The Question of Size

(According to Various Scotty Standards)

FOR the benefit of any interested Scottish Terrier breeders who may not have time to look it up, I collect below what the various Standards of our breed have laid down as to the proper size of our dog. In a proposed revision of the present American Standard, this appears to be the subject chiefly in question—most of the others, such as color, coat, conformation, etc. having been pretty well thrashed out, and all of us being of the same opinion still, and continuing to do our own sweet way!

The first or Morrison Standard, 1890, gives "16-17 lbs. for dogs, 2lbs. less for bitches, about 9½ in. high."

The Scottish Terrier Club, England, 1882, "from 15 to 20 lbs.; the best being as near as possible 18 lbs. for dogs and 16 for bitches, when in condition for work."

The Scottish Terrier Club, Scotland, 1880, "about 16 to 18 lbs. for a bitch, and 18 to 20 for a dog."

The American S. T. G. Standard, 1925,

"about 10 in. at the shoulder, and weight about 18-20 lbs. for both sexes. The correct size must take into consideration height fully as much as weight."

In these last three, size counted 10 points, though just what mental arithmetic a judge has to go through in reaching his decision is beyond my weak mind. If he has a poor too-little one and a good too-little one, and a poor too-big one and a good too-big one, and none that looks just right—where does he come out?

The new Standard of the Scottish Terrier Club, England, 1933, in its very intelligent effort to clarify and simplify past disputes, says "Size: the ideally made dog in hard show condition would weigh from 17 lbs. to 21 lbs." It gives no height and no point numbers.

Note, that the practical English in both cases pay some attention to the flight of time. The dog weighs so-and-so "when in condition for work" or "in hard show condition." Mrs. Stone astutely asks, "Of all the dogs that have gone best of breed, how many weighed 18 to 20 pounds?"

One of those questions, I fancy, that are followed by an awful pause. There is no record to consult; but surely few of the fair, fat, and fatty in "For Specials Only" would tip the scales so lightly—I hope not.

In looking the Standards up I came upon two observations, by two of the keenest minds we have had, Mrs. Caspers says:

"Weight and size are very different things. Both can be very misleading. The dog has to be big-built in small compass. Faulty variations are, a small dog not substantial enough in build, and a big-

built dog too large. Of the two evils the latter is less. The Scottish Terrier must above all things be balanced and proportionate."

W. L. McCandlish says: "Whether it be the question of size or any other desired feature, it does the breed no good to take a hard and fast position."

Kinclaven Classic, who has sired some excellent puppies including a number of winners who bred to daughters of Tobasco or Heather Anet. At present there are some interesting young litters at Kinclaven sired by Tobasco, particularly one out of Ch. Kinclaven Escapade.

Marie Stone is the 1943 Number One breeder, having bred three home-bred champions—Kinclaven The Stooze, Kinclaven Escapade and Kinclaven Curtain Call. She is the only individual breeder to produce more than one champion for the year.

rather barren of Scotties, that they have come to the conclusion that the breed is really getting around. As many are inquiring about bitches, Mr. Macaulay feels that a good many new breeders are in the making. The Macaulays have kept a dog and a bitch from the litter by Mac's Wilton-Tweed and Deephaven Spar. They are very much sold on these two pups and on four whistens they have by Tweed out of their wheaten bitch, Shock O'Wheat.

We quote what Mr. Macaulay has to say regarding the proposed revision of the Standard:

"We have received from Mr. Werber, Sec. of the S.T.C.A., the placements at Westminster Specialty, a service which

is much appreciated; also the minutes of the annual meeting, including comments by some of the breeders present on the considered change, if any, of the standard. We find ourselves very much in accord with Mr. Wm. MacBain that 'the Scottish Terrier was supposed to be a small dog and that the dog of to-day is too large.' To us, this seems to be in

impression of compactness and great substance. We find ourselves aligning with Mrs. Marie Stone when she said that 'it was not necessary to change the standard' that, 'we had not been breeding to the standard for the past ten years.'

"It follows then, that many Judges must have had a wrong interpretation of the standard and breeders have been breeding the kind that judges like, all with the desire to win.

"To correct this, why would it not be a good plan for the Scottish Terrier Club of America to have on its files a list of approved judges who properly interpret the Standard and furnish that list to its members who could refuse to show under any judge not included on that list. If this treatment is too drastic, why not start an education of all judges and in any case 'Breed to the Standard.'"

Maurice Pollak writes that Bob Braithwaite, Kennel Manager at Marlu for nine years, is working in a Defense Plant in Red Bank and lives just two or three minutes from the Marlu Farm. Whenever he has a spare moment he comes over to look at the dogs and get some of them in shape. Bob hopes to get to some of the shows on Sundays. Mr. Pollak has given him a half interest in a dog that he thinks a great deal of—Marlu Advancer, a coal black dog bred by Marlu, who have owned his ancestors for four generations back.

Mrs. George Hicks, Secretary of the Scottish Terrier Club of Chicago tells us about some bad luck they had recently. They have been especially anxious for a litter from their Iron Beauty of LaMer, bred here, and all they got was one dead puppy. They are, of course, hoping for better luck next time.

Ch. David's Debutants owned by Mr. and Mrs. David Doney, Bloomington, Calif., is pictured. Debutants has done some nice winning. On her quest to the title she was five times Best of Winners and Best of Opposite Sex, and once Best of Breed and second in the group. Since then she has chalked up two Best of

Gilbrax Ian 5 best of breeds, 3 groups, 1 best in show specialty. Kinclaven The Stogie, 3 best of breeds and 1 groups and 1 Best in Show. Shieling's Flath 10 Best of Breeds and 5 groups. Briarcroft Blanche has two best of breeds and one group. Johnny Martin of Sally Forth is the only non-champion winning a group this year.

Again, may I say that I shall be glad to furnish any further information to the breeders of Scottish Terriers upon a written request to me. I should also like to take this opportunity to thank Mrs. Rosenthal and the Doe News for their cooperation in allowing me this space at this time so that I may give the vital statistics of our breed to the Scottish Terrier breeders.—L. Her breeding to Classic will carry three crosses to Ch. Garsoca, one of the greatest winning Scotties ever owned by Mrs. Stone.

A note from Mrs. Ella Deegan, Sacramento, Calif., tells us she has no young stock. At Christmas time she sold a promising bitch, Dee Gan Black Eye Susan, a daughter of Dee Gan Dandy Boy, by Ch. A Renaissance in Scotties

FOR some time Dr. Ewing has been loudly proclaiming that a Renaissance in Scotties could be expected but up to now there was little concrete evidence to support this theory. Breed entries, particularly in the east, were miserable; general interest seemed apathetic and it really looked as though Scotties were down and just about out.

But it now looks as though the good Doctor was right and that the Renaissance in Scotties is really a hand. It certainly is if we are to take the three eastern shows—Baltimore, New York and Boston as any criterion, and it seems safe enough to do so.

Compare the entries at these three recent shows with their entries a year ago—At Baltimore there were only five Scotties entered last year and three of them were absent. This year Baltimore came through with an entry of twenty-one dogs, representing ten exhibitors and only a couple of absentees were chalked up. New York had some eighty-three dogs entered this year representing thirty-five odd owners—last year the entry was only sixty-eight. Boston was up ten over last year—forty-two representing some twenty exhibitors. At all three of these shows Scotties had the highest single entry in the Terrier group.

Normally we wouldn't say that three shows were sufficient on which to base conclusions or make predictions, but these were all eastern shows—where interest was supposed to be slipping—and they were big "important" shows.

We believe they are sufficient evidence to permit us to make the prediction that Scotties have come out of the doldrums and that 1944 will be a glorious year for the breed.—A. R.

Book for 1942. Twenty breeds showed increases, eleven of these being in the Working Dog group, a definite indication that the War Dog program has done much to increase interest in these breeds. Cocker Spaniels still lead all breeds in total number of registrations by a very wide margin—27,438 of this popular breed were admitted to the Stud Book this past year. Beagles were in second spot with 6,182 registrations.

Cockers, Beagles, Bostons, Fox Terriers, are the leading four breeds in number of registrations. Dachshunds moved from sixth place to fifth; Pekingers from seventh to sixth; Scotties dropped from fifth place which it held in 1942 to seventh the past year; Collies went from ninth to eighth position and Springer Spaniel dropped back from eighth to ninth. Boxers made a great jump forward, from sixteenth, the position it held in 1942 to twelfth this year.
