



Vet's Call

Megadosages of Vitamin C are Producing Miraculous Cures.

A FOUR-MONTH-OLD Doberman pinscher was brought to the veterinary hospital suffering from distemper, a highly contagious and common viral disease. The animal was running a high fever—104 degrees—and was listless with no appetite. Mucus and pus oozed from its eyes and nose.

Dr. Wendell Belfield, of Bel-Mar Orthomolecular Veterinary Hospital in San Jose, California, hesitated only briefly. This was a very sick dog. Wasting no time, he gave the pinscher an injection. Within 30 minutes the dog's temperature dropped to 102.5. Injections were continued at regular intervals, and the next morning the animal was eating again and moving around. Even the eye and nose discharges were improving. By the third day, Dr. Belfield reported, "The patient was lively, playful, and barking, appetite excellent, eating voraciously." By the fifth day, the Doberman was well enough to go home. Was this some new miracle drug? Some life-saving marvel from a chemist's lab? Dr. Belfield had simply given the dog an injection of sodium ascorbate—vitamin C.

If this were an isolated case, it might be easy to pass it off as a coincidence. After all, according to popular belief and medical theory, cats and dogs are capable of synthesizing all the vitamin C they need. But this was *not* an isolated incident. Dr. Belfield has used this treatment in other cases.

A deathly-ill German shepherd was brought to Dr. Belfield's clinic. The dog, a five-year-old female, was so weak she could not walk and had stopped eating and drinking. The diagnosis was severe jaundice, and the prognosis—death. Instead of giving up, the veterinarian chose to try the vitamin C treatment. The dog received large doses—75 grams a day—and responded quickly. By the next day she was moving about and had started eating and drinking again. After three more days of vitamin C injections, the dog was well enough to go home with her owner, although she continued treatment with powdered vitamin C food supplement at home.

If you are still not convinced vitamin C was the "miracle drug" that cured the animals, Dr. Belfield tells of another occasion when he was called upon to treat a poodle suffering from violent vomiting, fever, and loss of appetite. As if that were not enough, the poor animal was also found to have a heart murmur. Because all the humans in the poodle's household were recent flu victims, Dr. Belfield was quickly able to diagnose London influenza, a virus which can affect the heart muscle in humans. He began the vitamin C treatment. Within a few days, the poodle was completely recovered and the heart murmur had disappeared. About 250 similar flu cases have been treated this way, Dr. Belfield adds.

Fine. Wonderful. It seems to work for dogs, but what if you are a cat owner? There is evidence that vitamin C can protect pets—both canine and feline—from all sorts of infectious diseases. A male Siamese cat was brought to Dr. Belfield with a bad case of rhinotracheitis (RHT), which is an inflammation of the nasal passages and the windpipe common in cats. The animal was running a high temperature, sneezing, and suffering from laryngitis. Two injections of vitamin C were given that first day, and the next morning the pet showed improvement. The fever had broken. After two more vitamin C shots, the patient was discharged. Over 100 RHT cases have been successfully treated this way by Dr. Belfield.

"The intravenous use of ascorbate is especially valuable in the therapy of the viral diseases, as it appears to be an effective, non-specific, non-toxic virucidal agent," Belfield and biochemist Irwin Stone conclude. "We have not seen any viral disease that did not respond to this treatment. Successful therapy appears to depend on using it in sufficiently large doses.



"It is our belief that in communicable viral diseases," they go on, "the virus is incapacitated within a few minutes" after the vitamin C is injected. They also point out that healthy unvaccinated dogs placed in close contact with distemper victims don't contract the disease if they have been treated with vitamin C minutes before.

How does it work? Why does vitamin C accomplish such amazing feats of healing in animals?

Even though he wasn't sure just why it worked, Dr. Belfield continued using the vitamin C therapy because it brought such wonderful results. Later Belfield and Stone came to the conclusion that cats and dogs simply were not able to create enough of the vitamin in their livers to meet stress situations such as disease. "For a long time," they wrote, "the impression has existed among veterinarians and others that those mammals capable of synthesizing their own ascorbate produce enough each day to fully satisfy their requirements. This is far from the truth, especially during periods of stress."

When a serious disease brings an animal to the veterinarian, the shortage of vitamin C may become apparent. Unfortunately, Dr. Belfield feels that most animals suffer from a chronic shortage which amounts to a subclinical form of scurvy, the vitamin C deficiency disease. "As a result of nearly a decade of clinical experience in this area," he and Stone say, "it is our opinion that the incidence and morbidity of chronic subclinical scurvy amongst dogs and cats is much higher than generally recognized. It amounts to an endemic condition afflicting most of these animals throughout their lives. . . ."


Having a firm basis for believing in vitamin C's protective powers, Dr. Belfield has treated an array of seemingly unrelated pet problems with the substance.

A female miniature poodle with a long history of bladder inflammation (cystitis) had been previously treated with sulfa drugs and various antibiotics, but her symptoms always returned. When she was brought to the hospital, he began treating her with vitamin C, prescribing one gram of it as a daily food supplement. The cystitis disappeared and the poodle was still symptom-free after 18 months.

A female mixed terrier suffered from severe allergy in the spring and would sneeze violently, eyes tearing,







The Patient I'll Never Forget THE KING AND I

It was very soon after graduation from veterinary school, in May of 1966, that I first met Mac. He was a real Scotsman, lord of his household and servant to none. He demanded a one-sided respect, and got it. After all, who can argue with all those teeth and that deep guttural growl? Mac was a fine specimen of Scottish Terrier.

A newly graduated veterinarian stands in awe of a patient like Mac. He was only in the clinic for a routine trim, but for the trimmer this dog's visits were anything but routine. None of the usual methods of restraint seemed to work with Mac. Blood invariably flowed. To me, this was an instant challenge; I decided that I would help with the trimming job. But I bled, too.

Since Mac was a regular at our clinic it was clear that he and I would have to come to a mutual understanding. On his next visit I kept Mac a little later than usual — through my supper hour, in fact — and we had a heart-to-heart talk. Anyone listening would have thought it a very peculiar conversation, but no one else was around. It was just the two of us, having it out. Throughout the two-hour session, Mac never backed down, but he did finally come forward in a cautious and dignified way. I was triumphant! Mac allowed me to enjoy my triumph, while he remained aloof and superior. From that day on Mac became Mackie, and I became a necessary, but tolerable, evil.

Mac was the kind of patient that makes my profession enjoyable. Any health problems were always attended to immediately; he was vaccinated annually, and bathed and trimmed on schedule. Those black nails were gingerly cut, the anal glands squeezed delicately, the hair on his muzzle combed ever so gently. He was like a king. Groom me right, but groom me cautiously; after all, a king's bite is just as bad as a king's bark.

This was dealt with promptly, and the results were a tribute to the stamina of Mackie and his breed.

By this time, each meeting indicated that our respect for each other had grown. I was convinced it really was mutual, even though Mackie never lost his aloofness in the waiting room. The years passed, but the growls and warnings remained. Time mellowed the spirit, but the stamina, strength and determination remained.

A veterinarian gets so involved with his patients that he sometimes forgets that the aging process of his wards is faster than his own, even though some days it does feel like the reverse. A periodic faint, a slight cough, a soft heart murmur indicated that trouble was there. Time speeds fast for a dog. Yes, I know that time stops for no man, but it seems to run ahead of schedule for his best friend.

On a summer Sunday in 1975 I was called to see Mackie for the last time; his heart could take no more. I did the deed I didn't want to do, yet had to do and, I must admit, did with tears rolling down my cheeks. Mac showed no apprehension, and this made this final procedure more bearable for me. I must point out that the expression "going to sleep" is not a cover-up phrase; it is exactly that.

The king was dead. The subject was left behind with sadness in a heart filled with years of respect — for Mackie and his royal breed, the Scottish Terrier.
