## C R U F T S 1 9 7 8

Despite freezing cold weather for the Show - like you - we have had a very severe winter, it was at least dry and the crowds were the largest ever, in fact a friend of ours arrived at midday and was told there would be no further admissions until 3:00 P.M., something completely unheard of, even for Cruft's! Mr. Henry Ormond, the Chief Steward, told me that attendance on the previous day exceeded 20,000; on the Saturday there were 35,000 and one had literally to fight one's way inch by inch round the gallery section where Terriers were and I was amused to hear a lady remark to her husband as she pushed her way passed the Scottie ring, "it is an absolute disgrace that these people round the ring are taking up so much space," to which her husband gently replied, "Well, dear, I suppose it is the dogs they've come to see!" Which all goes to show that perhaps the anti-dog Campaign is not making such a headway over here as one thought, it is merely a case of a very small but very vociferous minority getting the limelight on T.V., radio and in the press; Something which is all too common in these days of sensationalism.

Interest in this year's Crufts was, also, increased through the very same coverage over the death by poisoning of a Champion Chow (tipped as a possible Crufts Supreme Champion) at a show late last year (it was ignored by both press and radio at the time), two other Chows being poisoned at the same time and all three having been bred by the same person. Police are investigating but it seems unlikely they will be able to trace the culprit; as Stanley Dangerfield commented in an article, it is unlikely that even a disappointed loser would stoop so low and that it was far more likely to be one of the general public with a "twisted" mind.

To cap everything on the first day someone walked out of Olympia with a Boxer exhibit, it had only been left about 15 minutes by the owner. It was apparently turned loose by the thief shortly afterwards as it was found three days later at the Battersea Dogs Home, the largest stray dogs reception place in London and for that matter in the country. No one on the Staff recognised it, despite all the publicity, but the owner's young kennel maid spent the whole week-end touring round London hoping to find him and finally as a last resource went to Battersea Home, and to her

joy recognized the family pet who bounded up to her in great excitement.

As usual there was a tremendous overseas contingent present particularly from Europe, but amongst those from the American continent. I spotted Mrs. H. Hugh, President of the Canadian Kennel Club over for the week long pre-Crufts Conference of representatives from World's Kennel Clubs to try to sort out ways and means of closer co-operation between these authorities. One particular item that received unanimous support was that they should get together to produce unified Standards of the Breeds - "That they should be simple, unambiguous and easy to translate into other languages" was the gist of this very laudable proposal.

I am told that the conference was a great success - a statement which is considerably more definite than that usually put out after such events, so we can be very hopeful!

Amongst the 31 delegates the United States was represented by Mr. Bill Stifel, Executive Vice-President of the American Kennel Club. Other overseas delegates whose speeches were reported in the press included Frances Antoinette of Monaco, Mr. E. Beim of Brazil, Dr. P. E. Sundgren and Mrs Ulla Magnusson of the Swedish Kennel Club and Mr. S. Luse President of the New Zealand Kennel Club and of course a number from amongst the large British Contingent.

Visitors from the United States were conspicuous this year by their absence but I did spot Mesdames Harriet Kenney and Munro of Charlottesville, Virginia who regularly comes over for Crufts.

Miss Jane Miller gave the Dog C.C. and Best of Breed to the Owen's Ch. Gaywyn Clockwatch whilst Bitch C.C. went to Mr. J. Jeffs Stonemoor Prudence bred by Mr. J. Thompson. Runners-up were Dr. King's Ch. Rehus Royal Solitaire (dog) and Bessett, Henderson and Shorto's Ch. Gaywyn Concherto (bitch).

The Scottish Terrier Breeders and Exhibitors Association had their usual Club Table and their 1978 Year Book was available to members present to pick up. Overseas members of the Club will be sent their copy by printed paper rate as soon as possible. I can thoroughly recommend this book, it is printed as usual by Ryship Printing and is now bound instead of stapled and runs to some 120 pages!! And it's free for £1 membership (£1.50 joint or £10 life membership).

Finally I have news that your Editor hopes to visit England in June and we look forward to welcoming her in mid-summer. At last our first daffodils are out in the garden so spring is not far off and I hope the sun will shine whilst she is over here. (con't pg.12)

## ARE YOU KILLING YOUR PUPPIES (Con't)

In recent years it has seemed more and more breeders have been losing their puppies from some type of infection. One breeder in my area lost 32 puppies from four bitches, managing to save only one puppy that was stunted in growth and never grew to proper size. All these puppies were lost within a space of a few months.

After learning of this, I decided when my next litter arrived I was being foolish not to take advantage of the availability of antibiotics that could prevent my bitch from having a disease she could pass on to her puppies. Following my usual procedure, I took her and the newborn puppies to my veterinarian the following day. When he was finished examining her and the puppies, he pronounced them in excellent condition. I asked him if he didn't think it would be wise to give the bitch some type of antibiotic and he said, "No ma'am. I don't see any reason for it."

Of course, I respect my veterinarian and his knowledge, so I didn't argue with him. And the 10 healthy puppies grew rapidly and strong with no problems at all. The following litter I asked the same question and again received the same reply. In the preceding months I had known breeders who had lost either all or most of their puppies and I will admit I fretted silently when my veterinarian refused to administer an antibiotic which I felt could prevent any trouble from cropping up.

I was fortunate again, however, not to have any problems and my puppies grew fat and healthy and saucy.

Several of those breeders who were losing their puppies to this terrible "fading puppy syndrome" were friends of mine. I listened sympathetically to them as they tried to figure a reason for the loss of their puppies. Ironically, as you will see later, they decided that some bacteria was getting into the puppies' stomachs so they placed the blame on themselves, feeling they had not been quite as antiseptic with the whelping quarters as perhaps they could be.

The next time, I watched them scrub everything as diligently as it would be had it been a hospital delivery room and then a few days before going to delivery, they scrubbed her stomach with antiseptic soap and water and thoroughly rinsed it.

They took the extra precaution of seeing that the scissors to be used for severing the naval cord were sterilized, in the event infection was getting in through the naval. And, for ADDED PROTECTION they gave their bitch the antibiotic shot after she had whelped and followed this with the same in pill form. In spite of all this precaution, they still continued to lose their puppies. In fact, some have become so discouraged they are ready to quit the breeding of dogs.

Apparently, from what I have been able to learn, most veterinarians have been mystified by this "fading puppy syndrome." No doubt in most cases they are consulted after the puppies are in the final stages and so near death nothing much could be done to save them even had there been time to attempt a diagnosis. Also, most of our veterinarians have a very busy practice and they cannot waste time on dead puppies when there are so many live animals that need their care.

One day, however, I was reading through some old 1967 issues of the AMERICAN KENNEL GAZETTE and I ran across an article under the Labrador column that attracted my attention immediately. A dentist, Dr. Daniel S. Grayson, who breeds Labradors as a hobby, reported he had lost two litters, 18 puppies in all, to this "fading puppy syndrome." In his article, he said he went the entire route

under competent veterinary advice in an effort to save the puppies, including tube feeding, subcutaneous dextrose and saline, and antibiotics administered both by injection and orally into the digestive tract, to no avail.

He had autopsies made on the dead puppies at the Ohio State University Pathology Institute in an effort to diagnose the disease causing the death of the puppies. He said the autopsies failed to reveal ANY bacterial infection. But, there was one significant find — there were NO bacteria of ANY description found in the puppies!

When he received this report, Dr. Grayson said he began to wonder if perhaps his "fading puppy syndrome" was not being caused by the antibiotic being transmitted in the bitch's milk to the puppies and sterilizing their digestive tracts.

Every living thing has a normal intestinal bacteria known as *Lactobacillus acidophilus* which is vital to the well being of the living creature and, Dr. Grayson explained, if it is destroyed at any time and is not replaced in the digestive tract then serious complication will occur.

He reported that when the next litter arrived, he suspended the antibiotic therapy to the bitch to stop the transmission of the antibiotic through the milk to the puppies — and then he administered live *Lactobacillus acidophilus* bacteria to the bitch AND the puppies. This bitch, by the way, was one that had lost her previous litters to the disease.

He said he also gave the bitch a milk supplement containing an enormous dose of vitamin B-1 because he knew that normal intestinal bacteria need certain food substance to grow on and vitamin B-1 is one of them.

Dr. Grayson reported the entire litter survived. After reading this article, I immediately called my veterinarian and asked him if he thought the injection of an antibiotic into a bitch could kill the necessary bacteria in the puppies that was needed in their digestive tracts for survival. His reply was, "Yes, ma'am, it surely could. That's why I don't believe in giving antibiotics indiscriminately."

Thinking back over the many litters I had seen die and remembering the words of the breeders: "I give my bitch antibiotics and STILL the puppies came down with this disease," I began to see the light. Although the article in the GAZETTE was a report on only one litter, still it did make sense this could be the cause for the "fading puppy syndrome," or at least one of the causes. No doubt our veterinarians are possibly unaware of the free dispensary of antibiotics some breeders engage in and because of this they have been unable to understand why the puppies die.

I decided to pass this information on to Collie breeders so I wrote my findings in an article for COLLIE CUES. I immediately received a letter from a breeder who had read it. Her letter brought out some interesting points and I would like to pass them on.

She wrote she was familiar with post whelping infections since one of her bitches invariably retains an afterbirth and she gives ergot to keep her open and draining plus antibiotics . . . but she emphasized NEVER penicillin. This breeder said personally she would not consider whelping a litter of Collies without Lactonoc in her refrigerator. Lactonoc is Norden Laboratories trade name of *Lactobacillus acidophilus*. She explained she removed the brown covering on the capsules and dumped the contents in cold sterile water and since it is difficult to dissolve, she administers it with a medicine dropper.



Dear Mrs. Ellsworth:

It was my intention to write this letter long ago but time whizzes by and we don't accomplish all we would like. Anyway, I would like to answer the letter from Leslie Boucher in regard to lymphoma, since no one else has done so. I feel I'm practically a "pro" in this matter as I have lost at least fifteen dogs with various forms of

cancer and at least ten with lymphoma, and now have three in the kennel with lumps. My doctor where I used to live said that with the incidence of cancer in my kennels, it would definitely indicate a virus.

I feel safe in advising Mrs. Boucher that the chances are VERY high that she will lose her other dog to the same ailment. I lost a Scottie bitch to lymphoma a few years ago. At the time, one of my dogs had a broken door on his crate so I started sleeping him in the crate of the deceased bitch. Six months later I had to have him put to sleep -- lymphoma.

My doctor here doesn't think it can be transmitted in this way. He thinks the dam is possibly the carrier and transmits it to her children. This might be a reasonable assumption with some of mine where it does seem to run in families. However, the dog and bitch above mentioned were related only VERY distantly, and were never in the same or adjoining pens. So even though we don't know HOW it is transmitted, it is reasonable to assume that it IS transmitted, either by inheritance or by a virus.

In some articles on lymphoma (leukemia) in humans, doctors have stated that apparently it can be transmitted in dogs but is not contagious in humans. Needless to say, I wish some one would come up with a cure, but since they're not doing very well in regard to human cancer, it isn't very likely they'll find out much for dogs.

I would like to add another comment while I'm writing -- this about the "hush Hush" Scottie Cramp. I have also had six or eight dogs with the Cramp but have had only one in which it lasted past his second year. Usually they are over it by the time they are one and a half. It seems to be more of an "excitement" problem, and not necessarily sexual excitement. Perhaps after all the hushing up over the years it may be nothing more than something similar to a hyperkinetic child -- overly excitable and overly active.

Cost of original trophy to be between \$500.00 and \$750.00, to be paid for out of bequest left to the S.T.C.A. by Helen Stalter. Second and carried. Once the original trophy is retired duplicate trophies will be paid for out of income from this bequest.

Motion by Don Massaker Fee paid Sweepstakes judge to be left to the discretion of the current Board. Second and carried.

Motion by John Sheehan to accept Antax Consulting Corporation of New York City as the accounting firm to count the ballots for new Board and Officers if necessary. Second & carried.

Motion by Miriam Stamm to reinstate Sarah Tidmore as a member. Second and carried.

Motion by Marjorie Cohen that a letter be sent to Blanche Reeg extending an Honorary Membership to her, explaining what acceptance of this entails. Second and carried.

Nominating Committee for 1978 - Chairman: Ed Watkins; members, Jerry Rozman and Cynthia Walgren; Alternates Jane Seeberg and Dana Lee Saar.

New Obedience Chairman - Bart Lapin.

Motion by Marjorie Cohen to give permission to Joan Eagle to display Kirmse etchings at Montgomery County S.T.C.A. annual meeting. Second and carried.

Motion by Cass Ridgley for S.T.C.A. to check into the cost of reproducing films which the S.T.C.A. has, or can get. (film on grooming by Blanche Reeg.) Second and carried.

Motion by Ed Ingram for the National Rotating Specialty Show be held on the West Coast every other year, starting with S.T.C. of California in 1980, Washington State S.T.C. in 1982;

If one or more valid additional nominations are received by the Recording Secretary on or before July 15, he shall, on or about August 1, mail to each member in good standing a ballot listing all of the nominees for each position in alphabetical order, with the name of the state in which they reside, together with a blank envelope and a return envelope addressed to the independent auditing firm, marked "Ballot" and bearing the name of the member to whom it was sent. So that the ballots may remain secret, each voter, after marking his ballot, shall seal it in the second envelope addressed to the auditing firm. The auditing firm, after counting the ballots received, shall return the results of that count, sealed, to the Recording Secretary not less than one (1) week prior to the annual meeting. The Recording Secretary shall announce, at the annual meeting, the results of the election.

"Interpretation of the STANDARD as it functionally applies to a BREED." This article is in the last issue of the TARTAN and written by Mr. Robert Marshall.

"In the Scottish Terrier we are blessed with a dog that was bred that way for a specific purpose: to go to ground for rodents or varmints; to run the fields in any weather; to have natural hunting instinct, alert and inquisitive; to be hard and sound with sufficient stamina to go all day.

He was given a head much too large for beauty but to house an honest mouthful of punishing teeth. A skull large enough to house some common sense and protect his deepset eyes, topped with small prick ears that can be laid flat and out of the way of an objecting tooth or claw. A muscular neck, strong enough to pull a badger from his den. Sloping shoulders to gently squeeze into cracks and holes. Well boned, short front legs with strong feet and nails for digging and pushing backward--(how else to pull the varmint from the lair?)

With all this up front he must be balanced with a body, a mid-piece that is well sprung but rigid, one piece and supple, for if that front end gets into a crack, the back end can't block it coming out backwards. Balance it all with a very powerful set of hind quarters, something with which to drive this locomotive, cover it all with a short, hard coat, and you have a most functional and well equipped wee beastie. Set on top a tail, carried a little above the vertical just to let all the world know that he's proud of being the best built dog in a little package, and you've got a Scottish Terrier."

While dog showing is a sport, it is not a sport that should depend on luck alone, in fact, success in any game or sport depends entirely on experience, hard work and most of all "stick-to-itiveness." The good-luck part in the game is experienced sooner or later by the serious, dedicated breeder. The length of time it takes before most of us have our good luck should be used to develop our inbreeding, conditioning and presenting our dogs in order to take advantage of luck when it comes. This includes studying the Standard of Perfection for our breed until we can identify real quality when we find it - whether in our own dogs or in the dogs of others. All breeders should take off the "rose-colored glasses" and be able to objectively select from their own stock the best to SHOW to a judge. Also, they should be prospects for future judging assignments.


