### Sharing the Warmth

Puppies huddle together to keep warm, especially when the temperature is low. But how low is low? And how dangerous are low temperatures to the newborn? The answers: lower than you probably think and more dangerous than previously suspected. These conclusions were drawn by Ronald Schultz, DVM, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Pathobiological Sciences at the University of Wisconsin's School of Veterinary Medicine.

Dr. Schultz reminds us that a puppy's internal temperature regulatory system doesn't begin to develop until it's about two weeks old. In the meantime, if kept at a room temperature of less than 86°F, a puppy's internal temperature can drop from its normal 101°F to between 91° and 93°F— and run the risk of a weakened immunological system later in life. This would mean, among other things, that the pup would not respond fully or safely to vaccines that challenge the normally developed immune system—for example, canine distemper.

Studies at Wisconsin have shown that pups kept at a room temperature of 86°F have depressed or even totally suppressed immune responses. In this period, immediately after birth and before development of the pup's own thermoregulatory system, the pup is at greatest risk of infectious disease because the cold environment has further weakened its immature defense system. So until the end of the second week—when the pup can maintain its normal 101°F body temperature in spite of a colder environment—share the warmth.

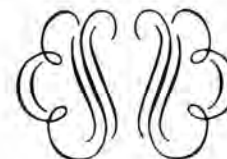

## SUMMARY OF THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

### OF THE SCOTTISH TERRIER CLUB OF AMERICA HILTON INN, ATLANTA, GA — APRIL 11, 1985

President Edward Ingram called the meeting to order at 9:05 a.m.

Officers and Board Members present were:

Directors:	Mr. John Cohen, Mr. Michael Cook, Miss Cindy Cooke, Mr. Richard Fowler, Mr. Richard Hickman and Mrs. Helen Prince. Not present Mrs. Sandi Hach and Mr. Jerry Roszman.

**REPORT OF OFFICERS:** Ed Ingram reported the following specific items which would be covered in full in order of the Agenda.

1. The Alan Novick Contribution for the Atlanta Rotating.
2. The Silver Service and Anstamm Achievement Awards. Nominations by the membership must be in writing.
3. Montgomery County 1985-/Ring Procedure for the two ring set-up if it is needed again.
4. Minimum cost value for Replacement of Annual Trophies
5. Treasurer Bonding Requirements.
6. Representatives from the Black & White Scotch Distributing Company would be joining us to discuss future involvement with the STCA.

**Vice President's Report:** John DeSaye reported on arrangements for the 1986 Rotating at New York: The problems that have been occurring with Rotating Specialties and his suggestions to eliminate them. Any revisions to the guidelines will be added to the S.O.P. John also reported that he had four Ring Stewards available, if necessary, for Montgomery County.

**CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT:** A list of correspondence sent and received since the last meeting was distributed and the following actions were taken:

1. Montgomery County 1985 - Deadlines sent to all Boardmembers and Chairpersons: Judges - Graham/Kingsbury.
2. Rotating Specialty 1986 - Hosted by STC of Greater New York. Judges - Chashoudian/Lee.
3. Montgomery Co. 1986 - Letters to Judges sent.
4. Rotating Specialty 1987 - Hosted by Greater Dallas STC-Letter to host Club sent for judges suggestions to the Board for consideration at the Oct. meeting.
5. **Sandissy Award Revision:** Marilyn Meador, donor of this award has requested the following changes of the requirements to receive this award.
  - a. To be awarded to the Scottish Terrier best representing the Breed in All Breed competition. (eliminating the American Bred Requirement).
  - b. The number of Best of Breed Wins be noted when tabulations are published.
  - c. An additional award of excellence or merit be given to those placing 2 thru 10 in tabulations.
  - d. These changes to be retroactive to January 1, 1985. (This has been approved by the AKC.)

6. Membership letter questioning whether the Nat'l Show Chairman may exhibit at Montgomery County or the Rotating Specialty. The STCA Policy states that the National Show Chairman cannot exhibit at our specialties, however a dog/bitch owned by them may be entered and a family member may exhibit.
7. Handbook Advertising. Due to the delay of the winter issue of the Bagpiper it was moved by Kathi Brown/John DeSaye to extend the discount rate to May 30. Motion carried.
8. Junior Membership: The Board received a letter from Ned Reaves for us to consider accepting Junior Membership. After much discussion - Motion was made by Kathi Brown/John DeSaye to amend our By-Laws to include Junior membership. The ballots will be sent to the membership the first of June. Motion carried.
9. Specialty Show Classes: Cindy Cook pointed out that the 12-18 month class was only allowed at Independent Specialties, following a short discussion Cindy made the **motion**, seconded by Michael Cook that our delegate to the AKC request they consider changing their rules to include the 12 to 18 class. Motion carried.
10. Morris Foundation. Letter was received from the Morris Foundations inviting the STCA to send a representative to their annual meeting on June 23/23 at Universal City, CA. This foundation provides funds to study health problems with animals and its is funded thru an endowment from the Morris family. **Motion** R. Hickman/R. Fowler to appropriate \$100.00 to the representative towards expenses for the weekend. **Motion carried.**

**Recording Secretary's Reports:** Betty McArthur requested that upon acceptance of New Members, the applications be turned over to her as well as all old files in order to maintain more accurate membership records. She also requested that another notice be put in the Bagpiper to the membership advising that any address or name changes be sent to her so she may update the files and the mailing list accordingly.

**Treasurer's Report:** Netha Robinson Distributed a detailed report for the period of October 1, 1984 to March 30, 1985. Total Receipts \$24,536.37 - Disbursements \$9,377.99 - Balance \$15,158.28. Full report elsewhere in this issue.

**AKC Delegate Report:** Results of the AKC Nominations. The panel submitted by the nominating Committee was elected to office.

Dr. Kirk gave a special report regarding the Staffordshire Terrier Club. Due to the laws being passed **against** the Bull Terrier, Staffordshires and American Staffordshires, in some cases attempting to **delete the breed**, they have depleted all of the funds in legal fees and cannot afford to hold their National Specialty. The AKC has resolved to assist and shall increase their entry fee next year by \$1.00 to go toward the Staffordshire defense fund with the consideration that if legislature would or could delete one breed, who would be next?

Booth space will be made available to them so they may distribute information regarding the legislation passed and information to the public about their breed. The ATC has proposed that if they wish to have their show with them, 30c of each dollar be donated to this fund.

Dr. Kirk read a letter from the Staffordshire Club to the STCA Board congratulating us on our member Dr. Alan Riga who so generously have his time and assistance in fighting legislature in Cleveland for them.

We were also advised that the stock of Clarifications was near depletion. **Motion - Prince/Kirk** to order 3000 new copies. **Motion carried.**

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS

**Awards Ch. Helen Prince:** Helen reported receipts of cash awards for M.C. and all was in good order. Because of the delay in mailing of the Bagpiper Helen has sent to the membership the nomination form for recipients of the Silver Service/Anstamm and Gaines Awards with her mailing for trophy donations.

**Bagpiper:** Letter received from editor Sani Hach advising this latest issue in the black in the amount of \$500.00. Sandi announced she found a volunteer to replace her as editor starting with the Summer issue, this being Nancy Van Meter. Nancy is a professional graphic artist and quite enthusiastic about the job. We were also advised that Color photo's are now available.

**New Regional Club Policy - Ch. Richard Hickman:** The revised detailed questionnaire was distributed by Richard Hickman. The purpose of this application is to assist the STCA Board in making a decision as to the qualifications of a club's request to be recognized as a regional club and also to assist the club in its application to the AKC for sanctioning. **Motion - Kirk/DeSaye** to accept this report in application form and to lodge the master copy with the Corresponding Secretary to utilize as and when appropriate. **Motion carried.**

**Way n Means:** Letter received from Faith Harrop who chaired this function at M.C. 1984 advising a quantity of left over items on hand. She suggests that left unclaimed from the Regional Tables become property of the STCA., and that the division percentage be revised. **Motion - Hickman/McArthur** to change the percentage of division to 60% Regional Club/40% National Club. **Motion carried.** Further discussion regarding the current onflow of Scotti items which would add to the Ways n Means Tables be purchased when available at discount prices. **Motion - Prince/Fowler** to approve \$250.00 to Betty McArthur to purchase a supply of quality items for future Ways n Means use. **Motion carried.**

**Trophy - Helen Prince** distributed a 'commitment form' to be used for any future pledge of cash donations or trophies for specific classes each year. This form would hopefully prevent any future losses as happened with the Novick pledge. It was suggested to have a 120 day prepayment clause. **Motion -DeSaye/Fowler** to accept the form with the addition, **Motion carried.**

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS

**A. Pittsburgh Club Status:** John DeSaye advised that the Club will be having a Grooming Seminar in May under the guidance of Merle Taylor. Kathi Brown stated she has been receiving mailings of their club minutes and activities. She will send the the new Regional Club Application Form.

**B. Dunbar Trophy:** It was decided to continue with the minimum value (\$100,000) set in 1983 and to advise the current donors that we are attempting to standardize all of the awards accordingly.

**C. By Law Changes:** Three changes to be considered by the membership all involving Membership rulings have been proposed by the Board. **Motion - McArthur/Hickman** to accept the proposals as drafted and send them to the membership with the Nominating Co. Report June 1. **Motion carried.**

**D. Bagpiper Editor:** **Motion - Fowler/Kirk** to accept Nancy Van Meter's offer to replace Sandi Hach as editor beginning with the Summer Edition. **Motion carried.**

#### NEW BUSINESS:

**Election of New Members:** A list of applications were distributed and reviewed. **Motion - Fowler/Cook** to accept the applicants as presented with the exception of three incomplete applications: The new members will be listed under Welcome Waggon section of the Bagpiper.

**Mini Symposium:** Request from Heart of America to have a mini symposium in June or July of this year. Merle has already advised he was available. **Motion - Folwer/Cooke** to approve the request. **Motion carried.**

**Regional Clubs Support:** John Cohen reported on the lack of support the Regional Clubs are giving each other and pointed out that without this assistance many clubs will not be able to hold specialty shows. The Board entertained a resolution for Regional Clubs to support inter-club cooperation between Regional Clubs financially, with entries, advertising, or trophies for the mutual well being not only to the individual club but to the breed.

**Staffordshire Terrier Club:** Relating to the report given by Dr. Kirk with regards to the financial difficulty this club is in due to the legal battle to protect their breed, the Board suggested we offer a page in the Bagpiper to them so they may solicit assistance from the membership. **Motion carried.** The President of the Staffordshire Club will be invited to address our membership at the Annual Dinner in October.

**Motion Kirk/Brown** to adjourn. **Motion carried.** The meeting was adjourned at 5:20 p.m.

## What Will Happen to the Dogs?

The call came late on a Sunday evening. The voice on the other end betrayed the caller's shock and disbelief. "Cindy, Dick Hensel is dead." The caller went on to tell how, after a day of judging dogs in Louisiana, one of our most prominent breeder-judges had suddenly died of massive heart failure at a relatively young age. When I could finally speak, I asked the question that many dog fanciers, Scottie lovers in particular, would ask repeatedly in the next few weeks: **"What will happen to the dogs?"**

In the case of Dunbar Kennels, this story has a favorable ending. Dick had been reducing the number of dogs in his kennel and friends found good homes for all the dogs. Every day, however, dogs end up in shelters, euthanized, or worse, abandoned, because their owners neglected to ask the hard question: "If I die, what will happen to the dogs?"

Virtually everyone who reads this magazine has a deep emotional commitment to their dogs, manifested by a high expenditure of time and money. Most of you faithfully maintain a rigid shot schedule, wage all-out war on parasites, and willingly (if not cheerfully) provide your veterinarian with a very comfortable living. You buy miles of chain link fencing and subject prospective puppy buyers to interrogations that would bring a smile to the fact of the toughest homicide detective. You go without sleep to nurse puppies and you buy pages of ads to memorialize your old veterans when you lose them. You love your dogs, but I am willing to bet that most of you have not seriously considered what will happen to your dogs when you die.

In most states, dogs are considered as personal property. (Some states require the dog to be of a certain age or to be licensed to qualify as property, but these are the exceptions.) When you die, your property is distributed to the new owners in accordance with the laws of your state. If you die without a will (in legalese, this is called dying intestate), your state's law determines who will be the new owner of your property, including your dogs. Such laws are called laws of "intestate succession." Intestate succession varies from state to state. Normally, the spouse of the deceased gets most of the estate, then the children, parents, and other relatives. This transfer of ownership must be done through the court, who normally appoints a family member or an attorney to be the personal representative of the estate (Personal representative, administrator, and executor are terms used in different states for this same function.) The personal representative locates all of the heirs, inventories the assets, notifies and pays creditors and distributes the estate to the heirs. While this often lengthy and occasionally expensive process goes on, what will happen to the dogs?

If you're married to another doggy person, you could die together in your van on the highway. Do your grown children want all those dogs? If your children are minors, someone else will be rearing them (maybe not your first choice, either, since you didn't have a will naming a guardian). Will that someone else take your children AND your dogs? It could even be worse--no one may even know who your dogs are. Many breeders have numbers of dogs who live in the house or in unmarked kennel runs. If the breeder dies, who will know which dog is which? If you co-own a dog, and your co-owner dies, you may think that you are now the sole owner of the dog. Wrong! You now co-own the dog with the estate of the deceased and when the estate is settled, you may find that the new co-owner is a war correspondent who travels in the Middle East and is too busy to sign AKC paperwork when you need it.

All of the above problems are preventable if you are willing to do a few simple things. First, sit down and decide what you want with your dogs if you should die. Talk to the lucky person or people upon whom you have decided to bestow your dogs. Be certain that they are willing to accept the responsibility. Second, be sure that your runs and crates are labeled, and that your canine files are in order. Somewhere among your dog papers, put the name or names of persons who know which dog is which. The next step is going to cost a little money, but after all, you're dog people. You're used to shelling out for the dogs. See an attorney for some estate planning. You can select a personal representative who will see the dogs for what they are--your loving companions and the culmination of your lifetime of breeding toward the goal of a perfect Scottish Terrier--and not just property. You can decide who will own your dogs and you can allocate funds for their support. You can also decide who will get all of your runs, crates, grooming tools, etc. You can insure that the Scottie memorabilia that has given you such pleasure will go to people who will treasure it, rather than ending up in a flea market. You may wish to leave some bequest to an organization, such as the STCA or a humane society, who shares your goals. A will or a trust (or both) can be fashioned to achieve any of these goals and more.

As we tell our clients, the best way to be sure that your estate is managed the way you want is not to die. Good estate planning is the second best way. If you die, what will happen to YOUR dogs?

## OBEDIENCE

A lovely new trophy is being offered in Obedience. Through the generosity of Lorayne and Marc Lapin, and because of their interest in both conformation and obedience, the trophy is to be awarded to the dog earning the Highest Average Score for a Novice, Open or Utility title and who was a Champion of Record at the time the title was earned. It is a beautiful engraved silver trophy and will be offered for the first time at our annual meeting in October 1985. It will be called the *MacLapin "Sam" Memorial Trophy* and is in memory of Ch. MacLapin Just a Sample, C.D.X., Can C.D. We all thank Lorayne and Marc for honoring "Sam" this way.

Transforming Mac from a Champion to a Companion Dog really isn't difficult for what he has learned in the breed ring can be translated into good obedience work. Doubtless one of the main problems will be Mac's owner proclaiming "He will never do Obedience work". Think about it — is it not an excuse for not trying? Mac has earned your affection and attention. He deserves more than being retired to stud, or if it is a Maggie, to bearing and raising puppies. Once the handler's mental hurdle is overcome Mac is on his way towards his Obedience titles.

While you will doubtless enter Mac in Beginners Obedience Class, he will have one big advantage over most of the other dogs. Mac has been in the ring many times and is used to seeing other dogs in the ring. Scotties do feel they have to keep an eye on these other dogs but they are not a totally new thing for Mac and you can convince him to focus his attention on you much more quickly than the other handlers will be able to do so with their dogs. You also will be using a different type of collar and lead and this will clue Mac into the fact that this is a somewhat different ball game.

The sit-stay exercise is often the first exercise learned in the beginners class. While there is not sit in the conformation ring, the dogs are required to stay. This exercise is often taught first as it quickly gives you control over your dog, the dogs seem to catch on easily and it minimizes the first class night confusion, thus making communication between the instructor and handlers easier.

Whether or not you realize it, a great deal of the time Mac is in the conformation ring, he is doing a stay. Granted you are beside him, stacking him, - but he is staying. Think of the number of times you tell him "Steady" or "Stay" while the judge is looking all the dogs over. The dog who can stay without constant handling always has an edge over the other dogs. Stay is simply a refinement of steady as it does not permit any movement.

While gaiting in the conformation ring and heeling in the obedience ring are different, there is considerable carry-over from one ring to the other. When a Scottie is gaited in the conformation ring it is invariably on a tight lead. In obedience the lead must be loose. However, Mac is lead broken and knows how to make turns and stay at your side. Using the training collar and lead, corrections can be made when he forges or lags or goes wide from you and he will quickly learn his place is by your side even though the lead is loose. Plenty of praise and encouragement will help keep him there. In the conformation ring Mac has moved at only one pace. Now he must learn to move slowly at times or run along side of you, always adjusting to your pace. With the proper lead corrections you can soon have him changing pace without too many difficulties. Gaiting is one of the most important parts of conformation showing, for there the judge can see more clearly both the good and weak points of a dog - in obedience heeling is the basis of all good obedience work. So use all the good things you have learned in conformation and translate them with the correct changes into good obedience heeling.

In conformation Mac should not sit when you stop when gaiting him, but it is different in obedience. Here he must learn every time you halt he is to sit smartly at your side, but learning this is not too difficult for the conformation Scottie. It can best be accomplished by a quick jerk upward with the lead and pushing his solid little rump down the moment you come to a halt. There must be **NO** delay in sitting Mac when you stop and you will have to do it every time for the first few days and then, after practicing a bit, comes the day you just halt — and Mac will amaze and delight you by sitting automatically. Hard to believe but it does work that way. Just don't try the automatic sit too soon with Mac. We all tend to push our Scotties too fast. Remember he is learning the difference between the two rings and should be given a chance to understand it.

Free Heeling is a part of the Novice routine Mac will be asked to do when he is entered in an Obedience Trial working towards his Companion Dog title. It is simply heeling without the lead - and is important not only in the scoring but for his own safety, as he should always be under your control. Unfortunately many Novice dogs do not do well in this exercise. Usually it is not the dog's fault but the handler's. They are heeled offlead too soon. It is a big temptation as Mac is heeling well on lead - surely he will do equally well offlead, in spite of some lagging or slow sits.

Sadly it rarely works that way. Keep him on lead until his heeling is practically perfect, just super; that he thinks by your side is the **ONLY** place to be when heeling. Then take off the lead and give him a try. The first deviation from good heeling, such as lagging, going wide, forging, etc. calls for the lead to be put on immediately. Since he was always by your side in the conformation ring don't let him ever get the idea he can do otherwise in the obedience ring. When training talk to him and encourage him, just as you do in the breed ring. There is lots of carry over - use it to Mac's advantage.


Frequently the Stand for Examination exercise is more difficult for the conformation dog to learn than one would expect. But remember, when the judge went over Mac you were right there at his side, propping him up at times, keeping his tail from wagging in the judges face at other times and in all ways helping him and in many cases, giving him confidence. In obedience Mac must stand on his own, off lead and with you six feet in front of him while the judge goes over him. The Novice examination is very simple with only the head being touched once and the back twice. However the Utility examination is very similar to the breed examination. Mac must learn to be steady, not to move his feet or try to duck or even cringe as the judge goes to handle him. He can wag his tail happily though! But here, again, he has an advantage over the other beginners as he is used to being gone over by a stranger. He must only learn to be steady without you right there. First, keep Mac on lead and stay with him as he is being examined but do not hold or touch him. Gradually you can move away from him and then there will come the day when he will be off lead and sure of himself. Just as you try to make sure he is comfortable when in the breed ring, make sure he is standing comfortably when you place him for the Stand for Examination.

The Recall exercise does not have any correlation with the conformation ring but it does incorporate the sit-stay in the beginning of the exercise. Go along with the method of teaching used in your class and always remember whatever the method, praise and encouragement are among the two most important ingredients in training Mac. When you call Mac be firm - you mean it - but not stern. Put a quality in your voice that makes him want to come to you.

The long sit and down in obedience are simply stays in certain positions. Mac, having learned to sit in both the heeling exercise and by your side the first night, is now ready to do the sit-stay exercise, first on lead with you in front of him. Heel Mac a few feet, come to a halt with Mac at your side in the sit position, tell him to "Stay" firmly, give him the hand signal and take a few steps in front of him and turn and face him. Don't be surprised when he stays. He knows how to sit, he knows how to stay, you have simply changed your position. Gradually you can move away from him until you are at the end of the lead, and eventually he will do it off lead with you across the room from him. There is nothing in conformation that can be translated to the down position so you and Mac will be genuine beginners in that exercise. Use whatever method you instructor is teaching to get Mac to go to the down position and once that is accomplished, you have only to add the stay commands, voice and hand, and proceed with Mac's training as you did in the sit-stay.

One of the interesting things about Obedience is that the longer you work with your Mac the better he does the work and the more he likes it. Nothing worth doing happens in a minute. Capitalize on Mac's breed experience and help him acquire his new skills. Mac showed great patience with you all those months you were grooming him, carting him about and showing him. Now it is your turn to show patience and affection as he transfers his conformation training to the Obedience ring. Don't let those 15 points end Mac's career - they should just be the beginning! A start to being what he really wants to be - a real companion dog!

It is nice to report several Scotties have earned Obedience titles so far this year, including two Utility titles! So train your Mac and happy heeling.

## WAY BACK WHEN

(Excerpts from Vol. IV, No. 7, Sept. '52 of Diehard Dope)

### DO JUDGES SPREAD DISEASE?

FRANK FOSTER DAVIS has long advocated that judges do not open mouths of dogs they are examining, lest they spread disease, but have the handler of the dog open its mouth.

This idea also has been advocated in Great Britain, with another of Frank's—that vets also refrain from opening dogs' mouths but have the exhibitor do it upon admission to the show.

On the surface, this seems an excellent idea, although some judges might ask how they were doing to get the dog's exhibitor to open its mouth sufficiently to permit proper examination.

But before I can endorse such a proposal, it would be necessary to get veterinarian agreement that these practices are dangerous, that they do spread disease.

I doubt it.

First of all, not many diseases are transmitted by mouth; many more are communicated by inhalation, or by contact in the exercise ring with excreta.

Second, a healthy dog has ample defense mechanisms within its bloodstream.

I have exhibited dogs at many shows; they were taken home and placed with their kennelmates with no sort of isolation, yet I never brought home any illness, despite the fact that few had even been immunized against distemper.

During an outbreak of pseudo-distemper some years ago that caused heavy losses, with some kennels virtually wiped out, I had six of some 25 dogs ill and lost one—the best bitch, of course.

But my dogs were outdoors all day in the sun and fresh air, winter and summer, except during rain or snow, and slept snug in boxes in an unheated kennel in winter, but with plenty of fresh air.

My feed bill was double that of heated kennels, but my vet bill was virtually nil.

### FRANK FOSTER DAVIS DISAGREES WITH EDITORIAL ON INFECTIONS

Frank Foster Davis, all-arounder, former dog-show owner and breeder, takes exception to the editorial in the September issue of Diehard Dope entitled: "Do Judges Spread Disease?" To be entirely fair to Frank, his rebuttal is published first; it is answered at the end. Mr. Davis' reply follows:

I fail to appreciate Mr. Linton's editorial, September issue of Diehard Dope, in which he questions the possibility of transmitting virus infection through the mouth, this at the time of examination of mouths by the official veterinarian and judges placing their hands on or within the mouths of the dogs during a show.

Mr. Linton expresses himself first and then adds that he must consult the opinions of those schooled in medicine before arriving at a conclusion. He DOUBTS the possibility of the spread of disease through the unsanitary methods now in effect. I would have suggested to Mr. Linton that he would have been well in order had he have asked for the opinions of qualified veterinarians, and M.D.s, as well, before seeing fit to have written his article. [I have done so—Ed.]

I wish to advise Mr. Linton that I devoted considerable time during a three-month period in which I sought an expression from many of those whose opinions I respect in the medical world prior to writing my first article on this all important issue.

Each and all agreed as to the gravity regarding the situation or present practice of spreading disease through pernicious handling of dogs' mouths without precautionary form of any sort. I based my article on these findings. Now that Mr. Linton has seen fit to question my objective [I did not question his objective—Ed.], I would suggest that he also devote time to research, then write another editorial.

It is possible that he may have reports in which his opinion is concurred in. If so, it would prove most interesting to all of us.

I feel that Mr. Linton is most fortunate as to the lack of infection directly attributed to the hazards of shows and the possibility of his dogs coming down with an old or new form of virus. This as to his own kennels.

During the years in which I exhibited dogs (I no longer do so as I believe an all-breed judge should either judge or exhibit but not BOTH), I have lost plenty through virus infection followin at which my dogs were exhibited. I know full well I would appreciate the proposed safeguard were I again to return to the exhibiting of dogs. This in the form of proper legislation on the part of the American Kennel Club.

After Mr. Linton investigates and finds that medical authorities are in agreement as to the possibility [anything is "possible" to a scientist] of oral transmission of infection, I would suggest that an article to this effect be published on the same editorial page in which Mr. Linton saw fit to question the issue.

I would call to your attention Mr. Linton's questioning in the paragraph which sets forth as follows: "On the surface, this seems an excellent idea, although some judges might ask how they were going to get the dog's exhibitor to open its mouth sufficiently to permit proper examination."

I question that this was advanced in all sincerity. [O.K.—so I'm a liar!] I will ask a question in return. IF the handler, one the dog knows, cannot open or present the "bite" of the mouth, how in hell could a total stranger hope to arrive at a point of observation through his or her own physical contact? [You can, Frank, you can.]

Mr. Linton doubts it all, but let us grant that even ONE dog may be spared infection due to the lack of "Hands Off." Just ONE!—Would it not be worth it all? Bear in mind the ONE dog may be your own!!!! Even an EXCELLENT one of your own breeding, Mr. Linton.

EDITOR'S REPLY: Like many persons who feel deeply upon a subject, obviously Mr. Davis cannot read and understand simple English.

For example, in his second paragraph he states that in the complained-of editorial I said that I "must consult the opinions of those schooled in medicine before arriving at a conclusion."

What I published was: "But before I can endorse (which is NOT the same as "arriving at a conclusion") such a proposal (to have vets and judges refrain from opening mouths), it would be necessary to get veterinarian agreement that these practices are dangerous, that they do spread disease."

So far as I can learn, vets DISAGREE that the complained of practices causes the spread of disease.

Let's look at the FACTS:

Distemper, according to the recognized authority, Hamilton Kirk, M.R.C.V.S. ("Index of Diagnosis"), is "most difficult to diagnose with any real certainty." But he offers as a "fairly rapid and accurate clinical diagnose," a method using "bladder smears"; distemper is a virus disease, commonly contracted through the nose, either by contact with nasal discharge of infected dogs, or, as the bladder-smear technique suggests, through sniffing of urine from infected dogs. BUT NOT via the mouth.

Infectious jaundice, likewise is transmitter, authorities agree, via urine—often rat urine. Rabies is NEVER transmitted by mouth, but by a bite that permits this virus to enter the nervous system.

Transmission of hardpad, so far as I know, has not been determined, but, since it appears related to the distemper group of diseases, it appears doubtful that it is transmitted by mouth.

All available scientific facts indicate to me that the REAL source of dog-show infections is NOT the examination of mouths by judges and vets, but THE EXERCISE RINGS. It is in them that well dogs can come in contact with infections in the excreta of ill ones.

The first case of distemper I ever encountered occurred in a bitch that NEVER come in contact with another dog or had her mouth "opened" by a judge or vet. She did, however, do a lot of sniffing—and came down with distemper. If she didn't get the virus from excreta, WHERE did she get it from? Q.E.D.

CHAPTER XIII  
THINGS TO REMEMBER.

Nearing the end of this little handbook, I would impress several points to be remembered, small things apparently, which in reality are big things.

With the exception of "History" and "Origin" the main part of this book is not compiled from hearsay or read up from other books, but is written entirely from practical experience gained in a very hard school, that of having to make a living out of dogs, and there is no sterner master than necessity.

A good-looking dog is a beautiful thing, the rearing and care of which is a privilege. The man who with hard work and intelligence breeds them leaves the world better than he found it.

Do not imagine you are going to make a fortune out of Scotties, or any other breed, for that matter. With work, patience and intelligence you may make them pay, indeed you may make a living—you won't do more.

If your aim is to be a Fancier, be a Fancier and do not degenerate into a dealer, trucking rubbish other people cannot place, just to make a pound or so for yourself.

When showing, do not yowl when your dog goes down or preen your wings unduly when he goes up.

Never give up hope over a sick dog; do your utmost, spare no expense, nurse him as you would your best beloved, and remember a good dose of Castor Oil given promptly saves many a vet.'s bill.

Make yourself conversant with canine ailments. Get a sound book and thoroughly study it. Notice what the vet. does and how he does it. If you do not understand his method, question him. If he is a sportsman he will explain.

Make your dogs your pals. Don't treat them either at hot house plants or machines. Never "slap dab" at a Scottie, nor keep up a continuous chant of "Naughty Dog!" Make him understand what you want him to do and see that he does it. If he absolutely defies you, thrash him at the time of his misdemeanour, not an hour after. As a breed Scotties are ultra intelligent and high couraged, and one thorough thrashing in a lifetime is usually sufficient for them.

Laugh *with* them—not *at* them. Scotties hate being made to look foolish. If you are wise, you will place all your bitches not later than four years old, otherwise you will in time find your kennels filled up with a bunch of ancients who do not earn their keep. It is ten to one you will *not* be wise, because you love them, and cannot cast them out in their old age.

Don't expect to house-train an eight week old Scottie. You won't do it. He believes in indoor sanitation; also the steps into the garden are often a proposition to his stubby legs.

Remember "Cleanliness is next to godliness," and keep everything scrupulously clean—dogs, beds, kennels, brushes, bowls and Yard.

When a dog is a bit off colour, don't run about telling everyone he has distemper. It makes you unpopular, and it is quite probable you are wrong; but if there is a rise in the dog's temperature and a lassitude about him, isolate at once, and wash your hands in disinfectant before touching another dog.

On returning from a show, change your trousers or skirt and shoes, and wash your hands in disinfectant before going into the kennels, or handling the youngsters.

Don't remove your dog from a warm kennel or a show and take him for a drive in an open car unless he wears a coat. He is as likely to take cold as you are, if you go out under similar circumstances without a wrap.

When showing, send your entries in time and clearly written, together with the correct entry fees. Arrive in time. Yammering at the gate in these days lands you at the Kennel Club.

Breed your winners—don't buy them. A third at an Open Show with a home-bred 'un gives more pleasure than a first at a Championship Show with a bought one.

Buy your food judiciously and buy the best. The dog biscuit people are all open to give you good terms for prompt payment.

Don't feed on horseflesh. Remember it's the old or the physicked horses that usually come to the knacker. You can't buy a two-year-old at 3d. a lb.

Feed regularly at the same time every day. Regular meals do twice as much good as double the food given at odd times.

See that the drinking water is always fresh and clean. Don't be beguiled into putting a lump of brimstone into the water. You might put in a lump of brick and the result would be the same. If you must put something in, get an old horseshoe, thoroughly clean it, and put that in the water. There's nothing like iron.

In summer (that is to say, hot sunny weather) see that there is always shelter from the sun in the open run. If you have no trees, erect an awning.

Feed your small puppies little and often and *always* worm early.

Don't grumble if your dogs howl all night. The fault is yours, as the dog is uncomfortable and possibly hungry. A well-bedded, well-fed dog sleeps and does not mourn.

Keep your Stud Dog away from in-season bitches until you wish to use him. He will only fret and go off his feed.

Don't be led into doping your Stud Dog. If he is getting too much work, rest him. It's cheaper in the long run.

When you advertise your stock, say what you need to say, but don't make an essay of it. Possible buyers want facts, not blank verse.

When selling your dogs, don't overcharge and don't undercut. Ask their honest value, for in the one case your clients never come back and in the other you are spoiling the market for other fanciers.

When you get to know a bit, don't hesitate to give a helping hand to those who know less, but in your desire to help do not patronise or assume a greater knowledge than you have. The blind leading the blind usually ends in disaster.

Don't make a habit of trying new patent medicines. It is rough on the dogs, and a strain on the pocket. Make up your mind as to the medicines that are good, and stick to them.

When the dogs you are not showing get past their coats, strip them off. Don't reserve all your attention for the exhibition dogs, but keep the whole kennel looking smart and trim.

When sending dogs by rail, have proper boxes, not make-shift ones. Baskets are not safe for Scotties, as on a long journey they are perfectly able to gnaw a way out.

Never kennel three dogs together. If they should fight in the kennel, two have equal chances. With three, it may be a case of two to one.

Never let dogs get into the habit of running in and out of the house, and in winter lying near the fire, and then turning them out into the kennels at night. Either have them as house dogs or kennel dogs and keep them as such.

Keep your Stud Dog in the kennels, and not in the house. Cushions and petting make a ninny of him.

Advertise your Stud Dog, don't hawk him.

Keep down your rats. Let your Scotties assist; work helps to keep them fit. Do not attempt poison, as in nine cases out of ten, one or more of the dogs pick some up, with unfortunate results. Trap, or use ferrets. Rats bring all kinds of trouble to a kennel, not the least of these being mange.

Remember that if your dogs hunt rabbits, they are apt to dig themselves in.

If your puppies at a day or so old cry like kittens, get limp to the touch and appear to look long and thin, the reason is generally acidity in the dam's milk. This can be tested with litmus paper, but ten to one you'll lose the pups.

To avoid or correct acidity in bitch's milk, a teaspoonful of bi-carbonate of soda should be added to every pint of drinking water, a week prior to whelping, and continued until the pups are lapping.

If you have to get a foster mother, be sure and smear the Scottie's pups with the foster's milk, and give them to her one by one. Don't put the whole litter on to her at once without any preparation, and expect her to take to them.

Remember that all bitches will not foster, and that Scottish Terriers very seldom will.

When dosing for internal derangement, remember it is Castor Oil for diarrhoea, and medicinal paraffin for constipation.

Never rear a real sickly pup. Put it painlessly out. It pays. If you keep it, it's endless trouble. If you sell it the buyer never recommends you.

Remember that a bad doer is no use to anyone.

When a dog, no matter how you love it, is incurably ill, be merciful and put it painlessly to sleep. Treat it as you would be treated. Don't ask it to bear that which you would not dare face.

Copy your pedigrees correctly, and write them so that they can be read, without reference to the Stud Book or the aid of a magnifying glass.

Don't feed your house dog with bits at the dinner table. It does him no good, and makes him a nuisance.

Don't stop your dogs digging in their grass runs. It is all exercise, and it does their feet good.

A retiring, nervous dog is usually cureable. There is only place for the snappy, shy dog, and that is the grave. Put him there painlessly.

When advertising your kennels, don't say "inspection invited." It often only encourages the curious who don't want to buy. If your stock is worth while, purchasers will come without having to be enticed.

Don't crowd up to the judge, or get in front of your own dog. You will get your tum, no need to get agitated.

Don't enter the list of grouzers. If your dog is licked, take it like a sportsman, and try again.

Don't chatter in the ring, or chirrup to your dog. It distracts the judge, and annoys other exhibitors.

If showing your dog with liver, don't throw pieces all over the ring. Other dogs get their meals and the owners object to your cast-off food.

If for the nonce, you are a ringsider, don't commit the impertinence of audibly criticising the judge. It's quite on the cards that he has forgotten more than you will ever know.

Never be over satisfied with any of your own dogs. Discontent is the Mother of Ambition.

Don't take up the breed simply with the view of exploiting it and making money. If you can't take up Scotties for the love of them, leave them alone!

#### CHAPTER XIV AND LAST!

I am hoping that the foregoing chapters may be an assistance to you, budding Scottish Terrier Fancier, along the hilly road to success. Although the Fancy seems grossly overcrowded, as in other things, there is plenty of room at the top. Some flash into the limelight at the beginning, breeding a champion in their first litter, but usually it is absolutely sheer and phenomenal luck and seldom lasts, and is no proof of their knowledge of the breed.

In many cases of failure, trimming is often the great stumbling block. It is not the slightest use expecting to trim correctly straight away, and more than useless expecting a dog badly and carelessly put down, to get well in the money.

You must remember that you are not competing against other novices only, but against experienced and often professional owners. It may seem as if this is asking a lot of you, and to your (often) disgruntled eyes appearing unfair. You must remember, however, that these experienced people were once novices like yourself, and that hard work and sticking power have made them what they are. In dogs you cannot hustle things, you must know how to play the waiting game. Scottish Terrier people are a crowd of friendly souls. No beginner need be afraid they will not make friends quickly. Not only make them, but get a helping hand over the many difficulties for the asking.

"Novice's luck" is well known, and the start may be merry and bright. Sooner or later the bad streak comes, but the combination of getting your back into it, and the love you will by then have for your dogs, will help you through.

Hard work and sticking power are the whole root of dog breeding, which added to the ability of being able to play the game and do the straight thing, will ultimately lead to success.

The day will come, however, when you realise, that much as you care for your dogs, there is one—the one—that no money can buy—no persuasion make you part with—that nothing can separate you from—till the hour of its passing—
