Everything was carried out to perfection, from the accommodation and hospitality thru the show and concluding with a very enjoyable dinner.

All committees surpassed themselves and the Officers, Directors and members of the STCA thank all concerned for a most delightful weekend and a great, flawless show.

Your BAGPIPER Editor was asked to postpone the publishing of this issue so that the entire membership could be notified of an unexpected change in the Montgomery County Sweepstakes judge.

On June 8th, The American Kennel Club notified the STCA that due to an "erroneous oversight" on part of the AKC, Miss Barbara Kingsbury would not be permitted to judge the Montgomery County Sweepstakes due to a ruling concerning licensed handlers as judges.

The Officers and Directors regret this "oversight" and apologize to Barbara for the inconvenience caused her.

The 1977 Sweepstakes judge will appear in the Montgomery County premium, as we cannot publish the name without final official approval of the AKC.


You will notice several other changes in the Sweepstakes format and rules.

1. The entry fee has been lowered to \$5.00.
2. The prize money has been increased.
3. A "Best in Sweepstakes" will be awarded.
4. Professional Handlers will be barred from exhibiting dogs other than those owned by them or a member of their family.

The American Kennel Club has not given final approval to the amendment to Article IV, Section 4, Paragraph a thru d. Therefore we will follow the existing Article IV as it appears in the By-Laws.

If there are any additional nominations, the membership will be called to order in the afternoon of October 8th, allowing adequate time for a tallying committee to be selected and the counting of votes to take place. If an early convening is necessary, members will be notified of the time. In order to call the meeting to order, 35 members must be present, your cooperation will be appreciated.

MINUTES OF THE SCOTTISH TERRIER CLUB OF AMERICA - REGIONAL CLUBS

Committee meeting, April 22, 1977 - San Rafael, California.

The meeting was called to order at 10:15 A.M. by Co-chairman Miriam Stamm in the absence of Chairman Marilyn Meador.

Regional Club Representatives present:

Martha Merrill: S.T.C.C.; Marjorie Cohen: G.M.S.T.C.; Jackie Seelbach: G.N.Y.S.T.C.; Cynthia Walgren: S.T.C.G.M.; Cass Ridgley: S.T.C.G.D.; Jeannie Passmore: W.S.S.T.C. Peggy Burge/ Ann Wooldrige: S.F.B.S.T.C.; Hy Weiner: S.T.C.N.E. National Committee: Dick Seelbach, John Sheehan, Miriam Stamm, and Barbara Dunham.

A progress report from Marilyn Meador was read by Miriam Stamm. Graphs based on the 1975 questionnaires sent to each regional club were given out to each Representative present... these will be sent to those clubs which were not represented at this meeting, along with these minutes.

Discussion was held re: objective and purposes of the Parent Club and the Regional Clubs. These are found to be basically the same. (note Constitution of Parent Club and Regional Clubs) The Parent Club operating at the National level; the Regional Clubs - at the local level.

Examples: to assist people in raising better Scottish Terriers; hold Specialty Shows; disseminate information on all phases of the breed; educate the non-exhibiting member, particularly the pet owner, so that they can become useful working members of both the Parent Club and a Regional Club, and the breeders and exhibitors of tomorrow. Each Regional Club must have a focal point to disseminate this information. There must be input by the knowledgeable members.

Responsibilities of Parent Club in relation to Regional Clubs:

Education through Mini Workshops, Seminars. Help with fund-raising ideas. Possibility of STCA putting together an educational package to be distributed through the Regional Clubs, particularly to the Pet owners. At this time, the STCA does have "FACTS About the Scottish Terrier" pamphlets available to the Regional Clubs at 10¢ each; donates Bred by Exhibitor Medals for 1st in both dog and bitch classes at Regional Specialties.

One new idea which all present felt was most important was the establishment of a Health Committee and Central Repository by the STCA, where owners and breeders can go for help with problems that may or have come up in the breed, with which they are not familiar . . . nor are their local veterinarians. We need open communication between breeders. This is to be referred to the STCA Board.

It was felt that a new, and somewhat different type of, questionnaire needs to be sent out to the Regional Clubs. So that we, the Committee, can be sure that each club receives it, all questionnaire, minutes and letters will be sent to the Regional Club Representatives and the President of each Regional Club.

Responsibilities of Regional Clubs to the Parent Club:

Financial responsibility: to bring Regional Club members into the STCA membership; Inform the Regional Club members about the STCA, breed books, Specialty Shows. It would help if the Secretary of each Regional Club had applications for membership from the STCA on hand. These are obtained from the STCA Corresponding Secretary.

Respond to questionnaires from the STCA within a reasonable length of time. Submit a yearly status report to the STCA.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTIVES AND PURPOSES OF THE REGIONAL CLUBS COMMITTEE

as submitted by Martha Merrill, Jackie Seelbach and Barbara Dunham.

TO Offer guidelines:

How to form a Regional Club . . . How to put on Matches. . . How to conduct an Educational Forum. . . How to put on a Parent Club Specialty.

If requested:

To disseminate advice and information to the Regional Clubs.

Each Regional Club, by election, selection or appointment by its Board, chooses a Regional Club Representative. This Representative, in turn, is responsible to the National Regional Club Committee. The National Committee is responsible to the Officers and the Board of Governors of the S.T.C.A.

The Regional Clubs committee was established to give help in any area possible, both to the Regional Clubs and the Parent Club. To open lines of communication between the Regional Clubs and the Parent Club. This is an absolute necessity in order for the organizations to grow and

TO: S.T.C.A. REGIONAL CLUB REPRESENTATIVES (RCR's)

SUBJECT: Regional Club Committee Meeting, April 22, 1977, San Rafael, California.

RCR's or designated alternates met with members of the STCA Board prior to the Board meeting. It was the first of such meetings and minutes of that meeting are enclosed. Copies are being sent to all attendees, regional club presidents, RCR's, Bagpiper editor, and Gazette columnist.


The meeting was a productive one and resulted in a lively and enthusiastic exchange of ideas. Many problems were aired and discussed and many suggestions introduced. It was the consensus belief that one of the most important results of this meeting was the proposal to create a permanent Health Committee (perhaps "Health & Welfare" would be more appropriate), which would collect and receive materials and information on health, medical, hereditary, and other problems. The committee could act as a repository for such data and could also make the information available to club members and other interested persons and could even work with veterinarians and veterinary colleges. This will be a major agenda item at the October STCA Board meeting at Montgomery County, along with other proposals that were heard.

At the conclusion of the Board meeting, a sub-committee, composed of Martha Merrill, Jackie Seelbach, and Barbara Dunham, met for several hours and submitted the statement that appears in toto at the conclusion of the enclosed minutes under the heading: "Statement of Objectives and Purposes of the Regional Club Committee."

Please look that statement over carefully, bearing in mind that it is a tentative first draft. If you have suggestions for additions, amplifications, or anything else, please send your ideas both to Marilyn Meador, chairman of the Regional Club Committee, and to me, Miriam Stamm, co-chairman. Your input is valuable and welcome. It is also essential to the successful functioning of this committee.

If your regional club has a publication, I would like to suggest that either the minutes of this cover sheet be published in the next issue so that your members can know what the STCA is trying to do for regional clubs and how the members can help. One important way, of course, is for them to contribute ideas and make their needs known to the STCA through you, their representative.

The STCA Board holds quarterly meetings at different locations in the country. We hope to be able to set up Regional Club Committee meeting, such as the one held in San Rafael, coincident with each Board meeting. When we do, you will be notified of the time and place. Although we cannot expect all RCR's to attend all such meetings, we hope that when they are within reasonable reach of your area, many of you (or your alternates) can and will.

March saw a red-letter day in the British calendar with the publication of a new dog magazine called "TERRIER TALK". There was considerable pre-publication publicity and I must admit that I took the view, like many others, to "wait and see" what the first issue was like. This was not in anyway to decry the idea, far from it as Terriers generally urgently need this type of magazine devoted solely to the group's interests, but knowing how costs have escalated in the past year on printing and paper over here one just wondered if it would be possible to produce a nicely printed professional job at an economic price.

The answer I am pleased to say on seeing the first issue, can only be called "super" First class printing, good glossy paper with plenty of good photographs of various breeds of Terriers, interesting articles and news - all in all adding up to something one can only congratulate it's Editor, Ed Reid a Canadian, ...for a first rate job.

It is quite fearless as to controversial articles as you can realise when the Editor states the second issue is going to contain, "Which end of the lead is judged" with the remark that "If top Show judges were to judge top dogs in classes where owners/handlers had to handle exhibits other than their own would it not be interesting to see which dog would win?" You are a brave man Ed! I understand the question of "How Judges are elected" is another subject in future issue.

If you read in your National papers of a Canadian being hung, drawn and quartered in England, you'll realise it is the Editor of Terrier Talk. Joking apart, I'd really recommend this Magazine which is published quarterly at £ 2.40 for the 4 issues annually plus postage. Contact Ed. Reid, Canines Inter-continental, 26 Pinford Road, London S.W.16. and if you've any photographs or articles you'd like published I'm sure he'll be happy to oblige, if they are suitable for reproduction!

Incidentally the first issue contains a Complete report on The Scottish Terrier judging at Crufts and a short biography of the Judge - Mrs. Muriel Owen, together with the photograph which I hope Your Editor will be able to find space to publish the Dagenham Girl Pipers with a Scottie in their arms - so our breed was very favourably dealt with and we must try to keep this up.

The Annual General Meeting of the Scottish Terrier Breeders & Exhibitors Association was held after the judging of their Championship Show on March 26, 1977 at which two new Officials were elected as follows:

Secretary . . Miss M. A. Shorto, 196 Marlborough Rd. Manneys, Ramford, Essex.

Treasurer . . Mrs. M. Daltrey.

The President . . Mrs. M. Owen and Chairman Miss B. Sedorski were re-elected.

It was reported at this meeting that the Scottish Terrier Emergency Care Scheme (S.T.E.C.S.) which was started over here about ten months ago, had already done good work in finding 8 Scotties new happy settled homes - in most cases the owners were going to have their pets put down. This scheme is very lucky to have two wonderful officials, (both volunteers!) - Mrs Nellie Holland (Noonsun) as Honorable Secretary and Miss Enid McDevutt (Dumac) as Honorable Treasurer both are tremendously keen, hard working and efficient.

Actually it was Mrs. McDevitt who first raised this idea of rescuing Scotties in emergencies (with strict emphasis on the last word) in 1970 - 1971 but it was not given any support; then in 1974 Mrs. Holland suggested at the A.G.M. of the S.T.B.E.A. that this Club should consider setting up a Reserve Scheme. As this was raised under "any other business" the suggestion was passed to the Committee who after several lengthy discussions finally felt that the Scheme should be a joint effort of all the Scottie Clubs here but that they would do all they could to help - which they did by donating £25 very generously allowing the Reserve Scheme to take over the Club's normal "Bring and Buy" stall at their Championship Show, this raised nearly another £50 and the idea was off the ground. Other Clubs have given their support and a Board of Trustees was set up comprising a Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer with 8 member Trustees (this allows for one Trustee from each of the British Clubs plus one Trustee representing other Reserve Societies in Britain).

I am glad to say that this Scheme is receiving tremendous support from Scottie lovers over here and eventually the Secretary & Treasurer hope to see every area in England and Wales covered by a representative so that no Scottie in distress of any kind is missed. They already have a waiting list of homes which is the main thing and a number of kind helpers who will give temporary accommodation to homeless Scotties - for which they receive only £2 per week towards feeding, so that no one is going to make any money out of the Scheme, they all have the interest of our breed at heart. This question of payment was the main stumbling block to getting the Scheme started and I think they have solved this problem very diplomatically. I'm sure you all join with me in wishing this Scheme every success.

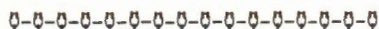

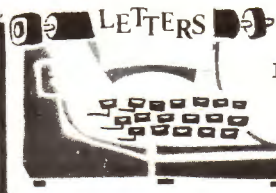
My description of the Scottish Terrier temperament with paragraphs identifying qualities of disposition and character. All dogs have certain qualities, as well as their own breed characteristics. They also each have their own individual personality.

The character of the Scottish Terrier includes the identifying qualities typical of the breed. These include his independence combined with his wish to always be near you although he is not happy as a lap dog. He is by his breed character a stoic, a dour, canny individual honorable and incapable of a mean or petty act. He is never two-faced or hypocritical and when he objects he objects out loud.

The disposition of a Scottish Terrier is the result of the fixed qualities of his inherited individual nature, inclinations, and habit and can be influenced by environment. These qualities often include aloofness, disrespect for obedience and rules, and determination to do as he pleases. He expects you to trust his ability to take care of himself. Scottie lovers more or less enjoy these qualities and if they don't care for them can encourage deviation one way or the other with varying success. I don't believe that dogs become the mirror of their master because that mirror would reflect me as everything from a psychotic hermit to a militant slashing rioter -- all from different Scottish Terriers that I have owned and loved.

When one is a serious breeder of many many generations he tries to improve the breed and eliminate faults. If he has shy or just bashful dogs he had better try breeding for intelligence and colorful personality and not depend completely on environment to accomplish the improvement. From many years of line breeding generations from two foundation bitches of opposite temperaments - although both were granddaughters of the same dog with different mothers -- I can assure anyone that it is most improbable to get uniform, ideal temperament, disposition or character even with identical environment.

Now to temperament -- I believe this to be typical of the individual dog and is his own personal constitutional mixture of traits and this undoubtedly comes from his breeding. To be a show temperament we would wish first for outstanding intelligence -- not just acceptable animal smartness but a real colorful personality which shines forth from his eyes and makes him vital and animated. He should be regal and sensitive with an alertness and curiosity identifiable at all times. All breeders know that in breeding for temperament in dogs -- especially in show dogs -- one really "walks a tight-rope". There is trouble in getting very far off balance either way. In breeding for "colorful personality" you can get them too sharp very easily.

WATCH PUPPY'S MOUTH DURING DENTITION - - -

By - Bob Bartos

A bad mouth can be forstalled and a good mouth retained by the following method. As dentition time approaches between 3rd & 5th month, the upper incisors should be loosened and extracted before they are ready to come out by themselves. At the same time leave the lower incisors in place as long as possible. This results in the upper permanent teeth coming through quickly while retarding the lower. The upper actually deflects the lowers. The working principle of this method is that permanent teeth, if hindered in their progress by a retained tooth, always deflect to the inner rather than the outer side of the mouth. All incisor teeth have a tendency to move forward in the jaw.

To retain the lower incisors they must be effectively trapped or held in position by the upper permanent incisors until complete dentition is accomplished and the teeth are firmly anchored.

If the lower canine teeth are retained too long, they will force the adult canine tooth to hit the upper jaw and prevent the mouth from closing. Otherwise the lower incisors can move forward and not be trapped by the upper incisors, and the undershot bite will develop. Remove the lower deciduous canine teeth as soon as possible. Many times seemingly hopeless cases of undershot mouths can be corrected during this period. There are puppies who have a perfect bite while carrying their deciduous teeth but end up undershot. This is usually due to carelessness on the breeder's part. If a dog's mouth goes bad, much money, time and effort in raising him for show and breeding are lost. This is true no matter how excellent he may be, both as to disposition and conformation. BY ALL MEANS WATCH PUPPY'S MOUTH CLOSELY AT TEETHING TIME.

The GASTC has passed another milestone, the 2nd AKC Sanctioned "A" Match was held on April 17, 1977. Now plans are underway for their first Specialty Show.

"THE PEDIGREE - WHAT DOES IT TELL YOU?"

First, you must know how to read a pedigree and assess its value. What does it tell you? It tells you a bunch of names - novices often say "he has a pedigree as long as your arm". Neither the length of the pedigree nor the number of Champions means a thing unless you know something of the dogs in it. This can come from seeing them, reading about them, hearing about them or best of all from associating with them for generations as a breeder.

A breeder does often exhibit his dogs most especially to see how they compare with others in the ring. However, the main reward for a breeder is in watching succeeding generations reveal hoped-for improvements and recognizing reoccurrence of a fault.

Perhaps here is the best place for the most important advice one can give. Join your breed club and really study and get inspired by the first part of its constitution. This always says that the club is formed to improve the breed in all ways and the members are pledged to this end. Usually the club founders have formed a "Code of Ethics" to which members are expected to adhere. Just as important is the study of the standard of your breed and learn to recognize virtues and faults when you see them. Rose colored glasses will never help. So many of us can see faults in the dogs of others but not in our own.

There is no perfect dog but because a judge will forgive one small imperfection in each of several dogs is no reason that he should forgive all of these imperfections in one dog.

Percy Roberts once said, "There is no standard for mediocrity" so try to get out of that class.

The true breeder realizes before anything else that he must breed for intelligence and health. His goal is to breed a perfect dog and to this end all of his efforts are directed.

All the advice I have ever read and what I have learned from experience is that a breeder must start with the best bitch that he can find - by best we mean best in intelligence and health; especially if one plans to line breed health and character are essential. Many things you can see can be corrected but what is inside a dog that hinders successful line breeding is what will stop the line. I was breeding very close at the beginning and asked an experienced breeder how long I could keep it up. He said, "until you start losing size, fertility and acquire shyness." So far none of these has shown up consistently and certainly not size. Of course one should never start a line with a male, a prepotent bitch is the best way to start a family line.

When you have decided on the bitch one should choose the best stud for her preferably one in her own line if she is line bred. If not, then be sure to breed her to a strong line-bred stud with a record of good pups strong in points needed by the bitch - by this time you should be able to admit that you could use improvement. In-breeding or line-breeding is the only route to consider if one is interested in raising the average quality of one's own breeding.

When the average of all the dogs bred is high in uniform quality, then one can begin to expect many winners and once in a life time - if you are lucky you may get a great one.

The qualities do not originate with the breeding animals but in their ancestors. This explains the importance of a good pedigree with the same quality genes in the background.

Now we come to selection and why one must know the standard and be able to keep the pups until they get their teeth and approximate size can be foretold before deciding quality.

To prove this I will have to tell you part of my story - and why it took me 15 years to get a blue ribbon. I had been in the habit of breeding a Scottie bitch to imported Best in Show winners and getting no improvement. Then I would take her daughter and breed her to another BIS winner! No improvement. Of course I was doubling upon NOTHING. I was real discouraged, I bought a nice healthy bitch and found a breeder who with his father had been line-breeding for many generations, but had discontinued showing. I bred to a dog that he suggested and got my first champion, a bitch which I showed myself. I bred this bitch to a stud also in the sire's line and suggested by the breeder and had five pups. I couldn't decide on my usual pattern of keeping the best bitch so asked for help from three top judges. After long consultation, they said, "If you can afford it, get rid of everything else and keep all of them."

At their first show in the February Specialty they were W.D. - W.B. - and American bred bitch and for 13 consecutive years the progeny from this litter were winners, B.W. or BOB at Westminster. The champion bitch held the world's record for champions from one Scottish Terrier for many years. She had champions in every litter and was bred to four different dogs - not line-bred in line. She had many quality champion studs but with the type and improvement wanted from the sire.

I tell you this to prove it can be done by a novice and try to inspire you to keep trying.

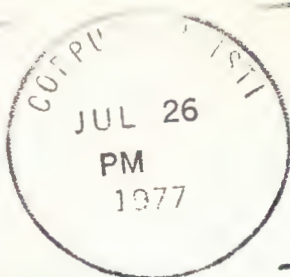
