk Farms, whistle training and table training are begun at four to five weeks. Table training (placing the pup on a table and off the floor) gives the handler a psychological advantage, for it gets the pup out of his natural environment. By applying a headstall with a drop cord, he can be trimmed or trained to stand for show. He can be laid on the table while his toenails are trimmed or for a general examination. Table training is an excellent early training procedure.

This newer knowledge of puppy training gives the vet some answers to the cause for success or failure to the training of dogs, and supplies him with suggestions on dog training for his clients. This early training program in conjunction with proper selection of intelligent dogs is the basis for the training of guide dogs for the blind.

TRAINING ANSWERS

Some of the conclusions based on the studies reported here are:

1. Pups are incapable of learning during the first three weeks.
2. Pups learn rapidly from three to seven weeks and become socialized with dogs during this period.
3. Pups weaned and removed from contact with dogs at four weeks do not socialize with dogs and do not enjoy the company of other dogs.
4. Dominance and social order develop rapidly after seven weeks with the largest males being dominant or, where males are absent, the noisiest and most active females (not necessarily the largest) being dominant.
5. With some breeds it is impossible to grow more than two pups together, since the pup lowest in the social order may be ill treated.
6. Some socializing with humans and training (whistle training and table training) should be done during the three to seven week period.
7. Pups should be weaned and separated from other dogs at seven to eight weeks for best training results.
8. Pups allowed the company of their mother or littermates after seven weeks are difficult to train.
9. Play training (lead, sit, stay, come and retrieve) should be practiced for fifteen minutes daily during the seven to twelve week period.
10. Serious training should be carried out during the twelve to sixteen week period.
11. Training can be started before the sixteenth week, but the earlier the better.
12. After sixteen weeks of age, pups who have not previously been socialized with people are difficult or impossible to train.
13. Dogs have been bred for specific instinctive traits (trailing, pointing, herding), so puppies should be selected for type, breed or class, depending on their ultimate use.
14. Pups may be partially self trained (herding, pointing), but those with early basic training and proper socialization with humans are capable of much better training.

THE SCOTTISH TERRIER FROM THE SCOTTISH ANGLE

OUR DOGS Dec. 15, 1961

Over few breeds of dog has there been more controversy than the Scottish Terrier. From 1874 until 1879 quite a number of letters appeared in the canine press regarding this breed when in answer to many appeals, the Kennel Club provided some classes. There was no standard which to judge these dogs and at Brighton the judges appointed had little or no knowledge of the breed which certainly did not improve matters. Despite numerous drawbacks the agitators stuck to their point and the Kennel Club agreed to provide classes for the "hard-haired Scotch Terrier." Mr James B. Morrison, at that time recognized as a leading canine authority, judged the 15 entires.

But it was at Dundee show that the first class in Scotland was scheduled and the prize money and a silver cup were generously provided by Mr. Thomson Gray, who at that time was reconed to be the leading Scottish canine journalist. The winner, owned by Mr. P. Thomson, was brought from Skye; he was prick-eared, strongly developed and as plucky as a Bull Terrier. Incidentally it was at Dundee open show in April, 1904, where I made my debut as a handler on my own and with my father's puppy Kettledrum, and was elated at winning 5 firsts under a leading Scottish authority. So from this humble birth the Scottish Terrier had a wonderfully successful run for many years.

How the term "Diehard" came to be applied is not quite clear. It is said that George IV, Earl of Dunbarton, had a pack of Scottish Terriers which were so noted for their pluck and determination that they were called Diehards, and his regiment the Royal Scots, was named the "Dunbarton Diehards."

In Aberdeenshire, around 1880, fanciers accepted a breed of prick-eared, hard-coated, game terriers at "Thingummy Terriers" but a Mr. Lort did not like that name and renamed them Aberdeenshire which became very unpopular as people still believe there is a breed called "Aberdeens."

Over fifty years ago the breeders in Aberdeenshire became very unpopular as they sold puppies to people in the South at ridiculously low prices. They were able to do this as they spent very little in stud fees.

Around 1907, Scottish Terriers became very popular, and at Waverly Market show it was quite common to see as many entries in the Open class as it is now seen at some champion shows. Spectators booked their seats hours before judging commenced and spectators stood seven or eight deep around the ring.

The leading fanciers then were "Dippie", "McMillan", "Kinnear", "Stewart", "Love", "Ballintyne", "Cumming", "Campbell", "Reynard", "Flett", "Prentice", "Young", "Skinner", Reid, my father, Rowatt, George Davidson, etc.

In England Mrs. Hannay paid \$250 for Seafield Rascal, whose name was changed to Heworth Rascal, and she made him a champion. Two other fanciers in England who became prominent were Mr. W. L. McCandlish and Mr. J. Deane Willis. Two of their leading winners were brought from a great friend of my family, Joh Love, a miner from Barlieston, who produced several champions bearing the "Carter" prefix. Another staunch supporter was Holland Buckley who purchased many winners to export abroad. His Ch. Clonmel Invader was perhaps his leading winner. Then the one and only A. G. Cowley began to make his mark and he often told me that it was a brood bitch which came from my father's breeding that put him in the picture. He made a host of champions.

After the first world war Bob Chapman, Johnny Donald (previously interested in Pomeranians), Willie Davidson (who gave up his Collies) with his "Lauriestons" and the latter's nephew, Willie Crawford of "Rosehall", now had a long run of successes. George Tennant of "Brimstone" fame, also came back to a successful time. These old-timers were followed by Bert McGill who made great records at home and abroad with his "Glendoune" champions.

I do hope that Mr. "Viewpark" MacLaren, Messrs., Aitchison, Barrie, Crawford, Lumsden, etc., carry on the good work of the Heather, Clendoune and Rosehall experts. Two other fanciers in Mr. W. M. Singleton and Dr. Conrad Bremmer made great reputations with their splendid terriers as did Billy Berry. Quite recently the breed lost one of its greatest characters in Mrs. D. S. Caspersz who was a wonderful secretary and organizer for the club.

Today, in my opinion, there are some grand Scottish Terriers on view, and we look forward to having a welcome revival of the breed.

In the March-April issue of the "CLAN NEWS" appeared a very interesting article obtained through information and research of Doctors R.M. Clemmons, R.I. Peters and K.M. Meyers.

"Scotty Cramp is inherited as a recessive trait controlled by a single pair of genes. In order for a dog to be affected with this disorder, both genes of the pair must be for Scotty Cramp. A carrier, that is a dog with one normal gene and one recessive gene for this trait, DOES NOT have the disorder. Conversely, BOTH the sire and the dam MUST be carriers of Scotty Cramp in order to produce an affected offspring.

"Not all dogs with Scotty Cramp are affected to the same extent; some dogs show very minor clinical signs, others are incapacitated. This is due to modifying effects of other genetic factors. Stress, excitement, and fear can exacerbate the signs, as can illness and nutritional factors. Clinical signs can be reduced, for example, by giving the dog some chocolate or other form of sugar about an hour before exposure to stress. The drug, diazepam, is frequently used to treat this condition both acutely and chronically. Vitamin E at doses above 125 IU/kg body weight given once daily will decrease the incidence, but not the severity, of the episodes.

"In spite of the name, dogs with Scotty Cramp do not have cramped muscles and do not suffer pain during an episode."

"Reflecting back on the last couple of years, a number of Thunder Bay dog people and their dogs have made their mark. I think a lot of local people are just not aware of how far reaching an effect some of these dogs and people have had. One particular team comes to mind for me and deserves attention. Louise Whent and her beloved Scotty bitch, Ch. Mayson's My Fair Lady have accomplished a great deal more than the average person is aware of. "Tubby," as she is affectionately known to all her friends, won the hearts of many, long before she began her illustrious career. Tubby is royally bred, hailing from the same famous kennel who produced the all time winningest Scottish Terrier in Britain, Ch. Mason Monoply. In the Spring of 1979, a little black fuzzy 5-month-old blob arrived in Thunder Bay. She went nameless for a while, until Kenny Whent decided she looked like a little tub, hence "Tubby"—and it stuck! I must admit, looking back, it was appropriate . . . but some of her friends thought it was a shame not to have named her "Frankie," for after all, what better name (so we thought) for her, since her companion and kennel mate was to be "Johnnie!" Louise was not impressed, so "Tubby" it stayed. Secretly Louise, I'm glad you clung to "Tubby." Her early training classes were a giggle; typical terrier fashion, never in one spot longer than a few seconds. However, "Tubby" survived it all and grew more beautiful with each passing day. on to Best Puppy in Show! "Tubby" finished at the tender age of 8 months, and along the way picked up 2 more Puppy Groups and a 3rd and 4th Group placing. From there on there was no looking back. A total of:

- 4 Best in Show wins
- 16 Group Firsts
- 9 Group Seconds
- 7 Group Thirds
- 1 Group Fourth
- 3 Best Puppy in Group
- 1 Best Puppy in Show

In November of 1980, Louise and "Tubby" put Thunder Bay and Northwestern Ontario on the map by heading east to Ottawa for the Show of Shows competition, open only to dogs who have won one or more Best in Shows during the year previous. The Groups are judged by a panel, and the dogs evaluated on a point system. "Tubby" was victorious and won the Terrier Group, an accomplishment no other dog from this area has achieved. We stand in awe."

A number of people who know I am very much a wheaten fan, wrote or phoned me to say that Sandgreg's Sweet Charity is being shown in Ontario and indeed at the London Show was BB and Group 1st, with a fairly large entry. OBEDIENCE

by OB Chairman Ruth Tryon

The big day approaches. You have read the rule book carefully and have entered Mac in the correct class for his first Obedience Trial. As you nervously make the final preparations you begin to wonder if you have lost your mind! He is working well—he should qualify with a respectable score. You gather together his lead, collar, water and a dish, goodies and rain gear (although the sun shines, never leave it home!). Even though he may never earn his Championship in conformation, he is still a wonderful dog, so make sure he is nicely brushed and trimmed, neat and clean. Mac is a special Scottie.

It always helps to arrive well in advance of the beginning of the class and pick up your arm band. While you are waiting at ringside, be sure and observe the Judge's pattern. Where does he start the heeling exercise and what heeling pattern does he use; where do you do the figure 8 and the stand for examination and at which end of the ring do you leave Mac for the recall. Having all this information will be a tremendous help when you and Mac enter the ring. Then suddenly you two are the next ones in the ring!

As you stand at the gate waiting to be called in, wondering what on earth you are doing there, try and remember those before you have felt the same way. As you go in the ring with your three left feet, those butterflies in your stomach find their way right down the lead to Mac—and there he is, knowing at this moment you probably barely know your right foot from your left. Poor Mac, he is going to have to carry this team. He can feel those nerves of yours! Dogs always seem to take shows in better stride than people! Somehow you and Mac get in the correct spot to start, and now is your chance to restore a little sanity to the situation. When the Judge asks if you are ready, in a firm and confident voice, say "Ready." Believe it or not, this will not only give you confidence, but also remind Mac to pay attention and that things are better than he had thought.

So forward you go, and finally you hear the last "Exercise finished" and you and Mac are on your way out of the ring. Mac did it! As you gather yourself together outside the ring you think about what happened. Maybe a crooked sit here or there, maybe a tight lead on that figure 8—he could have been closer on the about turn, but you sure stumbled about on that other turn . . . and what possessed you to almost stop on the Slow! Mac is happily enjoying the show as you gradually relax. But now it is time for the Long Sit and Down. That one minute sit is long, but those 3 minutes for the long down are the longest minutes in the world. Someone dropped a chair and Mac's ears went up and then his head—that awful moment—will he stay? You held your breath and he did. You finally get back to his side and he loves the praise as much as you enjoy giving it to him. You all traipse out of the ring and stand waiting—hoping for your number to be called. Mac's is! As you stand in the ring and the Judge gives you that beautiful qualifying green ribbon, you know it has been worth every bit of it. Even if it is pouring down rain, the sun was never brighter. Mac's first leg towards his C.D.!

But it sometimes happens that the Judge will tell you as gently as possible, "I am sorry, but you failed such and such an exercise." The world hasn't come to an end. You are not alone. It simply means you and Mac work together to find out why it went wrong. Are your commands, your footwork clear and precise,

have you failed to insist Mac heel sharply by your side on lead, not lagging, sniffing, going wide or forging while practicing? His "sins" on lead will almost invariably be worse off lead. Did you take him off lead too soon? Rarely do instructors have problems with the dogs—it is the handlers that give them the trouble, so look to yourself more than to Mac. Work on your problem faithfully. Making excuses for failures only slows down progress. Insist on Mac working well. Don't accept sloppiness in his work. Mac will not only respect you more for it, but he will enjoy the training much more. Your approval and praise are two of the most essential ingredients in his life, and the better he works the happier he will be. You and Mac walk into the ring with the perfect 200 score. From then on, the points off are the team's doing and you are the leader of the team! Scotties can do excellent work—one of their main problems is lack of attention for, unlike most dogs, they do have the world about them to observe, comment on and manage. He may tax your patience; he may be a bit stubborn . . . but you have one great advantage with him over the world's—your love of Mac, his basic need of your approval and praise, and the Scottie devotion to his master. So don't be discouraged. Train carefully, well and happily, and those beautiful green qualifying ribbons will be coming your way. Happy heeling and qualifying scores!

On Monday, March 15th, 1982, the dog world was stunned to learn of the passing of Louise Whent. While most of us knew the seriousness of Louise's illness, we somehow felt she would make it—or at least we couldn't bring ourselves to think she wouldn't.

Without any hesitation I can say that Louise was one of the kindest, warmest and most friendly persons I have ever met. As one of her showing competitors told me by phone from Thunder Bay (where Louise lived): "I have been against Louise in the ring a number of times and she would go out of her way to help you, even helping you beat her." He was saddened and shocked at her passing . . . as are we all.

Most of you are familiar with her little band of Scottish Terriers. After her marriage to Ken, Louise visited England and purchased Brio Student Prince and Gaywyn Lyric who, in due course, became Canadian Champions and ultimately the parents of one little puppy—a feat which pleased Louise so much as she always feared having to sell puppies to strangers. That one little fellow grew to become Can. Am. Bda. Ch. Gaberfeidh Johnnie Walker. After the untimely loss of Ch. Gaywyn Lyric, Louise was offered a young puppy, Mayson My Fair Lady (Tubby), who—owner-handled all the way—became Number 1 Scottie in Canada for 1981 and yet was shown only sparingly, and never campaigned. Louise enjoyed every show, win or lose, and was ecstatic when she got coveted B.I.S. wins with "Tubby" and "Brio." Her highlight was showing "Tubby" through to Best in Terrier Group at the prestigious Show of Shows (open to B.I.S. All Breed winners only) at Ottawa in 1980. Without a doubt, Louise had that special 'something' that brings out the best in a dog and the pair, Louise and her Scottie, was always hard to beat.

Previous to her present dogs, Louise, together with her mother, Margaret Hunter, was very involved with Scotties in obedience as well as conformation. Louise owned, trained and handled Ch. Monteith's Angus MacTavish, C.D., who was the sire of Canada's first U.D. Scottie.

Louise supported a number of breed clubs both in Canada, the U.S. and Britain, where she was a life member of the Scottish Terrier Breeders and Exhibitors Association. Always a lover of animals, she was a keen member of the Scottish Terrier Emergency Protection Service from its beginning. Louise was a past C.K.C. Director for Ontario and an active member of the Lakehead and Thunder Bay Kennel Clubs.

Born at Noranda, Quebec, Louise moved as a child to the Thunder Bay area. Later she taught in the Commercial Department at the Sir Winston Churchill High School and was a graduate of Lakehead University. Louise was a keen sportswoman—a member of the Ski Instructors Alliance of Canada and a champion golfer.

While we in Scottiedom have lost a dear, dear friend, we do realize that Louise will be more sadly missed by her two young children, Maggie and Jake, and by her husband, Ken—and specially her mother, Margaret Hunter. To her family we can only say that in our hearts we share your sorrow, grief and loss.
