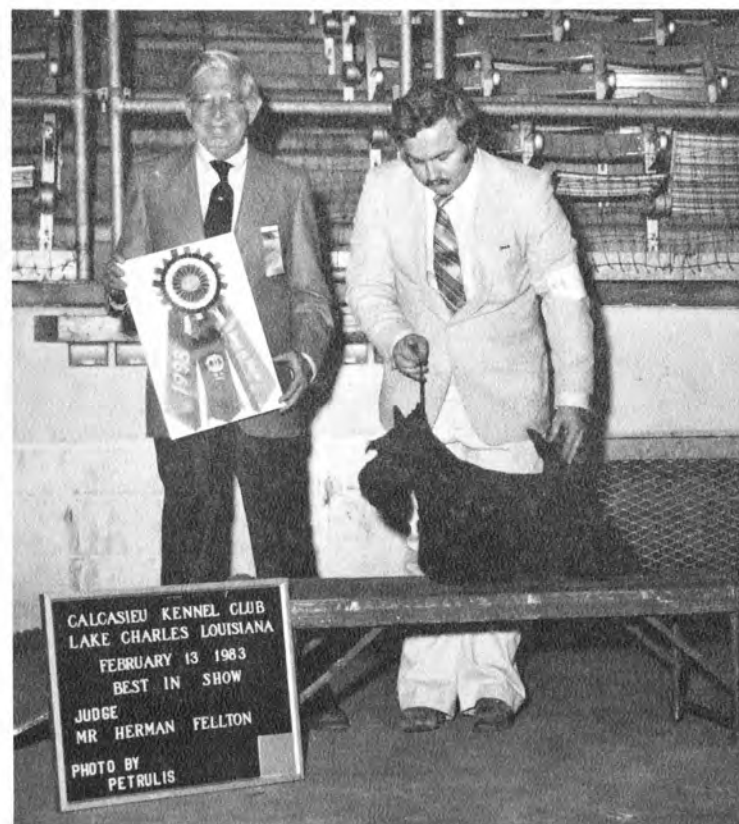

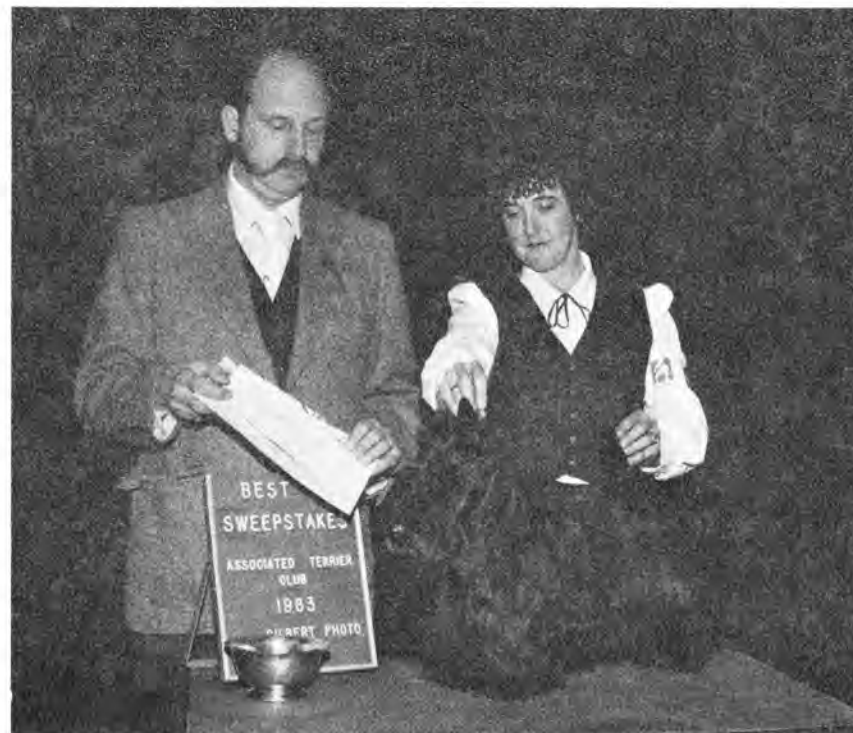

NEW STUDIES IN EPILEPSY

Not all seizures are caused by epilepsy, some seizures may be the result of a heavy infestation of parasites, allergic reaction, trauma, distemper or rabies. But . . . these causes are more the exception to the rule . . . most seizures ARE caused by epilepsy.

The new **American Canine Epilepsy Services, (ACES)** has been founded to bridge at least part of the tremendous gap that exists in veterinary knowledge of cause and treatment. The **ACES**, under the direction of **George C. Farnbach, DVM, Ph.D., University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine**, is attempting to monitor cases brought to the attention of **ACES** by participating vets and pet owners throughout the country; to provide inexpensive blood serum level testing; and compile data and distribute information. Research on epilepsy will also be undertaken.

Dr. Farnbach's goals for the **ACES** are:

1. Define the pharmac/physiological processes involved, allowing treatment and control to be improved.
2. Develop an accurate screening method so that high-seizure-potential animals can be identified and removed from breeding programs and to alert pet owners.
3. The ultimate goal is to achieve genetic control as far as possible.

Dr. Farnbach hopes to have the **ACES** follow at least 1000 cases over a three year period. The study should bring into focus effectiveness of major drugs, their short and long term side effects, and the point at which they either begin to work or should be withdrawn as unsuitable.

As of yet not enough is known to say one breed is prevalent over another with epilepsy. **Dr. Farnbach** hopes to have a clearer picture at the end of the study, with the help of the AKC records.

Dr. Farnbach would like to develop a colony of mixed-breed epileptics; boarding costs alone for this enterprise would range from \$3,000 to \$4,000 a year. A major roadblock facing such research is that seizures do not begin until early maturity. Waiting up to 3½ years to uncover a disease makes for a very expensive project.

University of Pennsylvania is furnishing forms to owners of epileptic dogs on which records can be kept. Those wishing to participate in the **ACES** study may obtain these forms from **G. Farnbach, DVM, Ph.D., 3800 Spruce Street, Philadelphia, PA 19104**. **ACES** members can receive blood serum level test results by mail or phone. The cost is only \$5.00 (\$10.00 to non-members).

Efficacy of various drugs and their side effects will be a very important result of the **ACES** project. Dilantin, phenobarbital, primidone, Valium, Zantol (elthosuximide) and Tegretol (carbamazepine) are the principal drugs under examination, and are included in the reports submitted by **ACES** Members.

Although still in wide use, Dilantin has been ruled out at the Un. of Pa. for the reason that it is too rapidly excreted to be effective. **Dr. Farnbach** explained that "in man, a blood serum level of 10 mg/ml generally proves effective, but we've never seen it that high in a dog. To achieve it, a German Shepherd sized animal would require at least 3,000 mg/day."

Valium controls some cases, but is very expensive and patients required medication four times a day — very inconvenient, if not impossible for some owners. Primidone has been known to cause liver damage.

Zantol and Tegretol can be effective on "absent" seizures in man (as opposed to "tonic" or muscular contractions seizures), but such episodes are unrecognized as yet in animals.

All of these are depressants, owners of animals on such therapy should be alert for unusual clumsiness or drowsiness. Monitoring of serum chemistry is necessary to avoid long term organ damage.

Dr. James G. Cunningham of Michigan State University, a prominent veterinary researcher in epilepsy comments: "Complex behavioral signs frequently develop immediately before or after seizures, such as apprehension, restlessness, chewing, howling or barking and changes in eating or drinking habits.

Generalized seizures have bilateral and more or less symmetrical signs, whereas partial seizures are inconsistent; both types of epileptic seizures may be produced by anything that alters neuronal function. The primary origin may be extracranial or intracranial."

Sleep appears to bring on seizures in some animals; owners who notice their dogs "dreaming" may be witnessing mild attacks. Papers torn up in kennels during sleeping hours may be the result of seizures. An epileptic bitch in heat seems to be more prone to seizures — also causing stress in the opposite sex. Normal ranges of diet and temperature do not appear to be involved; however, since body temperatures is an important factor in recovery from an attack, a dog seizing in extreme heat could suffer severe damage.

Interested epileptic dog owners wishing to participate in this new study (**ACES**) should write **Dr. Farnbach** at the address given. Through breeders and owners cooperation a break thru is possible.

MRS. CONSTANCE WINANT EARLE

Mrs. Constance Winant Earle, past President of the Scottish Terrier Club of America, 1949 recipient of the Lloyd Trophy, and founder of Edgerstoune Kennels died on February 15th, 1983. The history of the Scottish Terrier would not be complete without honoring Mrs. Winant Earle and Edgerstoune Kennels.

In 1920 the then Mrs. Winant began Edgerstoune Kennels in Concord, New Hampshire with West Highland White Terriers. Her Ch. Wolvey Pattern of Edgerstoune achieved fame by being the first Westie to be awarded Best In Show at Westminster in 1942.

Scottish Terriers came to Edgerstoune Kennels in 1934 when Mrs. Winant, wife of the U.S. ambassador to the Court of St. James, began extensive importing from England. Many great Scotties carried the Edgerstoune prefix. Mrs. Winant's Ch. Edgerstoune Spitfire was the first of the Edgerstoune dogs to go Best of Breed at STCA Specialties, winning at the 1944 New York show. Perhaps the most famous of the Edgerstoune scotties was Ch. Walsing Winning Trick of Edgerstoune, bred by Mr. W. M. Singleton of England, Best of Breed at STCA Specialties in 1949 and 1950. "Trick" went on to Best In Show at Westminster in 1950 under the capable hands of Phil Prentice. "Trick" sired 23 champions, many found in today's pedigrees. His son, Ch. Edgerstoune Troubadour, in turn had an impressive show record and surpassed "Trick" as sire of 35 champions.

Mrs. Winant served as President of the Scottish Terrier Club of America in 1950 and 1951.

The demise of the Edgerstoune Kennel in the '50's was the end of a great era. However Mrs. Winant Earle and Edgerstoune will remain the foundation on which many of today's breeders have built their proud bloodlines.

Our sympathy is extended to Mrs. Winant Earle family and friends along with our humble appreciation for her dedication to our breed.

AMERICAN TEMPERAMENT TESTING SOCIETY

(The following article was sent in by **Judy Riga** by way of the **Staffordshire Club of America's** newsletter. We thank Judy)

THE TEN ATTS TESTS

Below are 10 tests given by the American Temperament Testing Society to all breeds of dogs. Those passing earn a certificate.

BEHAVIOR TOWARD STRANGERS:

Objective: To determine the dog's reaction to strangers in a non-threatening test.

Procedure: Two parts: A) **NEUTRAL STRANGER:** A stranger to the dog approaches the handler, shakes hands and ignores the dog for (for 10 seconds). B) **FRIENDLY STRANGER:** A stranger to the dog approaches happily and briskly and is exuberantly friendly to the dog. Petting (10 seconds).

REACTION TO ACOUSTIC STIMULI:

Objective: To test the dog's reaction to an acoustic stimulus, and to measure the dog's investigative behavior. This test also shows alertness and curiosity.

Procedure: Two parts: A) **HIDDEN NOISE:** As dog and handler come with 30 feet of the well hidden assistant, the assistance begins to rattle a large tin can filled with marbles, making weird noises at the same time. The dog should investigate, otherwise the handler may encourage the dog. The handler's focus must be on the stimulus, not on the dog. B) **GUNSHOTS:** Dog and handler have their backs turned to the well-hidden and unnoticed ATTS assistant. Team and assistant are 15 feet apart. With a .22-cal. starter pistol, the assistant fires three shots into the air: Shot — pause — shot — shot. If the dog turns toward the sound, then the handler may follow up to 10 feet.

REACTION TO A VISUAL STIMULUS:

Objective: To test the dog's reaction to a sudden visual stimulus. To measure the degree of investigative behavior, and the startle and recovery time.

Procedure: The handler-dog team proceeds toward the ATTS assistant who is sitting motionless and relaxed in a chair holding a large, black, spring-loaded self-opening umbrella at his or her side in a closed position. The assistant, looking straight ahead shows no challenging behavior as the team approaches from the right side. When the dog is five feet from the umbrella at the two flags, the handler brings him to a stop at which time the catch on the umbrella is suddenly but smoothly opened so that the umbrella will open at a 90 angle to the dogs path, and then immediately and smoothly the umbrella is lowered to the ground with its tip coming to a rest and being held by the assistant while the dog should investigate it within 15 seconds. Otherwise the handler may encourage the dog for 15 seconds to investigate the umbrella, not the assistant.

FOOTING TEST:

Objective:

Procedure:

To measure the dog's reaction to unusual footing. Two parts: A) The handler-dog team approaches a 15 foot long and six foot wide strip of plastic sheeting smoothly spread out and laid flat on the even ground and weighted along the sides. With the dog on a loose lead, both handler and dog proceed directly over this unusual footing for the entire 15 foot length. B) After completing the above part, handler and dog proceed on the area's natural ground for 30 feet to and over an exercise pen laid flat (opened) on the level ground. Both handler and dog move normally on and along the entire 12 foot length of the three or four foot wide pen.

SELF-PROTECTIVENESS — AGGRESSIVE REACTION:

Objective:

To test the dog's capacity to A) Recognize a potentially threatening situation. B) React in a positive manner, and C) Show how the dog defends himself or herself in the face of a threat.

Procedure:

Three parts: Dog must wear a sturdy collar and a strong lead for all three parts. The ATTS decoy is dressed in odd clothing. A) The handler-dog team approaches the decoy to 30 feet, and when decoy jumps out from behind his hiding place in a non-threatening way, the handler ceases to move forward and remains on the same spot until the end of all testing. The decoy walks uncoordinatedly, making weird sounds and motions. B) After crossing the path, the decoy turns toward the dog and continues with the weird sounds and motions while slowly advancing to the dog to 20 feet. The handler still remains stationary. C) In this last of the 10 sub-tests, the decoy raises the riding crop, pounding it on the ground six times during 10 seconds while advancing to 10 feet to the dog, continuing to make weird sounds and motions. Then the decoy backs off in a thief-like manner. The test is completed. Team leaves the field.

The STCNE will hold their Specialty on the evening of June 3rd at the Worcester Armory, Worcester, MA. Mr. Jerry Roszman of CA will judge the Sweepstakes Classes and Mr. Robert Marshall of CA will judge the Regular Classes. This will be a 3 show weekend.

"On February 5th, 1983 the STCNE conducted what could be a first in New England and possibly one the first in the country. Before a group of about 40 people, consisting of judges, breeders and exhibitors, a seminar utilizing the STCA slide presentation was conducted by Mr. Fred Ferris, breeder-judge.

"Mr. Ferris began with a brief introduction explaining the value of the slide presentation as a visual tool for a better understanding of the standard for the breed, as well as the seminar aiding judges to comply with the AKC's new guidelines. He then gave a final emphasis to the viewers to understand that each slide was not necessarily depicting the entire animal shown, but rather the particular item or area the monologue was describing. The presentation was then shown in its' entirety without interruption.

"Mr. Ferris then proceeded to go "stem to stem" in a discussion-amplification of the Scottie. This was done quite effectively by his use of the slides to further clarify and reinforce each point he was describing. He also gave the group insights into what the judge sees and looks for in the ring, and how the standard is used as a guideline to make decisions on proper type. Speaking as the judge, he reminded the breeders that it is their responsibility to breed to the standard and strive for the balance and symmetry that is the cornerstone of the breed. The exhibitors responsibility is to bring only those animals into the ring because it is only in the judges power to put up the best animal there on a given day; therefore, if the judge has a poor representation in the ring he may have to put up the best of the worst, which does not mean it is a good Scottie. He also felt that if there was a short coming to the presentation it was in the area of actual movement of an animal, it is too difficult to interpret good and bad movement from a photo. Unfortunately, it was not possible to bring in a few Scotties to compare movement.

"The floor was open to questions at all times during the presentation and there were many questions such as asking for further clarification of a point, asking about a particular animal displayed on the slides, even asking hypothetical questions such as what he would do as a judge with two given specimens with different flaws, and what value of emphasis should be placed on the point system included in the standard. This last item evoked a lively discussion during which Mr. Ferris felt personally that the STCA should do away with this point system since it is an unrealistic measurement and the judge would need a score pad to keep track of the points which he would not have time to do in the 2½ minutes per given to judge. For a further example of

a glaring flaw, the point system makes no mention of movement or temperament. Mrs. Barbara Keenan agreed adding that the West Highland White Terrier Club of America has finally done this. Mr. Ferris reminded all in attendance the STCA publication of the amplification of the Scottish Terrier was an additional tool with diagrams.

"All in all this proved to be a unique learning experience that combined both visual and verbal amplification of the ideal Scottie, as well as a question and answer format to clarify any doubts or uncertainties that one may have had."

CANADIAN COMMENT

Well I certainly got off to a poor start for 1983. Forget everything I wrote in my last column and I'll try again. The Specialty date was not approved by the C.K.C., so has been set back to the prestigious **Metropolitan Show** later in the year. More next time. Mr. Howard Snethen will be the Judge.

There will be a **BOOSTER** for Scottish Terriers in conjunction with the **Terrier Breeders' Association Show** at Thornhill (Toronto area) on June 5th. Judge: Edna Joel.

July 3rd the Canadian S.T.C. will hold a **Sanction Match (Conformation and Obedience)** at the **Master Feeds Farms** on **Trafalgar Road, Oakville, Ontario.**

Having gotten that right, I will now add that for further info. please contact the Club Sec'y, Mrs. Anne Newlands, R.R. 1, Peterborough, Ontario, K9J 6X2. Also another correction: the Club Newsletter, "Scottie Scamper" is for the time being edited by Anne, so kindly send any newsy items directly to her at that address.

Here's something to think about. Recently a newcomer to our breed asked me how do you look for a good Scottie? What is the first thing you notice? I always look at the overall picture. I guess a lot goes through the brain during that initial encounter. Its like feeding a computer with the data, I'm either impressed or I'm not. If the dog is a little power packet, a pocket hercules, I look further. A small dog bursting at the seams always attracts me. If he has a deep, dark eye, small high set ears and tough shoulders I keep looking. If he gaits nicely and carries his tail well and has a reasonably level topline, I am definitely impressed, BUT if on opening his mouth I find he's undershot, he is off my list. A bad mouth is to me the worst. Temperament . . . well so many things can affect it I am a forgiving type in that department.

OBEDIENCE

Somewhere along the training route we seem to come to a halt in progress in certain exercises. Other things may be going well but there is that stumbling block. Two common ones are lagging while heeling and a gradual slowing down in the Recall exercise.

Probably the best way to solve our problem is to break down the exercise to its smallest components. If it is lagging in the heeling exercise, are you sure Mac starts the moment you do. If not, he begins the exercise already lagging and rarely will be catch up with you. As you say "Heel" give him a quick snap of the lead and run the first few steps. It won't be long before Mac will decide to watch you and stay with you rather than be sharply corrected. If you tend to lose him at the turns, start running a few paces at **EACH** turn, with the quick snap of the lead to remind him to stay with you. You will be amazed at his change in attitude and performance. Remember to always move quickly, thus keeping Mac's attention. Make sure you never adjust your pace to his! Don't go too far before stopping and encourage him all the way. As he improves you can lengthen the distance between the halts.

If he slows down coming in during the Recall, again go back to the basics. Maybe you are going too far away from him — he isn't ready for a long distance recall. Go back to the length of the lead, call him, reinforce your command with a quick snap of the lead and run back a few paces. Gradually increase your distance. And have you forgotten enthusiasm? All the time he is coming encourage him with praise. However, don't forget the **only** time you use the command "Come" "Front" or whatever you have decided upon is at the start of the recall, not while you are encouraging him. Forget the straight sit in front for a while — get Mac to come to you joyously and quickly. Practice the straight fronts at a short distance as a separate exercise. When Mac gives you the happy, quick response you want, you can put it all together at greater distances.

In your efforts to train Mac to do things well, think about it have you left out the enthusiasm? Happy, enthusiastic praise is the key to success. You may have to correct him sharply at times but he will always accept this as long as he knows your genuine praise will follow when he does things properly. Whatever you give to Mac will be returned many times over in his willingness to do what you ask.

However, in insisting he do an exercise correctly, be careful not to repeat and repeat and repeat it. While repetition is a major factor in learning, a terrier gets bored quickly and Mac is a terrier. Vary your routine for if you don't Mac will — by adding variations to the exercise you are drilling on and those variations are rarely what you want. Intersperse working on the problems with exercises he does well and play periods. Then you can go back to the problems and they will gradually disappear.

However, frequently we really are not sure where our handling faults lie. All types of match shows and AKC Trials are wonderful places to learn. Go and watch the top handlers in the ring. Their performance will be smooth and even, some moving more rapidly than others but always the handler and dog are a **team** . . . Observe how they make their turns, how they keep their dogs attention during an exercise and equally important between exercises. While judging is of separate exercises, the dog's performance in the ring is really on exercise. Therefore, going from one exercise to another it is essential you keep Mac's attention and interest. Once you have started to lose Mac's attention it is not easy to regain it quickly. You are in the ring but a brief few minutes and if

you realize his mind may be wandering to that interesting event outside the ring, quickly divert it back to you. In Novice "the dog may be gently guided by the collar" between exercises. Don't wait to see if Mac's attention will come back to you or go with the "outside" world. If you do, you well can lose him. Instead gently guide him and quickly bring his mind back to you. In Open, of course, you may not touch him between exercises so observe carefully how the good handlers keep their dog's attention and how they quickly regain it for the brief instant they appear to lose it.

Then go to the Novice A Class and watch. These people are not as experienced and while you may see some fine handling you will doubtless see some handlers who are still learning. Watch carefully for there you may see your own problem and once you know where the mistake or uneven handling is, you are on your way to improving Mac's and your teamwork.

It is an interesting fact but the more you insist that Mac do whatever you tell him to correctly, the more he will enjoy his training. He should never be permitted to "get away" with sloppy work, ignoring your wishes and general indifference. You are the "pack leader" and he will love and respect you more if you always make that clear. The more training Mac has the better adjusted companion he will be and the greater rapport you two will share. Stay with your training of Mac — it is worth every minute of it — and Happy Heeling!
