HERE'S the Second Annual Scottish Terrier Issue of the Dog News, and we should like to thank everyone for the whole-hearted support which they have accorded the issue. Unfortunately, several splendid articles had to be carried over until next month. William Singleton was unable to contribute this month as he was in a serious accident recently, in which his car was struck by a train. When he has recuperated his article will be forthcoming. Again, thanks to all who have helped us to make this Special Scottish Terrier Issue possible.

Cabrach Cairn owned by Dr. Flora M. Polstead is pictured in this issue. Cabrach has had a splendid show record, having won the 1933 Specialty Show of America and the Morris & Essex event the same year. He was Best of Winners at Ridgewood and Best of Breed at Trenton in 1934. Besides these wins, Cabrach has taken fourteen first and five Reserve Winners and he placed first in the American-bred class two years in succession at Westminster. He was Reserve this year at Newark to Eng. Ch. Albournie handman.

Elizabeth Hall has a litter of five by Goldfraders Knockout out of an Albournie flatter bitch.

C. R. Jackson of the Kokosing Kennel, Mt. Vernon, Ohio, has just completed negotiations for the purchase of the sensational black bitch, Albournie Sylvia by Gangall Nicholas out of Gangall Sylvia, the dam of

the sensational Eng. Ch. Heather Realization. Mr. Cowley described this bitch as being one of the best he had ever owned at any time and stated she had an exceptional head with small black eyes, small ears and "a dead straight front." Sylvia is being bred to Ch. Heather Fashion Hint before sailing.

The Durincourt Kennel, Newport, Tenn., have bred one of their good bitches to Bruce Webb's Middlefemot Tam.

Fred Finney's bitch, Ch. Pobble of Harken, has just been mated to Dr. Ewing's Ch. Albournie Royalist.

Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Day of St. Paul have purchased Maizee of Alvin Farms from Mrs. Emma E. Hunter. Her new owners write she is a beauty; a daughter of Albournie Wattadog O'Mine Brook. She has been bred to the Days' Black Jonathan, their 1934 American-bred Champion.

Mrs. Marie R. Cooper, Memphis, Tenn., writes she has recently purchased a young dog from Kenneth MacLain, that should be a great benefit to the breeders in the Tennessee district, as he has a marvelous coat, is extremely compact and short backed. He is a son of Necessity, and a grandson of Fashion Hint on his dam's side, she being a full sister to the immortal Annie Laurie. Mrs. Cooper has bred her good Ch. Bull-thistle of Nossagey bitch to Ch. Walnut Aristocrat.

Mrs. A. K. McCallagh of Philadelphia, writes that Golden Thistle, of Docken has presented her with three lovely puppies sired

by Far Away Fuchin Marjanna. Golden Thistle is a wheaten and her owner writes she is very low to the ground, has a lovely long head and carries a glorious coat. Incidentally, Mrs. McCallagh tells us that wheaten puppies are very often almost black when born, and that their final color cannot be determined until they are about six or seven months of age. The present litter of Golden Thistles all had light hair on their heads when born and one was born with a red gold coat. All are rapidly turning wheaten. Golden Thistle was imported some time ago, from Miss Wick's famous kennel.

THE Specialty and Westminster have come and gone. Breeders who were unable to attend these shows will probably be interested in learning that at both shows the Scottish rings were the center of attraction. It was almost impossible to get to the ringpile at either of the shows. The Specialty, from the standpoint of entries, proved to be the greatest American-bred exposition of Scottish Terriers that has yet been given—John McOwan should feel highly complimented at the turnout. The Catalogue listed 122 Scotties, with an entry of 127. Very few were absent and the quality was excellent.

At Westminster, where Mrs. T. D. Duzant did the judging, there were 197 dogs entered with 122 entries. Scotties were second only to Wires in the Terrier classes. The quality at the Garden was much the same as at the Specialty, and should be very gratifying to the officers of both shows.

John Gaudin again came into the limelight. Collapsoid Chapman took the honors at both the Specialty and Westminster, and was beaten only for Best of Breed by the recent importation of S. L. Fowles' Halybournie Hospital, sired by Chick Geranium and out of Chick Charmaine.

Jim Horton is very enthusiastic in his description of Geranium. He says he is really good, and his coat defies adequate description.

The New York shows were not complete. We could not locate Dr. Foyote C. Ewing, the dean of some breeders, anywhere. We learned later that Dr. Ewing sent a telegram expressing his regrets at being unable to attend the Specialty and the annual dinner.

The new officers of the Scottish Terrier Club of America are as follows: President, George W. Gale; Vice President, Morgan Stuenkel; Secretary-Treasurer, Robert D. Harborsie; Delegate to the American Kennel Club, Henry D. Rothy; Delegate at Large, C. Foster Browning; Governor, H. Allen McAllexan; Carl E. Smith, Dr. Foyote C. Ewing and Herbert P. Emory.

The old justice tender and judge, Ervin Bell, of Red Grange, Wisconsin, was seen straining his neck over the shoulders at the ringpile of the Scotnies at the Specialty.

Best Month, of Champion Eng. Blood fame on the West Coast, was seen going from ring-

Continuing popularity of the Scottish Terrier is evidenced by 5799 registrations for 1934 as compared with 4310 in 1933, and 3511 in 1932; and 31 American Kennel Club Champions in 1934 compared with 14 in 1933 and 22 in 1932. Fourteen of this year's champions were American-bred as compared with only six in 1933, and 1934 saw the first American-bred bitch champion since 1932, this honor rather appropriately falling to Robert D. Hartshorne, the breeder and owner of Monagh Lea Black Bess, by in this fashion celebrating his election as Secretary of the Scottish Terrier Club.

THE 265th American Kennel Club champion, Heather Commandeur of Diehard, was bred by Robert Chapman and is by Br. Ch. Merlewood Aristocrat out of Ormsay Matron, a Ch. Ormsay Brave bitch.

Ch. Broxton Buttonhook O'Briarcroft was bred by N. L. Horabin, and is by Bravo of Corsic out of Wruckwardine Dawn.

Ch. Rosehall Rouser was bred by W. Crawford, and is by Br. Ch. Heather Fashion Hint out of Rosehall Maid, a Ch. Albourne Reveller bitch. Shown extensively in California, he has accounted for 9 Best of Breeds, 6 since he acquired his title, and won the Terrier Group at Oakland and San Mateo.

Ch. Bill Whiskers was bred by M. Willis and is by Br. Ch. Albourne Brigand of Diehard out of Kiltane Flora, a Ch. Albourne Reveller bitch.

Br. and U. S. Ch. Lonkley Larkspur of Hinfia was the 19th Scottie to add an AKC title of her British one. Bred by Mr. and Mrs. Walton, she is by Br. Ch. Heather Necessity out of Lonkley Lea, a Ch. Merlewood Aristocrat bitch. She was brought over by the late Frank Spickerman, with whom she acquired all but two of her points, and finished this year under the colors of the Marlu Farm Kennel.

Ch. Spornan Roger, the year's first American-bred, was bred by S. S. Van Dine, and is by Nordic Roger out of Lauriczon Lovelace. He started his show career as first Puppy in 1932 at the Specialty, Westminster, Newark, Hartford and Boston. Purchased in 1933

by C. B. Goes, Jr., he was shown to his title in March and April. He won the Terrier Group at Auburn, Indiana.

Ch. Scotswald Royalist was bred by Mrs. C. B. Ward, and is by Glenisla Sterling of Scots-

Heather Fashion Hint out of Br. Ch. Orley Elegance. A sensation at the February Specialty and Westminster shows, the last account for six Best of Breeds, and the Terrier Group at Waltham, Mass., Washington, D. C., and Hewlett Harbor, L. I.

Ch. Clover's Alert was bred by Mrs. L. Holliday, and is by Ch. Balgay Battister, another 1934 champion, out of Dunkle Dorr, a Ch. Abernay Grog bitch.

Ch. Hinfia Chief was bred by James Chapman, and is by Heather Fashion Hint out of Heather Solitaire, a bitch of the famous Heather Necessity-Albourne Romance mating. Chief thus owns Nemesis as his only grand-sire. His wins at the Specialty and Westminster shows were an immediate stamp of his quality.

Ch. Quince Hill Racketeer falls in the Brody-Exhibition class. He is by Br. Ch. Albourne Brigand of Diehard out of Quince Hill Maggie, she by Ormsay Hunter of Diehard, and he by Ch. Merlewood Aristocrat. He was Western Dog at Morris and Essex.

Ch. Red Gauntlet's Blue Chip is another bred-by-exhibitor dog of Dr. and Mrs. C. F. Lynch. He is a litter brother of the 1933 Ch. Red Gauntlet's Frier Tuck, and is by Ch. Heather Goldblender out of Ormsay Bess II, a bitch who has produced many good ones. She is by a son of Ch. Albourne Vindicated of Bentley out of Ch. Ormsay Bess of Earlshill, who in turn is by Ch. Ormsay Brave.

The American Scottie Stud

By Donald M. Ewing

THE questions of importations, of American breeds—whether studs or bitches for breeding purposes, or whether purely for showing—is one that has always intrigued me. An ardent supporter always of American breeds—perhaps just a liking for the home country, or perhaps a desire to see our breeders equal those abroad—I have wondered many times what the solution to this always debatable question will be.

For the Scottie issue of THE DOG NEWS, I suggested to the associate editor that I poll a majority of the outstanding kennels—particularly the kennels maintaining their own studs—and seek information which might enable me to give a composite word picture of the Scottie stud in America today, the tendency in the studs in our kennels as to size, height, weight, color, et cetera, and to generally discuss the studs in this side of the Atlantic without going into personalities. In other words, without actually mentioning

are entirely accurate, I would personally draw these conclusions:

1.—The vast majority of the Scottie studs in our kennels, of course, are imported.

2.—The vast majority trace their male ancestry within not more than two generations to the great Heather Necessity, which the Chapman brothers at Glenboig, Scotland, believe to be the greatest sire ever produced, or to Albourne Barry, another with an almost unparalleled record abroad.

3.—The American bred studs of outstand-

any one dog or any one kennel as compared with another.

I received stud cards, and in most cases explanatory letters, from some fifty kennels. They ranged from far up in New England to up and down in California; from out in Oregon to down in Louisiana. The composite is interesting. If the replies I have received

ing producing ability may be counted without using all the fingers of one hand.

4.—There is more and more tendency to looseness to length of head, not too much weight and diversity of color in available studs here.

5.—An increasing tendency on the part of larger kennels, keeping two or more noted studs, to always have at many handles—of some shade or other—as blacks.

Putting the measurements into a composite, the stud in America today would seem to be about as follows, according to these kennel claims:

Weight: 19½ to 22 pounds; complete discouragement for any greater weight and few placing their studs at above 20 pounds.

Height at shoulder: 9½ to 10½ inches, varying with weight.

Feeding the Scottish Terrier

Dr. Chas. F. Lynch

MY concern with the breed is the production of healthy, disease-resisting animals in the care and protection of the expectant mother prior to and after her delivery, and in the healthy development of the puppies. That in my opinion, born by experience in raising many litters, is entirely dependent upon proper feeding; protein, carbohydrates, fats, minerals and vitamins are

Good condition is to be judged in the flesh which should be just sufficient to round off the form of the body over the bony frame work. Over feeding leads to obesity; the aim should be to feed the smallest quantity necessary to be consistent with good condition and function.

The female in whelp needs plenty of animal food during the whole course of her pregnancy, plenty immediately after whelping and during the entire time of her nursing. Milk at the entire time is perhaps the most important single article of her diet.

the basis of the diet and provide the body with its growth material and with energy and reserve for repair and disease resistance.

There is no complete utilization of food without the vital principle known as the Vitamins. "Food without vitamins is dead food." A perfectly balanced ration without vitamins cannot sustain healthful life; neither can vitamins alone, but in combination they represent all there is to a diet for maintaining a healthy organism.

Vitamins are present in abundance in natural foods such as young leaves and shoots, greens, grains, fruits, vegetables, tubers and roots, eggs, milk, fresh meats, glandular organs (kidneys, livers) tripe and animal fats.

The vitamin value of foods is often low due to insufficient intake of natural food stuffs or to their treatment prior to consumption. Boiling, cooking, pasteurization, storage, decomposition, drying, canning, preserving, etc., definitely reduce or completely destroy vitamins. Canned tomatoes is a notable exception to this rule. Foods that do not include an adequate supply of whole milk, glandular organs, butter and other animal fats, eggs, fresh green vegetables, and fruits and whole meat foods are likely to be deficient dietaries.

As dogs are essentially carnivorous animals, the principle source of their food is obtained from the animal kingdom; milk, eggs, meat, glandular organs, animal fats and bone. In the fresh raw state, these foods retain the quality of being protective against vitamin deficiency. It is therefore important to start the young out right by feeding raw foods, bearing in mind that cooking and other processes destroy the vital principle of the dietary. The dog may get along without vegetables and be perfectly well upon a diet of milk, eggs, raw beef or lamb and raw glandular organs; some will not take fresh milk but will take butter-milk.

"The Docken Twins"

POOOL Mrs. Ewing tried valiantly to steer the channels of thought in directions other than Scotties while we were making our delightfully leisurely way over to Britain last August, but with not much response from the Doctor, and none whatsoever from me, she got quite towfere. I spent every waking moment (saving those long intervals at meals where our more than charming table companions joined us in our mad foolishness which so shocked our harassed waiter, and whom I shall always think of as having been inordinately frightened by something early in life!) in dwelling fondly on the pleasures awaiting me in Scotie-land.

I was harboring a secret desire: Would it be possible to secure a bitch descended tail-female from Annie Laurie, or perhaps a bonnie daughter of Markman, and in my more delicious moments I fancied the bliss of securing a daughter of Mark, and also descended tail-female from Annie Laurie! Mad dreams which I told myself were impossible, but the funny thing is I ended up with two granddaughters of Annie Laurie, and both out of perhaps her two most famous daughters, i. e., Ch. Alboune Bruw Lass and Alboune Sequence, but to top the climax, I discovered Miss Wijk had a good winning bitch on sale, just ready for breeding, and I grabbed her up with a mating to old Mark. But kind Fate had had too much of my enthusiasm, and the bitch failed to conceive. I'm not over my bitter disappointment yet for I had in mind what Bobbie Chapman had said, and what he afterwards wrote me in those words: "It is generally recognized that Annie Laurie is the greater brood bitch of all time; I think you will know her record as

well as anyone else. *Bitches from Markman of Docken are very, very valuable to breed from.*" (Italics mine.) "Most of the best terriers today have Annie Laurie and Markman blood. Bitches of this blood seem to suit the more recent blood of Necessity and Fashion Hint."

Under date of October 16, 1934, Miss Wijk wrote me as follows:

"Now in answer to your question: 'Well, Markman and Annie Laurie were the second litter or so I bred! There were only three pups in it; the third is owned by Mrs. MacBain in Scotland and called Chance Lassie. (I don't think she has ever bred anything of note.) Well this was also, incidentally, the only litter that *Ch. Michael of Docken* ever bred! I stated her (to several different dogs) gave her all kinds of treatments but of no avail. Annie Laurie was first registered by me as 'Melody of Docken' and I called them Mark and Melody, hence the name 'Markman'."

"Mr. Brogan did not change her name, but Mr. Cowley did. I never bred from her as I sold her at Crufts Show when she was 9 months old. The name 'Docken' comes from a little stream in the New Forest, where I first started my kennel. I thought it so pretty and suitable for Scotties."

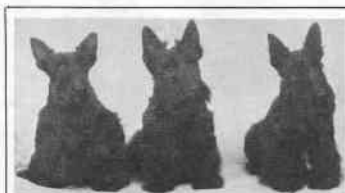

I think considering he had not the opportunities of some of the fashionable sires, he certainly has stamped his type . . . and his name figures in most of the modern Champions and winners."

There is a peculiar thing to be discovered in a later article about Markman's connection with those best five champions. It will be incorporated in another study of pedigree, in response to a flood of letters asking for more of this "bitch" business.

Now it is always a matter of heated interest when any showdog lets go of a great producer, but when one lady not only "gives" away the greatest brood ever known, and then in a few years sells what turns out to be a close contender for that same crown, in much the same manner . . . then the world wants to know why. I asked Mrs. Wijk just this and she wrote:

The Blue and Tan Scottie!

Editor's Note: Mr. MacBain, owner of the famous Diehard Kennels at Closter, N. J., has been associated with Scotties since childhood. He is one of the nation's most noted judges and authorities on the Scottish Terrier.

SPEAKING of color reminds me of a couple of dogs I knew in my boyhood in Aberdeen when Scotties "held a strong hold." Mr. Cummings of the Bonnacorders and Mr. Atlatson of the Ashleys lived in and kept their kennels in that city, so we can be assured of the Silver City's inhabitants being keen on the native Terrier breed.

I was part owner with a boy friend of a Scottie bitch that was dark slate blue with light tan markings. She was low and cobby in build and with erect but bigish ears. Her eyes had that keen expression we so much like, but—alas!—they were a light brown. Meg—by name—was a keen ratter, which

was her undoing for one day on backing off a blind drain she got under the wheel of a loaded cart and was killed. Poor Meg!

The other dog I remember from those was a red wheaten that lay part of each day on the top step of his owner's candy shop (an old woman) which was three steps down from the sidewalk. This dog must have been all of 24 to 26 pounds in weight, but a well-proportioned dog, in no way leggy. He had a long, lean head. His eyes were keen and brown—a real Terrier expression.

But both of his ears were way down—and what a coat he had! He feared nothing that wore hair and nearly killed a Fighting Bull Terrier that was all at five or six pounds heavier.

He was still daring on the top step the last time I saw him. I can't remember his name, but he was a Scottie to remember, and it is fifty years ago.

sides to ringside at the Specialty. Best showed us an awfully good time in California, taking us around to the various kennels. We were glad to see him at the Show.

A. C. Cowley has often remarked: "All judges should pick the same fawn. As to how the fawn are placed is a matter of each judge's ideal." There is some truth in Mr. Cowley's observations.

What are we breeding for? Puppies or to attain an ideal?

In breeding one must have an ideal to work to, and he must work to that ideal. The first problem is to purchase a real, out-

impression of a modern Scottie is upon an inexperienced inbreeder? One would naturally think that the impression would be that the head was the largest part of the dog. Sitting at the ringside and listening to the casual observer, one gets an entirely different impression. What we hear around the ringside from the novice would lead us to believe that there is not enough attention being given to a moderate length of neck, the sort of neck that is shapely and yet muscular. At Westminster I heard one individual make the remark that a certain Scottie was too low to the ground. It seems to me that it is quite possible with the increased shortness in back, the greater depth of body, and the longer head, that we are overlooking uniformity, the grace of outline that is possible when proper attention is paid to the neck. We should be careful in our breeding not to breed too low and too closely a dog—one which looks as if its head and shoulders are all one. Let's not exaggerate, but keep close to the line set up by the standards.

Isabelle Sherry, a recent import of Mr. and Mrs. Joyce Killip, went to Best of Breed at the Palm Springs, California Show. Sherry is a black bitch who makes the most of herself at all times.

Wynneway, Wisp O'Heather, one of the show bitches of Wynneway Kennels, has been bred to Ch. Heather Goldfinder. Bob Wain is looking for a flyer in the coming litter.

Wynneway Walnut Maide by Ch. Walnut Aristocrat started her show career on the Markato-St. Paul-Minneapolis Show Circuit. She was handled by Art Craney. She is now being conditioned for some of the latest spring shows to add to the blues she has already secured.

standing, well-bred bitch. Second, one must start looking for the right sire to breed her to. The sire should be strong in the points in which the bitch is weak. Find out what type of puppies the sire is throwing. Be sure he is emphasizing his strong points which are the weak points in your bitch. When you have once found that sire, stick to him until you accomplish the result you have started out to obtain.

An excellent article on this particular point appears in Ben Brown's column in *Dog Chat* for February. Every breeder should read Ben's column.

Description and Standard of Points

(By Courtesy of the Scottish Terrier Club of America)

The Scottish Terrier is a sturdily built, low set, little dog, possessing a philosophic and independent nature. Not quarrelsome, but when fighting is to be done, not soon finisled with it. He takes a friendly interest in the family, possesses the tact and unassuming self-confidence of assured strength, but is usually devoted to but one master. Originally used to hunt fox and other vermin, today it is as the household pet that we know him.

The standard adopted by this club shall be the same as that of the Scottish Terrier Club of Scotland, as follows:

Skull: Proportionately long, slightly domed, and covered with short, hard hair, about three-quarters of an inch long or less. It should not be quite flat as there should be a sort of stop, or drop between the eyes.

Muzzle: Very powerful and gradually tapering toward the nose, which should always be black, and of a good size. The jaws should be perfectly level and the teeth

Chest: Broad in comparison to the size of the dog, and proportionately deep.

Body: Of moderate length, not so long as a sky's and rather flat-sided, but well ribbed up and exceedingly strong in hindquarters.

Legs and Feet: Both fore and hindlegs should be short and very heavy in bone, the former being straight or slightly bent and well set on under the body, as the Scottish Terrier should not be set at elbows. The hocks should be bent, and the thighs very muscular; the first strong and thickly covered with short hair, the forefeet being larger than the hind ones, and well let down on the ground.

Tail: which is never cut, should be about 7 inches long, carried with a slight bend, and often gaily.

Coat: Should be rather short, about 2 inches, intensely hard and wiry in texture and very dense all over the body.

Size: About 16 pounds to 18 pounds for a bitch, and 18 pounds to 20 pounds for a dog.

Colors: Steel or iron-gray, brindle or grizzled, black, sandy and wharsten. White markings are objectionable and can only be allowed on the chest, and that to a small extent.

General Appearance: The face should wear a very sharp, bright, active expression and the head should be carried up. The dog, owing to the shortness of his coat, should appear to be higher on the leg than he really is, but at the same time he should look compact and possessed of great muscle in the hindquarters. In fact, a Scottish Terrier, though essentially a terrier, cannot be too powerfully put together. He should be from 9 inches to 12 inches in height.

FAULTS

Muzzle: Either under or overhang.

Eyes: Large or light-colored.

Ears: Large, round to the points, or droop. It is also a fault if they are too heavily covered with hair.

Coat: Any slickness, wave or tendency to curl is a serious blemish, as is also an open coat.

Size: Any specimens over 20 pounds should not be encouraged.

It should be the spirit and purpose of the judge in deciding the relative merits of two or more dogs to consider the approximation of nature to the standard rather than the effect of artificiality.

square, though the nose projects somewhat over the mouth, which gives the impression of the upper jaw being longer than the under one.

Eyes: Set wide apart, of a dark hazel color; small, piercing, very bright and rather sunken.

Ears: Very small, prick or half-prick, but never droop. They should be sharply pointed but not cut. The hair on them should not be long, but velvety. The ears should be free from any fringe at the top.

Neck: Short, thick and muscular, strongly set on sloping shoulders.

Our Cover

CH. HEATHER PREMIER, the outstanding brindle stud dog, owned by Mrs. Marie A. Stone of Milwaukee, is pictured on our cover this month. Premier is a son of Ch. Heather Fashion. Hair set of Gartcoch Laura and his pedigree is an interesting one indeed. On his sire's side, he has as grandparents, Ch. Heather Necessity and Inerkip Irena; on his dam's side, he has Ch. Albourne Barty and Ravenscraig Laura's.

Ch. Heather Premier and his kennel mate, Ch. Heather Fragrance, both finished their championships on the southwest circuit in October. Premier started his show career in 1934 at the Specialty and Westminster, where he was Third in the Open Dog class and then went on to Newark to take First in the Open and Reserve Winners. The following week in New Haven he was First in the Open and Winners and in July, 1934, he was Winner and Best of Breed at Lake Forest. In September he was Winner and Best of Winners at Northbrook and in October on the Texas circuit he was Winner at Dallas, San Antonio and then at Shreveport.

He is described as a very dark brindle, of the correct size, having tremendous bone and an extremely short back with a long head, perfect mouth, eyes and ears, and an excellent coat. He is a sound mover at both ends. Mrs. Stone is more than pleased with the type of puppy which he has been siring and she has a lovely bitch by him which she is bringing out at this year's Morris & Egan event.

The American Scottie Stud

Head: About 9½ inches by tape, which means usually 8½ by caliper, according to how accurately the tape was used.

Color: Black predominating in the individual coat, but more and more breeders pointing out that their studs "black" coat has "some brindle sprinkled through"; pure blacks still in the lead, however.

Now, when it comes to measurements and weights, I do not want anyone to think I am trying to set up a standard of such for Scotties. No one knows better than I that these things may mean little. I present them only as matters of interest. One of England's great judges has stated:

"I never weigh them; I never measure them. I just look at them."

Nothing could be more true than the sentiment he intended to express. Mr. William MacLain of Closter, N. J., pointed out that a dog might be 9 inches at the shoulder and yet be extremely high in appearance because of shortness of body. Or, a dog may weigh 20 pounds and be spread out like a Dachshund. Or, again, a dog may be 19½ inches at the shoulder and yet be low though being a heavy one, yet well proportioned.

It is the general proportion of the dog that counts—not the actual measurements—yet these measurements are straws in the wind as to general tendency when considered in a roll of this kind covering nearly all major kennels, except a few whose addresses I could not obtain at the time.

The difference in views as to height and weight is illustrated by the following two letters to me from prominent breeders—persons whose names are by-words in the Scottie fancy. The first:

"This dog is grey brindle—absolutely correct. Shoulder height 19½ inches, weight 22 pounds."

The second:

"This Scottie is about as near to perfection as they come. He is 8½ inches at the shoulder and weighs 19 pounds."

Note the difference in measurements; yet, perhaps each dog is fine as to proportion and a fine picture in the ring. One of them is, I know, for I saw him at a show not long ago.

An astounding thing to me is the fact that virtually no stud owner details in a stud card much about eye, tail, straightness of back, movement, mouth, ears, texture of coat, spring of ribs, front, and such things that to me are essential to round out the true Scottie. I realize that few of them count a great deal individually as points in the standard, but they count a lot when you are picking a sire, or when you are picking a winner.

The average stud card is about like the

one that came before it. It describes a "low, short, long headed dog of fine appearance."

I think we fail to place enough emphasis on movement.

I once heard a young Eastern breeder who has a tremendous ancestral background in the fancy and who is breeding Westminster winners, say as he watched some twenty Scotties in a ring:

"Not two good movers in the lot. If they aren't good movers they aren't good Scotties."

All the head, however, and out in the world can't make a Scottie look good—except when he is standing still; and the Scottie is a dog supposed to be on the move all the time.

Many of the outstanding Scottie studs of today are, of course, in the east. This is no reflection on the middle west, the far west or the south. Scottie breeding, once it got under way, quickly centered in the east both as to quantity and quality. There are many reasons for this, chiefly that wealth is centered in the east and consequently the great impetus were brought over largely by easterners.

However, there is a noticeable swing mid-westward and southward as the stud properties of various kennels are studied. The Pacific Coast recently has been importing some fine dogs to build up its stock and there is the same tendency in the south, and, especially, in the southwest.

It is also noticeable that many breeders outside the east now are importing fine brood

hutches, already in which to such noted British sires as Heather Necessity, Heather Fashion Hint, Albourne Barry, and others whose names figure so largely in the pedigrees of our own champions.

All in all, the stud situation here—so far as developing American bred studs is concerned—looks brighter and brighter. But, there still is a long way to go.

For information and assistance in preparing this I want to thank the entire Scottish fancy, north, east, south and west. I especially want to thank Mr. A. C. Hall, ardent keeper of pedigrees, for sending me pedigrees of some 75 living Scottish Champions.

"I sold Annie Laurie as she was an only, and being a novice at the time, I was very disappointed and disheartened with her. Even in later years she was never much to get her tail up in the ring. But when I showed her she just crawled around with her tail between her legs!

"Re: Wishing Whisper . . . at the time she was born I was moving and had nowhere to put my dogs. I boarded the whole litter with Mrs. Gabriel from the age of about 3 weeks to 3 months while I was in France. On my return I sold practically all my pups, having still no place permanent for them. Capt. Phillips bought three bitches, Wishing Whispers being one. They were about 3 months old, nine at three, and I did not keep any except the only dog pup and he died later of distemper!

"So that's the reason why I let those bitches leave my hands. J. Wijk."

I wrote both Mr. Bronnan and Mr. Lloyd, just as I was sailing from Southampton, for certain bits of information about Annie Laurie, but I have not had the courtesy of a reply as yet. However, Mr. Cowley answered my inquiries thus:

"The reason why I sold Albourne Annie Laurie for forty pounds was because I was absolutely disgusted by the way judges who should have known better, treated her. If ever a bitch should have been a champion she should. And although her type would be out of date today, yet at the time I was showing her she was one of the best SHOW bitches in England. True, she was not always a good shower, but on occasions when she was Reserve Ch. she did really show. It has always been my contention that a dog or bitch continually being Reserve for Champion Certificate rarely get made up. Judges who don't know plus for safety and place them as other judges placed them. Anyhow, the one and only reason why I sold her was in sheer disgust at her treatment and also at that time she had been no champions, though Ch. Albourne Braw Lays, Ch. Albourne Reveller, Ch. Albourne Brigand, Albourne Sequenz and two others who were ultimately champions in America, were in my kennels and about 4 months old, and although of great promise did not stand out as champions. They were of the improving kind . . . out of the type that win at 7 and 8 months and are forgotten at 18 months.

"I believe Bronnan gave Miss Wijk either nine or twelve pounds for her and at that time she would not show. Bronnan brought her out at a show at Uxbridge, under W. J. Nichols, and she showed for all she was worth and I either gave fifty or one hundred pounds for her. I believe one hundred.

"Both Annie Laurie and Markoman of Docken were brought out as puppies at Bath Show under the late Mr. Tward and at that time they looked all heads and drain pipe bodies, but they kept on improving and improving beyond recognition.

"I never had a photo of this bitch. I consider she was the greatest bitch that ever lived. A. G. Cowley."

At the kennels I saw old Twinkle and Brilliant, with the great Markoman as lapper as a puppy, hunting rats. He is a most magnificent old Roman, full of fire and active as a cat; utterly fearless but lovable without. His teeth were going with age, but the mouth was still perfect. Eyes twinkled up at us with no diminution in their lustre. His back would look long against that of his great grandson, Reclamation, but a real size still, and it was with a feeling of real sadness that I left him in his kennel that late twilight, looking at me in his great friendly way, as though to ask: "Why are you leaving so soon? Come back and let's go racing!" My depression was lightened by the hope of leaving a letter to him, before mentioned, but even so I left him reluctantly, knowing it was unreasonable to hope to see what I consider a great sire, and a sadly unappreciated one, again ever, for he is now in the dust of a long life.

The Morris & Essex Show

MORRIS & ESSEX promises even bigger and better things in 1935 than in 1934, if that is possible. For some months, plans have been going forward, and as previously announced, the show will be held this year on Saturday, May 25th, at the Glenside estate of Mr. and Mrs. M. Hartley Dodge.

There is more prize money than ever being offered. Approximately \$14,000 will be impartially allotted throughout all breeds. The entry fee is but \$5.00 and cash awards will be \$10.00, \$5 and \$2, instead of \$5, \$3 and \$2 as in former years. Remember, these cash prizes are offered in every breed in every class, regardless of the number of dogs.

This year there will be 75 breeds in the regular competition, 10 more than last year. Another innovation in the trophy list will be a prize for the first four winners in every variety group, also the usual prizes in the brace class. The sterling silver trophies to be won outright amount to approximately \$5,000 in value; in addition to the prizes mentioned, many of the Specialty Clubs are offering cash prizes and in quite a number of instances, it doubles the amounts stated here.

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The setting of Morris & Essex is so delightful, so much is done for the comfort and convenience of exhibitors, competition is so keen and prizes so profuse, that one is really missing something, and something good, when they do not take in this show.

Judging starts at 10 in the morning and continues to mid-afternoon, permitting everyone to leave the ground around 6 o'clock. Exhibitors, as a matter of fact, are permitted to leave as soon as their breeds are judged, providing, of course, they haven't won Best of Breed and are not needed for group competition and who worries about staying to compete in a group!

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The Flint, Michigan, Event

The annual All-Breed show of the Genesee County Kennel Club will be held on June 16th this year at Flint, Mich. The club have again secured the L. M. A. Auditorium for their show. havoc on the day. Based on ideal but to the winner in soundness, though I do not consider him an unsound dog, but he is not as sound as the winner.

Champion The Crossspring is indeed a champion, is hard to fault, but had to give way on the day, in my opinion, to a larger dog, equally as perfect, being better, in my opinion, before the eyes.

Champion Drinkwater Moonshine, the winner, is a dog of approximately 60 pounds weight, all of a heavy, tremendous substance, good ribs, good tuck-up of loin, low to the ground, but not too low, short back in comparison with his lowness to the ground, good tail, tremendous skull, flat as it should be, very wide and well turned up underjaw, with good lay back and true bulldog expression. He is a white and brindle pied dog and shows in perfection. On the day, he looked to me to be the best American-bred we have ever had.

Three of these four champions that competed for best of breed are American-bred. Taking this into consideration with the American-bred dogs shown in other classes, especially in puppies, I don't think we Americans will have to go abroad for Bulldogs.

I wish to thank the ring stewards, Mr. William T. Drew and Mr. Felix A. Donnelly, who were very painstaking and adept.
