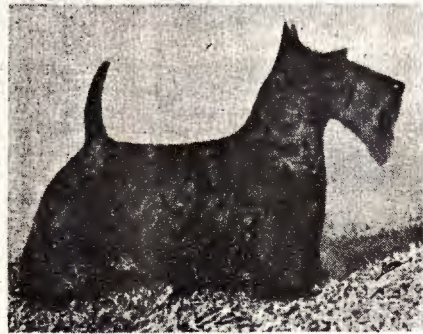

THE SCOT— Aristocrat and Gentleman of the Dog World

WE LOOK for character in dogs, as we do in human beings! The Scottish Terrier has plenty! That's one of the things about him that makes him seem different to his owner—distinguishing him from other breeds. Many other breeds are also faithful, dutiful, trustworthy—but, ask the man who owns a Scottie! He'll tell you that his dog is a distinct personality, that he can do almost anything but talk! He'll tell you that the Scottie is a gentleman and an

aristocrat—that he's "all dog," fearful of almost nothing on four legs (often to his disadvantage!). He'll tell you that the Scottie has an indomitable spirit, more human than dog-like. If you've ever owned one, you'll agree. If you haven't, then you don't know what you've missed in the way of canine companionship! Maybe he's so human because, in the

early days, his ancestors were the intimate friends of their masters—sharing their homes and meals, enjoying their pleasures, enduring their hardships.

The Scottish Terrier came, originally, from the Island of Skye as well as from the mainland of the west coast of Scotland. In fact, authorities believe that he shared a common ancestor with the other three varieties of Scottish terrier breeds—the Cairn, the Skye and the West Highland White. In his early days, he was not the dapper-looking fellow he is today. He was a rough-haired, "varminty" sort of terrier, likely to be any shape or size, sometimes prick-eared, sometimes drop-eared, sometimes one of each kind! Pluck and gameness were essential qualities, for his job was to bolt foxes from the cairns. Possibly that's why, today, he thinks he can overpower anything—of any size! His is a rare combination of pluck, grit, courage, daring—and affection for his loved ones! This worship of his own family is an outstand-

ing Scottie characteristic. Where his loved ones are, he wants to be. He is never happy when left alone and will follow you from room to room. He has developed an unusually high intelligence and a rare ability to interpret and anticipate his master's looks and desires. The Scottie's nature is big—even though his size is not! He's far less nervous and ex-

citabile than some others of the terrier breeds. Every conversation in the home seems to interest him, whether it concerns him or not.

Among Scottie enthusiasts there are those who believe that he is the oldest of all the Highland terriers and that all other terrier breeds are offshoots. Authoritative sources don't lean to this belief, although the Scottie has been bred—as we know him today—for well over half a century. The first breed standards to be adopted were drawn up about 1800 by J. B. Morrison. Scottish Terrier clubs were formed and the good points of the breed publicized. He found his way to the east coast of Scotland, where he became very popular, especially in Aberdeen. This accounts for his subtitle, "Aberdeen Terrier." The first show to have a Scottish Terrier class was held at Birmingham, England. Other shows had entries under the name, but the dogs shown were not always Scotties. This made the Scots indignant (especially when they won!) and a lively discussion was started in the Live Stock Journal. It grew so heated and furious, it had to be stopped by the editor. The adoption of standards put an end to that sort of argument.

If you're thinking of buying a Scottie, you'll probably ask, first of all, "What can I expect of him?" the answer is, "Plenty!" You'll find that he's more than just an amiable companion. You'll find him amusing, interesting, courageous, steadfast and entertaining, full of love and devotion. The Scottie is firm and

determined. When he gets an idea, he'll stick to it! He much prefers being "asked" to do something to being "told" to do it! In dealing with him, courtesy pays, but never let him win an argument, so to speak! When you want him to do anything, if he doesn't seem inclined to comply the first time, or even

the second time, don't give up. If he finds out that he can "get away" with doing what he likes rather than what you want, you'll soon find that he is the boss and not you! When he fights (and he will get into a scrap now and then!) he's just "doing what comes naturally"—another result of his early training! He can take care of himself extremely well

and will often plunge right in even if his adversary is twice or three times his size. He's not at all vicious, and does not go around looking for trouble, but he will stand his ground with Spartan-like courage and gameness! No whimpering when he's hurt! As in other breeds, the female is milder in temperament than the male.

A remarkable memory is a notable Scotty quality. He will remember friends he has not seen for years—greeting them as if he had seen them only recently. He is usually quite reserved in his manner and very dignified. In most cases, he doesn't like a great deal of petting and he scorns the idea of being a lap dog. He'll make it very plain to you when he wants to be loved and petted. When he's had all he wants, he'll walk away and become interested in something else. He takes life as he finds it and seems to have a keen understanding of events as they take place. There's nothing mean or petty in his nature and he's very honorable. All dogs hate to be laughed at, but a Scottie's feelings are particularly wounded by ridicule. You can reason with him and, if you were to jot down the number of words in his vocabulary, you'd be amazed! He's fastidious and clean and loves to be kept looking smart and trim. Unkempt and neglected, he's positively miserable. To sum it all up, he's an aristocrat and a gentleman, stout-hearted and loving, faithful, brave and game.

There's not a better watch-dog than a Scottie. Even when he's curled up in his favorite spot for a little nap, he'll keep

one eye open, as it were, ready to be on the job if anything demands his attention. He loves his home and is never more contented than when he's spending a quiet evening with his family; but, suggest a ride in the car, or a walk! He'll be ready to go!

If you're buying a Scottie, you should know what to look for. He should have a long, level head, a powerful jaw, dark bright eyes (not too large) and erect ears. His body should be short and compact. He should have a short sickle tail, good bone, straight forelegs and a hard outercoat with a soft, fine undercoat. The most usual colors are black and brindle and there are a few Wheatens around. Red brindles are popular in the United States and are increasing in

number in Canada. Ask old-country folk about their choice! They'll tell you there's nothing like a red brindle. They'll rave about the way he blends in with the colorings of the fall foliage on the Scottish moors and the hills of Devon! They'll go into ecstasies about the way he tones in with the bracken as it colors the fall landscape with a reddish hue! They'll describe how he blends with the warm, reddish brown of the heather—how he looks against the blackberry brambles in their glorious red, yellow and brown tones!

If a Scottie could talk, he would undoubtedly do a little boasting about the heights to which his breed has risen. He would remind you about the late Franklin D. Roosevelt's "Fala" and about General Dwight D. Eisenhower's "Telek."

There's infinite satisfaction in owning a good example of your chosen breed and one should not expect to buy a first-rate Scottie for a mere song. A great deal of expense is involved in caring for

the mother and raising the puppies to a saleable age, which is usually from four to six months.

A Scotsman (and who should know the breed better?) once said "the real Scottie has the most characteristic facial expression. He is a thinker, philosopher and seer. His soul is oppressed by the dense stupidity of all things created. He shows this in his countenance and there should be a cast of thought upon his face even when he is a puppy." Maybe you agree and maybe you don't, but if you understand the breed at all, you'll have to agree that a Scottie is "all dog," worthy of your respect and admiration. If you acquire one, be prepared to treat him as an "equal," for he'll expect it. He'll expect, too, as much love and devotion from you as he is ready to lavish on you!

In the past fourteen months, Warspite has been Best of Breed at the following important shows and at every one of the All Breed events he has placed in the group. These shows include Westminster 1946, Judge J. Alvin McAleenan; Westminster 1947, Judge Marie Stone; Boston, 1946, Judge Caswell Barrie; Boston 1947, Judge Ernie Joresco; Scottish Terrier Winter Specialty 1946, Judge Clinton B. Schenck; Scottish Terrier Spring Specialty 1946, Judge Robert Hartshorne; International Show, Chicago 1946, Judge Walter H. Reeves.

Mr. Pollack advises that from here on out Warspite will only be shown occasionally. He is at present five years old, but he is so great a laster that today many think he looks better than he did a year or so ago. Warspite is a son of Ch. Hillcote Laddie out of Ch. Deephaven Honeysuckle and was bred by Ted Bennett's Deephaven Kennels. Warspite is possessed of a fearless, yet friendly spirit, has grand Scottie expression and coat.

At present the Marymac Kennels house two champion bitches, Marymac's Jean Girl and Acton Hill's Fairy Tale, and two champion studs, Johnny Martin of Sally Forth and the old gentleman, Can. Ch. Haldon Tally Ho, who is well up in years but is still producing nice puppies. In the near future Marymac will campaign two younger studs. Since the development of air express and air freight, Marymac have shipped puppies to many sections of the country and three recently left for South America.

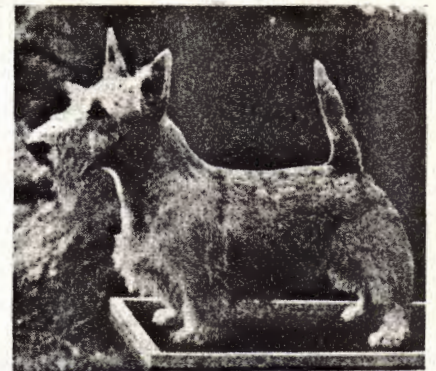

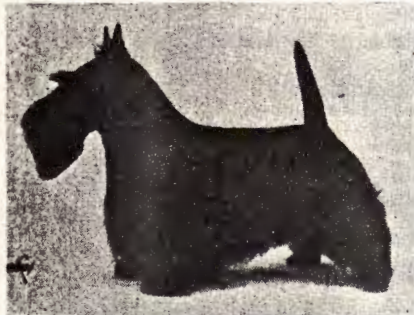
