SIXTY-FIVE Scottish Terriers completed their Championships in the past twelve months, i.e., as officially confirmed and their names published in the American Kennel Gazette, issues of March 1957 thru February 1958. We believe that all sixty-five actually finished in 1957.

The leading sire, and by quite a wide margin, is Ch. Wyrebury Wrangler who has eight of the current Champions to his credit. In second spot is his son, Ch. Wyrebury Wilwyn with four sired by him. Both are English imports. Three sires produced three Champions each and they are: Champions Edgerstoune Troubadour; Bianart Bolero and Cantie Captivator. Those siring two each include Champions Niddbank His Nibs, Trevone Tartar of Bothkenar, Walsing Winning Trick of Edgerstoune and Rannoch Dune Rogan.

The leading dam is Ch. Wyrebury Water Gypsy with three to her credit. An import, all three of Gypsy's Champions are from one litter. She was imported by F. C. Ewing in whelp to Ch. Wyrebury Wilwyn and the three Champions are from this litter. Four bitches produced two

Scottish Terriers, R. H. McGill, Rannoch Dune Kennels, Dr. Allan Kirk and Dorissa Barnes.

Champions each and they are Ch. Bianart Barcoe's Trey, Ch. Trevone Tara, Fran Jean's Bride Molly and Crescent Hill Ginger Blossom.

By an odd set of circumstances the leading breeder this year of our sixty-five American Champions is an English breeder—Wm. Berry with four Champions to his credit. Officially he is the breeder of the three Wilwyn-Gypsy Champions mentioned above, (the three were imported "in utero") plus one other and it puts him in first spot. Tying for second place honors are several of our American breeders—Mrs. Wm. M. Robertson; Blanche Reeg; and F. C. Ewing. These three produced three Champions each. Those breeders which produced two Champions each are

The Scottish Terrier Club of California's Annual Specialty Show—always a Top one—will be the Year's Silver Anniversary Show this year. The date is April 27th and the judge the well-known easterner Charles C. Stalter. Last year this Specialty had an entry of forty-eight—sure to be larger this year.

There are some new Champions which finished for the title, too late to be included in the current list. Among those we know of is T. H. Sneath's Glenview Grand Duke who finished in four shows with four Majors—one a five pointer won at the Specialty in N. Y. He won two Groups from the classes—Annapolis and, according to a late flash, Elm City.

And from California we hear that Mary German's Cantie's Ace took final points at Silver Bay.

Mrs. Kathryn M. Levy of New York owns the only two living set of Hazelbrae Best Trick (By Ch. Walsing Winning Trick of Edgerstoune ex Gold Pinder's Bess) and both are Champions—Hazelbrae Bridge Desk and The Fairy Flag—a current Champion which is pictured.

Here are the 1958 officers of the Scottish Terrier Club of Ky., whose Specialty show in 1957 was the sec-

ond largest in the country for Scottish—the Parent Club's N. Y. Specialty was first. President of the Ky. Club is Harry Stanley; Vice-President, Mrs. Clara Kinkead Applegate; Treasurer Mrs. Evelyn Morris; Secretary Mrs. W. S. Carter.

When the famous Ch. Deephaven Bess Seal died two weeks before Marlorain Dark Seal was whelped, Marlorain Kennels of Harbor City, Calif., realized how important his bloodline would be to their breeding program. In 1957 Dark Seal finished his title with five Majors and was the top-winning West Coast Scotty. His dam, Ch. Mariglen Blithe Spirit has two Champions to her credit and last year she was bred to Westpark Rio Grande and Marlorain expect great things from the litter. Lena Kardos purchased a male, Marlorain Hamish and at 11 weeks he was Best Opposite at the Orange Empire Spring Puppy Match. Jean Chisholm has one of the bitch puppies and states it looks most promising. Right now it would seem that four of the six puppies would go places.

lated three Champions in 1957. This year they hope to have their first home-bred Champion and write that their Ver-Nev's Stylish Lass is a nice looking prospect.

1957 was really quite a year for southern breeders. The Ewing's Nosegay kennels bred three Champions and their Ch. Wyrebury Water Gypsy and some of her pups had awesome records. Since September Gypsy won sixteen groups and a Best in Show at Birmingham. Two of her pups finished unbeaten in their sex and Ch. Nosegay Nankin finished in five shows winning two groups and a

Best in Show at St. Petersburg.

And still in the south, Dr. Allan Kirk of Virginia bred two Champions—yes, 1957 was a good year for southern breeders.

Due to illness in their immediate family the Henry D. Israels of Dayton, Ohio, missed the New York show this year—and how they hated it. The Israels are going into their 31st year of breeding Scotties.

Carnation Farm Kennels have shown their "Baffle" clear across the country as their Best of Breed wins at Long Beach, the International and Westminster certainly testify. His Westminster win was his 24th Best of Breed; he won 31 Terrier Groups; 14 Best in Shows and topped a couple of Specialty events. We've a very late flash that Carnation Dark Sentry has finished his title with one Best in Show and two 2nd in Group placements. Carnation Leading Lady finished with a Group win at Spokane.

## British Notes

**BY HIGH ROAD** and low road, by railway and airway, 6,916 dogs converged on London's Olympia to make the 1958 Cruft's the largest dog show ever held in England or any other country. In 1886 Charles Cruft held his first show of 600 dogs and thru the intervening years it has grown in size and public favor until it has become the prestige show of England as Westminster is the prestige show of the U.S.A. With 30 and 40 entries per class in many of the more popular breeds even a placing in the top three becomes important while a Best of Breed winner creates for himself a special place in dog show annals.

The weather on opening day, Friday, Feb. 7th, was anything but kind to the dog show committee anxious to make this the biggest show in entries as well as in attendance. The day was bitterly cold and heavy snow continued falling for several hours, drastically cutting the first day attendance. During the night, however, the temperature took a sudden upward turn and Saturday was mild.

A new feature of the show was the "Dog's Delicatessen" which greeted hungry early arrivals at the show. A choice of some 20 or 30 different menus was available featuring fresh meat, cooked meat, boiled liver, hot milk, tripe, broth and almost anything a dog might fancy. The show

was televised by the BBC.

Miss Vassilopulo judging 92 Scottish Terriers seemed to find few serious faults in her top class winners. Her comments mentioned a few faults such as oversize, height on leg, flat sides and an occasional low tail set. On the other side of the ledger were the possession of good harsh coats, excellent bone and substance, and free movement. In the case of dogs, credit was given for proper masculine appearance, a desirable asset in a stud dog.

The dog c.e. was awarded to Miss Law's Eckersley Wee McGregor and since this was his third certificate he becomes the first champion of the year. He is by Ch. Eckersley Wee Mon of the Fashion Hint line and out of the bitch, Chesterton Caprice. The reserve c.e. went to Ryeland Bed Ensign. Mrs. Dewar's bitch Desco Doreen by Ch. Happy Kimbo ex Desco Daylight won her first c.e. and reserve bitch was Mr. Gee's Glenview Carnival Queen.

The terrier group was won by the Lakeland, Tithebarn Highlight, Best in Show to the Pointer bitch, Ch. Chiming Bells. Reserve Best in Show was the non-sporting winner, the Bullmastiff, Ch. Ambassador of Biltonook.

And so finished another great dog show with everyone looking forward to an even finer Cruft's of 1959. Judges for next year have already been announced and Miss P. Drummond will pass on Scottish Terriers.

## Our Cover

Ch. Blanart Barcarolle

**PICTURED ON OUR cover** is the world's record-holding Scottish Terrier dam - Ch. Blanart Barcarolle, owned by Mrs. Blanche Reeg's Blanart Kennels of Wantagh, New York. Barcarolle produced ten Champions from twenty-three puppies raised from seven different litters sired by six different dogs.

Barcarolle was a Blanart's first Champion and she was groomed and handled by her Novice Owner. All of her Champion sons and daughters were winners at the largest of the Eastern shows including five Westminster winners. "Carol" now has 40 Champion descendants to her credit.

Although 3 of Barcarolle's Champion sons have accounted for some twenty-four Champions, Blanart are at present developing a successful family line through three of her daughters — Ch. Blanart Baraye, Ch. Blanart Black Queen and Blanart Barcoe, the latter being a result of a son to mother (Barrister-Barcarolle) breeding. Barcoe and the newly-crowned Champion Blanart Bewitching, a double granddaughter of Barcarolle's are considered the nearest thing to her in the kennel.

For nine consecutive years a descendant of Barcarolle's has been Winner Dog or Winner Bitch at the Garden!

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## INFLUENCE OF AN ANCESTOR

**S**HORTLY AFTER the July article on Br. Ch. Albourne Barty appeared in this magazine, Mrs. Caspers commented in the Scottish Terrier column of "Our Dogs" on the dearth of male representatives of the line in England. This brought forth the interesting suggestion from an English breeder that a Barty line dog, perhaps a son or grandson of Ch. Walsing Winning Trick, be imported from America "to become the property of one of the specialist clubs, to be kennelled by one of its members, and stand at public stud." Rightly, Mrs. Caspers saw many problems arising in connection with such a venture, problems of a practical nature such as the financial outlay re-

responsibility of finding and choosing a dog which retained his best characteristics? Is there one like him among his myriad American descendants which are now six to eight generations removed from the sturdy black dog whose name identifies the line? America has always drawn heavily on England's winning lines as the charts on Necessity and his sons plainly show. The founders of these lines were not for sale, nor the good producing bitches, but a goodly number of their sons and grandsons

quired, responsibility for the dog's care, etc. These are assuredly the first difficulties which come to mind but as one muses on the many factors involved, greater difficulties, less easily solved, come to mind. There are undoubtedly many Scottish Terrier followers in England and a few in America who remember Barty but what one of these would want the

travelled overseas to blend with and often dominate the lines already here.

As with other lines, America drew her full share of Barty stock, the most important being his son Br. Ch. Albourne Brigand, his grandsons Br. & Am. Ch. Heather Reveller and Ch. Heather Gold Finder, and the most recent import Br. & Am. Ch. Walsing Winning Trick. To learn something of the influence exerted by this group it might be interesting to examine the pedigrees of their present representatives and note the extent of their use.

The last 100 American champions which belong to this line are spread thru the years 1949 to 1958. There are 52 bitches in this group, twenty of which carry double or triple crosses to Barty. 15 of these have

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produced a total of 31 champions. Not a bad record for show bitches, altho Ch. Blanart Barcarolle has accounted for one third of them.

The 48 dogs are, of course, a more significant group for it is up to them to extend the line. The dogs carry a heavier percentage of Barty ancestry than the bitches for 29 of them carry double and even triple such breeding. Ten of the dogs have thus far accounted for a total of 46 champions—21 bitches and 25 dogs. The 25 dogs can be further classified into a smaller group for they represent only two lines—that from the sons of Winning Trick and the line from Heather Reveller down to Ch. Blanart Bolero. After flourishing for many years, the line from Ch. Al-

well as Barrister, could conceivably continue the line but it is at present inactive.

This brief survey covers a period which produced a total of 479 champions representing all four of the present producing lines. In addition to the 100 champions described above, there are also 44 champions from the Necessity, Ambition, and Fashion Hint lines which trace to Barty on the family side. 30% of

great dogs, Champions Albourne Admiration and Maigen Juggernaut, forerunners of Walsing Winning Trick and his progeny. It is this same line from Juggernaut thru his grandson, Desert Emperor which gave England her last male Barty champion, Glenrae Prince Charming in 1948. As in America there are still a number of non-champion dogs which could still carry on.

Yes, America has plenty of Scotties of these bloodlines and the English breeder who suggested a son or grandson of Trick was right in that this is the most popular and prolific of the Barty lines. We must remember, however, that Trick's dam came from the Fashion Hint and Ambition lines thru sons of Walsing Wizard and Ch. Ortlely Ambassador. In turn,

bourne Brigand is now a question mark as a male line for it hinges on one champion, Blanart Barrister, who has sired nine champion daughters but as yet no champion sons. A number of non-champion dogs, as

all the champions in this period then, trace to him on line, family or both.

And so in the end it appears that only thru his son, Dr. Ch. Albourne Reveller, does the male line from Barty flourish today in either England or America. The stronger line at least more prolific of champions at the moment—is the one which has come to us thru two of England's

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## HOW TO SELECT A SCOTTISH TERRIER

By D. S. Caspersz, *The Cottage, Turville Heath, Henleworth-Thames, England*

**REASONS** FOR knowing how to select a young Scottish Terrier vary according to the purpose for which the dog is required. The selectors usually fall into one of three categories, which for convenience I label "A", "B" and "C".

Class "A" are the everyday buyers of a puppy for house-pet and companion. It may be for a child's playmate, and if so the buyer has been well advised, for there is no breed better suited to follow this vocation.

Class "B" are those who, though having no intention of exhibiting, yet want a typical well-bred bitch puppy, from which ultimately they may breed a few litters as a hobby.

Class "C" are the true breeders, their selective powers are mostly called into play over their own home-bred stock.

To the class "A", seekers after an intelligent companion, I would say let neither coat-color, conformation nor champion-ancestry influence your choice too much. In the rugged little dachard, chosen to share your life for maybe 14 or 15 years if you care for it properly, what you need above all else is CHARACTER. Buy from a reputable breeder and select the bold pup that carries itself with assurance and has a keen quizzical expression. Check up on the signs of physical health—pink gums, body skin that will wrinkle up loosely when grasped, and a thick root to the tail and, apart from these considerations, you will be wise to select the smallest, of a litter. More often than not these are the brainiest.

Class "B" people have other factors to consider. To them, both pedigree and points should be important. If they care to risk a gamble, or happen to be clever puppy pickers, pedigree being satisfactory they may invest

in an eight-week-old and trust to its embodying all the desired features on reaching maturity. But when choosing a bitch from which it is hoped to breed, it is far safer to pay a bit more and get one of six months or over. Colour of eye, ear-carriage, coat-texture, and a good mouth are all points that cannot be finally assessed before that age.

Now, what to look for in a six to eight months bitch suitable for breeding?

First study the pedigree. Pay more attention to the blood of the dam than to that of the sire. Make sure she belongs to one of the recorded families. Other things being equal, select a bitch whose pedigree shows some degree of line-breeding, in preference to one that does not.

Second, temperament. She need not be gushing but she must not be shy.

Third, breed type. See the puppy moving and look for a long, free stride, indicating a well laid-back shoulder and well-bent stifle. She should have a long head for her size, clean-skulled — which means no bumps on top and fat over the cheekbones—and a well-filled-up, deep forehead. Her teeth should be large, white and strong, the mouth fitting in a scissor-grip. Eyes deep-set and dark. Look for deep ribs carried well back, strength of loin, and more important than all else good big muscular hindquarters. These should appear broad when viewed from the rear, the sort of bottom that seems to invite a smack! A thick-rooted tail carried gaily, a really hard outercoat

with dense undercoat, and heavy bone, with well-padded feet, are other essentials. Don't worry if she is a shade long-eared, her ears somewhat large, or her front not one of the straightest. Provided a bitch has

deep ribs and lots of heart-roots, it is her two ends (head and quarters) that matter most. Faults to avoid firmly are a soft coat, light eye, undershot mouth or low-set tail, for these are particularly hard to eradicate.

On class "C", the breeders, who in their turn are also the judges, does the future of the breed really depend.

There is a serious responsibility. In selecting from a batch of youngsters they must weigh up potentialities from both a breeding and a showing standpoint. By gradual and careful selection practiced over the years, both the quality of their stock and their own ability to select from it, should improve.

In my view there are three particular stages in the life of a puppy when momentous decisions can be made. These are at the ages of (a) under 24 hours; (b) at five weeks; and (c) about eight months. Needless to say, the outstanding features to be looked for at these different

ages are by no means the same. With a new-born litter, providing the dam is a placid sort not resenting her owner's gentle handling of the whelps, instructive comparisons can be made before they have started to lay on fat. At this stage, heads, bone, tails, and sometimes length of body, can be compared. Plump for those with the largest heads, both for breadth and length. The best heads are suggestive at this tender age of a miniature St. Bernard, with wide, high-domed, long skull, and a foreface both broad and deep. 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## Thoughts On Line Breeding

By Cornelia M. Crissey

MANY ARTICLES have been written on line-breeding but there are several points which can hardly be stressed enough. For the benefit of anyone who is not familiar with the term "line-breeding", it means breeding closely related individuals

with a common ancestor in the hopes of duplicating this ancestor. For example, the desired ancestor might be the grandfather of a puppy on its sire's side and the great-grandfather of the puppy on its dam's side—or this common ancestor might appear

three or four or more times in the puppy's pedigree. Genetically speaking, this means that the number of possible gene combinations is reduced, since the same type of gene

appears so often in the pedigree.

There is great benefit to be derived from line-breeding—as line-breeding continues the puppies become more and more uniform, and it is to be

hoped, more and more like the common ancestor. An intensely line-bred individual may be bred to an outside mate with better than average assurance that many of the line's characteristics will be transmitted to the offspring. Some of the healthiest, most beautiful, best dispositioned Scotties in the ring today are the most intensely line-bred.

However, it should be remembered that it is not line-breeding for the sake of line-breeding that is recommended. The all-important point is the common ancestor. For, if line-breeding is to have good results, the characteristics to be transmitted must be those of quality. If the line-breeding is to a dog with many faults, those faults will be transmitted. Uniformity of faults will still result—uniformity of faults rather than of virtues. The type of the individual becomes poorer rather than better.

On paper this looks easy—Choose a good quality line-bred bitch; mate her to a dog of good quality and of similar breeding—and presto! a superb litter of perfect puppies! The trouble with this little fantasy is the recessive gene, which can lie dormant, covered by the dominant gene

for generations until such time as two of those recessives meet in a mating and then appear in the puppy. Another traitor is the characteristic which requires a certain combination of several genes to appear. This type of character transmission is not well understood, as it

is very specific for each trait. It will take a great number of experiments to discover which traits are transmitted in this way.

Far from being discouraged by this lack of certainty, the challenges and anticipations of each new litter are the rewards reaped by the "diehard" breeder.

From then on the progress is best forgotten, apart from sane feeding and general management, until about eight months of age. Then finding the youngster with a loose head of good shape plus small, dark, deep-set eyes and neat ears, watch for other basic virtues it must possess to excel either on the bench or as a producer; for a great head is nothing by itself. These include a muscular yet graceful neck; sloping shoulders; big bone; straight front; thick firm feet; deep brisket; adequate breadth of chest; big ribs; strong, short loin; powerful quarters; tail set-on high enough to be carried gaily with only slight curve, the whole dog slung between its legs and not, as it were placed on top of them, and clad throughout in a harsh flat-lying jacket.

If construction is right these action should be, but this as well as temperament and potential size, must be taken into account. Waste no time on the narrow-chested, the shallow-ribbed, the thin-footed or the slimhipped.
