Dr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Thomas' Ch. Wyrebury Worthwhile did terrific winning at the Florida shows and topped the Terrier Group at the Re-

cent Worcester K. C. Show. Their Ch. Highlander Trickster won 27 Best of Breeds this past year with Phil Prentice handling, and the Thomases finished two Champions by him — Highlander Bard and Rivanel's Prima Donna.

Ruth and Henry Israel of Paisley Hill fame are offering a Memorial Trophy for their beloved Ch. Marlu Clincher through the Scottish Terrier Club of America. It will be a Sterling Trophy for members only for the dog or bitch winning the most points in Best of Breed at Specialty Shows only, throughout the country during 1955, based on the championship point rating at the shows. Clincher himself topped 6 Specialties.

There was an entry of 59 with 10 Specials, and last year's Best of Breed, Olive Carter's Rebel Invader made it two in a row by topping the entry. In 1954 he had come up from the classes. This year, this Troubadour son, was entered in Specials. Eileen Josten took Best Opposite with Ch. Hampton Hill Wit.

Barberry Knowe Wager owned by the Charles C. Stallers was Best of Winners. Bred by Mrs. Josten, he is by Ch. Syl-Von's Sirius ex Ch. Hampton Hill Whim, and you will hear more about the latter when we get to Westminster. In bitches, Blanche Reeg took the points with Mar-Eli's Make Mine Manhattan, a daughter of Ch. Blanart Bartender out of Blanart Bitters of Drumbule, bred by Mary Coplin. Reserves were the W. Sheldon Winans' Sr. Puppy Dog, Fullvitt Festive Fling, a homebred by Ch. Edgerstone Troubadour out of Ch. Fullvitt Wee Mousie, and Mrs. Reeg's homebred, Blanart Bellsong, by Ch. Blanart Barrieter ex Ch. Blanart Bluebell.

The entry dropped to 36 at Westminster. Morgan Stinemetz handing out the ribbons. Mrs. Josten's Ch. Hampton Hill Whim, a litter sister to Wit, was Best of Breed, and Ch. Rebel Invader Best Opposite. The point winners were a repeat of the Special-

The California— Kentucky Derby

This contest shall be known as the California-Kentucky Derby. Its purpose is to select, as fairly as possible, the best Scottish Terrier within a given period, to represent the Scottish Terrier Club of California at the Scottish Terrier Club of Kentucky specialty show in 1955.

1. Most Best of Breeds computed by point system (points awarded in the breed only) between September 1, 1954 and July 31, 1955. Contest limited to American bred dogs and bitches owned by members of the Scottish Terrier Club of California.

2. All dogs or bitches that are not champions of record on January 1, 1954 are eligible. Members desiring to participate shall, by paying \$10.00 into the purse before September 1, 1954, be eligible to enter dogs in this contest.

3. Winner must guarantee that the winning dog will be shown at the 1955 Scottish Terrier Club of Kentucky specialty show. In the event that the winning dog is prevented from competing at the Kentucky specialty show due to illness or to the unwillingness of the owner through any circumstance to ship said dog for show, then that dog shall be declared ineligible and the runner up shall be declared winner.

4. In the event of a tie by two or more dogs then the purse shall be divided equally between those owners willing to show. Owner need not accompany his dog. Dog's presence only is required.

5. Should an eligible dog change owners he will remain eligible provided the new owner has been a member of the Scottish Terrier Club of California since July 1, 1954. No money will be refunded. Contributions to this purse by nonparticipants will be welcomed, as it is felt that a considerable purse will be necessary.

6. The contest to be limited to shows in California (making equal point ratings for all.)

Note: The winner's expenses are paid from monies collected from entries in the Derby.

Night Watch is a particularly beautiful silver brindle with black mask and tips, excelling in head, eye and expression. He is said to have the short, compact body of Warspite, with the reach of neck and masculine style of Red Seal. He possesses an exceptionally hard coat and the disposition which makes him an outstanding showman. He has an excellent litter sister, Ch. Carnation Sweet-Poosity. Both Night Watch and Pegarty finished in four shows, and Night Watch, shown to date four times in Specials, has won four groups and two Best in Shows All Breeds.

One of his Best in Shows was at the Richland Kennel Club event, and here he won the second leg for Carnation Farms on the three-time Perpetual Best in Show Trophy. Carnation won it the first time in 1947, and they are now the only two-time winners.

Carnation tell us that Night Watch is very definitely carrying on his heritage, both on the bench and at stud. His litters to date have been very good and on maturing, promise well for the future.

We believe there were only three Scotties which took Best in Show at All Breed events in 1954. Two were Carnation Scotts, Night Watch and Ch. Carnation Comet, and the third was the Carters' Ch. Edgerstone Troubadour. Night Watch has been handled at all of the shows by Bob Bartos, Carnation Farms Manager.

How To Select The Best Puppy

I TAKE my dogs very seriously and have been studying for years to find a way to judge puppies and predict their eventual quality. I have joined the ranks of my teachers—not one of whom could tell me anything for sure. Their answers to my questions confused me with such helpful hints as—"he might," "you never can tell," "if he doesn't get too big," "if he gets big enough," "he could grow into his ears," "if he doesn't get too long," etc. etc. Although it isn't easy to do, I'll try to write something constructive on this subject, but there is one thing you'll be sure to learn—when you take a healthy, well-groomed and well trained puppy into the ring and the judge hands you the blue ribbon, you have a good one—providing you have quality competition and a capable breeder judge! My friends say that I never admit that I have a good one until it has at least one major show!

Enough! Facetiousness. The first time I try to evaluate potential quality is at about five weeks of age when the puppies first gather around the feed pan. You can see something of body conformation, tail set and length, and sometimes temperament can be predicted at this time. I look for shortness of body—because we all have plenty of good long ones—then a

short straight little tail standing straight up. I still like a large head on a Scottie because I feel that is our one big difference with other short-legged Terriers. The quality of the

head will not be apparent until later, but I like to see very small ears set well up on the head. At this age eyes may look round or prominent, but if eyes are not a fault in the line, you can disregard them at this time.

I think that the most important consideration should be given to tem-

perament, and this I try to discover at about nine or ten weeks. I like to bring them into a strange room, one at a time, as often a puppy will gain superficial courage from the others. I like them to start getting acquainted with the new surroundings immediately, testing the strange footing, inquiring into everything and not taking too long about it. If noise with how much confidence they approach a strange older dog, strange people, and a ball or strange toy.

Then comes the "moo-cow" test! This is a toy box, containing a contraption that makes a loud long mournful m-o-o-o when turned upside down. This noise is repeated several times and then the object placed on the floor. Some pups will immediately rush up and grab it in a slightly hysterical way. This I regard as too foolhardy for a Scottie and prefer the one who walks up to it confidently, not too slowly, and with no crouch, and then takes hold of it with his mouth. When his attention persuades it to m-o-o again, he does not let go but inquisitively holds on, then puts it down to try to figure out what makes it "go." He soon discovers this and then proceeds to get a succession of sounds from it. The pups to discard for temperament are the ones who run whimpering under anything they can find and refuse to come out to get acquainted. Most of us know the heartbreak of our most beautiful specimen being timid, and I, for one, have decided that, in any dog, timidity is absolutely the worst fault. Temperament alone is not

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The Years Between

IN November of 1954 Scottish Terriers in Gt. Britain completed 75 years of show history for it was in 1879 that the breed emerged into show status and became eligible to win certificates. 75 years of history stretch between the shadowy, unrecorded highland terriers of the breed's beginning and the two top show dogs of 1954; Britain's Ch. Westpark Der-

1925 and 1927 came near to doing just that, for Alister's greatest descendant, Champion Albourne Barty and Heather Necessity, stamped their type so strongly on the breed that they and their sons have dominated the male lines ever since. In America, 800 champions trace to this pair. Although the male line from Dundee has almost ceased to exist as a male line it still persists on the distaff side of many pedigrees through the brother-sister team of Markman of Docket and Albourne Annie Laurie. The breed as it exists today is largely made up of the sons and daughters of this type-setting quartet.

Principally through the importation of British dogs in the early days and Necessity sons in the 1930s, British bred sires dominated the lists of American champions from 1898 to 1942. The next ten years saw American bred sires move into a lead which they have held by a wide margin until 1954, a year featured by increased importations with a considerable number of the year's champions sired by earlier imports.



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riford Baffie and America's Ch. Edgerstoune Troubadour. Popularity has varied through these years, type has changed in some details, great dogs have had their hour in the spotlight, some to fade into oblivion and some to continue on through equally great sons and daughters. But through all the exigencies of time the breed has maintained a high rating among terriers and has retained those unique qualities which led to the alias "Once a Scottish owner, always a Scottish owner".

During 75 years of show history in Britain, 367 champions have been produced and while show history in America began some twenty years later, 1077 champions have been recorded here. The sexes making up the American total are nearly even, 544 dogs and 533 bitches. Not all of the champions in either country can be classified as great but the study of bloodlines has demonstrated that some produce winning stock more consistently than others and that these lines in the hands of thoughtful breeders will continue to produce champions.

McCandlish said long ago that "No one dog can revolutionize the breed, bitches have as much to do with breed type as the sire". Two stars, however appearing in close conjunction in

A ten year period should provide some indication of the trend bloodlines are taking in a breed but it is remarkable how consistently a few lines have continued to produce champions during the years from 1945 through 1954. The majority of the 482 champions in the Barty group still trace to Br. Ch. Albourne Barty and although the progeny of Ch. Walsing Winning Trick have been coming up so rapidly in the past four years that he may soon dominate the group.

In the small Necessity group, 144, tracing to him through sons other

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Ch. Blanart Barcarolle

It has been said again and again and cannot be too often repeated that "the strength of a kennel lies in the bitches it contains". Dogs and bitches closely in-bred to a particular type can be expected to impress that type on their progeny, but from time to time individuals appear who produce winning stock to a degree which cannot be explained by the heredity. Progenitor sires are usually available to everyone, but progenitor bitches are the exclusive property of their home kennel. When a bitch such as this appears who consistently throws quality, regardless of the bloodlines of the dog to whom she is bred, she can be the making of the kennel fortunate enough to own her. This, Ch. Blanart Barcarolle has done for Mrs. Blanche Reeg and her Blanart Kennels.

There have been many outstanding bitches in Scottish Terrier history but the record of Barcarolle places her at the top of the roster of producing matrons in America. At the end of 1954, a daughter, Blanart Barayee, completed her championship by bringing to eight the number of champions out of Barcarolle and to set a new record for American champions from one Scottish bitch.

Barcarolle's story is also the story of a great litter. Whelped in June 1947 it contained in addition to "Carol" two males important as sires: Blanart Buccaneer and Blanart Brigadier. The dam of this litter was Hiscott's Clipper, a granddaughter of

Ch. Heather Realisation and the sire was Kenneth MacBain's young dog Cabrach Caliper, a son of Diehard Fashion. This breeding represented a departure from the line-breeding which Mrs. Reeg had practiced for fourteen years without achieving any top winners, but the outcross to Caliper apparently supplied what the family line needed to create an outstanding litter which became the foundation of the present Blanart line.

In 1948, with some trepidation as to her ability to condition and handle her dog Mrs. Reeg nominated Barcarolle's sire and entered her in the S.T.C.A. Stud Dog Sweepstakes. To her great joy "Carol" won the purse and the prize for herself and her sire.

Encouraged by this win, Mrs. Reeg continued to show her promising youngster to her title. "Carol" treated the judging ring with friendly tolerance but with considerable boredom. Like so many Scottish bitches she took puppies seriously, but shows never.

Barcarolle's eight champions did not conclude the record of this litter; her two litter brothers, Buccaneer and Brigadier, sired three and two champions respectively, bringing the present total of this producing group to thirteen champions. As evidence that they are continuing to produce, ten grandchildren and one great-granddaughter have completed their titles. From Barcarolle's first litter, by Diehard Toby, came three champions all with important wins. These were Blanart Barrister and Blanart Ballad, Winners Dog and Winners Bitch at the February Specialty in 1951, with the latter taking Best of Winners at the Garden the following day. A litter mate, Blanart Black Queen, was Best of Winners at the Specialty and at the Garden in 1952. Barcarolle, bred six times to five different dogs, has produced at least one champion in each litter. Her latest champion, Blanart Barayee, is by her son Ch. Blanart Barrister and four bitches from this litter are now producing beautiful uniform puppies.

Indefinable attribute needed to make the good ones great. At eight years of age, "Carol", still beautiful and as playful as a puppy, has been bred again, this time to a double great grandson of her two litter brothers.

Perhaps it is a bit premature to appraise within her lifetime the producing ability of a bitch but Hazzardelle's own record as a producer of champions seems likely to be secure for some time since such prepotent bitches are few and far between. "Carol" is doing her share. Next it will be up to her excellent sons and daughters, coupled with astute breeding on the part of their owners, to turn to good account this fine heritage.

Show Shorts

Years ago the Baltimore show served as a sort of kick-off for Westminsters, but all this is changed, due to the early closing date and the ribbon requirements for entries at the Garden. Baltimore is a big show though — better than 700 dogs this year. Mrs. Augustus Riggs IV judged Scotties. There were 13, and Dr. and

most 800 entries and a really big Scottie entry, 25, again the largest in the group. Here the Scottish Terrier Club of Northern Ohio considered the classes as its Specialty show and Ernest Crowley judged. There was a quite terrific trophy list, about two pages long in the catalogue. Ch. Erb's Ray-Mar was Best of Breed and third in the group, Goldie Seagraves Seagraves Glamour Girl Best of Winners and Best Opposite and the George LeRoy Smith's Bittersweet Butterball, Winners Dog. Glamour Girl's litter brother, Seagraves Anchor Man was the Reserve Winning Dog and Galley Wren of Seaglen, the Reserve Bitch.

Canton, Ohio had 6 entries with Seagraves Anchor Man going from the Open class to Best of Breed, absent from the group, and Genevieve Walkley's Blamart Barnaid Winners Bitch and Best Opposite.

Florida Shows

Just got four catalogues from the later Florida shows — Orlando, Clearwater, St. Petersburg and Tampa. Eight at Orlando and Dr. and Mrs. J. A. Thomas' Ch. through his son Ch. Heather Ambition is a large one, 24, and continues to be dominated by Br. & Am. Ch. Orley Ambassadors. An interesting trend in the last three years is a notable increase in American champions coming from Ambassador's British sons, Gildie Impression and Crich Convo.

While the Ambition group has produced champions consistently throughout this decade, those de-

scending from Ch. Heather Fashion Hint, 254, have shown their greatest rise in the last six years. By far the largest number have come from Ch. Realisation's son, Ch. Walsing Warrant through his grandsons, Champions Deephaven Red Seal and Deephaven Jeferly. An equal number are coming from a Realisation grandson, Walsing Wizard, who is accounting for many British champions through the Westpark Scottish Terriers.

In a brief article on leading sires published in this magazine in 1950, the first ten sires were listed with the number of champions credited to each. In a similar list as of the close of 1954 Br. Ch. Heather Fashion Hint still holds first place with 26. Following him are six who have aired 15 or more champions: Ch. Shielding's Signature (22), Ch. Heather Goldfinder (20), Ch. Walsing Winning Trick (18), Ch. Deephaven Red Seal (17), Heather Asset (16), and Ch. Hillcote Laddie (15).

Continuing bloodlines are more difficult to appraise but also, perhaps, more significant. In this category the lines from Realisation through Champion Walsing Warrant and Walsing Wizard are at present the most active in America, having produced an increasingly high number of champions since 1950 with an overall total of 107. Second is the line from Ch. Ortley Ambassador (80), third Heather Asset (59), fourth Ch.

What trend the breed will take in the next ten years and along what lines is a matter of concern to all of us who love Scottish Terriers above all other breeds. The breed will change as all living things do, and it may deviate from the standard as others have done unless there is a backbone of earnest breeders who make balance, proportion and soundness their watchword; who strive to bring the breed back from each variation toward exaggeration; who set as their goal a rugged, active terrier of a size most difficult to breed — the big dog in small compass.

How To Select The Best Puppy

enough as your best pup must be the one with the best conformation, coupled with a good sound temperament. Large size is not often the best, and usually the one who is smaller and slower in maturing will be the best "laster."

There are so many influences of luck, management and health that affect the final quality of the pup that perhaps some of these should be mentioned. There is the question of teeth. Providing the ancestry is conducive to perfect mouths so much depends on when the puppy teeth come

out. This is influenced by health, how much they play and with what. We often have the second teeth coming in before the first teeth are out. This crowding may be helpful if it is crowding a certain jaw and very harmful if it is crowding the jaw that should be discouraged. From four to five months the Scottish puppy head grows about an inch and this is while the teeth are changing and the eventual length of the head can be predicted.

The faults of the line and of the ancestors should be known and fearlessly admitted by the breeder. In trying to improve and correct faults, one should always try to select puppies which show improvement in these

faults and more or less ignore indications of faults which are not prevalent in the line.

One of our big problems is shoulders, and this I feel I am no expert on in predicting. I have seen beautiful close shoulder blades get spread, and I have seen shoulder blades that spread and are bumpy grow into beautiful well laid back shoulders at eleven months. Perhaps this is because the temperament of the dog caused it to trot and exercise correctly, as the shoulder blades are only attached to the skeleton by muscles. I have had both kinds from the same line-bred strain, and I do believe that shoulders improve up to one year of age even though they may not get perfect.

Another place you may expect improvement is in top line. A puppy will often look "roachly" at six or seven months because of a habit of galloping rather than trotting. By maturity it will perhaps begin to trot, especially if it exercises alone and this will tighten up shoulder muscles, rais-

ing the withers and discouraging the roach back muscles caused by hard galloping play. Sometimes, however, a roached back is caused because the dog is too long in the loin or has a low-set tail.

There is really no substitute for experience to consistently breed good ones, and I believe it is good to use the experienced breeder's advice if you can. Sincere breeders are always willing to help. Be patient, keep the good ones until maturity, and you will find that time and care will often improve them. Select ruthlessly, however, and when you find a fault developing, do not let your "heart rule your head."

By watching for and encouraging good temperament you can gain the alert ears, eyes and expression, as well as a high held head and confident powerful movement which is the best foundation for your show quality dog. Then comes good grooming, good handling and Good Luck!
