Among recent news items is one which had been rumored to us for

a couple of weeks. In this case the rumor turned out to be correct. The great English Champion Gosmore Ellburn Admaration, Top Dog of the Year for 1967 in England, is now in this country and owned by Mr. and Mrs. Clive Pillsbury of San Diego, California. Most all Scottie folks know of Admaration. He was Best in Show at Windsor, Birmingham, Belfast, Paington, and a number of other National Championship events. At a couple of those shows he had topped entries of ten and fourteen thousand entries. He is just past three years old and we understand is a magnificent showman.

The Pillsburys are also the owners of the current Champion, Eng. and Am. Ch. Gosmore Gillson Highland King, another English import and a tremendous winner in his own right. In his last twenty-five

shows in the West he has won Best of Breed twenty-three times. He has one Best in Show win, six Group firsts, and on the recent Texas circuit, he was the Top Winning Terrier All Breeds, winning three Group firsts, five seconds and two thirds. He had a very excellent record in England, but had never been shown against Admaration, and Mr. Pillsbury states "and he never will be over here."

The picture of Admaration appearing in the Pillsbury announcement is an English one. We hope before long to show you some shots taken in this country.

And now for some really tragic news — English, American and Canadian Ch. Bardene Boy Blue passed away recently at the age of twelve and a half years. He was owned by Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Stamm of Kalamazoo, Mich., and

at the time of his death was the All-Time Top Producing Sire of Champions for the breed, having produced thirty-seven Champions to date, thus topping the previous record of thirty-five held by the great Troubadour. In the calendar year 1968, thirteen of his get earned their titles.

He was shown extensively here amassing a total of sixty-seven Best of Breeds out of seventy-nine shows. He won two Best in Shows, placed in the Terrier Group some fifty-five times, including twenty-two firsts. His Canadian record was

most outstanding and we believe he won several Best in Shows over there.

Possessed of an outstanding personality and temperament, Boy Blue was not only a great showman and a great sire, he was an equally great companion.

And the death of another great Scottie must be reported. The fabulous Ch. Carmichael's Fanfare, the greatest winning Scottish Terrier of all times, died in November. She was past eight years old and in the years she was shown, she had been Best of Breed ninety-two times, receiving sixty-one Terrier Group firsts and thirty-two Best in Shows. She was retired from showing in

February 1965, after she placed Best in Show All breeds at Westminster.

She was owned by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Stalter, bred by Mrs. Ruth Johnson, and was by Ch. Barbbery Knowe Merrymaker out of Ch. Carmichael's Cornelia. She was the pride and joy of her owners and certainly of her handler, John Murphy.

In addition to her great show career, Fanfare can truly lay claim to being a great producer. We know of seven of her get which have completed their Championships, three are on the current fiscal list, and Mrs. Stalter is currently showing another in the classes.

The Scottish Terrier Club of America's spring Show, a Rotating Specialty, will be held with the Chain O'Lakes All Breed event at Grays Lake, Ill. June 15th. Mrs. Winifred Heckman will judge the regular classes and Ann Harbulak the Sweepstakes. Ann, by the way, is now the Editor of "The Bagpiper", the STCA brochure, and she is doing a bang-up job. But back to the Specialty, it will be preceded by a Symposium which will be held at the Holiday Inn,

Gary, Ind., beginning at noon on Thursday, June 12th. Sessions follow on Friday and Saturday, June 13th and 14th with Sunday of course bringing the Specialty. It is about an hours drive over a good Interstate Highway from Gary to the Specialty site.

From the Bagpiper we learn that the Scottish Terrier Club of California Sweepstakes event will be held with Beverly Hills, Saturday and Sunday, June 21st and 22nd. Site is Santa Monica, Calif. and Robert Waters is judging. Sweepstakes entries must be entered in the regular classes at Beverly Hills.

Last July Mrs. John A. Munro of Charlottesville, Va. came home from a trip to Scotland, bringing back a bitch and one of her puppies. The bitch is the current Champion, Abercot Advocate's Choice. She took her final points at Tampa, a four-point major, after previously winning two three-pointers and another four. Her puppy, Abercot

The young fellow is by English and Canadian Champion Gosmore Gillzie Scotch Lad ex Ch. Glad-Mac's Sweet Talk. He is co-owned by Miss Peggy Coppel, with Mrs. Robertson. His litter sister, Glad-Mac's Goswip went to her first show and was Reserve. Irene Robertson says she is lovely but needs a few more airings.

At the moment Glad-Mac are greatly excited over a young Bingo son. Can hardly wait for him to

grow up. He is four or five months old now.

Pictured is one of Glad-Mac's current Champions, Gayclan Abigail Ann. She is a Bingo daughter out of Ch. Glad-Mac's Wave of Seaglen, which by the way ties for the Number one Dam on our fiscal list. She produced four of the current Champions. Ann is owned by Mrs. Mary Jane Rogers of Spokane. Dorothy Morris who has been doing some Scottie handling for other folk writes that her own Scots Delight news is on the brief side. She is very proud of the young son of Ch. Scots Delight Rough Rider—Ch. Kirk Nor Outrider pictured. While he is owned by Judith Bonaiuto, he makes his home with Mrs. Morris. His dam is Kirk Nor Hey Babe, a Ch. Scots Delight Wild Out daughter.

Scots Delight have a litter out of Hey Babe's sister, Kirk Nor Steff Toy by Rough Rider, over which they are very high. Mrs. Bonaiuto who owns Outrider has bred some very good Beddingtons, and Scotties are relatively new to her, but she has certainly done extremely well in a very short time.

Louise Ellsworth of Hialeah, Fla. has a red wheaten homebred, Elscot Gold Coast Classic which went

## THE OLD AND THE NEW

AMERICA HAS so many active bloodlines and is producing so many champions each year that it boggles the mind to keep them in order. Each bloodline has its supporters, long lines of them, but only the passing of several years will disclose their real worth to the breed. Each section of the country has its favorite son and there are so many sections that it takes a great dog to overcome boundaries and make his influence felt over a wide area. We can get an idea of the most promising of current champions by noting the current trophy race winners but how long the influence of the best of these will last only later breed history will tell. As the line from each producing sire lengthens we find one or two, occasionally a small group of related dogs dominating the field. They create very evident bulges in the line to which they belong, somewhat resembling the sudden appearance of a large bead on a long chain of small ones. Eng. Ch. Heather Necessity and his closely related contemporary, Eng. Ch. Albourne Barty were standouts of this sort in the long father to son chain originating with Eng. Ch. Alistair. Appearing at about the same time, 1925 and 1927, each complemented the other and together they changed the course of the breed.

As the sire of 26 champions, 18 of them producing sons as far as America was concerned, Necessity's popularity in this country was assured from the beginning. Barty sired 12 champions and these only the brothers Eng. Champions Albourne Brigand and Reveler, founded influential lines in the United States. As of now the Reveler line has out produced and outlasted Brigand's. This is principally due to the importation of Eng. and Am. Ch. Walsing Winning Trick in 1947. He gave the Barty line a needed boost when it was sagging a bit and the progeny of Trick and his best son, Ch. Edgerstone Troubadour have become the sole carriers of this male line in the last two years. This Trick-Troubadour combination has been responsible for many great dogs in the last twenty years and today depends for its momentum on Ch. Barbbery Knowe Merrymaker, Ch. The Laird of Scots Guard and his son, Ch. Scots Guard Troops the Colors.

As is true in England, the Necessity line now dominates the whole field of champions and the shift toward the descendants of his greatest son, Eng. Ch. Heather Fashion Hint, is becoming more evident with each year's output of champions. Of Necessity's 16 Miscellaneous sons, some champions and some not, but all producers, only Eng. and Am. Ch. Heather Essential, made any real impression and that principally through an American bred dog,

Ch. Hillcote Laddie. Laddie's descendants in the years 1944 to 1956 outnumbered all others in the group but did not last to carry on his undeniably good qualities of temperament and physical appearance.

The next of Necessity's sons to establish a large group of American champions was Eng. Ch. Heather Ambition. He was whelped in 1931 two years later than Fashion Hint but eight of his progeny sired champions here and three established respectively prolific lines. The paths of Fashion Hint and Ambition ran parallel for a time but by 1943 the Ambition group drew ahead and dominated championship lists for nearly ten years. Their production reached a peak in 1952 to 1953 and then fell off rapidly as Fashion Hint's line took over. Eng. and Am. Ch. Ortleby Ambassador of

Edgerstone was by far the leading producer belonging to this group and the imported Heather Asset a close second. If, and there are so many ifs in dog annals, Mrs. Stone had lived to carry on her Kinclaven kennels the story of Asset might have been quite different for he was the basis of much of her breeding program in search of good color and good type in the wheaten Scotties she wanted. As it was, Asset's progeny did not carry on very many years after her death in 1951. From 1958 on there have been only a scattering of survivors of a once very prolific group. Ch. Shieling's Signature, a best in show winner at New York's Westminster, sired 20 champions but the line did not last. For all practical purposes the Ambition line is lost although, just to upset the apple cart, one from Asset appeared in 1968.

And so we come to Necessity's

Fashion Hint group which occupies the limelight today. Its climb to success began in 1933 with English imports which seemed to come over by the boatload and while their champions suffered a brief eclipse around 1947 when the Ambition dogs were most active, it picked up again by 1952 and has not looked back since.

Fashion Hint sired 13 English Champion but the one who lived on in his sons was Eng. Ch. Heather Realisation. He is the most recent and sole connecting link between Necessity and his modern descendants. Realisation's sons, Heather Benefactor in England, and his brother, Eng. Ch. Walsing Warrant in America were the next to increase this male line enormously. Benefactor's son, Walsing Wizard established two branches, both of which developed into a great stud force in England and in America. The branch through Westpark Masterpiece brought to both countries that wonderful producing group including Westpark Derriford Baffle, Wyrebury Wrangler, Trevone Tartar, Westpark Rio Grande and Reimill Radiator, producers all and some of them with outstanding show records. As a group they contributed many champions up to the last two years when they slowed down considerably, some have ceased entirely for several years now, but so few are still active that they were almost negligible in 1968.

In 1940 The Marlu Farm Kennels in New Jersey imported Eng. Ch. Walsing Warrant. He sired, among others, a black dog Ch. Marlu Crusader by name and Crusader in turn sired Ch. Deephaven Red Seal, who sired in 1945 Red Seal sired 24 champions and from them developed the most prolific and longest single line this country has known. It boasts 132 descendants and is still producing champions in 1968. Crusader also sired a brother to Red Seal, Ch. Deephaven Jeffrey who sired some champions but they never caught up to Red Seal's remarkable record. Red Seal's supporting cast included Ch. Deephaven Citation, continuing through Ch. Gilkey's Johnny Come Lately, Ch. Good Finder's Admiral continuing through Ch. Friendship Farm Diplomat and the Gaidouines, and Ch. Marlouin Dark Seal who died recently at his home kennel at the great age (for a Scottie) of 14 years and 3 months. Carnation Farms also bred a number of champions from Red Seal since he was brought from the East and was shown by that kennel to a successful career, notably with his half sister, Ch. Carnation Golden Girl, one of the prettiest wheatens ever to grace a cover of Dog News.

Second in production to Warrant's line is one that is really going up to new heights and that is the Realisation — Benefactor Line through the Walsing dogs to Rosehall Enchanter and his two sons, Edward and Tam o'Shanter. This too is a long line and a very important one. It has continued in a modest way from about 1950 but

## Current Champions

THERE ARE eighty-eight Champions on the current fiscal list, covering a twelve months period. It includes those Champions whose titles have been confirmed and published in the issues of the American Kennel Gazette, issues from March 1968 to and including February 1969. This total of eighty-eight is ten up over the previous year, and it is about the same as it was in 1967.

Undoubtedly there have been a number of other Scottish Terriers which have completed their titles recently, but not in time to have the fact published in the issues of the Gazette mentioned. These new Champions will of course head next year's list.

### Leading Sire

The leading sire is Ch. Bardene Boy Blue, and this is the third successive year he has been the leading producer of Champions. He has a total of eleven on the current list. As a matter of fact, Bardene Boy Blue's record as a producer stands at an all-time high, a position previously held by Troubadour.

In second spot is Ch. Bardene Bingo with seven on the fiscal list, followed by Ch. Gaidoune Great Bear with six. The Bear's total really makes him the leading living American-bred sire, and the Gaidoune's collectively, have certainly piled up a fantastic record.

Following these three top sires, come six sires each of which produced three of the current Champions on the list. They are: Beauda Ringold, Gaidoune Go Bingo, Ch. Scots Guard Troops The Colors, Marlorain Rainmaker, Ch. Barbbery Knowe Merrymaker and Viewpark Viking of Cyann.

Six dogs each produced two Champions. They are: Ch. Lyabrier of Zelwyn, Ch. Bardene Bobby Dazzler, Ch. The Laird of Scots Guard, Ch. Barbbery Knows Blizard, Ch. Viewpark Red Hackle, Firebrand's Viking Rex.

### Leading Dam

The leading dam is Ch. Glad-Mac's Wave of Seaglen with a total of four Champions. She is followed by two bitches with three Champions each — Ch. Carmichael's Fanfare and Van Istendal's Ginger Snap.

## British Notes

**RICHMOND CH. SHOW** more than made up for its inability to hold a show last year when the outbreak of hoof and mouth disease made its cancellation necessary. This year entries increased by 12% and a record 6,270 dogs were crowded into London's Olympia for the one day show.

Mr. Cliff Brown judged best in show and the winner was Mrs. J. B. Holden's Afghan Hound, Ranjitsinhji of Jagai. This was his first c.e. in the breed and he triumphed over two best in show winners to get the award. Reserve best in show was the Old English Sheepdog, Ch. Rollingsa Snow Boots. A Bedlington, Vardene Blue Brenadier won the terrier group.

Mr. J. R. Ross was the judge of 89 Scotties, the highest entry of the year except for the Specialty shows. Mr. Ross felt that a promising lot of young dogs were coming along, the Novice and Limit classes being particularly hot with eleven entries each. Movement, coming and going, was commended. Fronts were good in dogs but not so good in bitches where slack elbows and straight shoulders were in evidence. Many had coats well past their best and puppies in particular needed stripping without delay. Brade Roberts' Gaywyn Ferguson was the winning dog, his first c.e. "He was in immaculate condition with a good harsh flat-lying double coat, he showed steadily, possesses a long well-shaped head with the desired flat skull, neat ears and good eyes, is well put together with typical neck, good shoulder place-

ment, body and bone, so moved correctly." He is by Ch. Gaywyn Emperor (Bingo) ex Bardene Be Lovely (also Bingo). Ch. Kennelgarth Knight Errant was the reserve dog, a well balanced black dog of good type, showed nicely but had to give way to coat condition. Ch. Brjo Jesebel finished an outstandingly successful year by winning her 11th certificate and was best of breed. She won her first c.e. at the first show of the year,

Cruff's and her 11th at the last show of the year, Richmond. Reserve to her was Woodmansey Wisecracker, soundly constructed and one of the best moving bitches Mr. Ross had ever seen but at

present just lacked the glamour of Jesebel. The puppy dog class was topped by a puppy that has done considerable winning lately, Lewis' Cynon Crackerjack. He is a smart dark brindle of 11 mos. just coming into the age where he could make himself felt in the competition of the coming year. Best puppy bitch was Norman's Roxeth Virginia, an excellent bitch but coat was well past its best.

Thus the 1968 season ended with nine new champions finished, 6 dogs and 3 bitches, sired by 8 different dogs, Bardene Blue Steptoe having sired two of the nine. In general, two sires, Ch. Kennelgarth Viking and Br. & Am. Ch. Bardene Bingo predominate in the background of this group of champions. They in turn represent the Viewmark Champions, Pilot and Vincent, descending from Br. Ch. Rosehall Torgylen Tam o' Shanter and the Wyrebury line stemming from Br. Ch. Rosehall Edward. So productive a source of English champions are these two lines that all others appear to be in danger of dying out. Every year bloodlines are becoming more concentrated and as they narrow down breeders must be ever more watchful to see that serious faults are not creeping in and that true Scottish Terrier type and characteristics are being maintained.

This column will continue to report the Scottie winners at non-ch. shows for they are the dogs most likely to be prominent candidates for top honors at championship shows in the ensuing months. Limited and open shows have large entries and usually excellent competition so that any Scottie that is high in these awards is worthy of mention as a possible comer in championship competition. There are few to report this month, only two, in fact, the first being a show

at Scarborough where Woodmansey Whizz Bang was best puppy and reserve best in show.

Fife K. A. held a large open show at which Pulton's Scottie bitch, Elburn Wonder Girl, went best in show all breeds.

A sanction show at Acrefair in Wales saw Niddbank Cracksmen go best in show.

And now to the Hodgman report on the condition of dogs in Japan. Following his report on his trip to that country English breeders were asked to send in their comments. The response was excellent and included names of well-known breeders as well as many who have spent time in Japan and observed conditions at first hand. The overall feeling among them was that while the report seemed to be fair and unbiased there was a very great deal to be read between the lines and that breeders should think twice before exporting dogs to a country where there is no legislation to protect dogs from cruelty in pounds, research laboratories or as pets. While this may not seem to affect pedigreed and supposedly valuable animals there is a basic fact that does concern them and that is that the whole attitude toward animals in the East is quite different from England's in that animals, pedigreed or not, are valued only as long as they remain commercially valuable in some way or another. When animals are sick or no longer useful it is a quite common practice to "set them free" as it is termed. They are then picked up as strays on the street and turned over to pounds to be killed by inhumane (by our standards) methods or sent to research laboratories. One writer suggests that since Mr. Hodgman's guide was from the company which is doing a wholesale importing of large quantities of dogs for resale he might have been led to see only what it was intended he should see. One writer, a veterinarian, said that had he visited the medical laboratories of a University he would have found conditions so bad that no amount of pre-visit cleaning up could disguise them. One writer makes a good point when she asks "Are Japanese breeders being advised why English breeders are refusing to fill orders?" She thinks it might be very constructive to give the reason. "Doing so might help

to start some educational work on the part of certain Japanese who have not been concerned before."

One though provoking suggestion was made that it might be well for dog fanciers to first be sure their own backyards are clean enough to meet the light of day. Cruelty to animals exists the world over, and while protective laws exist in England and America, laws are made to be broken by unscrupulous people especially when hard cash is involved. One has only to read the sorry cases exposed in the pages of America's journal "Popular Dogs" to realize

that laws alone do not protect unless dedicated individuals or groups are alert to see that they are enforced. Dognappers are constantly at work in our cities loading vans with household pets for transportation to the eastern states but their punishment when caught is not drastic enough to stop the profitable chain between dognappers and research laboratories. Medical laboratories are notoriously callous in dealing with animals and, hidden away from the public in the name

of "Science" who knows what cruelties are perpetrated unless public opinion is aroused to the point where adequate supervision guarantees humane treatment for all helpless animals used for this purpose. The average layman considers the mysterious world labeled "Science" as forbidden territory which he dares not challenge or enter but dedicated individuals and groups with authority behind them will, we hope, one day affect a change toward open inspection of the housing and treatment of all such animals. Stronger laws with teeth in them must be enacted to make the shady traffic in stolen dogs and cats unprofitable and uncomfortable for those who deal in it. There is much to be done in both England and the United States before we can condemn others too harshly.

In the meantime the report, however incomplete, has served a good purpose if it alerts breeders and dog clubs to conditions at home and in addition makes them think twice before exporting dogs to the Orient.

And lastly, a sad note to conclude this month's column. As most of you already know, Scottish Terriers have suffered a grievous loss in the sudden death of Mrs. Mary Ross of Niddbank Kennels fame. She has devoted most of her life to the interests of Scottish Terriers and like the late Dorothy Caspers was not afraid to speak up on what was best for the breed to which she had contributed so much. She and her husband bred many Scotties which attained their titles in England and America, she was a respected championship judge and was also the person designated to carry on the pedigree records started by Mrs. Caspers. The Ross' last champion was Niddbank Niece Fella who finished in June 1968 at Blackpool. To Mr. Ross we extend our deep sympathy and hope his health may enable him to carry on, if only in a limited way, the famous prefix of Niddbank.

suddenly through the imported Bardene dogs has exploded into a leading position from 1964 through 1968. The two dogs behind the startling rise in the Enchanter line are Bardene Boy Blue owned by the Anstamm Kennels and Bardene Bingo of Carnation Farms. Both are English, American and Canadian Champions, both are producers of a high order and possess champion sons which have sired champions. Bingo has the advantage of a spectacular best in show career to enhance his popularity. He was the top winning Terrier for 1966 and was among the Top Ten in 1965. He has had many best in show wins and for three successive years placed best in show at one of America's 3 largest shows, — Beverly Hills, in '65, Santa Barbara in '66 and Westminster in 1967. It is scarcely believable but the entire line from Rosehall Enchanter has jumped from a production of 23 champions in 1964 to 48 in 1968. The total production of this line from the beginning is 178, second only to Red Seal's line. If (and there's that doggy "if" again) the production from Boy Blue and Bingo continues to rise, as it has every reason to do, it could easily become the dominant line of the next decade.

So that is the story at the close of 1968. A total of 88 champions finished and 75 of them belong to the Fashion Hint line through all its

branches. The most successful male bloodline of the year comes from Eng. Ch. Rosehall Edward through the English bred pair, Champions Bardene Boy Blue and Bardene Bingo. In spite of the large number of champions produced in the last few years, the records do not point to any really outstanding show dog since Bingo. This is perhaps due to too many shows, too many huge shows and an emphasis on assembly line quantity rather than a high standard of quality.
