The rearing of children can have many problems especially for a couple who are deeply involved in dog breeding and showing. These problems can be minimized and many times children can be big assets. Dog breeding and showing can also aid parents with the healthy upbringing of their children. The one vital ingredient in benefiting the dog fancy and the child rearing is the total involvement of the children in your endeavors with the dogs.

Children can become involved at a very young age. Instead of leaving our children at home when they were infants, we took them along to shows and meetings. This was done, at the time, for economic reasons (We could afford either the entry or the baby sitter, but not both.), but it did accustom each child from infancy - on to dog showing. Blankets and pillows have only this year started to be eliminated from our list of necessities to be packed for dog shows. The area under our grooming table often served as a bed for one or more of the kids.

We have always had several dogs in the house and naturally each of the children selected one as their "own". When we saw this occurring, we encouraged it and made each child responsible for some part of taking care of his or her dog. Problems occurred when we considered selling one of the "pets", but in keeping her at her young "owners" insistence, we decided to breed her and were presented with some of the best pups we have ever had to date. Another problem had to be solved: Not all of the pets got along with each other. But again the solution turned out to provide some hidden benefits. Two of the pets had to stay in the kennel, but to our amazement, this was accepted without hesitation by their small masters. The kids simply visited their dogs and all of the others in their runs.

Each child was assigned a kennel task as soon as they were old enough to accept the assignment. Kennel cleaning, watering and feeding dogs, shifting dogs from inside runs to the outside, all were assumed to various degrees by the small helpers. The smallest one would complain that she had no job, but she came up with her own solution: she announced one day that her job was loving the dogs. In her new job she spent some time every day with each dog in the kennel.

Dog breeding and whelping times served as good educational tools in teaching the children about the fundamentals of life. Although the children have not actually witnessed a mating as yet, they have asked questions about what goes-on and we attempted to give them frank but sensitive answers. All of the children have witnessed pups being whelped.

To keep children interested in dog showing and to make going to dog shows more agreeable to them, we involved them as much as possible in showing dogs themselves. Their chief showing exposure has been at matches, but to them, a match win is as important as a point show win is to us. But they couldn't simply go to shows and exhibit; they had to practise at home in the yard first before each match. They also had to, at least help with brushing-out their dogs.

The age that our children start showing their own dogs is 5 years old. At this age, they can usually control a puppy and even some grown dogs, but they do need help putting their dog onto the ring table. At most shows the steward will help, but occasionally the judge does "the Honors". None has ever seemed to mind, and most people have complimented the children.

The children can learn lesson in sportsmanship from showing their dogs. Our middle daughter had a very superior attitude after winning Best Adult at a recent match. She thought she and her dog were unbeatable. When the next match came along she was over-confident, and when she went into the ring she showed poorly. Of course she went 4th in her class. She was heart-broken. "Why didn't we win?" she asked. When we got home, we had a long talk with her and we made her understand about losing and about getting herself and her dog ready for shows. The next day we found her in the yard working with her dog. She had learned a valuable lesson and made her decision to be prepared.

Soon our oldest will start Junior Handling. He is quite anxious to have the months go by when he can start. He will know from the beginning that the show ring is only one step in many in the dog showing skill.

It's a shame, so many of the great names in Scotties have died with their owners. It is also a shame so many children of kennel owners actually dislike dogs and dog showing. We hope that dogs will enrich the lives of our children and that our line will be perpetuated long after we have left the scene.

In future issues of the Bagpiper your Editor hopes to place one Regional Club in the Spotlight. This winter issue will start. . . The San Francisco Bay Scottish Terrier Club.

Originally named the Scottish Terrier Club of the Golden West, this club was formed after a group of Scottish Terrier fanciers expressed a desire to learn more about the breed through activities, and educational functions. The Nearest Scottish Terrier club, at that time, was in Southern California, over 300 miles away; few Northern California members were able to attend, or participate.

The first meeting was held at the home of John and Barbara DeSaye on February 19, 1967. Chosen to serve as acting officers were: John Baird, President, Mrs. Gilbert Robinson, Vice-President, Mrs. Charles Pengra, Secretary and Mrs. Gerald Meeder, Treasurer. Following months of work on the Constitution, the document was sent to the American Kennel Club for approval. The AKC requested the name be changed to identify with the local area along with other recommendations; after compliance, the constitution was accepted. There were 34 Charter Members. A bulletin first edited by Neatha Robinson, grew from one or two pages to what is now the BAY SCOT BULLETIN, under the capable direction of Mrs. George Spradling.

First activities were several Fun Matches. The first Sanctioned 'B' Match was held in April 1970. After four Sanctioned 'B' Matches the required 'A' Matches followed. Another popular activity has been a breakfast bazaar with Scottie items made by members for sale. A flea market booth raised \$300.00 for the Club. Grooming sessions are held at least biannually. Monthly meetings are in various restaurants in the Oakland and San Francisco areas on the last Saturday. An annual Christmas party hosted by the Robinsons is a highlight of the year.

Following the death of the first President, Mrs. Gilbert Robinson presided for three months until the annual election. Gilbert Robinson was elected President, serving two terms succeeded by Mrs. Charles Pengra, also for two years. The current President is Kenneth McArthur. Ken and his capable and talented wife, Betty, are examples of the membership in donating time and ideas toward making the club a success. Other members of the current board are: William Burge, Vice-President, Mrs. William McCool, Secretary, Gordon Ervin, Treasurer and Parliamentarian. The Board is composed of: Mrs. Bruce Wilson, Wallace Helfer, Edward George, Mrs. Charles Pengra, and Gilbert Robinson.

Each year the Golden Gate Kennel Club conducts a bench decorations contest. The SFBSTC

has won, or placed, in the last three years in the 'best decorated bench by a club' division. Often using the original green plywood boards, with shield and Scottie, plus a combination of tartans, and two bagpipe replicas, several members meet a day or two prior the show to put up the decorations. Wallace Helfer and Betty McArthur have been leaders in this annual project. In 1973, the display was graced with a full-size mannequin in full tartan kilt. Suspended above the decorated bench, flanked by two large crepe paper Scotties on leads, the Scottish gentleman was a great attraction.

Various goals were now completed with an eye toward holding a Specialty show. That day arrived September 14, 1974. The first Specialty was held in conjunction with the Associated Specialty in San Rafael, California. Mrs. John Marvin judged the classes after Mrs. W. H. Robertson (Glad-Mac) judged the Sweepstakes of 28 very nice puppies. Mrs. Marvin had an outstanding entry of 37 dogs, 38 bitches and 11 Specials. The quality was very good and an improvement over several years ago.

Dr. Kirk gave a report on possible and desirable by-law changes. It became apparent the question of regional representatives and expansion of the board were so related that the board felt one could not be discussed without the other.

\*\*\*In order to best determine the mechanics of the expansion a committee was assigned to gather and compile information, data and progress of regional clubs, and to help determine where interest and the workers are located. These reports will be due for presentation at the board meeting in April.

\*\*\*the winners of the Lloyd and Shieling trophies will insure these by purchasing riders on their household insurance. Winners will be required to give the treasurer a certificate of insurance prior to taking possession of the trophies.

1976 rotating specialty will be located in Denver in conjunction with the Denver Association of Allied Specialties. There will be six all-breed shows during the following week; all of these shows including the specialty will be in the same building.

THE FRANCIS G. LLOYD MEMORIAL TROPHY

A perpetual silver challenge cup to be awarded annually to the dog or bitch scoring the greatest number of points for Best of Breed based on the championship point rating of the breed; the names of the winners to be engraved on the trophy, which will be in the custody of the owner of the winning dog or bitch for the ensuing year.

THE CH. SHIELING SIGNATURE MEMORIAL TROPHY

A sterling silver trophy offered by Mr. and Mrs. T.H.Snethen through the STCA to be awarded annually to the kennel or exhibitor winning the most points for Best of Breed during the year based upon the championship point rating of the shows. For permanent possession to be won three times by the same exhibitor or kennel, not necessarily with the same dog or bitch.

THE CH. SANDOONE MISSY LOU MEMORIAL TROPHY

A trophy offered by Miss Betty Malinka through the STCA. To be awarded to the dog or bitch winning the most points for Best of Opposite Sex during the year, based upon the championship point rating for the breed.

THE BALACHAN BRED-BY-EXHIBITOR TROPHY

A trophy offered by Dr. and Mrs. T.Allen Kirk, Jr. through the STCA to be awarded annually to the exhibitor accumulating the most points in the Bred-by-Exhibitor classes during the year with either dog or bitch, not necessarily the same dog or bitch, provided there is competition between dogs of different owners. Points will be based on the championship point rating of the breed. If there is no competition, one point will be awarded for being present in either dog or bitch classes. Points may be awarded for entry in both dog and bitch classes.

The awards for American Bred Dog and American Bred Bitch, Puppy Dog and Puppy Bitch will be calculated on the following basis. Wins will have the same point value as the AKC championship point rating for the sex, provided there is competition between dogs of different owners. If there is no competition in the class or if competition is between dogs of the same owner, one point only will be allowed. If a puppy dog, puppy bitch, American Bred Dog, American Bred Bitch goes Winners, the championship points of the sex will be awarded regardless of competition in the class, if the dog has beaten a dog of different ownership. If the dog goes Best of Winners, he will receive the points of the Breed.

THE CH. RAAB HILL SPECIAL DELIVERY MEMORIAL TROPHY for American Bred Dog

A trophy offered by Don Massaker and Tom Natalini, Stonehedge, through the STCA. (Rules above.)

THE AM ANGER CINDERELLA MEMORIAL TROPHY for American Bred Bitch

A trophy offered by Edward B. Jarvis and Stephen Kurek, through the STCA. (Rules above.)

THE CH. LAIRD OF SCOTS GUARD MEMORIAL TROPHY for Puppy Dog

A trophy offered by Eileen Lyne Weaver through the STCA. (Rules above.)

THE DUNBAR TROPHY for Puppy Bitch

A trophy offered by Richard Hensel through the STCA. (Rules above.)

THE CH. MARLORAIN DARK SEAL MEMORIAL TROPHY (Stud Dog)

A trophy offered by Marlorain Kennels, through the STCA, to the owner(s) of the Scottish Terrier siring the most Scottish Terrier champions during the champions during the calendar year. In the event of a tie, the dog in the tie producing the greatest number of validated champions during the preceding two years shall be declared the winner.

THE CH. LADY ALBERTA MEMORIAL TROPHY (Brood Bitch)

A trophy offered by Mrs. Vana Mapplebeck, through the STCA, to the owner(s) of the Scottish Terrier Bitch producing the most Scottish Terrier champions during the calendar year. (Same rules as Marlorain trophy)

THE ANSTAMM ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

An award offered annually through the STCA by the friends of Anthony Stamm for outstanding service to the Club, for notable advancement of the breed, for outstanding achievement in the field of breeding or exhibiting, or for any other kind of meritorious accomplishment affecting or relating to the Scottish Terrier.

THE SANDISSY TROPHY

A trophy offered by Dr. and Mrs. Barry Meador through the STCA, for the American bred dog or bitch best representing the breed in all-breed competition during the award year. The dog or bitch must have competed in no less than ten shows during the year. The points to be computed as follows: 1 point for each Best of Breed; 2 points for each Group 4th; 3 points for each Group 3rd; 4 points for each Group 2nd; 5 points for each Group 1st; 8 points for each Best In Show. Independent specialty Best of Breed wins not to be counted.

THE SCOTTISH TERRIER CLUB OF AMERICA OBEDIENCE AWARDS:

An award offered by the STCA on an annual basis to the top obedience Scottish Terriers of the year. The award is to be computed by the total of the three highest scores received by the dog during the award year. Awards are to be given one to each division: Novice, Open, Utility. The owners will be responsible for notifying the statistician of these scores.

OTHER AWARDS GIVEN BY THE SCOTTISH TERRIER CLUB OF AMERICA:

A Certificate of Merit, signed by the President, will be awarded to All owners of Scottish Terriers obtaining any obedience degree.

A Certificate of Achievement to be awarded to any Junior Showman who has five 1st place wins in the Open Class (at point shows), exhibiting a Scottish Terrier.



## HOW TO CONDUCT A MEETING

The president, or presiding officer, should be in the chair at least a few minutes before time to open the meeting. When it is time to begin, she (or he) should rise and strike ONE blow with the gavel (not bang several times) and pause for quiet, then say:

Chair: (Standing) "The meeting will come to order."  
(If there are to be music, prayer, or flag salute in the opening, they usually come at this time.)

Chair: "The Secretary will read the minutes of the last regular meeting."  
(Chair sits while minutes are read.)

Secretary: (Rises, and without addressing the chair, reads the minutes.)  
(Chair sits while minutes are read.)

Chair: (Standing) "Are there any corrections to the minutes?" (Pause).  
"There being none, the minutes stand approved as read." (If there are corrections, she (or he) directs the secretary to make the corrections, and says, "Are there any further corrections? If not, the minutes stand approved as corrected.")

Chair: (Standing) "The next business in order is the reading and referring of the treasurer's report." (Sits.)

Treasurer: (Rises, and without addressing the chair, reads the report.)

Chair: "Are there any questions concerning the treasurer's report? If not, it will be filed for auditing." (The treasurer's report is never adopted.)

Chair: The corresponding secretary will read the correspondence." (If there is any. If none, skip corresponding secretary.)

Chair: The Next business is hearing reports:  
Are there any reports from officers?  
Are there any reports from the Standing Committees?  
Reports from Special Committees."

(Usually, the President will know what reports are to be given, and call on just the committees that are to report. This saves time. Never say, "Will Mrs. \_\_\_\_\_ give HER report! Say, "Mrs. \_\_\_\_\_ will give the report of the \_\_\_\_\_ Committee." (The chair may thank the chairman for the report of the committee.") (NOT thank her for HER report.)

(In giving the committee report, the Chairman rises and says, "Madam (or Mr.) President, the report of the \_\_\_\_\_ Committee is as follows:  
"Reads the report and sits down.)

HOW TO CONDUCT A MEETING (con't)

Chair: "Is there any unfinished business? (If any, it is taken up at this time.)"

Chair: "Next is New Business." (Here is where the main motions and new business is transacted.) Members should RISE. ADDRESS THE CHAIR. AND AWAIT RECOGNITION, before speaking or making a motion.

(If there are communications or information received by the organization that requires motions to be made, they may be read by the president, or by the Sec'y)

Chair: What would the Club like to do about this matter?"

Member: (Rising) "Madam (or Mr.) President, (await recognition.) I move that we give \$10.00 to the Red Cross." (Or whatever the question called for.)  
(Another member seconds the motion.)

Chair: (Standing) "It has been moved and seconded that the Club give \$10.00 to the Red Cross." "Are you ready for the question?" (Which means, is there any discussion?) Debate is now in order. (The members should express their opinions now, but each must rise and get recognition from the chair.)

Chair: "Is there any further discussion? (The president should not say anything one way or another concerning the question.)"

Chair: (Standing, takes the vote by saying:) "All those in favor of giving \$10.00 to the Red Cross will please say 'aye' those opposed say 'no'. The 'Ayes' have it and the motion is carried. We will give \$10.00 to the Red Cross." (The chair should always announce the result of the vote.)

Chair: "Is there any further business?"

Chair: (The program may be given at this time.) "The program will be presented at this time by the program Chairman, Mrs.(or Mr.) \_\_\_\_\_" (Never say, "I will turn the meeting over to the program chairman." Or to any person.)

(After program is presented.)

Chair: "Is there any further business at this time?" (Announcements might be made at this time.)

Member: (Rising.) "Madam (or Mr.) President," (Awaits recognition,) "I move that we adjourn."

(Another member seconds it.)

Chair: "It has been moved and seconded that we adjourn. All those in favor say 'aye'. Those opposed, say 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the meeting stands adjourned." (Gavel.)

In Novice, about the only difference between the AKC (pre Jan. 1, 1975) and CKC regulations is that the 'Stand for exam.' is on-lead. I'll gladly answer any questions that you have about showing in Canada.

## "GROOMING THE SCOTTIE EXHIBITOR"

SCOTTIE SCOOP - S.T.C. of Greater N. Y.

It seems to me we spend a great deal of time and money on our dogs preparing them for the show ring, and with our efforts to present our dogs in the best condition we fail to take a good look at ourselves in that grooming mirror.

Besides observing the dogs from ringside, I often look up at the other end of the lead as I'm sure most of us do. It is hard to believe that the dog is groomed to perfection and the handler looks as though he or she had slept in their clothing. Their hair looks like a busted mattress. This always amazes me, since we as terrier handlers spend so much time getting the hair on our prospects set to perfection. With this in mind I'd like to lay out a few guide lines that might help the new exhibitor.

**MEN** - Wear comfortable slacks "not stove pipe tight" or over exaggerated bells that flop in your dogs face as he is strutting his stuff. A shirt, tie and jacket always completes the picture. Always wear a jacket unless the judge is in the ring without his jacket. You will notice the professionals always wear jackets. If your dogs are a light color (silver, wheaten or light brindle) then dark slacks will show him up better. If the dog is black, light slacks will serve as a better background for him. Long hair is fine, but if it is uncontrollable or fly away, then consider having it shaped to appear long but it is really short. A good hint: Hair spray and cologne draws flies and bees, so use anunscented spray and forget cologne.

**WOMEN** - If you wear skirts, make sure they are not tight or too short. The back of the ladies knees are not particularly attractive. As a matter of fact, skirts and dresses should be a shade longer than street clothing. Here again is where color plays an important role in assisting your entry. If you wear slacks, be careful not to choose large floral prints or plaids. If your hips and thighs are large, forget slacks. Wear "A" shaped, or full skirts to minimize your shape. Wear comfortable shoes. High heels and platform shoes are a great fashion, but not practical for showing dogs. Don't wear lots of chains and dangling bracelets. How can you show a dog that is set up with your necklace dangling over his ears, or your bangles clattering over his head?

Now we come to hair again. If your hair is long, don't just pile it on your head. Put it in a bun or a pony tail, or better yet why not a twist neatly pinned so it will be cool in summer and neat in the winter. After all don't you deserve well groomed hair the same as your show entry?

In conclusion, let us put our dogs and ourselves in the right perspective. If we spend money on our dogs, why not a little on ourselves, so both entry and exhibitor are conditioned properly. These few extra thoughts will give dogs and exhibitor the complete total picture and may help you with that extra little something towards winning those precious points toward championship.
