1978 ANNUAL REPORT

The Scottish Terrier Club of America has concluded a year in which we have seen many STCA records broken. There has been several innovating ideas initiated to keep abreast of the Club's expansion and changing times, while retaining our long standing prestige.

The STCA has increased its membership to approximately 765 members* or 558 units representing 47 states, Canada, Britain, Australia, Switzerland, Mexico and Venezuela.

The Scottish Terrier Show statistics will confirm the fact that Scotties are ranking high in all show placement categories. 105 Scotties achieved the title of "Champion" from June 1976 thru June 1977. 115 received their title from June 1977 thru June 1978, an increase of 10. Scotties were awarded 8 BEST IN SHOW during the period from June 1976 thru June 1977. 20 BEST IN SHOW were awarded during the same period in 1978. Litter registrations have increased after a slight decrease last year. Individual registrations have declined by 28 over Sept. 1977.

Attendance and entries at the National Specialty, Montgomery County, and the Rotating Specialties have reached record highs. Members are taking an active interest in their Club and Breed. There are more participating Regional Clubs than at any time in our history. Members now have a direct line of communication to the Board through their Regional Representatives.

Your Officers and Directors have met on three occasions during the past year. Many long hours were devoted to the task of governing the STCA. A great deal of business was conducted through the mail and by phone when necessary. Although costs are constantly rising, (postage, services, printing and supplies) your Board has made every effort to hold the line on expenses pertaining to running the S.T.C.A.

To join the Scottish Terrier Club of America is to accept the challenge of upholding the prestigious history of the Club. To hold the sincere interest of our Breed and Club foremost in view and to display good sportsmanship behavior. We accepted the challenge to breed for the betterment of the Scottish Terrier, to protect and preserve his qualities. We are challenged to constantly seek and share knowledge on health, grooming and conditioning our dogs, while taking an active interest in the Scottish Terrier Club of America.

We are striving to breed healthy, robust, well adjusted Scotties - quality not quantity. Each year the STCA is faced with new challenges. We have always risen to these challenges, faced them and through the efforts of working together we have conquered them. This unity will continue, we will continue to grow and become stronger through our efforts and unity.

CANINE von WILLEBRAND'S DISEASE

von Willenbrand's Disease (VWD) is an inherited bleeding disorder that occurs in man, Poland-China swine, and dogs. It has been recognized, to date, in five breeds of dogs: German Shepherds, Golden Retrievers, Doberman Pinschers, Miniature Schnauzers and Scottish Terriers. The condition occurs in both sexes and is inherited as an autosomal incompletely dominant trait. The disease has variable clinical expression within the same family and can vary from mild to severe. It is somewhat similar to hemophilia and can thus be misdiagnosed by inexperienced clinicians. The differential diagnosis between hemophilia and VWD requires specialized clotting tests and a thorough family(Pedigree)study.

Affected individuals have long bleeding times, low factor VIII activity, reduced platelet retention in a glass bead column, reduced Ristocetininduced platelet aggregation, and usually demonstrate low levels of factor VIII-related antigen. Following transfusion of normal or hemophilic plasma, VWD patients show an overresponse in their plasma factor VIII level that is characteristic of this disease.

VWD tends to be less clinically severe than hemophilia unless affected dogs are subjected to surgical procedures, which may be life-threatening. For example, affected breeds that require tail docking and ear cropping will often manifest the bleeding tendency during or immediately after these procedures. In fact, this type of surgically-induced hemorrhage may be the first indication of the problem within a kennel. However, most affected dogs survive to maturity and to reproduce. The disease is therefore one of low mortality but high morbidity (a chronic, debilitating illness).

Because VWD is less severe and occurs in both sexes, the incidence increases rapidly within affected inbred lines. Therefore, it is very important to test dogs that are closely related to a line affected with VWD, in order to prevent the possible widespread dissemination of the disease.

SAMPLE PREPARATION FOR COAGULATION ASSAYS

1. Any breeder interested in this problem should provide us with three to five generation pedigrees on all dogs they wish to test. We need these for our records to determine whether any of the dogs are immrrfisyrly or distantly related to the family or families known to be affected with an inherited breeding disorder.
2. Results are confidential and sent directly to the owner or co-owner of the dog or to his/her veterinarian.
3. Draw and prepare the blood as follows:
Use one part of 3.8% trisodium citrate ot 9 parts whole blood (1:10 dilution). Take the blood sample in a plastic syringe into which you have placed 0.4 ml of the anticoagulant. Draw the blood by clean venipuncture through the anitcoagulant up to a final volume of 4 ml. Mix well and transfer to a plastic test tube for immediate centrifugation. Centrifuge at 2500-3500 rpm for 15 minutes. Aspirate off the supernatant citrated plasma with a plastic or siliconized pipette, or a small plastic syringe such as a tuberculin syringe. Place the plasma into a small plastic tube and freeze at -20° C or lower, if possible. Ship the samples to us in dry ice within 1-2 weeks after drawing. The samples must not thaw before they reach us. Ship samples by air freight (American or Allegheny fly into Albany) and use plenty of dry ice (10-20 lbs) in case they get lost. Ship in an insulated (styrofoam-type) container. Some airlines have special regulations and stickers for dry ice shipments, please check with your air carrier prior to shipping. For shipments from places close to Albany, UPS or First Class Mail can also be used to ship the dry ice parcel.

BEWARE THE EXPERT NOVICE

EVERYONE who has been breeding Scotties for a considerable length of time had experience with the eager novice. He comes to you with questions in his eyes, on his lips and in every action but he displays an apparently sincere desire to know everything possible about a breed which has caught his fancy. If he lives at some distance from you, the letters back and forth would fill several books. "I don't know a thing about them but I just LOVE Scotties" he declares and since there are few remarks more pleasing to the dedicated Scottie breeder, you melt right there and resolve to help him in every way possible. You start him off with the standard of the breed and if he lives in your local area you use a good dog as a model, pointing out that no matter how good or how successful the dog may be there is always some flaw, no dog quite approximates the standard set forth as the ideal. You have a litter of pups and he wants to buy one so you select one of the best to start him off as successfully as possible. If he lives out of town the pup is shipped and you spend the next six months or year tapping out advice on your little typewriter, trying to put into the most understandable terms the requisites for proper management of a good Scottie pup. In or out of town you give your novice help on grooming, feeding, lead training, house-breaking and a host of related subjects; knowledge which you have gathered through long and sometimes years of experience.

For our example, let's stay with the local novice although the pattern is much the same for the out of town. You start your tyro out with his pup at a puppy match. The pup wins! ... and the beginner is thrilled beyond belief with his

first taste of success, as he has every right to be. Mixed with delight over the pup's achievement is admiration for you. You are so clever, you trim a Scottie so well, you show one so well; you are really the one. Being human, it's easy to fall into this trap of oozy admiration but if you are really experienced you've seen all of this before and will take it a large mental barrel of salt.

Time goes on and you continue to trim, to show and to aid the novice as required. You know that there are many proper ways to trim a dog and to handle it, both in and out of the ring. You use the methods that have been successful for you and hope the same success will come to the beginner you are helping. The puppy develops into a nice dog, is entered in regular classes and begins to gather points. The novice is enthralled with dog shows, dog people and especially grateful to you. Although he continues to insist that he really knows nothing, little phrases indicating that he has gotten the hang of the game creep into his conversation and you smile a secret smile deep inside. Eventually his dog finished and it is a gala day. But the story doesn't end there. As if by magic, once his dog becomes a champion, the erstwhile novice becomes a full-fledged expert. He knows exactly how the dog should be trimmed, at which shows it should be entered, how it should be used to produce more champions, and a bewildering array of other facts and fancies which make it very plain that you are now quite useless to him. In the student's opinions he has now progressed much farther than the master. Most breeders of long standing have found themselves in this position and some for this reason, refuse to help the newcomers. Luckily, for the good of the breed, most continue to assist when they can. The novice who becomes an expert overnight is not so much ungrateful as growing. Whether that growth is productive and healthy depends entirely on what sort of person is involved. Some are destined never to be more than perennial amateurs who prattle at great length about Scotties but never in this world will be able to recognize a good one, particularly if owned by someone else. Others soon learn that expertism comes hard and not with the first and only champion finished. Knowledge must have a solid basis (con't pg 6)

ARE YOU KILLING YOUR PUPPIES (con't)

I told her to ask her veterinarian for the bacteria. When I explained this would be live bacteria, she was horrified at the thought and refused to even consider it until she was down to five puppies, three of which were so weak they could not move or nurse. At this state, I asked her if she didn't think the puppies were going to die and she agreed they were. I then asked her if she wouldn't give the Lactobacillus acidophilus a chance. Deciding she had nothing to lose, she agreed to try it but it was Sunday and her veterinarian could not be located. She went to her pharmacist and he sold her some Lactinex, which is for humans, and she administered small doses to the dying puppies with fear and trepidations - ALL five puppies are living and as healthy as they can be.

While, in both cases, the bitches did have an infection that required an antibiotic, the miraculous results following the administering of the Lactobacillus acidophilus would indicate this bacteria should be given all puppies in cases where antibiotics are required. I also believe breeders should discontinue the practice of preventative antibiotic therapy on their bitches because without realizing it they no doubt are actually killing their puppies.

And, there is some evidence perhaps we should do as the first breeder wrote she did and administer Lactobacillus acidophilus to our puppies for the first two days even though there is no problem. I say this because I've learned pig farmers are being advised to give newborn pigs this bacteria therapy because it has been found to create a natural biological barrier against the E. Coli bacteria causing enteritis. Since pork is a valuable food for humans, more research is naturally carried out on them than on dogs in an effort to help the farmers raise more healthy pigs. A report by Dr. Robert Doster of Buckeye, Arizona, gave case histories on the use of Lactobacillus acidophilus on young pigs from time they are born and where before the mortality rate was 50% among newborn pigs, this loss was reduced drastically. For instance, administering Lactonoc to 200 young pigs resulted in all being raised and he reported they actually appeared to be out-performing others who were not given this bacteria.

If pigs are being saved by this method, then why not take advantage of the knowledge gained by the researchers and save our puppies, too? Perhaps you might like to discuss this with your veterinarian the next time you expect a litter.

The above article appeared in DOG LOVERS DIGEST under the title "Are You Killing Your Puppies" and in COLLIE CUES under the title "Stop Killing Your Puppies."

After it appeared in print I received many letters and long distance calls from around the country from people who were having problems and needed advice. To the best of my ability I told them just what to do, explaining each time that I had never had an occasion to use this bacteria. In every instance, there were follow-up letters thanking me for helping them save their puppies.

At the time that I was notified that the Dog Writers' Association of America, Inc. had chosen my article to receive the award, I was expecting a litter of puppies. Not anticipating any problems, and although the puppies would be only 10 days old on the date of awards banquet in New York City. My husband, Tom, convinced me that I should make plans to attend to accept the award in person. On schedule, my bitch whelped seven beautiful puppies and had the easiest birthing I had ever witnessed.

At times she did not even know a puppy had been born until I showed it to her. This, I later found out was bad because she felt no urge to strain and thus expel the final afterbirth. Three days later she developed a uterine infection that required her to be given a five-day series of antibiotics (Perhaps I should have knocked on wood harder since this was my very first case of infection). Was I going to lose my puppies? How could I go to New York to accept the award and leave a sick mother and dying puppies at home?

Before any problem had developed, I had given each puppy a dose of Lactobacillus acidophilus shortly after birth and again 12 hours later. Following the instructions I had been giving to everyone else. However, when he gave me the antibiotics to give my bitch, my veterinarian also instructed me to continue giving the bacteria to the puppies twice a day for the five days she would be on the antibiotics plus two days following. I was also to give it to the bitch as well.

I can truthfully report that it is truly a miracle powder! Not only did my puppies have no set-back or problems, but did in fact seem to blossom as none of my puppies had ever done before. And this is saying something since I have always had extremely healthy, strong puppies in the past.

I have had many people wishing to know how to give this bacteria and I would like to set down here the information for all to have on record. The bacteria can be obtained from your druggist under the brand name of Lactinox, as stated in the above article. It comes in capsules and also in a box of 12 packets, with each packet containing a gram of the Lactobacillus acidophilus. I used the packets. Each gram is 1,000 milligrams and you want to give each puppy 300 milligrams every 12 hours. Here is how to mix it for this ratio:

Mix one packet in two tablespoons (or one ounce) of cool sterile water. It is not easy to mix and must be stirred for some time to dissolve it. One teaspoonful of this mixture equals 150 milligrams. So, give each puppy two teaspoonful with an eye dropper or, as I did, by tube feeding. I perhaps give my pups an extra boost because I mixed the 300 milligrams with 5 cc's of Enfamil with Iron and tube fed this. I could do all seven puppies in less than five minutes.

On the advice of my veterinarian, I also gave the bitch the Lactinox. She was given one-half of a packet, or 500 milligrams, every twelve hours. This can be sprinkled in the bitch's food if she is eating well, or, as I did, I obtained some large capsules from my veterinarian and divided the packet into two of the capsules. She received the Lactinox and the puppies received the Lactinox for the five days she was on the antibiotics, plus the two additional days after she had completed her treatment. This is necessary, apparently, because the antibiotic remains active for at least 36 hours after the final dose.

On the fifth day and final day that my bitch was given the antibiotics, I noticed a slight loosening of the puppies' stools so I increased the dosage to three teaspoonful of the Lactinox mixture and they immediately became normal again.

Three days later, with my bitch in fine shape and all seven puppies doing great, I took off for New York, leaving them with Tom to watch after them. I really felt I had been put to the test to see if I really deserved this award and I came through with flying colors.

S.T.C. OF GREATER WASHINGTON, D.C. (con't)

Mr. Gordon Carvill, President of the American Dog Owners Association, gave a talk at the Club's last regular meeting. He talked on the role of the ADOA in fighting dog ordinances, the primary objective being to eventually have such ordinances declared unconstitutional. To this end, the ADOA concentrates on assisting with specific local cases which have national significance, and which could be appealed to the higher courts. He gave a number of factual (and horrifying) examples of cases being fought around the country. These ordinances are very stringent, and have, and will continue to put the small dedicated breeder out of business, if they were enacted and enforced. Mr. Carvill is a compelling speaker and deeply committed to the interests of pure bred dogs, and left the impression that we are indeed fortunate there is an organization like the ADOA which, despite limited funds and staff, is doing as much as it can about the limited dog ordinance problem.

In addition to the presidency of ADOA, Mr. Carvill is a long-time dachshund breeder and an AKC licensed judge of the hound group and some sporting breeds.

Dear Louise:

I've started this letter several times and still can't find the way to put our loss into words.

My "Rennie" - Ruff-Me-Tuff Galent Grenader, U.D. and Canadian C.D.X. died tragically September 1st.

He was chasing ducks and dove off the pier near our boat. He's done this before and has been a good swimmer, whatever happened we'll never know, if he struck the side of the dock, had a heart attack or just what happened? I was right there waiting to lift him out after he paddled to the surface, but he never came fully up. My husband dove right in and tried to reach him, but he was gone. The entire episode didn't take more than three minutes, but it was like a horror show in slow motion.

"Rennie" was really a very special little fellow. He earned his C.D. in three trials, his C.D.X. in five and his U.D. in an even dozen, a degree a year. He also had his Canadian C.D. & C.D.X. We even entered in London, Ontario this October to go for our U.D. there. He had mustered the additional wooden articles required in Canada, plus the "Seek Back" for the gloves, and had brought his jumps up from the 10" height required in the States, to 14" required in Canada. This was the most difficult for him, and his pride when he mastered it was great. He strutted his stuff like only a Scottie can.

His death leaves a void in our home and in our hearts nothing can fill. His dear little face will be missed around the Obedience ring, and his excitement in the Tracking field and Terrier Trials will be missed also.

He was a true gentleman, a loyal friend, and a constant companion.

I'll be back again with another Scottie, but never another "Rennie".

COMMITTEE REPORTS: HEALTH BANK COMMITTEE:

The Chairman of this Sub-Committee, Hal Taylor Sr., D.V.M. reported that reproduction of written articles involves problems of copyrights, written permission of writers, researchers, and in many cases payment of a substantial fee to obtain such permission. Consequently his Report was a summary of his having read articles, having personal conversations and conclusions.

He commented on von Willenbrand's Disease. (The article on this disease appears in this issue of the Bagpiper.)

Dr. Taylor suggested that the term "Canine Cramp" be substituted for "Scottie Cramp" since this ailment is found in many breeds other than Scottish Terriers. He also discussed some new drugs for its control which are still in the experimental stages. The School of Veterinary Medicine at Ohio State University is conducting research in the disease, and anyone who is interested in learning more about their work should contact Dr. Taylor.

Dr. Taylor also gave a comprehensive Report on his conclusions and findings, based on consultations with many other breeders, doctors, as well as personal findings, on how to establish and proceed with a breeding program resulting in healthy puppies. (con't pg. 11)

While not actually writing a column, these past few months, I'm afraid Scotties still occupied my thoughts and I felt impelled to write a few words for the next Bagpiper.

The West of England S.T.C. in their July Bulletin carried an article by the well-known British Member of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons, Miss I. C. Strachan, on SWIMMERS. (see elsewhere in this issue). Perhaps this article will end the horrendous practice by some of destroying such pups. To quote Miss Strachan, "But, as prevention seems to be easy, it is infinitely easier than cure!"

From swimmers, to EARS. Without going into a long elucidation, I assume those engaged in breeding Scotties are fully aware of the size, placement and general character of the correct ear. Referring to The Popular Scottish Terrier by Dorothy Casperz editions 1, 2 or the revised edition now out page 67 shows the correct placement, figure 10 and three incorrect ones. Most common today is a combination of figures 12 and 13, too wide at base and carried too wide. It is rare to see figure 11, although this can occasionally happen. The correct position of the ear in profile is found on the following page and figure 14. However there is another fault seen increasingly and that is an ear tending to curl backwards. Nothing in my opinion, apart from increasing size, is distracting from the correct overall picture these days more than ears.

This summer, together with some of my family, we motored across Canada as far as Winnipeg. En route I met a number of Scottie friends and their little diehards. What struck me most happily was that while nearly all were champions and/or obedience title holders, all without exception were beloved pets having the freedom of their homes and gardens.

Congratulations to two new B.I.S. winners. Am. Ch. Marlornain Beau Brummel owned by D. G. Sinnema and Am. Cana. Ch. Anstamm Happy Emigrant owned by J. and M. Reynolds. Beau Brummel was B.I.S. on two consecutive days of the three day Tukon K.C. Show and Happy Emigrant (a Happy Venture son) went B.I.S. at the Sportsmen Show in Toronto.

"SWIMMERS" By - Miss I.C.Strachan M.R.C.V.S.

A swimmer can be described as a puppy who, as soon as it is able to start moving is unable to bear its weight and make normal movements with it's hind quarters; thus making its forward progression like that of a seal. This condition nearly always occurs in pups that are exceptionally short-backed and are particularly good do-ers - therefore well-bodied and fat.

I have never been able to find anything physically wrong with any of those pups and, over the years have come to the conclusion that the condition is caused simply and solely to not providing a sufficiently rough surface for them to get enough purchase to encourage correct muscular development. Newspaper or smooth sheeting is quite the worst bedding one can provide - if you observe pups on either of these you will see that the hind legs slide backwards and sideways, meaning that the pup can only move forwards by pulling on the front legs, thus also meaning that the shoulders are over-used. If these conditions are not remedied it is obvious that deformities of both hind and fore-quarters will be encouraged. Therefore always make sure that a rough surface is provided right from the beginning. Sacking forms a perfect surface - but it must be stretched flat and firmly fixed otherwise it will be rucked up and finally pushed aside. When sacking is not available I use a piece of old carpet, used upside down, provided it is not rubber backed - this is not quite as satisfactory as sacking as it must be replaced fairly often as it is not as easy to clean.

Most pups that start as swimmers, even if untreated, will eventually recover; but if not attended to will usually develop a peculiar sideways sway of the hindquarters, even if, on handling they appear quite normal and well-muscled. But, as prevention seems to be so easy, it is infinitely easier than cure!

I am sure your editor will be giving an account of her impressions of our major Breed Championship show, the Scottish Terrier Club of England, and the famous Windsor Show on the following day, which incidentally has been run by one of the most knowledgeable ladies in the dog world Mrs. Catherine Sutton, for many years. She also organizes the Richmond Show, so two major Championship Shows in one year is pretty good going for the weaker sex(!) particularly as they probably come in the top 4 of best organized of both - outdoor and indoor shows.

It was a very great pleasure to meet Louise Ellsworth and Ann Landry on their trip, in fact my wife will always remember it as Louise very kindly gave her a most wonderful tartan poncho she had made herself - it is so lovely all our visitors have to see it.

The weather was against the S.T.C. of England Ch. Show and it rained all day and in consequence the show had to be held indoors; this particular venue does not lend itself for indoor shows unfortunately, however I'm sure the setting at Windsor with the Castle in the background gave our visitors a better impression of our outdoor shows, it's probably the most famous site in England.

As I write we are now more than halfway through our season for the main Championship Shows and for the first time in many years no really outstanding dog or bitch has emerged; four new champions have been made up already and several others have one or two C.C.'s towards their title, so it is possible we may have a near record number of new Champions for 1978. At one show both the dog and bitch C.C.'s went to puppies! The weather has been very poor generally, hardly a big show has escaped rain on at least one day and it has often been windy (which my wife says is even worse!).

For the rest of my report I will try to cover the main points of news of the dog world here since I wrote my last article.

Mrs. Nagle's attempt to open up membership of the Kennel Club (G.B.) to women members failed in its initial hearing in the Industrial Court. The Courts ruling boiled down to the fact that it was still lawful to have a "men only" that is exactly the same way as a "ladies only" Club - despite the Sex Discrimination Act! This, of course is a lower "Court" interest, as far as I know much legal standing as it is not presided over by a judge. She is to appeal and is expected to be supported in her appeal by the Equal Opportunities Commission, if she is, then this Commission will give a big boost to her appeal.

The Industrial Court in its summing up described the Sex Discrimination Act as "a badly drafted and difficult to interpret bill" and that the action failed on a "fine point of law," so there is every hope that a higher judicial Court may alter the ruling. The Court Action made the main news on T.V. at 9:00 P.M. at the opening and again when the Court gave its decision, so it was well publicised - until now the reports had namely been confined to our two weekly dog papers, with a mention "in passing" perhaps in some of the national newspapers.

She is, of course, taking on a considerably different and more difficult task than when she took on the Jockey Club and won. In the case of the Jockey Club she was not applying for membership of the Club but merely for the right of women to be allowed to become trainers, previously another all male preserve.

Mid June saw the publication of an article by one of our more "outspoken" news papers (I expect you have them in America too and also a name for them!) alleging bribery of judges at Dog Shows - names were even named - which as you can imagine created a tremendous furore. The Kennel Clubs are at the moment holding their own investigation under a committee of three; the Sunday newspaper has refused to lend its evidence in checking, so it claims, taped recordings of conversations made by its reporters. No doubt it is holding these back for use in the libel action cases against it which one almost certain to follow from the persons named. However the Kennel Club has appealed in the Dog papers for evidence from anyone who has any knowledge of such acts and ends their appeal by stating that "anonymous" communications will be ignored.

The Kennel Club will obviously find them seriously handicapped without being allowed access to the actual evidence on which the article was based but it is hoped they be able to issue their detailed findings shortly.

To end on a more happy note, entries at nearly all the Championship Shows this year have been up, whether there was prize money or not and so despite continuing inflation this must be a sign of a healthy future for the Dog World generally; The enthusiasm and companionship is still there and while these remain dog owners will I'm sure always find the necessary cash to enter shows and enjoy themselves for a few hours, hopefully in sunshine if outdoors and a nice comfortable venue with all amenities if indoors!
