Health Trust Fund News

Marcia Dawson, Chairman

Applause! Applause! Congratulations to the San Francisco Bay Scottish Terrier Club for their very successful Canine Cancer Seminar, held in the Radisson Hotel on Saturday April 6 in Sacramento. Without a doubt this was a conference of major importance for all Scottie owners and veterinarians alike. This ambitious project took months of careful planning, fund raising and cooperation among all club members, but it must be said that the real architect of this successful day was STCA Health Trustee and SFBSTC Board member, Elizabeth Wise. With true Diehard tenacity and dogged determination, Elizabeth worked for nearly a year to bring this labor of love to fruition, and it is thanks to her and all of the SFBSTC members that an event of this caliber was carried out without a hitch. All of those in attendance came away inspired by the researchers' presentations, more appreciative than ever of the complexities of cancer research. And we all came away with a sense of hope that, with scientists such as these in our corner, there will surely be answers and a cure for our Scotties in the future.

Read more about this amazing Seminar in Nancy Aaron's article "The SFBSTC Cancer Seminar- An Observation" in this issue of the *Bagpiper*.

And as a wonderful bonus, Roxanne Huckstep, in attendance all the way from Yorktown, Virginia, volunteered to videotape the entire event. Although an admitted amateur in the video field, Roxanne did a fantastic job, and it is her wish that the SFBSTC will make copies available for a nominal fee to any interested party. More information on the tapes will be published at a later time.

The HTF would like to extend to all the Regional Clubs of the STCA an offer of financial support for other educational events, clinics or seminars in the future. Although all day seminars with presenters of national repute may not always be feasible for each club, the Trustees feel strongly that education of all of our members is a very important part of the mission of the HTF. The Trustees want very much to hear about health concerns and receive proposals from any regional club that is considering any kind of educational event for their members. The SFBSTC has set the standard high for a Regional Club Educational event, and STCA members and Scottie owners everywhere owe this club our heartfelt thanks for its excellent job.

The Trustees met in Sacramento on Friday April 5 and discussed many of the important and exciting issues of Scottie health. On the agenda were the ongoing HTF supported studies on CMO, Scottie Cramp and Cerebellar Abiotrophy (CA), VetGen's vWD clinic results, the new AKC Canine Health Foundation study on Atopic Dermatitis, and the Purdue Bladder Cancer study.

- Dr. Venta is still working tirelessly to unlock the genetic secrets of both CMO and Scottie Cramp, and he reports that he is getting closer all the time to discovering the defects to these diseases, although this process is slow and painstaking.



- Dr. Bell reports that as of 3/26/02, he has had contacts concerning 39 Scotties involving possible cases of CA. Of these, 12 have definitive diagnoses of CA, 6 have possible CA but need confirmation, 6 have been ruled out or a different diagnosis made, and 13 are waiting for videotapes and/or veterinary contacts. Dr. Bell reiterates that based on pedigrees and confirmed cases of CA, the autosomal recessive defective gene causing CA is an old one in Scotties and is widely dispersed in the breed. Dr. Bell recommends that the STCA consider a Scottish Terrier Databank for DNA storage, thereby making genetic material available for future research on any Scottie disease based on a request from the STCA. The HTF plans to investigate this important and valuable possibility.
- VetGen reports that as of 4/4/02, a total of 996 Scotties have been tested for vWD with 7 (0.7%) identified as affected, 114 (11.4%) carriers and 875 (87.9%) clear. A total of 23 tests were sold in the April vWD clinic. Contact the HTF for information on future clinics during the specialty season.
- The Purdue researchers report that the questionnaire return rate for their Bladder Cancer (TCC) study is very encouraging. As of April 1, 2002 there was a Case return rate of 76% and a Control return rate of 66%. Since that update, there have been more forms returned and more participants contacted by the research team to help with questions or concerns they may have. Dr. Glickman and Dr. Knapp hope to have some preliminary results on this epidemiologic study by the end of the year. Examples of topics are canine reproduction, epilepsy, nutrition, breed specific concerns, and many more. Each week will present a new topic and a new chance to learn!

STCA PERFORMANCE AWARDS RULES FOR 2002

The AgilScot award listed below is a new award created to encourage participation and excellence in the area of Agility. It is offered by Kellie and Tim Verrelli. The full explanation for this award follows below:

The AgilScot Agility Award. (AAA) 2002

This award is to recognize dogs that exhibit superior performance and consistency in the sport of Agility. It was patterned after the AKC MACH (Master Agility Championship) Title⁽¹⁾ but was expanded to include dogs in the regular AKC Agility titling programs (NA/NAJ through MX/MXJ) for completeness.

The AgilScot Agility Award will be given to the Scottish Terrier Club of America (STCA) Member who's agility dog has earned the most points in a given year. The AKC MACH Title is open for only dogs who are in Excellent B (both Standard Titling and Jumpers With Weaves), but any level agility dog has the ability to win the AgilScot Agility Award. Agility is a sport for all dogs, but speed and consistency is the goal. Older and slower dogs can do well by being consistent and qualifying in both classes on the same day.

We want to make this award attainable for more Scottish Terrier Members without losing the true meaning of the word agility.

NOTES:

- AgilScot Agility Award(AAA) can only be won by members in good standing with Scottish Terrier Club of America (STCA)
- Only those performances that result in a Qualifying Score (pursuant to AKC Rules and Regulations for Agility) at an approved AKC event will be considered for this award.
- Records are kept by individual dog – Owners with multiple dogs will NOT be tabulated together.
- Dogs/Bitches that have earned this award three years in a row will be allowed to keep the trophy.

Points will be awarded using the following criteria:

- Dogs/Bitches earning a Qualifying Score will receive 5 points (Regardless of Titling/JWW level).
- Dogs/Bitches qualifying in both the Standard Agility Class (Std) and the Jumpers With Weaves (JWW) Class on the same day will receive an extra 10 points (Regardless of Titling/JWW level).
- Additional points for placement will be added as follows:

1. Dogs/Bitches placing 1st in their class receive 4 extra points.
 2. Dogs/Bitches placing 2nd in their class receive 3 extra points.
 3. Dogs/Bitches placing 3rd in their class receive 2 extra points.
 4. Dogs/Bitches placing 4th in their class receive 1 extra point.
- Dogs/Bitches that receive a perfect score of 100 for a class can receive additional points for each whole second under the Standard Course Time (SCT) as follows:
 1. Novice A/B Class
Dogs/Bitches earns 1 point for each full second under standard course time.
 2. Open Class
Dogs/Bitches earns 1.5 points for each full second under standard course time (rounded down).
 3. Excellent A/B Class
Dogs/Bitches earns 2 points for each full second under standard course time.

NOTE:

Standard Course Times are based on a yards-per-second (yps) calculation based on the class (Std or JWW) and the height of the competitor. For Scottish Terriers (who compete in the 8" and 12" jump heights, these rates are as follows:

For Std Titling:

For JWW:

Novice A/B:	2.00 yps
Novice A/B:	2.50 yps
Open:	2.50 yps

—1 (CP) point is awarded for each full second under standard course time. (No partial points are awarded.)
—Dogs earn points from the Ex B Agility Class and/or the Ex B Jumpers With Weaves Class.

Placement Multiplier:

—Dogs placing first in their class double their championship points.
—Dogs placing 2nd in their class receive 1-1/2 time their standard championship points. (All fractions of points are rounded down.)

20 Double Qualify (2Q's) required minimum:

—Dogs qualifying with scores of 100 in both the Ex B Agility Class and the Ex B Jumpers With Weaves Class on the same day is equal to 1 (2Q)

STCA OBEDIENCE AWARDS

The four Obedience Awards listed below are tallied by the following rules:

THE HIGHEST SCORING DOG/BITCH FOR EACH OF THE AWARDS WAS DETERMINED BY AVERAGING ONLY THE SCORE THAT AKC COUNTS TOWARDS THE OBEDIENCE TITLE; THE FIRST THREE QUALIFYING SCORES EACH DOG/BITCH MAY HAVE EARNED.

HARROP AWARD FOR THE HIGHEST SCORING COMPANION DOG

Plaque awarded by Faith Harrop to the dog or bitch earning the highest average score in qualifying for a Companion Dog Obedience title during the award year.

PASSIG AWARD FOR THE HIGHEST SCORING COMPANION DOG EXCELLENT

Plaque awarded by Letty Passig to the dog or bitch earning the highest average

score in qualifying for a Companion Dog Excellent Obedience title during the award year.

FAIRBANKS AWARD FOR THE HIGHEST SCORING UTILITY DOG

Plaque awarded by Virginia Fairbanks to the dog or bitch earning the highest average score in qualifying for a Utility Dog Obedience title during the award year.

MACLAPIN "SAM" MEMORIAL AWARD

Award donated by Lorayne Lapin in memory of CH MacLapin Just A Sample, CDX, CAN.CD, CD to the champion of record who earns the highest average score in qualifying for CD, CDX, UD Obedience titles during the award year.

THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY SCOTTISH TERRIER CLUB VERSATILITY AWARD

This award is offered to any member shoes dog/bitch has been awarded three of the five AKC recognized titles; Conformation, Obedience, Tracking, Earthdog or Agility. Application must be made to the STCA Annual Awards Chairman and must be accompanied by a photocopy of the championship or title certificate and must be received by July 1st for the year it is being awarded.

CODE OF ETHICS THE SCOTTISH TERRIER CLUB OF AMERICA

This Code of Ethics is established to set a standard of acceptable behavioral limits for the Scottish Terrier Club of America members. The Code is designed to protect the interests of the club and to protect and preserve the Scottish Terrier. The Scottish Terrier Club of America expects adherence to the code. Blatant disregard for the standards set out in this code will not be condoned.

The Scottish Terrier Club of America was formed and exists to encourage and promote the responsible breeding and ownership of Scottish Terriers and to protect and advance the interests of these dogs. Toward these ends, The Scottish Terrier Club of America recommends the following practices as ethical.

- Abide by the Constitution and By-laws of the Scottish Terrier Club of America and the rules of the American Kennel Club.
- Maintain the animal(s) in an environment and under a regime that as far as possible ensures the well being of the dog.
- Make use of available DNA testing when needed in order to produce Scottish Terriers free of genetically transmitted defects.
- Familiarize oneself with the AKC Standard of the Breed and strive to breed only Scottish Terriers of characteristic type, sound structure and temperament, directing ones efforts to producing dogs in conformity to the AKC Standard.
- Keep accurate breeding records and registration information in accordance with American Kennel Club regulations.
- Breed bitches in good condition and health according to AKC recommendations.
- Only undertake the breeding of a bitch when one is prepared to keep the resultant puppies until they are suitably placed. Members offering a dog at stud should require similar assurances from the owners of bitches of non STCA members.
- Puppies should not be sold prior to 10 weeks of age. Puppies and adults should be sold with appropriate inoculations for their age.
- Members should provide stud service only when satisfied that the owner of the bitch has such time and facilities necessary for the proper development of the puppies.
- Should not misrepresent or fail to disclose known hereditary defects, health and physical condition of any stock offered for sale or breeding purposes.
- Provide purchasers of adults or puppies with accurate papers to include a three generation pedigree, registration certificate and/or a written sales agreement as to whether a guarantee is provided and setting forth any terms, conditions or limitations thereto, together with complete medical records and instructions for care and feeding.
- Not knowingly sell a Scottish Terrier of any age to a pet shop, catalog house, laboratory or any wholesale dealer in dogs (a dealer being a person who regularly buys dogs for sale at profit), or to any person who sells to any of the above. Members will not knowingly offer stud service to wholesale dealers or to any person involved with pet shops, catalog houses or laboratories. No Scottish Terrier will be provided for use in raffles, auctions or similar enterprises.
- Assume an ongoing responsibility for the Scottish Terriers that they produce. This is a lifetime commitment. A Scottie in need of a new home, who is owned by, bred by or sired by a dog owned by a member of the STCA should not become a rescue dog. Whenever feasible this dog should become the responsibility of the owner, breeder, or owner of the sire.
- Engage in advertising that is as factual as possible. Misleading exaggerations or unfounded implications of superiority shall not be used.
- Refrain from knowingly making unfair or untrue statements about the dogs or practices of others.

ENFORCEMENT

Enforcement of the above Code of Ethics will be per Article VI of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Scottish Terrier Club of America.

By signing this Code of Ethics, I/we acknowledge that I/we understand and agree with the purpose of the Scottish Terrier Club of America and that I/we will do my/our best to promote the best interests of the Club and the Scottish Terrier. Furthermore, I/we will conduct myself/ourselves in a manner of good sportsmanship at conformation, obedience and performance events, so as to reflect positively on the sport of purebred dogs.

Earth Dog Report: delete the words "in the breed."

Report of Treasurer regarding the Rotating 2002: Danica Burge should be listed as Trophy Recorder, not Trophy Chair.

Minutes of the October 6, 2001 after dinner meeting had the following correction: Addition of agenda item #4, to set a budget for the STCA delegate to the AKC.

Motion to accept all minutes as corrected, Clarkson/Prince. Motion carried.

Report of the Corresponding Secretary, Lois Bolding

Written report received.

Discussion regarding the Bred-By Medallions sent to the regional clubs for their specialties and approval by the STCA of the specialty date for the regional club. The STCA approval letter must accompany the application sent to the AKC, or it will be rejected by the AKC.

Motion: that the Corresponding Secretary SOP should read: A regional club must obtain written permission to hold their specialty from the STCA through the Corresponding Secretary, and that Bred-By Medallions will not be sent to the club until the regional club receives STCA permission to hold the specialty. Clarkson/Shafer. Motion carried.

Lengthy discussion about the 2000 yearbooks in storage. There are many extra books in cartons. With the Corresponding Secretary moving to Florida, does the STCA need to ship the 20 cartons to her new home? Suggestion that the regional clubs may distribute them among their members.

Motion: that a carton of books be sent to each regional club to share with their members, and that a request be sent with the books asking for voluntary reimbursement of ship-

ping costs. Shafer/Hansen. Motion carried.

Discussion regarding the availability of STCA items for sale. **Motion: that the Corresponding Secretary be responsible for supplying STCA items for sale at both Montgomery County and the Rotating, and that this procedure be added to the SOP. Duncan/Prince. Motion carried.**

Acting upon the recommendation made by the Corresponding Secretary: **Motion: that price list of STCA items being offered in the Bagpiper, with the exception of the 2000 yearbook, include shipping and handling, and that this notice be placed in the Bagpiper announcement of items for sale. Clarkson/Cone. Motion carried.**

Letter from Texas A&M University requesting hair samples for a DNA project. Consensus that the board members would participate by sending samples from their own dogs.

A letter from the AKC received with subject matter requesting the re-evaluation of auction policy and to discourage parent clubs from purchasing dogs of their breed at auction. "AKC believes that purchasing of dogs at auctions in nor overall in the best interest of purebred dogs." The AKC also discourages the purchase of dogs at auction by representatives of rescue. Consensus to send a copy of this AKC letter to Rescue Chair, Daphne Branzell.

Discussion of AKC registered kennel prefix regarding ownership for STCA awards. To be eligible for STCA awards, all owners of the registered prefix must be members of the STCA **Motion: that it is the Tally Chair's responsibility to ask the Corresponding Secretary to write to any owner of an AKC registered prefix for clarification as to exactly who are the owners of that prefix on a yearly basis. Hill/Clarkson. Motion carried.**

Letter of appeal received from a member who did not have their dues to the Treasurer by January 31st, asking for an extension as allowed by the Constitution and By-Laws. The letter explained the reasons for requesting a meritorious extension.

The discussion centered around the question that according to the By-Laws Article I, Section #4 (B) was the situation a "meritorious case" which allows the Board to "grant an additional 30 days of grace" and, to whether it establishes precedent. **Motion: that the STCA accept the dues grant the reinstatement. Prince/Clarkson. Motion failed 7 votes opposed, 4 votes in favor.** No "grace period" was granted to anyone delinquent with dues.

Report of the Recording Secretary, Charla Hill

Written report received.

In addition to the regular duties of Recording Secretary, such as maintaining the roster, mailing minutes from prior meetings, making mailing labels for the Board, and Committee Chairs, several items of business were conducted by mail.

Mailed ballots to Officers and Directors for the following:

1. to authorize the expenditure of \$450 to the AKC for information from their data base to use in the Handbook being assembled now. Ballots returned 12 in favor, 0 opposed, and 1 abstention.
2. to authorize the expenditure of \$1,600 from the Health Trust Fund as a donation to a study on Atopic Dermatitis sponsored by the AKC Canine Health Fund. Ballots returned 9 in favor, 1 opposed, 1 abstention.

Received ballots sent to Officers and Directors by Donna Cone for approval of new members whose names were printed in the Bagpiper #3, 2001. New members accepted unanimously.

Mailed letters to inform a member that charges had been brought against them by

a fellow member. Received the report from the hearing and mailed letters informing the parties involved that the results of the hearing provided for a three month suspension from the STCA, beginning with the hearing date.

Mailed roster changes to the Editor of the Bagpiper for publication in issue #1, 2002.

Recommended that we continue to receive the New Titles report, subscription from the AKC, in hard copy, at a cost of \$198 per year. **Motion to accept recommendation: Hill/Clarkson. Motion carried.**

Treasurer's Report, Theresa Duncan

Copies of the Financial Report received covering the period of January 1-December 31, 2001. Total income \$113,342.34. Total expenditures \$122,965.18. Total loss \$9,622.84. Total assets as of December 31, 2001 are \$182,653.98.

Discussion regarding checks written to the STCA and returned for insufficient funds. Recommendation by the Treasurer that this problem be addressed with a policy. **Motion: Any person who writes two or more checks returned for insufficient funds to the STCA, at the Treasurer's discretion, may be placed on a cash basis only, and notice of this will be placed in the Bagpiper and added to the SOP for Treasurer. Prince/Shafer. Motion carried.**

Treasurer asks for authorization to adopt a new and easier abbreviated audit procedure based on Quick Books. **Motion: To authorize an audit procedure established by the CPA who files the STCA tax return, with the cost not to exceed \$350.00. Duncan/Hill. Motion carried.**

Discussion of budgets for officers, directors and committee chairs to be established for the fiscal year (January 1st to

December 31st). President O'Neal has requested that the Treasurer recommend a budget for each. Treasurer Duncan researched the previous 10 years to recommend an amount. When the new Board and Committee Chairs have taken their position in October, they will be working against that year's budget, and will start anew on January 1st. Each position was discussed and a budget recommended for each. Consensus approval. Reviewed STCA insurance coverage. Present coverage of accident policy is \$1 million per incident, \$2 million annual, \$50 thousand for fire damage. The policy was due for renewal March 10. **Motion: to seek quotes that would increase liability for Directors and Officers of the STCA to \$2 million, seek quotes to obtain hired and non-owned automobile policy for liability covering the club, and in addition to pay the deductible amount of any "insured member" against whom a claim is brought under the D & O policy. Shafer/Prince. Motion carried.**

A copy of the club's insurance policies should be made available to both the Treasurer and the Vice President/Show Chairman.

Report of the AKC Delegate, Helen Prince

Written report received.

The AKC Classic was a success and will be staged by the AKC again this year. The booth was minimal in 2001. Organizing assistance from the local regional club was not accomplished. Recommendation that the Delegate organize individuals who will man the booth rather than a regional club.

New ruling for the Bred-By Exhibitor class. The rules are that any dog or bitch be 6 mo of age on first day of show, not champion of record on day of show closing, individually registered with the AKC as of the date of the closing of entries, owned or co-owned by any of the breeders of record as of the date of the closing of entries, and the person handling the dog in the class must be a

breeder of record and one of the owners of record of the dog. No one else in a family can handle the dog in that class. If the dog or bitch goes back in for Winners, another person then may handle that animal for Winners competition, as well as for Best of Breed.

Recommendation by the AKC that each specialty club print a page in the show catalog with the breed standard. Consensus that the AKC Delegate support the ruling in this matter at the Delegates meeting for education purposes.

The next meeting of the AKC will be held in June in San Antonio, with the object of moving the meetings around outside of NYC.

There is a Parent Club Conference in Cincinnati from October 25-27, sponsored by the AKC. The AKC asks for each parent club to send two representatives.

Report of the Vice President, Joanne Kinnelly

The Rotating is in place and going forward with no problems in Kansas City. Montgomery County is approved with the AKC for date, site and judges.

Table favors are approved. Pat Wooster will be Sweeps Show Secretary.

The 2003 Rotating will take place in Sacramento, California on Saturday April 12, in conjunction with Sacramento all breed club. The all breed club has agreed to place the clubs in a separate building. Entries \$25, \$17.50 BBX.

The San Francisco Bay Club will hold their specialty on Friday, the day prior. There is an all terrier club event on Thursday, and a second all breed show on Sunday.

Report of the President, Polly O'Neal
Recommends the establishment of a Sunshine Committee. Board consensus that it be added to the list of committees.

Passig/Prince. Motion carried.**

Request for an ad in the Bagpiper. **Motion: to approve of an ad in the Bagpiper announcing the event and which solicits donations for the Agility Event. Duncan/Clarkson. Motion carried.** Donation checks should be made to STCA and be sent to Kellie Verrelli.

Consensus that Kellie can order the AKC computerized all Scottie Agility Report in the name of the STCA, at her own cost.

Annual Awards, Letty Passig. Written report received.

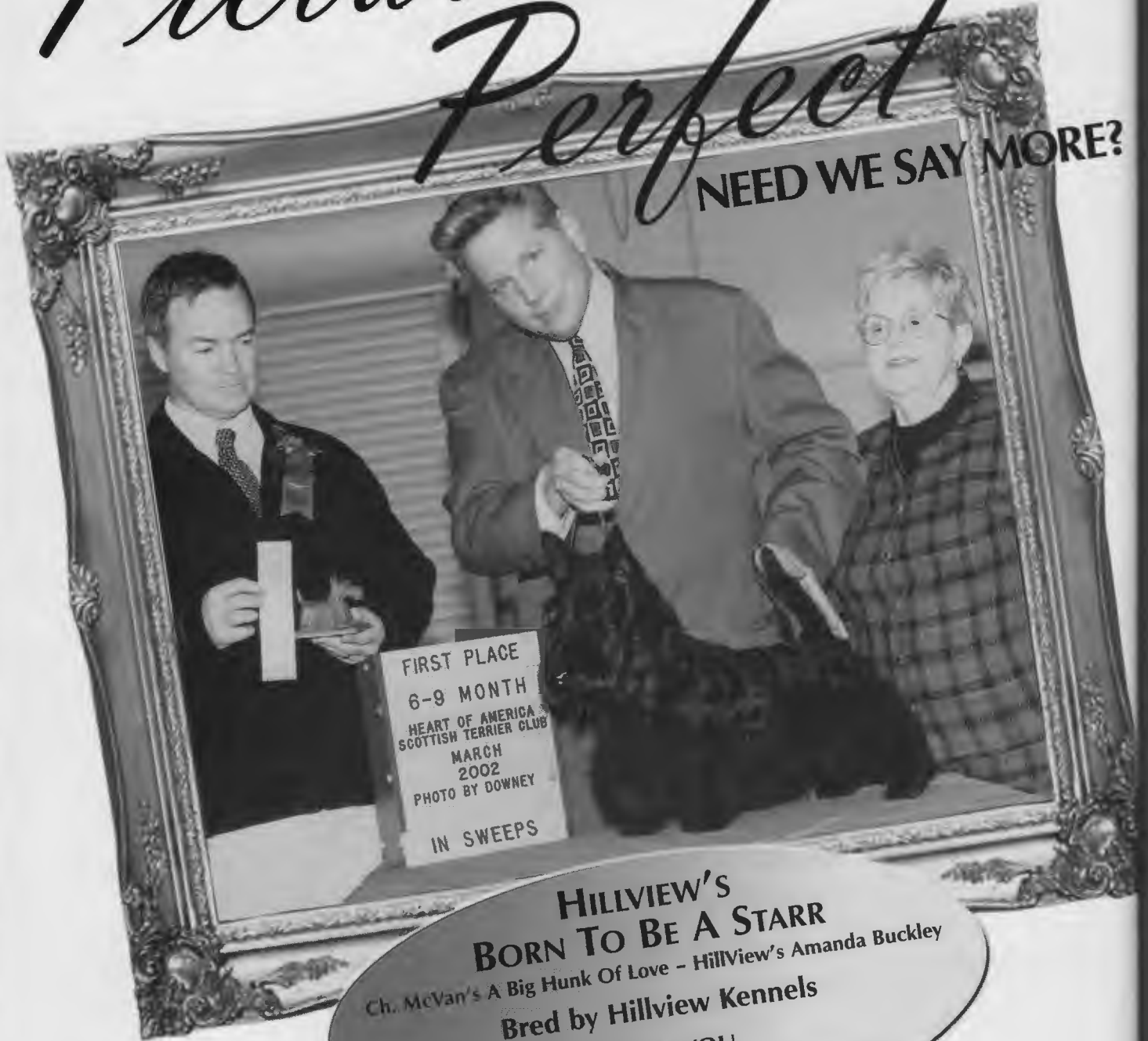

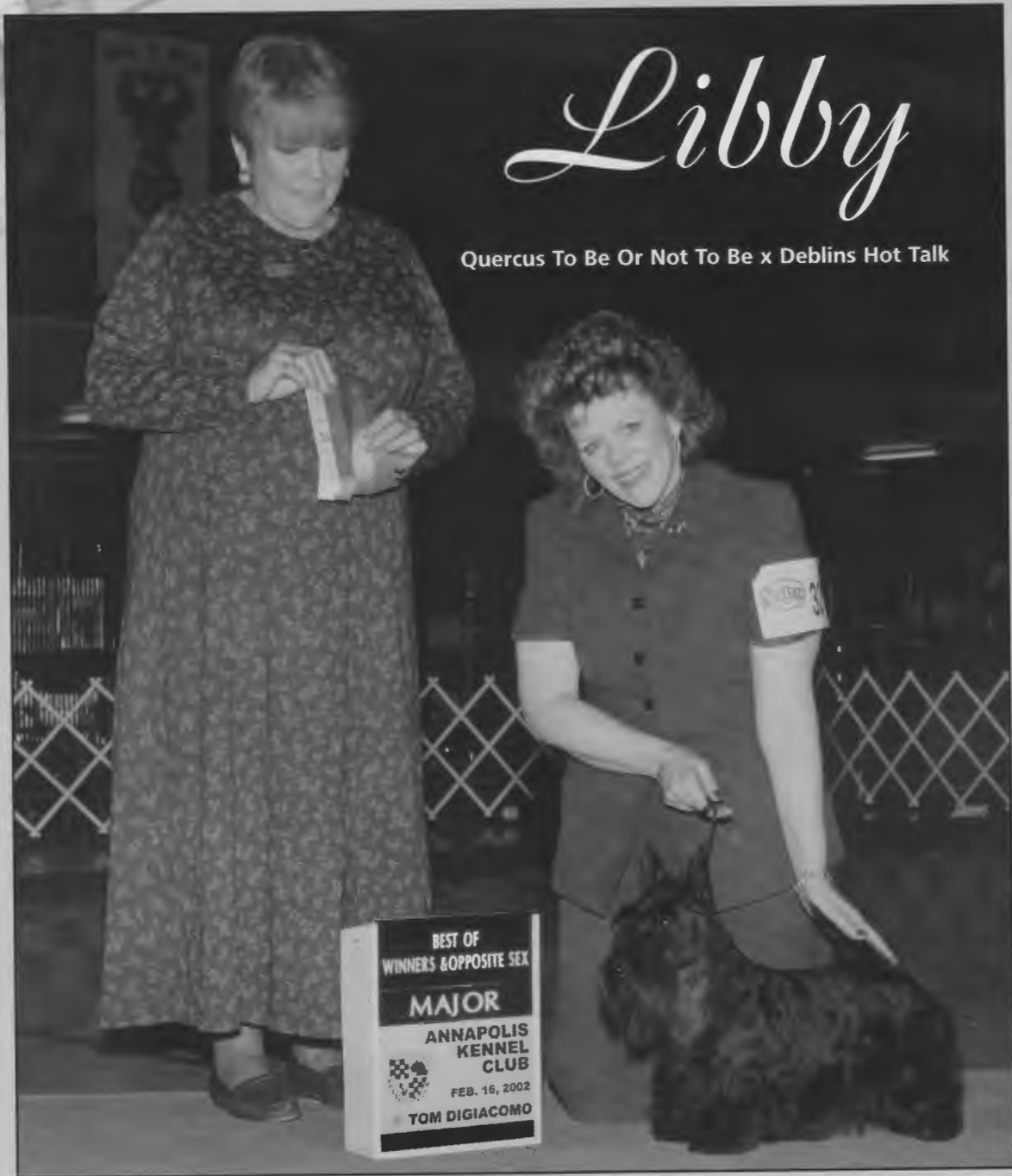

A Walk in the Fields with a Purpose

Tracking With Your Scottie

by John McNabney

Tracking is an activity with your Scottie for which the AKC has tests and titles. This article will not attempt to explain how you can train for and participate in AKC Tracking Tests, but rather is a brief description of tracking as an activity you can pursue with your Scottie, and some reasons why you may want to do so.

All dogs possess the ability to track a scent. This was a necessary skill for survival in the wild which has ceased to be essential, but is an innate ability which can be honed to an active skill. Two aspects of tracking must be developed, the ability to locate the scent to be followed (scent discrimination) and the techniques necessary to follow that scent through changes in direction, terrain, and surface. The dog must maintain the motivation to follow the scent to the end of the track.

Watch your Scottie when you take it for a walk. Does it use its nose to find and follow scents. If it is off lead, will it follow a scent for any distance, or does it quickly lose a scent, and begin to look for a new scent to follow. A Scottie who instinctively finds, and follows, a scent is probably a natural tracker and will quickly pick-up on tracking as defined by the AKC. Those who don't show this instinct are still candidates for tracking, but your initial efforts will be to develop the instinct and motivation to track, before you can pursue tracking as an AKC title activity.

Tracking as defined by the AKC consists of following a course made by a person, (track layer), from an identified starting point to an article at the end of the track. The track layer must record the path the track follows and, if not the handler, must either give the handler a copy of the track, or follow the

handler to insure that the track is followed. For the entry level of tracking the start is defined by a flag, with a second flag approximately 30 yards from the start giving the handler the direction for the first leg. The Scottie must pick up the scent at the first flag, and indicate that it is following the track by moving out towards the second flag. After the second flag the course may change direction as many as four times and cover a total distance of approximately 440 yards over terrain which is fairly uniform in surface. Without going into detail about the training techniques necessary to arrive at the point where your Scottie is actually participating in an AKC Tracking Trial, suffice it to say that considerable training must occur before that happens. Depending on you starting point, as determined by your Scottie's displayed innate tracking skills, you will be looking at a time period of one to three years.

Why would you want to make a commitment of so much time to get involved in this activity? For starters, once your Scottie grasps what tracking is all about, it will love it and eagerly look forward to your practice sessions. This is using its natural instincts and abilities for reward and gaining your attention and approval. While tracking, the

two of you are working as a team, developing communication skills which hitherto did not exist. You as the handler are at the mercy of your Scottie to follow the track. Your Scottie needs your trust and reinforcing of good tracking practices to successfully find the article at the end of the track. You, as the handler, must be totally focused on your Scottie and this fact is not lost on it. *You are truly a team of equals*, each contributing skills necessary for the successful completion of the task at hand. As an activity, this is an excellent cure for couch potatoitis. This is not a beauty contest, nor one requiring agility or skills not intrinsic to all Scotties. In tracking, beauty is as beauty does. There are no deductions for form or style.

When is a good time to start? As long as your Scottie is in good health, anytime after it outgrows its early puppyhood. We started tracking with Rosie, our oldest Scottie, when she was 11 years old. At the age of 12 she passed her certification test and is eligible to enter tracking trials. At her first and only trial entered to date, we had a bad start, after which she settled down and completed the track. The consensus of observers was that she will earn her tracking title. *Age should not be a barrier to being involved.*

While working with another handler, or a group of handlers allows for independent evaluation of progress, advice and mutual assistance, and provides companionship while in the field, it is not necessary.

If you decide to get involved in tracking there are several books you can obtain on tracking. Probably the best from the standpoint of a small Terrier is one by William Sanders entitled *Enthusiastic Tracking*. It is published by Rime Publications.

THE SFBSTC CANCER SEMINAR - An Observation

I had the extreme good fortune to participate at the Canine Cancer seminar recently held in Sacramento, California. Sponsored by the San Francisco Bay Scottish Terrier Club, and underwritten by the Health Trust Fund of the STCA, the event drew a wide range of participants. Breeders and exhibitors, veterinarians, veterinary assistants, pet owners and members from the online Scottie lists were riveted during the entire presentation.

Without a doubt, this was the best seminar on any subject that I have ever attended. The individual presentations ran for nearly seven hours and covered lymphoma, bladder cancer (TCC), melanoma, and molecular genetic approaches to malignancy including gene therapy. The four panelists, all well known specialists and researchers in their fields, were Dr. Deborah Knapp, Purdue University; Dr. Bruce Madewell, U. C. Davis; Dr. Jaime Modiano, AMC Cancer Research Center in Denver; and Dr. Fredrick Leach from the National Cancer Institute. Additionally, Dr. Cathy Connelly and Dr. Maureen Adams, the Reno, Nevada practitioners responsible for the care of Seminar Chairperson Elizabeth Wise's "Kati" during her battle with TCC, gave a case study. Marcia Dawson, DVM, and Chair of the STCA Health Trust Fund, was also a presenter as well as moderator for the day's sessions.

It was truly a remarkable event. Each expert was thoroughly prepared, utilizing many excellent visual aids. Each presentation was clear, concise and "audience friendly." A question and answer format permeated the atmosphere, and all of us felt very much at ease in directing comments and questions throughout the presentations. A highly informative "round table" discussion between the presenters concluded the day's events, giving the panelists an opportunity to interchange opinions, share ideas, and amplify on specifics, in response to audience questions. The rapport established was remarkable, and it was apparent that these researchers will be closely aligned in a concerted effort to find the cause for the high incidence of cancer in our Scotties as well as better treatment methods.

It would be difficult to isolate any one thing, any one segment of the day's events. To highlight seven hours is a lot of ground to cover, a lot to absorb! Several things stick in my mind. One has to do with the approaches to treatment of TCC, and the need for immediate diagnosis if TCC is suspected. Piroxicam remains the drug of choice. But, there is no magic bullet with any of these cancers. The topic presented by Dr. Frederick Leach, of the National Cancer Institute, provided interesting information comparing dog bladder cancer to human urologic malignancies. Dr. Leach is currently conducting a genetic study on canine TCC, which involves the submission of blood and tissue samples from affected Scotties. Dr Leach will search the DNA harvested from this material in an effort to unlock the genetic secret of inherited predisposition for TCC. The Canine Hereditary Urothelial Malignancy Study, or CHUMS, will be a model for human studies, treatment, and findings. This seems to be a fascinating approach, one that ultimately may benefit both man, and man's best friend.

SFBSTC member and seminar Chairperson Elizabeth Wise did an outstanding job. The seminar was well prepared and complete in

format with presenters of national repute. As a post conference addendum, Elizabeth indicated that she received several e-mails from veterinarians in attendance. She gives the following report:

I was so pleased to have one vet tell me that she was revamping her whole cancer treatment protocol as a result of the seminar. Another vet said he was blown away with all that he learned, and that two days later his head was still reeling! And yet another vet said she had not known about all the drugs that could be used for the different cancers. And if we lay people went away with just one or two things to watch for in our furkids, then our objective of educating vets and pet owners was met!

All of us who were fortunate enough to attend, came away with a great deal of new information, and with the conviction that these researchers will leave little to chance, no avenue unexplored, in their goal to conquer this disease. In a way, my personal feeling is that we had attended a monumental event, one of those singular times, too few in life, when the problems facing many, if not all of us, as Scottie owners, were being addressed by a dedicated and determined group of outstanding research specialists. It is a very good feeling. The answers are not there yet. But the challenge of finding them is certainly in capable hands!

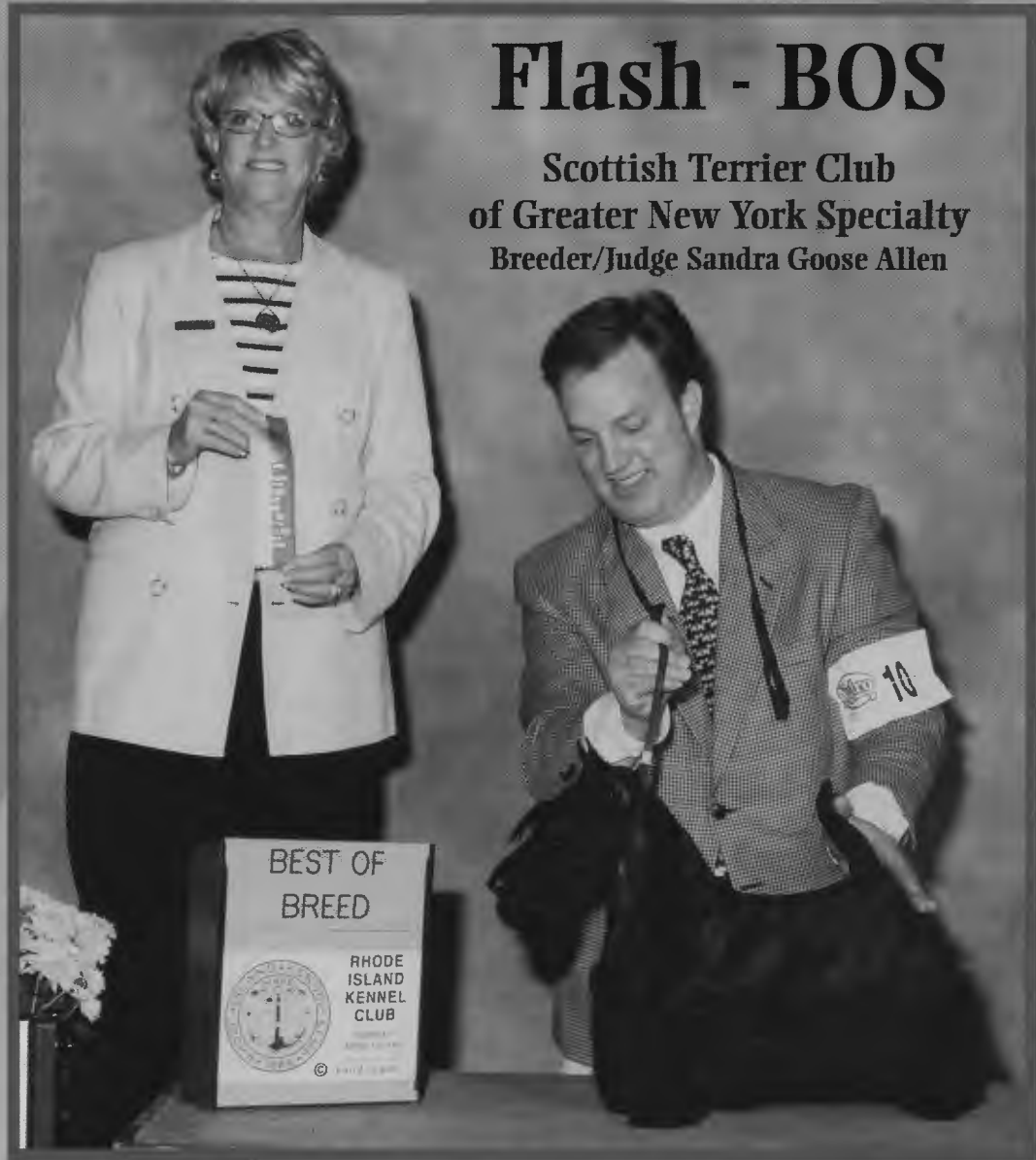

Little did I dream that when I was given my first Scottie at four years old (a Fala puppy), that would I have the honor of judging my favorite breed at a national specialty. Thank you for the opportunity and privilege of judging at the 2002 Rotating Specialty. I thoroughly enjoyed my assignment, and will never forget such a memorable day! Thank you to all the workers that labored behind the scenes to make the specialty such a success. I appreciate the many meetings and hours spent which allowed the show to run so smoothly. My appreciation to Theresa Duncan and Joanne Kinnelly who arranged such superb hospitality for David and I. Thank you to my steward and clerk, Helen and Norman Prince, for being so efficient and making my job fun and easy.

Thank you to the breeders and exhibitors for such a nice entry. Overall I noticed some breed improvements. I concentrated on choosing dogs of breed type: sturdy, low to the ground, of good bone & substance, with a deep chest and strong rear. Scotties need to cover ground well, with ears and tail up, while creating an overall appearance of balance.

6-9 Puppy Dog- was a black fella, a single entry that gaited well.

9-12 Puppy Dog- an alert cobby dog with little ears

12-18 Puppy Dog- a nice Brindle dog of good substance

Bred By Dog- First place was sturdy dog of good substance.

He had easy gait, and was of excellent quality. Second place was of equal quality with ears to die for. There were some blown coats in this class.

Open Dog- Overall, this class was in good condition for this show. My first place dog, again, was of good bone and deep chest. Scottish Terrier expression by all four placements in this class was excellent, as was ear size and coat texture.

Winners Dog- was first from the Bred By class. He continued to exhibit breed type and temperament while in the ring.

Reserve Winners Dog- was second from the Bred By class. A dog of correct structure, straight legs, and an attractive well balanced head. He should have an excellent future.

6-9 Puppy Bitch- Both first and second place in this class had good tail sets, coats and expression. Both gals were happy and showy, an extremely helpful quality when exhibiting bitches.

9-12 Puppy Bitch- had a nice cobby body with small ears and great expression.

12-18 Puppy Bitch- a female of good coat, ears and expression was my first place. All placements in this class had dark eyes and good Terrier attitudes.

Bred By Bitch- a correctly built Brindle bitch with a varminty expression and that independent, Terrier attitude. Her outline and showmanship caught my eye the minute she entered the ring. Second in this class was another alert Brindle girl of proper coat and an alert expression. The entire Bred By Bitch entry had nice coats, correct substance, ears and tail sets. This was one of the finest Bred By Bitch classes I have judged.

Am. Bred Bitch- was one entry of good breed type and Scottie determination.

Open Bitch- First was a quality Brindle bitch of good breed

type, condition and proper gait. Second was a Black-Brindle gal with well-proportioned ears, and also of good coat and condition.

Winners Bitch- was first from the BBE class, my favorite class to exhibit in. She never let down and continued to show to Winners, exhibiting her sturdy and determined attitude.

Reserve Winners Bitch- Second from the BBE class, with her dense coat, "wow" ears and good balance. She will be an easy finish.

Best of Breed- Though the Specials' class was a smaller entry of Champions, it was a quality entry. For Best of Breed & Best of Winners I chose my Winners Dog. For a young dog, in my mind, he exemplifies good breeding, and the first paragraph of the Scottish Terrier Standard. He has as much in front of himself as he does behind his tail. His head filled my hands and was of correct proportion, with parallel planes and a dark eye. He alerted on other dogs with steadiness and determination. I will enjoy following his promising career.

Best of Opposite Sex- was my Winners Bitch. With her lovely ears, dense coat and easy gait, she exemplifies good breeding and breed type. She never let down in her showmanship and was "full of herself" right down to my final selection.

Awards of Merit- Again, I focused on breed type. I chose two dogs that showed well. Both the Black and the Wheaten boy I awarded were of good coat and condition. They were properly put together, well balanced, and alerted on other dogs. Both should have exciting Specials' careers.

Overall comments from a breeder's perspective: I stated previously that I noticed some breed improvements in this entry. Fronts felt deeper and broader, tail placement and carriage was higher, and ears were more proportioned to the head. Proper ear placement, on the top, and not the side of the skull is still a goal. Bites were excellent throughout the entry. Eyes were dark in color and in most cases well set under the brow. Coats of all colors were of proper texture and presented well. Blown coats were rarely present. Although most of the entry had strong and powerful rears while standing, I noted several dogs with open hocks while moving. Proper fronts and rears both standing and moving are atomically difficult to breed in the Scottish Terrier. However, we, myself included, must remain persistent in our breeding programs and keep only that stock which perpetuates the first paragraph of our standard. I was pleased to see many breeders going over potential stud dogs at our specialty. It is in the sharing of breeding programs, pedigrees and "hands on" dogs that we expand the education and focus on purpose of our breed.

Thank you again for the personal opportunity to go over some lovely Scots. I appreciate all the hours breeders and exhibitors spent grooming, conditioning and training each week. Congratulations to all that were in Kansas City. You are all winners! You own and love the greatest breed there is, the Scottish Terrier!

Conformation and Obedience were the first steps. Temper earned her Canadian Championship by nine months with several puppy group wins and a Best Puppy in Show. Obedience also came quickly with

her Companion Dog title in early 1995.

Agility AKA

The Playground!!

Dog agility has quickly become the most popular dog sport in the country. The thing that makes agility so popular is that it is fun. That fact makes it an ideal sport to enjoy with your Scottie. So, what have you been doing with your Scotties lately? Agility is an obstacle course for dogs. The dogs run, jump, go over and through a specific numbered course in a specific amount of time at the direction of their handler. A Scottie needs to think they are in control; they won't work if forced. They have to think it is fun and in their best interest. I train using the clicker and treats. I don't know of any Scottie that is not food motivated! Scotties are well suited to agility as they are naturals at going through tunnels and they love to run and jump.

If you decide to try agility make sure you find a trainer that uses positive reinforcement. The length of time needed to be ready for competition depends on a lot of factors. Your Scottie does not need to be obedience trained but should have had some form of interaction with you such as training for conformation, where he has trained to focus on you, knows how to work on a leash and has probably been around dogs he does not know. Training can start as early as eight weeks but an older dog can be started as well. Make sure, what ever their age, that your Scottie is in good physical health. A well put together

confirmation dog should have no problems doing agility.

One problem that some Scotties have is their aggression towards other dogs. Both of my agility dogs have had to overcome this. Whenever I am at a competition I have to be very aware of things around me and never let my guard down, when my Scotties are not in their crates. Distracting your dog before a situation can develop is the best solution. I use treats, my voice, and the clicker. The agility ring offers your Scottie a safe place to perform without having to worry about other dogs because while competing he is the only dog and it is such a fast paced sport, your dog doesn't have time to think about other things.

When you decide you are ready to compete plan on spending very long days at the trials. The AKC offers two classes at each level of training; Standard and Jumpers with Weaves. You can enter either one or both classes at a trial, depending on yours and your dog's stamina. At the present time there are no weaves in the Novice Standard class but starting in September they will be required. It takes three qualifying scores of 85 to 100 to earn a title. The requirements for getting a title increase with each level. Beginning in September of this year the AKC will be offering a new class called Preferred. This will offer regular Standard and JWW classes but with a lowered jump height and

five seconds added to the standard course time. All levels of titles will be offered. I think this is great news for Scotties!

If you get bitten by the agility bug you may want to invest in a few pieces of agility equipment. There are many companies offering equipment but if you or someone you know is handy, try making some for home use. Weaves are certainly the simplest and can be as easy as sticking a few poles in the ground. Plungers make a great indoor weave-pole set. Jumps can be a pole across two cement block or indoors use a wrapping paper tube stuck between door jambs. Watch out though and tell everyone in the house about the wrapping tubes or somebody will get tripped! My husband just loves this one!

Small contact trainers are being offered for sale, which include an A-Frame on one side and a dog walk on the other. They are great for small yards or in your house. A Scottie is a small enough dog so equipment can be improvised but be sure to make it safe.

I hope more Scotties will be out on the Agility circuit. I rarely see any others here in the North East. Scotties love this sport and even if you decide not to compete they will benefit from the attention and exercise. What better way to condition a confirmation dog! What ever you decide to do, keep it fun and upbeat and your Scotties will thank you.

Obedient? Me? Obedient?

It has been said that Terriers are born with a larger dose of original sin than other breeds of dogs. If you consider the differences of what the breeds were originally bred to do, it's no wonder there's a huge difference in how they respond to training.

Consider a herding breed, bred to produce an extremely biddable dog that will safely work a herd and take commands – either audible or visual, even from a distance. Consider too, the Retrievers, bred to hold steady, mark and remember the fall of three birds before being sent by the handler to eagerly dash out and fetch them. They also take directions from a distance, and most are a gregarious bunch, willing to get in the boat with just about anybody to do their job. Then there are the terriers, bred to kill varmints, and if they had to look to a handler for directions they'd never catch anything. They must be quick, tough, full of initiative, and determination. They are very impulsive, often triggered into action by some shadowy thing blowing across the ground that just might need extinction. Listening for directions isn't in the picture. Add to that, the Scottie's dour personality, which is willing to be nobody's fool, and discernment, which can see no reason to keep repeating an exercise, and you see a need to alter the average training program if your Scottie is going to get it and stay interested. Fortunately, we didn't know all that when we got our first Scottie. Had it been a deterrent, I would have missed out on a very smart, intriguing breed with deep, deep feelings, and which seems more like a partner than a pet.

All dog training is part science and part art. With Scotties, it's a lot more art. Scotties are very proud and get their feelings hurt easily. Get too demanding or make it a grind, and they'll likely shut down on you. Demand too little, and you'll get nothing worthwhile. You have to gain a sense of when to pressure, and when to back off. Your little diehard may fetch a dumbbell happily for you, but unlike Labs or Goldens, Scotties would not rather retrieve than go to Heaven, so if you keep throwing the thing, (or repeating any of the exercises) they'll lose interest. They may even get inventive, hoping to find a way to shut you off. Try to

keep it short and sweet. If your book or instructor tells you to practice something ten times, you'd probably better not, at least not in constant repetition. Brief, frequent lessons are better.

One area where Scotties are like other dogs is that they need to be praised when doing something right. Not just praise words, but an upbeat, glowing sound that registers. If you tune in to your praise enough that you can actually feel it, your dog will feel it too. Perfunctory praise won't do. This cannot be over-emphasized – let them feel your pleasure in their efforts.

Choosing a Training Class

Even if you don't need an instructor and feel you can do your training at home, you'll probably join a class at some point to get your dog used to working reliably around other dogs. Training methods are many – seemingly more all the time. There was the harsh, old school, using much physical coercion, then along came things like play training, lure training, clicker training, and more. Personally, I am used to, and prefer a combination of positive and negative actions to train a dog. That is, to gently show the dog what I want, motivating it with treats or other rewards, doing it often enough to make it a habit, and using fair corrections where necessary. And motivation has many forms; you'd be surprised how much easier it is to teach a Scottie the down if you make it a requirement to get off the grooming table.

You should ask if there is a certain method taught at the school you're considering. If it's a private one, you can probably check out its reputation. If it's a training club, the class will only be as good as the instructor who volunteered to teach it. Clubs are often a mixed bag of talents, which can be a good thing, because if you hang around long enough, you'll be exposed to a variety of styles and can usually join the club with the facility available to further your training. Generally, it would be good to have an instructor who has competed and put titles on dogs, and has worked with a variety of breeds. Also, I would definitely want one that uses food treats. Ask about the instructor's qualifications, and voice your concerns. Visit a class in progress and judge if

the dogs look happy to be there. Even Scotties like to go to school.

Regardless of what kind of program you join, every instructor knows that dogs learn at different rates, and should reassure you not to compare your Scottie's progress with other dogs in the class. You are very likely to go through the weeks of the course with little change in your dog. You'll feel like you need far more time to teach all the basics, and you probably do. Take what they taught you, practice at home, and come back later, perhaps for an intermediate beginners' class.

For those of you who also want to get a breed championship – I would get the breed points first. You can teach your dog most of the exercises, and I'd start with the stand, but wouldn't teach heeling until afterwards. Theoretically, the dog should be able to totally adjust its performance just by a change in the collar and leash, but I have not yet found it to be so.

Who's Training Whom?

You will learn a lot training dogs, even more training Scotties. You will be involved in quite a balancing act, finding ways to let your little partner know what you want, motivating him with treats, toys, or whatever it takes to work happily, plus figuring out when he needs more help to understand, or deserves a fair correction because he understood, but didn't do it. Each dog you train will be different, so you should develop more savvy and patience than anyone has naturally.

Like many of you, I wasn't born with a lot of patience. There are times when I'm looking into the inquiring eyes of one of my Scotties, trying to figure out how to improve on something, and wonder if I'm not being looked upon likewise from above, and being lured with the irresistible to motivate me, like: Here's a Scottie I know you'll love. It'll teach you a lot. You can work things out together.

Obviously, Scottie training isn't for everyone. If you think you'd like to try it, I'd encourage you to get started. It'll add greatly to the dimension of your relationship, and can add years of showing and interest to your dog's life, while you find yourself launched into a whole new adventure.

OBEDIENCE TRAINING AND SHOWING

They're referred to as legs, not points, and when you've earned three of them under different judges, your dog has an obedience title. You don't need to win or even place – all you need is a qualifying score, regardless of how many or how few are in the class.

A wonderful thing about Obedience is that it's really all about communication, and is a totally personal sport, where your chief competition is you. Regardless of what the others in the class are doing, you are trying to do your best, perhaps improving on what you have done before. It's between you and your dog. You are happy with your performance or you know what you want to work on, and of course that doesn't always have to do with the score. We're all working on things, and to feel improvement in an area that's been a problem can be exhilarating. Of course there are winners and ribbons to fourth place, and there are year-end awards to shoot for just like all the other dog sports. You can go with the idea of trying to win, but whether or not you are going for awards, you can take satisfaction in how you and your dog have communicated that day, and revel in any tips you have picked up on working together more effectively. We learn a lot from each other.

Each exercise in the routine is valued at

so many points, totaling 200 for a perfect score. Perfect scores are infrequent, even in breeds known to be ideal for the sport, because there are many ways to lose points, such as lagging, forging, heeling wide, bumping, and crooked halts, to name some, but if you earn at least 170 of the points with at least 50 percent in each exercise, you'll have a qualifying score. Some parts of the exercises are more important than others, so it would be possible to do a fantastic job except for one thing, and still not qualify. For instance, if the dog needed to be told twice to come, or if it got up during the down/stay, you would get an NQ (Not qualified). While having to call your dog twice to come will get a zero, a failure to finish to heel after the come, or a second command to remind your dog to heel, will just get points off. Many dogs earn their titles with casual performances, because they managed to score at least the minimum for each exercise.

A Look At The Classes

AKC offers three basic obedience classes, which are divided into A and B categories. They are Novice, Open and Utility, and no matter how far a dog is trained before being entered in its first class, it will start out in Novice. Besides these regular classes, many shows offer additional classes,

called non-regular classes, which do not earn titles, such as Sub-novice, Graduate Novice, or Veterans, giving more people chances in the ring with their dogs.

If you have never earned an obedience title, you enter the Novice-A class. It's run exactly the same as the B class, but you'll be competing against all beginners. Once you have that first title, a Companion Dog degree, you will enter all your future beginner dogs in the Novice-B class. But the A/B categories don't follow through the same for the upper level classes. There is a big jump in what is expected in the Open Class, and another huge jump in difficulty for the Utility Class, so the A division in those classes is for dogs that do not yet have their title in that class. The B classes are for dogs that already are titled, so you can enter your next Open or Utility candidate in the A class, unless you are a judge or have advanced to the limited ranks of those who have earned an OTCh (Obedience Trial Championship), in which case you will always show in B classes.

You will enter the ring and go to the designated starting spot with your dog on leash, and have him in position to start heeling. The judge will call out the pattern for you, with commands to test that your dog will heel at different speeds – normal, fast, and slow, as well as do turns and halts. A frequently used pattern is an upside down L-shape, with the judge calling directions to forward, halt, forward, left turn, slow, normal, about turn, halt. By now you are at the far side of the L, and on your way back. Forward, right turn, fast, normal, about turn, halt. After that, while still on leash, you proceed to the two people that just came into the ring for you, and make two figure 8's around them, with two halts, as the judge calls it.

Now, you take off your leash, and at the judge's command, stand your dog and walk six feet in front of him. The judge walks up to your dog, gives a light, quick going over the top line with his hand, then tells you to return to your dog. Hopefully, your dog has accepted this and not moved a foot.

Next, you go back to the starting point for the Heel Free exercise. The judge will call out the same heeling pattern you did while on leash. After that, you will be told where to put your dog on a sit/stay, walk to the opposite end of the ring, and upon direction of the judge, call your dog. Lastly, you'll be told to finish, which is to command your dog back into heel position. That completes your individual work.

You'll come back with others for group sits and downs. The judge determines how many dogs to take at one time – usually lining up about 10, depending upon space and how many dogs are showing. Upon orders from the judge, all dogs are to be put into a sit, then a stay, and all handlers walk to the other end of the ring and face their dog. After a one minute sit, you are told to return to your dog, and upon direction from the judge, do the same thing in a down/stay for

three minutes.

Open A

B classes have the same exercises in varying order.

All work in Open is done off leash, and the heeling test will be quite the same as Novice. At the recall, though, a new element is introduced, which is, upon signal from the judge, you will drop your dog to a down while he is coming to you. You will again call your dog for a sit in front of you, then Finish. The judge will let you know when to do each thing. You are now in position to retrieve on the flat, and the judge will hand you your dumbbell. He'll tell you when to throw it, and when to send your dog. Hopefully your dog runs out there, picks it up, brings it back promptly, and sits straight in front of you. The judge will tell you when to take it, and when to finish. You will then move over to the high jump to retrieve over that, and the rulebook allows Scotties to jump the minimum height, which is 8". The dog is to take the jump on his way to the dumbbell, and on the way back to you, and it'll get an NQ if he doesn't jump both ways. The judge will

let you know when to throw, when to send your dog, when to take it from his mouth, and finish. Lastly, you move over to the broad jump, no closer than 8 feet. The broad jump is always double the inches of the high jump, so Scotties are allowed the minimum 16". You put your dog on a sit/stay, leave when the judge tells you, walk to the side of the jump, and send him

over when the judge tells you. The dog takes the jump, then returns to sit in front of you. The judge tells you to finish, and that ends your individual work.

You will come back for the group sits and downs. This time the sit is for three minutes, the down is for five, and all handlers will be led to a place that is out of sight of their dogs.

Open Scoring

Utility A

Utility B has the same exercises in varying order.



For the retrieve over the high jump Scotties are allowed the minimum 8 inches.

You will start off heeling silently, with a hand signal, with the judge calling the turns, and quite a different pattern than in Novice or Open. As he starts you back down the ring heeling, you'll be told to stand your dog, and then leave your dog. You go to the end of the ring, turn and face your dog. On the judge's signal, you will give hand signals to your dog to down, then sit, then come, and finish.

Scent Discrimination is the next test. You will provide 10 numbered, identical articles, except five are metal and five are leather. The judge or steward will place eight of the articles about 20' from you, randomly spacing them about 6" apart. You will have your backs to them so neither you or the dog can see the articles being placed. The two remaining articles – one each of the leather and metal, will be scented up with your hands and placed among the others for your dog to find. They will be placed one at a time, so there are two separate trips. You scent the first article, it's placed on the floor, you Send your dog, he searches through them and hopefully brings the right one back, you take it, you have him finish back to heel position, and you turn your backs while they place the second article. The judge tells you when to do all.

Directed Retrieve is next. Three white gloves are placed across the back of the ring, one in the middle, and one near each corner. You will be standing near the mid-

dle of the ring, and once again have your backs turned so your dog doesn't see the gloves being placed. The judge will tell you which glove to retrieve. You turn in place to face the correct glove, halting with your dog in heel position. With a single motion of your left hand and arm, you signal your dog what direction to go in and give him a verbal retrieve command. The dog should go directly to the glove, bring it back, sit in front of you, and finish upon command.

Moving stand and examination is the next test. The judge will have you heel your dog about 10', then tell you to Stand your dog. You will command and/or signal your dog to stand, and continue walking forward about 10' or 12', then turn and face your dog. The judge will approach your dog and examine it as in breed judging, but will not include either teeth or testicles. The judge will then tell you to call your dog to heel, at which time you either verbally command or hand signal the dog to return to the heel position, this time without first sitting in front of you.

Directed jumping is last. The principal features of this exercise is that the dog goes away from the handler to the opposite end of the ring, stops upon command, sits facing the handler, then takes the jump the handler points to, which is the one the judge tells the handler to take. Two jumps are in the ring, and both are taken, neither being designated by the judge until the dog has reached the far end of the ring. One is an upright solid jump, the other a single bar with open space underneath. The dog will jump, come sit in front of you, and you will have him finish to heel position after each jump. Your work is over; there are no group sits and downs in this class.

GO TO GROUND

By John McNabney

Why?

Why would you want to enter or be involved with your Scottie at an Earthdog trial? This is an activity which involves your Scottie using its natural instincts with potentially minimal training requirements. It is a low-keyed event with active encouragement and support of beginners and veterans alike by other participants, (an atmosphere unlike other AKC events), and if your Scottie develops a working ethic, this is an activity it will totally enjoy. Here, performance counts and performance is measured against very objective standards. The judges are Terrier people who understand Terriers and their behavior. They are very willing to share their knowledge and experience if asked to do so. Scotties were bred to hunt and once that instinct is energized, it becomes an activity which they will eagerly embrace. By proving this instinct in your Scottie, you are confirming that this very important component of the Scottie personality is present.

AKC Earthdog Trial

INTRODUCTION TO THE QUARRY

The tunnel for the Intro. Class is ten feet long with one 90-degree corner approximately four feet from the entrance. The entrance is to be as inviting as possible so as to encourage the dog to approach and investigate willingly. This usually means a gently sloping approach which is clearly visible from the point of release – about ten feet from the entrance. The purpose of this test is to determine if the dog is willing to enter a confined, darkened space and “work” the quarry continuously for a short period. Work is defined as barking, whining, digging, attacking the protective bars, etc. The AKC does not consider staring working. Because of the short tunnel with only one 90-degree corner, the den is not completely dark and the dog can see the inside of the tunnel and

the quarry. In judging, at release the handler can give a single command; then optionally, move to a point along side the entrance to the tunnel, but can give no further encouragement. The dog has two minutes after entering the tunnel for the first time to reach and begin working the quarry. Within those two minutes the dog can leave the tunnel and reenter or approach the quarry and leave without beginning to work. If the dog reaches the quarry, but does not begin to work, the judge can encourage a reaction to the quarry by shaking the quarry cage, making scratching noises or using a noisemaker, without penalty to the dog. However, once the dog begins to work, the work must be continuously for 30 seconds. If the dog reaches the quarry and begins to work within two minutes of entering the tunnel and works the quarry for 30 seconds, it has earned a qualifying score. Note that this is non-regular class and is not a prerequisite to entering the Junior Earthdog Class.

JUNIOR EARTHDOG

The tunnel for the Junior Earthdog Class is thirty feet long with three 90-degree corners approximately ten feet apart with the first corner approximately four feet from the entrance. As with the Intro. Den, the entrance is to be gently sloped and visible from the release point which is approximately ten feet away. Upon release, the handler can give a single command, but must remain stationary and silent thereafter. After release, the dog has thirty seconds to reach to quarry. Once it reaches the quarry, it cannot leave and qualify. After reaching the quarry, the dog has thirty seconds to begin working and must work continuously for sixty seconds in order to earn a qualifying score. This class tests the dog's willingness to enter and follow a tunnel in what becomes total darkness to the quarry without much hesitation, and upon realizing that there is a

quarry at the end of the tunnel, to work the quarry for a somewhat prolonged period. The thirty second delay between reaching the quarry, and beginning to work gives the dog a chance to recognize the quarry by scent and sound since there should be no light to see the quarry. Recognize that this test does not prove several desirable Terrier traits, including a Scottie's natural instinct to be cautious when entering a tunnel. In this test there must be an acceptance that there are no surprises and no decisions required. Even though the tunnel is scented, following the scent beyond the entrance is not required and little time is allowed for deliberate tracking of the Scent.

It takes two qualifying scores of 100 to earn a Junior Earthdog Title. It is probably good that the requirements are not more stringent, as this class tests only the very basic instincts of a working Terrier, and in the case of time to the quarry, actually encourages behavior which is not desirable in a true working Terrier, namely, blindly rushing to the quarry without investigation, scent discrimination, or caution. However, since this is usually the largest class and time per entrant is a consideration, the test is constructed to provide some insight into the dog's instincts without taking too much time.

SENIOR EARTHDOG

The tunnel for the Senior Earthdog Class is similar in length and configuration to the Junior tunnel, with the addition of an unscented false exit and a scented false den at the second and third corners in any sequence. The entrance also differs in that it must be surrounded by a mound of dirt at least four inches high, and sloped into the tunnel at approximately 45 degrees so that it cannot be seen by the dog from the release point. The release point is a line that is a minimum of 20 feet from the entrance and between two markers which are approximately ten feet apart.

GO TO GROUND

Scent lines are laid from the markers towards the entrance forming a "vee" with its point at the entrance. The false exit is approximately seven feet long with one 90-degree bend and not visible to the dog from the release point. The false den is approximately four feet long and contains scented bedding material at the far end, but with no scent line leading to the bedding material. Upon release, the dog has 90 seconds to reach the quarry. In doing so it must cover the full 30-foot scented tunnel in the direction from the entrance to the quarry, but not necessarily continuously. This means that if the dog enters the earth through the false exit, it must leave the earth and reenter through the scented entrance. If it exits the earth from the false exit, it may reenter either the false exit or the scented entrance. After reaching the quarry the dog has 15 seconds to begin "working" the quarry. Working must be continuous for the 90 seconds after it begins. At the conclusion of the 90 seconds the judge removes the quarry from the den, re-covers the den and instructs the handler to recall the dog. The handler has 90 seconds from that time to gain physical control of the dog by recalling the dog with voice or whistle. The handler must remain at the entrance until the dog exits the earth at which time the handler may move to gain control of the dog. If the dog reenters the false exit, the handler must return to the scented entrance to recall the dog again.

This test consists of three elements, approaching the quarry in 90 seconds, working the quarry for 90 seconds and recalling to the handler with 90 seconds, with no more than 15 seconds between the first and second elements. The approach tests the dog's ability to follow a scent line from the point of release to the quarry without being distracted by the scented false den. If the dog runs over the scent line outside the den without picking it up and following it to the scented entrance, there is a good possibility that it will find the false exit and enter the earth there. Once in the den, it must be able to discriminate between the unscented false exit and the scented tunnel leading to the quar-

ry. The recall portion tests the dog's ability to recognize that the quarry has bolted, or left the den, and return to the handler. This is the first level that test tracking ability and having the discretion to recognize a false or empty den and either move on or return to the handler if being called.

It takes three qualifying runs to obtain a Senior Earthdog title. To qualify, all three elements must be completed within the proscribed time limits and your Scottie must attain a perfect score of 100.

MASTER EARTHDOG

The Master Earthdog tunnel is identical to the Senior Earthdog tunnel with the addition of a squeeze and a roller obstacle. The squeeze is a narrowing of the tunnel to 6 inches wide for a distance of 18 inches. The roller obstacle consists of a piece of 6 inch diameter PVC piping across the tunnel, restrained in movement by a one inch dowel passing through it on its horizontal centerline (allowing the pipe to roll forwards and backwards two and a half inches). An 18 inch long raised cover above the pipe allows the dog to climb on top of the pipe after first rolling it forwards and then climb down off the pipe on the far side by rolling it backwards. The purpose of these obstacles is to test the dogs' determination to reach the quarry.

There is no release point. Instead, there is a 200-yard approach walked by the judge, two off leash dogs and their handlers. The pairing of the dogs is done by random draw with the restriction that a brace cannot consist of two dogs owned by the same owner. The judge observes the dog's hunting activities above ground, and its willingness to work with another dog. Before reaching the earth, the dogs will pass a blind, unscented tunnel. The scented entrance and false exit are blocked, but the scented entrance is open enough that the dog may determine that it is scented. Additionally, a scent line is laid from the scented entrance approximately 20 feet towards the approach path. A stake is located approximately 20 feet from the entrance. The dog must actively hunt during the approach, ignore or leave the false tunnel without beginning to

work, and find the scented entrance to the earth before the judge reaches it. The dog may leave the scented entrance and continue to hunt before returning to the control of its handler, but the location of the scented entrance must be positively marked by active interest. The second dog to reach the entrance is tied to the stake while the handler of the first dog brings the dog to the now unblocked scented entrance and releases the dog. The dog has 90 seconds to reach the quarry and must work the quarry for 90 continuous seconds. After one minute of the working, the judge will scratch on the tunnel above the dog with a trowel or similar hand tool for the remaining 30 seconds of work and the dog must continue to work without break. At the end of the work period, the judge will call the handler to retrieve the dog from the tunnel. The handler has 15 seconds to extract the dog from the earth at the den end. The first dog is then tied to the stake and the second dog is released at the entrance. While staked, the non-working dog must "honor" the working dog by remaining quiet and under the control of the handler without being restrained by the handler.

To earn a Master Earthdog title a dog must complete four qualifying runs. To qualify, the dog must pass all elements with a perfect score of 100. During the walk-up, each dog must remain under control of its handler while actively hunting. It must find and mark the scented entrance before the arrival of the judge. Terrier temperament is tested; as the dog must aggressively work the quarry while at the same time recognize that the other dog on the walk-up is not the quarry. Aggressive behavior towards the other dog is an automatic disqualification. Aggressive or unruly behavior while in the honoring position is also cause for disqualification. And the time constraints of the tunnel portion must be met.

This is but a brief overview of the AKC Earthdog Trial classes. I hope that this information will encourage you to consider an activity that allows you to enjoy working with your dog, and allows your dog to develop natural instincts.

A well-trained Scottie is only a click away

Did you know that there's a method of dog training that seems as if it were made just for Scotties? It doesn't involve corrections, dominance, "Alpha rolls," chokers or prong collars, or scolding. You train only a few minutes a day, and your dog enjoys it, looks forward to it even. Sound too good to be true? Maybe you haven't tried clicker training!

Clicker training is an exciting and proven method, based on rewarding desired behavior and ignoring undesired behavior. Karen Pryor brought clicker training to the forefront in the 1960s when she'd been charged with the task of training dolphins for her husband's sea park. Because you can't punish, scold or otherwise physically correct a dolphin, Pryor had to find an innovative way to teach her dolphins to perform; after studying B.F. Skinner's psychology texts, clicker training was born. Marine mammal trainers use whistles, and dog trainers use clickers; hundreds of species of animals have been trained using this concept.

Part of what makes this method revolutionary in that it puts all the responsibility on the trainer, rather than constantly blaming the dog for "blowing off" the handler, "being stubborn" or giving them other unfair labels. It's the trainer's job to train the animal to the required level of adequacy.

Clicker training can be used for any dog sport – conformation, obedience, agility, tracking, therapy work – and can be used to improve your dog's manners around the house. It is reliable and effective. By eliminating corrections and focusing only on desired behavior, training loses its adversarial nature and learning flourishes. Scotties thrive in this kind of learning environment because they were bred to be problem solvers and independent thinkers.

The clicker itself is often the subject of misunderstanding. It is neither a command nor praise, and is never used to get the dog's attention; once the dog learns the desired behavior, the clicker is no longer needed. The clicker is used only in the learning stages and for refreshers.

The sound of the click is used to "mark" a behavior, much like taking a snapshot; by clicking, you are telling the dog that, at that exact moment, you like what he's doing. By following the sound of the click with some-

thing the dog wants, such as food or a toy, the click becomes a valuable form of communication. The dog quickly learns that the behavior during the sound of the click is being marked, and the sound means that something good will quickly follow. The click always means the same thing: you are doing something right, and you're about to get rewarded (reinforced) for it. A dog that has figured out the game will begin testing and trying new things in training, hoping to get clicked. Undesired behaviors are simply ignored. When the dog has learned the behavior, the clicker is faded gradually and the occasional cookie is used to reinforce correct responses.

While you will eventually fade the clicker altogether as the behavior is learned, you never remove the goodie that follows the click. In order to retain its importance, the click must always be paired with something the dog wants; food is usually the easiest and most obvious, but there are a few extremely toy-motivated Scotties that enjoy their favorite ball or fuzzy rat as reinforcement. One click always equals one treat (or tug, or fetch, etc.). If using food, use delicious treats like cheese, chicken, or liver; avoid kibble and dry biscuits. It should be something highly desirable for the dog, something he really wants. Praise is not sufficient; dogs do not have any inherent desire to please. You can praise a Scottie to the ends of the earth and it usually matters little to them; they might like it, but they won't work their hardest for it. While we humans seem to think highly of praise, it's cheap payout for our dogs. Humans don't work for free, and there's no reason our Scotties should either. Food and toys are excellent training tools and will only enhance your dog's attitude when used correctly.

People often ask why you can't just use your voice instead of the clicker. First, your voice changes every day, all day long. In a single phrase (such as "good dog!") your inflection can change repeatedly in any given training session, depending on your mood, your dog's behavior, how tired you are, etc. However, the tone of the click never changes – it is a steady and constant sound. Another benefit to using the clicker is that a click occurs in 1/10th of a second; because of this, you can mark the tiniest pieces of behaviors, something that simply can't be done with any

word or phrase. Because the clicker is so precise, it speeds up training time considerably.

When you are teaching a new behavior, it must be broken down into as many small pieces as possible. Each behavior is comprised of many pieces that make up the end result. For instance, when your dog lies down, what does it do first? Imagine it in slow motion. The head lowers, then the front, then the elbows, the center, and finally the rear. To begin teaching a new behavior, you begin by clicking and treating only the beginning of the behavior (dog's head lowers). Then, you ask for a little more (dog's front lowers), and then some more (elbows down). If this sounds complicated, think of math in school. Did you learn addition in first grade, and then move immediately to algebra? Or even division? Of course not. Clicker training, because of its precision, progresses quickly.

Timing is crucial when training with the clicker. By clicking *during* the behavior, you are communicating to the dog that what he's doing at that moment is what has earned him his cookie. Most new clicker trainers click way too late; while this doesn't harm the dog, it does slow learning. As with anything, timing will only improve with practice, and the dogs often learn despite their owner's timing. Most people are quite amazed at what happens in their first training session with their dog!

There are three different ways to teach your dog a new behavior: shaping, luring and capturing. These three methods can be used interchangeably, depending on your dog and your desired goal.

Shaping involves watching the dog and marking for tiny increments towards your goal, without any prompts from the trainer. To shape a dog to heel, for example, one would click the dog first for any slack in the lead, then for anything with a slack lead on the left side, then for anything with a slack lead on the left side closer to the knee, etc.

Luring involves using a prop of some sort (such as a treat or visual target) to get the dog into position without force. Luring is most often used to teach behaviors like sit and down, with the dog being lured into position with a treat in front of its nose, clicking and releasing the treat as the dog moves into position.

Capturing is the final method, and is quite simple: wait for the dog to do what you want, then click him for it. This method is usually recommended outside of actual training sessions, for behaviors difficult to train although the dog does them naturally (such as stacking, lying down, or making eye contact). Does your Scottie free-stack beautifully in the back yard while watching the world go by? Capture it!

When training a behavior with the clicker, wait to add the cue (the clicker word for command) until after the dog is volunteering the behavior. Because the dog does not understand English, concentrate on first teaching the behavior itself, and then naming it once the behavior is complete. Once the dog is volunteering the behavior, begin saying the name *as he does it*. By pairing the word with the behavior, the dog learns that this specific behavior is called by this specific name.

To get started with your dog and the clicker, I usually recommend that beginners attempt teaching something very simple, such as a trick. Trick training removes the pressure to succeed and "make your dog behave," because you're only teaching it for fun; try teaching your Scottie to do a fun trick he doesn't yet know, such as spin, shake or crawl. Begin your first couple sessions of just clicking and treating repeatedly, to give the dog the message that click = treat; after that, begin working on your trick. If one way doesn't seem to be working, try another way; the beauty of clicker training is that there are as many ways to teach a behavior as there are trainers. There is no single recipe for teaching your dog something. Once you get the feel for clicking with your dog, you can move on to more serious goals, such as perfecting a free stack, sitting nicely for petting or loose-lead walking.

If you'd like to try clicker training with your Scottie, read the tips below, get the books on the reading list at your local library, and visit the websites. Petco now carries Karen Pryor's beginning clicker training kits as well; these are a wonderful and inexpensive resource. Clicker training enhances your relationship with your Scottie, because you're finally able to tell him what you want him to do, and he gets something he wants. It's the best kind of trade-off. So, what are you waiting for? Start clicking and have fun!

Tips

- *One click always equals one treat.* If you click, even by accident, it must be followed by a treat. This is an absolute.
- *Click once (in-out).* Never use multiple clicks (clickety-clickety-click). If you want to emphasize that the dog has just done something extraordinary, use a jackpot (approximately 5-10 treats at once, as compared to one).
- *Click during the behavior, not after.* If you want to click your dog for walking loosely on the lead, click as the lead slackens for just that split second.
- *Click ends the behavior.* It's okay if your dog gets up or moves around after he's been clicked; the behavior is finished and he's earned his cookie. Don't attempt to hold him in position after you've clicked, because the behavior is done. Start again, and click the next increment toward your goal.
- *Break behaviors up into small, manageable pieces.* If you always try to get the desired behavior from the beginning, you'll frustrate your dog and he'll quit. Click for small pieces and slowly ask for more; be careful not to ask for the entire behavior in perfect form too soon.
- *The more a behavior is reinforced, the more it is likely to reoccur.* This is the Golden Rule of Clicker Training! If your dog isn't doing what you want, it's because you haven't reinforced it enough yet in that exact situation!
- *Do not correct or punish.* The point of clicker training is to get the dog to think for itself, and to attempt new behaviors to earn goodies. A dog that's corrected won't offer behaviors and will simply wait to be told what to do. Clicker training cannot be effective if mixed with punishment.
- *Don't always make it harder.* Bounce back and forth on the ladder of difficulty to keep your dog encouraged and guessing about what's to come.
- *Never use the clicker to get your dog to come to you or get your dog's attention.* Remember, the click is marking the behavior that the dog is doing at that moment. If you begin clicking to get your dog to come to you, the clicker is losing its significance and will quickly become white noise.
- *Train for no more than 5 minutes.* Dogs, like people, learn more in a shorter period of time than they do in marathon sessions. You can do two to three sessions in a day, if you want, but no more than five min-

utes at a time.

- *Toss the treat away from you.* This not only gets the dog out of position so you aren't locked into staring at him, it also works great for treat sharks. Scotties live for the thrill of the chase, and this is a great way to burn off energy during training.
- *Keep treats small (raisin-sized!).* Small treats keep the dog from getting full quickly, and losing interest. If your Scottie has a tendency to gain weight, omit a portion of his meals whenever you train.
- *Use something the dog really wants for reinforcement.* If your dog isn't excited about what you're offering, it doesn't mean clicker training isn't working – you have to find what it is the dog wants and use it. Be creative!
- *Work on your timing while the dogs are outside.* Watch the news and click when the anchors blink. Use different props (a tennis ball, a set of keys) and, dropping them, click as the item hits the floor. Toss it up and click as it hits the apex.
- *If the dog is having difficulty, move back a couple steps.* If you ask for too much too soon, the dog won't understand and will quit working. Go back a couple steps, make it simpler, and you'll be amazed at how quickly your dog will progress.
- *If your dog is doing something you don't like, train an incompatible behavior.* Click for four paws on the floor if he jumps on people. Click for lying on a mat in the kitchen if he tends to beg at the table.
- *Have fun!* Remember, you can't fool a Scottie. Enjoy your training time, quit while you're ahead, and always end on a happy note.

Special-needs rescues come into your life when you least expect them. They are the ones who immediately touch your heart and burrow deep into your soul. Somehow, they find their way to safety and love. This Scottie found her way. And if not for STCA Rescue, this story could not be told.

It had been less than two month's since I lost my rescue Stanley to cancer last year, and I was starting to think of another special-need's rescue. One night, I received a call from Amy Cada who told me about a young female Scottie who just had been brought to the humane society in Daytona Beach. Amy forwarded me this poor creature's picture and my heart stopped. Within five minutes I was on the phone to Jim and Kathi Overby, STCA Florida Rescue Coordinators, to let them know this Scottie HAD TO BE MINE. Jim had been alerted earlier that day about this potential rescue and assured me that he was doing all he could to get her released. After many phone calls and emails, Jim made arrangements to drive to Daytona Beach to rescue this very emaciated, dehydrated sick Scottie.

What Jim saw shocked and appalled him. The picture on the Internet did not compare to what this Scottie looked like when she was brought out of the kennel area. She was too weak to walk. Her nails were like talons. She literally had no hair. Her skin was hanging in folds like that of a Shar Pei. And her entire body was covered with oozing sores. Her eyes were glazed over, with no life behind them. This Scottie was near death and Jim knew he had to intervene immediately. Because of her condition, she was handed over to Rescue without a mention of donation, etc. Jim was told they were sure no one would want her and consequently she was scheduled for euthanasia the next day.

Naming this little sprite was not difficult. The moment I saw her picture, I felt it was serendipity. I checked Webster's dictionary and found "serendipity" defined as "The faculty of making fortunate and unexpected discoveries by accident." And that is how she got her name, Seren, short for serendipity.

Jim and Kathi worked round the clock to bring Seren back from the brink of death. Feeding small and frequent meals, daily medicated baths, administering

antibiotics and salves, and showering with much needed love worked magic. One month later, Seren made her way from Jacksonville to Fort Lauderdale with the help of the Scottish Terrier Club of Tampa Bay's wagon train.

The minute Seren walked into the house she went directly to the toy box as if to say "I'll have one of these, and one of those" until every toy was strewn across the room. My Scotties sat back in amazement with "HEY, who is this newbie???" in their eyes. It didn't take long and as if to say "let the games begin," everyone joined in to play *tug of war*, *catch me catch me*, and *kill that squeaker*.

As bold and brassy as Seren was inside the house, she was just the opposite outside. Every noise, car, person, and movement frightened her. It now was my responsibility to introduce the new world to her and let her know all was safe. We started off with baby steps – two steps outside and a treat and on and on, until after several days she cautiously walked out to the driveway. Riding in the car was quite an experience for her, but she took to that quickly. During one of our rides,

I had to put on the windshield wipers. It was as if Seren was watching a tennis match, with her eyes and head following the movement of the blades. I doubt I will never stop smiling when I think of that ride. Trips to Petsmart became a regular outing for us and slowly her confidence grew.

By this time Seren had started bonding with my Scotties and looked to them for the high sign when she was faced with a new experience. Then came the big challenge - going for a walk in the neighborhood. The first couple of walks were brief, with Seren watching the others every inch of the way. Then it was if a light bulb went on in her head - it wasn't scary out there anymore. Now it was time to actually meet the neighbors who anxiously came out to greet her. Again, she watched my other Scotties as they approached children and adults and she slowly followed suit. The rest is history.

Today, Seren OWNS the world. When it is walk time, she aroos at the door for her leash and takes off ahead of the pack in anticipation of all the fun that always presents itself down the road. I still am amazed at how she has changed from a skittish, frightened Scottie into a confident and loving companion.

Gone is the hairless, emaciated dog from the humane society. In less than six months, Seren became a true Scottie in every way, right down to her furnishings. As you can see in these pictures, Seren's progress is a true miracle.

Seren's next challenge is to compete in earth dog with her older sister, Tudey, in

which I might add, she will excel as she has with everything she has faced in her life.

Give back to the breed we love. Reach into your pockets and donate to Rescue. This story is only one of many that exemplifies the hard work and dedication of everyone dedicated to our Rescue organization.

2001 STCA RESCUE SURVEY

A survey was conducted to count the number of Scottish Terriers rescued during 2001. All official rescue coordinators received a questionnaire and a notice was posted on the STCA Web Page asking for input from individuals who may have rescued a Scottie during the year. We thank everyone who responded to the survey and participated in rescue during 2001. 510 rescues were counted in the previous survey conducted in 1999. The new count is a 27.4% increase. The number of rescues they receive overwhelms many of the rescue coordinators. There are many ways that individuals can help and we ask all Scottie lovers to call your local rescue person and ask what you can do to assist them.

- 59% were males and 41% were females
- The youngest was 8 weeks.
- The oldest was 14 and a half years
- 97.5% were adopted
- 11 were euthanized for health reasons and 5 were euthanized because of bad temperament, which made them unadoptable.

- 55% were turned in by owners
- 37% came from shelters
- 8% were strays or other sources (i.e. puppy mill, abandoned at vet, etc.)
- Texas had the most rescues with 82 followed by California with 50 and New York, Colorado, Ohio and Illinois with 48 each.
