

The Specialty Club and Westminster brought out two outstanding specimens, Ortley Angela who had just arrived in this country, after a meteoric career in England which gave her four champion certificates and the title. She was imported by a newcomer to the fancy, Don C. Voorhees of New York City. The other was recently imported by the Hill Top Farm. He is registered as Hitofa Chief, appearing for the first time at the Specialty. He made a popular win, then went right back to repeat at the Garden.

It is with regret that I must record the death of the veteran English bitch, Ch. Ornsay Baba, owned by Mrs. S. Willis. Her name will be found in many of the pedigrees of outstanding Scotties in this country today.

Have you noticed the article by our own A. C. Hall of the Hallcrest Kennels, entitled "Scottish Terriers in the United States During 1933" which appeared in the February 9 issue of the English magazine, "Our Dogs"?—An excellent article by a very popular and well informed writer.

An interesting letter from Mrs. C. E. Pierce of Evergreen Farm, Columbus Junction, Iowa, has just come to my desk. It is interesting to note that at Evergreen Farm they have been breeding Scotties exclusively for over thirty years. When Mrs. Pierce was a small girl her father bought the first one, a little registered female and a year later purchased a male puppy of Nosegay breeding. They have bred the little Diehard continuously since that time, never in quantity, but always with quality in mind

The outstanding stud of this Kennel is Highlanders Heather Burr. Heather Burr is an outstanding Scottish Terrier of the best of modern blood lines. Harton Highlander is the sire of the very famous Ch. Heather Necessity who has at this writing sired 15 champions. He is of standard size, powerful bone and substance. His coat is flat and extremely hard with dense undercoat, has a short back, sound body, short, correctly carried tail, an exceptionally long lean well balanced head, good well placed ears, very small dark eyes.

H. E. Simon, Cashier of the Farmers & Merchants Savings Bank of Burlington, Iowa, maintains a small quality Kennel at his country home at the edge of the City of Burlington. He has four outstanding brood matrons, one by Eng. Ch. Albourne Brigand, one by Ch. Merlewood Aristocrat, and two wonderful black daughters of Sandhey's Simon of Wotan. At the present time he has a nice litter of six puppies, sired by Eng. Ch. Albourne Royalist and out of his good Brigand bitch.

This united front that the Diehard Fanciers are presenting to the world will surely bear fruit This Scottish Terrier issue of Dog News shows that they advertise, that they send in all the news that they can get from their own, as well as other Kennels.

Scottish Terriers In England In 1933

IF ONE cared to take the trouble to invite the opinion of all breeders and followers of the Diehard in England as to which is the breed that has (not only) held its own, (but) increased in favour and may even be the most popular breed of the day, it would be a safe bet that the unanimous verdict would be-"The Scottish Terrier"-That would be too much of a "cert" to expect anyone to lay odds on. I venture to suggest, moreover, that if you left Scottie folk out of the reckoning altogether and asked a similar opinion of dog breeders generally and Show goers in particular for a really impartial opinion as to the present day position of our breed amongst all the others, they could only say that at the close of 1933 the Scottish Terrier was very, very near the top of the list in popularity.

Before eulogizing on the achievements of any one breed during the past year, the very important point can not be ignored that in spite of bad times in many directions and troubles national and international this great and fascinating sport of dog breeding and exhibiting is in a most flourishing condition and provides by virture of its magnitude one very important fact-employment directly and indirectly for many thousands of people.

(Statistics are invariably irksome and I do not intend to transgress in that direction but), It is m o s t interesting to note that from figures available as I write, the total number of registrations with the English Kennel Club for the twelve months ended 31st October 1933 exceeds by more than 4,000 those for

the corresponding period of a year ago; to prove that Scottish Terriers can claim a very liberal share of this increase it must be stated that, taking the same period, the figures for registrations in this breed have increased by no fewer than 746. Whilst figures do give definite proof, I am (nevertheless) of the opinion that it is not necessarily in this direction alone that one should seek for information (to enable an opinion to be formed). For some years now the people who keep dogs only as companions have been desiring pure bred dogs, until to-day very few mongrels are seen; they are fast being superseded by dogs of quite good breeding, conforming more or less to the recognized standards of their particular breed. That Scottish Terriers are in the ascendant in this direction is a truth apparent to any observer. The number of people asking for Scotties as "pals" is amazing and on all sides one find; breeders quite unable to cope with the demands.

Advertisements of dog foods and medicines in very many instances portray illustrations of fascinating Scottish Terriers. This (and others I could mention) forms a very definite piece of evidence in support of the contention I have made.

The natural outcome (of the conditions I have stated) has been that entries at all shows have been well maintained and in more than a few instances increases have been recorded. Scottish Terriers have certainly boomed at the shows and at some Championship events have shown in the figures for average entries per class a lead over all other breeds. The Scottie benches and Judging rings have been great attractions for the crowd-a state of things indeed gratifying to those of us who are so desperately keen on the future welfare of the breed.

Let us now turn to some of the principal shows and recall a few of the dogs making the deepest impressions in this wonderful year.

The National Terrier Show held at Olympia in London heralds each New Year of Championship shows for Terrier breeders in England. Could anything but a great entry in Scotties be expected under the ever popular Mr. McCandlish? Nothing stereotyped either in methods or placings here! Sound independent judgment-often knocking form to blazes-but, nevertheless, a judgment so many of us appreciate more than most. Little need be said here of the Dog Challenge Certi-

ficate winner — Grey Steel of Rookes, now in America, where he will be well known and no doubt making his presence felt in puppies almost ready for the show ring. Ch. Rose Marie of Rookes walked away with the bitch Certificate, as she did at Crufts and Edinburgh — successive shows. A great bitch is Rose Marie and I have just doted

on her since her first appearance; the real "all of a heap" sort, yet withal such great quality and movement which just lifts her right above most.

Ch. Rouken Rogue put it across the opposition in dogs at Crufts in February. Many good puppies are now being shown by this particularly sound dog and luckily for English breeders he is still this side the Atlantic.

At Edinburgh in March Ch. Talavera Ian came out to win his first Certificate under Col. Jackson. I remember Ian looking particularly "the part" on this occasion and he secured a most popular verdict. Repeating the performance at Blackpool under Mrs. Carpersz and again at Darlington under Mr. Wm. Davidson he qualified for his certificate. That this dog will appeal to most American breeders is a certainty.

When talking about the most prominent bitches seen this year, Ch. Brimstane Belle must be given a prominent place. She was very near the top (on a few occasions) before she ran out the ultimate winner at Manchester and later annexed two certificates in succession at the Great Joint Terrier show

under Mrs. Walton and the Ladies Kennel Association show the next day under Mr. Holland Buckley. Belle was another of the great ones by Ch. Heather Fashion Hint and always a hot ringside favorite.

Our American friends need no reminding of the prominent place occupied during this year by the famous "Ortley" bitches. Ch. Ortley Patience has apparently been making the going very hot since her arrival in America and now followed by her successor Angela—another Champion securing the title at successive shows and then adding a fourth certificate to make doubly sure. (A great performance without a doubt.) Of great interest would be a meeting of these two bitches, and I would like to be there to see. If I were hazarding a guess on the result—well, I think I would plump for Patience.

Nowadays it seems impossible to imagine any Championship show of Scottish Terriers complete without the usual representation from the "Of Rookes" kennels, (and I am certain the owners must be more than satisfied with the year's work). My own favorite among the dogs seen from this kennel in the past year has been Ch. Radical of Rookes. A great dog in every way and a distinct loss to the breed here when he left these shores. He was very quickly made up and won his certificates under no less authorities than Dr. Twigg, Mr. Holland Buckley and Mr. C. Bremer.

Ch. Raceaway of Rookes could not be denied certificates at Leeds, Bournemouth and Brighton; from her first appearance she was a firm favorite and as was expected she had not long to wait for her title.

No year passes without something emanating from the Docken Kennel (which can claim a prominent place in the first flight). The star turn of 1933 was Dandy of Docken—now possessing the coveted prefix—winning certificates at the Great Joint Terrier, Taunton and, when the property of Mr. Robert Chapman, at Abergavenny. Dandy has now changed hands again, the fortunate owner (of this most desirable Terrier) being Mr. Hamilton who has proved by his winning the certificate at Birmingham only a few weeks ago that Ch. Dandy of Docken was no fluke champion.

Another most popular Champion has been Mrs. C. M. Cross's Gaisgill Monah. Monah is a bitch of the highest class and in spite of many tempting offers Mrs. Cross has retained her and I understand she is breeding from her very shortly. Gaisgill Nicholas is responsible for siring Monah and as he is also the sire of many other good winners he is rapidly coming along to take a place among the fashionable Stud dogs of the day.

The "Glencannie" Kennels have been quite a force to reckon with. By securing certificates with the particularly sound bitch, Grand Slam, at Darlington and Birmingham and the Dog certificate at the Metropolitan and Essex Show with Cigar, Mrs. Madden has made great progress during a year when competition has been so keen.

Six dog certificates have fallen this year to Ch. Albourne Admiration. A black of great type and assertive Scottish Terrier character, his total of certificates must be a goodly number and he looks good for a few more.

The fact that I am not now fortunate enough to be the owner of two bitches which

have also been outstanding in the array of winners offers some excuse for my referring to them. Ch. Ripple of Rookes qualified for her title under Miss Wijk at Richmond and after a considerable run of atrocious luck, having been reserve Champion on six or seven occasions, the well known Lonkley Lavender at last annexed her first certificate under Mr. Chapman at the Kennel Club Show and ample evidence was forthcoming that a most popular victory had been recorded.

(It will be appreciated that) Space does not permit of mention of all the high class specimens which have graced our shows during the past twelve months, but it is worth emphasizing that the quality and general soundness has been most marked and possibly never surpassed. At many shows huge classes of exceptionally promising young stock have been exhibited, a sure sign of the healthy condition of the breed and a foundation upon which many breeders are building for their stock in the New year.

Many good ones of both sexes have left England for America and it can be confident-

Fortunate indeed are American breeders in having at their disposal Ch. Albourne Royalist. Undoubtedly one of the best of the present day Scotties, a great little dog whose departure was a distinct loss to the breed here. (I am only one of many breeders on this side who have not yet done bemoaning the fact that we did not have a bitch or two to him before he left.) With ordinary luck he ought to do big things in

(Now) A review such as I have attempted could not (possibly) be brought to a conclusion without reference to what is probably the greatest kennel in the world-Mr. Robert Chapman's stud at Glenboig. (Even in a year when his activities in the show ring have not been so pronounced as in some previous years.) Quite a number of very prominent victories have been achieved-notably the debut of Heather Fresh Fuel at the Scottish Kennel Club Show at Edinburgh. After winning the certificate by lowering the flags of several champions, this son of Necessity eventually emerged triumphant by securing the award for best of all breeds. A great performance for a first timer.

It is, however, the impression left on the breed by several of the Glenboig Stud dogs that merits the unique position occupied by this renowned kennel. This year in a most marked degree has been revealed the marvellous powers of Ch. Heather Fashion Hint as a stud force. He even looks like eclipsing his own great sire as a getter of the highest class of Scottish Terriers. It is no exaggeration to say that most of the sensational youngsters of the year can claim this great dog as their sire.

Whatever success has been achieved in 1933 ought to be even surpassed in the New year, (that is at least a reasonable conclusion at which to arrive if the present strong position of most of the leading kennels and the enthusiasm of many of the new recruits to the breed can be taken as a criterion). (Another) most pleasing fact is that everything points to the breed increasing even further in popularity in America and English breeders are always delighted to learn of the successes of exported dogs and, in no less a degree, (are we gratified to know that the enterprise and foresight shown by so many American breeders in the purchase of such a number of good ones is now being successfully revealed by) the numerous home bred winners being produced from imported parents.

Without any doubt it is the aim of the great majority of breeders in this Country to export only those animals which are expected to bring credit to the kennel which they represent although, (as in most other popular breeds) the popularity, which all true lovers of the breed so much desire, inevitably brings with it the usual make-as-much-as-you can mongers regardless of the quality, (but that, I am afraid, is another story which deserves special treatment and for which space does not allow).

For 1934 we in England extend to our American friends and fellow breeders of the game little Scottish Terrier our heartiest greetings and good wishes for a most successful year.

Westminster and Specialty Scotties

By Donald M. Ewing

"I wholly disapprove of what you say and will defend to the death your right to say it."—Voltaire to Helvetius.

In retrospect, many things stand out in my mind concerning the splendid exhibition of Scotties at the Specialty and Westminster shows in New York. It is difficult to decide in what order to discuss them, but I'll just jot things

down as they pop up.

The unfortunate absence of international Ch. Heather Reveller of Sporran was a blow to all who came to see if this dog could make it three straight Best-of-Breed at Westminster and two straight in the Specialty. He was sick for some time before the shows, but his owner, S. S. Van Dine, wanted him to appear if possible. The dog had to be withdrawn from the Specialty by order of the veterinarian even after judging had begun.

There were fine dogs in both shows and a point that im-

pressed me tremendously was the large number of non-blacks. I have no tabulation for Westminster, but rather accurate checking on the Specialty gave these results:

More than 70 percent of dogs were nonblack—ranging from black brindle down to true reddish-gray brindle. Some 60 percent of the bitches were classified the same way. A majority of the winners in each class were non-black, though Winners Dogs and Best of Breed went to true blacks. This is quite a change from the past few years when the true

black has been much larger in the class winners as well as in the total dogs benched.

There is not space for me to give details of each class at each show. But, of interest to all, I think, is the differences of opinion shown in placings at the two shows.

Naturally, with two shows so close together, with virtually the same dogs in each, everyone watches closely to see where they differ and where they agree.

There were some outstanding differences as well as agreements between Mrs. Marguerite Kirmse Cole's decisions at the Specialty and those of Morgan Stinemetz at the Garden. These I discuss because of the natural interest, but without thought of personal criticism.


Outstanding, of course, was the reversal in Best of Breed at the two shows. Mrs. Cole put up that fine bitch, Ortley Patience O' Hollybourne. Against Patience, Mrs. Cole had two contestants. One was the newly imported Ortley Angela, shown by Frank Brumby perfectly and selected abroad for Don Vorhees by Brumby's father. (Incidentally, Vorhees and his kennels must be watched. He won first and second team at the Specialty also, and then won best team in Westminster.) The other was Radical of Rookes, a fine little dog which unfortunately comes at time when there may be too many greats for him to hit the top frequently.

Mrs. Cole quickly put Radical aside and finally gave the award to Patience. Angela is a beautiful, small bitch, compact, pushed in from all sides, good head. But, though Patience is a bit high and on that day seemed to twist her rear toes a bit, I thought her better. She has a fine head, good bone, good coat, and in general quality seemed to me superior. Patience is black, Angela dark brindle.

That is where the first disagreement comes! Mr. Stinemetz

thought entirely differently! He put Angela first and Patience second, b u t agreed with Mrs. Cole on Radical, giving h i m little attention.

On Winners Dogs, both judges placed Mrs. Spiekerman's new import first. This is a fine black. He needs a bit of substance in the flanks and could fill out a bit across the chest. He is young and if he does fill out should be a wonder. I think he already has won his championship over here, starting at the Specialty. I certainly could not fault the decision in putting up

this dog, though he did have ample competion.

A real reversal came in the 6-9-months Puppy Dog Class. Mrs. Cole put up Barlae Bard, a fine true brindle owned and shown by William Prentice. He was a little light in coat and what was seen of him in the ring was all dog—not trimmings. A good all-around one. The battle seemed to me—and to most of the ringside, judging by the whispering and pointing—to rest with this dog and Bottle of Vigal. Bottle is a beautiful black, in full coat, by that great stud of Mr. Mc-Aleenan's Heather Goldfinder Babe.

To my surprise, Mrs. Cole suddenly moved Bottle to fifth, putting in the first four a puppy with a round, light eye, and bad mouth. I am sure it must have been an unintentional slip. Mr. Stinemetz made it Bottle first and Bard second.

Later Mrs. Cole put Bottle first Bred-by-Exhibitor, over dogs (Continued on page 175) including Mrs. Batt's Canadian champion and best American bred at the 5-point Chicago show, Haldon Minstrel. This surprised me and I later inspected Minstrel closely. He is a fine, sound dog, good coat, great shower, fine mouth, head and eyes. A wee bit light in the body, and Mrs. Cole was running to very substantial dogs most of the time. She sent him out of the ring with others in Limit, in which class Mr. Stinemetz put him second.

Back now to some more agreements between the two arbiters:-Kenneth MacBain and his brother brought into the ring at both shows two fine black puppy bitches-Tower Hill Hope, owned by Kenneth; and Tower Hill Glamor, owned by the boys' father. They placed one-two, in that order at each show-truly just decisions, I think. Hope was also Reserve at the Specialty and Novice Winner at Westminster.

The success of Kenneth MacBain will delight those fostering the American-bred. He shows nothing else and his fine, true brindle, Cabrach Cabar, cleaned up both at Specialty and Westminster. He went to American bred, Open and Reserve at the Specialty. At Westminster he was American bred winner and second Open. Just to butt in again, I think I would have made him Open Winner at both shows, although he is decidedly on the large side.

Cabrach is sound, a good mover, has a fine coat and good all-round points. He has been a big winner and will keep on being We need more American breds so, I think. We need more American breds able to pull down the blues like this dog does, though personally I would prefer one just a bit smaller.

The Open class at the two shows brought probably more ringside discussion than any other class. Mrs. Cole put them: Cabrach Cabar, Gleniffer Ideal, Heather Premier and Albourne Royalist. Mr. Stinemetz made it: Heather Enchanter of Hitofa, Cabrach Cabar, Heather Premier and Scotsward Royalist. The latter was not shown under Mrs. Cole. He is another very large one. Ardmore Royalist was considered by Mr. Stinemetz and finally put fifth. He seemed to me too lacking in flanks to go to the top against stiff competition.

A truly unfortunate feature of both shows, and one that is too prevalent in all shows, was the absence of the better dogs from the benches. During eight trips to the benches between 10:00 A. M. and 5:30 P. M. at the Specialty, only one of the national or international dogs was to be found there for inspection. The situation was about the same at the Garden.

Because of acquaintance with some handlers and owners, I was able to inspect most of the good dogs in the boxes in which they were secreted. But, many a person could not. I saw one young breeder who traveled all the way from Tennessee, and two from equally great distances, who did not see even one of the dogs they really came to see except through brief, long-distance, ringside glances.

I myself, tied up in Washington, dashed back and forth on 2 A. M. trains and would have missed examination of the good dogs but for the reasons given above. There are many reasons why this is done, but not one of them is valid, in my opinion. Both breed and fancy have grown too big for such things and I trust that future shows-everywherewill find some thought given to the public on this point. And, by the public, I mean not just the passerby who drops in, but the average run of breeder and exhibitor. These spend many dollars and travel many miles at times to see the good dogs, inspect them and thereby learn what to seek in their own

They should not be denied that privilegeclose inspection. They should be urged to examine closely, given every opportunity to

Thereby lies true improvement of the breed and the fancy.

Personal Experiences In Breeding, Training and Feeding Scottish Terriers

By Charles F. Lynch, M. D., F. A. C. S., Red Gauntlet Kennels

THERE is a great thrill in breeding a good Scottie and having him win in keen competition.

This is not a haphazard proposition. It requires attention to detail, both in selection of your brood matron, the sire, the care of your new born puppies and

their subsequent training.

Blood lines are important-secure good ones, but do not rely on pedigree alone—there is no easier path to failure. Basically mate two good specimens, there is no other way. When choosing a brood matron look at her from the rear first: good quarters are most desirable; pick one of moderate size if you are considering quality; one not too short in body. A black brindle or gray black coat will cause no anxiety when preparing for show; let the faddist have the Wheatens and other odd colors; the public are rarely interested and the judges are never. Looking in front — the amber colored eye, undershot jaw, bat ears, thick skull, poor front legs are outstanding faults.

Choose a sire suited to your matron, of the same family tree, if possible, one that you know or have seen is best. Many of the best sires have inconspicuous show records. One may often choose a sire on the record of his progeny. Leon Whitney, an authority on breeding, recommends mating on the fourth day after the matron shows that she is willing to breed. I am prepared to endorse this recommendation from my own experi-

ence.

A young dog intended for stud purposes is best introduced to his vocation by an experienced handler, proper training requires patience and special knowledge and he may be initiated at from nine to ten months.

A puppy intended for exhibition should begin his career at three months of age; leash training is of the utmost importance. A dog that does not walk well, does not win, so begin early. Pluck out the long puppy hairs, comb out dead undercoat, groom and handle him frequently so that he soon accustoms himself to the pose required of the exhibition Terrier. Youngsters like to fight in the ring; the judge enjoys a show of spirit but an intractable one disrupts the whole show and he may be ordered to a

corner and forgotten; again a dog does not appear to his best advantage with his mouth open; his tongue hanging out or snarling and barking at his neighbor. Keep him quiet and well behaved; a short leash and a word or two will help. Bring your dog into the ring promptly when his class is called; one might just as well not come in at all, as come in late.

In our experience proper feeding of the brood matron and her puppies takes precedence in the successful raising of good Terriers.

Raw meat with a liberal amount of fat is the basis of our feeding, milk, eggs, kidney, liver cooked and green vegetables, such as spinach, tomatoes, carrots, lettuce, celery tops, onions, cauliflower and squash. Bones are never given in runs or on the ground, where there is any chance of fecal soiling. Bones occasionally in the box or crate, where one knows it is clean.

The expectant mother is given raw meat freely all through her period of gestation. It is varied at times and mixed with vegetables. A feeding of partly cooked kidney or liver once a week, and it is assumed that she has been wormed at least twice in the early weeks of her pregnancy. At the end of her period she is offered all the raw meat she cares for and what milk, fresh or sour, she wishes. For a day preceding whelping she may not eat but will drink freely of water.

I trust to the instinct of my animals and most of my knowledge comes from my observation of normal animal instinct.

I do not interfere in any way with the animal in labor. She is left to her own devices, unless an obvious abnormality presents, when one can render assistance. In the assisting of a difficult delivery, a presenting puppy may be grasped with a thin towel or cloth, the traction made downward and only synchronous with the labor pain or expulsive effort of the mother. Let the mother attend to it if she will; if not, rend the sac, cut the cord, tie it, wipe secretions from the mouth and gently press the sides of the chest to induce respiration. If the puppy cries it is breathing. Some times to stimulate breathing one can blow directly into the mouth through two or three layers of cheese cloth.

A healthy matron can nourish all of the puppies that she delivers; they nurse

in relays.

Those that are obviously undersized may be put to sleep or soon pass away naturally; a few whiffs of chloroform is more humane than the coarse method of drowning; one half ounce is sufficient

for all purposes.

As soon as the mother dog is placed in a warm and dry bed, she is offered a generous portion of raw meat, before she starts nursing her litter; she probably will eat a pound or more. Our custom is to leave with her a pint of milk with two eggs beaten with it and sweetened to satisfy her. Plenty of fresh water is left for her convenience. Our maxim is plenty of food for the nursing mother; our reward is healthy, strong puppies.

Our puppies are started on finely ground, lean meat and cream, or rich milk on the twenty-fifth day. Each one is taken in hand and spoon fed four times a day; at first little is taken, at the end of a week they are eating without assistance. Puppies are also fed egg and milk, which is left with them to help themselves. At five weeks the mother is usually taken away and they are then on their own.

It is best not to allow the mother in with the puppies when they are feeding—she will eat all their food and will snap at a puppy that attempts to share it with her.

Timid and indifferent feeders are fed separately, otherwise they will not thrive. This is very important. They will very near starve as the aggressive ones eat everything and bully them as well.

Worming is routine, five to six weeks, repeated in three weeks. A caution is to note that the puppy has swallowed the capsule; it is often held in the cheek to be spat out later; or as a danger the dissolving in the mouth which could be

We advise generous feeding of meat, eggs, milk and vegetables until well bevond the developmental stage; some roughage if you like for bulk, but the average should be three-quarters of a pound of meat with a liberal amount of fat each day. Do not overlook this fact that there are twice as many calories in fat than in lean meat. Vitamines are present in sufficient quantities in all these foods, sunlight helps them operate. I despise the taste of cod liver oil; I presume that my dog does also; I have never found the necessity of using it when I feed my animals, as I have described. I know that it has great medicinal value and should be tried, if other means fail.

Yeast is of value also; it is now prepared in a palatable form for dogs. It has been stated by the Health Department of New York City that, Vitamin D Milk is secured by feeding a ration of irradiated yeast to the herd of cattle and that drinking this milk will prevent rickets in babies, why not the same result in puppies, feeding the nursing mother a ration of yeast.

Rickets is a very common disorder in dogs and is responsible for their susceptibility to disease, such as distemper, pneumonia, deformed legs, etc.

The Scottish Terrier is a hardy animal and can stand any amount of exposure if properly nourished. If he is to be out all winter in cold climates, strip his outer coat off about October 15th and do not remove the hair from his head or ears in cold weather. In summer take his coat off when the hot weather arrives.

Keep the fleas from irritating him in the warm season. A dip in a preparation made for this purpose kills them instantly. Keep the sleeping quarters sprayed with Flit, Fly-Tox, or other such preparation. This and light feeding in summertime will keep your animal free of skin trouble.-Charles F. Lynch.

The 1933 Parade of Champions

By A. C. Hall, Hallcrest Kennels, East St. Louis, Illinois

T O REVIEW the Scottish Terrier champions of 1933 seemed a simple assignment until I endeavored to mould the mass of show data and breeding history into a story that would carry a reasonable amount of reader interest. There I gave up and so content myself with setting forth the facts, and letting the imagination of you who read supply the romance, the triumphs and the heart-breaks that accompanied the breeding and showing of these great Scotties and their less fortunate rivals. That only fourteen of an AKC registration of Forty-five Hundred and ten reached the coveted heights speaks volumes of the path they trod, and that a Thousand more Scotties were registered this year over last is eloquent of the breed's popularity.

Black Douglas V falls in the "Bred by Exhibitor" class, and went undefeated to Winners Dog in four shows from the Puppy Class. Born April 28th, 1932, he was first shown at Boston in November of '32, and in February, '33 completed his championship at New York Specialty, Westminster

and Newark. He is by Albourne Wattadorg O'Mine Brook out of Ch. Mine Brook Jessica, a Mine Brook Vindicated bitch.

Red Gauntlet's Friar Tuck was bred by Dr. and Mrs. C. F. Lynch, and is a black-brindle, born November 12th, 1931 by Ch. Heather Goldfinder, he by Ch. Albourne Reveller. Ornsay Bess II is Friar Tuck's dam. Friar Tuck began his show career as a puppy at Morris & Essex in 1932. His principal winning occurred in October and November, 1932 when, still a puppy, he accumulated thirteen championship points, finishing in Baltimore February, 1933.

Heather Sunshine was bred by James Chapman of Scotland, and during her show career was owned by Mrs. Marie A Stone, being sold after her championship to her present owner. She is a black, by Eng. and U. S. Ch. Heather Reveller of Sporran out of Heather Remembrance, an Eng. Ch. Heather Necessity bitch. Born September 10th, 1931, she forged her way to fame as Best of Winners at the New York Specialty, and continued her way through Newark, New Haven, Buffalo and Cleveland for the title. Her only defeats were at Westminster and Boston by Rookery Romance.

Ardmore Royalist, another "Bred by Exhibitor" dog, is by Ch. Ardmore Toddler out of Ch. Ardmore Keepsake, a Ch. Ardmore Skipper bitch. He is a black of sensational quality. Born June 2nd, 1932, he is undefeated by Scotty dog or bitch, and finished his championship in four shows in March, 1933. At his first show in Detroit, he topped all breeds to Best Dog in show.

Gaisgill Nosegay was bred by Mrs. C. M. Cross of Eng-

land, and is a black brindled son of Eng. Ch. Sandheys Silvertip of the Heather Necessity-Albourne Annie Laurie breeding. He is out of Gaisgill Ling, a Marksman of Docken bitch, and was born June 8th, 1931. He came out at the Southern shows of October, '32, and made his championship on the Southern circuit in February, March and April of '33. Shown eleven times, he was Winners Dog six times, Best of Breed five times and won the Terrier Group twice.

Redlington Rumpus was bred by H. B. Cathcart, Scotland, and is a black, born August 12th, 1930, by Heather Necessity out of Hillpark Adventure, a Ch. Albourne Barty bitch. Shown five times, he was Best of Breed at four of these shows, his only defeat being by Scotsward Sportsman at Tuscon, Arizona.

Rookery Romance was bred by A. J. Dickinson of England, and is a lovely black, born January 4th, 1931. She came to this country with her English title, and started her championship during the late summer shows of 1932, finishing at Westmin ter and Boston in February of 1933. Shown eleven

times, she was never lower than Best of Winners in the seven shows she won. She is by Albourne All Scotch out of Croindene Cabaret Girl, a Heather Necessity bitch, Albourne All Scotch being by Eng. Ch. Rookery Robin.

Diehard Reveller was bred in America by the Diehard Kennels. He is by Heather Reveller of Sporran out of Glenisla Griselda of Diehard, a Heather Necessity bitch. A black, born October 24th, 1931, he was shown extensively in late '32 and began his serious campaign in Washington, D. C. in April. In May he annexed seven more points at White-

marsh and Devon, and in June he completed his campaign. He was shown twenty-four times winning seven shows.

Ortley Patience of Hollybourne, a sister of Eng. Ch. Ortley Carmen, was bred by Conrad Bremer in England, and came to this country with her English championship. She was born March 16th, 1932, and owns Heather Necessity as grandsire in both brackets, being by Eng. Ch. Heather Fashion Hint out of Eng. Ch. Ortley Elegance. She is a sensational black bitch who was never less than Best of Winners during her title campaign, and achieved Best in Show, all breeds, at Greenwich and Mt. Kisco. Her first showing was at Morris & Essex on May 27th, and by June 4th she had completed her title.

Toddler O'Blairgowrie was born April 4th, 1930 and bred by Mr. and Mrs. Z. B. West, Jr., U. S. He is by Ch. Talavera Toddler out of Tyne Remeraber. He was campaigned over a period of a year and a half, beginning in (Continued on page 180)

February, 1932 at Baltimore and ending in September of 1933 at Oklahoma City. Shown twenty-three times, he was Winners Dog ten times, Best of Breed eight times and won the Terrier Group four times. Most of his showing was on the Mid-western circuit.

Walnut Aristocrat O'Briarcroft was bred by R. Lloyd of England, and is a black-brindle, by Heather Necessity out of Albourne Annie Laurie. Before coming to America he had won an English challenge certificate. Shown between March and September of 1933, he was Best in Show, All Breeds, twice at Columbus, and won five of his ten shows.

Talavera Myrtle of Lewspen was bred by Miss N. T. G. Hows of England, and is a brindle, born October 22nd, 1927. She is by Rookery Robin out of Lissenden Nickey, a Marksman of Docken bitch. She accumulated six championship points in 1930, six in 1931, two in 1932 and three in 1933, finishing at Dallas. In April, 1931 she was Best Dog in Show at New Orleans.

Walnut Judith O'Briarcroft was born March 7th, 1932, and was bred by Mrs. J. Sharp, England. Like Ortley Patience, she owns Heather Necessity as grandsire in both brackets, being by Heather Fashion Hint out of Queen of the Roses of Rookes. She is a black bitch, first shown at Sewickley, Pa. in July. Her serious campaign began in August, and she then won four shows, at Columbus, Indianapolis, Louisville and finished at the Chicago Specialty show in October.

Ardmore Toddler also falls in the "Bred by Exhibitor" class. He is the sire of Ardmore Royalist, and Mr. Mc-Kinven re-acquired him from Mr. and Mrs. D. P. Caulkins. He is by Ch. Ardmore Legacy out of Ardmore Jewel, an Int. Ch. Albourne Adair bitch, and finished his championship in October and November at East Lansing, Michigan and Des Moines.


The officers and members of the ken-
