In the July issue of the Bagpiper, you will remember reading Dr. Robert W. Kirk's comments at the symposium on sterility problems in bitches. He mentioned that a change in diet or feeding stale food can be a cause. Along this same line, I would like to submit excerpts from the Pembroke Welsh Corgi Column (July, 1968 AKC Gazette.) Mr. John Lambert, Hermitage, Route 2, Raleigh, N. C. is the columnist, and in my opinion his comments are so vitally important that our members should know about his experience.

Unfortunately, when it comes to the "New! Improved!" products we know whereof we speak. At least three times in the past decade we have run into trouble, and on each occasion it has taken hard work, including that of busy professionals,

to find out what went awry.

The first incident arose over a coat conditioner we had bought on the recommendation of a fancier of a different breed. In retrospect, we should have added more fat to the Corgis' food during a long, hot summer rather than this additive; but we did not realize this until two years later. In the interim one of our best brood bitches had developed breast cancer, necessitating surgery. The cancer, unfortunately spread and the bitch died. We thought this an isolated case, but when the same thing happened to her daughter, we began to fear that the bloodline had a fatal flaw. Some months later a third, unrelated, bitch developed the same affliction; and at this juncture we called the veterinatians together for a research session. As it turned out-after losing three bitches, two in whelp-we discovered that the coat conditioner had been "improved" with unbalanced additions of sex hormones. We stopped using the product and have had cancer in no bitch since then. The product, by the way, was modified when the veternarians' report was filed.

The second incident happened about a year ago. Concurrently two Tarheel Corgi breeders discovered that none of the bitches was coming into season. They had different bloodlines and different kennel regimens; what they did have in common was use of a recently "improved" dog food. On the recommendation of their veterinarians, one changed brands immediately, and the bitches in the kennels came into heat as though it were a contagion! Then the other changed, with identical results. We still do not know what had been added to make the food "New! Improved!" Pity, too, for it might provide the long-sought solution for the world population explosion!

The final incident has just reached resolution. For the past two winters, since mov-

ing into new kennels, our stud force has been plagued with bloody urine. No young dog was affected, nor was any bitch, regardless of age. Surgery in one champion revealed serious kidney damage; the trouble, in sum, seems to be cumulative. Genetic factors were ruled out; the dogs were not closely related. But when we compared notes with other breeders, spread from coast to coast, we began to fear—from similar experiences—that we had found an Achilles Heel in the Pembroke breed.

Once again the long search, item by item. to discover what might be wrong. All products changed; kennel regimen modified. Finally, since nothing else remained, we had the water tested, both for bacteria and for chemical content. More by accident than design, samples of both the hot and the cold water were submitted to the state health department. Neither contained harmful bacteria; but the cold water, slightly acid, contained traces of iron, copper, and zinc. The hot water, passing through a new, "improved" glass-lined heater, revealed increased acidity, doubled amounts of iron, copper, and zinc-plus amounts of lead. These reports were submitted to two toxicology laboratories for interpretation; both concluded that heavy metal ions in the hot water were sufficient to impair the kidneys of the stud dogs, over a period of time.

It was easy, once we had learned this, to figure out why the trouble appeared only in winter. We had used large amounts of hot water to moisten dog food and even larger amounts to thaw and fill the outside drinking pans in sub-freezing temperatures. We shall, of course, modify procedures next winter; but if other breeders are having similar trouble, might we suggest they have their water supply chemically analyzed?

We shall continue using products that are "New! Improved!—it is almost impossible to avoid them—but we shall attempt to introduce them one at a time and always with one eye looking for side-effects.—John Lambert, Hermitage, Rt. 2, Raleigh, N.C. 27610

#### BY THEIR PROGENY SHALL THEY BE KNOWN

Vana Mapplebeck called your editor's attention to the following article by F. Warner Hill appearing in the English "Dog World" (August, 1968). This should be of general interest to all of you. AH

Five years ago at the Uxbridge show, little did I realize I was awarding Best in Show to a Scottish Terrier already on his way to becoming the greatest stud force of the present century in any breed, and we can write his name with pride--Ch. KENNELGARTH VIKING--for he has broken the record of Bobby Chapman's famous dog, Ch. Heather Necessity, which has stood for over 30 years. who had 18 British champions to his credit.

Kennelgarth is a continuation of the Heather line, for owner of Viking, Miss Betty Penn-Bull of Windsor, bought Heather Herald from Mr. Chapman in 1937 as a real newcomer to the breed. This dog was directly bred to Necessity, being by Ch. Heather Realisation, by Ch. Heather Fashion Hint, who was by the old champion Champion Viking, now 8 1/2 years old, still looks wonderful, and every inch a champion.

He is a very intelligent, alert and active dog, full of character and personality. He is also a great pet and lives a free life. Very good tempered, he runs with six other adult male stud dogs and a bitch or two, and while he remains King and tops the lot, and is completely fearless, he is no fighter.

This year and last year he attended the Champion Parade at the Scottish Terrier Breeders' and Exhibitors' Association show at Slough, where he showed with great enthusiasm and received an ovation from the ringside. His virility is undiminished for he has recently sired three litters of six, four and five. His dam, Ch. Kennelgarth Gleam, died last year at 13 1/2, and his sire, Ch. Kennelgarth Eros, also died only recently. Viking, however, looks good for several years to come.

Comment has been made over the years that sensational winning dogs do not always register as sires, but Viking, champion bred and a multiple best in show winner, though not exploited to the full, has proved to be a brilliant exception, and he sired "Dog of the Year" in Mrs. Audrey Dallison's Ch. Gosmore Eilburn Admaration.

1965 was really Viking's greatest year, for at Cruft's 12 of his progeny between them won BOB, res. CC, 12 of the 16 firsts in the straight classes together with 8 seconds and 5 thirds, and he sired the three top dog puppies and the two top bitch puppies. Eight of the above were, or later to become, champions. What is more, his stock breeds on and two recent topliners are his grandchildren, Ch. Gosmore Eilburn Miss Hopeful, BIS champion show winner; and Ch. Brio Jezebel, champion show group winner.

Ch. Viking is now sire of 36 champions distributed all over the world. Twenty are English champions—eight dogs and twelve bitches.

It is seven years ago since his first puppy entered the ring, and his twentieth champion won his title at Peterborough this year. Another interesting point comes in the bitch line. The only survivor of Viking's first litter became Ch. Gaywyn Viscountess, who holds the bitch record with 15 certificates, and many BIS awards.

# POPULAR DOGS FAMOUS PHILLIPS SYSTEM . . . . what it is . . . . how it works

Popular Dogs' Phillips' System is designed to measure with fairness the difference between a dog show win scored over many dogs and one scored over but a few dogs. For example, a Best in Show scored over 1,000 dogs should obviously have more meaning than a Best in Show scored over 200 dogs. The Phillips System does this by awarding points in accordance with the number of dogs over which the win was scored. The Best in Show (BIS) dog earns a point for each dog in actual competition (absentees and Obedience dogs are not counted.) Points are awarded for Best in Show, or Group placement wins only. First in Group (GR1) earns a point for each dog in the Group. Second in Group(GR2) earns a point for each dog in the Group less the total dogs in the breed that was First. Third in Group (GR3) earns a point for each dog in the Group less the total of the breeds that were First and Second. And Fourth in Group (GR4) earns a point for each dog in the Group less the total of the breeds that were First, Second, and Third.

Source for the count are the official records for each show, as published by the American Kennel Club. The AKC reports appear approximately two months subsequent to the show --for example, July shows are usually reported in the September Gazette, August shows in October, etc. Popular Dogs maintains a running, detailed individual card for each dog that has placed in a Group during the year. Note that the breakdown of BIS and GR placements shown in the point totals are for wins in the period specified at top of the sheet, and are not overall career records of the dogs.

The Phillips System is a copyrighted presentation of Popular Dogs. It was originated over 10 years ago by Mrs. Irene Castle Phillips (now Khatoonian) a prominent judge, and was compiled by her for many years. It is now compiled by Joan Brearley, the editor of Popular Dogs magazine.

# SCOTTISH HELOISE HELPFUL HINTS

The following hint was sent to us by two old friends of the breed, Henry and Ruth Israel, Paisley Hill, of Dayton, Ohio. The Israels are retired, and although they have not been active in the show rings, they do enjoy keeping up with the Scottie news.

Accidents will happen--quick with the salt!!!!!

To remove a wet puddle from a wool rug, wipe up as much as possible, then just pour ordinary table salt on it. Cover the whole spot and put PLENTY on. Put on about a half-inch high. Leave it on until the spot is thoroughly dry. Takes about a day or two, depending on the amount of liquid that is there. When it is dry, take your sweeper and pick up the salt. Result? No trace of the spot whatsoever and what's more, no odor. This was tested and the results are truly fantastic!

It's best to first put down some old terry cloth towels (or paper ones) over the stain and step on them until the excess moisture has been absorbed. Then just pour on that salt (like you were filling the shaker, not sprinkling an egg) until it completely covers the stain, being sure to rub some down into the pile. After the salt dries completely (in a day or so), vacuum it up and you'll not believe your eyes. Not a sign of a ring or spot! Now you may think pouring on so much salt will be expensive, but doesn't that beat buying a new carpet? Some stains, if not taken care of immediately, are permanent. Bet you won't ever be without an extra box of salt just for accidents like this. Remember, however, to empty that vacuum cleaner, gals, and wipe off the bottom or section that came in contact with the salt. That salt may rust your machine--especially in damp weather.

This is all for now, and since our next issue will be in December, I do want to wish all of you a very happy Thanksgiving Day!
