Damn! It’s a Boy!

When now-Champion Anstamm All American went Best of Breed from the classes at Montgomery County, I remember saying, “Poor Harmon! The first words he heard as he came into the world were ‘Damn! It’s a boy!’” Harmon was born into the first litter whelped and raised by me without the supervision of my partner, Buffy Stamm. I was still too nervous to do it alone so I drafted Roy Lay to help me through the ordeal. I had stayed home from a big snow, I had the flu, and I had been up two nights in a row waiting for this litter. So you can imagine my dismay when the first rear end revealed that sight dreaded by all breeders—the little nub on his tummy that changed him from a welcome arrival to a mere male.

From the time I first wandered through the looking glass into the wonderland of dog showing, I was bombarded by this conventional wisdom: Buy the best bitch you can afford, no matter the cost or the wait. I already had 1 Scottie who was my dearest companion, but he was neither female nor show quality. I did my homework. I read books, joined clubs, went to shows, pored over pedigrees. I picked a breeder and besieged her with phone calls, checks and letters until she relented and parted with that jewel in the breeder’s crown—a show quality bitch.

I’ve learned a few things since then that have caused me to question the conventional wisdom and consider this heretical idea: maybe the novice exhibitor would be better off buying a show quality dog. Consider the following:

- 1) You can usually find a number of first class show quality dogs for sale without waiting, often as long as a year or more. Breeders hoard their bitches, but all of the ones I know have males available.
- 2) For the same or less money that you pay for a barely finishable bitch, you can get a male who could well be the pick puppy in the kennel.
- 3) Breeders are often reluctant to sell bitches to novices who may drop out before the bitch is bred.
- 4) Bitches are harder to finish than dogs. Breeders keep their best bitches and show them. The novice often has a hard time competing with these more experienced handlers and groomers. The bitch entry is usually larger than the dog entry, and the inexperienced can get lost in the crowd. Furthermore, bitches can be temperamental. I say this knowing that the all-time top show dog is a bitch, but even she stays home when she’s in season. Besides, one of the things that has made her record so amazing is that she is a *bitch* who shows consistently well.
- 5) Breeders often want puppies back when they sell a bitch. The novice exhibitor who decides to drop out may find that he or she is tied to a contract requiring the production of a litter or two.

So, here’s my idea for the novice who thinks that he or she wants to show Scotties: Buy a male. You’ll spend less money and probably get a better dog. If you can learn to trim, to train your dog, and to exhibit it properly, you will probably finish him. By then, you’ll have a good idea if you can stand the expense, the outlay of time, the noise, the smells, the driving, and the general madness of this peculiar sport. If you still want to enlist in our slightly off-beat ranks, you’ll have the credentials to present to breeders when you want to buy a bitch. The breeder’s frozen smile will thaw considerably when you can show that you have already finished a dog—perhaps you are worthy of having a bitch bestowed upon you.

Oh, yes, one more thing. You may find that you hate dog showing. If you like to sleep on Sunday and read the paper over a leisurely brunch; if you like a house full of carpeting and expensive furniture; if you want to wear high heels and buy a dress without pockets; if you can’t stand the dainty scent of puppy poop in your bedroom or kitchen, this life is not for you. If you’ve bought a male, you’ll come out ahead. You’ll have the dearest and most loving of all companions—the much maligned Scottie male.

STRIPPING

Many Scottie breeders and exhibitors do not understand the reason for stripping, what affect it has on the coat, or why it has that affect.

In this article we will use the term *stripping*. Some people prefer the term *plucking* which is a more accurate term. We have used the term stripping for over 20 years and old habits are hard to break.

Scotties, like many of the other Terriers are double-coated. They have hard guard hair and soft undercoat hair. Stripping is the process of pulling the guard hair from the skin. by pulling this hair from the skin, completely new hair shafts begin to grow, taking the place of the hair just pulled. (We often wish to remove undercoat as well, but that coat can be combed out with a comb or stripping tool.) The outer quarter inch of each stripped hair will be hard but that hardness will diminish along the hair shaft. For that reason, hair that is cut or broken will be softer. If a Scottie's coat is not stripped it will continue to grow. In the wild, that long coat would snag on rocks and be pulled out just as we do when we strip. Hairs that have been stripped can be identified because they will be pointed and will be hard at the outer quarter inch. Hair that has been cut will have blunt tips. In addition, wheaten and brindle hairs will have different colors at the tip than on the soft shaft. With a little practice you will be able to distinguish between coat that has been stripped and coat that has been cut.

Choosing a stripping tool is extremely important. Many of the stripping knives on the market have sharp V shaped notches which if not used very carefully will cut the coat. For that reason, many breeders use their fingers to pluck the coat. The pumice stone we described in the last issue is ideal for that. When looking for a stripping knife, look for one that has squared off notches instead of the usual V notches. The purpose of any stripping tool is to grasp or snag hair shafts so that they can be pulled from the skin. The V notched tools are often quite sharp and my facilitate cutting the coat whereas the square notched tools are not quite so sharp. Square notched tools can damage the coat, however if they are used incorrectly, but that damage is less likely. Grooming tools come in both left and right handed models.

The proper use of the stripping knife is extremely important. The idea is to catch the selected hair shafts to be stripped in the notches of the knife. The thumb of the right hand (left hand for left handed persons) is used to hold the hairs in the notches. The knife is brought straight back WITHOUT TWISTING, pulling the hairs from the roots. If you twist the knife you will put too much pressure on the hair shafts where they contact the knife and they will break. You can tell if you are stripping or cutting the coat if you look at hairs immediately after stripping. Carefully remove the long hairs on the skin side of the knife. If you have several hairs that do not extend past the knife notches, these hairs are cut.

"What are some of your personal ideas concerning the conditioning, management, and ownership of an active Stud Force?"

Many factors go into choosing a stud dog. We prefer a line bred dog; one that is good in conformation, temperament, and health. If he is a prepotent stud, he will produce his qualities with most bitches. A prepotent stud should be able to put his mark on his puppies and in most cases, it will be evident who the sire is. We prefer a very masculine male with plenty of bone and substance but not lacking in elegance because of it.

An outcrossed stud dog can be a valuable part of a breeding program if bred to line bred bitches AND if he is capable of producing the qualities he possesses, being the reason you kept him as part of your breeding program.

Picking any stud dog to breed to means watching what he is producing, and with what type of bitches, and if he is producing the consistent quality and temperament for showing. We believe that attitude and showmanship is every bit as hereditary as quality or faults in conformation. However, remember that the big winner is not always the most prepotent stud dog. He can be both if you're lucky. He must also fit into your breeding program, meaning in type, pedigree, etc.

We do not like to breed two very unlike types. When we outcross, which everyone must do at some time in their breeding program, we look for type and naturally the stud dog must excel in the things we need to improve upon. At the same time, trying to preserve our good points.

Something we all seem to forget at times—the stud dog cannot do it all. It takes both dogs to produce the quality we are looking for.

We have bred some very outstanding stud dogs in our 20 years of breeding. The first being the "Bingo" son—Am & Can Ch Sandgreg's Keno Ticket, sire of 11 Champions, Keno was owned by us much too early in our breeding days. I'm sure that he would have been capable of producing many more Champions. Ch. Sandgreg's Headliner, sire of 18 Champions, one of which is the top winning show dog of all time—Ch. Braeburn's Close Encounter. Ch. Sandgreg's Square Deal, a Headliner son, sire of 22 Champions; one of which is the Best In Show wheaten bitch, Ch. Sandgreg's Sweet Luv. To his credit are many other specialty and group winners.

Last, but certainly not least, Ch. Sandgreg's Editorial. Sire of 46 Champions, many of them specialty and group winners. Editorial was the prepotent stud I refer to in this article. He was among the very few in this life that is considered a breeder's dream. We will always be thankful for the 10½ years with this wonderful scottie and all the great descendants he has left to us and to the Breed.

His Name Was Simon
Miriam Stamm

Much has been written in praise of the foundation bitch and of the fact that "The strength of a kennel is in its bitches." The truth of this is well documented. The contribution of the foundation stud, however, is seldom recognized.

Anstamm is one of the very few major breeding kennels in the unusual position of owing its breeding and showing successes to a foundation stud rather than a foundation bitch. Although we had been breeding and showing Scottish Terriers for more than ten years, it was not until Eng. Ch. Bardene Boy Blue arrived at Anstamm in 1961 that we were able to develop a consistent type, a distinct look, and a dominant bloodline.

His name was Simon, and I saw his stunning picture in the 1961 STCE Yearbook in an ad for the Walter Palethorpes' Bardene Kennels, which then was not the household word it is today. In fact, few breeders this side of the Atlantic had heard of it. The caption under the picture indicated that Simon, then almost four years old, was being retired at stud after a show career that included the coveted "Junior Warrant," seven CC's, and numerous reserve CC's. It also went on to say that his owners had received many offers to buy "this lovely dog" from breeders all over the world, but that he was not for sale.

The picture somehow managed to project Simon's personality all the way across the Atlantic and into my living room. Never had I seen such a dog. Not only had he caught my attention; he had also captured my heart. I was hopelessly hooked. We had been looking for a stud outside our lines who could bring in new blood to complement and improve our stock. Here was just the dog, but he was not available. It was too depressing. I mooned over his picture the way a lovesick teenager would over her favorite rock star. I even took the Yearbook to work with me and placed it, open to his picture, just inside my desk drawer, where I could look at it several times during the day. Finally, at the suggestion of my husband, and knowing I had nothing to lose, I composed a carefully worded letter to the Palethorpes. After complimenting them on their magnificent dog, I concluded by asking that if ever, in a moment of madness, they felt they could part with Simon, would they consider giving us first chance to buy him.

Several months and many letters later, Simon *did* come to live with us at Anstamm. He was everything we had hoped for, and more. He had intelligence and great character, style, and a wonderful blend of substance and elegance. His long, aristocratic head, graceful carriage, powerful drive, and free-flowing gait gave him a distinctive appearance in the ring.

Not only was Simon a great showman and multiple Group and BIS winner, he was also an even greater producer, siring 40 champions and breaking the record held up to then by Ch. Edgerstoune Troubadour. In the opinion of many, he brought his blend of substance and refinement to the breed at a time when it was needed. He did much for our kennel and, in fact, became the foundation upon which rests the present-day Anstamm bloodlines. He was extremely prepotent and nicked well with our bitches, the combination producing a definite new type. The resulting litters were outcrosses, of course, but there could never be any doubt about who sired them. Most of them had a certain look and distinctive qualities that combined to put the stamp of his kinship upon them. Best of all, Simon was able to pass these prepotent genes on to succeeding generations, thus preserving his "look" and other qualities. In proof of this, three generations of STCA Lloyd Trophy winners trace back to him directly: his son, Ch. Anstamm Dark Venture (1964); Dark Venture's son, Ch. Anstamm Happy Venture (1972 and 1973); and Happy Venture's daughter, Ch. Anstamm Happy Sonata (1978). Over half of the specialty Best of Breed winners in 1985 were Simon's descendants.

I would like to repeat the tribute to Simon that appeared in the April 1969 issue of Terrier Type, for it describes so well the dog he was.



English, Canadian, and American Champion Bardene Boy Blue

With sadness we report the passing of a "breed great." The following tribute to Eng. Can. and Am. Ch. Bardene Boy Blue was sent to us by Barbara Dunham:

"His name is Simon...and he is something special. Elegant is the single word to describe him. Once in a lifetime should you be so blessed; meeting the personification of the Standard of your particular breed, be it Scotties or otherwise, and this is Simon. Once seen, never forgotten. Sitting high in the stands at Golden Gate or the Garden, you recognize immediately that familiar silhouette, so undeniably his. He is all business, ready to show; asking for his wins, all the way. Never one to start a skirmish, nevertheless this little black Scotsman never backs off. He's in 'til the finish, be it battle or Best in Show.

His record is well known...his Best in Show and Group wins...1 is 40 champion offspring, making him the all-time top producing Scottish Terrier sire... and so many Champion grandchildren and great grandchildren, that even he cannot keep count. Through these children, he has helped many small breeders produce fine champion stock that otherwise might not be theirs.

His name was Simon...and now he has gone, taking with him the hearts of his owners, and his handler, and, in fact, many Scottie fanciers, who were privileged to know him. Occasionally, when watching his sons and grandsons, at the kennels, or in the ring, you'll see one cock his head, or pull himself up, when playing with another Scottie, or see a tail wagging furiously, when he discovers, to his delight... "It's a girl!", and for a fleeting moment, you see something so familiar...and then it's gone. For there will never be another Simon...he was unique, and a truly great Scottie."

BLESS YOU BOYS*By Cynthia Wallgren*

The day Nancy Van Meter's request came for me to write an article on "THE STUD DOG", I had just finished whelping a litter of 5 males. As each puppy came out of the sac, and the outdoor plumbing was in evidence, I found myself saying, another male @#%\$!—oh well, the next one will be a female. That went on for the next few hours, until there were no more "next ones." BUT, then I stopped and thought — maybe just maybe one of these will be "the" great one. Deep down in my heart, I do favor the boys. Why, do you say? I think males are much more stable in their entire outlook on life and a lot of that is attributed to their hormones—males either show, or don't show—very few of them are up and down showers. Now, the bitches (and you know that there must be a reason why they are called that) can show up a storm one day and the next day they can really let down—either they are just coming into season, or going out, or it is raining or snowing, or they have a headache or 6 months post natal blues, etc etc. I have always felt that the males are much more dependable and lovable.

Being the owner of a stud dog(s) is a tremendous responsibility. You hold in your hands the future of our breed. Great care should be taken to breed top quality bitches (they do not necessarily have to be champions—the dam of one of our greatest sires never saw a show ring.) The entire concept of breeding is for the betterment of the breed—IMPROVE, IMPROVE, IMPROVE.

One of the aspects the stud owner should take into consideration is what are the restrictions you place on the bitches you breed. Do you use the phrase "to approved bitches only"? If so, what do you mean by that? On one hand do you mean that your stud would only be bred to top quality bitches? Or would you breed your stud to all bitches who request him? Two arguments prevail here. On the one hand, a good stud should be used on all bitches, because the off-spring of even a poor bitch would be better than if she were bred to a good dog rather than a poor run-of-the mill dog. BUT, also you must consider that the reproduction of poor quality should be discouraged. There are some underlying facts here that should be considered, and let's call a spade a spade. Stud fees are a source of income for campaigning, advertising, showing, feeding, etc. On the other hand, restricting services to high quality bitches only will improve the overall quality of the puppies and hence the reputation of the stud and his owner's kennel. These are two extreme points of view. But, you must also remember the human element. Most of us are keen enough to size up the humans we are dealing with. If the bitch is half-way decent, confirmation & pedigree-wise, I think you can sit down and talk with the owners, pointing out her faults and good points. Also try to find out why they want to breed her—if it is just so the children can see puppies born, OR just to make money—or do they truly want to learn and hope by breeding "her" to your stud will improve the puppies. You should tell them about the pre-natal care, supplemental feeding of the bitch, Caesarean Sections, vitamins, veterinary costs, and so on and so on. If they want to breed for profit only, this is the time to say "NO".

There is another argument that we must take into consideration. The future of the breed is also very dependent on bringing into the fold of the "fancy", dedicated, sincere people who truly love their dogs and the Scottish Terrier breed (in that order). We cannot expect that everyone has had the good fortune of having obtained a top quality bitch as their first scottie. If you find someone who is sincerely interested in dogs and our breed, perhaps you would loose them because you refused to breed their mediocre bitch. But, if you take the time, and show them the difference between the good and the not so good (very tactfully) and help them to pick out a good puppy, you will be doing a service to them and to our breed.

Take time to go and see as many of the offspring of your stud dog as is possible and evaluate just what he and that bitch produced (remember it takes two to tango.) Too many stud owners just see the dollar signs and nothing else. I can't count the times that I have very carefully so as not to hurt the owner's feelings, said "you have a very nice scottie, take her home, love her and have her spayed." BUT, do take the time to tell them why.

Of course, the stud owner should attempt to assure that bitch and puppies will be well cared for and that the puppies will NEVER end up in a pet shop. You can try to put a clause in your stud contract (and every stud owner should use a contract) but whether or not it would stand up in court is another matter—but that clause will make the owner think twice. I did only once take a litter of puppies and sell them for the owner as her husband passed away when the puppies were 7 weeks old. So you see there are sometimes extenuating circumstances.

I think that this all boils down to using your own good judgment—i.e. common sense. You must assess the people as well as the dog. Maybe we should say—"TO APPROVED OWNERS ONLY"!!!

As the years pass, your stud dog is now too old to be used at stud — he can no longer make money—but think of how faithfully he has served you, how many lives he has been a part in producing. He has earned his retirement—give him the love and attention he so justly deserves—maybe some short walks, or just sitting on your lap and hugging him—or a little extra tid bit at food time. (This also might be a good time to have him neutered—as this will help him out both physically and mentally.) Do not put him to sleep or give him to someone else—in this life don't just take from, but give, give, give as he has given to you.

How do you put a coat on a show stopper like Ch. Sandgreg's Sweet Luv or trim a national specialty winner like Ch. Balgair's Redoubt Take a Bow? You'll have to ask the two dozen participants at the Scottish Terrier Club of Greater Houston's two-day grooming seminar with professional handler Mark George. If you're lucky, one of these two dozen Scottie fanciers will share some of the secrets he salted away that weekend.

Not that this young man with the familiar beard from Clayton, Calif., dropped names or specifics on his winners. However, participants had only to add up principals passed on in 10 hours of hands-on grooming sessions to know what it takes.

George didn't seem worried about sharing his techniques. He knows watching and doing are two different stories. Putting those skills with the stripping knife and thinning shears into action is a job he's sure might take his students a decade to perfect.

Held Jan. 4 and 5 at Houston's Mueller Park, the seminar drew Scottie people from the Houston area, Austin, Dallas, Irving, College Station, West Texas, and even New Orleans. These are show folks who take their grooming seriously. Perhaps you'll recognize them by the superior coats circling the rings in Texas and Louisiana this spring and summer.

"You have to be able to make mistakes," repeated George again and again. "If you don't try, you're not going to learn. Coat will grow back!"

"Some people don't like the way I trim," reminded George. He emphasized that he doesn't have all the answers: "Develop your own style, what you like. Do what works for you."

How are George's Scots groomed differently from many in the ring? Gasps from student groomers greeted two of his variations. He clippers black and brindle heads. He shows with much less undercoat.

Ch. Wee Elmer Andrew Wood was one of the Scotties who willingly took to the table for George. George sets aside the theorem that heads must be stripped. Substituting a #15 blade for his usual #40, he showed the technique on Ramona Wood's new champion.

The fine art of trimming leg furnishings is another story. Karen Duckett's bitch, Castlegate's Highland Sprite, was the model for that demonstration. George pulled some furnishings, cut some with the knife, tipped off many around the foot with straight shears and snipped other sure cuts with the thinning shears.

After group demonstrations, George moved from table to table suggesting grooming strategies on individual dogs. Hearts stopped as George took thinning scissors to beards, transforming heads into the long lean look that's his trademark. "Now you do it," he'd point to the other side of the beard and pass shears to the nervous owner.

Whiskybae Yankee Bonnie Jean, St. Lea's Heavy Cruiser, Rigadoon's Just in Time, Passmore's Blessing Too and Tri-Scot's Daddy's Looks are a few of the catalogue names to watch in the ring for results of the grooming seminar. However, Rocky, Roan, Peppy, Jazz, Bess, Cubby Sue, Looker and Teddy Girl were the names we all came to prefer over those long-handled catalogue monikers.

Even champions were out for further refinements. Shirley Hitt and Marguerite Guice were hard at work on Marguerite's special, Ch. Guice's Spicy Truffle. Am./Can. Ch. Passmore's Fascination took honors as the farthest traveling Scot. She covered 1000 miles down and back in a Muse Air hold.

The legacy of grooming tips that George was kind enough to pass on is one that for him started in the kennels of Bob Charves as a teenager. It's a legacy that participants of the Greater Houston Scottish Terrier Club will in turn pass on to others searching for the elusive hows of grooming our beloved breed.

Some of George's secrets include Pro-Gro, Pidge's Oil, salad oil, lecithin and the numbers 44-20, 40, 30, 15 and 10. Curious? Just ask the next Texan you meet in the ring with his Scot.

OBEDIENCE

By Ruth Tryon

Train your Scottie for Utility! Yes, whether or not you have only basic Obedience training in mind, whether or not your Mac is five years old and has never had any Obedience training, whether or not you are also a first timer in the Obedience world, train your dog for Utility! At first glance this may seem a wholly ridiculous, unnecessary and impossible plan but upon closer examination it will prove to be the best program for any phase of Obedience work you plan to participate in. In essence it means, not only train for Utility but think Utility and herein is the key that will open the door for you and Mac for a very special relationship with each other.

We all know what busy dogs Scotties are. They have the whole world not only to watch but manage if at all possible—and a lot of that possibility lies with the control the handler has over his Mac. The neighbor's cat, the squirrels, wandering dogs even if not on his property all require his immediate attention and loud warnings. People, too, come in for their share of his directives—the mailman, delivery men, certainly the sanitation men taking his garbage, people who work about your house all need Mac's advice. If the truth is known he probably knows them and would like to play with them but first he does have his obligation to tell you about them. Mac is a wonderful dog but he does need your firm hand in control.

People usually love to pet Scotties with their tails wagging, perky ears and alert eyes but they don't always like paws jumping on them so if Mac is trained to keep all four feet quiet for the Stand for Examination in Novice you can, by a quiet command to Stay, have him know the joys of being petted by an admirer and not become a pest. And when he makes his trips to his Veterinarian what a pleasure and assistance to have him stand still for the examination and any necessary shots without all the squirming about and wiggling that so many dogs do. Mac's Vet will appreciate it too and the entire visit will go well.

Mac loves to go for walks and there is something very special about taking a walk with your Scottie companion. You do have a choice—you can be pulled in all directions as Mac tries to chase the varying animal life he comes upon or you can train him to heel WELL so that the temptations, though great, will not take Mac from your side. He will still find them of great interest but if you have worked and trained him well he will know his place is by your side. If you have accepted this as satisfactory because you only want basic Obedience Mac will realize you really don't care if he minds well or pays strict attention to you so he thinks, why not go a bit wider to chase the cat, lag to watch the dog across the street and forge and lunge after the squirrel as it goes up the tree. You really never cared that he be right at heel position—so why not misbehave when something of more interest than heeling appears in your area. The result could be Mac slipping away from you into danger, pulling you down—a Scottie's quick reaction has upset many an owner—a pulled arm or wrist - there are innumerable problems that can arise from your lack of control, not to mention dog fights. But if you have thought Utility which requires precision and control and worked towards that goal you and Mac can have much pleasanter walks.

When you and Mac are out for your walk what a pleasure it is to everyone concerned, whether it be a friend you have met and want to chat with, or to purchase the paper at the neighborhood newsstand or just standing with others on the corner waiting for traffic to pass before crossing the street to know that Mac is sitting sharply at your side, not sitting at an angle to give him an opportunity to look for what could be fascinating trouble or ignore you when you start to cross the street. When Mac is sitting straight he is watching you out of the corner of his eye and thinking about what you are about to do. You have his attention and what you do and what are the prime things. He still enjoys the walk and all the things to see but just being with you is, to him, the most important part of the walk and that you two are a team.

And thinking Utility also brings to mind that there is no reason why early on Mac

cannot learn the hand signals for heeling, staying, coming, sitting, going to the down position and going to the heel position. There are occasions when a hand signal is more desirable for control than a voice one. If you want just a well mannered dog and you have no intentions of ever showing him in Obedience competition, then keep on thinking Utility for there is nothing pleasanter than a Scottie companion who obeys his master on a quiet signal.

There is no end to the benefits of thinking Utility from the first day you and Mac start to train whether it be at a dog school or at home with a good Obedience training book. Somehow you and Mac will grow closer as a team as his work and your training improve. There is a very special rapport that develops between man and his dog in Obedience that is beyond that normally felt. Give Mac a chance to become even closer to you—think Utility and become a very special pair.

WHEATEN SCOTTISH TERRIERS

By Kennan Glaser

In 1970 when we started showing our first Wheaten Scottish Terrier, Wheatens were considered rare. Many judges, having never seen one before were reluctant to put one up. Today, the color has become accepted and one can frequently see one or more of this beautiful colored Scottie in the show ring at any given dog show.

But there is still much confusion among breeders about the color and there are many misconceptions about Wheaten Scotties as well.

The Wheaten color is a simple recessive genetic trait. Gregor Mendel (1822-1884) first described such traits while breeding ordinary plants and his theories are still valid and are easily understood. If you breed two Wheatens together all puppies will be Wheatens; if you breed a wheaten to a black wheaten gene carrier each puppy will have a 50:50 chance of being wheaten; if you breed two black or brindles together and each is a wheaten gene carrier, each puppy will have a 25% chance of being wheaten.

Each parent carries 2 genes for coat color (and for all other traits as well), and each parent contributes only one each of these genes to each puppy. If one of those contributed genes is dominant (black or brindle) and the other is recessive (wheaten) then the puppy's coat color will exhibit the dominant trait and will be black or brindle. The puppy will carry the wheaten trait albeit hidden and will be able to pass it on to his or her get. Although some genes governing other traits have a mixing effect, the genes for coat color (at least those for the wheaten color) do not. If the parents each contribute the recessive trait to a puppy, the puppy will exhibit that trait. Also, that puppy will only be able to pass that recessive trait onto his or her offspring. In other words, breeding two wheaten Scotties together can only produce wheatens.

WHEATEN PROBABILITIES

BLACK (wh. carrier) x BLACK (wh. carrier) 25% chance
BLACK (wh. carrier) x Wheaten 50% chance
Wheaten x Wheaten 100% chance
BLACK (not a carrier) x Wheaten no chance

Table 1. Lists the chances of any single puppy inheriting the wheaten trait from various combinations of parents.

You may be wondering how to test whether a brindle or black dog or bitch is a wheaten gene carrier. The only way to find out for sure is to mate that dog with a wheaten. If any puppies are wheaten then the brindle or black is a gene carrier. If 12 puppies are produced from matings between the black or brindle and a wheaten bitch and no wheaten puppies are produced then you can be quite certain that the wheaten gene is not present!

Wheatens can come in several shades from a dark mahogany red, deep brown, light buff or nearly white. We have seen an all white Scotie a few years back that was the same color as most Westies. The dog was not an albino, because it had dark pigmentation. The red and brown shades are produced by a different gene than the gene for the basic coat color. This shading gene probably is present in black and brindle Scotties but the red or brown color is masked by the base color. In brindle dogs, one often can see red cast in bright sunlight. It is quite common for one gene to mask the expression of another gene: this condition is not limited to coat color.

We prefer the red mahogany color, but the dark brown shade is equally acceptable and should not be penalized. In a recent breedings between two wheatens we have come to the conclusion that the red tones are dominant to the brown but we feel that this is an incomplete dominance. More work needs to be done in this area. Of course the white color should be discouraged and should never be propagated. We urged the owner of the white scottie to never allow his dog to be used at stud and we suggested neutering him.

Since the color exists in only the last quarter inch of stripped hair, if a wheaten coat is clipped, even the darkest red coat will be buff colored. Undercoats too, will be the same color as the outer coat but the undercoat will be a few shades lighter.

There are many misconceptions commonly held about wheatens which we would like to discuss:

1. **WHEATENS HAVE MORE HEALTH PROBLEMS** This is not true. We have bred many litters over the past 15 years which contained both wheaten puppies blacks and brindles and have found that the wheatens are every bit as healthy and active as are the other colored dogs. One litter contained 7 wheaten puppies and all grew and matured to be healthy animals. We currently have an old wheaten bitch that is almost 14 years old and is still very active and playful. Unfortunately some breeders breed only for the wheaten color disregarding other faults. This serious mistake not only propagates the color but it carries on the serious faults as well. The gene for color is only one of several thousand genes carried by each Scottie. The color gene has no effect on the other genes.

2. **IF YOU BREED TWO WHEATENS TOGETHER YOU WILL GET ALL WHITE OR FADED COLORED PUPS** Scientifically this statement is inaccurate as it is in actual practice. We have bred two wheatens together on several occasions and the puppies all had good color and pigmentation. The white Scottie we discussed above was probably a mutation, i.e. a gene that changed slightly in that particular dog. If one would breed this dog the white color would be passed on to the puppies, either as an expressed trait (one that is exhibited in the animals) or a carried trait (one that cannot be seen but can be passed on to future generations).

3. **WHEATENS HAVE SOFT COATS** Over our last 20 years in Scotties we have heard tales of one color or the other that has soft coats. The fact is that the gene that governs coat texture is different from the gene that governs coat color. Wheatens can have either soft or hard coats as can blacks or brindles. Again, if one breeds only for color, a bad fault such as soft coat texture can be passed on along with the desired color.

4. **WHEATENS ARE PRONE TO WINTER NOSE** Winter nose is a problem in some dogs and is usually caused by a vitamin deficiency. In the summer months all animals exposed to the sun receive a dose of vitamins A and D from that exposure. In the winter months that exposure is much less. Blacks are much less susceptible to winter nose because their noses receive a double dose of pigment - from the coat color gene and from the gene that governs nose and feet pigmentation. Winter nose can be overcome by adding supplements such as kelp to the diet.

5. **WHEATENS HAVE LIGHT EYES AND LIGHT PIGMENTATION** The gene that governs eye color is different from the gene that governs coat color. Blacks and brindles can have light eyes as can wheatens. All Scotties should conform to the Scottish Terrier Standard and have dark eyes.

6. **WHEATENS HAVE LARGE, ROUND EYES** Wheatens can and should have small, dark, almond shaped eyes set deeply into the skull. Unfortunately, when a wheaten has a large round eye it is much more prominent than if a black dog has the same characteristic. Black Scotties tend to "get away" with this serious fault because the eye color blends with the coat color and attention is not called to the eye. Remember, the gene for eye shape and color is different from the color gene.

7. **WHEATEN STUDS PRODUCE WEAKER PUPPIES** This too is a misconception that has been stated by some breeders, perhaps out of jealousy, which has no validity. We have had many healthy, vigorous litters of puppies sired by wheaten studs as have other prominent wheaten Scottie breeders. Of course, if one breeds only for color, then other traits are inherited as well. Remember, the wheaten gene is only one of perhaps one hundred thousand or more genes passed on by the parents to the offspring.

Wheaten Scotties are Scottish Terriers first and foremost and should be treated as such.
