War-Time Shows

SHOW-GIVING clubs which are finding it difficult to plan their annual shows on the usual lines should be cheered by the news that the American Kennel Club is willing to waive certain of its rules during war time. One of the most important of such rules is that pertaining to benching. The present rule states in effect that if admission is charged at an all-breed show, that show must be benched. The rule is still in effect but during the war the AKC will grant permission to hold an unbenched show and to charge admission, providing the proper announcement is made in the premium list and the catalog, and is displayed on a sign where admission tickets are sold.

The waiving of this rule should be very heartening to a good many clubs which are finding it difficult to locate a building large enough to house a benched show, or who are fearful of the expense which a benched show entails. An unbenched show can be given quite inexpensively, out-of-doors or in a comparatively small building if such a building has plenty of adjoining parking space.

In addition to the fact that it is now possible to give an unbenched show, at which admission can be charged, it is also possible to make the time schedule for a show very elastic. In the case of

two day shows certain breeds can be judged one day and the balance the next. Exhibitors need not be present but the one day their dogs are to be judged.

Clubs are urged not to give up their shows even though they may have to make many modifications from their usual set-up. It is dog shows which largely provide the incentive to breed better dogs, and it is dog shows which keep the public pure-bred dog conscious. Let the shows lag, and breeding and selling will lag. Clubs may not fancy some of the changes which war times make necessary but they should not forget that any show is better for the dogs, the fanciers and the public than no show at all.

Singleton is continuing breeding as usual, although there is a shortage of staff at the office and scarcely any kennel assistants at his home.

I want to again call your attention to the Call of Champions, as presented to us by Mrs. Larry Roth. If you are interested in a complete record of the Champions of the breed, I suggest you keep your **DOG NEWS** on file. This column is really worthwhile and contains much valuable information.

Your editor is considerably proud of the fact that he has become a grandfather since our last issue. Annette Jean arrived on March 31, in the home of the only son. Grandpa will be busy from now on!

A note from John Kemps tells us that since he judged the breed in Greenville, S. C., he did not have any Scots on the Southeastern Spring Circuit this year, except a few pups and a couple of Beagles in Asheville to help out the local show.

From their last two litters, the Kemps are retaining three outstanding male pups to replace studs that are due to be retired before long. Sophisticate's litter by Reliance is due next month. Acton Hill is breeding from producing show stock only, this year in preparation for the fresh impetus the game will undoubtedly experience after the war. They feel very strongly that the next two years or so could be made into a reconstruction period during which breeders have a chance to quietly build up the strength of their kennels and to weed out carefully, with an eye on type and soundness. Thus, they believe, this period can be utilized to improve on the quality of the breed in general and they would like to see the large number of private owners start raising pups from fewer but better matrons, suitably mated. If we could all start after the war with a clean slate, so to speak, competition would immediately be keen because there would be many more top specimens around. This, in turn, would greatly benefit the game.

Bruce Webb of Dunedin, Florida, has lost Middlemount Gay Boy, a very promising youngster, with five points to his credit, won at Jacksonville and Sarasota. The Webbs have recently built a slick little kennel that can be taken apart for transportation. It will house about ten dogs and we are hoping Mr. Webb may furnish us with more details, since it sounds quite ideal and very easy to erect.

Through the Garden Wall

DEATH is but a door in a garden wall, and on Good Friday, just as the first spring flowers were coming to bloom, Mrs. Clarence Stanley of Indianapolis stepped through that quiet door into a land forever green.

Dean of Indiana Scottish Terrier breeders, and a prominent Scottie judge, Mrs. Stanley was widely known and loved throughout the entire country. She had been breeding high quality Scotties for more than 20 years, and her Eagle Creek Kennels had included Champion Bellstane Queen, Champion Eagle Creek Leebie, Champion Ardmore Rowdy, English Champion Albourne Royalist, and many other noted show dogs. Her original strain was developed by fusing the bloodlines of Int. Ch. Albourne Adair and Ch. Bellstane Laddie. It was in her kennels that the last litter by Albourne Adair was produced, and from this litter of Mrs. Stanley's great brood matron, Eagle Creek Locket, came Ch. Leebie and Eagle Creek Ern who lived to be the last surviving son of Adair.

In recent years, Mrs. Stanley found it necessary to curtail her show activities, but her love and loyalty to her dogs remained until the last. On the morning of her death she had been working with them, and although this exertion brought on the fatal heart attack, it was this way Ido Stanley would have chosen to go—in her beautiful home, surrounded by the things and the ones she loved, and doing the things she liked to do. Her husband and partner for 41 years survives.

Like many more, it was to Ido Stanley that I owed my own deep interest in Scottish Terriers, for it was she who laid the foundation for the development of the breed in this section and it was due to her pioneer efforts that Indiana Scottish Terriers have gained prominence in these later years.

As her nearest neighbor, I owe much to Ido Stanley—as do countless others of her friends who would join me in saying:

With all my words I cannot tell
The difference it has made,
Since on my shoulder you first touched
Your shining accolade:
Wisdom to see, courage to be
And willingness to do—
All these, it seems, have come to me
Just through knowing you.
