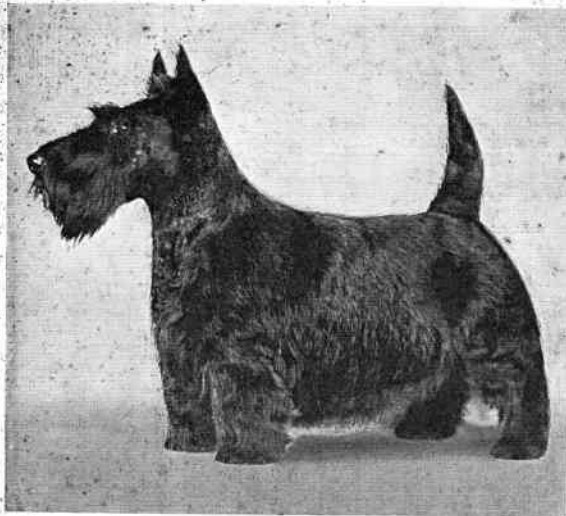

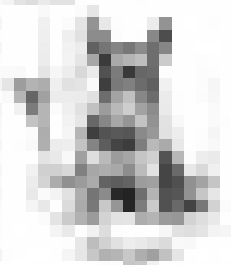

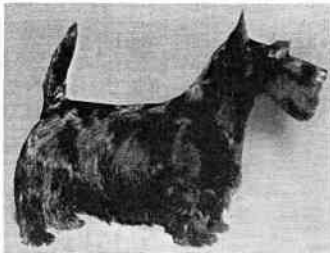

He has three crosses to Necessity and I see a blending of the characteristics of the two famous dogs. He will not be shown for the time being, as he needs resting after his long trip."

Mr. Webb is planning to bring out two puppies by Middlemount Tam ex, a daughter

Conn., who is placing him at stud to the public and is planning on showing him.

This little black Scottie, pictured in this issue, is a son of Heather Gold Finder and is out of Mr. Roby's little show bitch, Hallcrest Bellaire Star-Dusk. Star-Dusk owns as her only grandpups the four great producing champions—Heather Fashion Hint, Rosette of Rooker, Alboune Barty and Walsing Whimper. These four dogs have produced over 50 champions, and combined with Gold Finder's eleven champions make a total of over 61 champions produced by three dogs and two bitches within the first three generations of this pedigree.

Gold Seeker, or "Lucky," as he is called, has had a very successful show career thus far and it is expected that he will soon reach the top. He was Winner at the June (1936) Chicago Puppy Match when less than three months of age. Since then he has been shown at four puppy matches and one all-breed show and has won his class every time; was Reserve once, Winner once, twice Best of Breed, Reserve best junior male in show all breeds once, and finished off his show career

## Aftermath

IN THE extended obituaries of Champion Heather Necessity in Our Dogs nothing was said as to the immediate cause of death of this seemingly healthy and animated dog as I saw him last summer, and as he appeared to Mrs. Casperiz, who preceded me on a visit to Heather Kennels. In reply to a letter of inquiry Mr. Chapman says: "I think Necessity died of heart failure; he had only two hours of illness, breathing heavily and died within two hours. We put a new tug on him and placed him in a new dog-box and buried him in the rose garden in front of the parlor."

This wonderful dog was greatly beloved by Robert Chapman, not only because of his outstanding distinction and the good fortune he had brought to Heather Kennels, but because of his radiant and lovable personality, coupled with high intelligence that marked him as a born leader of his tribe, even as some men come into this world so gifted with one or another talent, and power that they are born to lead. Speaking as a physician: I think Mr. Chapman's diagnosis of "heart failure" is correct. Disease of the heart has become a scourge to the human race; second only to tuberculosis. Statistics show that 80% of physicians die of some one of the many forms of cardiac disease, and dogs are frequently its victim. It would seem that the humanizing of dogs, which has made them develop so many human diseases, must be a factor in the pathogenesis.

This illness prevented Mr. James Chapman from making his customary visit to the Specialty and the Westminster shows. He expects to attend the Morris and Essex. ## Teeth and Toenails

Having discussed the irrationality of cutting toenails "to the quick" in order to make a Scottish stand properly on his feet, in my last article, I wish to bring into discussion a more practical view generally of the irregularity of teeth. Irregular front teeth are one of the vices that have come to the breed in its transition from a working, to a show dog, with the accompanying emphasis set upon muzzle-length to the exclusion of working ability. The text that a judge should subject a mouth

to its execution ability. Irregularity, rather slightly under, or over, also, should not nullify against a Scamie in the show ring provided it is evident that the mouth can do as much damage in a fray as if the teeth were fragrant. And it should be remembered that the most effective weapons of the mouth are the fangs. In the fray, dogs do not nip, or, if they do, it is a small part of the offensive action. They puncture, snag, tear, and rip with the great fangs and the fangs should loom much more important in the eye of the judge when it comes to penalization than the irregularities of a few front teeth whose nipping ability is evidently unimportant. We have seen Winners given to dogs whose fangs were so placed that the lower ones were

prophesied that it would go all wrong in time. But not one of them seemed to figure at all on the absolutely perfect anchorage of those fangs, dovetailed and the upper and lower in close apposition, preventing any movement forward or backward to bring the mouth under or overbit in future. Today, at a year and a half old, that dog's mouth is just exactly where it was when I bought him. At the time, his breeder (an experienced man) stated that the relationship of the teeth had "not changed at all in the last two months." He had heard how mouths went wrong and ruined valuable puppies, and he had watched the process with solicitude.

There has been a great deal of discussion about the part that the future of the breed

turned inward, impinging upon the hind palate, preventing the incisors from coming together. We have seen dogs penalized for slight irregularities of the front teeth, and a great hue and cry raised by amateurs with due prophesies that the young dog's mouth was bound to go wrong; this without any consideration of the perfect dovetailing and consequent anchorage of the upper and lower jaw that insured no change in the relationship of the upper and lower incisors. From our observations, we doubt if the average judge ever thinks about the anchorage of the fangs. Certainly, we do not recall ever having seen one lifting up the lips on the side and studying this feature. But we have frequently seen them use their fingers to determine the relationship of upper and lower incisors, not even looking in the mouth. This is all wrong. Last summer, at Glenboig, I bought an eight months old puppie whose incisors were somewhat uneven and I got him cheap because of this defect, in spite of outstanding type, great breeding, and all the earmarks of a great sire. I could count the names of four or five of the oldest judges in Scotland and America who studied that dog's mouth and

should play in judicial decisions. Most judges seem to give very little attention to the future and judge on the minute. Consequently the art of the handler has become paramount and inherent quality is subversive to, or defeated by, the heavy parlor. It seems to me that the judge is in duty bound not to perpetuate faults by giving Winners' prestige to a dog with transmissible faults. A little unevenness of front teeth, with two or three under, or over, that, should not be considered a necessarily transmissible fault when they are knit close together and there is no deficiency that would impair execution. With definite ideas myself upon this subject, based upon long experience and anatomical study, I took the trouble to write to two of the ablest judges in the country, Mr. William MacBain and Dr. C. F. Lynch, requesting an expression of their attitude on the ring. Said Dr. Lynch: "Along with other points making for perfection, I consider the perfect scissors a point of excellence; the definite underbite was a positive detriment. The irregularity of teeth so often met with the slight protrusion of the lower incisors and lateral incisors and

# The Hall of Fame

**T**HE King is Dead! Long Live the King! Heather Necessity is no more! But his fame lives on, and through his sons and daughters future generations of owners will go on to future glory. We hope these monthly articles will serve as a permanent record of the accomplishments of the great dogs of the breed, and it seems appropriate at this time to review the illustrious stud career of the great Champion Heather Necessity.

## Sire of Sixteen British Champions

Heather Necessity was the sire of sixteen British Champions, and of these, four came to our shores and added an AKC Championship to their English honors. The four are Lonkley Larkspur, who is out of Lonkley Leat; Heather Essential (now of Hinda), who is out of Br. Ch. Albourne Rosamond; Heather Enchantment (now of Hinda), who is out of Dumagpie; and Merlewood Hopeful, the son of Merlewood Countess.

The other twelve British Champions are Heather Ambition, brother of Heather Essential; the great Heather Fashion Hint, out of Inniskip Irma; Sandhys Silvertip, out of Albourne Anne Laurie; Orley Elegance, out of Orley Violet Ray; Roskley Astar, out of Roskley Lass; the late world famous producer and show bitch Walsing Whisper, out of Twinkle of Dacken; Roskley Rocco, out of Maad Trentant; Albourne Royalist, out of Albourne Sorrow Packer; Ch. Crich Certainty (now of Deephaven), out of Ch. Coffey Rose Marie of Roskley, sister of Heather Enchantment; Termont, brother of Roskley Rocco; and Grandhaw Gloria, out of Electric Asima.

## Sire of Twelve American Champions

In addition to the four Studites mentioned above who acquired both a British and an American Championship, there are eight other sons and daughters of Necessity who won an American Championship. They are Wilfick Necessity, out of Heather Lorna; Richard Faith out of Albourne Faith; Bellington Business, out of Hillway Adventurer; Walnut Aristocrat of Bricarot, brother of Sandhys Silvertip; and out of Albourne Annie Laurie;

Heather Fragrance, out of Dumfries Morag; Duoni Major of Docken, out of Br. Ch. Ormay Babal; Roscoe of Roskley, out of Albourne Lucky Day; and Floriel Somnifella, out of Recky Essential.

This makes a total of twenty-four championships sired by Necessity. Necessity also made a lasting impression on Scottish Terrier History, as a showman with his record of twenty challenge certificates which stood for six many years, until Alboune Admiration added one more last year to make a new record of 21, which in turn fell when the great showman grandson of Necessity, Heather Realization topped them all with 28 certificates.

## Necessity Grand sire of 74 Champions

Twelve sons of Heather Necessity have sired 61 champions. The most famous producing son has been Br. Ch. Heather Fashion Hint who is the sire of 18 dog and 12 bitch champions. Of these 30, four are title holders both here and in England; and including duplications there are 13 British Champions and 21 American Champions. Next comes Br. Ch. Heather Ambition with a total of 8-3 dogs and 5 bitches. Of these there are six British and 3 American Champions, one holding a championship in both countries. Third in the list of illustrious sons is Br. Ch. Crich Certainty (of Deephaven), who has sired one dog and four bitch champions. Next come Glenida Sterling of Scottward and Sandhys Silvertip, both having sired four champions. Then follows Br. and U. S. Ch. Heather Essential of Hinda, Heather Rosamond of Dickard, and U. S. Ch. Wilfick Necessity, with two each. Other sons with one each are The Master, Br. Ch. Termont, U. S. Ch. Duoni Major of Docken, and U. S. Ch. Walnut Aristocrat of Bricarot.

## Famous Necessity Daughters

Twenty daughters of Necessity have produced 28 champions, 11 British, 20 U. S. with three duplications because of championships in both countries.

If none of the ladies or gentlemen on the list are available, and in order not to work a hardship on this account, exhibitors and showmen, the Board of Governors will almost invariably award the specials for a specified show if the superintendent requests them sufficiently in advance to permit of the Board's approval. If the trophies are to be awarded at any show, they must be printed in the show catalogue. The Club's trophies for 1936 were won by the following:

No. 1—The Regal Kennels (Ch. Fionell Soundfella).

No. 2—Mr. Ed. F. Maloney.

No. 3—Mrs. Marie A. Stone.

No. 4—Mr. and Mrs. Charles Werber.

The Scottish Terrier Club of America (H. Alvin McAlleen, Secretary, 1330 Broadway, New York, N. Y.) offers, under approved judges, the following special prizes to Club Members only, to be competed for during the year 1937 at all A. K. C. licensed shows.

Competition is required—or no award—"Competition" means there must be competition in any class between two Terriers at least, or two Bitches or two Teams—if there are but two Terriers, or Bitches or Teams, they must be of separate ownership. No. 1—The Francis G. Lloyd Memorial Trophy, a perpetual Silver Challenge Cup, for the best of either sex. To be awarded annually to the dog or bitch scoring the greatest number of points. Names of winners to be engraved on the trophy, which will be in the custody of the owner of the winning dog or bitch for the ensuing year.

No. 2—Club offers the "Puppy Dog Class Trophy," value \$25, for the best in Puppy Dog Class. To be won by exhibitor or kennel winning the most points during the year, not necessarily with the same puppy.

No. 3—Club offers the "Puppy Bitch Class Trophy," value \$25, for the best in Puppy Bitch Class. To be won by the exhibitor or kennel winning the most points during the year, not necessarily with the same puppy.

(Where Puppy Classes are divided into two classes, 6 to 9 and 9 to 12 months, the winner of each class shall be awarded the points.)

No. 4—Club offers "American-bred Dog Class Trophy," value \$25, for the best in American-bred Dog Class. To be won by the exhibitor or kennel winning the most points during the year, not necessarily with the same dog.

No. 5—Club offers "American-bred Bitch Class Trophy," value \$25, for the best in the American-bred Bitch Class. To be won by the exhibitor or kennel winning the most

## Description and Standard of Points

(Courtesy of The Scottish Terrier Club of America)

**Skull.**—Long, of medium width, slightly domed and covered with short, hard hair. It should not be quite flat as there should be a slight stop or drop between the eyes.

**Muzzle.**—In proportion to the length of skull, with not too much taper toward the nose. Nose should be black and of good size. The jaws should be perfectly level and teeth square, although the nose projects somewhat over the mouth, giving the impression that the upper jaw is longer than the lower.

**Eyes.**—Set wide apart, small and of almond shape, not round. Color to be dark

**Tail.**—Never cut and about seven inches long, carried gaily with a slight curve, but not over the back.

**Coat.**—Rather short, about two inches, dense under coat with outer coat intensely hard and wiry.

**Size.**—About 10 inches high at the shoulder and weight about 18 or 20 pounds for both sexes. The correct size must take into consideration height fully as much as weight.

**Color.**—Steel or iron grey, brindle or grizzled, black, sandy or wheaten. White markings are objectionable and can be allowed only on the chest and that to a slight extent only.

**General Appearance.**—The face should wear a keen, sharp and active expression. Both head and tail should be carried well up. The dog should look very compact, well muscled and powerful, giving the im-

brown or nearly black. To be bright, piercing and set well under the brow.

**Ears.**—Small, prick, set well upon the skull, rather pointed but not cut. The hair on them should be short and velvety.

**Neck.**—Moderately short, thick and muscular, strongly set on sloping shoulders, but not so short as to appear clumsy.

**Chest.**—Broad and very deep, well let down between the fore legs.

**Body.**—Moderately short and well ribbed up with strong loin, deep flanks and very muscular hind quarters.

**Legs and Feet.**—Both fore and hind legs should be short and very heavy in bone in proportion to the size of the dog. Fore legs straight or slightly bent with elbows close to the body, as Scottish Terriers should not be out at the elbows. Stiffes should be well bent and legs straight from hock to heel. Thighs very muscular. Feet round and thick with strong nails, fore feet larger than the hind feet.

## Scottish Terriers

By William MacLain, Dielhard Kennels,  
Closter, N. J.

**D**R. ROGERS has asked me to write a short article for this Scottish Terrier Issue so here goes.

I have grown up, and am growing old with Scottish Terriers and for over thirty years here in my Dielhard Kennels at Closter, New Jersey, I have been trying to breed good ones. During this time there have been fads and fancies, and some definite changes have taken place in the breed. On the whole the Scottish Terrier has improved but there are points which fail to show improvement and have actually gone backwards.

Coats, in general, do not have the wire-like texture of the Scots of long ago. While some blacks have very good coats, in the main we must turn to the red brindles for the better and harder jackets. Fortunately some kennels have presented the old-time and much-to-be desired coat, as there is hope for the rest of us if we keep trying.

One reads as much about the wheaten color these days and I sometimes wonder if people really know just what color "wheaten" is. I well remember the wheaten of old—really red, like the old-fashioned Irish Terrier which was much lighter in shade than the Mick of to-day. The true wheaten was, and still is, the color of the female of the species of the Black Red Breasted Game Powl.

Some years ago, while in England, I visited the Docken Kennels of Miss Wijk—now Mrs. Scraze-Dickens—who in my opinion is one of the best judges of our breed in the world. Miss Wijk, mentioning one of her good dogs said, "some people speak of him as a wheaten, but he is really a cream". Cream is not an allowed color in show Scotties, be their pedigree ever so good.

For those who have trouble adding the 61 champions sired by sons to the 28 champions produced by daughters, to arrive at the total of 74 champions claiming Necessity as their grandsire, I should explain that 15 of the champions run to Necessity through both their sire and dam, thus owning Necessity as their only grandsire.

The most famous daughter of Necessity to remain in England was the late Br. Ch. Walsing Whisper, who in her best career won at least five British Championship Certificates, several Best in Shows, and produced Br. and U. S. Ch. Walsing Waller and Br. Ch. Ripple of Rookes, as well as several other certificate winners.

Another famous English daughter is Br. Ch. Orley Patience (of Hollybourne) and Br. U. S. Ch. Orley Carmen, Br. and U. S. Ch. Orley Patience (of Hollybourne) and Br. Ch. Orley Bridget.

Necessity's most famous daughter in America is U. S. Ch. Rosette of Rookes, who bred in Heather Fashion Hint produced three male Champions in one litter—Ch. Hallcrest Black Lancer, Ch. Hallcrest Baccaree, and Ch. McCrystal Beau Brummel—a record that has only been surpassed once in Scottish Terrier history, when Albourn Annie Laurie produced three male and one bitch champions in the same litter when bred to Br. Ch. Albourn Barry.

Necessity's daughter, Croisneede Calaret Girl produced Br. Ch. Albourn Black Magic and U. S. Ch. Rookery Romance.

Gleniffer Gaiety, another daughter of Necessity produced U. S. Ch. Gleniffer Keepsake and Br. Ch. Gleniffer Leading Lady.

Roschall Rooky, another daughter produced Br. Ch. Roschall Gipsy and U. S. Ch. Roschall Rookbud.

Other daughters of Necessity having produced one champion each are Heather Remembrance, Glenilla Grizelda of Dielhard, Cammoor Cara, Br. and U. S. Ch. Merlewood, Hopeful, U. S. Ch. Heather Fragrance, Castleland Duchess, Heather Betty, Kibean Laurette, Queen of the Roscos of Rookes, Heather Saltire, Roschall Pansy, Roschall Jean, Heather Ideal, and Malgen Starshine.

Davison's critique which appeared in the English paper stated "Walsing Whispering, an outstandingly beautiful puppy; grey brindle; real double flaying coat; delightful head, eye, ear, and expression; clean shoulders; good front; excellent bone; well-moulded body; big ribs; strong joint; nice quarters; in fact, most difficult to criticize other than favorably."

Mrs. D. Gabriel reviewing Scotties at Crufts in the *Dog World* (England) stated "Mr. Singleton showed a grand bitch in Walsing Whispering; a nine months old puppy that went hand through her classes and ultimately gained the green ticket. She is worthy of her dam, Ch. Walsing Whisper and should go far. To make her success all the more pleasing to her breeder, was the fact that she was sired by his own dog, Walsing Warrantor now owned by Dr. Pedicor."

Mrs. D. S. Casper in *Our Dogs* stated "Mr. Singleton's lovely puppy bitch, Walsing Whispering had quite an ovation and truly did she, and he as her breeder, deserve it. Heartiest congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Singleton. I have no doubt they both took a hand in rearing and bringing on his lovely youngster to her present state of perfection. We learn she was the only one reared of the litter and "only" puppies are apt to come in for a lot of attention. Incidentally her pedigree is most interesting."

Dr. Pedicor's Heather Charming was brought out at the Huntington, W. Va. Show under Wm. Shanks and went through to Winners, gaining three points. From there she went on to Detroit where she topped the breed under James Spring, winning five points. Eight points in a week is indeed a grand start for Heather Charming.

Wm. M. Quade's Gold Finder's Star Man which placed Winners at the Garden has not been shown extensively, but he has had a wonderfully good record. Brought out in 1935 at the Morris and Essex Show he placed first in the Puppy Class; his next show was the Specialty in New York that year, where he took first in the Novice Class; in 1936 he topped the American-bred Class at the Morris and Essex Event and this same year was Best of Breed at Manchester, N. H. His next show was Westminster where he topped the American-bred Class and went on to place Winners Dog. He has done some nice winning in Worcester, Hartford and Cambridge and if shown, should acquire the title in 1937.

F. B. Jeter, Euclid, Ohio, was delighted with the win of Haldon Emblem which topped the Puppy and Novice Class at the Garden and went on to place Reserve Winner. Emblem is sired by Jeter's Can. Ch. Haldon Mirel Boy. Several other promising youngsters sired by this dog will be brought out at the late spring and early fall shows.

Dr. A. A. Mull, Rushville, Ind., is expecting a litter by Int. Ch. Walsing Walleet out of his good bitch, Haldon Ruby.

Eng. Ch. Dandy of Docken o'Marlus owned by the Marlus Farm Kennels, West Long Branch, N. J., is fast forging to the front as a sire of outstanding progeny. In the East, Docken has two champions to his credit in the last nine months—Monagh Lee Mariner and Marlus Merrie Lass. The third, Marlus Morning Glory has started on her way. She

Mrs. A. C. McCullagh of Philadelphia, writes that her Christmas litter out of Faithful Laurie and sired by Macks Welton Corky are developing into very outstanding specimens. Corky is by Ch. Heather Goldfinder out of a granddaughter of this same dog. Thus Corky carries Annie Laurie twice and Faithful Laurie carries Ch. Heather Necessity twice.

Mrs. McCullagh's Braw Bright Bokie is heavy in whelp to Regillt Kennel's Ch. Flornell Soundfella. This is the third time that this bitch has been bred to Soundfella. the perfectly-approximating upper and lowers are not in my opinion of sufficient importance to detract from the general excellence of a Terrier. The Standards for the Terriers call for the "scissors mouth." When one is confronted with a decision between two equally good Terriers, a perfect set of teeth should be

considered." What Dr. Lynch says is not at variance with what I contend. No one can deny that if a judge is "confronted with decision between two equally good dogs" any slight defect in the competitors should be considered. Dr. Lynch's partiality for the perfect scissors mouth is shared by me because, just as the anchorage of the fangs affects the future of the teeth, so does the perfect scissors-adjustment of the incisors tend to preserve their life and stability. But let it be remembered that none of the old Scottish Terrier Standards has anything to say about scissors mouth or overlapping teeth. The standard of the Scottish Terrier Club of Scotland, published in the last century at the beginning of the dog's show career, says under "Muzzle": "The jaw should be perfectly level and the teeth square"—and nothing more. The Scottish Terrier Club of England, contemporary with the above, was in agreement with it. When the Scottish Terrier Club of America took upon itself, in 1925, to revise the English Standards, they used the exact words of the old Standard of the Scottish Club quoted above, and said nothing more. It was not until the Scottish Terrier Club of England got out a revised Standard, in 1933, that we had the first intimation of scissors mouths, when it stated: "The teeth large, the upper incisors closely overlapping the lower."

I have never had anyone interpret to me the exact meaning of "the jaws should be perfectly level and the teeth square," but I assume that "level" means that the upper and lower incisors exactly meet, edge to edge, neither the upper nor the lower overlapping. Whatever the dog's mouth may have been in the old hunting days, a perfect example of this "level" mouth is rare; and what I have been saying about irregularity means that we should be more or less tolerant when confronted with deviations from what was normal to the old breeders, and base our decisions on ability to execute, which is a commonsense view. I quote from Mr. William MacBain: "Your dogs for years have been noted for alert, eyes, ears, and mouths. Now you are having the trouble we have all had since we took on the modern Scottie. Personally, I don't like a poor mouth, although for some years, while we have been fixing type, I have been easy on them where the dog has type and other desired features. I would still put up a dog of good type, etc., over a dog with good mouth, etc., but absolutely lacking type. Naturally, a typey dog with good mouth would beat a typey and good dog with doubtful mouth. A flush mouth usually goes wrong when the dog is three or four years old." By "flush mouth," Mr. MacBain evidently means a level mouth and I have indicated my agreement with this in my statement above that the scissors adjustment tends to preserve the life of the teeth.

Ch. Heather Realization, according to the report in *Our Dogs*, has been quite ill; but this didn't stop him from "shouldering" his crutch to show how fields are won. He went down to Crafr—"greatest show on earth"—and topped his 29th certificate his second annual achievement. I think, in this gargantuan competition. Realization is turning out grand bitches by the dozen, but we don't hear much of his champion-type dogs. It is already being said, by British and American fanciers, that, like Ch. Albourne Barty, his future fame will rest upon his daughters.

The real sensation of the Crufts show was the poppy, Walsing Whispering, brought out by Walter L. Singleton, of "Walsing" fame. This young bitch is of special interest to Americans because she was sired by the recently imported Walsing Warrantor, owned by Dr. Pellcord. The siring of this sensational pup, upon which unstated praise is lavished by the Scottish editors of *Our Dogs*, will make breeders sit up and take notice of Warrantor as a sire. No doubt he had an able assistant in Ch. Through her high intelligence and definite ideas Mrs. Batt has almost created a strain of her own for the Haldon dogs are mostly farther removed from the "Four Horsemen" than the dogs of any other kennel I know. Mrs. Batt has not only placed Haldon in the forefront of Canadian Scottie kennels, but she has made it a force to be reckoned with annually in Westminster, and Morris and Essex, and was usually in the winning at the New York Specialty show of the S. T. C. of A. until the entries were limited to American-breds. This year at the Garden, Haldon Emblem, a puppy bred by Mrs. Batt, got First Puppy, First Novice, and went on to the high distinction of Reserve Winners, dogs. This puppy is by Haldon Mintrel Boy, who is by Ch. Haldon Mintrel, and deeply Haldon-bred all through. Naturally, Mrs. Batt is enthused and she writes: "I shall never be satisfied now until I take Winners at Westminster." Her many American friends wish her luck.

Last summer at Heather Kennels I was shown a new purchase by Robert Chapman, a young dog that had done some sensational winning. Mr. Chapman's dog was given the suggestive name of "Heather Magnificent," but he has never been advertised at stud by Heather Kennels and I had heard no more of him until recently when he was brought out and won a Challenge Certificate. Now, I read that he has been sold to Miss Elizabeth Hall of Glen Afon Kennel.—Dr. F. C. Z.

more years than I've lived, and yet he has produced very few champions, speaking numerically, but he has had to do with really breeding many winners, and what's more important, he has bred many producing dogs, and the general average of his stock is very high. Given correct type, we should aim for as much evenness of merit as possible, for the best stock comes from animals from evenly good litters—almost never from the startlingly great litter from an otherwise obscure litter. Beware of those for they are almost always chance-bred good ones and what they leave behind to carry on with is usually nothing.

And to the novice let me say: Aim high; the higher the better, but consider the future and don't fall into the mental trap of confusing show wins as the ultimate desideratum. Show wins are delightful, when you have really bred a good dog, show it under a judge who knows what's wanted and has no strings to his decisions, and you have honestly good competition, then to win is a great satisfaction and a thing greatly to be desired, but anything else is just a fancy. I know a great number of real breeders who have come to look on the showing end of fancying dogs as a sort of necessary evil; a thing to be endured rather than enjoyed, for there are too many rank Scotties carrying the title and there are far too many people who can be suspected of complicity or rank ignorance in having put such dogs over superior animals. I think one of the quickest ways to be rid of that type of judge is to stop entering under them.

Now a word about the financial end, which, like the poor, is always with us, and of vital interest to most of us. A good dog can always bring a fair price. The market is glutted just now with the unhappy results of factory "breeders" who have bred quantity, hoping to reap a rich and overnight reward. Justly enough, they thwart their very own purposes. If there were any short cuts to breeding good dogs, the fun would be gone, and good dogs are the only ones that will fetch a price. The others merely clutter up the pet-buying market with rubbish, and have to be endured with whatever varying degree of patience the individual can summon. But the point is this: If you will concern yourself first with trying to improve the breed, you will inevitably reap your reward financially, but if you make selling puppies your goal, you will neither breed anything, nor sell anything for more than dime store prices; and since mongrels cost as much to keep as do good dogs, no man can break even on anything less than honest merit in his dogs. And breaking even financially is satisfactory of most sincere breeders; none of them have ever seen any pot of gold in dog breeding, and if they can just even things up on an average, or with luck make a little profit in order to expand and add new and desired breeding animals, they are satisfied and consider their kennels a great success financially.

Before closing I wish to pay tribute to a dog that I think got too little recognition when he lived, as many good producing dogs do. I am just informed by my friend, Wm. MacLain, that his old English Champion Albourne Brigard de Diehard has just died in his tenth year. I suppose because the dog didn't sire a flashy champion in every litter, some people thought him of little use. Anyway he was not used nearly as much outside his home kennels as he should have been. He sired several champions, exact

the breeder (?) of a baker's dozen champion, not a single one of which has ever produced anything of note. The dog, however, was not lost entirely to the breed, because of the serious and thoughtful efforts of a few obscure breeders who used him intelligently and not only produced some good winners, but more important still, produced some animals which have produced many winners and producers of winners. That's the ideal of all real breeders.

The same thing is true in Scotties today. I know one man who has bred Scotties for

suit very open, and that is all to the good of  
the game. When a really great dog comes  
along he will spread-eagle the lot, but such  
dogs only come once or twice in a decade,  
and in the meanwhile there are quite a lot of  
good ones, some appealing more particularly  
to one judge and some to another.

I was very disappointed with the bitchies at  
Cruft's and the fact that the Challenge Cer-  
tificate was won by a puppy of ten months of  
age, and that no one could grumble at the  
decision proved in itself that there was some-  
thing wrong. E. W. Byron's home-bred  
Cefnffynnon Queen is a very creditable pro-  
duction whose general outline very much ap-  
peals, but as a puppy she is not in a class  
with what Angloragus Shesardrafcman or  
Clarinda were: at the same age, and had the  
mature bitchies been at high class as usual  
she could not have got away with the ticket.  
However, we have better bitchies in England  
than were seen at Cruft's, as the later cham-  
pionship shows will prove. Mrs. E. E. Smith's  
Loordie Ladye Fayre struck me as a more  
than useful one, and I have just heard that  
she has gained her first certificate this week  
at Glasgow under Mrs. van Raalte, a lady  
with a keen eye for a Bulldog.

number I can't state with accuracy at the  
moment, but his greatness lies in the number  
of great producing bitches and sons that are  
siring. And so his place is secure in the  
halls of the great for all time, for his name  
will be found in the best pedigrees when  
many others are forgotten. Brigand will  
carry on, which is the real test, while other,  
more spectacular animals may come to a  
dead-end, a sort of ul-de-uc as it were. A  
champion dog or bitch that cannot produce  
either a champion or a really worthwhile  
breeding son or daughter, is worthless. Brig-  
and is grandeur of a young dog that in my  
opinion is going to prove the greatest dog in  
America. He has been kicked about at the  
shows, but that's a trifling matter with those  
who think. Whether he ever becomes a  
champion has nothing to do with his in-  
dividual greatness, and I've seen his first puppies  
and they are startling, as he is himself. I  
shan't call his name or in any way try to  
identify the dog for to do so would give little  
minds the excuse they are always seeking to  
seize on every great dog and tear him apart,  
so many many have tried to do to one, who at  
past seven years is one of the greatest dogs  
I've ever seen in the breed despite his one real  
fault. While there are too few breeders—of-  
ring-handlers and jealous little minds there  
are, alas! too many.

Stet dear of those people who are forever  
nursing down every dog that's possessed of  
some honest merit. There are too many  
good and useful dogs in the world to make  
a reasonable there should be only one worth-  
while, which is usually owned by the critics  
themselves.
