PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

July 16, 1985

Dear Sir:

As President of the Scottish Terrier Club of America, I express official and personal objection and profound disappointment with your Black & White Scotch promotional contest offering Scottie and Westie puppies as prizes. Mr. Rudy Moeller first inquired on November 28, 1984, about our position on such a promotional contest. By response to his questionnaire on November 29, 1984, and by specific letter of December 4, 1984, responding to his inquiry, I conveyed to Mr. Moeller the objections of The Scottish Terrier Club of America to any such contest. In subsequent conversations, Mr. Moeller seemed quite willing to discuss and consider alternative promotional activities not involving puppies as prizes.

Ms. Nungesser of your firm met with our Board in Atlanta this past April. Our objections to promotions involving puppies were reiterated as was our willingness to consider supporting mutually acceptable promotional alternatives. We appointed one of our members to act as liason with you on promotional concepts and other means of mutual support. We were left with the very clear impression that Sazerac and its representatives understood our position and that you were willing to respect our judgment on promotional concepts involving Scotties. Personally, I was satisfied that Sazerac would *not* use any promotional contest which offered puppies as prizes.

Hence, my surprise, disappointment and distress when I learned that you had commenced a promotional contest which awards cash or Scottie puppies as prizes. Most recently, Bill Falvey advised me that the "Win A Puppy" contest has been planned for more than a year and was largely in place before Mr. Moeller even contacted us in November, 1984. I strongly feel that there was a lack of candor in dealing with The Scottish Terrier Club of America and your failure to early advise us of your intentions about such a contest. Your failure to be "up front" on this matter is almost as disappointing as the contest itself.

Obviously, at this point it would be futile to debate with you the relative merits of our respective positions. Our opposition to your action is firm and absolute. I assume you made an informed decision to proceed with this contest with full knowledge of our objections and with the conviction that the promotional and economic benefits far outweighed our objections. So be it. However, I do urge you to exercise your reserved right to award cash prizes in lieu of puppies. That should not diminish your contest benefits. And it would at least be a step back in the right direction.

Some of our members report that retailers and wholesalers of Black & White Scotch have been led to believe that The Scottish Terrier Club of America supports or approves of your contest. Be advised that we do not and please immediately correct any representations to the contrary made to your wholesalers or retailers.

I had hoped that we could have a mutually supportive and beneficial relationship.

GOING PLACES

Atlanta Area

QUERCUS KENNELS Gay, Georgia

Duchess Visonti di Modrone

As a child in Italy I remember our home always being filled with a variety of animals. Some of them were little mutts which had been rescued along the roadside, others were finely bred dogs, and even a goat and once an orangutang. My first Scottie came from a pet shop there. I looked in the window and completely lost my heart when I saw his large, yellow, almond shaped eyes. He was as long as a train, but his most distinguishing feature was his tail—he could curl it across his back and touch the top of his head! I spoke to the shop owner and decided he must be of good breeding. After all there was one champion in his pedigree. Before long I decided that this handsome animal deserved a wife—a fine and noble Scottish lady. So it was off to England, where from one of the most reputable of breeders, "Kate" came into our lives.

When we moved to the United States the Scotties and my husband's Jack Russells came along, too. Before coming here I had been involved with the breeding and raising of both cattle and horses for many years. So it was only natural that as we settled down on our farm in Gay that I would want to improve upon the quality of the Scottish Terriers which had so completely won my heart.

My first two English imports were Intl. Ch. Enchanter of Eilburn (Jeff) and Woodmansey Wait for It (Suzy). Both quickly attained their American championships, and became the foundation of Quercus Kennels. After a rather notable record in the American showrings, they have both now been retired. Jeff, however, came out of retirement this past April, long enough to win the Veterans Class at the Atlanta Specialty. It was one of my proudest moments, when he strutted around the ring, every inch a showman. Before I purchased him, he had been sold by his English breeders to an Italian handler. Once in Italy however, he was forgotten in the kennel and seldom shown or used at stud. What a loss it would have been to the breed if this lovely dog had remained unnoticed. I feel most fortunate to own him. Suzy was located for me by Peter Green, who started her out on her American show career at Montgomery County. I remember seeing her for the first time, handled by him, in the showing. I felt a catch in my throat, but it was the "Suzy personality" which I later came to know that has made her one of my dearest friends.

All of this began just five years ago. There are now 14 champions from Quercus Kennels, with several more that should finish their title shortly. There are still the house dogs with their own special gifts to share. But there is also a new, modern kennel facility that has been planned to insure the finest care of the show dogs and breeding stock. All of the Scotties however, take their turn in being house dogs. One of the things that seems to surprise many people is the early morning walks which I take each day with the dogs. A brisk hike of about three miles is taken around the lake and its surrounding pastures. All of the Scotties—dogs and bitches alike—and even the puppies once they are old enough—accompany me. There are seldom any problems, other than for a quick chase after a rabbit or wandering cow. It does not take them long to learn that if they want to go along they must behave or be left behind, and the excitement that builds when they know it is time to take off leaves little doubt of how much they all enjoy it. The exercise helps to develop strong, firm muscles and keeps them in the peak of good physical condition.

My goals for Quercus Kennels are very definite ones. To be able by careful and selective breeding, to produce dogs of top calibre that will be free of genetic problems: As a breeder I feel that this is my obligation. As a matter of personal choice, I would strive to combine the elegance of the American Scottie with the tenacity and substance of the English lines.

The South is not the most desirable place to breed and raise Scottish Terriers. We have bred Scotties in the North and also in England and have found that it is much more of a challenge here in the South. The hot, humid summers take their toll on coats and skin, not to mention the problem of fleas, ticks, and parasites. One has to work hard to keep one's kennel meticulously clean, which necessitates spraying for fleas and parasites once or twice a week. The dogs themselves must have constant care in order to maintain a decent coat. Frequent fleaspraying makes the coat dry and brittle resulting in more work on conditioning of the coat, but without flea-spraying, there would be no coat. When a Southern Breeder presents a dog in the ring in "tip-top" shape, you better believe that they have spent many hours of work on that dog. The most important contribution of work is that of keeping the kennels and surrounding areas free of fleas and parasites so that those show prospects are given a chance to grow into well conditioned dogs, not an easy task here in the South.

Now when I think back to the three years we spent in England showing and raising Scotties, it was a breeze. Well, let me say, breeding and raising was a breeze, showing there was no breeze! It took us a year to get the hang of exhibiting at British shows . . . all benched, no unloading areas, and class entries that were totally baffling. However, the knowledge that we gained while living there was invaluable. To us, the climate was less than desirable, but our Scotties loved it . . . and what coats!! It was easy to keep them in a tight hard coat all year round.

When we first arrived in the South, we had five adult dogs and two puppies, all English. It was winter, although it seemed like summer to us after the English climate we had become accustomed to. We soon found that fleas abounded everywhere. The dogs started to scratch and bite out lumps of hair and I watched my beautiful English coats go to ruin. With the help of our Vet and a lot of hard work we finally got things under control. However, it took many months of constant spraying, cleaning, and disinfecting to get those poor English dogs back into condition.

Some of the imports are still allergic to fleas and the grass down here and periodically must be on medication. However, we have found that our puppies who are now being born in this environment have very few problems; but the work never ceases. In the four years that we have been here, we have made up three generations of champions and that makes all the work worthwhile.

We were also fortunate in having the help and support of some of our other breeders here in the South. To them we will be forever grateful.

Our start in Scottish Terriers was probably like a lot of breeder-exhibitors—purchasing a pet Scottie. We attended a local dog show and noted how classy and aristocratic the Scottish Terrier was. We went home discussing how much fun it would be to get a Scottie to show and compete. The quest was on to find that Scottie. This was only the beginning; today, our quest is to breed the best Scottish Terrier possible.

Vikland is nestled in the mountains of Northern Georgia. We are a small but select kennel, with no more than five or six adults and one or two show prospects to bring along. Our philosophy—quality not quantity. Keeping our kennel small enables us to work with each Scottie to develop his full potential. We feel pressured with a lot of dogs. We would rather spend our time with a few; enjoying their activities, individual personalities and building on their good traits through a sound breeding program.

In show preparation and conditioning we have few problems relating to grass allergies, ticks, fleas, etc. due to our kennel facilities. Conditioning includes a bal-

anced diet, proper exercise and keeping our animals parasite free enables them to be happy healthy Scotties. Summer tends to dry coats so this is taken into consideration. Winters require a warm place or jackets placed on the dog until their natural protection grows in. Otherwise three months before showtime, stripping and conditioning begin.

In the years we have been a part of the South, the shows have grown in size—85 Scotties at the STCGA Speciality—and our regular shows normally have majors available. We have had competitors from the North, East, and West attending in recent years making it even more exciting. Grooming has markedly improved and many new folks are on the circuit. We are seeing more bloodlines being introduced to the South, including some imported dogs in recent years. We see Jet blacks, silverbrindles and wheaters in the ring today.

Travel time has to be taken into consideration as the Southern shows aren't always clustered or close together. Atlanta, Ga. seems to be the hub of the activity with the Scottie club; however the strongest exhibitors are in the outlying areas and neighboring states.

Southern folks are more relaxed and friendly, but also very competitive. We feel, as in each area of the country, each one of us needs to put personalities aside and honestly analyze each others dogs, after all we are trying to achieve the same goal—reduce faults to a minimum and enhance the good qualities. Our Scotties benefit from this atmosphere.

More is required of the exhibitor today than fifteen years ago. Competition is keener—quality is a direct result. Educational programs sponsored by the STCA and STCGA have challenged each of us to a more professional presentation of our Scottish Terrier. And last but not least the new and older exhibitors working together for a common goal.

In our breeding program, Bill and I strive for a nicely balanced dog. Short in stature, heavy, cobby body, tail right up on top of its back, great layback of shoulder with super drive and movement, a nice head with a small dark piercing eye, correct terrier attitude, and last but not least a good scissor bite. Someday . . .!

My first Scottie arrived in a white wicker basket, on a red velvet cushion—a gift from Santa in 1936. The basket didn't last very long, but Lassie and I shared 13 happy years together. Many dogs later (of various questionable breeds) and it was back to Scotties in 1965. Once you have lost your heart to a Scottie nothing else ever seems to take its place. "Clyde" was a delightful pet, of great breeding, but with a crippled leg. He was with us for nine years. During that time we began looking for another Scottie, one which we could not only love but also show. That was how our kennel began, with "Rina", (Ch. Clanronald's Sabrina) who is now 12 years old and still very much a part of our lives.

We had two male champions from Rina and several lovely pets. One of these, Holly, was the first puppy whelped from Rina's first litter, and is now nine years old and is still with us. Another of our Scotties, Ch. Firebrand's winetaster, was a wonderful bitch that had the misfortune of having to be spayed after whelping her first litter. She is now in a lovely home, enriching another family's life.

We also purchased a finished bitch (Ch. Clanronald's Sugar N' Spice), but with her second litter she, too, had to be spayed. So now it's back to the drawing board—by fall we hope to start over again. Scotties! That's all there is!

I have been breeding Scotties about 20 years. I started with a pet bitch given to me by friends. I never dreamed where that would lead. My interest in showing dogs stemmed back to childhood when I attended the Chattanooga Kennel Club Shows with my father. A kind man at the show asked me to take a Manchester Terrier in the ring for him, which was terribly exciting to an eight year old. I had a terrier-type mixed breed for many years as a youngster and loved her grit and tenacity.

My first Scottie "Bonnie", was by no means show quality but she was Scottie to the core in temperament. She did not like strangers or other dogs but adored my roommates and the neighborhood children. She was an excellent varmit dog and set about ridding the farm of mice, moles, snakes and groundhogs. My landlord wanted to keep her when I moved away.

From Bonnie's pups I learned a great deal about basic puppy rearing. She produced some fair pups bred to two different champion studs in my area, but I doubt they would ever have had the temperament necessary to finish. I showed her once and could see she had some serious faults so I set out to find a good bitch. In going to a number of shows with a friend, I began to see what was important to me. I met Evelyn Kirk who was showing Ch. Balachan Nighthawk. That was a truly fortunate experience, for from the Kirks I obtained a lovely bitch who became Ch. Balachan Nattie Nittack, "Tilly". She became a champion and group placer from the classes then produced four champion puppies in her two litters. She was a joy in every respect. Since Tilly and without adding any other bitches to my breeding program until about five years ago, I have been able to keep something decent to show. There have been some nice wins along the way and a fair number of champions.

I would not trade the wonderful friends and relationships I feel we have in Scotties in this area. I really like the exhibitors around our area without exception; there is a core of people with whom I have been close friends for ten to fifteen years. I have tremendous respect for them as people and as breeders. I enjoy their company and the exchange of ideas so much. Occasionally I have been caught off guard as when a friend pointed out that I am losing some feature that my dogs were previously strong for—I had simply gotten sidetracked with another problem or quest and had not given it much thought. On the other hand I have been patted on the back when I have managed to correct a particularly plagueing problem. We all need *constructive* comment and these can be given if there is mutual respect and sensitivity. As breeders we all have ups and downs, and it is our friends that often make the difference in the final outcome. I have a terrible tendency to go off on tangents and have been known to lose sight of the forest. Friends have frequently helped to provide the necessary corrective.

It was "Maggie" that all of my early mistakes were made upon. With an air of hopeless resignation she suffered through my early attempts at grooming. She bore the litter of puppies I thought she just had to have. My first wheaten, "McKuen", came from that litter. By that time I had been to my first dog show, and although I knew that my pet-store Scottie with the less than impressive pedigree might never win a blue ribbon, I was totally hooked on the breed.

I desperately wanted a good wheaten Scottie, but could neither locate nor afford one at that time. So I set about doing what I could with the puppy I had. If you have ever sat at ringside at an Obedience Trial in the south perhaps you will remember Hycourt McKuen's Sonnet CDX. He has won more friends for the breed, and for me, than any other dog I know. Watch him work and you will know that he does it for the joy of it, and that nothing pleases him more than to be on center stage.

Three lovely wheaten bitches are now a part of the kennel, each of them a champion. All of the dogs are as much at home in the house as they are in the ring. I firmly believe that the temperament of a well balanced dog should adjust to any situation, and that a "show dog" can be an equally fine companion and pet. Neither should showing in obedience deter an animal from a show of spirit in the breed ring. All of the Scotties run together during nice weather in a fenced in, wooded half-acre. They do not fight amongst themselves, because they know it is unacceptable behavior, but beware the intruder that wanders uninvited into their domain.

Hycourt is a small kennel (and plans to stay that way) dedicated to producing the finest dogs that it can. Although it is the quality of the animal that is foremost, I must admit a deep love of the wheaten color. Here in the South, keeping a Scottie of any color in good coat can present a few unique problems. However, in spite of what I hear other breeders say about fleas, allergies, blown coats due to extreme heat, and lack of furnishings, fortunately I have not found it to cause me any difficulty. I believe that what you put *in* the dog is more important than what you put *on* the dog, and all of my Scotties are maintained on a top quality dog food with the addition of a daily vitamin supplement and Brewers Yeast. They are not fed table scraps, but do get a biscuit each day. Otherwise their diet seldom varies. One of the things which I feel can cause the most harm to any dog's coat is internal parasites, and my dogs are all wormed every three months unless they are being bred.

About three years ago this city lady and her city Scotties moved to the small country town of Gay. Here the dogs run in the woods and through the brush. They are outside in the heat of summer, winter snow storms, and rain. In the evenings they adjust to the heated or airconditioned house. They delight in chasing rabbits and cattle, digging holes and occasionally escaping the confines of their fence for a day of serious hunting. Not pampered pooches, these hardy Scots, they are none-the-less thriving.

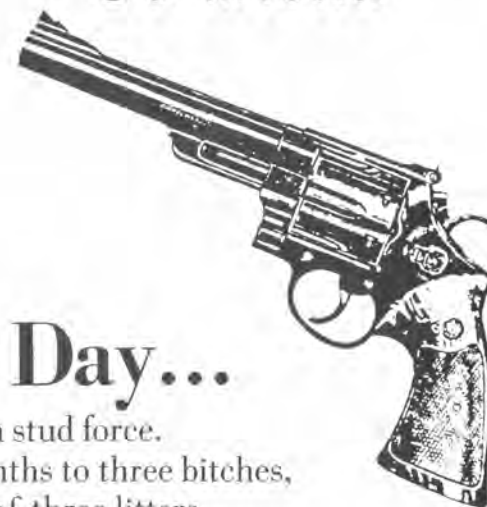

OBEDIENCE

By Ruth Tryon

With the fall season rapidly approaching we hope Mac is ready to be entered in Obedience Trials. However, you and Mac are a team and while Mac's work is acceptable, how ready are you?

Have you recently reviewed the A.K.C. Obedience Regulations concerning your class? It is a good idea every so often to read the rules that govern our sport. No matter how carefully we have read the "Book" we frequently find something we had not noticed or been too aware of before. So, first thing this season, check the Regulations.

While it is permitted in the ring, few people show a dog with a plain buckle collar such as he might wear all the time but if you have chosen to work with that collar, be sure nothing is attached to it—or any other collar—such as identification tags, rabies tag, etc. Also permitted in the ring are the slip (choke) collars of leather, fabric or chain with two rings, which most of us use. Always bear in mind Mac wears it only when working or on a walk with you on lead. It is a marvelous training device but remember it can be a deadly collar when Mac wears it other times. Be sure you use the same slip collar Mac has worn in training. In the ring is not the time to try out a new type of slip collar!

As you read the Regulations note not just what Mac is supposed to do but also what is required of you and what restrictions are placed on you as the handler. Handler errors not only take points off from Mac's score but could confuse him to the point he could fail the exercise. So as you work with Mac, encouraging him to do better and make fewer errors, make sure you are doing as well as he is. Scotties are not lap dogs as we all know but occasionally when they do something really well we will pick them up to praise them. But don't do it in the ring! The judge will be forced to penalize Mac by taking off points for handler error. Helping Mac is what you want to do—not penalize him for your mistakes.

Don't forget not only how you and Mac work as a team but how you appear as a team. Be sure Mac is well groomed. This does not mean he must have his coat in show condition but it does mean that he is well brushed, clean and presents a tidy appearance. And, again, this does not stop with Mac. Lately we have seen a number of articles on the appearance of the handlers in Obedience. Men judging are required to wear jackets and ties and women are expected to wear attractive and conventional sport clothes. It follows if judges are required to be careful of their appearance, why should not the same rules apply to the exhibitor? Fortunately we can be proud of those who exhibit Scottish Terriers. Our handlers present a neat appearance and their Macs are well groomed. Mac may not take the High Score in Trial award but our sportmanship, our conduct and appearance in the ring and our acceptance of Mac's success or failure, all in good grace, should be among the hallmarks of Scotties in Obedience. Let's maintain our "class" and be known as "the breed that is of special credit to the sport of Obedience". Never forget we are representatives of our breed to the public.

There are many things to think about as we prepare to enter the fall shows. Whether we realize it or not there are several phases in Mac's learning process. Going to school and working at home each day on certain exercises is certainly one phase. We try to be careful in school and training to use only certain words for certain activities, to pitch our voice in various ways according to the commands, to always be consistent in what we ask Mac to do and how we ask him. Another phase in his training is that great expanse of time spent with Mac daily about the house and yard. All too often when telling Mac what to do we use words meaning the same but not the exact same word or command we use in school. Even worse, we give commands in such a casual way or in phrases that Mac does not know exactly what we want, and can even compound the trouble to completely confuse him. He will try to do what is asked but if he fails, it is because you have confused him. Punishing him

only adds to the general confusion and sets back his training a considerable amount. So whether you are in school, training at home or in a special training location, wherever, USE the formal commands you have taken the time to teach Mac. You will reinforce each exercise, you will give him a chance to do it right, or if he fails, then to correct him. You will set the whole word and its meaning firmly in his mind. Exhibiting in the ring is another phase. While you plan to use the words Mac has learned, every so often unfortunately, you may substitute another command, such as Wait for Stay. A small difference to us but it could be a major problem to Mac. So keep your cool and remember what you have taught Mac.

Mac can learn "conversation commands" which are in essence a few words strung together, such as "Come over here" which means come to me but it is not necessary to sit squarely in front and then go to heel position. There are a multitude of commands we give Mac every day which are a generalized version of our ring commands. But before you "teach" Mac these commands, make sure he thoroughly knows and understands the basic training commands. In the meantime, during all your training, a rapport has been developing between you and Mac and it is through this rapport that you and Mac will understand each other. Eventually your friends will swear Mac understands everything you say and that he is a super dog. And he is a super dog because he is an Obedience Scottie.

While we are discussing commands there are a few salient facts about them. One is—*Don't keep on repeating a command.* This is one of the most common mistakes we all make. Once you have given a command Mac should follow it and if he doesn't then a correction is in order and the command can be repeated—but don't go "Heeling" down the street. He does not have to be told more than once for then you are only boring him with it and, more unfortunately, convincing him you didn't really mean it the first time. His little brain is working although at times it may not seem so and everything you do and say is being recorded. It behooves all of us to handle our Scottie well. The same thing goes with Stay—only once and he stays. To keep on saying it only convinces Mac you aren't sure what you want or you don't always mean what you say. For his own safety he must come on the first "Come". If he doesn't, correct him at once. If he is on lead lose no time using the lead correction. If he is off lead, put the lead back on him and give him the lead correction with a firm "come". It may take some time going back to the beginning but it is essential for his own safety at times that he always obeys the first command and that you always get those corrections in.

Heeling is an equally important exercise. Poor heeling off lead is often the cause of many points being lost in the ring. However, losing points in the ring is not the only reason we should all work and strive towards excellent off lead heeling. This poor, sloppy off lead heeling indicates lack of control of Mac and one of the main reasons we have started all this Obedience training is for better control of our Scottie. It is far too easy for the dog who lags, wanders wide and in general is not close to the handler to let his mind wander, his attention lags and then all too often he will find far more interesting things to not only watch but possibly explore and thus you have lost control of Mac, if only temporarily. For his own sake Mac must be under your safe control at all times and a dog who heels free really well is one who recognizes, accepts and respects you as "top dog". To attain this excellence takes some time but it more than repays you for the time it takes and the problems you must overcome.

First, polish Mac's on lead heeling and then start heeling with the lead thrown over your shoulder. Watch what happens carefully and at the slightest deviation from excellent heeling, quickly give a lead correction with lots of praise when he is back in the right position by your side. Remember no matter what you are trying to teach Mac to do, Praise, Praise and more Praise is just about the most essential ingredient.

All the corrections in the world will only lead to more trouble unless they are accompanied by praise for doing it right as he is corrected. Once Mac is doing nicely without corrections, you are ready for the next step. With him at heel position, while you are telling him what a wonderful boy he is, unsnap the lead but drop the snap between his neck and the collar, and then proceed to heel. He thinks he is on lead for he can feel the snap and the lead and any going slow, wide, etc. will result in lead tension on his neck. Once he is doing well with that you can gradually remove the snap from between his collar and neck and let it only touch him. From there it is a simple progression to no lead and good off lead heeling. Anytime he errs, put the lead back on and correct him, praise him and heel for a while and then start the entire process over. If he is really ready for off lead heeling there should be no problems for Mac. However, if you are running into lagging, going wide, etc. Mac is probably not ready for starting the off lead work so go back to basic on lead heeling. Practice. Practice. Practice and you and Mac will get there. Once he is really heeling well off lead you will find not only will he enjoy it but you will be amazed and delighted at the control you have—and how much fun it is being a team.

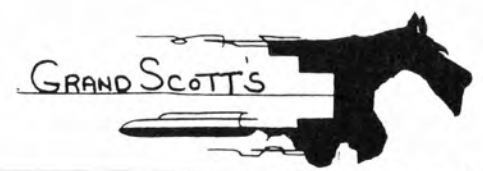
