**President John DeSaye called the meeting to order at 9:07 a.m.**

The chair entertained a motion to accept the minutes as distributed. Motion carried.

#### REPORT OF OFFICERS

**Corresponding Secretary's Report:** A list of correspondence sent and received since the last meeting was distributed, the following action was taken:

**Regional Club Change in Officers** - listed in the Regional Club News section of this issue.

**Nominating Committee Report:** Recommendations from the nominating committee to include in the STCA guidelines:

1. Encourage recommendations from Regional Clubs.
2. Bio forms be sent directly to Regional Clubs for recommendations.
3. Bio forms be sent to incumbents to list their past contributions as officer/director.
4. Bio forms should be used only as a guide, all recommendations should be considered.

**Motion Brown/McArthur** to delete the acceptance contract from the present form and print it separately. The single Bio Form to be sent to the membership and regional clubs. The combination form and contract to be sent to the nominees for office upon completion of the nominating committee's meeting. Motion carried.

**Motion Cohen/Kirk** To leave the guidelines for the nominating committee as they are with the exception of the previous motion. Motion carried.

**STCG DALLAS** requested permission to use the STCA logo for individual table favors at the Rotating Specialty. Motion- Cohen/Wooldridge to give approval specifying it may be used only for that purpose. Motion carried.

**Recording Secretary's Report:** Betty McArthur reported the mailing of 970 ballots. Sealed results received from the account firm to be opened at the Annual Meeting. After discussion regarding this procedure, motion- McArthur, Wooldridge to amend the constitution under Article IV, Section 4 d, to read: The auditing firm return the ballots two weeks prior to the annual meeting. The Recording Secretary advise the President and Corresponding Secretary of the results. The Corresponding Secretary notify the candidates of the results prior to the annual meeting. Motion failed.

**Treasurer's Report:** Neatha Robinson reported the year end statement - period ending 9/20/86.

Income: \$37,882.13 (does not reflect income from interest accounts for month of September.)

Expenses \$39,056.26 Net Loss (\$1,174.13)

The full report including the proposed budget is listed elsewhere in this issue.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS

**Handbook:** Michael Cook distributed the new 1986 S.T.C.A. Handbook. The membership to receive copies by mail. Individual members shall receive one copy, dual memberships- one copy per household. Orders will be taken by the Corresponding Secretary for additional copies for \$12.00 each, this will include postage and handling. Due to personal commitments and the deadline for proof reading, Marjorie and John Cohen were not available to assist with the proof reading, however the committee of Michael Cook, Sandi Hach, Cindy Cooke, Miriam Stamm and John DeSaye completed the task.

**National Show Chairman:** Kathi Brown reported all the necessary equipment was on hand for our first independent sweepstakes. She needed volunteers from the board at 9 a.m. for tent raising, catalog sales, sanitary engineers etc. A full assessment of costs, income and procedures to be discussed at the after dinner meeting.

**Awards:** Helen Prince distributed the final standing for the awards to be presented at the Annual Dinner. She discussed the problems in tallying points were related to owners not being consistent in completing entry applications, i.e. sometimes using initials instead of full names, not listing co-owners etc. this created a major problem in tallying points insofar as verifying membership status. Notice shall be printed with the half year standings for those who feel they are in contention to contact the Awards Chairman or Tally Chairman of any wins or championships and the evidence to substantiate them.

**Historian Report:** Ann Wooldridge has inventoried the stock sent to her and reported it consisted of: miscellaneous Baggpipers; Rosters, Specialty Catalogs, Stud Cards, correspondence etc. She would appreciate the memberships assistance by donating their old STCA records, photo's of Nat'l Specialty winners, etc. to her so she may complete the historian file.

**Judges Education:** Neatha Robinson had contacted her committee members and recommended they start a 'speakers pool' divided into areas nationally. When a judges seminar is advertised, the committee could advise them of a speaker for our breed within the area. She suggests a program consisting of: a. 30 minutes of video presentation; b. 30 minutes of discussion; c. 30 minutes of hands on experience. Dr. Kirk advised the AKC would have records of planned judges seminars for the year. He recommended Neatha contact them and give our format. They could then recommend our program to those clubs holding seminars.

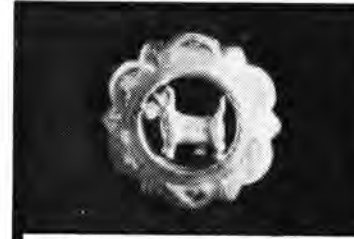
**A.K.C. Delegates Report:** Dr. Kirk distributed a full report of the AKC Delegates Meetings from October 1985- October 1986. The following changes/additions were discussed.

Changes in policies for approval of judges:

1. All judges must pass a test on the knowledge of the breed standard. If one fails they must wait a full year before reapplying.

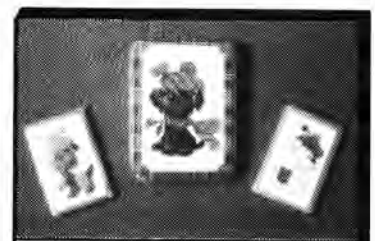

2. First time applicants must:

- a. Have 10 years of documented experience in the sport of dogs.
- b. Have been a breeder of at least 4 litters.
- c. Have had at least 2 champions from among those 4 litters.
- d. Must have stewarded a certain number of shows.
- e. Must have judged a certain number of sanctioned matches.

3. Applicants for additional breeds should expect only one additional breed approved for every one they already judge.

They must have judged the breeds previously approved for at least 5 times or one year whichever is longest.

A judges education committee is working on a standard glossary for clarification of standards. The wording/terminology of breed standards has created great misunderstanding between judges and exhibitors. When completed the glossary will be distributed to the breed clubs.

A new division of the AKC was created, a Division of Performance Events, to control all obedience trials, field trials, and hunting tests. Show events will remain separate from these.

Tribute was paid to Robert Graham on his retirement from the board, and a certificate of appreciation was presented.

It was discussed that Dr. Kirk suggest to the AKC they eliminate the Novice class and include a 12-18 month class at All Breed shows. Motion-Cooke/Prince to do so. Motion carried.

**Mini Workshop:** Kathi Brown reported her committee met in June and presented a list of seven members to be presentors for the workshop. The corresponding secretary shall contact them, advise the duties and request their acceptance for this program.

**Standard Operating Procedure Changes:** Betty McArthur submitted the following recommendations:

1. To draft a set of guidelines for National Advertising Chairman. Ann Wooldridge volunteered to prepare an outline to be reviewed at the next meeting.
2. To add under Trophy Ch. duties: An inventory of stock be made upon receipt of chairmanship and at the end of the chairmanship. A copy of that inventory be sent to the treasurer. This will apply to any chairmanship that retains goods belonging to the STCA.

Above recommendations were approved.

**Constitution and By-Laws Committee:** John and Marjorie Cohen suggest the following amendment to the Constitution: Article 1, Section 2 be resubmitted to the membership for approval. As it now stands, the AKC approved our amendment in 1984, however they object to the words "delinquent March 1" and denied our amendment in 1986 which leaves us with no provision for dues for junior members. Motion- Hickman/Prince to accept the committees recommendation. Motion carried. The ballot will be mailed to the membership the first of June along with the nominating committees report.

**Judges Selection Montgomery County 1988:** The Sweepstakes and Regular Class Judges were chosen for 1988. Notification shall be published upon receipt of acceptance.

#### NEW BUSINESS

**Handbook Editor 1991:** Motion- Wooldridge/Prince, the Recording Secretary prepare a notice for the fall issue of the bagpiper soliciting a handbook editor. Motion carried. Michael Cook will prepare an outline detailing the duties.

**Bagpiper Editor:** Nancy Van Meter joined the Board and discussed some of the problems she has incurred as editor, leading the list is mailing problems and the membership not receiving the issues in a timely fashion. She suggests the option to the membership to have first class mailings. When dues notices are sent there will be a section to check for first class mailings for an additional \$4.00. It was suggested a committee be formed to assist the editor in compiling some of the special notices and reports of committees. Motion- McArthur/Wooldridge that Jackie Seelbach; Sandi Hach and Nancy Van

Meter propose a format of guidelines for Bagpiper Editors to be added to the Standard Operating Manual. Motion carried. Nancy advised that she would be resigning this position after the Stud Issue.

**Anstamm Veterinary Memorial Award:** The STCA will donate \$100. annually to a college or University in memory of deceased STCA members. This award has not been presented for the past three years and the monies have been retained so a substantial amount may be donated. Motion- Wooldridge/Cook to present the award to Alexander de La Hunta, D.V.M., PH. D. for his research on Canine Epilepsy. Motion carried.

**Audit Committee:** Neatha Robinson advised the cost for a professional audit would be near \$2000.00, she suggests a review by her accountant for this last period. Motion- Wooldridge/Prince to have the review as recommended. Motion carried. The STCA Audit will check and approve/disapprove the review. Motion- Wooldridge/Hickman Upon taking over the Treasurer's duties, Sandra Lehrack be made chairperson of the Audit Committee and appoint two STCA members from her area to the committee. ## Regional Clubs' Representatives Committee Meeting

Westchester Inn, Westchester, Pennsylvania

October 3, 1986

The meeting was called to order at 3:20 p.m. by the Chairman, Marjorie Cohen. The Clubs represented and those in attendance were:

Heart of America STC (Margaret J. MacDonald, Loretta L. McEntire, Lowella G. Eagan); STC of New England (Gerry Poudrier, Shirley Howe); STC of Western Virginia (Evelyn Kirk, Katharine Munro, John Anderson, Jane Anderson); STC of Greater Washington, D.C. (Kathie McKessor, Norman Prince); STC of Greater Houston (Jim Justice); STC of Greater Denver (Elizabeth Cooper); STC of Greater New York (Dick Seelbach, Bill Berry); STC of Michigan (Miriam Stamm); Greater Miami STC (Marjorie Cohen).

The Chairman asked each person attending the meeting to inform the President of his or her Club that Mrs. Jackie Seelbach, Corresponding Secretary of the Parent Club, receives many inquiries about breeders of Scottish Terriers throughout the United States. She requests that the Presidents of each Club write to her giving her the name or names of the persons in the Club who are authorized to be given the referrals.

The Chairman also announced that the Corresponding Secretary of the Parent Club delivered a supply of the Green Supplemental Handbooks to the meeting. She requests that those present take them back to their local Clubs and put them to good use, including, among other uses, placing a copy in the local libraries.

### Report of the Health Committee Chairman

At the February, 1986 meeting of the RCRC a question had been raised whether there could be any possible relationship between the use of the live parvo vaccines and the high incidence of Cancer in the Scottish Terrier's later years. This prompted Kathie McKessor, Chairman of this Committee, to write to Schools of Veterinary Medicine asking the question. The schools that responded agreed that the question is premature since the modified live virus vaccines were first introduced in 1979 and later years.

Ms. McKessor also reviewed some other problems affecting a dog's autoimmune system associated with use of modified live parvo virus vaccine as well as problems associated with the use of the parvo vaccines given in conjunction with DHLPP shots. She suggested each person read the article published in the *Gazette* entitled "New Problems with Parvo Vaccines", written by Michael Passarella, D.V.M. and Kennan Glaser. The article contains some precautions to be taken in the use of these vaccines.

The second question addressed to the Veterinary Medical Schools asked for information on the statistics on deaths caused by Cancer in Scottish Terriers as compared to other Terrier Breeds. Although percentage figures received from the Veterinary Schools differed slightly it appears that the Scottish Terrier ranks fourth of all dog breeds at risk for developing Cancer.

Participants were urged to pay particular attention to the articles in the new 1986 STCA Handbook written by Howard H. Haues, Jr., D.V.M. and by E. Gregory MacEwen, D.V.M. on Cancer in the Scottish Terrier. Dr. Hayes' article has some sobering figures and Dr. MacEwen's article outlines some of the danger signals to look for.

Some of the Veterinary Schools suggested that the National Breed Clubs could assist them in research if they would ask their members to compile information in their individual States on Cancer, etc. Mention was also made that the University of Pennsylvania Veterinary School is engaged in research on Bladder Cancers, one of the primary causes of death of the Scottish Terrier; they would like those who have had recent experience with it to contact the School, giving them the information that you have.

The comments from those present indicated that when their individual veterinarians are baffled by a serious problem they usually consult with a specialist in their area, or, in

the alternative consult a Veterinary School of Medicine, very often the one from where they graduated. There was discussion on the plight of the trusting pet owner who relies on the advice of his veterinarian not knowing whether his veterinarian has the expertise to give him the best advice, he seldom sees some of the serious problems in the Scottish Terrier.

### Liability Insurance:

The question was posed to those present whether their individual Clubs carry liability insurance and the responses indicated that many Clubs have not been able to find a carrier willing to write it for them.

Mr. William Berry inquired of his well recognized agent whether it would be feasible to write an umbrella policy which would cover all Regional Clubs and possibly the Parent Club too. The answer was in the negative since the problem is to locate a company licensed to do business in all of the States where Regional Clubs are located. The polling of the few companies qualifying in that respect did not bring to light any company willing to write the coverage - even at a premium of \$5,000 yearly, the cost to be shared by all participating Clubs.

Hanover Insurance Company seems to be the primary carrier providing this coverage for those Clubs who have carried it in the past. Although they too would like to drop this coverage they feel they have an obligation to their current policy holders to continue the coverage. A report from Mr. Tom Hill confirmed this. If you currently have the coverage, and can afford the premium, keep the policy in force.

### Scottie Rescue Operations:

A survey of the policies of the various Clubs represented showed that:

The STC of Greater Washington, D.C. has a written policy describing the conditions under which they will rescue dogs. They deal only with homeless dogs-those found in shelters or pounds or loose on the streets. They do not accept dogs from owners who may be mistreating them because there are other facilities (SPCA, etc.) to deal with these situations. A Committee is designated in the Club to deliver the dog to special veterinarians with whom the Club works, to approve medical treatment, if necessary, and to investigate the home environment of a prospective adoptee. Payment for medical treatment and boarding is provided from the Club's Special Fund for which the Club makes solicitation several times each year. Those who adopt the dogs are requested to make a donation to this fund.

The STC of Michigan has similar procedures.

The STC of New England, the STC of Greater New York and the Heart of America have found no need to adopt formal programs for Scottie Rescue since they have had success in finding new, suitable homes for Scotties in distress.

The Greater Miami Scottish Terrier Club has a semi-formal procedure in its Scottie Rescue effort. A Committee is designated and all referrals of dogs needing homes, as well as prospective adoptees, are cleared through the Committee. Individual owners who have dogs in need of adoption are urged to keep the dogs until a proper home can be found. The Club also has a Special Fund to provide for veterinary care and boarding, if necessary.

Discussion of the Scottie Rescue Operations led to a discussion of the responsibility of our members as breeders to determine the suitability of the homes where they sell their puppies, to offer to take the dog back if circumstances change, and to follow up on the care of the dogs they sell in their new homes.

Those present were reminded too to make provision of their own dogs in their Wills by consulting with their attorneys to be certain the correct procedures are followed in each State. Consent of the parties to whom the dogs will be entrusted should be obtained and adequate monetary provision should be made for the care of the dogs.

The next meeting of the RCRC Committee will be at Dallas, Texas, March 20, 1987.

The meeting adjourned at 4:30 p.m.

## JUDGE'S CRITIQUE

It was a great privilege for me to be invited to judge the S.T.C.A. Specialty and I was extremely honored by the record entry of 201 scots.

I found this assignment particularly interesting as in the previous 3 months I had judged the breed in both Sweden and England, so I have had the opportunity to go over some of the best scotties being shown in the world today. My overall impression was that presentation on the whole is excellent **but** almost to the point of sacrificing the correct scottie type, as I interpret the standard.

I realize these are differences in the trimming technique, but the universal standard calls for a dense undercoat and harsh top coat - I have to say that I found this completely lacking in the majority of the exhibits.

I was a little concerned with the number of exhibits being shown, that although very smart in appearance, when handling lacked the desired depth of body, or spring of rib, bordering on the Fox Terrier, as against the Scottish Terrier.

I was delighted with my winners - B.O.B. Hughcrest Daiquiri Doll - who filled my eye as soon as she entered the ring and I was not disappointed on handling - she combines substance with quality, has superb ring presence, and considering her age I feel sure she has a bright future.

B.O.S. was Ch. Sandgreg's Foxmoor - I can honestly say that he's the best wheaten I have ever seen. He is a squarely made, completely balanced dog scoring in breed type, he was in good coat and condition, a natural showman who in my opinion did not need the constant attention given to him.

W.D. and R.W.D. Stonecraft Gaelic Warrior, and Glenecker Galivanter - both typical examples of the breed, and I found them both very good to go over. Both showed and moved happily. R.W.B. Merriland Gypsy Moth - a most attractive wheaten - full of quality and correct type, in very good coat and again moved and showed well.

In summing up I would like to thank the exhibitors for the sporting way in which they accepted my decisions, obviously with an entry as large as this it is impossible to please everybody and many good dogs could not be placed.

Hook a Scottie pet owner on obedience, and he'll eventually land in the breed ring and crawl into the whelping box. That's how it happened to us: first Scottie, 1967; first obedience competition, 1983; first champion finished, 1985; first litter, 1986.

Our first Scottie was Rob-Scot's Thistle McWilkins. Bred by Ray's mother in Florida, she was sired by Louise Ellsworth's first champion, Ell-Scot-T's Van Guard. Ray and I quickly fell in love with the gutsy spirit of our Scooter, sure that she must be very unique. We later realized she was simply terrier.

Do I hold a record? My first 15 years with a Scottie, I never watched anyone groom one. Instructions in old STCA materials were my cookbooks. Tom Natalini, Ann Gilkey and Miriam Stamm probably would not have recognized that I was following the steps they outlined in old STCA handbooks. Their recipes were good, but our old photoalbums prove the cook was not.

After Scooter died at 14, drifting off one night under her favorite live oak, we had to have another Scottie. The second would be a little silver brindle girl. Lucky was enrolled as an irrespressible five-month-old in the local kennel club's annual eight-week everything-you-always-wanted-to-know-about-obedience class. She'd sit, stand, stay, come, down and heel like an A-student at home, but I quickly learned she was only doing quiet homework on how to get into mischief at class.

"Why don't you just quit?" Ray would ask each night I'd return home in tears after an evening of her charging other dogs. The challenge was on though. Two friends with Great Danes had decided to go for Companion Dog degrees. Surely, I could train this Scottish rascal, too.

I hesitated to mention how long that C.D. took to earn. One year after our first show weekend when Lucky was 10 months old (13 shows later to be exact), the C.D. was hers (ours?).

The interim was accompanied by such ringside comments as "That lady must never work her dog" and peaked with Lucky's memorable performance at her only outdoor show. Halfway through the off lead heeling in Roswell, NM, Lucky led the judge, two ring stewards and me in a mad and merry chase around the ring. Of course, my Scottie, the darling of the crowd, was "excused for the day."

Persistence did pay off. In the den now there's a beautiful hammered silver bowl that came home from Montgomery County. It's inscribed "S.T.C.A. H.S. C.D. 1984" Yes, that bowl is Lucky's. The H.S. stands for high-scoring, but don't ask how high.

The same day Lucky "busted" her first try for a leg toward a C.D. was the day I'd also picked to "bring her out" and work toward a championship. My competition was Marguerite Robles' special, Ch. Short-Scot's Black Marble, in Texas from California with handler Dan Sackos. Thanks, Dan, for not laughing at Lucky. "She'd look a little neater if you'd pull some of this stuff off her sides," Dan suggested in his very kind way. He was speaking of the flying skirt that started somewhere near the top of Lucky's back.

"It would be better not to show this dog," Mrs. Heywood Hartley advised me as we left the ring that day. Busting in both obedience and the breed ring

was an inauspicious start in the show world, but it was the beginning of an education in Scottish Terriers.

The judge the next day didn't have Mrs. Hartley's courage to be honest with a novice. When asked whether Lucky should be shown, he replied, "She'd beat some dogs." Since Mrs. Hartley was the Scottie breeder of the two, I opted to trust her judgment. Lucky retired from the breed ring the day after she started.

That weekend whetted my appetite for a Scottie we could show in conformation. Something like Dan Sackos' "Josie" would be nice, I thought...and the search was on. Two years later, "a show dog" came to live with us in Big Spring. "Cubby" is our Passmore-bred foundation bitch. Will there ever be another thrill like that of finishing our first champion, owner-handled and conditioned, at a specialty?

This month we discovered a close second: hearing that one of the little guys from our first litter went Winners Dog twice the weekend he turned six months. Owyn San Jacinto was the first dog under the Owyn prefix to win championship points. This young businessman of the litter is better known to friends as Max "the kid" Wilson. Though not yet working the front counter of his jewelry store in Austin, Max has gone to work every day since he was nine weeks old. You see he has a big job to fill: his job slot was formerly filled by another Scottie, Don and Penny Wilson's old Boogie Bear.

Whatever Max and the rest of Owyn's Sesquicentennial "Texas Heroes" may accomplish in the show ring, we still wish then the same life of our first Scottie, the one that was "just a pet" - the chance to dig in a pile of rustling pecan leaves and to begin the long sleep under a Texas live oak.

#### DUNWOODIE

You might say the title of this story to be *What Thirty Dollars Buys You*, as this was the initial investment we made into the world of Scotties and dog shows. Through an ad in a San Antonio paper in 1951, we bought a cute little bundle of full-blooded Scotty which we named Danny. 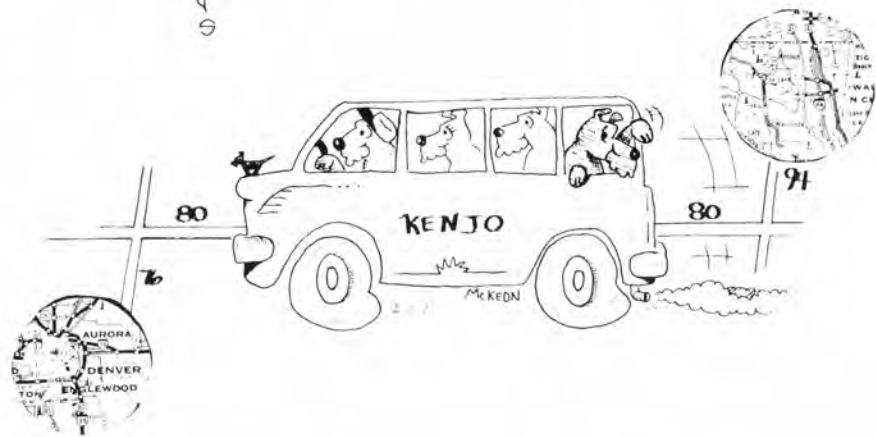
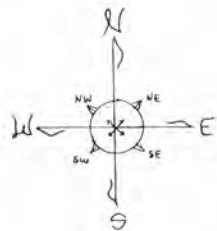

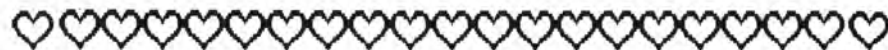

## The Inseparable Bond

This story is bizarre, but it can be authenticated by at least six people, all of them living in St. Petersburg, Florida.

My wife and I had raised our Scottish Terrier from a tiny puppy. When Gilly was about four years old, we had to find him a new home. My wife had started work, thus both of us were gone all day. An elderly friend of my wife's had just lost her little dog after having him for thirteen years. Gilly and our friend took to each other immediately so Gilly moved to his new home and we visited frequently.

About three months later on a Thursday evening I started getting the worst feelings of unrest I've ever had. Over and over in my mind came this complete feeling of panic and the words, "Poppa, Poppa help me I'm lost," kept going through my mind over and over. I told my wife about this feeling and that I just knew Gilly was in some sort of trouble. My whole family laughed and said I was just getting old and senile.

All day Friday this terrible mental unrest continued until finally Friday night I went over to our friend's house to check on Gilly. When I got there no one was home and her neighbor informed that she had gone to visit her sister in Birmingham, Alabama. The neighbor gave me her sister's phone number in Birmingham in case I wanted to contact our friend. By this time I started thinking that maybe I was getting a little old and I decided to drop the matter. I went home and went to bed. In the middle of the night I awoke with the worst feeling of anguish and terror I've ever had in my life. The words kept ringing in my mind, "Poppa, Poppa help me. I'm lost and I don't know what to do."

Early the next morning I called our friend's sister in Birmingham. The sister informed me that our friend left there in the middle of the week and headed for home with a few random unplanned stops along the way, but she had no idea of where. With this terrible feeling going on in my mind I decided I was forced to give up in spite of the misgivings and listen to my family, who by now were ready to call the men in the white jackets. They all told me that it was just because I hadn't wanted to give Gilly away in the first place because the dog and I were so close.

Saturday came and you guessed it, this terrible feeling came to me over and over again all day. "Poppa, Poppa, please help me, I'm lost." Sunday evening we were sitting at the dinner table and the phone rang. The voice on the other end of the line said, "Do you own a Scottish Terrier named Gilly and is your name Robert E. Sim?"

My heart froze and it took a good ten to fifteen seconds before I could squeak out a yes. The lady said, "I don't know how Gilly got here because we are way up in the mountains of North Carolina about one hundred and ten miles from the nearest big town. Nevertheless, we have your dog." I then asked her how she found me and the lady said Gilly had his dog identification tag on his collar. The woman informed me that Gilly had been pawing at her screen door for two days and whinning for her to let him in and he wouldn't go away. She said Gilly was just in terror because of the cars going by on the highway in front of her house. He was shaking all over. By the way this town is seven hundred and fifty miles from St. Petersburg. I thanked Gilly's benefactor and informed her that I would drive up and get the dog if I couldn't find his new

owner. When I asked the lady to put Gilly on the phone she came close to telling me I was crazy (as she later stated). I shouted into the phone, "It's okay Gilly, Poppa is coming to take you home." When the woman came back on the phone, she said Gilly really went crazy and started to yip and cry all at the same time.

The town where Gilly got lost only had three motels in it and we located our friend on the first call and gave her Gilly's location. Our friend said she had opened the door of her motel room for just a moment and Gilly dashed out to play with another dog, and he ran away with him. That had happened on Thursday afternoon. She had stayed over for three days trying to find Gilly. Can it be a coincidence that it was also Thursday afternoon that I started to have the ill feeling of unrest in my mind? Or was it Gilly calling to be across seven hundred and fifty miles? All I can tell you is that since Gilly was a tiny puppy he always ran to me when he was in trouble. And I know that he called to me when he was in need.

After this incident our friend became very ill, my wife gave up her job, and you don't have to wonder where Gilly is living out the rest of his days. Soooo. . . come on Gilly lets go for a walk. These people won't believe us anyway, but we know, don't we!

*Postlogue: August 1986*

*I wrote this happening in June of 1983. Since then my good pal Gilly has left us and gone to Dog Heaven. But I swear, sometimes late at night, when the house is still and quiet, I wake up from a sound sleep and hear a friendly little yip and what feels like a warm tongue on my cheek. Goodbye, Gilly! Poppa still loves you! There is an emptiness in my heart that I just can't seem to fill.*

*I believe in God and our Lord Jesus Christ, and I know that somewhere Gilly is waiting for me with that mischievous look in his eye, that sassy cock to his and with tail straight up in the air saying, "Hi Poppa, Let's go for a walk!" You bet this time we'll never be separated again and will walk together forever.*

**OBEDIENCE**

*by Ruth Tryon*

One day you look at your Mac and decide all dogs should have at least basic Obedience training and that includes Mac. So you start a search for Obedience clubs and training schools. On occasion you may find an Obedience trainer who claims Scotties just cannot be trained or who refuses to try and unfortunately, even a breeder who feels it is either too much work or it really isn't that important. Don't let those people discourage you. Good trainers welcome Scotties as do all-breed Obedience clubs so continue your search until you find the right place for you and Mac to learn.

Obedience training a Scottie is different from training, say, a Sheltie. A Scottie is from the Terrier Group, a group of dogs, bred through the ages to be independent, to work on their own, to use their native intelligence to solve their problems themselves without man's interference. Dogs from the working, sporting and herding groups have been bred to work beside man, to take their commands from him and to follow his directions swiftly and exactly. That is not to say one group is smarter than another, it only means that each group in training has its own set of problems and rate of learning. The Terrier may, in general, never as many other breeds. In many cases it is simply because precise in working because the Terrier handler has never trained the dog to keep strict attention to his handler. However, that does not mean the Terrier will not learn - he will, and as soon as he understands what you want, he learns fast. He also becomes bored with routine more quickly than many other breeds and in his own inimitable fashion, thinks up other ways to do an exercise than the exact routine you have in mind. To some trainers it is frustrating but to most Terrier people, it is challenging, often funny what that Terrier can think of, and always the realization that you are working with a bright, independent character who says "See, there is more than one way to do it."

So ignore all those people who shake their heads - just stay with it, keep on training Mac, don't worry if the Golden or Border Collie are weeks ahead of you now in training, you and Mac will get there. If you are enrolled in a school where you find the instructor does discourage you or ignore you for the dogs who are learning faster, find another training group which does understand obedience training is for all breeds. Enjoy working with Mac - remember, it is a big thing in his life to have your full attention at dog school and at home during training periods. Make sure he understands what you want him to do and then praise him lavishly when he does it right. Suddenly you will find training is great fun.

Don't limit your training knowledge to what is presented in class. Read Obedience training books. Good schools and instructors and clubs encourage you to learn all you can about training your dog and will often suggest good Obedience books and Obedience clubs frequently have a library from which you can borrow books. You will find in many cases the systems will contradict each other. If you have a problem, don't hesitate to try and figure out which might be the best method for Mac and try it. If it does not work, giving it a fair trial, try another system. Each dog is different and will respond to different methods in different ways. Always keep your mind open for new ideas and new techniques in training. Analyze what your problem is, have you made sure Mac

understands what you want, and think through, from Mac's viewpoint, what might work best. Read all you can on how dogs think for the better you understand Mac, the better your training methods will be and the more you and Mac will enjoy training. You may never attain High in Trial, but don't forget that in Obedience you are not competing just with the other dogs, but you also have the goal of doing the best you can as a team, which really is the most important thing. Don't be afraid to laugh when things go wrong - Terriers can think up some pretty funny things to do and ways to do them - remember to keep your perspective. What goes on in the dog world over the weekend really is not going to alter the world. Obedience is essential for Mac and all dogs and it is also fun. Each thing he learns, whether it is just a small thing or a major step forward in his training, enjoy it with him and let him know how pleased you are.

When you take Mac in the ring remember you two become representatives for the breed and it is not just his performance that counts but your attitude towards Mac, his successes and mistakes - and Mac's appeal to the public. Somehow, regardless of the quality of Mac's performance the spectators enjoy watching a Scottie work. His independence invariable comes through but with his ears up and his tail wagging his appeal is universal.

After reading this you might feel that Mac probably is not going to do well in the ring. This is not true - he can do a fine job - if it is simply he does not always sit absolutely straight, if he does not always go to a perfect heel position, if he does lag on the turns at times you should not feel Mac is not a good Obedience dog. Perfection might be our dream, but our goal in reality is to do the very best we can. That is an attainable goal and one that will be a pleasure to work towards with Mac.

The November 1986 issue of Front and Finish, a well known Obedience publication carries an article entitled "Thoughts on Obedience" by William F. Stifel, President of the AKC. Quoting from the last paragraph, "You and your dog are out there as a team, and what the minimum requirements really say is that you must successfully complete the principal features of each exercise in a reasonable neat context. In some breeds, it is all but impossible to imagine a score of 200 but the usefulness of the Pure-Bred as a companion to man can be demonstrated in all breeds. A green ribbon for a qualifying score is something any exhibitor should be proud of."

One major factor in training all dogs, including Mac, is having their attention. With Mac's great inherited curiosity to keep track of everything going on within his area, and taking command if necessary, the first thing you must do is convince him his attention when working is riveted on you! A great way to do this is to tell Mac to sit. If he keeps his eyes on you, tell him what a great do he is, tell him "Heel", take two steps and halt, and praise him. If when you told him to sit his eyes wandered off to the rest of the world, without warning, quickly turn with a strong lead correction and go in any direction away from him without any command. Do this several times and you will be amazed how quickly Mac will decide to keep his eyes on you. You have suddenly become unpredictable and you will move in any direction and not just where he expected - and he had better watch you. Start your training session each time with this short but effective attention getter and you will find Mac's work constantly improving.

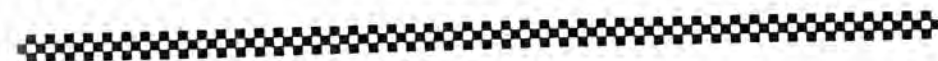

#### Canine parvovirus: recent advances in prevention and control

Ever since it first appeared, seemingly "out of nowhere" in 1978, canine parvovirus has been a major concern for dog owners and, more tragically, an important cause of illness and death, especially among puppies. Cornell has been in the forefront of research into the nature of the disease and in the development of effective vaccines. In recognition of this, three faculty members working at Cornell's James A. Baker Institute for Animal Health were awarded the Ralston Purina Small Animal Research Award in 1981. The recipients were Leland E. Carmichael, DVM, PhD, Max J. Appel, DVM, PhD, and Roy V.H. Pollock, DVM, PhD. In addition, Dr. Carmichael was recently named New York's "Inventor of the Year" for his role in the development of the parvovirus vaccines. Today, the result of the intensive work at Cornell and other institutions is evident in a much broader understanding of the nature of the disease and in the development of new methods to prevent and control it.

#### Parvovirus: a "new" disease

Canine parvovirus presented a special challenge to veterinary researchers because it is a truly new disease. In reality, new diseases are extremely rare among animals, just as among humans. Thus, when parvovirus first appeared, it was thought that the disease probably had been present, but undiagnosed for many years. This was in fact the case with Legionnaire's disease in man. Although it seemed new when the first outbreak occurred, later studies proved that the disease had been present for decades.

Today, we have proof that parvovirus did not exist before the 1978 epidemic. Investigators in several countries have tested canine serum samples collected before and after the first outbreaks. None of the samples collected before 1977 from anywhere in the world contained antibodies against canine parvovirus (the presence of antibodies indicates that the dog's natural defense system had responded to an attack by the virus). Other evidence also pointed to the "newness" of the disease. Acute episodes of diarrhea have always been common in dogs, but the severe, highly contagious syndrome produced by canine parvovirus was without precedent.

#### The evolution of a virus

Nothing in nature arises by spontaneous generation. New viruses are no exception—they arise from old viruses by a process of mutation and natural selection. Colin R. Parrish, PhD, at the Baker Institute has done a series of complex biochemical studies on canine parvovirus that sheds light on how the virus might have evolved. In sum, Dr. Parrish's studies have revealed that canine parvovirus probably arose as a mutant of feline panleukopenia virus or some other very closely related parvovirus. (The parvoviruses include, in addition to the feline panleukopenia virus, mink enteritis virus and rodent, raccoon, bovine, porcine, caprine, and now equine parvoviruses. They are the smallest of the true viruses.)

The new parvovirus that emerged had the ability to adhere to canine body cells—the first and critical step in the development of a viral infection. The virus then gained access to a dog, most likely through the oral-fecal route. This means

that the dog acquires the infection when it accidentally ingests the virus from some surface that has been contaminated. Once the cycle of infection in dogs was begun, it spread like wildfire. Although no dogs had antibodies in 1946, now, less than a decade after the first deaths from the disease, the majority of dogs in every country from Australia to Zimbabwe have antibodies to canine parvovirus whether they have been vaccinated or not. The pandemic (worldwide epidemic) that resulted occurred because the virus had found a new niche in the world—an enormous pool of susceptible animals in which there was no immunity from previous infection. Remember, previous infection was impossible because this particular mutant of the virus never existed before.

Unusual as the parvovirus story is, it is not unique. The same evolution seems to have happened with another closely related mutant of panleukopenia. In 1947, mink enteritis virus appeared suddenly on a fur farm in Ontario, Canada. The new disease spread rapidly throughout the world and continues to be a major pestilence of mink.

#### **How the virus acts**

Canine parvovirus, like other parvoviruses, depends on the division of cells inside the dog's body for its own replication and proliferation. This explains why the damage caused by canine parvovirus is most evident in tissues with a high multiplication rate—the intestine, lymph nodes, thymus, bone marrow. Although other factors are not doubt involved, the need the virus has to grow along with the dog's own cells explains many aspects of the disease and its development. For one thing, this knowledge has cleared up one of the early mysteries about the disease: What was the cause of the syndrome of sudden heart failure and death in very young puppies that appeared about the same time? Sudden puppy death from myocarditis (inflammation of the heart) and enteritis (inflammation of the intestine) in older dogs are two very different syndromes, leading at first to the supposition that two different diseases were responsible. It was then discovered that parvovirus actually caused both and for the following reason: For the first two weeks after the birth of a pup, there is a rapid growth of heart muscle (myocardial proliferation). If a susceptible puppy is infected in the first few days of life when the heart muscle is growing rapidly, the virus also grows rapidly in the heart, resulting in destruction of the muscle to the point where it is no longer strong enough to support life. After the first two weeks, however, the rate of heart muscle proliferation drops rapidly to zero, while the rate of intestinal tissue growth increases rapidly, particularly as the pup begins to eat some solid food. These changes in body tissue growth are accompanied by a switch from heart involvement to intestinal involvement as the predominant form of the disease.

As the virus reproduces and matures, it interferes with normal cell function and maintenance. Infected cells become unstable and die, releasing millions of new viral particles. Widespread destruction of white blood cells results in a low white-cell count, making the pup susceptible to secondary infection. Destruction of tissues within the intestines, which occurs in dogs four weeks old and older, produces vomiting and diarrhea, which may become bloody.

#### **As the virus spreads**

In addition to being new and fast growing, parvovirus is also exceptionally stable, persisting for months at room temperature. Since only a few viral particles are required to produce infection, these characteristics are very bad news. Virtually every dog is assured of exposure. Indeed, outbreaks of parvovirus enteritis occurred even in a closed colony that had no contact with outside dogs for years. How could this have happened? Apparently, the virus was carried in on the shoes and clothing of kennel workers (recall that parvovirus is the smallest of viruses). There is no evidence people themselves can be infected, however. The virus is also easily transported on the hair or feet of infected dogs and by contaminated cages or other objects.

A susceptible dog can become infected by ingesting less than a thousandth of a gram of infected fecal material. That's a very likely event, considering that there may be over a billion infectious viral particles in a diarrheic stool. Moreover, the virus survives for several weeks after being passed in the stool.

After ingestion, canine parvovirus rapidly multiplies in the tonsils and other lymphoid tissue (spleen, thymus, lymph nodes) for the first 24 to 36 hours. Then it spills into the circulatory system, which distributes it throughout the body. By the fourth day after ingestion, there may be one million infectious particles per milliliter of blood and one billion per gram of tissue. About this time, the virus reaches the intestines, replicates in the lining cells, and begins to be expelled in the feces.

This invasion of the dog's natural defense mechanism, however. Work at Cornell by Paul Meunier, DVM, PhD, suggests that there is actually a race between the rate at which the virus reproduces and the production of antibodies to fight the infection. The winner determines the outcome of the disease. Dogs that have early and vigorous antibody production are able to halt the continued spread and multiplication of the virus. This helps explain the puzzling spectrum of the severity of the illness, even within the same litter. Dogs with vigorous and rapid antibody production tend to have mild infections, sometimes so mild the infection is not even recognized as parvovirus. Dogs with a delayed antibody production have a more prolonged period when the virus is in the blood (viremia). The result is more severe viral destruction of the intestinal and other tissues. These dogs are more likely to have severe or even fatal infections. Death can occur in dogs of all ages, but is more likely in young pups.

## **THE GROOMING CORNER**

---

### **Grooming Edges Vs. Flats**

If you are reading this article while having your second cup of coffee, hold your cup up in front of you. Your cup is a form. Your eye sees the surface of the cup facing you, the "flat" and your eye sees the sides around the cup, the edges. Edges can also be referred to as silhouettes. If you view your grooming as working on edges and flats of your dog, you will be able to provide a better finished product in a shorter time. For example, set your Scottie in front of you on your grooming table. The flat is the side of the dog facing you. The edges are the outline of his head, chest, front of his legs, topline, rump and back of hocks. When you look down at your Scot from the top, the flat is the top of his head and back; the edges are the sides of his front legs, body and back legs.

To use this concept, with your Scot on the table, back comb the hair straight away from the body. This will in effect expand the silhouette. Next, pluck or strip hairs keeping the "edge" in sight. When you have completed this, combing the hair in place will provide a smooth silhouette. Don't do any grooming on the "flat"; do all grooming by repositioning the dog on the table so that you are always viewing edges to be groomed.

Recently I entered my dog Spencer (Ch. Stalwart Knight Errant) in his first European dog show in Hurth-Gleuel, West Germany. Spencer has been making trips with me to Germany since 1984 and on this trip we were hoping to breed him to a bitch from the Rannoch Kennels of Mrs. Elsbeth Clerc in Bern, Switzerland. Unfortunately, the Rannoch bitch did not check our travel itinerary and we were not able to breed. Luckily, I did check the *Der Terrier* magazine and found that we weren't too late to enter the Hurth-Gleuel Terrier Specialty Show. As a member of the "Klub fur Terrier E.V.", I had met Mrs. Clerc at a show the year before, so I consulted her concerning our entry. We entered in the Zuchtklasse/Ruden, a class for all champions from other than West Germany. Herr H. Kraus was the German judge for the show. Because they had a question concerning my entry, the show chairman called me to verify by AKC registration number and to give me specifics about the show time and location. How many times has an American superintendent called you?

When I reached the show, I realized why the show chairman could give such specialized attention to entrants. There were approximately 400 dogs entered in the 19 classes - Airedale, Irish, Lakeland, Welsh, Bedlington, Border, Kerry Blue, Manchester, Soft-Coated Wheaten, Australian, Cairn, Dandie Dinmont, Scottish, Sealyham, Skye, West Highland White, Boston Silky and Yorkshire. You notice they class several breeds as terriers which we do not. There were three rings with two German judges and one judge from Great Britain. We had no trouble finding the Resthalle in Hurth-Gleuel from the very detailed map on the letter of acceptance we received a week before the show and various road signs along the way. Upon entering the Testhalle each entrant paid his entry fee and received a program and armband, which actually was in the form of a square piece of white cardboard that attached to a button. The show was in a large room about the size of a high school gymnasium with a balcony overlooking the rings. Upstairs food was served cafeteria style with tables and benches for spectators, exhibitors, and their dogs. After checking the judging order for my ring (naturally we were last!) I was told that we probably would show around noon. This gave us enough time to have breakfast and survey the show rings. Breakfast was rich, strong coffee, salami and cheese, delicious, heavy rolls and steak tartare. A lunch menu was beer and bratwurst!

A common complaint about American and German dog shows is the crowded aisles around the show rings. The difference in German shows is that even though the aisle is crowded, there are long tables around the perimeter of each ring so observers can have a seat at the table to eat, drink, and write.

German exhibitors set and groom their dogs a bit differently than Americans, but Elsbeth Clerc had told a friend of hers, Gisela Gutschow of Hamburg, that we were entered, so she helped me to prepare Spencer for the ring. There were only six entries in the Scottish Terrier breed but one of them was the new English Champion Stuane Highland King (Ch. Mayson Monopoly x Ch. Stuane Highland Empress). There were no mats to walk on and Spencer was sliding a bit on the hardwood floors. The judge put up Stuane Highland King with Spencer as Reserve. Winners bitch was a beautiful bitch named Eika vom Ossiland (Viewpark Para Handy x Frauke vom Ossiland). All judges have different routines, but this particular judge seemed to go over the dogs a bit longer and

more carefully and was very cautious in sparring the dogs. After the judging, the Ring Stewart gave me a certificate instead of a ribbon and a written evaluation of Spencer by the judge. I was so very pleased with the experience and hope that we can do it again soon - but with winning results.

I encourage more Americans to take their dogs to Europe where dogs are accepted in all places, and to show them if possible. It would be difficult to show in Germany without a working knowledge of the language, but many people speak English, so it wouldn't be impossible.

Most of us relegate our show dogs to the cargo hold at flight time. Not Ann Wooldridge. She's been flying with a Scottie seatmate for years. Her secrets of how to do it, however, she is a bit hesitant to share.

"Please don't ruin it for us," requests Ann to other STCA members who may follow her lead.

"I did it extensively when I was campaigning Anna, at least two full years." recalls Ann of her travels with Sanford Rosenfeld's multi-specialty BOB, Ch. Scarista Glorianna.

"The reason I started flying with Anna in the cabin," explains Ann, "was that the dog I showed before her had his eardrums ruptured on a flight back from Phoenix." After that dog's misfortune, she hesitated to trust airline claims that pet cargo compartments are completely pressurized and heated.

"It's a safer way to travel with show dogs," claims Ann of in-cabin travel. However, this option is out for anyone traveling with more than one dog. Airlines allow only one animal per cabin. "I'd do it with my best dog, the one I cared about most," evaluates Ann.

"We've flown everything," indicates the STCA director from Mill Valley, California. She ticked off Western, United, TWA, Republic and Pan Am as examples.

The problem in flying an adult dog like Anna in a plane's passenger cabin is that airlines almost universally mandate that pets that fly there must be in hard-sided containers, ones which will fit under the passenger seat. That's fine for a tiny puppy, but try cramming a 21-pound adult in one of those mini kennels. It's as tight company as a tin of sardines—too confining for any grown Scottie.

What Ann uses instead is a soft-sided, zip top bag that's screened in the middle for ventilation. Both bag and dog fit neatly under the seat. This type bag is not, however, a regulation carrier. Therein lies the problem.

Ann's secret is to avoid calling attention to herself or what's in the bag.

"When boarding, the dog is in your shoulder bag which will look like any flight bag," describes Ann. At least her bag did after she modified it. It came blatantly marked "Pet Carrier," but Ann saw no reason to advertise the bag's function, so removed the label. As she carries the bag, Ann says she often drapes a sweater over it to mask the canine contents.

Anyone flying with a cabin dog must first have a ticket for it, reminds Ann. For most airlines that costs about \$25, comparable to the amount one pays to ship an animal excess baggage in the hold. You will not save money. But then economics is not the reason for hand carrying a show dog.

The safety factor of knowing where your dog is, that it is not lost in a transfer or left setting on the sun-baked runway as the temperature rockets are what Ann reiterates make in-cabin travel worth the trouble.

Ann stresses that cabin reservations should be booked early for a dog. In most airplanes the one pet per cabin rule means one pet in first class and one in economy—just two per plane. Jumbo jets having three cabins can accommodate three pets.

Until you have a Scottie that's a search and rescue worker, a seeing eye dog, hearing assistance dog or an explosives detection expert, you must be reconciled to the fact that your valuable show dog is simply a pet to the airline.

He will be allowed a ticket only if the two or three pet spots are not already booked.

Some airlines, in fact, have regulations which ban cabin pets completely. Delta and Continental are two such lines. Don't try Ann's techniques with them. Play by the rules with the others: book your dog's reservation; buy his ticket. The only place you bend the rules is in your use of a non-regulation container.

If your travel agent has not already pre-boarded you, "it's smartest to have someone else get your boarding pass," suggests Ann. Don't tempt fate by appearing at the ticket counter with your doggy bag and expect not to be called on it.

Ann warns about another possible trouble spot: the security area where passengers must pass through metal detectors before entering boarding gates. After she opens her bag to show guards what's in it, she says, "I usually can walk right through the gate."

Ann does admit: "Once I had to squish Anna at the last moment into an underseat Fiberlas® kennel. She squished because she trusted me. The minute the plane was off, Anna was out in her regular bag."

Once past the ticketing, luggage check and X-ray, Ann has found she hasn't had to worry about the cabin crew. She says they're not apt to complain to a dog owner unless the dog is whining, barking or being a nuisance. Stewardesses just don't relish a hassle from passengers who Ann groans may "scream and moan, 'Oh, my god, I'm allergic to dogs!'"

If you're going to try carrying a Scottie in the cabin, "use common sense," advises Ann. "You'll have to do some training...teach the dog to get in and out of the bag. And you need to have a dog that trusts you. A laid-back dog helps."

"Don't push your luck," warns this air veteran. "Leave the dog in the bag during flight. Don't call attention to it."

Even Ann has broken that cardinal rule at least once and gotten away with it. "Anna flew on the seat between us under an airline blanket," remembers Ann of a trip home from Grayslake, Ill., with Betty McArthur, another successful Scot-in-cabin traveler.

For times she does ship a dog in cargo, Ann adds, "I never just send a dog down." She's right there on the runway watching the dog load. "I learned that from Lena Kardos, and I tip heavily."

Are you game to try a Scottie seatmate?

I've tried and failed, and I've tried and succeeded.

The first time I made all the wrong moves. But then I didn't have Ann's tips to follow. On an American/Western flight from Texas to Seattle, I planned to carry a six-month old bitch in my nifty new soft-sided beast bag.

When I appeared with Sister-Sister on shoulder to buy her cabin ticket, the agent naturally asked what I was going to carry her in. "This bag!" I replied.

"Sorry, Miss, that bag does not fit American's regulations," the agent and his supervisor told me in no uncertain terms. Down into the hold my girl went in a hastily purchased kennel.

On my next try, bringing a pup home from Montgomery County, on one of the same airlines, I was cagier. I'd been coached by another successful Scot-in-bag traveler, Jeannie Passmore. She'd already tried Ann's and Betty's methods and passed them on to me.

Here's how I did it.

My new dog's spot was reserved in the cabin. However, since I didn't have his ticket, I left him out of sight with Ray and our luggage while I purchased it.

"Yes, I have an under-the-seat carrier," I answered honestly as I signed the charge slip.

Next I carried beast bag and beast on a trial run through the X-ray gate to assure myself we could get through to board. No problem. "What a cutie!" admired the security guard.

Now confident we wouldn't have to rush the dog to the hold after all, I sent Ray back to check our luggage and "the extra dog crate." Once through the security gate the second time, there was even time to take the pup to the lady's room and potty him on newspapers there. Then he joined us incognito in a bar before we finally settled inobtrusively at a boarding area several gates from our flight to await our call.

Sure it was scary to walk that boarding ramp the first time. I pulled myself as close as I could to Ann Wooldridge's commanding John Wayne-of-a-woman stature and bravely paused while Ray handed our boarding passes to the agent. There were no inquiries about dog or bag. She probably didn't even notice them.

Once in our seat, Gringo rested in his carrier on the floor in front of my legs. I draped the bag's handles over the corner of the magazine pocket in front of me so that the ventilation screen would be wide open to receive the cool air that blew under the seats.

Fortunately, being bagged was nothing new to Gringo. He'd been playing in his bag for several weeks. Then he'd just watched nearly 40 BOB Scottie specials ringside at Montgomery County from his beast bag. Clearly, he had decided a quiet flight to Texas would be no problem.

Once in the air though, I couldn't resist. Ann Wooldridge will say, "Shame. You shouldn't have." However, I itched to discover how the cabin attendants would react to a dog. We were sitting right next to the galley where stewardesses couldn't miss the critter, so I lifted the carrier to my lap and let Gringo sleep there with his head peaking out the bag.

"Oh, wat a darling dog." "I didn't know Scotties came in that color." "I'll be back to pet him after I serve." Those were some of the comments we heard. No one ever shook an official finger at us.

But Ann, yes, I promise to keep that bag zipped next time. The secret of Scot-in-cabin air travel is one we all definitely need to keep in the bag.
