

" SCOTTIES IN TRACKING."

In teaching Scotties to do anything, they cannot and should not be forced. With the current philosophy of training and working with your dog, there are few limitations as to what you all can do together.

In regard to tracking, I've found my own Scotties a real joy to work with. First, there's that independence they have for doing things their own way, and in tracking they're really doing "their own thing". Secondly, is their zest for doing things all the way or not bothering. Everything about tracking utilizes the dog's natural instincts. Specifying which scent is not difficult if you don't rush.

I know of no experience comparable to following a dog that is truly tracking and employing all his gusto and strength for just that.

"Hoss", C.D.X.,T.D.,my youngest tracker, is really a tracking fool. He was certified by Margaret Persall in September, 1971. I entered him in two tests the following month. He passed both. "Hoss" certainly has impressed many with his enthusiasm for the sport.

It was only natural that "Hoss" should track. His dam, Eliza Doolittle, U.D.T., was my first tracking Scottie. Eliza is a beautiful little tracker; she's the Scottie some of you may have read about who tracked for her "T" in a snow storm. She had never tracked in snow prior to her test but had never expressed any hesitancy in zapping her way through any track. I really believe it was that Scottie stubbornness that urged her to plow through that day. Surely you all know that once a Scottie decides to do something, you may consider it done.

Anyone who has walked Scotties through deep snow will know that only their rugged diehard determination drives them on through the almost impossible. Their little pads freeze up and the snow gathers in balls between their nails, balls of frozen snow cling to their tummies and they look like little ice-breakers chugging along. So when I read this article some time ago in the Michigan Tartan, the official bulletin of the STC of Michigan, U.S.A., I knew many readers would like to hear the adventures of a little girl named "ELIZA DOOLITTLE CDX - TD", although I would say by her titles she has hardly done little, but owned & handled by Diana Williams of Virginia, has done quite a bit and certainly all of us are proud she is a Scottie.

To quote from "The Tartan": "..... At least half an hour had passed and we called for the first dog to begin the tracking trial. By this time we have approximately 1 1/2" of snow, with drifts to 2 1/2" on the fields. The dog and handler came out to the area where the tracklayer had started; she was shown the exact spot in order that the dog might get the scent from the "ground" and was shown only the direction in which the tracklayer walked. Other than this, the handler knew nothing; the track was completely covered by the blowing snow; and she couldn't keep her eyes open to see the track even if it was visible. The only contact between dog and handler was a 40' lead and the handler must stay at least twenty feet from the dog. Encouragement can be given verbally by the handler. All the other exhibitors and interested parties left the warm fireplace of a nearby delightful farmhouse to watch the impossible event.

Within minutes, the black Scottie was white; making a tunnel through the snow - but right on the track! a turn!! No problem - she made the turn as if there was an arrow pointing the direction! All that could be seen by anyone there was a blanket of snow with a dog and handler putting a "rut" in Mother Nature's cover. Meanwhile, it is bitter and cold and the blizzard was not slowing for Scottish Terrier, handler or judge.

Eliza Doolittle (con't)

.....The Scottie was still going -- the second turn; now, the third turn -- but getting slower and still slower. However she was right on the track! She had gone approximately 350 yards -- now, she was making her last turn; about 75 to 100 yards to go! By this time, an entirely different motion was noticed by the judges and exhibitors who were tense, cold, and observing a fascinating dog fighting the elements. The Scottie was rocking -- actually muscling her body along the last 50 yards of the track. Her legs were packed with ice and her body covered with snow and ice; the handler had fallen many times - but they both kept going! The dog was attempting to make it to the end of the track where the tracklayer had left his "last" article. It was now inch by inch - muscle-flex by muscle-flex . . . the dog was only yards away from the article. I was "choked up" and Betty McBane (judge) was crying; the other people were watching in dead silence, except for wiping eyes and blowing noses. Still, the Scottie went on; and with one final thrust, she collapsed on the glove - the desired "last" article.

Never have I seen so many people so happy with so many tears in so much snow in such bad weather - but, over a Scottish Terrier who "fought the unfightable foe" to please her owner.

This speech was given to the Membership of the SCOTTISH TERRIER METROPOLITAN BREEDERS ASSOCIATION on February 13, 1972.

I would like to take this opportunity of sharing with all of you some of my apprehensions prevalent in the BREED to-day throughout the country. Foremost in my mind is HEAD and EXPRESSION. Where have the Heads of the past gone? Such as Necessity, Fashion Hint, Essential, Crich Certainty, Realization and many others in Dogs, with Bitches such as A. Laurie, Ortley Carmen, Rose. Gem Al. Romance, Summer Rose and more recently Janes Grey Wonder. These and more Scotties with Heads and Expressions one could never forget for to have seen, known and appreciate what these animals had in breed character, was a real pleasure I wish everyone interested in Scotties could have experienced. In the past we had some comparable Heads and Expressions in our Scotties ----but where are they today----they sure are few and far between and this is what makes it so difficult for the newcomers to our breed, what do they have as an IDEAL ? We have descendants of these former greats, so somewhere we Went wrong as far as HEADS and EXPRESSIONS,

We are fortunate to have throughout the country a few Oldtimers who can be of great assistance in this very important aspect.

Another condition that disturbs me, is the lack of substance in many of our Scots, particularly legs and feet and in many instances these are the ones also lacking in Head and Expression. When queried many owners will quote weights that are adequate. However, this weight is attained by the animal being overweight from poor soft condition. We could argue size and weight. Having divested myself of these observations, I realize that lip service alone will not correct anything. However, I do not believe that the majority of Scottie Breeders properly motivated would not honestly endeavor to rectify these most serious faults.

Perhaps if the newcomers and the not so recent newcomers would seek the advice and help of the Oldtimers, they would give freely of their knowledge. Thusly, Mrs. B. Reeg is being honored here tonight for it was her interest in and unselfish help extended to beginners was her greatest contribution to the breed.

"THE DIEHARD"

Short of body, long of head
Ears erect and small
Tail well up - of such length
'Tis scarce a tail at all.

Well-sprung ribs, chest low to ground,
Coat both hard and dense,
Small, well-shaped dark eye that gives
Varmint look intense.

Quarters strong, with rounded thighs
Feet compact and round,
Muzzle heavy, level mouth,
Teeth large, strong, and sound.

on clothing and possessions, with disastrous effect. It is not communicable after its onset, however.

The most likely candidates for this disease are: The very young dog, the dog in poor physical condition, males more than females, Boxers as a breed more than other breeds, and it is more likely to be present in underdeveloped areas.

To help prevent Valley Fever:
Cultivate your ground...earth that has been turned and planted with any type of vegetation is less likely to spread spores. Keep yourself and your pets in good condition by use of vitamins, good diet, plenty of rest, clean surroundings, etc. Investigate any suspicious symptoms with the help of your Veterinarian. Loving attention and care for your pet could very well be his salvation.
