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Update from Harry Hicks Chairman for the STCA Canine Legislation Committee

Regional Clubs: Kentucky reports that several puppy mills have been closed and at least one owner has been imprisoned (D. Miles, Liaison, STCGL)

Nationwide: From January through March there have been 49 reports of canine legislation across the U.S. By far the greatest activity has been in dangerous dog legislation with 8 out of 17 bills being breed specific. Both AKC and the Dog Club Canine Legislation Liaison continue to be active in combating this breed-specific attitude.

Last November a trade bill was signed into law which makes it illegal to import or export dog or cat pelts. Beginning January 31, Britain

extended its quarantine reduction actions to include Australia, New Zealand, Singapore and Hawaii.

The recent change in the presidential administration portends an unsettled canine control atmosphere until all appointments have been made and policies established. Appointments in the USDA appear to be favorable for the dog fancy. However, access to air travel for dogs continues to be of concern. AKC has launched a letter writing campaign to airlines and government legislatures and have enlisted active participation from all dog breeders and exhibitors. Detailed information has been forwarded to regional clubs.

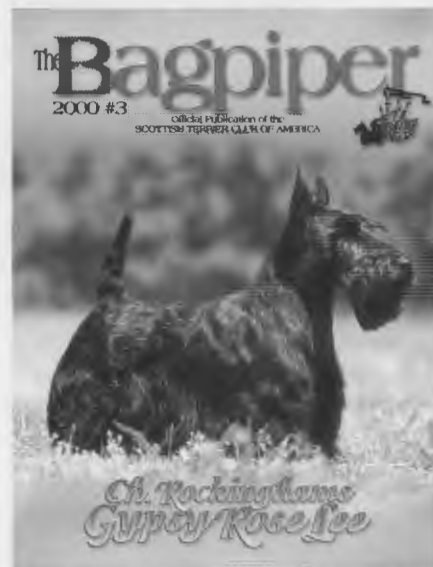

Helen Prince, the STCA delegate to AKC, is the contact person.

The results of our first health survey are discussed. Health Trust Fund News

We are happy to report that your Health Trust Fund supported projects are making progress.

Dr. Jerold Bell writes that, thanks to the publicity raised about his HTF funded study, 12 new suspected cases of Cerebellar Abiotrophy have come forward and are being investigated at this time. The process involves a telephone interview with the owner to obtain background information, the making

of a videotape, and, if warranted, a clinical confirmation of the suspected diagnosis by a veterinarian qualified to do so. Making use of STCA member Mary O'Neal's outstanding and masterful Scottish Terrier Pedigree Search Database, Dr. Bell is conducting his pedigree analysis to track the common genetic lines back several decades. He will soon be able to do a full genetic epidemiological study of the pedigree information to help breeders understand where this low frequency disorder comes from and how best to avoid it in our breeding stock. More from Dr. Bell in the near future.

On the bladder cancer front, the Purdue University Oncology researchers are busy collecting names and contact information from Scottie owners willing to participate in the new Transitional Cell Carcinoma study, Canine Health Foundation Grant #2105. Dr. Knapp and Dr. Glickman are also preparing the detailed questionnaire for distribution to the participants. So far, there has been a tremendous response from the Scottie community to the request for "cases" and "controls" for this study. And the Purdue team could use even more! The more data that can be collected, the more significant the conclusions will be. See the separate article in this issue of *The Bagpiper* for more information.

Robert and Moira Anderson sent in a sizeable sum for bladder cancer research,

representing monies raised from a raffle held during the "I Love My Scottish Terrier Grooming and Handling Workshop" in Greenville, SC, July 14-15. Charla and Kari Hill conducted the workshop for 24 eager participants who traveled to Greenville from several surrounding states for an intense two-day workshop. Grooming and handling skills at both the beginner and advanced levels were taught, and participants bought raffle tickets for

several donated Scottie prizes. Winning tickets were drawn during the final lunch, and everyone came away a winner. Our Scotties are the ultimate winners when we all contribute so generously for Scottish Terrier health!

Judges' Education Article

A belated thank you for all those people who shared their thoughts, their dogs, and their time to make the 2001 Rotating Specialty Judges' Education Seminar a success. Well, in my eyes, it was successful. I hope those who attended felt the same.

There are always parts of a presentation that, in afterthought, one would have done differently. Like fine wine, I only hope it gets better.

When I asked participants to prioritize their "must haves" in a Scottish Terrier, my point was to emphasize that a judge must do just that when judging competitive animals in the ring. It's not always easy. What attributes are found in one exhibit may be lacking in another; however, that same exhibit might excel in other areas, again, providing the judge with the question, "On

what basis shall I place these dogs today?"

What came to my attention, after the evening was over, was the fact that Scottie people love a little food for thought for dessert. Your comments were appreciated.

Some individuals have indicated to me that it is now time to study the standard to see if revisions or changes are in order. While it may not seem like it, it has been almost eight years since that last took place.

The STCA has developed excellent educational materials through the years. If, at any point in time, a STCA member comes across information that he/she feels would be beneficial, don't hesitate to pass it along.

While I feel we have done an excellent job of educating judges; we must continue to improve on what has become an integral

part of AKC's judging approval process. How can we expect judges to do a good job judging if we give them inaccurate or incomplete information. I truly would appreciate any thoughts on the subject so that we can continue to educate judges about the breed so dear to our hearts.

The STCA will be represented at the American Dog Show institute in August. Another wonderful opportunity for prospective judges to learn about our breed.

Again, I was truly impressed with your willingness to have your exhibits examined by prospective judges. It was appreciated; thanks. For your information my new e-mail address is jbrwkl@prairienet.net.

Zilly-Zagging Weave Poles

BY SUSAN HARNED
 OBEDIENCE AND PERFORMANCE EDITOR

Mention weave poles to most novice Agility people and the response is -a long moan. But weaves should be fun! I train with all twelve of the poles in a upright position right from the start. I use clicker and food as motivation and a technique I call "Zilly Zagging" Using an exaggerated hand signal and facing but not getting too close to the weaves I tell the dog "go weave" and the dog takes the entrance on the first pole. I click and treat and then immediately turn so I am walking backward next to the weaves. I use my hand and inside leg as a guide along with a

voice command. The dog is then being pulled, rather than pushed through the poles.

I discovered this technique worked quite by accident, at a trial a few years ago. Zilly was not getting the weaves and on this particular open course, she ended up not where I expected after an obstacle and I had to call her to me with my back to the weaves. She flew through with ease and had an expression on her face that looked as though the "light bulb" had finally come on. At a later training session I added the clicker to reinforce her

entrances, (she was already training in obedience with clicker and thought it was wonderful). She became in love with the weaves! If I moved in more of a dance mode she did too. I have taught all my Scotties in this way and I teach most of my students the "Zilly Zag" as well. Walking backward on uneven ground isn't for everyone but I have found that all the dogs respond very well.

Try it, put some "Zilly Zag" in your training; you might be surprised.

Website Review by Joanne Kinnelly

Mary O'Neal's Scottish Terrier Pedigree Website

"Dear Mary, I just wanted to take a moment to say a heartfelt thank you for all the time you have taken to teach me about pedigrees, the patience you have had in answering my questions. ... You have helped me understand through sharing your knowledge, that the integrity of this breed is important." Michelle Nuckles.

Michelle Nuckles is a Scottie fancier who has been able to learn about well-bred Scotties in a new way.

"Mary" is our own Mary O'Neal and she has rendered an invaluable service to all Scottish Terrier owners. She has given us a new tool to use in many ways to benefit our breed.

Mary is a mom, grandma, and active STCM and STCA member, who breeds and shows Scotties. She has worked for Handler George Ward and is currently kennel manager of the West Highland White Terrier, Wire Fox Terrier and Jack Russell Terrier "Round Town Kennel" of Dan and Amelia Musser.

In 1999, she began entering thousands of Scottish Terrier pedigrees into a database and recently, with the help of Michele Fujawa, she has them available to everyone on a web page.

Since she lives nearby, I had a chance to talk her more about how all this came about.

Mary, what made you interested in a project like this?

A. "I have always been interested in pedigrees. When I had Arabian horses, I traced their pedigrees back to the desert. I decided to buy a record and pedigree program for my computer. I tried several programs, but ended up buying one compatible to the database program I use a lot. It also supplied the conversion software for the files for the web page."

Where did you start?

A. "I had Dr. Tom Kirk's pedigree book and was entering it for my own use. I was very slow at typing when I started in November of 1999, so it was very hard going. I was looking for more data, so I purchased the Camino book of Scottish Terrier Champions from 1954 to 1980. It just sort of grew from there.

"When I worked for George Ward, I made copies of all the Scottie pages of all the old Montgomery catalogs he has. I entered all the dogs from 1967 to last year. I borrowed a lot of the Rotating catalogs and did those too.

"I occasionally e-mailed back and forth with Chris Hunter, who is doing the new English pedigree books. I made a couple of friends at Wee Scots this past year and one, Carol Adams, has been invaluable in helping with the English pedigrees. I ordered the English pedigree books and, when I got them, I added them to the database."

How did you get the idea to create a website?

A. "I had all this data and nothing to do with it. The Cairn Club had put up a pedigree website and I looked at it and thought, "I have the data, all we need is someone to do the web page." I e-mailed the URL to Michele Fujawa and asked, "Can we do this?" She ordered the software and the page was born.

"Since the website began, Kristy Hoare from South Africa sent me pedigrees from there. Others have sent me pedigrees from Germany, Poland, Holland and Finland. Darle Heck has sent me 4,000 pedigrees from Canada."

How is the site kept updated?

"I keep all the data and Michele does the page. As all the data must be changed over to the files that the web page uses, we decided to update the site weekly. I do the changes and continue to add new dogs on my database and send the updates to Michele every Sunday."

What is left to do?

A. "I have a book coming from Finland. I still need to enter the files from Darle Heck. I have the AKC Studbooks from 1970 to the present time. My program will support 200,000 dogs. I intend to enter all the Scotties that have ever been bred and are listed in the studbooks I have. This will allow anyone who has a Scottie, puppy mill, pet, or show, to be able to trace the dog back as far as I can get data. At the rate I am going, I think just entering the data will take another two years."

To see Mary's work for yourself, visit her Scottish Terrier Pedigree website at <http://scottish-terriers.com/pedigree/search.html>. Try looking up your own dog. It's gratifying to see him there among all the other Scottish Terriers. Now, look up other Scots you know and continue on to new ones you've heard of or seen and would like to know more about.

Just browsing through the site is interesting and fun, and the benefits to the breed are enormous. The differences between a well bred Scot and a commercially produced one become apparent. Veterinary researchers can look up pedigrees and immediately discuss breeding alternatives and ways to steer around problems. Scottish Terrier Club researchers can identify Register of Merit sires and dams and more easily measure the impact of individual dogs on the breed. Breed historians and writers have access to correct information. Breeders can easily look at pedigrees of potential sires. Individual owners can learn more about the origin of their own dogs and about the breed as a whole.

Mary, to quote Michelle Nuckles, "You are a remarkable lady! Thank you..."

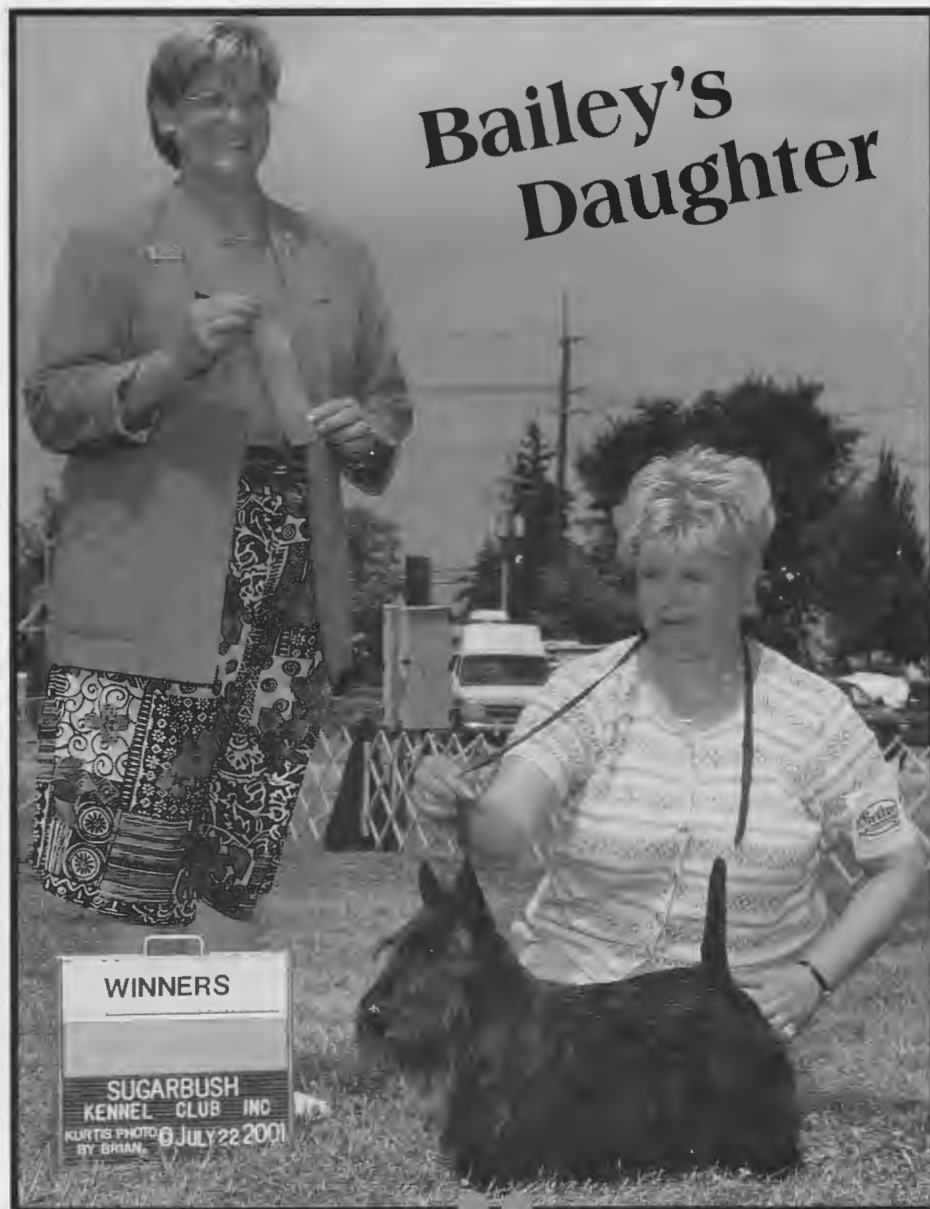

The Scottie world suffered a great loss with the passing of Robert Graham. After Bob's retirement as vice president of engineering with Rome Cable Corp., the Grahams moved to Charlottesville in 1978. Most of his time and energy was directed to the advancement and sport of pure-breed dogs. Bob served on the Board of Directors of the American Kennel Club for 14 years, and was both an AKC Club delegate and licensed dog show judge for more than 25 years. His love of the sport never wavered. The Central New York Kennel Club (CNYKC) in general, recently commemorated his long-term contributions to our breed, and to the dog world. He was the first judge I showed under...it was a fun and enjoyable experience I will always remember. And now, the CNYKC has insured the Rome Police Department will always remember him, too.

He not only met me at the airport for all the meetings but made sure I was introduced to all of the "right" people and made the meetings less formidable. I've heard stories of how he herded the entire Judging Panel for Montgomery around every year to make sure they were all where they were suppose to be on time. After Claribel passed away he just couldn't seem to manage and spent a lot of time grieving. Even then his doctors suggest he get a kitten for company. I got a call from him wanting to know everything about caring for it, including diet and toys, always needing to do everything correctly. Even though we only talked on the phone every couple of months I sincerely miss him and hope he met Claribel and all his Scotties on the Rainbow Bridge.

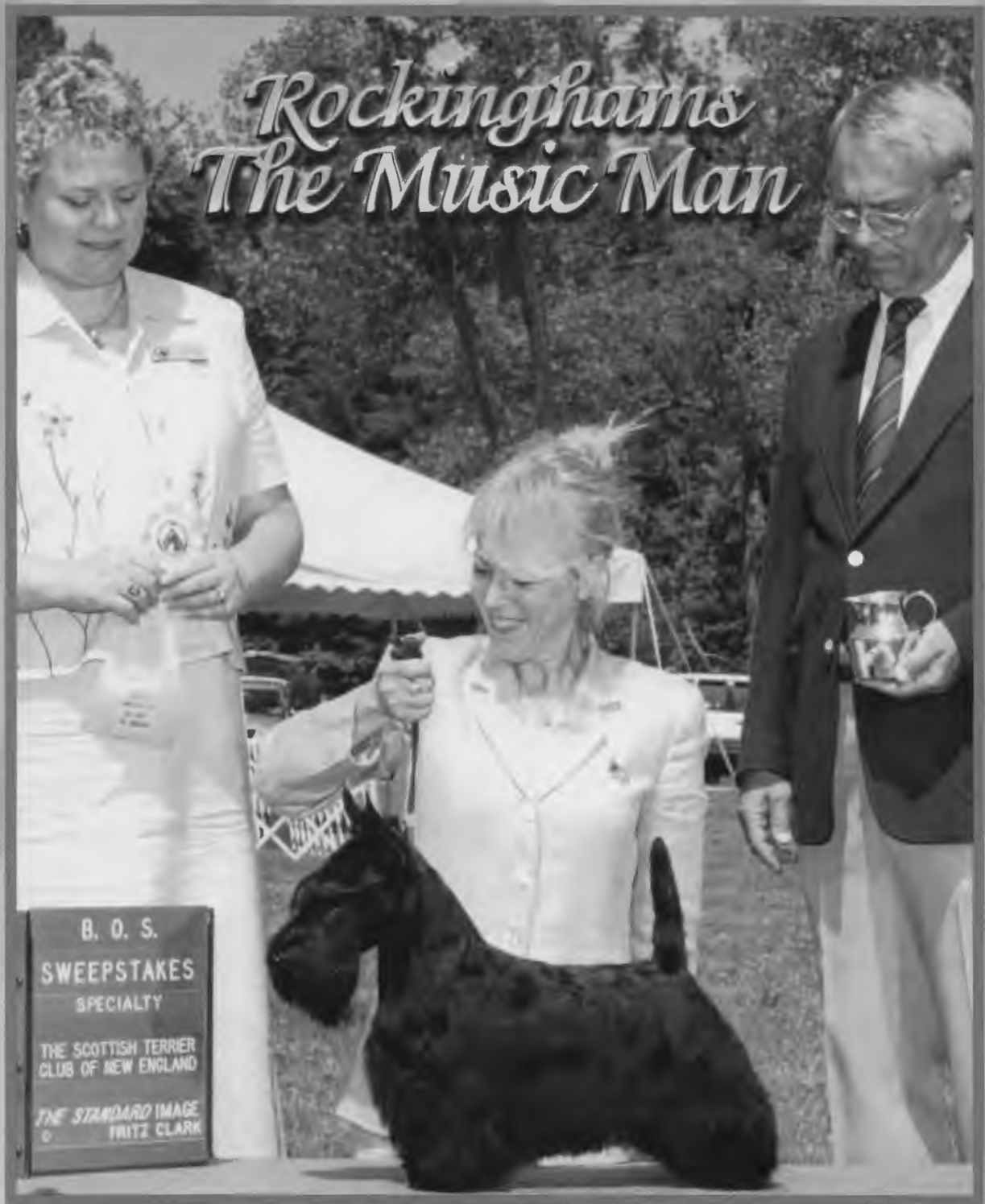

HELP NEEDED

for

Purdue Bladder Cancer Study

The Purdue University Oncology Team, headed by Dr. Deborah Knapp, has begun to collect data for the Scottie Bladder Cancer study and needs your help right away!

This study will consist of two groups of Scotties: the "Cases", or those affected with Transitional Cell Carcinoma (TCC), and the "Controls", those not affected with TCC. This study will involve a comparison of the two groups of Scotties with respect to several potential risk factors in the environment, including but not limited to foods, water supply, drug use, insecticide use, and second hand smoke. The Purdue Team needs to hear from anyone who is willing and able to participate in this study and whose dog meets certain criteria to be included in either group.

Important note: This study will involve your time only in carefully answering a very detailed and confidential questionnaire. **Nothing will be required of your Scottie, and your dog can be included even if he or she is no longer alive.**

CRITERIA

Cases: To be included as a case in the study, your Scottie has to have been diagnosed with TCC between the dates of January 1, 1995 up to the present time. This diagnosis has to have been made from a tissue biopsy by a lab and a copy of the pathology report will be requested. If the diagnosis was made from cells collected in urine or from a needle aspirate (a diagnosis by cytology), the Purdue team would still like to

hear from you. Only one TCC case dog per household can be included.

Controls: To be included as a control, a Scottie must have turned 6 years or older within the time frame listed above and cannot have had any history of urinary tract problems of any kind, including TCC, urinary tract infections, bladder stones, or any prostate disorder. (**Note:** Intact male Scotties normally have a prostate up to 4 times larger than other breeds, so prostate size in itself, with no clinical signs, is not a reason for exclusion from the study). Only one control dog per household can be included, and a control and a case cannot be from the same household.

What You Can Do

The Purdue team is requesting that up to 50 Cases and 100 Controls be submitted, so the Scottie community needs to step up to bat for the health of all Scotties!

If you now have or have had a Scottie that meets the criteria for inclusion in either of the two groups, and if you are willing to participate by carefully filling out a detailed and confidential questionnaire, **please** contact the Purdue team member listed below as soon as possible. You will need to submit the following preliminary information:

- Your name, address, phone number and e-mail address;
- Your Scottie's name and age;
- The date of diagnosis (approximate) and the method of diagnosis (biopsy, cytology),
- The name and contact information of your veterinarian.

If you are including one of your Scotties in this study as a "Case" or "Control" and know of another Scottie that would qualify as another Case or a Control, **please** submit the name(s) of the owner(s) so the Purdue researchers can make contact.

The Fire Within

Recently, upon placing my Scottish Terrier on the table at a show, the judge asked if my dog was one of those "attack trained Scotties?" The judge had earlier dismissed a dog for aggressive behavior, and commented that he had wanted to excuse more for the same reason – he was furious at what he was seeing in his ring. He then asked if I thought this was becoming a problem in the Scottish Terrier breed, and I could only answer "Yes, unfortunately".

This triggered a deeper curiosity about the breed's temperament – how was it viewed in the past, and whether there had been a significant change. I turned to my collection of books on the Scottish Terrier and began searching for references to the breed's temperament. The quote that appeared consistently was that the Scottie should display "real terrier spirit". That seemed a vague and indefensible statement for it really gives such broad latitude in interpretation. Another quote that appeared in the English Standard was that the Scottish Terrier "should be willing to go anywhere and do anything". That seemed an appropriate quote, for it implied a dog that was sure of itself, in control of its instincts, displayed courage, and yet was welcomed wherever it went. However, that may no longer be the case, as many of the dogs one sees today don't fit that description.

While attending dog shows over the past several years, I have witnessed a growing problem with temperament inside the Scottish Terrier breed ring, aggression directed at both dogs and humans. For the 14 years I have been involved with the breed, I have been fighting the negative reputation the Scottish Terrier has with the general public – that of an untrustworthy, mean, and aggressive dog. When taking my three dogs to the park during their daily walks, people shy away because of their past experiences with Scottish Terriers. They are truly surprised to find my mild mannered dogs responsive to not only their friendly overtures, but also to their dogs. That's when I hear the many stories of their bad experiences with our breed. At all-breed conformation shows, when heading

to the ring with my dog, I hear quips such as "Give those Scottie's plenty of room, they'll take your arm off." When I first attended earthdog trials, the other handlers pulled their dogs away because of their past encounters with Scottish Terriers – they now know my dogs well enough to feel at ease around them. But this raises the question: is this really the reputation we want our breed to have, not only within the dog community but also with the general public? I wouldn't think so, but that is the perception of our breed.

Time and again, Scottish Terriers are being shown in the conformation ring out of control; dogs are being groomed with muzzles on them; handlers are bitten; exhibitors ask others in the ring to give their dogs plenty of room; and judges, grinning as they watch dogs whirl and spin around on their leads as their handlers try to bring them under control, put these dogs up not only as Winners Dog or Bitch, but often as Best of Breed.

To pose another question: in which other breed ring is this behavior tolerated? I know of none, in fact the 1997 AKC Standard for the Jack Russell Terrier (the last breed to enter the Terrier Group) states: "Overt aggression towards another dog or human" shall constitute a disqualification. Yet it appears that we are breeding for this trait and are encouraging judges to reward this behavior with wins, often major wins, leading to their championships, and setting the standard for our breed. In most show rings, judges would excuse dogs with such attitudes, and any judge who has the wherewithal to do just that should be applauded. These dogs pose a threat not only to the other dogs (and I've seen blood drawn in the ring where nothing was done), but also to their handlers, the judges, and the other exhibitors. Could this be a reason why entries at Specialties are falling? Exhibitors may not want to take the risk of entering the ring with some of these dogs of questionable temperament.

Unfortunately, people now come to watch a potential bloodsport in the Scottish Terrier ring. Last year, I found myself describing to someone in the audience at a Specialty what sparring should be as we

watched the judge bring dogs out to spar. I explained that the out-of-control behaviors we were witnessing was not the intent; these people were genuinely disappointed as they enjoyed what they were seeing! This may coincide with the growing popularity of events such as professional wrestling and the general coarsening of American culture, but it has no place in the conformation ring in the sport of purebred dogs. This display has crossed the line of what sparring was intended to demonstrate as referenced in publications by the Scottish Terrier Club of America. The STCA's 1980 "Clarification and Amplification of the Scottish Terrier Standard" (reprinted in 1985), states:

"Sparring is sometimes a useful judging tool but should be done under carefully controlled conditions and only as directed by the judge. In no case should dogs be directed to come in actual contact with each other. A reasonably close "eyeball to eyeball" look is sufficient."

In the 1999 STCA publication "A Study of the Scottish Terrier", the explanation is further expanded:

"What one should see is a confident, tough little dog who won't back down from a challenge. When sparring, the dog should collect himself and appear on full alert, tail and ears up with excitement. He may stare down his opposition or look away, as if to give the other dogs the opportunity to leave with their dignity and their hides intact. If the other dogs don't back down, he may start a ruckus, but he should return to control when asked to do so by his handler. Sparring should never make a Scottie uncontrollable. After sparring, a Scottie should walk away with an air of strength, and firmness to signify confidently that he has asserted his superiority like a gentleman"

In the revised 1999 version, the latitude given when sparring dogs has grown to accommodate some of the behaviors seen in today's ring. The statement, "leave with their dignity and their hides intact" is disturbing as it implies that the temperament of the Scottish Terrier now allows for the physical attack of another dog in such circumstances. Under this definition, sparring

is no longer simply allowing the dogs to pull themselves together, to get the tail and ears up, for the judge to make a final evaluation of the dogs, but crosses over into condoning in-ring aggression.

It is most troubling that when aggressive dogs exit the ring a winner, other breeders congratulate them saying, "He'll make a great stud dog!" Just think about that statement and realize what kind of puppies these dogs will produce and where they will be placed. Out of their litters, realistically 50 to 75% of the puppies will be sold to pet homes. What does the future hold for these puppies? Many will face a bleak life if breeders won't admit to there being a problem in their lines, and most pet owners don't know how to handle aggressive dogs. Therefore, their owners will destroy some, others will show up in Rescue, a few will show up in shelters (along with the reinforced public perception of an aggressive breed, which will hinder their chances for adoption), and some will be turned back to their breeders for an uncertain future. Rescue organizations that receive dogs with temperament problems sometimes face the heartbreaking decision of putting them down as unsalvageable before ever being placed - they simply can't take the risk as some of these dogs literally bite the hand that feeds them, and bite the Rescue volunteers during their evaluation period. Every puppy deserves the best opportunity we can provide, and we owe it to each one delivered to have a chance at a full life where they aren't quarantined to the kitchen or basement, locked in a crate, or staked and chained in the back yard because of their temperament.

So what can we do as those involved in maintaining and promoting the breed? Several things come to mind, but I encourage everyone to think seriously about this issue:

1. Admit the presence of a potential problem. Temperament problems are often written off quickly by breeders as a result of "the home environment", certainly not of their breeding practices. But in some cases, it manifests itself in littermates raised in two completely different homes, and this suggests that there is a potential genetic problem instead of merely an environmental one. The home environment can certainly influence temperaments, both positively and negatively, but when a dog has a predisposition to aggression, there are very different ways of raising that

puppy than when raising a puppy without aggressive tendencies. Breeders need to be just as forthcoming with an admission of this characteristic in their breeding program as they were when many bravely bit the bullet and admitted to having von Willebrand's Disease, cramp, or seizures in their bloodlines. They need to maintain a long-range view of what is best for the Scottish Terrier at the central core of their breeding decisions.

2. Socialize your Scottish Terriers. In the The Kennelgarth Scottish Terrier Book, Betty Penn-Bull noted that "The average dog is responsive to training and he is 50% born and 50% made, so upbringing is important." This underscores the need to identify and correct aggressive behaviors early. An important period in any young dog's life is socialization, with both humans and other dogs. I am a firm believer that many a Scottish Terrier is perceived as aggressive merely for the fact that it has been kept isolated behind a fence or in a kennel most of its life. The dogs that are socialized, walked in public, exposed to a wide variety of experiences and other dogs from early puppyhood, will learn quickly that everything need not be challenged. When interviewing prospective buyers, breeders should also ask about their willingness and commitment to socialize and interact with their new puppy.

3. Learn ring etiquette. If an owner decides to show their dog in the conformation ring, they must learn how to control their dog. This means taking a conformation class and asking the instructor to spar those breeds that may be sparring, and learn how to approach the other dogs in the ring. Most importantly, your dog will display cues of its intended actions, so learn your dog's body language, what it means, and how you can pre-empt inappropriate behavior. The class ring is the perfect place to teach your dog what is and is not acceptable in the conformation ring.

4. Physical problems. Dogs can become aggressive or reactive when in pain or they feel vulnerable. For example, a dog I knew began to display aggression on the table when the judge examined the bite. The owner was perplexed as this had happened rather suddenly and couldn't understand why the dog, which had displayed such an even temperament, should suddenly change. After much thought and discussion, she found that the dog had chipped a

canine tooth. Whenever the judge or someone reached to open the mouth, the dog was experiencing pain, and thus was growling - not out of aggression, but out of a reaction to pain. Bitches coming into season can also live up to their namesake when they feel insecure, and it's best to leave them at home at such times. Make sure there are no underlying physical problems that may be causing a dog to act aggressively.

We must start paying more attention to temperament when we breed Scottish Terriers. Remember, these dogs originally were bred to hunt, often in packs, and an out of control dog was of no use to the owner or the rest of the pack. The dog that was in control of itself and its instincts was highly prized, for it could do its job with courage and posed a threat to no one. Aggression has been selectively bred and nurtured into the breed as a "desirable" trait for the show ring, and it's time to reverse this course and breed for even temperament. Most books from the early twentieth century laud the even temperament of the Scottish Terrier, many commenting on the dour nature of the breed. This now seems to be very much in jeopardy. In reality, the modern show dogs career will last only 2 to 3 years, yet the remainder of their lives, as well as their offspring's lives, will hopefully last 12 to 14 years. To ask yet another question: what carries the most value in this equation - the few minutes spent in the show ring those odd weekends for 2 to 3 years, or the hours and days the dog spends as a trusted part of the family with whom they live? The answer should be evident.

As more and more communities and counties are considering vicious dog ordinances, do we want the Scottish Terrier listed among those breeds that are banned within corporate limits? Do we want our breed listed along with those breeds that are not allowed to walk the street without a muzzle, to be potentially seized and destroyed because of neighbor complaints or fear of the aggression we have selectively bred into them for the show ring? Again, most in the Scottish Terrier fancy would say "Of course not", yet the potential is there to face this future.

There should be a fire burning within the Scottish Terrier, absolutely. But that fire needs to be under control. When the dogs enter the conformation ring, go for a walk, or are released in an earthdog trial,

they should exude confidence, courage, and yet "should never be quarrelsome", as Marvin states. If they are sparring in the show ring, they should pull themselves together, four feet solidly on the ground with head and tail up, so that we can truly admire the beauty of the Scottish Terrier, not fear for their or their handlers safety. We owe it to the Scottish Terrier to once again breed for even temperament, so that not only those of us who admire the breed can be delighted with their character, but future generations of dogs can be welcomed and admired for their "go anywhere and do anything" spirit.

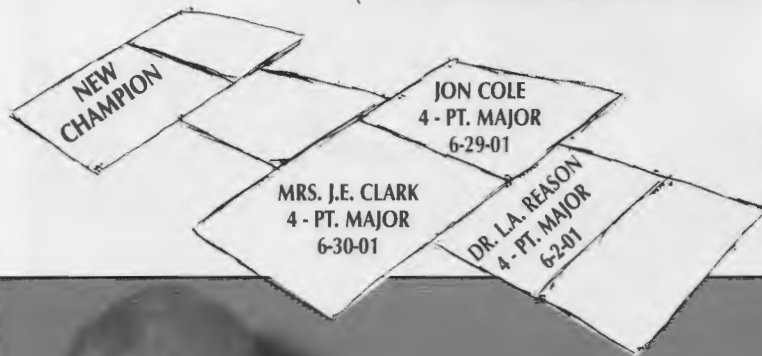

Colorado Wheatens

This story is a little different from the 'normal' rescue. But, then it seems that every rescue is just a little different. As with most stories we have a heroine (our Rescue Angel) and a villain (the puppy farm owner).

Our first personal knowledge of this particular operation had come more than 10 years earlier with a series of phone calls and notes inquiring as to the availability of a wheaten scottie, as a pet for their nice older family. They had, supposedly, seen the boy we were specializing at that time at the show in their community and were very taken by the "unusual color" and had been looking for a new companion. There was something that didn't ring true, so we called a scottie contact, our Rescue Angel, from that area to inquire about knowledge of this person and were quickly told the truth. The "family" was an older woman running a puppy farm, looking for "stock". Boy, that's one phone call we were glad we made!!

Thanks to the same Rescue Angel, Rocky Mountain Scottish Terrier Club (RMSTC) Rescue later acquired a black scottie from this place. This poor little boy never recovered from his experience and lived his remaining life in the home of our Rescue Chairpersons. He made some progress under their care and love, but was never stable enough to place.

This story is set in picturesque southwestern Colorado, an area of extreme beauty and serenity; small town America at its best - with a glimpse of its worse. A worn sign posted in a yard advertising 15 breeds of puppies for sale, with the "AKC Registered" portion painted over - an old railroad car rusting on the property behind the sign housing the operation, should be an warning to any potential buyer.

Our Rescue Angel had her day well planned with a long list of things to be done. That is, until she picked up her local paper and read an ad - great breeding stock available from a local puppy farm going out of business. I'm sure this ad was met with mixed emotions. On one hand, going out of business

was long overdue. On the other hand, were there scotties involved and what could she do, not to mention concern for the other "stock". I doubt there was more than a moment's hesitation before she picked up the phone to make that first call that would change the lives of so many innocent dogs and touch the lives of many people in the dog community. Yes, there was a breeding pair of wheaten scotties available, so she negotiated a price. That well planned day, and days to follow, evaporated. In my mind, I picture rubber burning as our Angel backed out of her driveway on her way to make this very special "purchase".

We all know that purchasing dogs for rescue is strongly discouraged. We just can't buy dogs from everyone wanting to "get rid" of a scottie. But, each circumstance and the ability of your local rescue effort, has to be considered on an individual basis. Our Angel would have done this with or without the support of RMSTC, but with our long time knowledge of this operation there was no question that we would do whatever was needed to get any scotties out of there. We are also blessed with a membership that strongly supports our rescue effort, so we had the resources to take on this challenge.

Our Angel picked up the "couple". I'm sure it was extremely difficult for her to leave with just two dogs, when it was obvious that there were so many others that needed help. She got her precious cargo to the vet for an examination, vaccinations, etc. Her initial evaluation was that the boy (dubbed "Squirt") would be easily adoptable. The girl ("Lady Dog") would be more difficult to place and was probably older than represented, but what was of more curiosity and concern was that she was GREEN. She was given an immediate medicated bath. A local kennel was able to board them pending their transport to Denver. Our Angel contacted a friend, who became Rescue Angel 2, and RMSTC Rescue Chair. Our Rescue Chair, in turn, contacted the All Breed Rescue Network (ABRN), a Denver

based coalition of breed clubs and individual pure breed dog owners who are dedicated to their respective breed rescues. Thanks to networking, within hours the ball began to roll. Angel 2 contacted the puppy farm owner, representing herself as a potential buyer and made an appointment to see the "stock" being offered. When this happened, it must have been overwhelming to go into this horrid place and see the conditions that existed for the more than 100 dogs she found housed in the old railroad car. There were Westies, Pugs, Pokes, Shih Tzus, Yorkies and Silkies (and combinations), Schnauzers, Min Pins, etc., and a second pair of wheaten scotties that she was able to negotiate for and bring to safety. This second pair (Mr. And Mrs.) was also taken for vet care. Again the boy was more adoptable than the girl.

What happened within a short period of time is mind boggling. The local all breed kennel club stepped up to plate. Angel and Angel 2 took charge. Both lost time from work, endless hours of moving dogs, finding places too for them, taking care of their needs and making sure they were safe. After physical and mental exhaustion, adrenaline took over. Local and some National breed rescues were contacted. A private benefactor advanced ABRN \$10,000 for the purpose of getting dogs out of this horrid place, with the understanding it would be reimbursed as dogs were placed. In all 105 dogs were purchased, this puppy farm was ABSOLUTELY OUT OF BUSINESS!!! Those dogs not taken into a breed rescue program, were fostered by individuals within ABRN.

None of the dogs had any identification or papers of any kind. This was not a USDA or state licensed facility. We know this operation had lost its AKC privileges in the mid-90s. We were able to find out what AKC registered Scotties they owned at that time, which went back to, but were not directly out of, some known kennels. The dogs involved here were too young to be any of those, though they may be out of those dogs. There is also evi-

dence that some of the dogs in this facility had originally been family pets, since they are housebroken, well socialized and trained, etc. UKC wouldn't register the stock because of the AKC suspension. We feel that whoever was brokering the puppies was probably providing papers of some sort. The facility had been under scrutiny by the State Veterinarian and local Humane Society and was being inspected on a regular basis due to infractions of local ordinances. Most of the dogs were in reasonable condition, in spite of their primary diet of stale white bread and horrible living conditions.

It took multiple trips by various groups to get all the dogs that were not kept in the local community to foster homes. On one trip on a glorious Rocky Mountain Fall day, two vehicles from each direction drove part way to meet and bring our special cargo that included the 4 wheaten scotties, 3 Westies, 7 Pokes and 7 Schnauzers to new lives. We set up exercise pens to let the dogs have a break before being reloaded for the trip to foster homes in the Denver area. As we took each dog out of its crate and put it in the expen, the realization that we were making a difference in their lives was overwhelming.

We were the ones selected to foster the scotties. What an experience that has been!! We are lucky to have an insulated garage that has been set up as a workshop. While I was on the road as part of the transport crew, Tony set up four exercise pens in that garage so we could have an isolation ward for these little refugees. This is imperative in this type of situation. In order to protect your own dogs, and yourself, you need some place where these dogs can be isolated for at least 10 days while vet care is being taken care of, temperaments evaluated, and the dogs are settling in. Since I work for a veterinarian, it was relatively easy to start the necessary medical care. I took the first pair, "Squirt" and "Lady Dog," in for exams, blood work, fecals, etc. "Squirt" was guessed to be about 5 years old and his mouth was beyond awful, by far the worse I had ever seen, and there was evidence of osteomyelitis in the bone in the jaw. He was started on a high dose of Antirobe, the drug of choice for the treatment of osteomyelitis which also treated his chronic urinary tract infection. He is a sweet and gentle spirit. "Lady Dog's" age was guessed to be between 2 and 3 and she had a staph infection in the skin along both sides where she had scratched herself raw. She is shy and has a sadness about her that makes your heart go out to her. Her teeth were pretty dirty and she had a nasty vaginal discharge, evidence she had recently whelped, and was put on antibiotics. This explained the green color that covered her when she was

originally picked up and maybe some of the sadness, too. We found out later that other of the female dogs had similar discharges, yet there were no young puppies, leading to speculation that no puppies were being destroyed prior to the "sale". They also had whipworm and all four were treated with Panacur. "Mr." was guessed to be 1-1/2 to 2 with some tartar. Otherwise he was a pretty happy little guy with no medical problems. When our Angel's vet originally examined "Mrs.," she had a positive test for pregnancy. Her original exam showed another nasty mouth, but we had to proceed cautiously if she was pregnant. We had talked with our Rescue Chairs and had decided that if she was in the early stages of pregnancy, we would proceed with an immediate spay. If she was past about 5 weeks, we would let her carry to term and place the puppies. In order to determine this, I was able to get the vet that operates the mobile ultrasound service that our clinic uses to do an ultrasound on "Mrs." He donated this service, which usually costs \$250. I was much relieved to find out that the pregnancy test had been wrong and that "Mrs." was not pregnant. I've never used this test, but was told that if she had been in season recently, it could have given a false positive. We started her on Antirobe for the infection in her mouth. "Mrs." is very people shy, pulling away from human contact. All four are so very sweet and accepting without any sign of aggression. Of course, they all had diarrhea from the change of diet and the stress of changes in their lives. After the first week, we groomed and bathed all four. They were great on the table, but all have an aversion to water, when it came to their baths, possibly from the hosing of their living quarters. Conformationally, they are all pretty decent specimens of the breed, better than a lot of the scotties we see in our rescue program.

Since his mouth was so bad, "Squirt" was the first to be scheduled for surgery. His neuter was routine. I documented the dental, in case it could be used to help pass some sort of legislation to help prevent this kind of situation from ever occurring again. He had four teeth left after the dental procedure that also included removal of some bone, and he required an additional procedure a few weeks later to remove the two lower canines, due to chronic infection. He was left with two premolars on one side. His recovery required regular flushes of the tooth sockets with a medicated rinse and keeping him on pain medication. He was on Antirobe for about 8 weeks total to treat the infection but has done well since that time. In spite of this he eats just about anything everyone else does and is doing well on dry kibble.

"Lady Dog" lost two premolars at the time of her spay and her skin infection cleared up after antibiotic treatment and medicated baths. "Mr.'s" teeth cleaned up fine when he was neutered. "Mrs." lost about half of her teeth at the time of spay, and she recovered without incident and is doing well.

Tony and I renamed these four golden spirits. "Squirt" has become "Durango" and "Mr." is now "Cortez," after the beautiful part of Colorado from which they escaped. "Lady Dog" was renamed "Susan" in honor of our Rescue Angel, STCA Club member Susan Riches. This is not the first time Susan has come to the rescue of a Scot in need. We know we can depend on her to go that extra mile. As a matter of fact, her "Angie" was a scot interviewing for a new home, and she added number four to her "pack" in the person of "Linus," one of the Westies from this operation. "Mrs." has become known as "Samantha," in honor of our Rescue Angel 2, Samantha Camack, who spent endless time and energy on behalf of all these puppy farm dogs.

It has been wonderful to watch these guys come to life. We became very attached to them all, especially "Durango" and "Susan." "Cortez" and "Samantha" were placed together with a wonderful family in Kansas. They have multiple scottie family for years. "Cortez" adjusted as expected, happy and fun loving. "Samantha" has been slow to trust, but is slowly starting to come to them.

"Susan" was placed in a home that didn't work for her. Even with all the warnings and discussions about it being a long, slow road, taking six months or more, the husband became discouraged that she would not bond with him. She has been placed with a personal friend that owned a wheaten girl with a very aloof personality. She also has a happy, well-adjusted little male scottie that gets along well with "Susan." I feel she will do well in this home and we will see her on a regular basis. She has become a hunter, spending extended periods hunting chipmunks that tease her in the rock pile in our yard.

"Durango" is my hero!! He is in the home of fellow RMSTC members, with two other scotties, "Duffy" and "Misty." "Duffy" is a big, sweet older male. "Misty" is a full of herself little snip of a scottie. "Durango" moved in like he had always been there. He and "Misty" are on the back of the couch looking out the window when you pull into the driveway. He sleeps on the bed and has his own chair. He is wonderful, seeing "Durango" doing so well makes all the work worth while. As I said at a recent rescue committee meeting this is a story that makes my heart happy.

English Dog Shows in June

It was November when we first planned our spring trip to Crufts dog show in England. Looking forward through the winter to that greatest of dog shows, the spectacle of beautiful dogs and English tradition, we passed the winter months making our plans. Unfortunately, the week prior, Crufts was rescheduled due to the devastating Hoof and Mouth disease. We did not go. However, in May, when the USAir E-savers notification came through with incredible fares to England, Kari and I just had to pack. Our rescheduled trip would coincide with the Windsor show and the Club of England STC shows. It was Kari's first trip to England, and we had much to see.

The Airbus Economy class was comfortable, with an added feature since we had last traveled. Each seat had its own video screen with a choice of seven movies, which were controlled by a personal handset built into the arm of the seat. That certainly made the 7 hour flight pass quickly. We left Charlotte on June 27th, changed in Philadelphia, and arrived in Manchester England the following morning.

The trains in England are very comfortable and punctual, and when we arrived at St. Albans we were met by Chink Owen. Both he and Muriel look wonderful. She had a knee replaced last April, and is very mobile now. I hope I am feeling that well at 83. The Gaywyn Kennels have greatly reduced their numbers in recent years, but their most recent champion, Ch Last Adventure at Gaywyn is quite an ambassador for the breed.

On Friday we went to the Windsor show. It is a three day event, and terriers were on Friday. The entry in Scotties wasn't large, probably due to the club show in the north the following day. There were 30+ entered. The CC was presented to Ch Brueik Mastercopy with the Reserve CC going to Brueik Man in the Moon. Both dogs are owned by Liz Bradley and Laurie Herd. The bitch CC was won by Stuan Pretty Woman, a wheaten handled by Stuart Plane's partner David Guy, coming down from the two Sandreg wheatens imported by Stuart a few years back.

Windsor is a huge outdoor BENCHED show. The benches are set up under tenting. The tents, white in color, are immense and supported by metal framing. The dogs have to be at the bench all day unless they are at the ring. It does present the opportunity for spectators to view the dogs and speak to the owners. There were almost no professionally handled dogs in Scotties, and the winners were all owners. When the CCs are awarded, as well as Best of Breed, the dogs then take a long walk around the ring called the lap of honor. It is something I would love to see done here at our specialty shows. It gives the spectators one last look, and adds prestige to the win.

The Windsor show site is a large park alongside a stream which sits in the shadow of Windsor Castle. The day was cloudy and in the 70's with a brisk breeze blowing. The dogs were cool and showed well. The grass was clipped short as on a golf course

green, and that enabled a good view of movement. As well, the dogs didn't disappear into the grass like alligators in a pond.

After the Scottie judging, we spent the afternoon shopping all the many wonderful vendors. The terrier group was first on at 4:30 and was won by the American Airedale, English, American & Italian CH Greenfield's Captain Fantastic, shown by Andrew Green. He was bred and exported to England by Andrew, Peter's son (Greenfield). Second, handled by Geoff Corish, was the Kerry Blue, Torum's Tunde Bayou, who also won the Terrier group at Crufts this year. You saw him if you watched it on Animal Planet. He is the younger brother to Torum's Scarf Michael, who was the Westminster Group winner in February. Third in group was the best Wirefox Terrier bitch I have ever seen, Star Design at Travella. She is young and will have a great future wherever she goes.

Some of the breeds we saw shown are very rare, and not recognized by the AKC. The Cesky Terrier is a cross between Sealy and a Scottie primarily, and has drop ears, a long tail (not carried high) and is shown clipped, with skirts. Not a pretty picture, unless you like that long back clipped look. In my opinion, it does look like a very bad Scottish Terrier.

The entry for Scotties was not very large compared to the 100+ Westies. The Westies do seem to be more popular than Scotties, and the numbers for Scotties are declining. Several breeders expressed concern for the smaller gene pool from which to choose the dogs to breed.

Windsor is called a Champ show. To make an English Champion requires the win of three Challenge Certificates, or CCs. The Kennel Club (equivalent to AKC) determines which shows will be able to offer CCs, based on numbers of registrations. Those are assigned to specific shows during the year. The number of possible CCs is controlled, and for Scotties has gone down. There is no search for that elusive major as happens in the US. Thus, Windsor did not offer classes for several of the terrier breeds such as

Sealyhams because there were no CCs on offer as mandated by the English Kennel Club. The breeds not eligible for CCs at this show can still enter, however, in a large miscellaneous class. From that class only one winner will be able to compete in the terrier group. This year it was the Cesky.

After the show, we strolled around the town of Windsor. It is one of our favorite places, having stayed there a week with the English Champions Tour five years ago, organized by the late Kathy Uhrich. Shops were closed by then, so we had the empty streets much to ourselves.

Next day we left Silverlands, home of the Gaywyn Scotties and the Owen family, at 8am to drive north with Chink and Muriel to the Scottish Terrier Club of England show near Birmingham. It is fortunate that their car gets good gas mileage, as the cost of a gallon of gas is over \$4. They sell gas, called petrol, in England by the liter. It is approximately a dollar a liter, and we understand that is mostly taxes. Next time you think to complain about our gas prices here, think about how cheap it is in comparison to the rest of the world.

The Club of England show was held outdoors in a grassy park in the town of Polesworth, a little south of Birmingham. The ring was huge, and defined only by the chairs placed in a rectangle. At the top of the ring, there were three or four large banquet style tables placed in a line and covered with cloths embroidered with the club name and logo. The trophies are displayed there as well as serving catalog sales, stewards table and raffles. The day was sunny off and on, as huge puffy clouds covered the sun from time to time. There was a stiff breeze blowing and the temperature was around 70. It was invigorating, and the dogs were very happy. The entry was around 100, and the judging went from 10 am until 3:30 with an hour break for lunch. The dog CC was won by Ch Brio Chief Inspector shown by breeder/owner Jane Miller, and the Reserve went to Ch Brueik Master Copy shown by breeder/owner Laurie Herd. The bitch CC was won by Ch Mayson Petrina, shown by breeder/owner Susan Gaskell. Reserve CC, shown by owner Derrick Parrish (who is judging the Atlanta specialty next April) went to Kirthorn Remembrance, the daughter of English/American Ch. Katie K of Kirthorn, born in the UK. Katie

is here in the US now, owned by Daphne and John Eggert and shown by Geoff Dawson. There were several Americans in the crowd of spectators, Gail Gaines, Ann McCormack, and Daphne Eggert and her husband, John.

On Sunday, Kari "dragged" me all over London. She wanted to sightsee, and that we did. The train from St. Albans let us off at the Kings Cross station, and we made our way to Oxford Street. There are only a few shops open on Sunday from noon until 5 pm. We shopped at Selfridges, and others, and took a good look at all the designer clothes. Temptation set in with the sales, but half price of \$800 for the jacket Kari coveted, is still over budget.

Finding the open topped double decker tourist bus at Marble Arch, we bought tickets good for 24 hours. There are three possible routes, and we were on the red route around Big Ben, Parliament, Westminster Abbey, and the newest attraction The London Eye. It is a huge ferris wheel with large enclosed capsules seating groups of people. When at the top, you can see 27 miles. It was built along side the River Thames for the Millenium celebrations. We didn't have time to get on, and will save it for the next trip. We had dinner in a pub in Soho, and there were some interesting looking people there. We arrived back at Silverlands, exhausted, but in time to share a large bowl of fresh raspberries picked that day from the Owen's garden, and cov-

ered in double cream!! I doubt if I will be able to eat a raspberry again in this country as good.

On Monday, we returned again to London. We had been invited by Valerie Bath (fellow Scottie lover), who is Lord Saville's Secretary, to join a small group who had arranged with the Lord to tour the House of Lords. It was amazing!! It is not open to the public, and we actually were able to stand on the floors of both the House of Lords, and the House of Commons. We spent 2 1/2 hours there, looking at the Queen's Robing Room, Portrait Gallery, the Houses, and some of the documents on display. To walk where the Kings and Queens have been through history was exciting. We saw the original document ordering the execution of Charles I, and signed by Oliver Cromwell. We had lunch with Valerie in the staff dining room...delicious, and then we said goodbye as she had to be back in the office by 2 since The House of Lords was to convene in session at 2:30.

Since we still had a few hours left on our 24 hour tour bus ticket, we hopped on the blue line which took us to Knightsbridge, where we hopped off at Harrod's. The rest of the afternoon we spent wandering around the incredible Halls. The Food Hall is the most interesting with gourmet delights, and of course the Egyptian Hall, which is designed in marbles reminiscent of the style of the

Pharaohs. There is a shrine to Dodi Fayed and Princess Diana, mounted in one corner by the owner who is father to Dodi. It reminded us that Saturday would have been the 40th birthday for the Princess.

We returned to the Owens in order to spend the evening visiting, and consuming another great bowl of raspberries. Sadly, that was our last evening there, as we had to leave the next afternoon to Manchester in order to get our flight home the following day.

The train arrived in Manchester at 4:30. We put our baggage in the "Left Baggage" checking point, and took the bus into the city. Manchester is an amazing conglomeration of old and new. Heavily bombed during the war, you will see an old building alongside of a modern one. We had time to shop another hour, and the stores closed. We spent several hours at the Easy Everything Internet Cafe, which cost one pound (about \$1.50) for an hour internet time. They have a snack bar and sell refreshments to enjoy while on the internet.

We stayed near the airport, and flew home the next morning, July 4th. It was exciting for both of us, and we hope that you may have the pleasure of the trip to the English dog shows too. For those of you who have already attended, I know you must be looking forward to returning again. We are!!

A SCOTTIE IN THE WHITE HOUSE... OR IT'S OUR FIFTEEN MINUTES OF FAME THIS TIME!

It all started about 10 years ago when I received a phone call in the early evening inquiring about Scottish Terrier stud service. The lady on the phone described her Scottie and how and when she purchased her. Now she was in season and wanted her bred so that her bitch could have a companion. As I was taking her particulars, her name caused me to pause, and so I asked, "Why is your name so familiar?" She replied that she had just run against Bill Bradley in the New Jersey Senatorial contest. She was that Christy Whitman! I thought that this was about the dumbest question that I had ever asked in my life.

Since that call, and about five litters later, a family of Scotties has been established at the Whitman's along with Christy's election and subsequent re-election as Governor of New Jersey and now appointment as Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency. Living on the family's large farm in New Jersey's "Hunt Country," the Governor's dogs enjoy an idyllic existence under the watchful eye of the Governor, her husband, John, their housekeepers, and while she was Governor, the watchful eye of the New Jersey State Police. Today the Scottie family consists of "Brie," a red brindle male from her first litter, "Coors," a black bitch from her second litter, (the dam of the White House dog "Barney") and Barney's littermate sister.

The governor's dogs have always been a big part of her public life with candid pictures of her and her Scots always in the press.

"Barney" now continues this tradition as the President's puppy and walking companion each morning. He's compiling a big portfolio of pictures in the White House settings with "Spot," an English Springer Spaniel, a gift from his father and mother, President Bush 41, as he's now called, and First Lady Barbara Bush. "Barney" entered the First Family's life as a little puppy who was first seen with his littermates when now President Bush and the First Lady, Laura, were on a campaign trip to New Jersey and spent some time at the Whitman's farm. The First Lady was taken by the pups and inquired if one might be available for their family. An agreement was quickly struck, and the puppy, "J" as he was then called, was headed to the Bush family and hopefully to the White House. When I was called by the Governor's personal assistant, Holly Rodgers, with the scoop, I was told that my excitement certainly did not exceed the Governor's. "J", soon to be "Barney", left Whitman's Pontefracht Farm home when the transition team set up camp in the Madison Hotel in Washington. When he was carried to the President's temporary office during a staff meeting, the President halted the meeting, walked over to "Barney," and bent down to pick up his new boy, "Barney," I I weeks old, but a true Scottie, immediately growled at the soon to be President and leader of the Free World.

Since then, for us, it's been interviews for newspapers, television and radio programs, and all the notoriety that goes with it. "Barney" was sired by my Am/Can CH Motherwell Storm

Warning and his mother, "Coors," was sired by my Am/Can CH Motherwell Pepperpot. "Barney" will carry the prefix of Pontefracht, the name of the Whitman's farm. At this writing we do not yet know the suffix, though the President also calls him "Caterpillar" in recognition of his being low to the ground.

We at Motherwell will watch with all other Americans and the world as Barney matures and assumes his place in Presidential canine history. We hope for a long, happy life for

Barney, lots of pictures in the media, and wish him Good Luck and Godspeed as he takes his place in the history of our great republic.



RULES AND PROCEDURES FOR VARIOUS INTERNATIONAL SHOWS

*This information is printed in
Fresh Pond Travel's pamphlet for the
International Shows sent to exhibitors.*

INTERNATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP: To be recognized as an International Champion by the Federation Cynologique Internationale (FCI), Belgium, a dog must be awarded four (4) CACIBs (Certificate of Aptitude for International Beauty Championship) by four different FCI-approved judges, in four different international shows. The Judges must be from at least two different continents. Two CACIBs are usually awarded per breed (BOB/BOS) even if there is no competition. The judge is not required to make the award but will do so unless he/she determines that the dog is not deserving (this is the case in all shows, everywhere). The dog must be at least 15 months old to be awarded International Championship points. Please note that the FCI recognizes 10 different groups (as compared to the USA's 7 groups). Some of the Caribbean countries compete in 10 different groups for group awards, others create 7 groups similar to ours. Please note also that most working and sporting, some hounds and some terriers, require a working test, which is not frequently given in the Western Hemisphere.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP: Each year the FCI designates one show as its World Show. In 2001 it will be in Oporto, Portugal. The World Championship can (and usually is) awarded to BOB and BOS in each breed at that show. In addition a Junior World Championship is awarded to the Best Puppy Dog and best Puppy Bitch (under 18 months). In 2002 the World Championship will be in Amsterdam, Holland.

EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIP: Once each year the FCI (Federation Cynologique Internationale) designates some show in Europe as the Europasiieger show. At this show a dog by going BOB or BOS will be designated as European Champion. The precise way of designating the title is "European Champion, 19??." Inasmuch-as there can only be two European Champions per breed each year this title, like the World Championship, is a rare and distinctive one. In 2001 the Europasiieger will be in Tel Aviv, Israel. In 2002, Paris, France.

CHAMPIONSHIP OF THE AMERICAS: Once each year

the FCI (Federation Cynologique Internatio-nale) designates some show in the Western Hemisphere as the Championship of the Americas show. At this show a dog by going BOB or BOS will be designated a Champion of the Americas. The precise way of designating the title is "Ch. of Amers.19??." Inasmuch as there can only be two Champions of the Americas per breed each year this title, like the World Championship, is rare and distinctive.

BAHAMAS CHAMPIONSHIP: To become a Bahamian Champion a dog must win two Challenge Certificates under two different judges. CCs are awarded to BOB and BOS, unless the judge decides the dog is not worthy and withholds the award. Please note: although the Bahamas Kennel Club calls their shows "International," they are not licensed by the FCI and wins, therefore, do not count towards the International Championship. Rare breeds may compete and obtain Championships and Obedience titles.

MEXICAN CHAMPIONSHIP: To be recognized as a Mexican Champion a dog must be awarded four CACMs (Certificate of Aptitude for Mexican Championship) under four different judges. The judge can award a CACM to Winners Dog and Winners Bitch, even if there is no competition. At least one of the CACMs must be won when the dog is over 15 months of age.

GUATEMALAN CHAMPIONSHIP: To be recognized as a Guatemalan Champion a dog must be awarded two Guatemalan championship points. The Judge can award 1 point each to WD/WB even if there is no competition, and usually will unless he/she determines that the dog is not worthy of the award.

CHILEAN CHAMPIONSHIP: To become a Chilean Champion a dog must win two Challenge Certificates under two different judges. Challenge Certificates are awarded (usually) to Winners' Dog and Winners' Bitch. To become a Grand Chilean Champion three certificates must be won. Since there are four shows in a circuit a dog can conceivably win both Chilean titles in one trip.

COSTA RICAN CHAMPIONSHIP: To become a Costa Rican Champion a dog must acquire four CACRs (Costa Rican championship points). Costa Rican points are awarded to WD & WB in each international and national show.

PUERTO RICAN SHOWS: Puerto Rico is the only place in the world where both AKC and FCI (International) shows are held. FCI shows in Puerto Rico, which are held every year, enable a dog to earn an International Championship ... and is the only place in the United States where an International title can be earned. AKC shows in Puerto Rico are run according to the same rules as AKC shows on the United States mainland. The important difference is that in Puerto Rico nearly every breed requires only four (4) dogs for a major. Thus the Puerto Rico AKC clusters are always fun and exciting, and are a wonderful opportunity to finish your dogs.

CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIP: To become a Canadian Champion a dog must be registered with the Canadian Kennel Club and must acquire 10 points under 3 different judges. It is not necessary for the dog to be registered in order to compete in shows. A maximum of 5 points can be awarded to a dog in any one show. The point schedule that follows applies to all breeds, and is for dogs beaten either directly or indirectly: beat 1 dog, 1 point; 2 to 4 dogs, 2 points; 5 to 8 dogs, 3 points; 9 to 11 dogs, 4 points; 12 or more dogs beaten by you, 5 points. Points can also be acquired by receiving a group placement. These points are added to those acquired in breed competition, up to a total of no more than 5 per show.


BERMUDA CHAMPIONSHIP: To be recognized as a Bermuda champion a dog must acquire at least 10 championship points, including at least one major (3-point win), in at least 3 different shows. Points may be won in breed, group, or best-in-show competition. Point schedule: 1 dog present, 1 point; 2 dogs, 2 points; 3 dogs, 3; 5 dogs, 4; 7 dogs, 5. Maximum number is 5. Any dog placing in group shall be awarded the highest number of points for any dog of any breed which it defeats in that group, or its own points, whichever is higher. Best in show is awarded the highest point rating of show. Bermuda holds its cluster each November. For your dog to be shown in Bermuda he/she must be either registered with the BKC (\$20) or listed (\$3 per show). The dog must be registered in order to be awarded a championship.

RUSSIAN CHAMPIONSHIP: The Russian Kennel Club, which is a member of the FCI, holds several hundred shows each year. At some of these FCI (international) points are awarded, as well as Russian championship points. It is possible for an American dog to become a Russian champion at one show ... the annual September show in Moscow ... by going BOB or BOS, while at the same time earning a

CACIB.

OBEDIENCE TITLES: Obedience rules most everywhere in Latin America are nearly the same as in the USA. In Europe they are sufficiently different to make it impossible for us to compete. To qualify for an obedience title the dog must attain 3 qualifying scores of 170 points each, except in the Dominican Republic, and Guatemala, where only two qualifying scores are needed. Exhibitors can compete in all three daily trials (novice, open, utility) but must qualify for each title progressively in order to receive the title. In Bermuda dogs cannot compete at a higher level until they have qualified in a third leg in the lower level. Bermuda All Breed Club hopes to offer agility titles, as well, in November, 2001.

ENTRY FEES, PREMIUM LISTS, IMPORT REQUIREMENTS, ETC: Import requirements everywhere are exacting, and each is different. Entry fees differ from country to country, but most are approximately \$20 per show or trial, plus approximately \$10 (one time charge) for registration (\$20. in Mexico). Entries are usually accepted without any evidence that the dog is registerable. Most countries will permit you to send a photocopy of your AKC papers and bring the originals with you when you travel. Papers are returned promptly from the various countries, so you need not worry about sending originals.
