**SUMMARY OF THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF
THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF

President McArthur called the meeting to order at 8:40 A.M. Officers and Directors present were:

The agenda was accepted with additions. **Motion - Justus/Prince - Passed unanimously.**

The minutes of the June meeting were passed with corrections: (1) A.K.C. Delegate Report - the A.K.C. scholarship money is for Veterinary scholarships. **Motion - Krause/Sheehan to accept as amended. Passed unanimously.**

It was noted that there was an additional correction to the February 17, 1991, minutes which was approved in June: The vote to ask the Regional Club News Editor for the BAGPIPER to determine if there was a need for Editors to meet at National Specialties passed with one nay.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: President McArthur shared with the Board some recent correspondence and information.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Jackie Seelbach noted that the 1991 Rotating Specialty report was complete. A letter of thanks was received from Judge Muriel Lee. Everything was set for this weekend.

Plans for the Rotating Specialty 1992 being held in Baltimore were reviewed. **Motion - Watkins/Robinson** to set Sweepstakes entry fee at \$7.00. **Passed unanimously.**

Jackie noted that the A.K.C. is considering raising the limit of dogs for judges at Specialty Shows only from 175 to 200. It will be voted on at the December meeting. If it passes, it may alleviate our need for hiring two judges for Montgomery County.

Vandra Huber had requested the Board to consider asking judges to make "select" placements during Best of Breed at Montgomery County. It was the consensus of the Board to table discussion of this until the Winter Meeting. **Motion - Watkins/Justus.**

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT: Diane Zollinger reported that the following Regional Clubs have been granted permission to hold Specialty Shows:

Diane noted some problems in communication between the Corresponding Secretary and other persons who are sending out information. **Motion - Zollinger/Prince** that a copy of all official STCA correspondence to Regional clubs should be sent to both the Corresponding Secretary and the President. **Passed unanimously.**

It was also noted that members get calls from persons requesting puppy referrals and other information after they have been given the Members by State handout from the Public Information Chair. In order to be more responsive and to follow-up Regional clubs also need to be informed. **Motion - Zollinger/Musson** that the names and address of all persons requesting information packets from the Public Information Chair be forwarded to the Regional Clubs in their respective areas. **Passes Unanimously.** Selected correspondence was reviewed.

RECORDING SECRETARY'S REPORT: Helen Prince reported that all fourteen (14) amendments and additions to the Constitution and By-Laws had passed. The American Kennel Club officially approved the changes as of September 27, 1991. It was the consensus of the Board that copies of the newly revised document will be sent to the membership in a special mailing.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Robbie Robinson distributed the financial statement for the 1991 fiscal year. Discussion on hiring an accounting firm to maintain the books was postponed until after specific proposals are received.

A.K.C. DELEGATE'S REPORT: John Sheehan was unable to attend the September meeting due to illness. Ed Watkins reported on the following:

1. Bred-By-Exhibitor class vote was defeated by a narrow margin.
2. Change of number of dogs a judges is assigned at a Specialty Show will be voted upon in December.
3. Veterinary Scholarship fund increased to \$50,000.
4. AKC is pushing for local clubs to fight the local dog ordinances
5. A new video, "Best Friends," narrated by Roger Karas, is available for dog clubs. It relates to our needs with dogs and current legislature in many counties requiring mandatory spay/seuter.

SELECTED COMMITTEE REPORTS

Handbook: Muriel Lee stated that the Handbook has been mailed in August. The estimated cost was fairly close to the final cost. There were several errors in advertising that she was aware of. (Any other complaints should now be forwarded to the Corresponding Secretary.) The Board will decide how to proceed with these advertisers. An errata sheet will be published later. The Board thanked Muriel for doing such a great job.

Annual Awards: Izzie McCool Reported on the problems she had with the 1991 Tally and presented some ideas for changes in the way we do the tally. A decision on a new donor for American Bred Dog Trophy donor was deferred until the next meeting because the notice that we needed a donor was in the BAGPIPER and persons did not have time to respond. Lynn Weaver has also notified the Board that she will give up the PUPPY DOG TROPHY....Donors will be solicited in the next Bagpiper.

Judges Education: Neatha Robinson has resigned as Chair. The Board thanked her for the work she has done.

BAGPIPER: In the absence of the Editor, President McArthur commented on concerns expressed by the membership.

She also noted that the "Letter to the Editor" in the Summer Issue from Carole Fry Owen in reference to the Membership Application stated that..."One STCA Member who asked to address the Board in person on this subject was told that Board meetings are closed!"... This statement was false. The Board invited Carole Owen to attend the October meeting and requested a retraction of this statement. We received a letter from Mrs. Owen at our October meeting in which she stated the person referred to stated..."he did not directly ask to speak to the Board on the membership issue..."

It has been a long-standing process to schedule any individual who requests to speak to the Board on a specific issue. Such a request must be sent to the Corresponding Secretary at least two weeks prior to the scheduled meeting in order to be added to the agenda.

It was noted, per discussion of an ad in the BAGPIPER, that our policy is to limit advertising to MEMBERS ONLY.

My name is Irene Bowa and live in Sebastopol, Ca. I own two obedience titled Scottish Terriers - Bowa's Laddie O'Gladdie CDX and McArthur's Wild Rose CDX.

Here are some tips you might find useful in training Scottish Terriers for obedience work.

I use positive reinforcement and plenty of positive motivation in my training. Lad and Rose are both trained with food, rewards and toys. Lots of play time between exercises. Corrections are given quickly (no nagging) and fairly, with much praise after reward. No corrections are given when a dog is just learning the exercise. It is much easier to show a Scot what you want him to do, than try to force or fight him to get the desired response.

If you are having a problem, go back and look at the situation from the dogs point of view. Actually, get on his eye level. Are you flashing your hand signals correctly? Are your about turns pivots? Is an exercise done as a whole or do you break it down to its individual parts to help your dog?

You must start thinking and looking at things as your dog does. This way you might just see why your dog is having a problem with an exercise or concept. MAKE this FUN.

Heeling is hard!!! Try to heel along with someone (you be the dog) just see if you can heel without forging or lagging. Think about how happy you would be if you were trying your hardest and someone jerked you. Video yourself and your dog heeling. See where he is having trouble and help him out. Remember your dog has feelings. Be FAIR.

Remember, obedience training is hard for a dog, who's life depends on being an independent worker.

One Book, I recommend to all obedience people and everyone in general, is by Karen Pryor's "Don't Shoot The Dog". This book is a must for everyone's library.

Remember, obedience is FUN. Your dog should make you laugh and be happy, even when they make mistakes.

They're still those wonderful pets you live with.

My sincere thanks to Irene in taking the time to write this article on training your dog, which is so true and I agree with her remarks.

Also as I close I would like to include "Season's Greetings and a Happy New Year" to all members.

I think a well chiseled head with small correctly shaped and placed ears and the deeply set eyes I am describing give finish and class to a good Scottish Terrier.

To the exhibitors who showed under me, I thank you from the bottom of my heart for giving me such a grand entry and for the sporting way in which you accepted my decision.

Dr. Schall is doing DNA work specifically on VWD found in Scottish Terriers. Although I have been fortunate thus far in not having any type of bleeding problems occur, I cannot in all good consciousness sit idly by and not do something to help eradicate this disease from my breed.

I sincerely hope each member will join in this important and most urgent endeavor.

To the members of the STCA;

As two of the more senior active breeders, we were impressed by the quality of the exhibits at Montgomery this year. It was good to see so many fine dogs presented beautifully, most by their owners. It is a hopeful sign that all four Winners and Reserve Winners were owner-handled and that those owners are fairly new faces. By all indications, our breed is in good shape. We wish we could say the same about our parent Club.

One would have to have been very self-absorbed not to be aware of the wide-spread controversy surrounding the STCA during the past year. Neither of us thinks any Officer or Director deliberately led the club astray. Change usually happens as a series of almost imperceptible deviations until you wake up one morning wondering "How did we get here?"

The most upsetting matter dealt with by our leadership has been the proposed revision of our standard. Two year ago, AKC requested that we rewrite it to conform with their format. At the October 1989 meeting, approximately 12 members showed up to oppose the change. The Board then voted unanimously to leave the standard as it was. Later the same day at the annual dinner meeting, our members responded with a loud and spontaneous burst of applause.

This past winter, AKC renewed its request. This time, however, our leadership responded favorably. The Board appointed a "secret" committee composed exclusively of Board members to reformat the standard. We use the word "secret" in describing the committee because the committee members names were never published in the "Bagpiper" and because several of the committee members perceived that their committee was secret.

Inevitably, the existence of this committee became known. In light of the Board's decision in 1989, many members were outraged that a committee would have been appointed and instructed to keep its existence secret. As it turned out, this secret committee actually prepared a reformatted standard. The Board sent the reformatted standard to AKC for approval, without the knowledge or approval of the membership.

This incident is only one of many controversies that arose during the past two years. The new membership application/sponsorship requirements, the amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws, and the new Code of Ethics are some of the others. What all of these matters have in common is that they were hastily enacted in secret and imposed on the membership without warning or explanation. The ensuing acrimony between membership and the Board was inevitable but avoidable.

We have two suggestions that we believe could reduce such conflict in the future. First, when the Board is considering an extraordinary change, one with some potential for controversy, the proposal should be published in the "Bagpiper." The President's Message could explain the Board's reasons for considering the proposal and ask for comments from the

members. At the following meeting, the Board could then make an informed decision to adopt, revise or discard the proposal. We know that publishing important proposals in the "Bagpiper" will necessarily delay some matters. In such cases, however, the membership needs that time to deliberate the effects of such changes and to offer suggestions to the Board. It does not matter whether the response is large or small--what matters is that the members have the opportunity to make themselves heard.

Secondly, end the secrecy surrounding the Board meetings. Except for judge selection and an occasional disciplinary matter, there are few Board activities that need to be kept secret from the membership. Besides, this is not national security--every Board member has leaked at least one "secret" to a friend or spouse. Eventually, the information trickles out, sometimes inaccurately. Why should members wait for months to read an abbreviated form of the minutes in the "Bagpiper?" Open communication between the Board members and the rest of us will greatly reduce the "us and them" feeling that is so prevalent right now.

If we are going to change direction, we must act now. The new Board got off to a poor start. At their first meeting after the Montgomery dinner, the Treasurer-elect, having held office for a few short hours, resigned. He then recommended as his replacement the immediate Past President. No advance notice was given to the current President and most, if not all of the Board members were completely unprepared to address this issue. Whatever the parties may have intended, they used secrecy and surprise to achieve an end.

If we are going to turn our club around, this affair would be a good place to start. At the next meeting, the new Treasurer should give the Board an opportunity to reconsider her appointment. It is in the Club's best interest that the Board consider all ramifications of appointing the past president as treasurer under the current circumstances.

Most important, we should take President Bush's advice and try to be a kinder, gentler STCA. We are all busy, all competitive and all passionately devoted to the Scottish Terrier. Passionate people are not always going to agree, but if we are courteous and respectful of one another, we can do away with so much of the anger that has overshadowed the past year.

EDITOR'S NOTES

On Leaving the Editorship -

This issue concludes my editorship of the Bagpiper. Editing a publication, especially as an avocation, has three stages, exciting, creative, challenging; then, it becomes a chore, and finally it becomes drudgery. I leave it just as it was becoming a chore.

The mail, the telephone calls, and the articles sent in by contributors have been to the very end interesting and enjoyable interludes. Those contacts, I will miss.

A number of you have taken the time to come up to me at shows or banquets to tell me how much you have enjoyed reading the BAGPIPER. Others have written postscripts on communications to the BAGPIPER, couched in flattering phrases. These will always be gratefully remembered.

On The Study of the Standard -

The Standard Study committee, the appointment of which arose from the AKC's dissatisfaction with the rearrangement of the Standard done at the AKC's earnest request, offers an opportunity for all of us to really study the standard; and, as well, to accept the committee's invitation to express our views to the committee---in writing, and only in writing.

In a recent issue of the Gazette one of the breed columnists relates a quote that points a way for us in doing that studying. He once went into a ring with a very respected veteran judge to get his start toward licensing. The veteran, in effect, taught him to swim by throwing him into the creek. The apprentice was uncertain, even bewildered. The veteran judge advised him to "pick out the dog which looked like it could best do the work for which the breed was developed and 90% of the time you will pick the right one."

That is good advice for our committee and to us all. The work for which our breed was developed, varmint control by mortal combat, if need be, and a dark den if required, should be the lodestone that guides our study and understanding of the breed's standard.

If we do that we will breed, generation after generation, sound, recognizable Scottish terriers able to do their work. Failure to follow the lodestone's way will surely lead to an over-emphasis on a particular feature that could result in some deforming of the breed, such as over-emphasis on large, wide heads has lead to bulldog bitches that can't whelp naturally, or an over-emphasis on angulation in the rear will lead to German shepherds that walk flat on their hind feet in not all that many generations. A Scottish terrier that could not work in the fields at successfully controlling varmint population is no Scottish terrier at all.

On Montgomery County, 1991 -

Montgomery County Weekend has special features that always excite and fascinate. There are dogs, both celebrated and not, from all over the country there. People we do not otherwise see and meet, and visit with in person are there. The Pennsylvania countryside is lovely. The weather is iffy, however. This year, Friday and Saturday were sunny, pleasant days. Sunday was chilly, showery, with the promised clearing coming as the show ended and the sun was setting.

One could not help but be thrilled that Brookhill Morning Edition won the show for the second, consecutive time.

Conversing with the Swedish lady who sat beside me added interest. She and her husband have scotties at home. Two things she said will stick in my memory. One, that few scottie bitches in Sweden are not afflicted with inert uteruses when whelping. The other was a remark on the shortness of Scottish terriers, which the standard describes as "moderately short". That is that many scotties are short in the wrong place. They are short in the chest rather than in the loin, which is the proper place, she said. An intriguing statement that makes one wonder.

REMEMBERING BLANCHE REEG

by Cornelia Crissey

The BAGPIPER invited Miss Cornelia Crissey to reminisce about her memories of Blanche Reeg with its readers. Miss Crissey, in the 50's lived, as a boarder as it were, with Mrs. Reeg, an arrangement that continued until Mrs. Reeg sold her property to a developer.

Miss Crissey remembers Blanche Reeg as persistent in pursuit of a goal, and also as a teacher of special talent.

Mrs. Reeg had entered the world of dog shows in Ohio, her native state (Plymouth) with Airedales, and had some success before moving to New York where her husband took a job as a representative for a coal company. The Airedales were a satisfying substitute for the standardbreds she longed to drive around the harness-racing tracks. Her father was an afficianado, and would take her along to the tracks or training stables. But it was quite unthinkable for a woman, or a girl, to do such a thing.

In New York and the East, Mrs. Reeg took up scotties. There she found that it was a man's world, dominated, in the terrier rings, by professional handlers, some legends today. When she asked for advice they either pointblank refused or gave her wrong answers. So she would go to shows, set up near one of them and watch him as he worked on his dogs. In the ring, she observed how the other dogs were groomed and how they were handled. Then she went home and worked at copying them until she learned. Mrs. Reeg kept that up for 15 years before winning her first blue ribbon.

One of Mrs. Reegs problems, Miss Crissey indicates, was that she did not know genetics, and was breeding to first one star stud and then another, and not getting anything really good. Finally she hit a winner when she bred Blanart Bewitching. By then, Miss Crissey, a science teacher in a New York City girls school, had taught Mrs. Reeg about genetics, and she based her breeding upon Bewitching and what she had learned about genetics, and her kennel became famous.

Having been cold-shouldered by the experts in her novice years, when Mrs. Reeg had established herself, she was generous with her time and advice to anyone she felt genuinely wanted to learn, and became noted for her lectures on genetics and breeding; and her demonstrations of grooming.

"She had a wonderful way of teaching," Miss Crissey remarked.

In the 60's, Mrs. Reeg sold her property to a developer. She was asked to come down to the Washington, D.C. area and help an older couple with their kennel, and she accepted. The wife died suddenly, but her widower kept the bargain, except that he turned the house over to Mrs. Reeg and moved into an apartment. Mrs. Reeg continued to live there until the property was sold upon the owner's death.

FIRST SCOTTIES

First Scotties intrigue me. I spent a little time this summer remembering our first one as I was trying to prove to a young friend how far she'd come in learning to groom in a short year's time. Sometimes we forget what our first dog was like—until we get out the pictures.

Heather Stewart had sent me photos of her work on the young champion male she bought from us a year ago. Actually, I was quite delighted about how well she was doing with his grooming. When she and husband Roy bought the 16-month-old Steeler from us, they lived on the edge of the Stealth Bomber test range in the high Nevada desert. From there they moved this spring to an even smaller place, Seligman, AZ, where Roy teaches physical education classes for all grades, kindergarten through high school. Neither that tiny Arizona ranching community, not their earlier Tonapah, NV home had a Scottish Terrier club closer than about 300 miles. Nevada only had one other STCA member, and she was almost 200 miles from Tonopah. However, as Heather waited for us to finish Steeler's championship so she could take him home, she set to learning to groom.

She and Roy took their own original beloved Scottie, a spayed female named Nikki, to a grooming seminar the San Francisco Bay Scottish Terrier Clubs sponsored in summer, 1990. Four months later, when she came to spend a few days with us in Texas before she took Steeler home, she already knew the basics of pulling from practicing on the ever patient Nikki. We spent the long weekend pulling more hair and trimming, and Heather left for Nevada with more techniques under the belt. By last spring, her pictures of Steeler and Nikki showed that she was coming along, even though she was having to do it the hard way, far from help. No Regional Clubs near, and no Scottie breeder close enough to critique her grooming! She had only an intermittent "fix" on Scotties at one of the very occasional Nevada dog shows, plus ideas from the STCA grooming manual, and lots of study of photos in the BAGPIPER.

Heather complained that she was having trouble in a couple areas—getting ear tufts right, for instance. However, I knew from the pictures she sent how far she had come in a year or less of regulation pulling and trimming. I thought the best way to emphasize her progress was to send her a picture of our first Scottie that I had recently run across in an old photo album. I wanted Heather to know that after only a year she was already far ahead of me when I was grooming that 11-year-old first Scottie in the picture.

Our first Scottish Terrier, Rob-Scot's Thistle McWilkins, AKA "Scooter," had been sent to us from Miami to Kansas in 1967 by my husband's parents, Bob and Billie Zimmerman, who made a brief foray into breeding. From their first litter, Scooter was very heavy in Blanche Reeg's old Blanart line. We had fun finding Scooter's famous ancestors in the Scottish Terrier books: Ch. Blanart Bacarolle, Ch. Blanart Barrister, Ch. Blanart Bolero and so on. We recognized other famous kennels in the pedigree, too, Wyrebury, Crescent Hill, Kinclaven, and more.

We'll always remember that first Scottie which introduced us to the breed. On that thought, I sat down to write some breeders who have had success in the ring. I didn't hear from all I wrote, but here is a good sampling. The success of these breeders/exhibitors is certainly measurable. Scottish Terriers they have owned and/or bred have won spots in the Top Ten in STCA Lloyd and Sandissy competition. Read these breeder's own stories. I have added photos where possible. Regretfully, several breeders did not have pictures of their very first dogs, but did send a photo of one of their early Scotties.

Perhaps in the future when we sent out beautiful champion photographs to prospective owners, we should all also send a picture of our first Scottie. What better hope for the beginner!

A Scottish Terrier has been an important part of my life since I was 10 years old. Up to that time, our family had owned several kinds of dogs: long-haired, short-haired, purebred, and mixed. bacon. This she accepted, matter-of-factly and consumed with such dignity that it struck us as quite comical. Evidently she perceived that we were her kind of folks, for the morning visit became a routine event. Soon she was spending more time with us than with her owner.

When our vacation ended, Misty went home with us. Her owner was finally persuaded to part with Misty for a price. In the early thirties, it was a good sum, but we paid it cheerfully, because by then leaving without the shaggy-coated little charmer was unthinkable.

Misty was somewhat sway-backed, I remember, but I can't recall too much about her overall conformation. I do remember her tiny ears, her lovely expression, and the bright little eyes that revealed such intelligence.

This one had a mind, all right--a mind of her own! We subsequently learned that this trait was typical of the breed, but that was small comfort to the person standing out in the rain or the cold, raw wind waiting for her to complete her "chores." The wilder the weather, the better she liked it, and more reluctant she was to come indoors. She loved to "smell" the wind. She would turn and lift her head into the teeth of it, and no amount of pleading, scolding or outright screaming would budge her until she either had her fill or knew in her own canny way that she had pushed us just short of the brink. At this point, she would turn, look at us steadily, wag her tail briefly, and trot jauntily toward the house.

She had a passion for balls, too. My father, an avid golfer, always turned his old golf balls over to her for final disposition. One evening he carelessly left his straw hat and three brand new Spaulding "Dot" balls in the couch in our sun room. Misty demolished the balls and vented the hat, and as I recall, was barely reprimanded. For less than this, I would have had a hair brush applied where it would have done the most good, but Misty was always able to get away with murder.

The number of words she knew and responded to was phenomenal, and she had an uncanny sense of hearing. She could recognize the crackle of a candy wrapper or the crunch of a potato chip from any part of the house. She was a great believer in sharing, especially if she were on the

receiving end. She shared all our between meal tidbits and managed to maintain a slim and beguiling figure in spite of it. She shared my bed at night, preferring either the pillows or dead center. During my various childhood illnesses, she stayed in my room and would leave only for absolute necessities.

Best of all, however, we shared many blissful hours in the "outdoors," which we both loved. Weekends and summer vacations found us trudging across the miles of government land that bounded our home on three sides, exploring the woods, meadows, valleys, streams, and of course, all suspicious gopher holes. Misty was happiest when padding along the muddy edges of creeks and streams. Her furnishing would cake together with mud and brambles, which meant an hour's work for me with brush and comb.

To me, Misty was a charming "little person," my favorite companion, and my most faithful and loyal friend. Her entry into my life was the greatest pleasure of my childhood, and her departure from it my first experience with great sorrow and prolonged grief. Thanks to my early introduction to this captivating breed, there have been many wonderful Scotties in my life, and I am sure there will be many, many more.

thing from my mind. I wanted a small, rugged, masculine dog, a Scottish Terrier for a pal, a real friend. And, boy did I find one!

That fall I visited the Rock Creek K.C. show, and although I did not arrive in time to see Scotties, the catalogue advertised the Scottish Terrier Club of Washington's Specialty and listed Renee Johnson, secretary. I called and was cordially invited to a club meeting and the Specialty that October.

To my untrained eye, the Scotties at that Specialty all looked alike. It was intriguing that a slender young woman with short blonde hair and whose name was Bergit seemed to be winning everything. Then, the champions entered the ring, and they all did not look alike anymore. I spotted the small rugged, masculine type. The catalogue listed him as Ch. Anstamm Happy Venture. He had, for me, the look! (Murray was handled that day by Nancy Donovan.)

Interestingly, the catalogue advertised a litter of Happy Venture ex Glendale's Misty Heather owned by Ed and Jean McCormick of Ferndale, MD. We then followed him to the grooming area, and he introduced us to Bob Bartos. I was in awe. This was the man I had seen on TV with Bingo.

The AKC rep was Jimmy Butler, a man with a great reputation and a legend as a handler. Bob Bartos was polite, but firm. He was very busy, but would take the time if we truly wanted to learn. We assured him we did. He then spent 45 minutes with us. He completely redid our bitch's head, pointed out our mistakes.

The following weekend we took her out and won a 5-point major. She finished with two more 5-point majors, owner-handled. Her name was Ch. Mountview's Tabatha. Tabatha was the dam of Ch. Heathcliff II, a dog we sold to Ron and Lois Giese, who was the the start of the Clanronald dogs and our own Besscotts.

We will always be grateful for each of these men who took time to help and encourage us.

At the dog shows we do get very busy, but it is important after the judging to try to spend some time to help newcomers if they ask.

Do not give up. Number 5 was our lucky number, and each one prior to that taught us something and gave us a very deep love for this wonderful breed.
