The Scotty entry at the Scottish Terrier Club of America Show held in New York the day before Westminster brought out the splendid entry of eighty-five — largest of any of the entries at the combined specialty show. There were Sweepstakes Classes judged by Mrs. William Shetburn with Edward Danks doing the regular classes.

The Sweepstakes were well supported there being a total of 28 entries in three classes. Dogs and bitches were judged together. In 4-9 mos., Arnault Edevery placed first with Boone Wassail; in 9-12 first was Mary Peters' Rannoch Dune Ballad of Mar. Ell. Blanch Reeg's Blarnt Barce's Second Mate got the nod in 12-18 mos.

In the regular classes Best of Breed went to Mr. and Mrs. Chas. C. Stalter's Ch. Barberr Knowe Wyndola which came up from a class of 13 Specials. Mrs. Louise Benham's

Blarnt Baraye named Darloch Durhess, (a black) which was bred by Joe Stephens. She is a real beauty and will be shown under the Mel-Jean's banner as soon as mature.

Pictured in this issue is Cuttysart's Gold Treasure owned by Mrs. H. E. McComb, Rutledge, Tenn. He won first place in the wheaten Open Dog class which was held with the Specialty at Louisville last October. It will be remembered this was the first show where there were separate classes for wheaten. Mrs. McComb has long been interested in wheaten and is one of our most successful wheaten breeders. Gold Treasure is a son of Ch. Kinclaven Fortissimo out of Cuttysart's Gorgeous Gussie.

To date he has sired three litters — fifteen puppies in all—and eight have been wheatens. A very recent litter of six puppies were all wheatens, the third all-wheaten litter Mrs. McComb's Clinch Mt. Kennels have had in the past ten years. All three of these all-wheaten litters were from their wheaten bitch, Clinch Mt. Stardust.

Another new Champion is Erb's Silver Star owned by the Erb Kennels of Olmsted Falls, Ohio. He is a homebred sire by Ch. Sheffield Selectman out of Ch. Amerescot Mistress Mary. He went from the classes to Best of Breed and won the group at Grand Rapids in January; was Best of Breed at five shows on the Florida circuit, took points at three others, placed in two groups, the only groups in which he was shown. At the Lansing show in December, Erb's Dashing Count completed his title with a Best of Breed and fourth in the group. He was bred by the Bruzgermann's Erb's Kennels, and is owned by Dolores Lucas.

"There's No Business Like Show Business"

THE American Kennel Club in a foreword to the rules applying to dog shows, states: "The holding of dog shows, at which pure-bred dogs may be exhibited and be given an opportunity to compete for prizes and thereby enable their breeders and/or owners to demonstrate the progress made in breeding for type and quality . . . has been found to be the best method by which the progress which has been made in

breeding can be shown". Of the several parts of this rather involved statement only the last holds the key to the essential reason for holding a show: to demonstrate progress made in breeding. A laudable reason but how many of the ringsiders, exhibitors, or even judges keep this phase of a show in mind? Which is more important to the average show participant, the glory, the prizes and the excitement of competition, or the serious comparison of one fine animal with another to the end that the winner shall be the one which in

physical and mental attributes appears to be best fitted to carry on the breed? In other words, what impels us to strive for championship titles? Why attend shows week after week, enduring the aching fatigue, the smoky atmosphere, the too-thin sandwiches, the long drives in heavy traffic? There are many reasons but perhaps the most remote is a focus on the betterment of breeds.

The greatest lure might easily be "the smell of the sawdust", a reason which any long-time circus performer could readily understand. It is compounded of many happy memories: the remembered triumph of a dearly loved dog, the coffee and dog-talk shared with friends in a chummy atmosphere redolent of pine oil, the feeling of good fellowship in a doggy world where humdrum business can be forgotten for a day. Perhaps it all sums up to a keen love for dogs and a feeling of satisfaction at being a part of the world where the dog becomes king for a day.

racing may be the sport of kings but dog breeding and exhibiting is within the scope of most incomes. When we own something by which we set great store it loses much unless we can exhibit it where others can admire and perhaps envy our possession. The dog show offers an opportunity to gain the admiration we all crave, an opportunity to shine in the dazzling light of victory which is, pardonably, a strong desire in all of us. If the moment of victory represents the satisfaction of another step toward the goal of producing better dogs, well and good. In its mild form inflation of the ego is an excellent tonic and a spur to greater accomplishment. Bona fide breeders, hard workers all, form the nucleus of this class of exhibitors and the backbone of dog shows.

There is another segment, however, whose craving for power and personal achievement transcends all other considerations at a dog show. To these only the win is important and

little. If this one does not bring home the big prizes another can be found and purchased to take his place. To this class of exhibitors the frantic pursuit of Group and Best in Show wins is the end and all of the show ring; "the progress made in breeding for type and quality" forms no part of the picture.

But make no mistake, there are many who do not forget the dog who shares the triumph, many whose first thought is a hug or a "well-done" pat for the little partner who has done his best. His ribbons mean

Is he the center of the admiring crowd and the recipient of rewarding pats, or is he snapped hurriedly into the darkness of his crate and forgotten? Too often the latter is his lot. He was purchased from his breeder because of his possibility as a show winner and beyond that he means

their supporters to examine the present status of the breed, its popularity, the demand for good stock, and the trend it is taking toward or away from the standard.

greats. Fortunately, most of them have been acquired by kennels with a long and enviable record for producing good, honest winning Scots. A few are in the hands of smaller but equally serious breeders who are carefully planning and selecting their litters with an eye to the future. With both of these the bloodlines are safe and their fusion with well-bred American stock will almost certainly result in outstanding Scottish Terriers to come, Scottish Terriers which will "demonstrate progress made in breeding's form and quality".

And finally, a word to those of you who are exhibiting Scottish Terriers. Whether you have bred or purchased the dog you are showing you also

What I Mean By Line-Breeding

By Blanch Reep, Box 116, Seaman Neck Rd., Wantagh, L. I., N. Y.

DO NOT fancy myself a geneticist, but I have been asked by many who have read and studied less than I have, what we mean by "line-breeding." I will try to describe what I mean when I say "linebred" and hope to be corrected, by someone who knows better, if my explanation is fundamentally false. As authorities seem to differ in their explanations, perhaps I can be pardoned if my un-

derstanding is incorrect. For instance, I have read recently that one must see the virtues of an animal repeated in their progeny before this animal is of value in breeding for certain characteristics. does not even show himself. Observing these results are what we call "selection" and it is very necessary. This has proven correct in my experience. It is true that one kennel or even one breed cannot carry on an experiment in one lifetime to prove these facts, but as breeders in a breed we can improve, to a certain point, if we accept certain facts and discard "hit and miss" breeding policies.

In my mind it is the first requirement of a good dog.

As I began to see certain faults in conformation, I bred her to dogs which had produced improvement in this fault and using this progeny to breed to her other descendants who might need this improvement. My experience has not been scientific perhaps, but it certainly has not been hit or miss.

I understand it is easier to base a breeding program of line-breeding on a stud rather than on a bitch, because of the male having a greater number of descendants to select from. Consequently, I feel lucky in having had seven litters from this bitch, although the total is only twenty-four puppies to choose from. Although I have never had a son or daughter that had all her quality, by combining grand-daughters, uncles, sons, etc., I have been able to raise the level of quality in all litters, and all are showing more of her virtues as the generations increase. Some of the pups now show her four and five times in their pedigree.

To put line-breeding very simply: A dog can only pass on faults or virtues which they inherit, whether visible or invisible. As they cannot pass on all the faults or virtues, because of numerical inheritance of gene and chromosomes, when you line-breed selectively to quality, you reduce the number of possibilities of faults and increase the chance of inheriting virtues, because there is not as great a number of faulty genes. However, the pull is back to average, and the disappointment is that one can never hope to achieve a perfect dog! The point to remember is that there is no virtue in line-breeding for its sake, alone. Unless you would be satisfied with a reproduction of the animal you line-breed to, don't try it. You probably will have to be content with a little less, even though the average will be higher. I hope this will explain the pitfalls to watch for as well as the advantages you might expect from careful selection in a line-breeding program.
