CHYSCOTT'S Coat of Arms (Eli) is the accumulation of 22 years of breeding quality Scottish terriers. We at Chyscott are very proud of Eli and his brother Lance, Chyscott's First Knight, who was WD/BOW at the 2001 Devon Dog Show and first in the open class the next day at Montgomery County. We believe these two stud dogs are going to put their stamp on the breed in the whelping box. The boy's mother was a dream come true when I was given the chance to purchase her in England 9 years ago. Ch. Pendlehill Velvet (Meg) is what I felt the breed standard called for and by breeding Meg to McVan's Stamp of Approval (Sammy) I have bred two outstanding stud dogs. Eli has already proven what he can do in the whelping box by producing three beautiful puppies out of Ch Chyscott's Concoction. This outstanding litter will be seen at upcoming Specialties.

Eli is heavy boned with a great amount of substance, which he is passing on to his offspring. His front-end assembly is one of the nicest I have ever had my hands on; he also has a beautiful black almond shaped eye and dead level head planes. As you can see in the picture there is plenty up front as well as in back. His shoulders are well laid back into a short level top line, with a bang on tail. He has a wonderful driving rear.

Eli at 8 months was Winners Dog at the Grayslake Terrier Specialty for a five point major. He will be seen at Specialties in 2002.

We at Chyscott want to thank everyone in the sport of dog shows and in the Scottie ring for your support and guidance throughout the years. We look forward to spending time with friends and dogs in the many years to come.

Health Trust Fund News

Welcome to 2002! As these words are being written, we are enjoying a mild winter with minimal snow so far. Could an early spring be far off? We can only hope!

Your HTF Trustees are anticipating an exciting New Year for Scottie research, education and outreach. First of all we are pleased to announce that the STCA Board has approved allocation of funds to support AKC Canine Health Fund Grant #2234:

Basophil/Mast Cell Response to Lectins as a Predictor for Risk of Allergic Disease in Genetically Susceptible Dogs. Principal investigator Dr. Bruce Hammerberg of NC State will be looking at what actually happens at the molecular level in the skin of allergic dogs, focusing on two kinds of cells (the basophil and the mast cell) which are major players in most dermatological conditions. Dr. Hammerberg has already done a great deal of research on allergic skin disorders, and in this study, he will focus on the genetics of atopic dermatitis in susceptible breeds of dogs. Dr. Hammerberg writes:

"If successful, this study will ultimately provide a useful diagnostic tool for predicting risk of allergic disease manifestation in later life. This tool will be extremely valuable to breeders in making decision about matching breeding pairs where the desire is to minimize allergic disease problems. The proposed project will in the short-term potentially make it possible to identify very young puppies having a high risk of developing atopic dermatitis later in life. This predictive assay for atopic dermatitis will assist responsible breeders in minimizing the incidence of allergic skin disease in their breeds."

In the 1995 STCA Health Survey, Atopic Dermatitis (AD) was assigned a "guesstimated" carrier frequency of 35.8%, the highest ranking of any of the genetic disorders reported. It is clear that our breed stands to benefit greatly from Dr. Hammerberg's study! The STCA will be joining forces with several other breed clubs in supporting this new AKC CHF study, and as soon as the total funding is confirmed, this study will get underway.

Make plans to attend the SFBSTC Cancer Seminar April 6, 2002! This one-day seminar to be held at the Radisson Hotel in Sacramento promises to be an exciting and educational event. Topics covered will include bladder cancer in Scotties, lymphoma, melanoma, and current research in these and other areas. Nationally known and well respected speakers will include Dr. Bruce Madewell from UC Davis Veterinary School, Dr. Deborah Knapp from Purdue University, Dr. Jaime Modiano from Denver, Colorado, Drs. Maureen Adams and Cathy Connelly in private practice in Reno, NV, and Dr. Fredrick Leach from the National Cancer Institute.

This important seminar is a major undertaking for the SFBSTC. Writes club president Ross Buffington: *"I want to thank Elizabeth Wise for bringing together some of the top veterinari-*



ans in the country to educate us on this disease that so horribly affects our breed...It is up to each one of us to complete the work needed to make this event the success that I know it will be." It is also up to all of us to support the club by spreading the word and attending if possible! The seminar promises to be a valuable event for veterinarians, veterinary students, and for all Scottish Terrier (and other breed) owners and fanciers. This year we will offer a limited edition bronze sculpture created and donated by artist and STCA member Tunia Hyland. This wonderful bronze entitled "Hey, What's Hoppenin'?" features a large Scottie who is gazing down with typical Diehard interest at a fat little toad. This beautiful work is no ordinary bronze to sit on a shelf in your curio cabinet. The Scottie is 16" long, 8" wide and 11" high and it weighs in at a hefty 30 pounds! The sculpture is tough enough to weather the elements outside in the garden or it can grace the inside of your home. Included is a beautiful walnut base for indoor display. This is truly a fine example of the very involved and expensive "lost wax" bronze process, and the winner of this piece will be very lucky indeed.

Tunia started sculpting 6 years ago as a tribute to her artist mother who had recently passed away. With the help and encouragement of talented teachers and artists, her creativity has flourished in the three dimensional form. Tunia describes her sculptures as "Garden Spirits" because they all have a spiritual quality about them and are born from a creative source deep within. The inspiration for this particular piece comes from Tunia's own two Scotties, Junebug and Willie, angels she calls them, who have taught her more about life than she could ever teach them. Writes Tunia: *"This particular sculpture... is very reminiscent of the confrontation most of us Scottie people have witnessed between a Scottie and a toad. One accidental taste of a toad and a Scottie learns a lesson- Look but don't touch- a very difficult thing for this hardy terrier to do!"*

Opportunity for Scotties with Lymphosarcoma: FREE CLINICAL TRIAL BEGINS IN APRIL

SUBMITTED BY CAROLE OWEN

Free lymphoma chemotherapy for dogs (all breeds) will begin April 15 at selected veterinary clinics in Houston, Tomball, and San Antonio, TX; Akron, OH; and Washington, D.C. Dogs must visit the clinics once weekly for 12 weeks. Gemzar (gemcitabine) will be the therapeutic drug, and all patients accepted in the trial will receive the drug therapy. There will be no placebos. This is a trial to determine the efficacy of this drug against canine lymphoma.

Lymphosarcoma (lymphoma) is one

of the more common cancers in Scotties, along with bladder cancer and malignant melanoma. "These trials are an important opportunity for owners to potentially help their own Scotties while adding to knowledge about treatment of lymphoma," states STCA Health Trust Fund Chairman, Marcia Dawson, DVM.

The trial will pay all costs for patient evaluation and eligibility as well as all treatment expenses during the study period. To be eligible, a dog must have a diagnosis of lymphoma, have no prior

use of steroid therapy or other chemotherapy and be in reasonably good health.

Rules for STCA Conformation Awards

approved for 2002

FRANCIS G. LLOYD AWARD

1. Points for the Lloyd Award are based on the championship point rating of the breed.
2. Points are awarded to the Scottish Terrier winning BOB.
3. In order to qualify for the award, the owner and all co-owners must be members in good standing of the Scottish Terrier Club of America at the time of the win
4. Wins have the same point value as the highest number of championship points awarded at that particular show. (In most cases this will be the same points as those awarded to the BOW; however, sometimes BOS will receive more points than BOW. This can occur if the BOS is from the classes and has defeated a champion(s). In the case when only one sex is exhibited, the highest number of points will be for the sex exhibited in the classes.
5. If there is no competition in the regular classes or no points are awarded in the regular classes, the BOB winner will receive no Lloyd points.
6. Lloyd points are also awarded for wins at Specialty Shows.

MCVAN AWARD

The award is presented to the owners of the Scottish Terrier that garners the most McVan points in all breed competition. In order to qualify, the owner and co-owners must be STCA members at the time of the win. Scotties accrue points for BOB wins, group placements and Best in Show. No points are awarded for Specialty wins unless the Specialty is held in conjunction with a Terrier group or all breed show. The McVan Award is designed to illustrate that Scotties can hold their own in all breed competition.

Point awards are as follows:

9 points: Best In Show, for an All Breed Show (Highest win of the day) BOB 1 point, 5 points Group 1, and 9 additional points for Best In Show All-Breed total =

15
8 points Best In Show at a Terrier Group Show (Highest win of the day) BOB 1 point, Group 1 5 points, 8 points for Best In Show Terrier Group Show total = 14
5 points Group 1 (+ 1 point for BOB = 6 total)
4 points Group 2 (+ 1 point for BOB = 5 total)
3 points Group 3 (+ 1 point for BOB = 4 total)
2 points Group 4 (+ 1 point for BOB + 3 total)
1 point BOB

GLENBY BEST OF OPPOSITE SEX AWARD

Using the tabulation of the Francis G. Lloyd Award, this award is offered by Fred and Christine Stephens and is awarded to the exhibitor owning the Scottish Terrier that is the opposite sex to the winner of the Francis G. Lloyd Memorial Award.

KAYLEE AMERICAN BRED AWARD

This award is awarded to the owner(s) of the American Bred Scotties accruing the most points from this class during the year. To be tallied together Scottish Terriers must have the same ownership. There is one award. Both dogs and bitches compete for the Kaylee American Bred Award.*

1. In order to qualify for the award, the owner and all co-owners must be members in good standing of the STCA at the time of the win.
2. Wins have the same point value as the championship point ratings for the sex, provided there is competition between different owners in the class.
3. If there is no competition in the class or if competition is between dogs of the same owners, no points are awarded at the class level.
4. If the dog or bitch goes Winners, the championship points of its sex will

be awarded regardless of competition in the class, if the dog or bitch has beaten a dog or bitch of different ownership. If the dog or bitch goes BOW, BOS or BOB, additional championship points for these wins, as published in the AKC Awards Book, will be awarded. To qualify for these additional points, the dog or bitch must defeat a dog or bitch of different ownership.

THE BAR-NONE PUPPY BITCH AWARD AND THE CH DUFF DE PACMAN PUPPY DOG AWARD

These awards are awarded to the owner(s) accruing the most points from the Puppy Bitch class and from the Puppy Dog class respectively. To be tallied together for the Bar-None Puppy Bitch Award, bitches must have the same ownership. To be tallied together for the Duff De Puppy Dog Award, dogs must have the same ownership.

1. In order to qualify for the award, the owner and all co-owners must be members in good standing of the STCA at the time of the win.
2. Wins have the same point value as the championship point rating for the sex, provided there is competition between different owners in the class.
3. If there is no competition in the class or if competition is between dogs of the same owners, no points are awarded at the class level.
4. If the dog or bitch goes Winners, the championship points of its sex will be awarded regardless of competition in the puppy class, if the dog or bitch has beaten a dog or bitch of different ownership. If the dog or bitch goes BOW, BOS, or BOB, additional championship points for these wins, as published in the AKC Awards Book will be awarded. To qualify for these additional points, the dog or bitch must defeat a dog or bitch of different ownership.
5. If the win in the puppy class with competition occurs at a Scottish

Terrier Regional Specialty or National Specialty, an additional point will be awarded for the day.*

RULES FOR SCORING THE ALCHEMY BRED BY EXHIBITOR AWARD

- The Alchemy Bred by Exhibitor Award can only be won by members of the Scottish Terrier Club of America (STCA).
- Records are kept according to OWNERS followed by their dogs. The same owner's dogs and bitches are tabulated together to yield the owners total over a specified interval.

1. First in Bred by Exhibitor class Dog (Bitch) earns 1 point.

A minimum of two dogs (bitches) who have different owners are required. However, there is one exception in the case of a single entry in the Bred by Exhibitor class and the dog (bitch) goes on to a minimum of Winners. The dog (bitch) can earn points for higher win(s) but the entry criteria as stated for the higher win(s) must be met. The dog (bitch) will not earn the 1 point for the Bred by Exhibitor class, however, he (she) will be awarded points according to the schedule outlined for the higher win(s). Therefore, when calculating the number of points, rule 1 would not be included in the total. For example, if the dog (bitch) does not have competition in the Bred by Exhibitor class, but goes

Winners Dog (Bitch), he (she) may be awarded 1 point vs 2 points when there would have been competition in Bred by Exhibitor.

2. Bred by Exhibitor goes Winners Dog (Bitch) earns an additional 1 point.

At least one additional first place winner who has a different owner must be in competition for the Bred by Exhibitor dog (bitch) to earn the additional point. If this is the highest win achieved at this show, the dog (bitch) receives a total of 2 points (this total includes rule 1)

3. Bred by Exhibitor goes BOW Dog (Bitch) earns an additional 1 point.

A minimum of two dogs (bitches) with different owners must have been shown in any of the opposite sex classes. If this is the highest win achieved at this show, the dog or bitch receives a total of 3 points (this total includes rule 1 and 2).

4. Bred by Exhibitor goes BOS Dog (Bitch)

earns an additional 1 point. A minimum of one dog or bitch not owned by the owner of the Bred by Exhibitor dog (bitch) which is being shown exclusively in BOB must be in competition to earn the additional 1 point. If this is the highest win achieved at this show, the dog (bitch) receives a total of 4 points (this total includes rule 1, 2 and 3).

5. Bred by Exhibitor goes BOB Dog (Bitch) earns an additional 2 points.

A minimum of one dog or bitch not owned by the owner of the Bred by Exhibitor dog (bitch) which is being shown exclusively in the BOB must be in competition to earn the additional 2 points. If this is the highest win achieved at this show, the dog (bitch) receives a total of 5 points (this total includes rule 1, 2 and 3).

CH DEBLIN'S BACK TALK MEMORIAL SPECIALTY AWARD

The CH Deblin's Back Talk Memorial Specialty Award is given in memory of the dog whose name it bears. The trophy will be awarded to the owner(s) of dogs/bitches winning the most Specialty Best of Breeds during the year. To be considered for this award, the dogs/bitches must be handled by an owner, not a professional handler. Dogs/bitches with IDENTICAL (SAME) ownership will be tallied together. In the event of a tie, two awards of equal value will be given. If there is a 3 or 4 way tie, the owners of the dog or bitch with the most Specialty Best of Breeds will win. If the same owner or co-owners win the award for a second time, a plaque will be awarded instead of the statue trophy. Membership in STCA at the time of the win is required for all owners and co-owners.

Care of the Bitch: BEFORE AND AFTER

"Can I talk to you, Dr. Lounsbury?" asked the anxious student in my office doorway.


I wondered what academic crisis she faced. "What's up, Andrea? Is it your thesis?" I asked.

"No," she replied, "it's my bitch. She's pregnant and I'm scared to death!"

Now, this was something I could help her with!

"What do you need to know?" I asked.

"Everything!" was the near-frantic reply.



Where on earth would I begin? Why, it would take me hours and hours to pass on even the most rudimentary information to this totally inexperienced young woman. And that, of course, was the problem facing me when I began to write this article. The topic, pre- and postnatal care of the bitch, is so vast that it would be impossible to reduce

it to only a few pages and still have it be useful to a group of readers who range from those who are contemplating their first litter, to those who are planning their fiftieth. And so I arrived at a compromise. For those of you who are, like my student, in need of a plethora of basic information, I will point you toward some invaluable sources so that your self-education can begin. And for those of you with a few litters under your belt, I will discuss some of the more controversial issues of caring for your bitch, both before and after delivery.

A special "thank you" to the breeders and breeder/veterinarians who helped me with this article. Acknowledgements appear in the references section.

Progesterone Testing

We all know that the bitch should be in excellent health before being bred, but results of my survey pointed out that, even among experienced breeders, there is more than a little room for individual differences. The first was in the use of progesterone testing. Several of the breeders surveyed have not used it, several have used it occasionally, and no one indicated that they used it routinely. I've only done it once, but it resulted in the discovery that my bitch ovulated unusually late in her cycle. She was bred accordingly, and five healthy girls were the result. I didn't do it this time, and she missed. Will I invest in the testing next time? You bet! Especially with a bitch whose seasons are at all atypical, it is well worth the money. Be aware that your vet needs a baseline blood test within the first 5 days of her season, so this is not something you can decide on when she reaches her 8th or 9th day. Also, after smears show 50-60% cornification, blood tests will be necessary every 2 days, so a serious commitment on your part is required.

Brucellosis Testing

Brucellosis is often referred to as "canine VD." It can be contracted, not only through sexual contact, but also through sniffing and licking an infected animal. It is highly infectious, and can run through an entire kennel in a heartbeat. It is surprising how many breeders don't think of it, and don't require a negative test on visiting bitches. It is not to be taken lightly - it can sterilize every dog in the place, and causes spontaneous abortion in pregnant bitches. Shelters report an

infection rate of as high as 35%, so any breeder who does rescue work should isolate any shelter refugee from breeding stock. Some stud dog owners require a recent negative test; many do not. And, of course, stud dogs should be routinely tested, as well. They can infect your bitch just as easily as she can infect them. Have you ever asked the stud dog owner for proof that the dog has tested clear? I must admit that, while I've provided test results for my bitches, it's never occurred to me to ask about the dog! Your vet can do the test in-house, but be aware that this runs a rather unsettling rate of "false positives." If your bitch (or dog) receives a positive test, don't panic. Insist that the test be redone through a university or competent private lab.

Raspberry Tea

This is a topic guaranteed to generate debate! The student who came to me for advice knew virtually nothing about pre-natal care, but had been told by her vet to immediately start the bitch on raspberry tea leaves. Her vet is a well-known specialist in canine reproduction. But no less than reproduction specialist Dr. Robert Hutchison has said in his seminar, "Natural tea leaves have ergotamine. The idea is to put tone in the uterus...but ergotamine has an oxytocin like effect and leads to premature labor. Whelp Wise in Colorado [see www.whelpwise.com] claims that the majority of bitches in premature labor are on ergotamine."

Says reproductive vet Scarlette Gotwals DVM, regarding premature labor, "...red raspberry tea leaves...can cause premature labor...in her data [Karen Copley at Perinatal Specialties reports that] puppy mortality was 36% for bitches on red raspberry tea leaves vs. 6-7% for bitches [who were] not..." Many holistic dog care books recommend it, as do many vets. Clearly this is a controversial issue that warrants serious thought.

Injectables, Ingestibles and Topicals

"Do I need to get my bitch's shots updated?" my student asked? "What about her heartworm pills? Are they safe?" To the first question, I replied, "Too late." The time to update shots is before the bitch is bred. Now that some breeders are immunizing less frequently than yearly, this is even more important.

While exposure to such things as distemper and hepatitis may be unlikely, anyone who goes where other dogs assemble can expose their puppies to parvo, with disastrous results. My vet updates shots before breeding, and so do I. I admit to having missed with one bitch, whose last shots had been nearly a year before. I lived in fear of her passing almost no immunity to her babies. I won't forget again. Most breeders surveyed, by the way, initiate puppy shots at 6 weeks, and vaccinate biweekly thereafter until 14 or 16 weeks. This results in 5 or 6 doses by the time the pup is four months old. My friends in England look upon this practice with horror! They typically give only two "jabs", as they call them, one at 8 or 10 weeks and the other at 12 or 14. Might our proliferation of vaccinations have long-term effects on our dog's immune systems? Some notable vets think so. Again, another topic which warrants serious thought.

Dr. Hutchison's advice is to continue heartworm preventative, and to use Amoxicillin, Clavamox or Cephalexin if necessary. But no Baytril, no tetracycline, and, above all, **no** steroids. Also on the "no" list are flea and tick products. And, of course, no prenatal supplementation with calcium. This can interfere with the body's calcium-regulating mechanism, resulting in life-threatening eclampsia. Many vets treat an attack with intravenous calcium, as getting the body back in balance quickly is essential. Veteran breeder Anne Seranne advises that this can cause cardiac complications, and asks that her vet use the subcutaneous form, which is slower-acting but safer. Ask your vet for his or her advice on this.

Postpartum Pit Shots

My vet tells me that the newer vet school graduates who have come to work for her have been taught that postpartum oxytocin shots are unnecessary. Bitches are biologically programmed to clean themselves out. The breeders and vets I surveyed were divided on this. My vet provides me with oxytocin, which I administer religiously after delivery is done. It stimulates contractions and helps expel retained placental material. The one time I didn't insist (it was our first litter) the bitch developed a raging metritis and we nearly lost her. This is surely not scientific evidence, but it's good enough for me! Use of oxytocin to

stimulate the uterus *during* whelping is another matter, of course, and should be done only with your vet's blessing. Inappropriate timing can result in a ruptured uterus, and loss of the bitch and her babies.

A Friend In Need

Every time I read from my collection of breeding and whelping books, I learn something new, and there is a staggering amount of information available on the Internet. Some valuable references follow, but we should never underestimate the value of a more experienced friend. I'm an "old hand" at this to my neophyte student with the pregnant Boxer, but a near-novice compared to someone who has been breeding for 30 or 40 years. During a very trouble-filled whelping, which occurred several years ago, I spent virtually the entire night on the phone with a friend in who lives 1000 miles from here. Her advice and her support were invaluable. If you are lucky, you'll have someone like that on *your* speed-dial.

NEONATE PUPPIES

CHARLA HILL, AUTHOR

Here is a fact that we have to live with. Most of us are not vets, mid wives, nurses. We do the best we can. Trouble is puppies are not born under the front porch and entirely taken care of by the dam; we have to assist. So, now that your puppies are just born, what do you do?

BE VIGILANT

As a mother hen, I stopped having babies, and started having puppies, and I say hang over the whelping box! I can never understand when someone goes back to work, or out to lunch when their puppies are less than 12 hours old. I can never understand when someone says, "My bitch won't let me near those puppies". Puppies die anyhow; that is life, but when we can intervene to maintain their well being, I say, Intervene! Bitches are for the most part born with strong mothering instincts, but they don't have antibiotics and tubes for feeding if a puppy is stressed during the whelping or is small. And, for the bitch that was born with none of the instincts, the mother with her first pups, for example, has to be taught.

ASSIST THE BITCH

I remember my first litter. The bitch had been already C sectioned once when we bought her, and so we opted for a C section again, rather than risking a ruptured uterus or worse. Home and feeling better, she would walk away from the puppies and turn her back. Now, I don't know what happened with the first litter she had, but she wasn't interested in these puppies. My instincts told me, I was not going to feed them, she had milk, and she was going to do it. I grabbed her beard as she was turning her back, and I screamed in her face. "You will take care of these babies!" She did. That was the last time she ignored them. Sometimes you have to make them understand.

SURVIVAL OF THE FITTEST??

There is a strong argument for survival of the fittest, but

this isn't the middle ages or a fact of evolution. We have the tools to assist survival. Because a puppy is small may not necessarily be due to genetics. It could be among other things that the placenta was poorly located, or the bitch had a huge litter.

The breeder isn't called that for no reason. A breeder is one who oversees the result of the mating. That is why the stud owner isn't called the breeder. It is the breeder's job to do all he/she can to insure that the puppies survive. Sometimes there are things that happen due to management, not nature. These can be reversed, and puppies live long healthy lives.

SUPPLIES NEEDED

There is certain equipment a breeder should have before puppies are born. After tube feeding an entire litter for 3 weeks because the dam had eclampsia, I know that to be prepared is essential for a puppy to survive.

Beg, borrow or buy the following:

- An indoor/outdoor digital thermometer. (the outdoor cord with sensor goes in the bottom of the box under the bedding to tell you what the temp is, and the indoor tells you the room temp. A cold puppy is a dead one, but by the same token you don't want to cook them either.)
- A gram scale that weighs up to 1,000 grams. (Your search for this should be a mission) and draw a chart with columns to record weights.
- A #5 French human preemie silicon tube or veterinary red rubber feeding tube in a pinch, as the human kind is so much better. For these you may need a vet prescription or referral to a hospital supply business. Buy at least two
- 12CC syringes that fit the end of the feeding tube for the first week and larger ones for the end of the second and third weeks.
- Milk replacer, I use Esbilac. (There are many tales about the various brands, but my puppies have always tolerat-

ed Esbilac with no side effects.)

- A rectal thermometer.
- All the books on whelping and rearing puppies you can put your hands on. My favorite is The Joy of Breeding Your Own Show Dog by Anne Serranne. Read them two or three times. Just remember there are some differences between breeds.
- A thick fleecy material that the litter can rest on, better have at least 4 pieces.
- A piece of foam egg carton type mattress padding to put under the fleecy. This will keep the puppies supported better with less risk of going flat.
- Supplemental heat. I use a doggy heating pad. Too much heat can cook puppies, but if you have the thermometer, and a rheostat control, monitoring all the time, you shouldn't have a problem. I have an Electro kennel which fits the bottom of the whelping box. Temp should be max of 90o but min of 85o the first 5 days. I prefer this to a heat lamp.
- A veterinarian you can call day or night. This is getting harder and harder to secure.

IT WON'T BE LONG

The most important part of Neonate care is to be vigilant. When after spending the entire night whelping the pups, the body needs to rest, but resist the urge to fall into a deep sleep. If you have an offer of help, take it. With my daughter as an infant, after being wakened frequently during the night, changing multiple diapers, I said to myself, "This could last several years."

Fortunately, newly born puppies only take several weeks of intensive care. You can get used to it for this short time.

WEIGHING THE PUPPIES

Birth weight is often misleading. If you put the newborn on a scale right away, then 8 hours later it has lost weight, it may only be fluid loss, as newborn puppies are very saturated, and often when dry they drop several grams. I generally wait until all the puppies have been born.

Keep a weight chart. Make a column for each puppy. You should have made some sort of identifying mark on each one when it was dry after being born. I use common nail polish. It is never toxic, and lasts. We have marked our puppies like this, dot head, dot withers, dot back, two dot back, etc. You get the idea. When I look into the whelping box at first glance I can see who is nursing, and who is not. I can tell which puppy is which. Of course, if there are different colors of coat, then it is even easier. I prefer this to anything around the neck. It can become caught and possible strangulation could occur.

The first 48 hours is critical. A puppy who loses 10% of its birth weight is probably in trouble. In Anne Serrane's book there is an excellent description of how to use a home

made glucose oral solution to save a puppy who isn't strong enough to suckle efficiently. I have used this frequently. A puppy doesn't fall asleep because it is full. It lacks the energy to stay awake.

A puppy is born with very low glycogen stores in the liver (that's the storage form of glucose) and so they are totally dependant on external sources of energy in the first few days. It's not that the liver (with the action of insulin) is incapable of converting glucose to glycogen. Instead every bit of glucose that the pup takes in is USED up so there is nothing to spare. And there is no subcutaneous fat to use as energy stores either. So pups can become hypoglycemic very easily. Waking a puppy before it wakes itself, and putting it to a nipple can be helpful in pushing the pup to gain. Also a smaller pup who is shoved out of the way by bigger brothers needs that extra time without competition.

For the first 48 hours, a puppy should be nursing almost 50 minutes of every hour. If this seems excessive, for some of that time the pup will probably be asleep with the nipple in its mouth. They seem to like to hang on to the food source. After 48 hours they are content to slide off and sleep by the dam's side. The amount of time spent suckling will gradually decline as the pup grows and can take more food each time. Don't be tempted to feed milk replacer, but use the glucose solution for energy to continue to suckle.

The weight gains can be small during these first two days, but there should be some small gain, or at least no loss. I weigh every 12 hours for the first two days, more frequently if I suspect trouble. To see how much a puppy is taking at each nursing, you can get a rough idea by weighing before it takes the nipple, and then weighing again when it falls asleep. A close estimate is that each gram the puppy gained is approximately a CC of liquid. If the puppy is sucking and doesn't show gain, it means that it is an ineffective nurser, and a candidate for supplementing.

A puppy who doesn't gain, but continues to lose weight, should be pushed. I have taken a small syringe, pulling on the milk gland, squeezing out a drop or two and sucking it into the syringe. I have taken 2 or 3 CCs of the mother's own milk this way and tube fed that. I don't feel comfortable using a milk replacer for the first 2 days. Once you hit the third day, go to Esbilac.

By the third day, if you are seeing a gain, a puppy should be gaining roughly 30 grams in 24 hours. There are puppies who are little hoglets, and they gain 50 or 60 grams daily. This can be exceptionally dangerous for the Scottie pup as they soon become too large for the skeletal structure to support them. That can lead to Flat Puppy syndrome. This can be life threatening. If you have a single pup or only two, often this is a problem since they have all the "dinner plates" to themselves. At the point you see too much weight gain, let mom come into the kitchen while

the puppies sleep for awhile, and monitor that gain closely. One or two days of this kind of weight gain isn't harmful; it's when it continues over three or four days or more.

Furthermore, overeating can cause a puppy to pass a thick, yellow, very smelly bowel movement that even the mom doesn't want to clean. Some people are worried that this is a kind of diarrhea which they don't know how to cure. Less feeding time may cure the problem.

This also can occur with newborns who have an underdeveloped digestive system, and it generally clears in a day or so. If you take mom out of the box the puppies will whine and squeal. Clump them together and lay a piece of fleece over them for comfort which you will remove when mom returns. It will make them think they are still with her and protected.

DON'T BE AFRAID TO TUBE FEED

Yes, it sounds so scary! But it is so easy! Remember, if the puppy can squeal when the tube is inserted, it is in the esophagus leading to the stomach, not the trachea (wind-pipe leading to the lungs). I got a call from a panicked breeder. "My puppies are dying." They aren't gaining weight." I asked, "are they losing?" "No, but they don't gain either." My answer was that they weren't getting enough milk nursing, and that they would have to be tube fed. The reply was "I can't do that". I said, "You have to or they will die for sure. Better you kill them trying, than letting them starve to death." Don't wait too long. Don't wait until those puppies have gone too long with no gain. There are diagrams in every good whelping book on how to do it. Your veterinarian can also assist you in learning how.

Some breeders like to bottle feed. I have thought often that seems more natural. My last litter had to be tube fed, due to the fact that the mother had eclampsia, I had already tried the small nurser bottles sold in the catalogs for dogs. They didn't work. I went to the baby section of my local Walmart. I bought three different types of baby bottles. Those puppies HATED it. They would not agree to taking the hard and inflexible nipple in their mouths. I went back to the tube.

Baby bottles don't give you an exact measurement of how much milk is being ingested; a syringe with tube attached is a certain amount. The puppy may fight the tube at first, but it is so fine, that it slips down the throat very easily. If the puppy is fussy, put the pup on your lap with the front feet on your knee and the head elevated. Take the puppy's head completely in your opposite hand like a ball, and rock the head very gently as you insert the tube. This has a great calming effect.

FLAT PUPPIES

Much has been written on this topic. It is my idea that

one of the common reasons in part, is the lack of calcification of the ribs coupled with weight gain. When a puppy is born, the bones are really soft and pliable, rather like the cartilage in the human ear. As the puppy grows, the bones harden and take in calcium. With a heavy bodied breed, such as the Scottie, a puppy may have some delay in this process. Also, the ribs are connected with cartilage toward the pup's sides and can fold at that point. The heavy body, with a stomach full of milk, while laying face down, may have a problem. The ribs are just too soft to hold the weight of that puppy. Naturally, they will not often stay on their backs like human babies. Flat puppies often have a ridge at each side which can be felt that is very pronounced, as the sternum(breast bone) collapses inward. As the puppy fills its stomach, there is nowhere for it to go but upward toward the diaphragm and lungs causing pain. Often the puppy starts to nurse, screams and stops. It is the pressure on the diaphragm that causes the pain.

We once x-rayed a compromised puppy. The stomach had pushed the lungs upward, displacing the heart almost into the throat. That puppy was gasping and turning blue. With oxygen, he did better, but still did not survive. The lungs, which normally float free in the rib cage, were being scratched against the ribs with every breath. He ended up with pneumonia. His cry was sharp like a bird. He was in great pain.

Those puppies can survive. The idea is to help them until they grow and calcify enough to support the body weight. It is critical at that time that the puppy not gain much more than 30 grams in 24 hours, and the bedding must not be flat. The bedding should be very spongy, and not press against the chest. A puppy with this problem can be held up in the hand with the forefinger and thumb supporting the front legs while the back feet dangle. Gravity puts the organs in the right place and takes the pressure off the diaphragm. This puppy may also need more oxygen.

It is possible to obtain a small tank of oxygen, but today, one needs a prescription. A veterinarian can supply that. It isn't inexpensive, but may be worth the cost. It is possible to construct a small mask by cutting off the top third of a small pop bottle. Drill a hole in the cap for the tube, and tape the rough edges. This can be placed over the puppy's muzzle while the puppy breathes.

The veterinarian can also prescribe something for pain. This puppy can relax, and when he falls asleep can be placed on his back. That will take the pressure off of the chest. While it is normal for the puppy to sleep on its chest, you will see these stressed puppies trying to raise their heads up the side of the dam and stretching themselves. When they are relaxed they can be placed on their backs. For puppies that will not stay in this position, place some strips of foam under the bedding in the box for them to pull themselves up. These puppies will do better when tube fed

as the puppy can be held upright taking pressure off the diaphragm.

FADING PUPPIES

They are those who do not nurse vigorously, seem different in the hand, more limp, and fade away. Sometimes they make no noise, but more often they cry pitifully. They are very hard to save, as there is generally something wrong. Either there is bacteria, virus, or physical deformities internally. Generally these puppies have a good weight gain at first, but then slow down. If you see no weight gain for 24 hours, it is time to intervene. Check the puppy's temperature. It seems like a human rectal thermometer is huge for the puppy, but with Vaseline, it will slide in easily. Take the temp of one that appears normal to get a baseline. If the compromised puppy is appreciably lower, do not tube feed with milk replacer, use Pedialyte, bought in the baby section at the pharmacy. A chilled pup cannot digest well but needs fluids to avert dehydration. Warm that puppy very slowly, and when the temp is the same as the others, you can tube feed it. At the same time, use a broad spectrum antibiotic. If the puppy has contracted a bacteria, it can help. I use Cephalexin liquid, and adjust the dosage to the puppy's weight mathematically. I mix it with Pedialyte and tube feed, so I know that all the medication has been delivered. If you pay close attention to how puppies cry, you can tell whether it is life threatening, an upset stomach, like colic, or if they are just too hot. You can also tell if the puppy is mad, and for example, has found himself stuck in the corner behind mom.

If after 24 hours, you don't see the puppy improve, it will probably not survive. That is the hardest part, watching a seemingly perfectly formed puppy fade away and die. We are not God, and we have to know that there is a reason, albeit we may not understand. I do not separate the puppy from the dam. Some books say that the dam will push the weak puppy to the side, but I have found some Scottie bitches are worried about the puppy who isn't doing well. Removing the puppy often causes them to be unsettled, restless and looking for that pup.

By the same token, I have left the puppy in the box, and in two instances, the dam has put her whole body over the puppy suffocating it, and putting it out of its misery. I think they are smarter sometimes than we think. In one instance, I removed a puppy which had just died, and the dam was looking for it and whining. I put it back, she sniffed it all over, pushed it to the side, and about an hour later, I was able to remove it with no problem. She had decided that it wasn't going to live. Their philosophy on death and dying is quite straight forward. They never mourn very long, and their attention immediately turns to the puppies which need her.

We can learn by their example.

PROVIDING WARMTH

While visiting a breeder in Scotland who had a litter of 5 born the day previously in March, I saw a whelping box on legs very similar to mine. It had below an agricultural radiant heater under the box. The heat came through the floor. While the room was a comfy 75o by the fireplace, which heated the room, the box floor radiated heat upwards. The dam was comfortable, not panting, while the puppies were safely warmed.

I have been successful with the Lectro Kennel in the bottom of the box under the bedding. With the indoor/outdoor thermometer, I monitor easily. If the temperature is too high, the pups are restless and generally have a whiney cry. This happens more often in summer when the temperature is already warm enough, but breeders add heat for good measure. If the home is air conditioned, you may need more warmth. Often by closing the register in the room, and opening the window, it can be warm enough.

I know many different methods which breeders use for supplementing warmth. Some breeders use a human heat lamp, but since it shines over the dam as well, she may want to leave the puppies more often if she is too hot. I have also read about fires caused by these lamps.

There is a light lamp used for piglets, which can be mounted over the box, but again the dam can be too warm. Several breeders have used a human heating pad but there is danger with a bitch that she may chew and sever the wires which could even cause electrocution.

Puppies cannot regulate their own body temperatures at first, and have no shiver mechanism developed. The temperatures I go by are to keep the box at 85-90o the first week, lowering by 5o for each week following. That should bring it to about 75o by the third week.

Toward the end of the third week, puppies are urinating by themselves, and unless it is winter and still very cold, the heating pad can be turned off.

If after taking the heating pad out, the puppies are not up on their feet, you can use the rubberized material which is sold to keep rugs in place, or in cabinets to set crystal on. It is lacy like, and very sticky in feel. It gives great traction, and is machine washable. I lay it over newspaper so puppies can get footing to do their business. Puppies whose back feet slide out beneath them will be able to navigate easily on this surface.

There are many other difficulties which can occur while puppies are very young, and they are discussed at length in many of the books available. Hopefully all your litters will be sturdy and healthy and grow into champions. The more litters you have, the more problems you will encounter, but take heart and stay the course. There is nothing more rewarding than breeding your own champion.



Whelping Box

The design for the whelping box is not completely ours, but we have made many variations on the original which has improved the functionality. The box is practical as it has legs. Being at chair level, it will allow the breeder to assist easily in the whelping process without having to sit on the floor. Ours is often pulled up to the edge of the bed so that I can have a few winks while waiting for the birthing to begin. It is well known that many bitches whelp in the night.

Furthermore, the box at chair level lends itself more readily to handling the puppies more frequently. The more the puppies are handled, the more easily they are socialized. In most weather, being elevated, cool drafts are not going to cause problems. It is enclosed on all sides in the birthing area also.

As readily seen the box is divided into two parts. The upper part, which has wire mesh windows, is the area where the dam can get cooler if she needs to, and where she can stretch out fully between nursing times. I have observed that most dams will spend almost 24 hours a day with the pups for the first week. They do nurse most of each hour and fall asleep with a teat in their mouth. During the second week, the dam may leave them as they sleep

longer between each nursing. There have been several instances when we were concerned that the dam was not staying with her pups as much as she should. It became clear to us, that these were usually dams who had a lot of rich milk, and their puppies had a tendency to be very fat. I believe that the dam knows instinctively that they cannot eat too much or they won't be able to get on their feet.

The lower portion, which is completely enclosed, is where the bitch will instinctively go to scratch papers before labor starts. We place bedding in the windowed portion and newspaper in the enclosed section. As the time draws near, the dam spends less time where there are windows and more time in the enclosed area. It is where the puppies will be born.

When we know that all the puppies have been born, we remove any soiled newspaper, and we put the heating pad in the enclosed area with fleece material covering it. This is where the dam will stay with her puppies until they are about 2-3 weeks old.

At this time, the puppies begin to crawl up over the pig rail, and into the windowed section. We push the box up to our love seat where the dam can climb out and rest. Then we remove the heating pad. We replace the heating

pad with newspaper, and cover it with fleece until we see that the puppies can get on their feet well. It gives them footing to potty, and the paper is absorbent. An alternative is to use the lacey rubberized material which is put under throw rugs to prevent slippage, and the same material which is used on cupboard shelves for glassware.

The puppies at this time prefer to spend their time in the top windowed part of the box. They will toddle over the edge into the bottom to do their bathroom duties. To insure that they do this (some litters are cleaner than others), I place them in that area when I wake them up. After we see that they can walk well, and can get their footing, we take the fleece or rubberized material off of the top of the newspaper, and lo and behold, the puppies are paper trained. They progress to this so easily.

When the puppies are about 4 weeks old, I let them play in a plastic wading pool on the floor (no water of course) with a rug on one side and papers on the other. They continue to sleep in the box until they are about 5-6 weeks old, and then they are transferred to an exercise pen.

All our puppies are raised in this manner, and we have given the design to many people who also have used it successfully.


This site has bottles and preemie nipples that actually work. They are extremely reasonable – these were what Debbie was concerned with.

Another suggestion from Debbie: With two bitches bred she found herself in need of a second whelping box, and elected to use a 3 x 3. The prob-

lem: pig rails. This was solved by tying paint rollers from the dollar store to the 3 x 3. You can determine height, they are deep enough for pups to crawl under, washable, and soft for mom. Seems in a wooden box you could run a dowel or tension rod through them.

Charhill WHELPING BOX Tom Hill

Materials Needed:

- 2 sheets of 4' x 8' plywood, 3/8" thick
- 1 ten foot 2" x 2" and 1 six foot 2"x 2" (for legs)
- 1 ten foot 1" x 4" (for pig rails)
- 1 box of wood screws
- 2 hinges
- 2 eye hooks
- 6' of wire mesh screen (plus 1/4" x 1" wood trim for wire mesh frames)

Directions:

3/8" plywood is lightweight and is what I use. However, it dose take some time and planning to get the screws lined up.

if you are not concerned with the weight, (we move ours around a lot) , then 1/2" or 3/4" plywood is much easier to work with, but again, heavier

I screw everything together, because it is easier to replace a section if needed.

Caulk all the seams with non-toxic putty. (This keeps urine from soaking down into the wood and eliminates any dirt buildup.

Prime the wood and paint with oil base white paint. (Latex paint just doesn't hold up)

When completed, measure the "Lower Level" and make pig rails to fit accordingly.

The one end is hinged so that you can fold it down, and help mother whelp puppies.

PUPPY CARE

POST WEANING TO 12 MONTHS

Congratulations! You have gotten your litter through the critical first 3-4 weeks without any major catastrophes. The pups are off and running, wallowing happily in their food, playing with one another and exploring their world. They may still try to nurse mom when she visits, but the presence of needle sharp teeth is quickly bringing this intimacy to a halt. Eyes are wide open, and tails are held high. You are back in your own bed again for a good night's sleep, content that your pups are rapidly developing into the noisy messy and rowdy Scottie pups we all love.

Now begins the work of raising these pups to become healthy, well-socialized, and well-trained Scotties. There are many factors involved in this labor of love including health issues, management practices, nutritional support and prop-

er socialization and training techniques. These are all vast subjects with many valid opinions on all sides. Suffice it to say no medicine or vaccine can make up for poor management with any livestock species, and dogs are no exception. Excellent diet, strict hygiene and a stress free environment are essential to any successful puppy-raising venture. For this article, I will assume these factors are in place and will emphasize a preventive health program for successful puppy rearing.

VACCINATION

From the perspective of the immune system, a newborn puppy is totally naïve. All immunity in the neonate must be acquired passively from his dam because no competent immune system yet exists to protect him. Within 24-48 hours, the pup must absorb the lifesaving antibodies from its mother's colostrum through special channels in the small intestinal walls. After the first 2 days, these channels are closed, and this precious opportunity is lost. As our pup grows and develops and begins to explore his environment, he will be increasingly exposed to a variety of organisms, a process that will inoculate him gradually and naturally to his world. And for the first 6-9 weeks of life, the maternal antibodies in his system will contin-

ue to protect our pup against all forms of virulent diseases, *including the components of these diseases in the vaccines we administer*. Therefore vaccination of a healthy, dam-raised pup any earlier than 6 weeks is basically wasted due to interference of maternal antibodies that are still on duty. By 6 weeks of age, however, this protection is beginning to wane and the pup is increasingly vulnerable to infection.

There is a huge debate currently swirling in the veterinary and lay world about vaccination: Are we vaccinating too often? Are we over-stimulating immune systems in our dogs and cats by over-vaccination, producing undesirable side effects and conditions such as hypothyroidism, immune mediated anemia and a variety of cancers? What is an acceptable risk to benefit ratio? What is a reasonable interval between vaccinations in adult dogs and cats to protect them adequately without overdoing it? Is titer testing reliable, and what is the true duration of immunity of the vaccines we give? These are all good questions that are stimulating lively discussion and research. But there is no debate in the area of puppy vaccination: **Puppies need their shots, period.**

Puppy vaccination should begin at 6 weeks and be repeated every 3-4 weeks after that until 16 weeks of age. One shot does not ensure protection. In fact for a few days after the first vaccination, the puppy is entirely vulnerable to infection due to the decline in protective maternal antibody levels and the incompetence of a newly developing immune system. A normal puppy's immune system requires 3-4 weeks to process, react, and then prepare for the next round of vaccine. This "Stimulate, Process, and then Re-stimulate" program is essential for a competent immune system to "remember" the components of the vaccine and be able to mount an adequate defense if the pup is challenged with the actual disease. Vaccination intervals that are shorter than 3 weeks are ineffective and may in fact result in vaccine failure due to over-stimulated cells. On the other hand, vaccination intervals longer than 4 weeks may also result in vaccine failure due to lack of adequate stimulation and the subsequent loss of memory.

Core vaccines are Distemper, Parvovirus, and Adenovirus (canine hepatitis) which are given as a combo shot. The combo often includes the Parainfluenza virus component which is one of the causative agents of kennel cough. Some veterinarians also include Coronavirus in the puppy shot, although this enteric viral disease is rarely a problem in puppies over 6 weeks of age. Rabies, the fourth core vaccine, is given only once from 12 to 16 weeks of age, depending on State law and your own veterinarian's protocol. As for the non-core vaccines, the intranasal Bordetella (kennel cough) vaccine can be given as

early as 8 to 12 weeks but I prefer 16 to 20 weeks, depending on your puppy class, dog show or boarding schedules. Remember that this vaccine is protective for only about 6 months, so dogs traveling to shows should be boosted semiannually. Lyme, Leptospirosis, Giardia, and Coronavirus are other non-core vaccines, which may be incorporated in the protocol if the risk for exposure is high.

What about the Modified Live Vaccine (MLV) vs. Killed debate? Over the years, much has been written and discussed on the pros and cons of using MLV vs. Killed vaccines, but the bottom line is: MLV vaccines impart a stronger and longer lasting immunity. Today the strains used in MLV vaccines incorporate the newest biotechnology to ensure safety and most of the combo shots used today are MLV. (Rabies is *always* a killed vaccine.) **Warning: Never give a puppy less than 4 weeks of age MLV Distemper or Parvovirus vaccines. The Distemper may cause encephalitis and the Parvo can cause fatal heart disease in a neonate.**

PARASITES

How about an appointment for a thorough physical exam, including a fecal check, for that litter at 6 to 9 weeks of age? Yes, we all do take excellent care of our Scotties, but parasites can happen in the best of families! Even the most pampered bitch may harbor certain intestinal parasites in a dormant state, waiting for the stress of pregnancy and whelping to emerge and to infect the pups. Some parasites are even capable of infecting the pups *in utero*. Round and hookworms are especially pathogenic for the pups, and deworming can be done as early as 3 weeks of age if necessary with a follow-up in 2 weeks. Other intestinal parasites including the protozoan coccidia, whipworms and giardia may be problematic and can be treated by your vet. Basically, the rule of thumb is if there is diarrhea in a pup, think parasites *first*. Take a sample in and have it checked. If one pup has anything, they all do, and they should all be treated.

Heartworm testing is not started until the pup is at least 6 months of age, but preventive should be started at 8 to 12 weeks. In the warmer weather, pups can be bitten by mosquitoes and infected with heartworms as well as any adult, even though the litter may not spend a great deal of time outside. This is an easy disease to prevent and a mean one to treat.

Check the pups carefully for any fleas or flea residue, as well as Cheyletiella (Walking Dandruff mites), Sarcoptes and ear mites. These are all communicable external parasites, which can infest a young litter in a short time and have the potential for making everyone in the household (including you!)

very itchy. Thankfully, many of today's newer generation parasite control products are safe and effective, even in the very young pup. Another consideration as the pup reaches 6 months of age and older is the insidious appearance of non-itchy bare patches on the head, around the eyes or on the legs. Juvenile onset Demodicosis is a fairly common problem and is evidence of a weakened immune system as the pup approaches puberty. Often this form of Demodicosis will resolve spontaneously as the pups' immune system gets back in control, but occasionally the pup has to be dipped or, preferably, spot treated for this form of mange.

DENTITION is another important aspect of puppy rearing that sometimes catches us off guard. Nothing is worse than opening the mouth of your beautiful 6-month-old show prospect and seeing a bite gone awry. We all know bad bites can be genetic and/or a management issue, so it pays to be vigilant. Starting at 4 months of age, open the mouth daily and monitor the progression of permanent tooth eruption. The smaller front incisors will erupt first followed by the premolars. The larger molars and canine teeth erupt last, and all permanent teeth should be in place by about 6 months of age. There should be no delay in eruption of the permanent teeth after the baby teeth have fallen out. If there is a delay, there may in fact be no adult tooth coming at all, which is unfortunate. Missing teeth is a growing problem in several breeds today. The full complement of adult teeth on the top should be 6 incisors, 2 canines, 8 premolars, and 4 molars. The bottom is the same with an additional molar per side.

Watch carefully for retained baby teeth, especially the canines! This condition more than anything else can throw a good bite off. Once the adult teeth have erupted, any retained baby teeth should be popped out or pulled by your vet. Don't wait until the adult canine is all the way in to start worrying about that retained baby tooth. As soon as the adult tooth is about 1/3 of the way in and the baby tooth is discolored, get to work. However, care should be taken when extracting a baby canine to get the entire root. I have heard some talk of extracting the baby canines preemptively, even before the adult teeth have erupted. This is a dangerous and unnecessary practice as you can damage the adult tooth bud underlying the deep root of the intact baby tooth. As a result, the adult canines may come in with missing enamel and may develop ugly brown stains that cannot be removed. It's just not worth the risk.

Ideally, when you open that mouth, you will see a clean scissors bite and proper occlusion in the premolars. Yes, a level bite is accepted in the ring, but

those gorgeous white teeth, arrayed in a scissors bite, are what we strive for!


Finally, one more growing pain merits our attention: **TONSILLITIS** in the 6-18 month old, post-pubertal pup. The tonsils are lymphoid glands located in two pockets or crypts in the back of the throat. Like lymph nodes, their job is to fight infection. When they are not inflamed, they are not easily seen because they remain deep in their crypts. But when they are fighting infection, they often become infected themselves and will enlarge. Swollen, red tonsils that are out of their crypts can be easily seen by your vet (and you too, with some practice!) if the dog will permit its mouth to be opened wide enough. It is important to remember that tonsils can be infected and even ulcerated, and **not** be visible outside of the crypts. This will completely baffle your veterinarian, but it is a relatively common occurrence in our Scotties!

When the tonsils enlarge, they are usually quite painful. This causes the dog to gag, as if something is in the throat. He may make exaggerated swallowing motions, paw at his beard, lick his lips repeatedly, and balk on the lead. Most affected dogs are reluctant to eat because of the pain associated with swallowing. They may be hungry and go to the food bowl but refuse to eat. **Note: A lack of appetite and thin condition may be the only signs of tonsillitis in a young Scottie!** Many dogs with tonsillitis are not as active as normal, but they usually do not have fever. In my experience with Scotties, they are usually acting fine, but they do not want to eat, they won't hold weight, and they don't show well because the lead hurts.

The definitive treatment for tonsillitis is surgery, although your vet may start out with a course of antibiotics first. The antibiotics may seem to help for a while, but the condition recurs and the dog still refuses to eat. Don't be frightened off at the thought of surgery! The most important thing about a tonsillectomy is to find a surgeon who is willing and able to do it. That means the proper equipment must be used: either a cauterizing snare or a laser instrument. This procedure **MUST NOT** be done with conventional instruments. With the right equipment in the hands of a skilled surgeon, this is an outpatient surgery that is relatively painless and will have your Scottie back to the food bowl and eagerly gaiting on lead in no time.

Enjoy your wonderful puppies! Yes, they take time, patience, and tons of effort. No, your house will not be the same and your life will be topsy-turvy for a while. But I'm certain that you will find raising puppies to be one of the most rewarding experiences in your life. Have fun!

PLAY TIME - PUPPY TUNNELS

By Ed Leab

There should be three boxes made of pine.

The First Box

This box measures 6 inches wide x 6 inches long mounted on 2-inch tall sides. It makes a u-shaped tunnel. This is placed in with the puppies when they are old enough to climb the two inches up onto it and fall off without being hurt.

The Second Box

This box measures 8 inches wide x 8 inches deep mounted on 4-inch tall sides - another tunnel. This is placed in with and at the same time as the first box and set next to it when the puppies are old enough to climb both and tumble off without being hurt.


The Third Box

This box measures 12 inches wide x 12 inches deep mounted on 6-inch sides - the third tunnel. This is placed in with and at the same time as the first two boxes and sits next to the other two boxes to form a stair step affect. These are put in with the puppies when they are old enough to fall off the tallest box and not be hurt.

The puppies will climb play on, in, and through, the boxes. This teaches them dexterity and just to have fun chasing each other. Every puppy needs to have a least one day in his life that he is "King Of The Mountain"! An important benefit is that you will quickly be able to see interaction in their personalities, and you leader will stand out. They will also chew on the boxes - so you will need to watch them for this.

The Bigger Box/Tunnel Set


This box/tunnel set can be enlarged to the following diagram. The multi-directional tunnel through the middle of the largest construction is wonderful fun for the puppies.

Mobiles Aid Puppy Development

BY ED LEAB

When we first decided to be responsible for bringing puppies into the world many questions, with all the accompanying worries, crossed through our mind. Beside the normal questions of who to breed to who, and why - was what do you do with the puppies after they arrive and begin to move around and to become mobile.

How do you "ENSURE", healthy well-adjusted puppies? What do you do to help the puppies become adjusted, other than to let them and yourself live through the puppy litter fights. After the first two, or three, litters, and watching the puppies play and chew on each other like a bolt of thunder and lightening - there right in front of me - was the answer the puppies need a M O B I L E.

Human babies entertain themselves when they are laying on their back in the crib by watching a mobile attached to the side of their crib by the parents. The purpose of the mobile is to entertain and amuse the baby with movement and pleasant noise. The baby is not yet in control of all of his or her

motor skills, the mobile helps in this development process.

A mobile is intended to, among other things, teach motor skill dexterity. Puppies need the same thing. Puppies at about 5 - 7 weeks or so become curious, love to play tug, pull on things and to generally explore them.

When I had a litter of 4 puppies in a 4 x 4, I decided to put my theory to the test. I found a bungee and stretched it corner-to-corner across the 4 x 4. I tied 4 or 5 baby toy's that rattle and make noise from it so that the toys would not quite touch the floor of the pen. The idea was as the puppies crawled past the toys they would bump into them, their curiosity would kick in and nature would take over.

Some of the best laugh's I have ever had, I got sitting by the 4 x 4 watching the puppies pulling on the toys suspended from the bungee. They would tug really hard, getting really annoyed because the toy kept pulling back. The bungee, of course, would pull back as hard as the puppy pulled on it.

Then another puppy would see this going on and of course want to take the toy away from the puppy "at work" pulling so hard on it - you can guess the rest!

The long and short of it is - "the bungee mobile" socialized the puppies in the litter, helped them to learn and developed their motor skills. It definitely kept their curiosity up.

We have successfully used the "bungee mobile" for about 8 years now and it has never failed to help us produce very strong healthy puppies. I recommend it highly. All you need to do is to stretch a bungee that goes from one corner to the other and hang 4 or 5 baby toys from it about an inch from the floor of the pen so that they will swing freely - and let nature do the rest.

Just do your best to pick action baby toys that are very durable. I promise you all the toy's will get a thorough work out, you will have healthy puppies, and lots of laughs watching puppies do what they do best - play.

Natural Breedings

When our new editor called and asked me to write this article, I was not sure how to approach the subject. I know many breeders prefer to do their breedings by artificial insemination. I have always felt the natural way was the best and most productive.

I know some people feel that Scottish Terriers are difficult to breed because of their build. That is so easy to rectify by using a breeding platform where needed. In most cases it does take two people to do the breeding, one to hold the bitch and the other to handle the stud dog.

The most important thing is to be sure the bitch is ready to accept the male. We have always relied on vaginal smears, but then I had a partner who was a great reader of smears. There is

nothing worse than asking a bitch to be cooperative when nature is telling her differently, especially a maiden bitch.

Too many people do their breedings to their schedule and not nature's. Every-thing that can be done must be done to make the bitch comfortable and at ease before the breeding, especially a visiting bitch.

Good stud dogs are gentlemen but depend on us not to ask them to perform when it is not the proper time. How you start out your young male is very important. He must have complete trust in you and the person controlling the muzzled bitch. Never allow him to be abused by the bitch needlessly. We all know some growling may happen, but hopefully the first couple

of experiences will be with a proven bitch or at least a sweet tempered one.

Naturally there are times when an A.I. may be needed, but never with the first few bitches. I do not like the boys to have to depend on that kind of help from me.

I have started stud dogs at 9 to 10 months of age, but I prefer them to be around a year old. Sometimes the first time takes lots of patience. We all know how silly young Scottie males can be. Believe me, patience and some disappointments in the beginning will payoff in the long run. When all is said and done you want that wonderful stud dog to know his business and what is expected of him when offered an in season, properly timed bitch.

IDEAL KENNELS BREEDING CONTRACT

I. IDEAL KENNELS agree:

O. To require prospective purchasers of pet-quality puppies to sign a spay-neuter purchase agreement.

Eenie meenie minney mo... is there a puppy I can show?

By Joanne Kinnelly

While I am not an "authority", I have always been a "student" and have been fortunate to have wonderful teachers inside and outside my breed. After reading, hearing and seeing lots of ideas, this is the best way I have found to evaluate puppies.

Always evaluate against the standard rather than compare puppies to each other. Don't keep the best of a litter of poor quality and don't only keep the best of a litter of outstanding puppies. You might have to part with them all, or you might be lucky and have to hold onto extra wonderful puppies.

Watch your puppies from the day they are whelped so you know their personalities and habits. Don't try to pick out the show puppies at two or four or six weeks. Just watch how they go about things.

Develop relationships with experienced breeders you can trust. It's really best to get an opinion from a breeder of another breed. Even if they won't recognize the "head to die for" or "perfect ears", they should recognize soundness and balance. You want your puppies to be good dogs first. One of my terrier friends has her litters examined by a Doberman breeder. She has been breeding over 30 years and they both ranked her last four litters almost exactly the same way! A balanced dog is a balanced dog.

Go over your puppies carefully at 10 weeks. Put each one on a table and look at every detail. Put them together in a little yard or x-open and watch how they relate. Be very critical. If you don't know your own dogs, you can't make improvements in your breeding. Look carefully at proportion. A tall, willow

puppy is not going to turn into a low, heavy dog. A Scottie's proportions at 10 weeks should be roughly the same as his adult ones.

Drive the puppies to a new place and have a trusted friend, who is a stranger to them, do an evaluation of each one. Do this also at 10 weeks. You can learn a lot from the trip, and from their reactions to the new place and person. Be honest with yourself about their reactions. Of course they may be intimidated and nervous at first. Watch for those who don't get over it. A puppy who has trouble adapting to a new place at 10 weeks is pretty surely going to have trouble all its life. If you make excuses for him now, you will find yourself going to shows with a lovely dog who is miserable and who will break your heart.

Have your friend examine each puppy away from the others and, using one sheet for each puppy, write down an evaluation of each important characteristic.

Look at the written evaluations and talk them over when he has finished. You should start to see how they stack up against the standard and each other. Re-examine the puppies in the order you think they compare to the standard. This is when you can look really hard at smaller details and discuss differences. Keep a copy of the breed standard on the examining table for reference.

Save the evaluation sheets. Refer to them as you plan and evaluate your next litter. They'll also be helpful in planning a breeding for one of these puppies someday. Seeing things in writing makes you focus better and keeps you from overlooking or forgetting.

Make decisions. If you differ substantially from your non-breed friend, consult a long-time breeder, maybe the stud dog owner. Don't forget to bring the puppies for the stud dog owner to see at 10 weeks, whether or not he gets one. It's nice to get input, especially if you need to choose between similar puppies. What you're trying to do is create a "check and balance" system for yourself. But, use your judgment! Unless you have just started breeding, don't ask others to make your decisions. You have known the pups all along and have the bigger picture. Your friends have only a "snapshot" view of them. On the other hand, if everyone who sees the puppies differs from you, think hard, or keep additional puppies a little longer and learn for yourself.

Last, don't forget to factor in how this puppy will fit into your life, into your showing plans and into your breeding program. Keep enough puppies but don't become a warehouse for dogs. If you hold onto extra puppies until their adult teeth are in at 5 or 6 months, socialize them properly and spend lots of individual time with them so that those who don't stay with you can be happy in a new home. If you must keep a puppy to show but not breed, start watching for the perfect "retirement" home so that when he receives his championship he can have another life. You will make your life lots easier and your puppies' lives richer.

I hope some of this information is useful and that all your puppies are lovely. When one of us has a successful breeding program, we all win.

RESCUED WITH HEART

During the evening of September 6, 2001, Charles and Marlene Hoyler called us to ask if we had heard about puppies for sale in New Holland, PA. According to an ad in a local paper, a man named Zimmerman was offering to sell dogs of various breeds for \$150 each, including several Scottish Terriers. In a conversation with Mr. Zimmerman, Charles had learned that Mr. Zimmerman was selling his breeding stock and moving to a different area.

I immediately called the number listed in the ad and spoke with Mr. Zimmerman. In addition to what he told the Hoylers, Mr. Zimmerman said that he was being forced by the government to close his breeding business and that he had to remove all animals from his property by October 1. When asked how he would dispose of the animals, he said that he would sell what he could and "move" the rest. I asked what he meant by "move" and he responded that any animal not sold would be put down. He said there were five Scottish Terriers on his farm.

Appealing to his sense of decency, I asked Mr. Zimmerman if he would consider surrendering the Scottish Terriers to Rescue as an alternative to killing his animals. At first, he was interested only in selling his dogs, since he had a sizable investment in his breeding stock. He offered to reduce the price per dog to \$125, but was told that Scottish Terrier Rescue will not pay for a dog. At the conclusion of a fairly lengthy conversation, Mr. Zimmerman agreed to release to Rescue any Scottish Terrier that had not been sold, so long as pickup was made by Saturday, September 29. We were not happy about the arrangement, but at least we had the opportunity to save some of the dogs from certain death.

We spoke with Bill Berry later that evening, telling him that we believed we could be getting as many as five Scottish Terriers on September 29. Bill said he would begin reviewing existing applications for rescues and we would have time to begin arranging volunteers to pick up, transport and foster the rescues. But that was not to be.

The next day, September 7, I received a rather cryptic call informing me that a private organization, the identity of which could not be revealed, was negotiating the release of 60 dogs from Mr. Zimmerman. Would Scottish Terrier Rescue be willing to take the eleven Scotties if they were successful in securing their release? Eleven? That would be a bit more work than five, but yes, I was sure we could handle eleven. How soon were they planning to get them? What a shock to learn that the dogs were being released the next day!

Moving with all due haste, we began arranging for volunteers to pick up, transport and foster these rescues. It appeared that eleven would strain our resources, so we began exploring other alternatives. Erica Cerny spoke with Cheryl Root in New York, who agreed to take two or three, at least to foster. Cindy Altmann from the STC of Greater Baltimore volunteered to take three more. That left five for STCGNY - a manageable number. On Saturday, September 8, Linda and I drove to the Humane League of Lancaster County. We've seen puppy mills before, and these dogs were no different from others we've seen. They were filthy and thin. One had a chain embedded in its neck that had to be surgically removed. Several had ear mites and infections and one had a tumor protruding from its eye.

As we began taking inventory of the Scottish Terriers, we found only nine, including a day old pup that was thought to be a Scottie but was not. In our conversations with Lee Wheeler and Maggie Weidinger, it became apparent that two Schnauzers had been mistakenly counted as Scotties and one Scottie, a wheaten female, had disappeared before they went back to the Zimmerman farm to get the dogs. In total, we were left with eight adult Scottish Terriers: two males and six females.

The only conditions imposed by this group, which we were to learn later was Hearts United for Animals, were that all dogs had to be spayed or neutered before being offered for adoption and any dog that could not be placed had to be

returned to them. We reiterated that Rescue would not pay for a dog and we received assurances that the dogs were secured from Mr. Zimmerman in a lawful and legal manner.

To make the transition easier on the dogs, we decided to take three females that were crated together. They were shaggy, dirty and underweight at 15 to 17 pounds and they trembled when humans came near. As I opened the crate to take the first girl out, she raised her paw and waited for me to reach out for her. This seemed strange, but we learned that Mr. Zimmerman had only one arm and the dogs were carried by one front leg.

The following day, September 9, Charles and Marlene Hoyler drove to Lancaster and picked up the two males. They met the Cernys near Easton, PA, and they drove the two boys to the Scranton area, where they met Cheryl Root. Both boys have been neutered and treated for ear mites and a home has been found for one of them.

Later that same day, Arlene Brice, a friend from West Chester whose Scottie masquerades as a Lady Bug, picked up the remaining three. Arlene agreed to foster them until the Baltimore Club Rescue people could pick them up. After bathing them, Arlene realized that only two of the girls were Scotties. The third was a Tibetan Terrier! Arlene contacted Tibetan Terrier Rescue and arranged to turn her over to their rescue people. The two Scotties have since been transported to Baltimore, where they have been spayed and are ready to go to their forever homes.

Two of the three girls who are with us have been spayed and will be ready to adopt at the end of the month. The third girl will be spayed on October 3. It was apparent that none of the three had ever walked on a leash or played with a toy. Nor did they know the taste of meat when it was offered to them. They were shy and withdrawn when they arrived, but each day we see improvement in their demeanors.

Our hats are off to each and every person who participated in this venture - especially on such short notice. A special

Thank You to Arlene Brice, who, while not a member of STCGNY, opened her heart and her home to three rescues with less than one day's notice. And special Thank Yous to Cheryl Root and Cindy Altmann for their support and assistance. And, of course our gratitude goes out to Lee Wheeler and Maggie Weidinger, the HUA, and the Humane League of Lancaster County, without whom none of this would have been possible.

UPDATES:

The three girls who spent time with Jim Cook have all been adopted into wonderful homes. Abbie, apparently the oldest of the trio and the one that Bonnie and Heather looked to for direction, is now living in northern New Jersey with a middle aged couple and her elderly mother. Although her name is still Abbie, we're told that "Mischief" would have been a better name. Abbie is an explorer who wanders through the house opening drawers and cupboards and pulling out anything she finds to claim as her own. Abbie spends considerable time with the elderly mother and they have become inseparable companions.

Heather was adopted on September 30, the same day as Abbie, and she now lives in Coaldale, PA, along with her adopted brother, Maxie. Heather was very shy and withdrawn and seemed to fear being on leash. The slightest tug caused her to sit and cower, but we're pleased to hear from her new family that Maxie has taught Heather the joys of taking walks on the

leash and cuddling on the sofa in front of the fireplace. Now, if Maxie could just teach Heather to share "her" toys....

Bonnie came into heat shortly after arriving at our house, so she was our guest for more than two months. She was very fearful of humans, at first, and would move as far away as possible when approached. By the time she was adopted on November 11, Bonnie had begun to trust us and was content to sit with us for several hours at a time. The problem, however, was how to pick her up. She would not come willingly, but over time she would work herself into a corner and allow herself to be picked up. We're happy to report, however, that Bonnie, now known as Bella, is making wonderful progress in her new home.

Bonnie was adopted by a wonderful family that lives in a suburb of New York City with another rescue named Bonnie. From their weekly reports, Bella has become the leader in their many daily walks, tugging on her leash and urging her rescue sister to move faster. She is still a bit fearful of humans, but the progress made thus far suggests that she will one day be rid of the baggage she carries and will know what it is to live a normal life with a family that loves her.

In spite of the many horrors that these three girls experienced, it now seems possible that the balance of their lives will be

filled with love and kindness rather than cruelty and neglect.

Angus and Shamus who were in foster care with Cheryl Root have both been neutered and adopted and are doing very well. Angus the younger of the two was very timid and stayed constantly by Shamus, the older dog. Angus had treatment for ear mites. Shamus, although he had hematomas in both ears, didn't require treatment. Angus is now MacDuff, living in Marathon, NY with a lovely family in a rural setting. He has a companion dog around his age. He is doing very well with house training and is less timid. Shamus became Duncan and at eight years plus, is living and playing with another rescued Scottie companion, three years old. He too is doing very well with housetraining. Both of

these dogs have very sweet dispositions and were a privilege to foster. Even though they came from a puppy mill life, they responded very well to people and all that was done for them. Both new families are very pleased with them.

The two girls that Cindy Altmann took were named Hope and Liberty when they were picked up by Arlene Brice and were very dependent on each other. They were very shy around adults but wiggled themselves silly with kids. They were not house broken but gave good signs of wanting to be and woke their foster mom, Susan Olsen, early in the mornings whining to go out which was a good first step. They were spayed with no complications and a home was found where they could stay together. The new family in Massachusetts has had rescued Scotties before and have three children who grew up with Scotties. Geoff Dawson was in Baltimore for dog shows and would be going near where the family lived. He was willing to meet the family and take them the girls. The new adoptive family was so excited; they couldn't wait until the next morning to meet the girls. They drove up to Rhode Island to meet with Geoff at 11.00 that night. As the Christmas picture shows, they are now quite attached to Hope and Libby - who kept their names.
