Chilling in Neonatal Deaths

Few things can be more frustrating and perplexing to a breeder than to have one or more pups in an apparently healthy litter become weak and stop nursing within 48 hours of birth. Frequently these pups are of normal size, comparable to their siblings, and seem healthy up to this point. These pups will often waste away, fall below birth weight, become rapidly dehydrated and die within several days of birth. Many theories have been advanced as to the cause of these neonatal deaths and no doubt they all have some basis in fact. It has become somewhat the vogue to pin these fatalities on puppy viremia, fading puppy syndrome, or toxic bitch's milk. These entities do exist, and they do result in the death of newly born pups. However, I am reminded of the words of a professor in school, "... When you hear hoofbeats around the corner, place your bet on a horse, not a zebra."

By far the greatest killer of neonatal puppies is nothing more than chilling. For the first few weeks of a dog's life, he is poikilothermic (cold-blooded). He cannot generate enough heat on his own to maintain body temperature at, or near, a normal of 100-102°F. If left to himself, a pup's temperature may fall to 94° or lower and, indeed, this is even listed as the normal body temperature for neonatal pups. I do not consider 94° normal just because it will fall that low! A decrease of 6° will not, in and of itself, result in the death of a normal puppy. However, here, as in many areas of medicine, we have one factor leading to complications which result in even more severe consequences. We have, in effect, a vicious circle. Chilling is a stress which causes weakness, in turn preventing effective nursing by the pup. Dehydration and more severe weakness result from this inability to suckle. We soon have apparent convulsions. These are seen occasionally when the temperature falls below 93° and the pup becomes hypoglycemic (blood sugar falls low) from not nursing. Death comes within hours for these pups. Often the entire litter is not affected, but only one or two will show these signs. Breeders will usually shrug off these losses, thinking eight out of 10, or four out of five isn't bad, but in many cases I feel these pups can be saved.

Don't think this happens only to those breeders who place the pregnant bitch in the garage in 30° weather on whelping night. I have seen this very problem in litters cared for by the most conscientious of breeders with the latest in techniques at their disposal. I cite, as an example, a litter of five Old English Sheepdog puppies, born all of good size and apparently healthy. The breeder had taken care to provide a suitable whelping box, heated with a heat-lamp, and draft-free. The bitch had had litters before and was exceptionally good with these. All pups nursed well for the first 12 hours, and then one seemed to fall behind. He segregated himself from the others and failed to nurse adequately. Then placed on a teat, he soon tired and fell off. Within 18 hours of birth this pup was in obvious trouble.

Several times during the night he had apparent convulsions, with his body becoming very noticeably depressed and dehydrated (the skin over the back failed to snap back when lifted, as in a normal pup.) Body temperature was below 94°F and he was still having bouts of rigid convulsions. Temperature within the whelping box was 78°. When placed directly under the heat-lamp, the pup's temperature rose to 100° within five minutes. Several ml. of light Karo syrup were placed directly in the pup's mouth, and an infant feeding tube was used to administer 8ml. of liquid Esbilac (Borden). Within 20 minutes there was a most dramatic change in the pup's condition. He was sleeping peacefully and not crying. Activated sleep, the normal twitching movements of the legs in young sleeping pups, was once again obvious. When removed from under the heat-lamp, the body temperature fell rapidly and the pup was obviously uncomfortable, complaining loudly.

Placed under the lamp, again the temperature rose to normal and the pup was fine. Directly under the lamp, the box temperature was approximately 85°. This one pup was fed, via stomach tube, warm Esbilac four times daily with supplemental nursing. Rectal temperature was monitored by the breeder every half-hour for the next two days. Weight gains were noted within several days, and although noticeably smaller than its littermates, it was perfectly healthy after a few weeks. All pups in the litter had a moderate infestation of roundworms and hookworms, for which they were treated. Today, at four months of age, it is nearly impossible to tell one from another.

In summary, body temperature maintenance is more important in neonatal pups than many people realize. The neonatal often cannot maintain near-normal temperature on his own and, coupled with weakness due to other factors, chilling may kill your pups.

Young puppies require large volumes of food and fluid intake and will rapidly dehydrate if unable to suckle effectively. Chilling adds to this debilitation. Nursing must be supplemented with stomach-tube feeding if a weak pup cannot suckle. Your veterinarian will demonstrate the technique of passing an infant stomach-feeding-tube.

Keep your breeding stock healthy and clean. Bring immunizations up to date before breeding. Have a yearly physical performed on each individual, with a fecal exam for intestinal parasites done at least once a year. If your bitches have worms, have them treated before breeding. Infective larvae can be passed to the fetuses across the placenta before birth, and through the milk while nursing. Intestinal parasites will cause severe weakness in your pups, robbing them of essential nutrients and causing considerable loss of blood. Migrating larvae pass through the lungs, often causing serious coughing, pneumonia and possible death if coupled with chilling.

Keep whelping-box temperatures at or near 80°. A General Electric heat-lamp

suspended approximately four feet over the box makes this task much easier. Take rectal temperatures on any puppy that seems weak and does not nurse well. If body temperature is below 98°, place the pup under the heat-lamp. Carefully monitor pups if they are kept under the lamp, for excessive heat will result in death, also. Using an eye-dropper or a small syringe, place several drops of light Karo syrup in the chilled pup's mouth. Glucose is absorbed directly through the mucous membranes and will provide an almost immediate source of energy.

Supplement nursing with stomach-tube feeding in any pup that is weak or debilitated.

Have fecal exams on your pups at 10-14 days of age; they may have parasites even though you wormed the bitch prior to breeding.

Consult with your veterinarian on any problems you may have with breeding stock or pups.

Heart of America S.T.C., founded in 1964 mainly through the efforts of Gordon E. Craft (of Brymstone Kennels), is now speeding ahead with plans for its third A.K.C. Specialty Show to be held (pending A.K.C. approval) March 13, 1976 with Mr. F. Lee as general chairman and President, Margaret MacDonald as Secretary.

It's been a long, steep road! In the founding year of 1964 members of HASTC finished 7 champions, representing Lynnhaven, Brymstone and Leathers kennels, but because there was not another Specialty club west of Chicago and east of California, our membership did at that time and still does radiate out approximately 200 miles from the club's home base of Kansas City, Missouri. The club's newsletter, Diehard Doin's, was first published in March of 1974 and has been published regularly since. There were 22 charter members, of whom six are still active in the club, which now has 49 members in five mid-western states. The newsletter still serves as the catalyst.

Shortly after the club's founding, 14 members traveled to St. Louis for the first Rotating Specialty of the S.T.C.A. to be held west of the Mississippi, and took 17 entries for Judge Robert C. E. Sharp.

Through the years the club has held its required A.K.C. Sanctioned Matches with several well known midwest professional handlers and breeders as judges: Dora Lee Wilson, Robert Pollock, Vic Boutwell, Roy McGinnis, Dick Vaughn, and John Sheehan. All but one of the matches were held in a delightful lake park pavilion near Kansas City and entries ranged from 19 to 28 Scottish Terriers.

In January 1967 Mrs. Lynn Beal Succeeded Gordon Craft as President, serving until January 1970 when Mrs. MacDonald was elected. The Club took a giant step forward in 1973 when it applied to the A.K.C. for a Specialty license. March 16, 1974, saw 68 entries gathered at Kansas City Municipal Auditorium for class judge Mrs. Charles Marck and sweepstakes judge Mrs. Raymond Offutt. Best of Breed went to Ch. Sandoone Rob Roy of Mil-Bran, owned by Betty Malinka and Bergit Coady, and shown by Bergit. A Specialty dinner was held at a nearby motel, complete with bagpipe entertainment.

March 15, 1975, 68 entries were presented to class judge Mrs. Heywood Hartley and Sweepstakes judge Mr. Raymond Bay. Best of Breed was awarded to Ch. Anstamm Happy Venture, owned and shown



by Mrs. Anthony Stamm. A Best Puppy in Sweepstakes was selected, honors going to Greenhagen's Royal Sir, co-owned by Robert Greenhagen and Ardelle Shannon. (Note: On September 7, 1975, Bob showed Royal Sir to his Championship in De Moines, Iowa.)

Because members of HASTC live over a wide area, finances have been a problem. A number of projects have been undertaken in which members could participate. Most notable was a COOK BOOK, which was a complete sellout and which contained recipes submitted not only by HASTC members but by nationally known Scottie breeders and judges. This is already a collector's item. Jackie Balog provided fascinating divider pages for the book. The Club's current project is Christmas Cards, featuring a Scottie pup.

No history of Heart of America Scottish Terrier Club would be complete without mention of longtime HASTC Secretary Katherine Osenbaugh, formerly of Kansas City, now of De Moines, who loaned her legal talents in keeping the fledgling Club "within the law" of the American Kennel Club. Katherine served the Club 8 years. As one member of the Club wrote in tribute when Katherine's health forced her resignation. "She has made the club and its members part of her life, giving much of her own time and personal money to make the Club a success."

Breeders are the backbone of any Specialty Club, of course, the HASTC recognizes among its members a number of well known breeders: Mrs. Lynn Beal, Mr. and Mrs. Ron Giese, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Greenhagen, Mr. F. Lee Hastings, Mr. and Mrs. C. This most interesting article appeared in the Club's Newsletter, and was written by Jim Alexander, D.V.M. on HEARTWORM DISEASE.

Heartworm disease is caused by a blood parasite, *Dirofilaria immitis*, a worm six to twelve inches in length that lives in the heart and large blood vessels of dogs. Heartworms are roundworms which are transmitted by mosquitoes. Heartworms are found in dogs throughout the world particularly in areas where mosquito and dog populations are high. The highest incidence is on the east coast, the south, the midwest, and Hawaii. Heartworms are very damaging to the heart. As the number of heartworms increase in the heart chambers, mechanical plugging of the pulmonary artery occurs. Over a period of time an inflammation of the lining of the pulmonary artery occurs. The effect is similar to arterio-

sclerosis. Kidney and lung damage may result due to blocked or reduced blood flow of those organs from massive numbers of heartworms.

The mature heartworm may live from 3 to 11 years in the dog and their offspring called, microfilariae, live up to 2 years.

The best time to treat your dog for heartworms is during the winter months. The chances of re-infection are less during the winter due to fewer mosquitoes and less stress on the lungs. With careful selection of those dogs capable of being treated, your mortality rate is less than 1%. Without selection mortality can be as high as 20%.

There are preventive measures for heartworm-- a liquid or tablet medication called CARICIDE. This product has to be given every day to your dog to prevent round worms, hookworm and heartworms. If used properly this medication has proven to be effective as a preventive measure for heartworms.

THE WHEATEN SCOTTISH TERRIER

In Scotland, its country of origin, "the rough coated working terrier" was the early name given the Scottish Terrier. He rid the farmer's acreage of pests - ground, moles, rats and mice. He also hunted the fox and rabbit successfully, with very little training. The preferred color of these rough-coated terriers were wheaten and gray brindle. Good typical specimens were scarce. Owners of these were reluctant to sell them, even to ones wishing to import them to America to try to establish the breed here.

In 1883 the Scottish Terrier was first introduced to America by John S. Naylor, of Chicago. He liked the breed's appearance and recognized its usefulness as a rabbit and small vermin hunter. His first imports, "Tam", "Tam Glen", and "Bonnie Belle" were the first to be shown in Pittsburgh, in a class listed as "rough haired terriers". They were competed in Chicago, New York and half a dozen other important shows of that era. The breed somehow failed to click and little headway was made up to 1889. Mr. Naylor's interest, as well as his hopes for their recognition, waned and he subsequently withdrew his efforts. A number of others succeeded Mr. Naylor, hopeful of their success where he had failed. None of these continued long. About this time (1889) Dr. Fayette Ewing, of Alexandria, Louisiana, began to exhibit his NOSE GAY Scotties in New York. He likewise experienced difficulty in bringing to pass recognition to his breed by the American public.

To procure good typical specimens from England and Scotland was practically impossible. The "sought for" good stock had been in the hands of the old Scottish "todhunters" fox hunters for generations. These breeders and owners had no wish to part with this good stock. To these people, expanding interest in America was secondary to retaining their good stock at home. The Scottish Terrier is a breed that has not been modernized. Its characteristics today are almost identical with those of its early ancestors, plus some refinements.

The next to enter the picture was Mr. Francis C. Lloyd, a New York industrialist, a man of wealth and with determination. He spared no effort or expense and succeeded in importing to America the very best stock obtainable, irrespective of cost. Very many generations remote in todays best Scotties are some of these very dogs that arrived in Mr. Lloyd's Kennel, located at Bernardsville, N. J. Bert Hankinson was in charge. His wide and valuable experience along with vast knowledge of the breed did the most to promote the Scottie to recognition in America. It was a long, hard struggle. Bert's son, born in America, grew up a student of the breed, as well as a good writer on the subject. In the 1930's he edited the official breed column.

The official A.K.C. breed standard designates $2\frac{1}{2}$ points to color, of the 100 aggregate. Color may be steel or iron gray, brindle or grizzled black, sandy or wheaten, in varying depths. In his book "The Scottish Terrier" the late Dr. Ewing wrote, "There is no good Scottie of a bad color".

During the Roosevelt era, Meg, and later Falla, both black Scotties, focused attention on that color and these pets also played their part in helping to promote interest in the breed among laymen. The late Morgan Dennis' illustrations for Buchanan's Black & White Liquor advertisements built up preference nationally for black Scotties. Down through the years novice breeders lessened the regard for the glamorous wheatens by indiscriminate breeding that resulted in soft-coated instead of rough-coated wheatens, and these with a glaring big light over big eyes, lacking black noses, along with good overall conformation. Never should other than a good, typical wheaten specimen in every feature, including rough coat, be exhibited. Successful breeding of these is the job of a professional breeder, not any amateur with hit-and-miss breeding techniques.

Despite the coat colors set forth in the official standard of the Scottish Terrier, prejudice still continues in the judging ring against the beautiful, glamorous wheatens. There is even a measure of confusion regarding soft-coated, Irish Wheaten Terriers, and rough-coated Scottish Terriers of wheaten coat color. An exhibitor recently reported that a judge was very critical of the soft-coated magnificent imported Irish wheaten terrier she exhibited, and said he, to her amazement, "Its coat should be harsh" on the subject of Irish soft-coated wheatens. Only products of Ireland are registerable.

Among the early private imported-owner breeders of wheaten colored Scottish Terriers is Miss Louise Murray, of Connecticut, now in her eighties. Her Boulder Brook Kennels sought in vain good wheatens to continue, as well as expand, her breeding program. Recently she gifted me with memorabilia compiled during most of her lifetime, ample proof of the wheatens in years gone by.



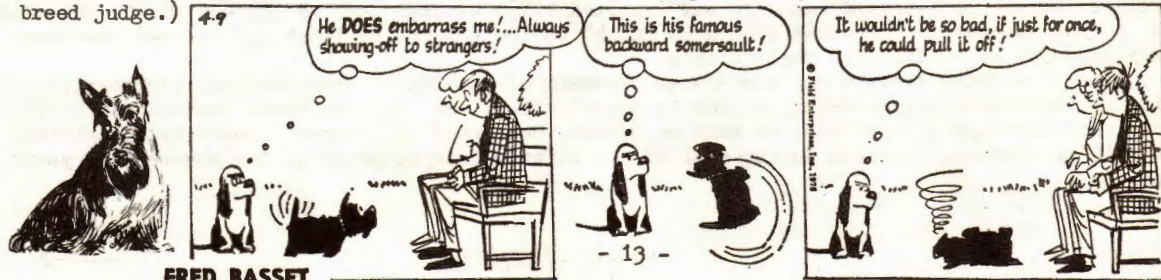
Wheaten Scotties of varying depths and color shading, go back to the very earliest times, and this is documented in the Youatt books circa. 1846; G. R. Jesse, 1866; Stonehenge 1st edition, 1859; Dalziel, 1881; Hutchinson's Encyclopedia and Count De Bylandt's "Les Races de Chiens", 1902, wherein reference to color of Scotties, "Black or fawn, mostly wheaten". Judy's Dog Encyclopedia, 1936, has an illustration of 4 wheatens. There is ample proof of wheaten-colored Scotties existing as far back as 1822 - 143 years ago. The 1895 Scottish Terrier Stud Book records 531 registrations - 57 black, the other 474 of varying colors, including wheatens, brindles and red-brindles.

A careful study of pedigrees of wheaten colored Scotties is far from revealing as to genetics of coat color inheritance. Pedigrees, however, indicate crossing with steel gray even black, perhaps to retain or improve rough coat texture among other coat characteristics. I recently learned of a litter from a wheaten sire, also dam, that produced 3 wheatens and 2 brindle-gray puppies. The ancestral background failed to indicate as far back as six generations an over-balance of wheatens. This litter disproves that wheaten-bred-to-wheaten produces exclusively like color of parents. A fact that is apparently not generally known is that not every wheaten bitch, with or without wheatens in her background, is capable of producing wheatens, anymore than every stud is of siring them. Lets take, as a hypothetical case - two litter sisters, both of which are black. Their parents are black, and we'll say one of the grand parents on the maternal side is wheaten. It is quite possible for the gene for wheaten color to be passed down from the wheaten grandparent through the dam to one of the black bitches, but not to the other. Since the gene for wheaten color is recessing, it is dominated by the gene for black, which is why both offspring are black. Thus, it is impossible to tell by looking at the two bitches (litter sisters) which one received the wheaten gene. This can be determined only by breeding them to a wheaten stud, which, of course, will have only wheaten genes to pass on, or to a stud (not necessarily a wheaten) known to be carrying a wheaten gene. Such a male could be the son of a wheaten or any stud with wheaten in his background; one that has sired wheatens. In the example chosen, the one bitch can be bred to wheaten studs infinitum and will never produce wheatens; her sister that has inherited the wheaten gene is likely to produce wheatens. Lets assume further that the latter bitch is bred to a wheaten. Each puppy in the resulting litter would have received 2 genes for every characteristic, one for each parent. To obtain the characteristic wheaten color requires the pairing of two recessive genes. The wheaten stud is termed homosyous, is: he possesses two like genes for a certain characteristic. In this case the recessive wheaten color. The bitch, on the other hand, is heterosyous, having one gene for wheaten and one for black. Since the male has only wheaten genes to give to the offspring and the bitch can give either wheaten or black, the bitch will be the one to determine the number of wheaten puppies in the litter by the number of times she passes on the gene for wheaten color. With her it will be something of a "heads or tails" deal, and theoretically, at least, she will pass on a wheaten gene 50% of the time, on the same theory that a flipped coin will turn heads up about 50% of the time.

Wheaten, more than any other color, should seldom, if ever, be inbred. Most of the faults inherent in wheatens today (at least two are disqualifying ones) result from inbreeding and/or too close line breeding practices in the past, when breeders who were fascinated by the color mainly and aiming to produce, bred their bitches to any available wheaten-producing stud, with little regard for pedigrees or good typical Scottish Terriers. Oddly, breeding wheatens is not like breeding the other colors. Wheaten puppies under six months of age seem to be highly susceptible to certain infections - a good reason for buying the somewhat developed dog. Wheatens have been known to develop near fatal reactions to vaccination. Nevertheless, there is much that is appealing and fascinating about them.

"Will some judges persist in by-passing a good Scottish Terrier of wheaten color? Is such adjudication due to prejudice along with lack of intimate knowledge of the breeds official standards - 2½ points allocated to color?"

(Note: the quote is from a letter of the late Judge Anthony Stamm, famous breeder and breed judge.)

This article on FIRE ANTS may be of interest to our Scottie people living in the States mentioned in this article. These horrible ants are getting worse in Florida.

Growing Menace: THE FIRE ANT

THEY ARE horrible creatures!" stated Al Danford, C. C. of A.'s District Director for Florida, speaking from his own painful experience. He spoke of the fire ant, a 1918 immigrant to the United States which has spread over much of the south. A Department of Agriculture press release informed the Bulletin of Florida's increasing peril, and Mr. Danford sent brochures as well as personal observations.



"A man was thrown unconscious into a fire ant mound in an automobile accident just north of Tampa," he wrote. "The ants ate out one of his eyes and damaged the other; ate the membrane out of his nose and ears. I heard about a newborn calf in a pasture that was attacked — it died of shock. There have been quite a few cases of the ants eating the hide off cows' legs about a foot above the hoofs. Dottie and I have had several bites. They sting like h . . . and leave a festering place. We've destroyed about 100 mounds but they keep popping up. The

Florida Department of Agriculture is spreading Mirex bait from planes here now. I went to the Pinellas Airport where they are working from and got about ten pounds of the bait. Since I've used that, they have vanished from our place."

The Agriculture Research Service brochures Mr. Danford enclosed described the grim invader, and explained the dangers he presents.

Imported fire ants look like ordinary ants, but there are great differences. When their mound is disturbed, these ants attack by sinking powerful jaws into the skin, then repeatedly thrust their poisonous stingers into the flesh. The stings cause long-lasting sores.

It does not take much imagination to substitute in Mr. Danford's account the words "puppy" for "newborn calf," especially when the agriculture bulletin goes on to say that fire ants may attack and kill newborn pigs, sheep and other animals; newly hatched chicks; and the young of ground-nesting birds. It is not safe for young children to play around fire ant mounds.

The bait which Mr. Danford mentioned is called one of the safest insect baits ever devised. It contains the insecticide mirex, specifically designed for use against the fire ant and reportedly has no harmful effect on humans, livestock, fish, wildlife or even bees. It is presumably obtainable through local Agricultural Extension Service offices.

The Department of Agriculture extermination effort is at the periphery of the infested area and there are local campaigns, trying to beat down the pest. The general infestation, however, includes all of Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and South Carolina as well as portions of Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and North Carolina.
