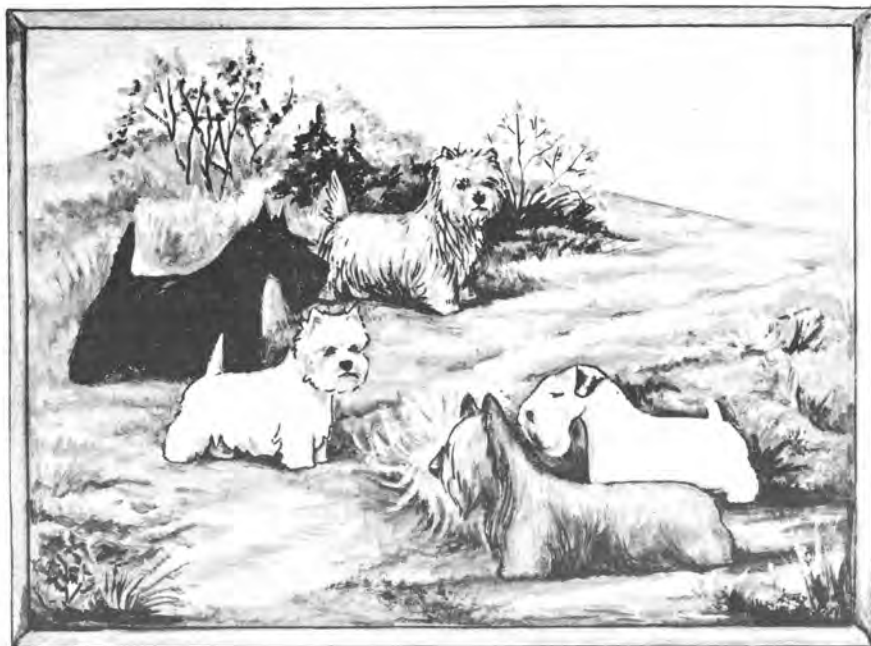
Mrs. Fred Heerlein (Bertha) passed away July 13 in Jamestown, N.Y. She was a past long-time member of the S.T.C.A. Bertha was devoted to the Scottish Terrier, her prefix being "Hillside" Kennels.

M. Dorothy Hardcastle of Kingston, Massachusetts, well-known terrier breeder and artist died Sunday, April 8, 1984. Dorothy was born on September 11, 1919 in Beverly, Massachusetts. She was the daughter of Harry Hardcastle, originally of Lyme, England, a terrier breeder and handler. Miss Hardcastle was a 1942 graduate of the Massachusetts College of Art. She was owner of Birchwood Kennels and Studio. Dorothy was a member of the South Shore Kennel Club, the West Highland White Terrier Club of America, the New England Terrier Club and Ladies Dog Club.

Her oil paintings and other art works are proudly owned by hundreds of breeders and exhibitors of all terrier breeds including the Scottish Terrier. Dorothy created many art works such as ceramics and handpainted leather goods. Scottish terrier oils painted by Miss Hardcastle include the painting of Ch. Carmichael's Fanfare donated to the American Kennel Club by contributing members of the Scottish Terrier Club of America and the Best of Breed Trophy painting offered by the Scottish Terrier Club of New England at its Specialty. The illustration below is a reproduction of one of her Christmas cards (1982) which have been saved and cherished by her many friends.

An exhibition of her collected works is being planned by her many friends in terrier clubs throughout New England. All proceeds from the dinner and exhibition will be donated to the American Kennel Club Dog Museum of America. Since the vast majority of Dorothy Hardcastle's works are privately owned and have been painted on commission an attempt is being made to gather together an extensive collection for this brief exhibit. ## LEST WE FORGET

JOHN MURPHY

*John was also known, deservedly so, as "Mister Scottie"! He was a breeder, using his father's registered kennel name in England, of "Fashion Kennels", a handler, and, later a judge, which many exhibitors agree, was all too short a career. He knew his dogs, and loved his breed — the Scottish terrier.*

*John and his wife "Lynchie" lived and had his own kennel in Fardale, N.J. — a section of Mahwah. Interestingly, his home is now a beautiful vet. hospital, and his kennel is a brand new boarding facility with a large apartment for the resident kennel manager.*

*John helped many, many people, in their breeding program, always willing to give a grooming tip, or help a novice exhibitor show his dog to a better advantage. We needed him, and as he said, he needed us; and to learn our breed in all its aspects, in and out of the ring.*

*John, for one, was instrumental in getting a group of local Scottie exhibitors and breeders to meet at Mr. and Mrs. Charles Stalters home in Woodcliff Lake, N.J., in the early 1970's, and forming a New York area show giving club, first called "the Metropolitan Breeders Association". Later changed, and now known as, the Scottish Terrier Club of Greater New York. We held grooming sessions; John taught; We held match shows; John judged, always explaining the whys and wherefores in each session. He always seemed to be "on call" whenever we needed advice; what dog to use on a certain bitch, medical assistance, shows to enter — whatever — he was there, and, willing to help. Some of the people who John helped educate and who are still showing, breeding or passing along John's valuable information are: the Marshalls, the Seelbachs, the Tryons, the McGaritys, Tom Natalini and myself...and... many other people, far and near.*

*John and his brothers Harry and Jimmy arrived in this country from Scotland, as part of the soccer team — staying on, and, continuing in the dog field. Although John showed some of the top Welsh terriers for Mrs. Colt, of Colten Kennel fame, he is known to us and our breed as a handler for Mr. and Mrs. Stalter's Barbary Knowe Kennels, which is now located in Canadensis, Pa. and owned by Barbara Kingsbury. "Barbery Knowe" was one of the largest foundation kennels of our breed, starting in the 1920's thru to Mrs. Stalter's death in the 1970's, and, continuing today. In 1965 John won Best in Show at Westminster Kennel Club Show in Madison Square Garden, N.Y.C. with "Ch. Carmichaels Fanfare" ("Mamie"), owned by the Stalters and bred by Ruth Johnson of Cherry Hill, N.J. (now, Stuart, Florida). It was a crowning win, and, John continued handling for three more years, and, then entered into judging, until his death in 1973.*

*For those of us who were fortunate to meet, or know Johnny, can we ever forget that smile or twinkle in the eye, of one fine gentleman?*

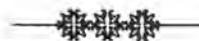

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the S.T.C.A. for asking me to judge their Rotating Specialty. I sincerely love puppies and get great satisfaction from working with them, so its always a pleasure doing sweepstakes classes.

I found overall this to be a nice group of puppies. I'm not going to go into particulars, as we are all breeders I feel we know what if anything is wrong with our own dogs and for me to do so would be more on personal likes and dislikes. I would like to mention two things, some constructive criticism and hope it will be taken in the spirit in which it is given. I do feel that there was a need for more pre-show conditioning and most of all training. I know there was some talk about the place in which the show was held having some effect on the puppies but I think more socializing and training classes is the key. It was very frustrating to see a nice scottie and not being able to do anything for it, this being the case in most of the classes. Conditioning and ring ready attitude lead me to my Best In Sweeps.

Again, I thank you all and of course, thank the San Francisco Club for their great hospitality.

## CRITIQUE OF SPRING ROTATING SPECIALTY

APRIL 22, 1984

The following are my comments on the judging at the rotating specialty in San Rafael, California. I wish to start by thanking all of the officers, members, and exhibitors for permitting me the honor of this assignment.

The overall quality of the entry is estimated to be average plus. There were some very good dogs exhibited. There were also, however, some which were of lesser quality that brought the overall quality rating down.

My top winners were clearly the best of the lot. The Breed winner is a sturdy, compact dog that is very sound and moves well. He conveys a good breed type as he is being judged. He certainly was Best of Breed on this day.

Best of Opposite Sex came from the veterans' class. This old girl is 10 years old, as I found out later, but very well preserved. Her teeth are still good, and the eyes are still bright. The coat has a good texture, but like most old timers it is losing a bit of luster. When brought out for sparring, the old girl was not about to take any sass from the youngsters.

Winner's Dog was also Best of Winners. He is a very nice dog with a long, clean head, and good front and rear. This dog was groomed very well, with a new, very hard coat. Winner's Dog is a young dog and could stand a little more maturation; otherwise, he was giving the Breed winner some good competition.

Winner's Bitch was one that showed well, moved well, and in competition with the other bitches, made her presence very much known. She is well-balanced and was well-groomed.

As I indicated previously, the quality rating was lowered a bit. In addition to the good things presented, I saw mediocre grooming, both stilted and loose movement, and structure that was off a bit. I have observed from various other assignments, in addition to this judging, an alarming number of poor fronts on the Scottish Terrier. Too many are straight in the shoulder and out at the elbows. It is difficult to get more than two fingers between the front legs, and the chest lacks depth. I believe that a little more attention should be paid to this problem when a breeding is being planned.

Again, I thank everyone for the pleasure of this assignment. I enjoyed the amicability of the exhibitors, spectators, and officials of the day. A special thanks goes to Brum and Barbara Dunham for being such good ring stewards. Thank you all.

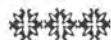
**Montgomery County 1985 Judges** have been selected for the National Specialty in 1985. Notification shall be printed upon acceptance by the Judges.

## THE AKC CENTENNIAL — AN UPDATE

Consider this as simply a P.S. to the article in the Spring issue of *The Bagpiper*. As the dates of Nov. 17 and 18 approach, every indicator still points to the highest quality and entry of any dog show ever held in America.

Answers to many of your questions can be found in *The Gazette* and the show premium list. For example, page 31 of the July *Gazette* illustrates the attractive trophies. In the same issue, page 33 lists the Nov. 16 Specialties and judges — page 79 describes the Centennial book, "*The AKC's World of Pure Bred Dogs*" — page 171 gives some useful information, and page 160 contains an Official Housing Form which states that available space is tight. However, don't let this discourage you since many good locations not listed by the Housing Bureau are available. Some breed clubs have reserved blocks of rooms in nearby areas such as Valley Forge, King of Prussia, and New Jersey. It is suggested you consult a Motel directory such as the *Mobile Guide*.

In case you would like to place an advertisement in the show catalog, which undoubtedly will become a permanent reference, refer to the Premium List for details. At this writing, space is still available.

The 50 plus page Premium List will be in the mail by August 1st and should be consulted for further details. It states that October 10 will be the closing date for entries unless the limit of 4500 dogs per day is previously reached. The entry fee will be \$25 per dog.

This same publication contains complete ticket and ordering information. One general admission ticket, good for both days, will be issued up to a maximum of 5 dogs. These tickets can also be obtained at the Civic Center box office at a cost of \$6 for adults and \$3 for children under 12. These general admission tickets will NOT admit the bearer to the Convention Hall Auditorium for the evening group judging and other special activities. These reserved seat tickets will cost \$5 per night and \$10 for reserved box seats.

Supplementing the shuttle bus service referred to in the *May Bagpiper*, a special AIRPORT pickup for people with dogs can be provided on a reservation basis. Again, see the Premium List for instructions.

All during Centennial week starting Nov. 9 the Dog Museum of America's traveling exhibition "Era of the Pet — Four Centuries of People and Their Dogs" will be open daily from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the University of Pennsylvania Museum at 34th and Spruce St., Philadelphia — just a few blocks from the Civic Center. This, plus many other attractions should help you and your Scotties' attendance to be interesting, rewarding, and busy.

Mid November weather in Philadelphia can be a bit nippy, so come prepared. There should be no need to remind you that an event like this will happen only once in our lifetime!

# AT THE RITZ



## OBEDIENCE By Ruth Tryon

Competition for the Open B award is very keen this year, which is most encouraging and interesting for it brings to the attention of everyone that not only can Scotties do the more advanced work but they can do it well. Those of you whose Mac has earned his C.D., take heart. The Open work is not as formidable or impossible as you may have thought. It is really a great class, lots more fun than Novice and even more rewarding to both you and Mac. So regardless of his Novice scores, plunge in and have a great swim. Once you two are into Open you will probably find Mac is doing better than in Novice!

Since all work in Open is off lead, do keep Mac's heeling a top priority and if it was not his greatest exercise in Novice, still keep him on lead most of the time. (We all get tired of saying and hearing this but heeling is the basic exercise of all training.) Take him off lead only to see how he is progressing — and it will become apparent that the more on lead heeling you do, the better his off lead will be.

Some Scotties pick up the dumbbell right away but you may have a bit of a struggle ahead to convince Mac to do that. Dumbbells are not particularly attractive, such as slippers, bones, etc., but once he learns to pick up the dumbbell, training him to do more useful things becomes not only possible but fun for Mac. There are as many methods for teaching this skill as there are trainers. One of the best methods can be found in Koehler's book on Open training. It might take a while for you to learn to do it correctly but stay with it. Once you have learned and follow his method, success will come quickly. When Mac understands he must pick up the dumbbell and thereby earns much praise, he suddenly finds it great fun to fetch it and carrying it back over the jump becomes even more fun. Don't demand that Mac always do the full height over the jump while practicing. Move it up and down a bit. The essential thing is that he understands he must go over the jump and come back the same way. Enthusiastic praise and encouragement will probably do more to keep that in Mac's mind than anything else. Let him know you think he is wonderful every time he does it correctly. Make sure the ground or flooring on which he takes off and lands on both sides of the jump provide good traction. A dog may refuse to jump, not because he is stubborn, has a desire to give you problems or even does not understand the exercise, but because he has slipped in take off or landing and feels insecure. Remember a Scottie is required to jump **ONLY** his height at the withers.

Scotties seem, on the whole, to take to the broad jump rather readily. Once in a while you may find one who tries to use the boards as steps, or to carefully put his feet between the boards. Place a board on edge or a narrow piece of hardware cloth or chicken wire (bend down the sharp edges) in front of the first broad jump board, thus making him jump up as well as over. This is usually a fairly sure cure. Should he decide to cut the corner, place a plumb line helper by the second board at the end near where you stand, thus forcing Mac to jump straight and then turn. There are other methods of curing problems but try and keep in mind that the idea is to get Mac to jump up as well as stretching out and to jump in a straight line as he goes over the boards. And always remember, in practice you can jump both ways over the broad jump, thus adding that bit of variety to the lesson. Scotties, 14" and under at the withers, are required to jump only two boards.

The drop on recall is one of the most valuable exercises for Mac's safety that he will ever learn and one that is failed most often in the ring. It matters not whether he is sitting beside you or running in the fields or is in the house or yard, when you say Down it is essential that he go down **IMMEDIATELY**. Do train Mac to drop quickly whether he is by your side or running to or from you. On command he should be down! If you had trouble in getting Mac to go down quickly for the long down in Novice, go back to basics and the table. Since Scotties are small an easy way on you to work with Mac is to put him on a table with good footing such as a grooming table. Once he goes down **QUICKLY** on command, without any assistance from you, then stand or sit him on the floor beside you and work on the fast response in that position. Don't be slow in your correction when you are training him as you will encourage him to resist but also don't be slow in praise. Once he drops quickly at your side, heel him and give him the command Down while you are both in motion. Make sure the drop is just as fast then as when by your side. Don't limit his training to those few minutes you devote to him every day. In the kitchen, wherever you are, give him the Down command and demand the fast drop. At first he may seem confused and wonder about you and your sanity but once he understands when you say Down you mean it no matter where you are or where he is, you are well on your way to the control you want and need. There are several "favorite" methods of various trainers but all are aimed at the same direction. Mac drops wherever he is when you say so and stays there! It is for his safety, not just the Obedience ring.

Then there comes the day you feel you are not getting the results you want and yet you have tried to do things right. Take a hard look at your training. Do you train too long so that Mac gets bored or tired, too often or maybe not often enough. If you have been too hard and firm, ease up a bit and add lots of enthusiasm. Enthusiasm is all too often lost when we begin to demand perfection and we ourselves become tense about that crooked sit or front. Eye contact is great but don't stare so long and hard at Mac you confuse him. When we stare that way we usually don't have the most pleasant expression on our faces and Mac can begin to wonder what in the world he is doing wrong — and then, trying to correct an imaginary wrong, really do something wrong! Staring can be fine and remind him not to dare make a mistake but use it wisely. And always keep your temper. Mac may vex you at times and if he does, then quit for a couple of hours. Anger has no place in training. Remember, Mac is not angry at you but he is probably thoroughly confused, and it is your fault as his trainer.

Also, another system might help with a problem. But don't try a different one every day! Work with one until you are convinced that you are not getting the results you need and then, then only, try another way. There are many, many books on training. Read them. Even though you may prefer one system each method has its strong points and each book should give you new ideas and a different approach to various problems. Be flexible. Use the system that works best with your Mac for each different exercise. Don't hesitate to mix up the "systems" as you train. Each dog is different, each trainer is different which adds up to anything but uniformity. And most important of all — learn to read your dog. The more you work and play with Mac the more attuned you will become to him — his good days, his bad days, (we all have them) — why he is having trouble understanding what you want, what motivates him and what he is trying to tell you. As you work together you will develop the wonderful rapport and bond between you and Mac that comes from mutual affection, respect and devotion and Mac's acceptance of you as his master. Happy training!

## CONVERSATIONS WITH BLANCHE

Interviews with Blanche Reeg

### "Remembrances"

#### Part II

BETTE: You knew, then, Frank Brumby for many years, from as early as 1930 onwards?

BLANCHE: Oh yes, until he died! I know his wife. She's been to my place here.

BETTE: Did he ever handle any of your dogs?

BLANCHE: Yes, he handled Barrister.

BETTE: But Barrister was in the 1950's, wasn't he?

BLANCHE: No, I think he was born in 1947. Frank finished him, and he won a couple of groups. I didn't care much for handling those wild males, myself. Although, I finished Barcarolle, his dam, myself, and I was the first woman to finish a Scotty to its championship in the East!

BETTE: I know...someone told me that. That's wonderful, but these days, there are more women in the ring than there are men. Why did you find it so difficult? I guess it was more of a man's world then. Did you find it difficult to get into the ring with the handlers?

BLANCHE: Yes, you couldn't do it. They wouldn't let you...they ganged up on us. They would give us no help whatsoever. They wouldn't give you advice on how to handle, condition, or trim. In fact, on the subject of trimming, they would show you THE WRONG WAY. And, I would just go in the ring...in those days the entry fee was \$3.50...and I would park next to one of them...Johnny Murphy or Frank or somebody else, to see how they trimmed. Each time I would study how they trimmed something different, for example, behind the tail...because they wouldn't tell me. That is one of the reasons why it took me so long!

BETTE: Well, I'm not sure that things have changed very much! Who were some of the other handlers you knew who showed and promoted Scotties. Did you know Johnny Murphy for instance?

BLANCHE: Well, Frank was before Johnny. Johnny was away at the war.

BETTE: Well, you've got very good handlers of Scotties nowadays.

BLANCHE: Who?

BETTE: Well, let's see, you've got on the East coast Cliff and Peter, Schaeffer, Clyde and Cruse...and I'm sure there are a few others. On the West coast...well, I'm not familiar with all of them...there's Kardos and the Cody's.

BLANCHE: Yes, Bergit is a very good handler. I met her in England even before she came to this country. Betty Malinka brought Bergit over to my place in Maryland one day and Bergit said she wanted me to teach her how to trim. Well, I didn't know anything...oh, maybe by that time I knew a thing or two...that was in the early 1960's, twenty years ago.

BETTE: It takes a long time to learn how to trim a Scotty, then?

BLANCHE: Oh well, I don't think it does, AT LEAST NOT AS LONG AS IT TAKES TO GET A GOOD ONE TO TRIM! We don't spend our time trying to hide things like the handlers do. You see, I would only show under the very best judges. Like Bewitching...that bitch was only shown in her lifetime 49 times.

BETTE: What was Bewitching's record? Do you remember?

BLANCHE: Of course I do! She was shown in 36 all breed shows and 13 specialties of which she won 27 best of breeds, 9 Best of Opposite, 7 Best in Show, 20 Group Firsts, 5 Group Seconds, 2 Group Thirds, and 13 specialty wins.

BETTE: That is fantastic! Thirteen specialty wins?

BLANCHE: Yes, my dear, and they were all consecutive wins, too! And she was in the top 10 for 1960. That's why I retired her. All those specialty wins which were consecutive turned other dogs away. No one would show against her. Now Fanfare was shown 85 times, and she won a few groups and Best in Shows with Johnny Murphy handling but the record of her wins would not have been as significant. Those handlers, if they got paid for showing a certain dog and they certainly did, would put in added entries and go off to the hills somewhere and finish the dog. Finishing a dog that way, means nothing!

BETTE: What kind of man was Frank Brumby? You said he had a wonderful philosophy.

BLANCHE: He was a good, honest, truthful person. He was not well educated but education would have ruined him. He was a gorgeous man.

BETTE: Did he prefer Scotties to other breeds?

BLANCHE: In the end, yes, because of S. S. van Dine. You've heard of him, haven't you? He had a good dog, Flornell Soundman, and Frank showed him. He made that dog world famous, really. After showing that dog, Frank definitely preferred Scotties. Before that, I think it was Westies. You see, Frank only learned from experience and accumulated knowledge, which is the way most of us should learn, but unfortunately that is not always the case. He was not a student and he probably would have turned up his nose at genetics, but he knew the dogs that were dominant. That's another point to make. You can buy a bitch that has been line bred, or what I call family bred. My idea is that family bred is the best, (the bitch's line). A strong family line is more important than a line bred stud UNLESS THE STUD'S LINE HAS THE SAME BLOOD IN IT AS THE BITCH'S. All the best pedigree's have it. Always remember to "give back to the sire, the best blood of his dam".

BETTE: So, in the end Frank preferred Scotties.

BLANCHE: Yes, there is no doubt. I finally gave him Barrister who was Barcarolle's best son, her first champion son. But this took years, from the 1930's to 1947. The way I bred is probably the way you are breeding now, and the way everybody starts out. You have a litter...it doesn't matter what...any to keep the best. The best for me and the best for everybody else is to try to pick the best bitch to carry on the breeding from the point of view of pedigree. Then later, from studying some genetics, I started line breeding. That is what Dorothy Casper in England and all those British men, the founders of the breed, the owners of Albourne Barty and Heather Necessity did. Those two kennel men were the ones who made up this rule "give back to the stud the best blood of his dam". And that's the way they bred, and that's the way they got their good ones. And they told us too, but nobody in this country paid much attention. We'd say "we can do better than that". Then a good one would come over from England, and the breeders would breed to every new high flyer, getting absolutely no improvement. Yes, I learned that line breeding was the only way to breed but it was next to impossible because all those wealthy people, for instance, Jean Flagler Matthews of Relgalf Kennels, kept bringing over every year another good one from England and we would all go breed to it. These dogs would be shown for a few years and then disappear. The Matthews and others like her didn't know any better either. I knew I should breed to a son of one of those big winners, but we could never find a son to breed to because they would be shown for a couple of years and do all the winning and be replaced by another dog from England, and generally speaking, not from the same line. So, I never got any improvement over my original bitch and I knew that something was wrong. I continued breeding with no real improvement for something like five or eight years.

BETTE: You said eight years!

BLANCHE: Well, sure, even for 15 years. The big story all over the country, and everybody has heard it...was that it took me 15 years to win a blue ribbon!

BETTE: Were you showing all that time?

BLANCHE: Well, most of it. Most of the time I would get a litter and then I would go to a match show.

BETTE: For the experience?

BLANCHE: Well, I was a woman...and I didn't know how to trim...and I didn't know how to handle...and I didn't know how to condition. There were a million reasons!

BETTE: There are a lot of things, you're saying, that one has to know.

BLANCHE: Yes, but I finally decided, to hell with this...I was advised by another friend, Hazel Malby to go to the McBain Kennel; she said Mr. McBain had good dogs there...he was an intelligent Scottish Terrier breeder. He was really one of the deans of the Scottie world in this country...and he and other wealthy Wall Street men would go over to England and sort out the dogs and, maybe, come back with a dozen or more.

BETTE: McBain was his name?

BLANCHE: Yes, William McBain. At one time he was one of the Presidents of the Scottish Terrier Club of America.

BETTE: So you went to the McBain Kennels, and what happened?

BLANCHE: So Hazel said, why don't you go over to McBain? He's got a young male that's very good. And I said, "I'm tired of this"...I get these bitches, and they're healthy and I get nice litters, but I can't get any improvement...I wasn't winning anything in the ring at that time. And to me, you can't think you've got a good one, or have somebody else tell you you've got a good one, unless you prove it by winning over other top dogs in a top show under a top judge." That's why Bewitching was only shown in 49 shows...I had to protect that reputation. WHY SHOULD I HAVE PUT HER UNDER ANY JUDGE AND HAVE SOMEONE WHO DOESN'T KNOW THE BREED PICK HER TO PIECES? There's no sense to that. But if you give the dog to a handler, they're going to finish it no matter where they have to take it...and you will never know how good the dog was. So finally,



discouraged as I was, Dottie (Dorothy Clawes) gave me a puppy bitch. Now that's a story. Dottie had had an inquiry from South America. Someone down there wanted a Scottie and she was to send the pup by clipper ship because in those days, you couldn't send a dog by plane. She didn't have any pups at the time but saw an ad in the paper, went down, and bought two pups, a bitch and a dog. When she got the pedigree, she found out that the grandsire was Blanart Bomber which was a dog I had bred before 1940. He had never been shown but I had kept him as a pet.

BETTE: So she gave you one of those puppies.

BLANCHE: Yes, the puppy bitch's name was Hi-Scot Clipper, and the reason she was named Hi-Scot Clipper was because Dottie planned to ship a pup by clipper ship. Now she had intended to name the male, Hi-Scot Clipper and send him down, giving me the bitch, but the names got mixed and the bitch turned out being named Hi-Scot Clipper.

BETTE: I see. That is a good story.

BLANCHE: Yes, Dottie was so good to me, you can't imagine...she even took me south on her yacht down to the Caribbean. So she gave me this puppy bitch who became the mother of Barcarolle!

BETTE: So it was Hi-Scot Clipper you took to McBain for breeding? Is that what happened? Who did you breed her to?

BLANCHE: The sire's name was Cabrach Caliper who had a lot of Diehard breeding behind him. That match produced Barcarolle. What finally happened was that Claire, another good friend of mine, bought Diehard Tobey from McBain. Now I can't remember exactly, but Diehard Tobey must have been a son of Caliper or had strong Diehard lines in him, and I bred Barcarolle to Tobey and had three champions in the first litter, and two in the second...and Claire had nameless ones because her bitch did not have the same blood. The foundation sire of both Claire's kennels and mine was Diehard Tobey. Barrister was a Tobey son. We just loved him, we both did. Diehard Tobey was by, or close up to either Necessity or Barty, and both Barty and Necessity were Annie Laurie sons.

BETTE: So you mixed English and American bloodlines to produce Barcarolle!

BLANCHE: Yes, but Diehard was McBain's kennel name and you could consider the line American. I really have forgotten who Tobey's sire was but he was one of these English champions brought over for the glory. But it was English breeding, alright! Those men knew who to double up on so and so and so and so. And you couldn't do anything BUT DOUBLE UP if you bred to Tobey because Barty and Necessity were half brothers. So that was line breeding to the stud. But everybody would do that if they could. If a dog became world famous, like Bingo, for instance...every good bitch in the country went to him for a stud service, and never did I see, but one, that looked anything like him. You see, he just wasn't dominant, and 9 out of 10 pedigree's, good ones, going back, must have him somewhere.

BETTE: Mine do, I know.

BLANCHE: That was the Bardene Kennel in England. Did you ever hear of the pedigree book put together by Dr. Kirk?

BETTE: Yes, I have, but I haven't got it.

BLANCHE: Try to get it if you can.

BETTE: Well, getting back to those early years, what do you remember about Johnny Murphy?

BLANCHE: Well, he was my dearest friendly enemy.

BETTE: Because you were competitors in the ring?

BLANCHE: Yes, always...you had to be a competitor with Johnny. But outside the ring he helped me alot.

BETTE: What kind of a man was he?

BLANCHE: Well, he was a little Irishman...a dear boy.

BETTE: What was the thing you remember best of what he taught you?

BLANCHE: Oh, I guess, it was the standard...that's a subject we've got to get on sometime. Nobody understands what the standard is, from what I hear, these days. Very few people know Scotties now as they did years ago, and the judges that are the good ones are saying that the quality in the breeding is deteriorating.

BETTE: So Johnny Murphy taught you the standard.

BLANCHE: Johnny Murphy, Seth Malby and Jimmy Murphy and I gave a symposium on interpreting the standard at Montgomery Country many years back. Frank Brumby critiqued it. You see, people who didn't have handlers would not let their dogs be exposed to just any judge. Now remember that, weed out your judges. You have to show a good judge a good dog; you can't teach a judge what a good Scotty is by showing him a second rater. So I donated two of my best dogs (but no one was supposed to know they were mine or their names), and we had a class after the dinner at the Montgomery show. The men graded them on a scale of 1 to 10, not according to

the points in the standard. All three men wrote down on a large blackboard for everyone to see their grading of the two dogs and how they rated them against the standard, and in the end the three handlers and the audience came to a consensus. It was a wonderful learning session for everybody there. Every judge would tell why this was good on this one and so on...or where the dog could be improved. And skulls. Johnny was very particular about skulls, and eyeset and earset. Each man had different ideas. But that taught us so much. And they don't have anything like that now. In fact, and of course, nobody today would put their good ones up there...to let good judges pick them to pieces. Every dog has some one thing that a breeder would like to change, I hope, otherwise why devote yourself to breeding? I know that sometimes, with some people, winning is more important than breeding.

BETTE: You're saying that going under a judge that doesn't know the breed will lead you to believe you have a good dog, and in the end, even if you win, you may wind up losing?

BLANCHE: Yes, well of course. They say, why isn't she using mine...my little scummy something or other...but if you started criticizing any little something or other, they would have a fit! Frank would also diagnose a dog according to the standard...not many people can...it could find fault, not fault so much, but he could tell you where he would like to find improvement, and that's the way he taught me, and anybody else who would pay any attention. But you can't get these people nowadays to pay any attention. If you are serious about breeding, I would advise you to go into it at the top. No one can say that they have the best of anything unless it is measured up against the best in the country, otherwise any breeder who does think this way is doing a disservice to the breed.

BETTE: I guess then there is such a thing as a backyard "show" breeder. Well, I guess, if there are enough judges around that don't know what they are doing, it can be done often enough. A well respected handler told me that he didn't think the new judges knew what they were doing!

BLANCHE: Yes, the first thing you've got to know as a breeder is to understand the standard. Study it, and get someone who knows that standard to tell you how it ought to be!

BETTE: They've changed the standard, haven't they?

BLANCHE: No, they can't change it! They have reinterpreted it! You know that I was the first one to start that committee when I was on the board of the STCA, many years ago.

BETTE: Tell me about your association and activities with the national club.

BLANCHE: Well, the first association I had with the STCA was when Jane Maloney, who was on the board at that time, suggested that I write the column for the *Gazette*...so the suggestion was made that I do the column for the *Gazette*. My first office was that of secretary/treasurer for the Club...Later, when I became President, I had that office divided into Corresponding Secretary and Recording Secretary...and somewhere the office of Treasurer was also separated from Secretary in duties. I had all those jobs.

BETTE: When were you President?

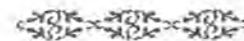
BLANCHE: Oh, let's see. Well, I was President in 1958 and 1959. It's listed in the *Handbook* as 1959, I think...I had two terms as President...with three terms as Secretary, and I was on the Board for a total of thirteen years.

BETTE: Then you were President from 1959 to 1960.

BLANCHE: No, if my memory serves me, I skipped a year...I was President in 1959, but then THEY FIRED ME!

BETTE: Fired you?

BLANCHE: Yes, a very influential member of the Board ordered the nominating committee not to have me on the slate for another year...but they still wanted me to be on the Board, however, and I told them that unless I was President, I wouldn't participate. So, the next year, I guess, they made me President, so I skipped a term. I think that was 1961. I guess my biggest contribution, though, was putting out the *Handbook* those years. I was proud of that! At that time, a handbook was long overdue, so I got it out, all by myself, and I had a terrible time with the Board because they wouldn't give me any money...and I got out the book and solicited all of the advertising, wrote all the articles, I think, and had a fight about giving them to the members. My treasurer was terrible, and I had to call him up all the time...and...finally, he said to me... "Well, I'll tell you Blanche...I won't vote against it"...and now that I think about it, I guess that I was really a bull in a china shop with that Club!
