**State of New York, VWD Testing**

The following letter was sent in by Charla Hill.

Dear User VWD Testing:

Effective July 18, 1994 the Comparative Hematology Laboratory will no longer be able to provide routine screening for von Willebrand's Disease. The costs associated with providing this service were supported in large part by grant funds from the Federal Government. This source of support is no longer available.

Testing and consultation for all animals with a **documented history of clinical bleeding** remain available **including assays for the hemophilia, platelet function defects, vwd other clotting factor disorders and special studies.**

Iatric Corporation of Tempe Arizona is the only commercial lab which will be offering VWD testing using the same highly sensitive and specific ELISA assay methodology developed by the Comparative Hematology Laboratory. Iatric also plans to offer a test kit which will

allow other labs to perform the assay. Additionally the following other laboratories offer VWD testing utilizing the Laurell assay: Oregon Medical Labs, Eugene Oregon; Professional Animal Labs, Irvine, California; and the University of California at Davis, Davis, California. Southwest Vet Diagnostics, Kansas City, Missouri, offers a modified Laurell assay utilizing a radiolabeled antibody.

Minutes of the March 17, 1994 were approved.

**REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:** Jackie Seelbach has been serving as corresponding secretary until the new secretary was officially voted in by the board. Evelyn Kirk was selected as corresponding secretary to replace Diane Zollinger for the remainder of the term. Telephone poll-Motion Gaines/Justus, passed unanimously.

Jackie reported correspondence from 3-22 to 5-29.

**REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY:** Shirley Justus reported that the rosters will be mailed within two weeks, bulk mailing. The rosters were delayed until June to provide as accurate a list of the membership as possible. June 1st is the deadline for payment of dues. She distributed the complete Standard Operating Procedure manuals to each board member and the board will make a final decision on the manuals in October. The complete manual is on one disk.

**REPORT OF THE TREASURER:** Mary-Ann Cole distributed her treasurer's report

and there was general discussion on items of interest. The STCA general fund is in a healthier state.

Several members paid their dues within the week after the June 1 deadline for payment. After discussion the board voted to reinstated the following members. William & Laura Cottenham, Judy Johannsson, Debby & Richard Fowler, Dennis & Alison McMillin. Motion-Brooks/Gaines-11 yes, 1 no-Passed. These members are not included in the roster.

**REPORT OF DELEGATE TO AKC:** John Sheehan reminded the board of a questionnaire from the AKC Delegate Parent Club Committee. The board completed the questionnaire and it will be mailed to the committee.

**COMMITTEES**

**VICE PRESIDENT/SHOW CHAIRPERSON:** Gail Gaines reported the following arrangements for Montgomery County (October 8/9, 1994):

**JUDGES:** Mareth Kipp, regular classes Christine Stephens, sweepstakes.

**Motels:** Guest Quarters Hotel-\$78/cut off 9-13; Inn at Plymouth Meeting-\$55/cut off 9-26; Days Hotel-\$55/cut off 9-15; Holiday Inn King of Prussia-\$73/cut off 9-06.

Dinner following Friday sweepstakes-\$12 (Donna Cone & Liz Heywood are in charge of the Friday buffet). Banquet-\$26/\$34 (Eric and Marlene Burgess).

The 1994 Montgomery County show will be dedicated to Clarabel Graham. Motion-Krause/Kinnelly-Passed unanimously.

The obedience will begin 8:00 and sweepstakes around 12:30, depending on entry (usually around 60 entries).

Patty Brooks reported on the progress of the MC trophy drive.

Ruth Ann Krause announced that the 1995 headquarters will be at the Holiday Inn King of Prussia. \$73 plus a one time \$10 fee for dogs. Banquet will be at the site and reservations have been made for Wednesday for STCA. Meeting room arrangements have been made also at no charge.

Gail reported that arrangements are being finalized for the Washington State STC specialty June 10, 1995.

**ANNUAL AWARDS CHAIRPERSON:** Robin Starr reported on the 25 year pins. Jeweler John DeSaye recommended that we not have the pins made of fine silver but that we use sterling because it is a stronger metal for securing the diamond. This infor-

mation will be placed in the treasurers report.

There was confusion concerning the Am Anger/Hebrides award given to the American Bred Bitch Class. This year the STCA will pay for the purchase of a replacement trophy (\$100). This award will be called the STCA American Bred Bitch Class Award for this year. Motion-Phelan, Krause-Passed unanimously.

**BAGPIPER:** Joanne Kinnelly discussed the colored picture costs.

A letter from Bill Berry was read complimenting Joanne and the Bagpiper for the beautiful color covers and the general excellent style and content of the publication since she has become editor.

**FUND RAISER COORDINATORS:**

Bob Phelan reported that the Heart of America raffle sold \$1254. Jane and Bob are in the process of working out a Dennis Springer original and the raffle. Information will be sent to the membership in the advertising packet.

The illustrated standard booklet is still being proposed but Bob suggested that we delay completion of the booklet until 1995.

The AKC video will be filmed in October, 1994.

Bill Berry suggested that commercial advertising be considered for the STCA rosters in the future to help pay for printing. Motion-Krause/Kinnelly-6 no, 7 yes-Passed.

**HEALTH CHAIRPERSON:** Gail Gaines reviewed a questionnaire completed by her for AKC concerning general health information.

**HEALTH TRUST FUND:** Fred Brooks had received two written responses from his request for STCA member/attorneys comments concerning the trust fund document; Marjorie Cohen and Thomas Eckhardt. Several of their suggestions were implemented. The board approved the 1st reading of the trust fund document (Gaines, Cole, Justus, Brooks, Krause, Kinnelly, Phelan, Cook, Martin, Sheehan, Starr, Stickler) After discussion, the board voted to send the document to the membership for their written input concerning the document and their recommendation for trustees. A written acceptance from the nominee stating their willingness to serve as trustee must accompany the recommendation. This information will be sent with the advertising packet. The deadline of Septem-

ber 1, 1994 for membership input. The second and possibly the final reading of the document, in the present form or in an amended form after membership comments, may be adopted by the board at the October 6th meeting. Motion-Krause/Justus-Passed unanimously.

The Scottish Terrier Club of America has a Health Trust Fund.

**MEMBERSHIP:** Membership chairperson Fred Brooks wrote to AKC for clarification of their rules concerning membership and received the following: (Michael Liosis-5/5/94) stated that a rejected applicant may go through the proper channels for membership as stated in our constitution ('a applicant's sponsor may elect such applicant at the next annual meeting of the club and the members may elect such applicant by secret ballot and a favorable vote of 75% of the members present'). Liosis further stated that, "AKC does not require parent clubs to reveal anything other than the result of the balloting. AKC expects clubs to process membership applications in a manner consistent with the procedure outlines in the bylaws."

**NOMINATING COMMITTEE:** Nominating committee member Phyllis Dabb's letter was read with her suggestions. Every effort must be made to allow the members time to make their recommendations. The BAGPIPER will help by placing the form requesting membership recommendations earlier in the year. The nominating committee will be reminded of the time necessary to receive input from the membership.

**PUBLIC INFORMATION:** Bill Martin reported on the newly revised "Facts About Scottish Terriers." The board approved the pamphlet.

Joanne Kinnelly reported that Carole Fry Owen's suggestion of including a general information insert on the Scottish Terrier to be included with each Scottish Terrier registration was approved by AKC. This will be the first terrier breed to include breed information with the registration and one of only six breeds. The board approved purchasing 7000 - \$285 plus shipping costs for the letters. Motion-Kinnelly/Cole-Passed unanimously.

**REGIONAL CLUBS:** There are concerns that show sites and hotels/motels are being lost because of the actions of a few inconsiderate and destructive exhibitors. Mary-Ann Cole reported on a lost show site and there were comments of what could be done to prevent the abuses of others. (A bench show committee hearing can be called if the hotel reports the abuses to the club. sj)

Regional Clubs Representative Chairperson Jeanice Ronden reported on planned

activities for the October meeting of the club representatives and suggestions for pre-sweepstakes activities.

It was recommended by Jeanice and supported by the board that an updated constitution/bylaws of each regional club be sent to the STCA corresponding secretary for our files. Jeanice will send copies that she receives to the STCA corresponding secretary. Motion-Martin/Cole-Passed unanimously.

Maxine Stickler explained the concept and general outline for a regional clubs workshop/seminar. The preparation is in the early stages and she selected a STCA seminar committee. The committee consists of chairperson Maxine Stickler, Jeanice Ronden, Karen Hansen and Christine Cook. The board supported the concept and encouraged her to continue with her plans and report in October. Motion-Justus/Krause-Passed unanimously.

**RESCUE:** Caryl Alten's letter was reviewed and her SOP suggestions were included in the latest SOP.

**YEARBOOK/HANDBOOK-TFH PUBLICATION OF MURIEL LEE'S BOOK:** Muriel Lee reported on the preparations of the yearbook (1996). It was the consensus of the board that the centenary handbook will be published in 2000.

Muriel Lee's book, THE BOOK ON THE SCOTTISH TERRIER will be ready for 1994 Montgomery County. A previously signed contract between TFH and STCA prompted a call from the publisher to requests suggestions from the board. After discussion, it was decided that the statement "is endorsed by the Scottish Terrier Club of America" statement and the seal allowed inside the book. A fee of \$5000 from the book will be directed to the general fund of STCA. Motion-Martin/Brooks-Passed unanimously. STCA also receives 10% of the price of the book. 



# Vigilante Education: How To Get Started

By Carole Fry Owen

"AKC Scotties, mini & reg. pups and adults. Ph. (xxx)xxx-xxxx".

This ad appeared in the Dallas Morning News in Summer, 1993. You've seen comparable ones in your own hometown newspaper.

What do you do? Stomp around and fume – indignant that someone so ignorant is breeding and selling the same breed you strive to improve and protect?

Do you call the number, pretending to be a prospective buyer? Do you milk the advertiser for information about his dogs, then snicker among your own circle of Scottie elite about the person's stupidity and irresponsibility?

I've done both, and I bet you have, too!

After grumbling about the above ad and growling to my own Scots about how lucky they are, I called the advertiser.

Yes, I admit it. I was incognito.

The woman said she had three Scottie puppies available out of miniature stock. They were \$350 each.

"What is miniature stock?" I displayed ignorance. I was, in fact. I had no idea.

"Eight to 18 pounds," the woman answered. "The standard is 18 to 26 pounds. Miniatures are not a separate AKC breed yet. They're still with regular Scottish Terriers."

Know what? I could tell this woman loved her dogs. She loves her Scotties like you and I love ours. Unfortunately, she has given herself the misguided mission of miniaturizing the breed. She also was misinformed about the existing Standard.

If we let ourselves admit it, most persons selling Scottie pups in the newspaper or in the throw-away advertising tabloids are well meaning, but innocent or misguided. The only time we discover where these folks are and who they are is when they advertise puppies. It's a golden opportunity to influence casual breeders and, more importantly, to reach their puppy buyers.

Pulling on a camouflage suit when you answer a disturbing ad accomplishes nothing for our breed – no more than fuming to the anointed fancy does. Here's an alternative. It's advertiser's outreach.

## Make That Call

The Greater Dallas Scottish Terrier Club started an advertiser's contact program in fall, 1993. It's a model of what other regional clubs or individual Scottie fanciers can do. GDSTC contacts persons who advertise Scottish Terriers in the Dallas Morning News and the Fort Worth Star Telegram. Our goal: through education, the gradual reduction of casual breeding of Scottish Terriers.

The nine-county Dallas/Fort Worth metro area has more than three million persons. Advertisers are often as far flung as East Texas, North Texas and Central Texas. We reach many casual breeders, some commercial breeders, and many new Scottie owners.

## The Prototype

The idea for the Dallas project came from two inspiring ladies in South Texas. Rebecca Hansen and Shirley Lawler sent me information in 1992 about the Chow-Chow advertiser's contact program they run in Houston. Their innovative undertaking first received national attention in Dog News and later in the AKC Gazette. My all-breed club, Big Spring Kennel Club, copied the idea, starting its own program early in 1993.

A detailed description of the program is printed in the Shih Tzu breed columns of Pure-Bred Dogs/American Kennel GAZETTE, May, 1993 (pp. 98-100) and August, 1993 (pp. 89-90). These articles describe the program developed by the ladies in Houston. Written by Cairn Terrier breeder Anna Lee Rucker, the features won one of the major awards in the Dog Writers Association of America 1993 writing contest.

"Why not for Scotties, too?" thought



several of us in the Greater Dallas Scottish Terrier Club. I chaired a committee with Jane Phelan and Tony Long to design a spin-off for our club. We composed a letter to advertisers and a letter to new owners for the advertiser to give puppy buyers and chose several supplementary items for inclusion in the packets. I call Dallas newspaper advertisers and Betty Joe McMillen later signed on to call Fort Worth newspaper advertisers.

## One Month on the Phone

Consider one month's operation of the Dallas program, from one of the two metro papers we service. Eight Dallas Morning News advertisers received GDSTC letters in March, 1994, along with 34 new owner letters for their buyers. The calls were made by one person, me. They cost only \$3.45 and that was all long distance!

Postage to mail the eight packets cost \$9.91. Copying cost, nothing. The only additional expenses were for 34 cheap business size envelopes for new owner information and eight large manila mailing envelopes. Phone and postage expense to reach eight advertisers and 34 new Scottie owners was \$13.36.

The Scottish Terrier Club of America soon will be inserting its own New Scottie Owner letter into every American Kennel Club mailing of individual Scottish Terrier registration certificates. The letter was patterned after the

Dallas club's ad contact/new owner letter. There are legions of buyers who never bother to register their new Scotties. Advertiser contact programs can provide the only material these owners ever receive about responsible breeding and responsible non-breeding.

GDSTC's program is a fledgling project, but we encourage other regional clubs to try one like it. An outline of our first year's results and sample advertisers' packets will be distributed to regional club representatives Montgomery County weekend.

## Problems, Problems

The problem is: even if every regional club operates an advertiser's contact program, that covers only 20 or so metropolitan areas in the U. S. Nonetheless, the idea can be carried easily into the nooks and crannies of America.

That's where you, the individual Scottish Terrier fancier, can come into play. There are more than 1,000 STCA members, spread all over the U. S., from Rome, NY to Gold Creek, MT, to North Pole, AK, to Kaneohe, HI. Still other fanciers belong to regional clubs but not the national.

Scottish Terriers are bred in numbers an ad contact program can reach. We can be grateful we're 37th in popularity among AKC breeds in 1993. We don't have 124,899 registrations like the number one Labrador Retriever breeders had last year. There were 6,724 Scottish Terriers registered in 1993, 1190 fewer than in 1992. We even dropped one notch in popularity.

## Don't Fume

Instead of fuming about casual breeders in your area, start an advertiser's contact program. One person can do it. Even a metro paper like the Dallas Morning News, which runs Scottie ads from a radius of several hundred miles, had ads from only 26 separate Scottie sellers from January through June, 1994. At least five of these had two litters during that time.

If there are several Scottie owners in your area, join forces. Don't duplicate effort. Three San Antonio members of GDSTC have modified the Dallas ad contact materials for use in San Anto-

nio. If you are in a regional club's immediate area, offer to help start a program for the club. If you're in the hinterlands, start your own one-person program.

## It's Easy

Preformatted letters make it easy for you to try an ad contact program. They are available in an advertiser's contact introductory packet. (Request from Carole Owen, 9 Coachman's Circle, Big Spring, TX 79720. Please send \$2 to cover cost.)

The sample packet includes:

1) Advertisers letters - copy of GDSTC's letter which may be modified by regional clubs; copy of letter for use by individual fanciers living out of the immediate areas of regional clubs.

2) New owner letter (for puppy buyers).

3) STCA Good Breeding Practices flyer.

4) New Scottish Terrier Standard .

5) AKC leaflets, "Should I Breed My Dog" and "Congratulations on Your New Pure-Bred Puppy."

6) Spay/Neuter article (emphasizes health benefits, i.e., reduction of cancer risk).

7) Simple Scottish Terrier care instructions.

For more deluxe, personalized mailings: add some of the excellent free brochures available from dog food companies, the American Dog Owners Association (ph. 518/477-8469), or the American Kennel Club.

Other helpful information can include a list of obedience schools in the area, good Scottie groomers, tattooers, animal control facilities that need rescue volunteers or donations, dates of upcoming dog shows, matches, grooming seminars, club functions. Also, insert the contact number for the nearest all-breed kennel club and for the nearest regional Scottish Terrier clubs.

### Keep Records

Simple record keeping is important. One easy method is to tape each classified ad to a file card, noting the date of the ad and name of paper that ran it. Record the name and address of the breeder you call, with any information

you learn from him (number of puppies, etc.). File each card by phone number, so you can avoid calling breeders about the same litter when they repeat their ads.

## When Calling

Calling techniques suggested in Ann Lee Rucker's prize-winning Gazette article include:

*"Be Friendly - Be Fair:* We were all once naive about our breed. Remember how great it felt to finally meet friendly, informative people? Each person you talk to could very well be a future asset to your breed or club, whether it is because he gives up breeding, breeds less, begins to screen for hereditary defects or just passes along the puppy packets to new buyers.

*"Do Not Lecture:* It is not against the law to breed dogs - yet. Your job is to offer breed educational materials. Criticism or sarcasm will not help your breed.

*"Be Ethical:* Never discuss bloodlines or quality, yours or anyone else's. Never knock pet versus champion pedigree stock. They love their dogs as much as you love yours.

*"Leave Breeding Technique Advice to the Experts:* Should questions come up, plead ignorance and suggest they ask their vet for a referral...Your job is to discourage, not encourage, breeding.

*"Don't Take Unfriendly Responses Personally:* Your club's packet is being rejected, not you. Note the date, phone number and response for your files..."

From my own experience, I will add:  
*Be Brief!*

## Keep It Short

Introduce yourself, make the offer. Get the advertiser's address. Thank him. Disengage.

I have had no unfriendly responses. I have never been turned down, except by one caller during the initial pilot of the GDSTC program.

I find I can get the job done in 30 seconds to one minute. All my Scottie calls are long distance, so time is a premium. The main reason I encourage brevity, though, is, if you are like me, if you talk too long, you may get edgy and eventually sermonize. Don't.

Turn preachy and you won't get

your foot in that Scottie door. Your job is to get rudimentary Scottish Terrier educational materials to these breeders and their buyers, not to evangelize on the phone. Let the letters speak for themselves.

As a short sales spiel, mention that the new owner letters contain important information about tattooing and national tattoo registries which you're sure the advertiser will want his buyers to have.

A last reminder – don't let your advertiser contact calls deteriorate into interrogation. Disengage!

### A Confession

All right. I confess. Occasionally, there is still an ad so irresistible I turn Nancy Drew myself. My last snoopy call was about this ad: "Scotties, 9 wks, AKC show lines, xxx/xxx-xxxx."

The "Show lines" piqued my interest.

Near as I could follow this advertiser's story, she and her husband "inherited" the daughter's Scotties. There had been two accidental breedings this past year, including these puppies.

"We didn't intend to be in the puppy business," explained the mother. "We don't show ourselves, but all the puppies could go in the ring." The woman ticked off names of Texas dogs I knew

well. Show lines indeed! The ad was not false advertising.

Spay/neuter education might help here, but I detected a definite pride in the husband's voice as he prompted her from the background with pedigree names. I expect these folks will keep breeding, accidental or otherwise. They were asking \$350 per puppy.

We can't win them all. But we can influence the new Scottie owners.

Just remind yourself: most persons really do want to do right when they know what right is. Hard core commercial breeders are a different story. The best we can hope is that they pass on new owner packets to buyers. And, yes, they will. On repeat calls, I've had commercial breeders tell me how much they appreciate having the new Scottie owner information to give to buyers.

One person can make a difference. Become a vigilante educator.

I use vigilante in a no-lynch, non-punishment sense. To be "vigilant" is "to be keenly attentive to detect danger." To be a vigilante can mean to work with others for the maintenance of order.

Be vigilant. Find where Scottish Terrier education is needed in your area. Take education into your own hands. Vigilante education is preventative rescue at its best. □

### Script

#### One Minute With an Advertiser

Ima Scottie Lover: Hello. My name is Ima Scottie Lover. I'm a member of the Scottish Terrier Club of America. I have some free information for Scottie owners. I saw your ad in the paper and I'd like to mail you a packet which has letters you can give to the buyers of your puppies. There's no charge. If you'll tell me how many puppies are in the litter and where I can send the material to you, I'll mail it right out.

Ura Scottie Seller (version 1): Thanks so much. We had five puppies. I'd love the information. Here's my address.

Ima Scottie Lover: I know your buyers will find the information valuable. Thank you.

Ura Scottie Seller (version 2): Advertiser hesitates.

Ima Scottie Lover: There's important information in the mailing about national tattoo registries and how tattooing can protect a pet against loss and theft. I think your new owners would find it helpful. I'd really like to send copies of this free Scottie information for your buyers. I know you'll want to safeguard your puppies. May I send the material?

Ura Scottie Seller: Sure. Here's my address.

Ima Scottie Lover: Thank you for your time. I'll mail the packet today. □







# MOTHER WAS A BITCH

I had thought that my days of walking the floor with a colicky baby and 2:00 a.m. feedings were just a dim memory deeply buried in the past. Recent newspaper headlines had astonished the world by proclaiming "Italian Mother Gives Birth at Age 63!" "Let her have it," I smiled. "I'll take a good night's sleep anytime." After all, I have grown grandchildren. I've earned the rest. But that was before Diva (Hycourt's High Note) ventured forth into the blissful condition called "maternity."

There had been a short, but very amorous, courtship. The tender entreaties of Robin (Ch. Hycourt's Robin of Glad-Mac) had practically made Diva swoon. She was a mere maiden, but the Scottish Lothario soon won her heart and stole her virginity. Diva is a very modern young lady, and when it became evident that she was about to become an unwed mother she took it all in stride. She watched her diet, got lots of fresh air and exercise, and listened intently to all the advice her more experienced friends had to offer. As the time drew near for her blessed event, she set about preparing the nursery. Everything was in readiness. Although it's said that Mona Lisa hid her condition behind a smile, Diva's look became one of disdain and indifference. Her usual sunny, happy disposition was replaced by low rumblings of discontent. Suddenly, she felt a sharp wrenching tug deep within her belly. Just two hours and fifteen minutes later, she had brought forth six large, healthy, squirming babies. It couldn't have been

easier. "What's all this fuss about the trials and tribulations of motherhood I keep hearing about?" she wondered. Then she took one look at me, jumped out of the whelping box, bared her teeth and menaced her brood.

"Okay, I've done my part and had the kids, now call the nanny!" she growled. With that, she walked away and never looked back.

This might have been just a cute little story if it hadn't actually been true. Diva's litter was born quickly and easily and without incident. Instinctively, she seemed to know just what to do and how to handle the newborn pups. I sat beside her but never needed to offer any assistance at all. The babies arrived so quickly that I hardly had time to place them upon a heating pad before Diva had produced another one - two black, two brindle and two wheaten! In my notes, I had scribbled this phrase after the birth of pup #2, "She's going to be a wonderful mother." And so it seemed. Unfortunately one pup's cord was cut too short and a small nick in the stomach wall caused the intestines to begin to protrude. Should I leave Diva now, mid-delivery, and rush the baby to the vet? She seemed to be in total control and it was the only chance of saving the pup. When I returned a half hour later, another baby was cleaned and in the whelping box, quickly followed by #5. At that point, she let it be known that she wanted to go outside. I prepared a small, tempting bowl of chicken and rice for her which she quickly consumed before coming back into the house. I had to encourage her to see her new family. She stopped suddenly before entering the whelping box and growled fiercely at the babies. I hoped my voice and words were reassuring as I urged her to return to her

brood. She was just as adamant in announcing her intention of ridding the box of these unwelcome intruders. Without my intervention, I feel absolutely certain that she would have attacked and maimed them all. I quickly moved the pups to another, smaller box in the hope that when she had settled down she would again accept them. Bless the Vet that answers late night phone calls! He suggested I give her a tranquilizer and a shot of Oxytocin to hasten her milk and give her natural maternal instincts a chance to kick in. Surprisingly, pup #6 made a quick appearance. Once more, she cleaned the baby with tender care but the instant it started to move toward her she grabbed it fiercely and slung it against the side of the whelping box. I slipped a muzzle on Diva and waited for about twenty more minutes. A final attempt to introduce her to her litter was a near disaster. Her reactions were alarmingly violent, especially for a bitch that I would normally trust with anyone. It was evident that, if the pups were to live, I would have to be their surrogate mother. Diva slept in her regular crate that night and has never since exhibited any interest in the babies. She was happy to spend the next morning romping in the yard with her kennel mates.

This was probably at least the 50th litter that I have either seen whelped or assisted with, but this was entirely new and unexpected. I was comfortable with tube feeding but this was not an isolated pup that needed my help. This was an entire litter that had never experienced any mothering at all. Since they had not even nursed, they were lacking most of the natural immunity which should have passed to them from Diva. It was almost three hours now since the final pup was delivered and I knew that time was becoming a critical factor.

First they were each given 2cc of Gatorade, rubbed down briskly with warm baby oil, weighed so that I would know the correct amount of formula to feed them, and settled into a smaller box on a covered heating pad. I knew

the importance of keeping their environment as sterile as possible, with a consistent 90 degree temperature and enough humidity. The whelping box was scrubbed with Nolvasan and fresh bedding added. I slipped their smaller box inside the whelping box and left them in it so that they would be contained near one another. Next, I quickly made a chart listing each individual pup, its color, sex, weight at birth, a place for a checklist of everything done for it. This was to become my Bible during the coming days. As soon as that was done, their first feeding of Esbilac was prepared and each baby was given 3cc. Immediately after feeding, they were wiped with wet cotton balls so that they could eliminate (It would be at least two weeks before they could do this chore for themselves.) The washing machine seemed to run continuously, for never was the same cloth used to clean more than one pup and bedding had to be frequently changed. My charted legal pad quickly filled up with notations of each feeding, elimination, weight and daily massage of their little bodies. They were weighed twice each day to be sure that they were gaining and the amount of their feedings increased as they grew. Every other day several tablespoons of yogurt were added to their daily formula. Several times daily they were laid on a heated, vibrating cushion. Visitors were discouraged and left standing at the front door, but invited to please come back again when the pups were old enough to have their primary inoculations.

There was a lot of holding and cuddling and feedings every four hours around the clock. The pups seemed to

flourish and, in spite of very little sleep, I managed to hang in there too. Part of their daily exercise pattern consisted of holding them upside down for 15 seconds to insure good blood circulation. Their natural need to suckle was most difficult to satisfy, and trying to bottle feed this many pups was out of the question. Several lambs wool toys in their whelping box helped to divert their interest in sibling ears and more delicate body parts. I even purchased some preemie pacifiers, but they were only effective as long as I held them in place.

By day ten, I began to relax a bit. I thought that perhaps we were over the hill. All the puppies seemed strong, active and right where they should be developmentally. Then I noticed the respiration of the wheaten male had increased noticeably. It was a holiday weekend and my vet was out of town. I isolated the pup from the rest and watched helplessly as his condition rapidly worsened. His breathing was heavy, rapid and labored. His temperature was alarmingly high and he laid in an extended position on one side. To make matters worse, I noticed the same symptoms starting in the little brindle bitch. I began to administer Amoxicillin along with their formula, but it was too little too late. Before morning, both puppies had lost their hard fought battle for life. It seemed particularly difficult to me because they had become such an integral part of my life since Diva had rejected them. I could not help but feel that I, too, had failed them. It was almost impossible to tear myself away from the whelping box – looking for any sign that the remaining three had problems. An autopsy was

performed and tissue samples sent off for analysis, but there was no definitive cause of death. Diva had whelped on her 58th day, but that isn't too unusual and rarely a cause for problems. We decided to put the other puppies on a preventative dosage of antibiotics. Today, they are still thriving, growing and standing up strong on sturdy little legs. They are responding to sounds now, and are starting to eat on their own. They interact with one another and gather excitedly when they hear me approach. Diva accepts them as she would any other Scotties in the household but with no special interest and with a degree of intolerance for their exuberance. I am sure she senses no direct connection with them.

Like any other proud mother, I carry their pictures in my wallet and fret and worry about what the future holds for them. Surely my Scottie puppies are the most magnificent puppies ever born! You just have to look at them to see how very special they are. I have not quite reached 63 yet, but I'VE GOT TRIPLETS!!

*(If anyone else has experience with a bitch behaving in a manner similar to Diva's, I would appreciate hearing from you. She comes from a line of easy whelpers and wonderful mothers. In spite of the lovely puppies which remain from her litter, I am seriously considering having her spayed rather than risk a repeat display of such violent, aggressive behavior. No signs of ill temper remain. She's once more happy, social and loving. I can't help but wonder – surely this couldn't happen again – or could it?)* □

# THE AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB



# NEWS RELEASE

On May 23, 1994, The American Kennel Club ("AKC") filed a suit in the United States District Court for the District of New Jersey entitled *The American Kennel Club v. Joel Grossman (a/k/a Joel Wilner)*, individually and d/b/a American Kennel Association; The Kennel Club; Cincinnati Kennel Club; Cincinnati Breeders Association; Ohio Kennel Club; and/or Ohio Dog Breeders Association, Docket No. 94-2466 (JWB). In that Complaint, the AKC asserted claims for civil contempt, false designation of origin and false description, trademark infringement, and unfair competition.

The Defendants are not members of the AKC or have any connection with the AKC. Rather, they are in the business of selling dogs.

Joel Grossman had previously been connected with an entity known as The New York Kennel Club, and other affiliated companies, located on Route 23 in Wayne, New Jersey. In 1988 AKC filed suit against Joel Grossman and those affiliated companies for infringement of AKC trademarks. That litigation resulted in the entry of a Consent Judgment that prohibited Joel Grossman and the other defendants in that case from further infringing AKC trademarks and causing the public to believe that the defendants were affiliated with the AKC (the "1988 Consent Judgment").

In December 1990, the AKC again filed suit against Joel Grossman and his related companies, alleging that Mr. Grossman had committed civil contempt by violating the terms of the 1988 Consent Judgment. In January 1991, U. S. District court Judge Bissell entered a temporary restraining order preventing Joel Grossman and all related entities from using "AKC" and any other American Kennel Club mark for any purpose without the express consent of the American Kennel Club.

That case ultimately was resolved by Joel Grossman and the AKC entering into another Consent Judgment which prohibited defendants' use of any marks confusingly similar to those of the AKC, and which specifically prohibited the defendants from using the name "American Kennel Association" in connection with any business (the "1991 Consent Judgment"). Joel Grossman and the other defendants' use of the marks "AKC," "American Kennel Club," and "The American Kennel Club" in connection with their sale of genuine AKC-registered or registrable puppies was severely restricted. The 1991 Consent Judgment also required defendants to pay twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to the AKC as payment for its claims of damages, attorneys' fees and costs.

The present action by the AKC against Joel Grossman was prompted by reports to the AKC that Joel Grossman was using the name "American Kennel Association" in connection with a dog selling business in Cincinnati, Ohio. Apparently, Mr. Grossman had obtained telephone listings under that name, and verbally represented to prospective dog purchasers that his organization was called, or was affiliated with an organization called, "The American Kennel Association." Thus, the AKC believed that Joel Grossman had once more violated the terms of a Consent Judgment concerning the names under which he was permitted to do business.

When the AKC filed its Complaint in May 1994, it had received information indicating that Joel Grossman was also offering dogs for sale in the Atlanta, Georgia area using the following toll-free number: 800-720-2220. Since then, the AKC has received reports that classified advertisements offering dogs for sale, and featuring that toll-free number, have recently ap-

peared in major newspapers in Seattle, Washington; Los Angeles, California; and Chicago, Illinois. It has also been reported to AKC that the toll-free number has been answered by someone stating: "Thank you for calling. This is the national headquarters of the Kennel Club."

On July 7, 1994, the Honorable John W. Bissell of the United States District Court for the District of New Jersey granted the AKC's request for entry of an Order to Show Cause for a Preliminary Injunction With Temporary Restraints. That order - effective for ten days - temporarily restrains Joel Grossman from using the marks "AKC," "American Kennel Club," "The American Kennel Club," "American Kennel Association," or any other confusingly similar mark. Today, the AKC is appearing before Judge Bissell to ask that the Court continue the injunction against Mr. Grossman thus preventing him for ever using such marks, and to seek monetary contempt sanctions. □

# Craniomandibular Osteopathy

Cranio-mandibular Osteopathy or Osteoarthropathy (CMO) commonly known as LION JAW, WESTY JAW or SCOTTY JAW is an inherited disorder of dogs. It is characterized as a noncancerous growth of the lower jaw bone (ramus of the mandible) or over the angle of the mandible and the tympanic bulla. In most cases, the defect is bilateral but this is not always true. The bone is dense and hard and has a rough surface that can be detected on palpation by an experienced person. The most common site for the dense growth in CMO is the lower jaw bone. However, the disease has been found in other non movable bony parts of the skull (cranium), and in the radius and ulna (the two bones in the lower arms). What this means is that, instead of the bone being flexible at this time of rapid growth, it is enlarged, brittle and resistant to movement. Therefore, it can be a very painful disease. It most commonly affects Scottish Terriers and West Highland

White Terriers, but has been seen in Cairn and Boston Terriers, Great Danes, Doberman Pinschers, Bull Mastiffs and Labrador Retrievers. The condition has been reported in the United States, Canada and Europe.

The disease is most often diagnosed by careful observation of the clinical signs and by palpation. It may be necessary to achieve definite diagnosis by radiograph of the skull or affected part. The onset of the disease usually occurs between the ages of four and seven months but it has been known to appear as early as three to four weeks or as late as nine to eleven months. Experienced breeders and veterinarians can recognize it earlier than four months. The onset of the disease is signaled by a very tender mouth or jaw. The puppy may scream when touched or played

with. Often he will show signs of discomfort when chewing or when his mouth is being examined. High temperatures have also been associated with this process, which has an inflammatory component. The puppy may also show signs of lethargy and not want to eat because of the pain. The more severe cases may progress to an inability

to open the mouth and chew food. Mild cases may go undetected in Scotties, Westies and Cairns for the reason that the swelling may be slight, not painful and all three breeds have long hair that may obscure observation of the swelling. Because of the age of the pup and varying degrees of severity, CMO is many times diagnosed as teething problems, swollen glands or a virus. The only sure way to diagnose CMO is radiographically.

CMO is a self limiting disease and usually not life threatening. Some pups will get over the disease on their own but most will need treatment. Steroids (prednisone and prednisolone) are most often used to treat the animal but the treatment can be long (4 to 10 months). Long term use of steroids and their affect on canines is just today being dis-

covered and documented and may be the source for a future article. Some success is being achieved with the NSAID type drugs (Non Steroidal Anti-Inflammatory Drugs) like ibuprofen (MOTRIN) or naproxen (NAPROSYN), but dosing is difficult and requires liver and kidney function monitoring and side effects of NSAIDs can be gastric ulcer disease. Following treatment, which most dogs respond to, the dog can live a normal healthy life and the bony swelling is frequently reabsorbed. By age two to three years it may be impossible to detect the dog was ever affected.

CMO is an inherited genetic disease. Although the disease has been around for many years, until recently no-one was sure what causes it to manifest itself. Some breeders believed it was a virus, while others thought CMO to be a fluke of nature due to the rarity of its occurrence. Thanks to the work of Dr. George Padgett and Westie breeder Barbara

Stoll, among others, much more is known about the disease today. Test breedings conducted by Dr. Padgett and Mrs. Stoll using two affected Westies have shown the disease to be an autosomal (simple) recessive. This means that both parents must be carriers of the gene for the disease to manifest itself. CMO will not show up in a litter using two clear dogs, one clear + one carrier, an affected + a clear and, a lot of times, it won't show up even when two carriers are bred. Why? As with most simple recessives, only 25% of the puppies produced by two carriers will be affected. That is one out of four. To be at least 90% sure there should be at least eight pups in the litter. Since most Highland breeds don't have that large a litter, one breeding may not produce an affected puppy.

Because we don't normally repeat breedings, we can go merrily along our way breeding a carrier, producing more carriers and not even know it - until the breeding that does produce an affected puppy and we wonder where it came from. You figure it must have been the stud dog you used - or, if you own the stud dog, it was probably that bitch. Before we start to name call, remember it takes both parents carrying the gene for that puppy to be affected and it doesn't matter if your dog has sired two hundred gorgeous pups or your bitch has produced seven specialty winning progeny. The only way to handle this situation is to recognize it for what it is and do something about it. The one thing you can be sure of, if you have a puppy that is affected, is that both parents are carriers and that any littermates that you kept or sold to others for breeding may also be carriers (25% from an affected litter will be clear, 50% will be carriers and 25% will be affected). This is not the end of the world. Keep only your very best and be willing to test breed. Remember, we are not trying to produce CMO when we test breed. We are trying to produce unaffected dogs that will show that the animal being test bred is clear of the gene for CMO. A CLEAR BRED TO AN AFFECTED WILL NEVER PRODUCE AN AFFECTED PUPPY! But remember all puppies from this test breeding will be carriers, so don't plan on keeping any. This is a great place for that spay/neuter contract



We Scottie breeders and fanciers are a curious lot. We always like to lead the way when it comes to ferreting out problems and finding solutions for the betterment of our breed. We have been leaders of the parade to help in gene mapping for VWD. We have dedicated countless hours toward corrective advertising by the makers of Filarbits Plus. We have raised countless dollars to establish a health issues trust fund. We agonize over each breeding to be sure we are passing along the best our stock has to offer and we try to make each new generation better than the last. We need to look at this new problem as something we can tackle with the same gusto. This time there is someone there ahead of us. The West Highland White Terrier Club of American has established a clearinghouse called WATCH. WATCH is a voluntary association of breeders willing to maintain records of all CMO affected or carrying stock. The purpose was to help all breeders when they were planning that special breeding to the top winning dogs today to see if there might be a problem. This approach can allow you, the breeder, to make the final decision based on all the facts. Let's face it, breeding is a difficult enough decision to make, let alone having to deal with hidden problems. How many times have you asked yourself, "What do I want from this litter?" and "What puddles am I going to step

into with this breeding?" No reputable breeder will deliberately mislead you as to the good, the bad and the ugly characteristics they know or suspect may be hiding in their stock. The specific nature of this disease may not have manifested itself before. The breeder who wins admiration is the one who lays it out right on the table for you. All of us aspire to be that breeder. The Cairn Terrier club of American is urging its members to consider joining WATCH because, "the apparatus is already in place and the cost would be significantly smaller..." I'm not sure that is the road we wish to travel but I think the Scottie clubs and breeders have always wanted what is truly beneficial to the breed. Some kind of assistance in establishing a way in which we can all work together to prevent the spread of this disease is an idea whose time just may have come.

# Is Retouching Necessary?

There are, alas, those dog owners who not only behold Rover through the rosiest of glasses but also expect the poor benighted photographer to use them. The drawback here is that the glasses aren't effective in front of the camera lens. But owners must be pleased...if the photographer likes to eat occasionally. There will always be those who'd rather have Rover remodeled – photographically, that is—than invest in a good dog. They are the same people who will spend a thousand dollars making a twenty-five dollar dog a champion.

The neatest, quickest way of ridding oneself of friends and customers is to make practical suggestions about not showing or breeding inferior specimens. Airbrush artists and retouchers thrive. Even sadder than the task of idealizing poor specimens is that of retouching beautiful ones whose pictures should be left entirely natural. A most constant request is for the removal of that little lump of muscle that shows on the withers of every smooth coated dog. If the animals were so maimed in life as they are in photographs they'd be quite unable to walk. Nature was sadly neglectful in not designing dogs with mechanical drawing instruments.

The illustrations herewith is a chuckler but it has offended enough people to give rise to the thought that the shoe fits – or pinches. So much breeding in this country is done, thanks to the rapid air service, strictly on the basis of pedigree, pictures and reputation. So, in my mind, faking in dog pictures is on a par with the use of the mails to defraud. For sales and stud purposes, pictures are invaluable if they truly represent the dog. When they don't, heaven help the purchaser or breeder unless some genius can devise a way to pass the photographic virtues of sire and dame to their progeny.

This diatribe is not to excuse bad

pictures. It's not the photographer's job to portray Rover at his worst; but it is his duty – and his reputation depends upon this – to locate obvious faults of outline and to minimize them by careful selection of shooting angle. If a dog be long in back, a three-quarter front view shortens him a little but remains an honest photo. A higher camera angle makes lack of depth of brisket less obvious. Hopelessly flat feet can be concealed in tallish grass. Lack of rear angulation and poor pasterns are less noticeable when the shot is made more to the front of the dog than the aforementioned three-quarter view. Poor backs, lack of shoulder angulation and short necks are vastly improved when the dog stretches himself, keenly alerted over some far-ish curiosity-provoking sound or movement. Intense animation covers a multitude of flaws.

Careful selection of a contrasting background can enhance a picture and spare retouching. Shrubbery and flowers may be lovely to look at on color photos but for black and white work they're generally a confusing mess of shades from light to dark. Clean backgrounds such as skyline or wide roads don't distract from the subject or make it essential to retouch the natural outline in order to find the dog...picture-puzzle style.

A certain amount of retouching is often necessary but this is not to be confused with faking. Sporting dogs such as Cockers usually must be held in position and hands must be removed from the picture; tail feathering or lip that might be covered must be restored. If a photo of a bitch nursing a litter is needed before she regains her shape, she is certainly entitled to a restored maidenly middlepiece. A good eye unnaturally lightened by the idiosyncrasies of flashbulb merits its original darkness. However, in this rugged and wearing business, my greatest pleasure is in getting a fine picture of a handsome dog and seeing it published over

the sacred word "unretouched."

Photograph Your Own Pups...

Shooting pups is a joy. It's easy, too, with a little know-how. Most breeds are at their most appealing age from eight to ten weeks and they are easiest to handle. Here is the system. Put the pups on a box or table which is high enough from the floor so the pups will be discouraged from jumping off. The box must be large enough so the puppies can sit or stand comfortably but not large enough for them to wander at will.

Push the box against a wall and have a helper on either side to keep the youngsters from falling off, then shove the puppies into position. Certainly one will move. Shove him back.

Keep your hands off the puppies. When they wriggle out of position, push them back – but don't leave your hands on them – for if you hold puppies in position until you are ready to shoot, they'll move every time. And don't be sweet; don't "kitchy-koo" 'em and don't pet 'em. (Do that after the picture taking.) If you talk to them at all use a firm voice. The little guys are smart, you know. So you're still pushing them back into position...Quick! Hands off! Then a sharp noise, or a thrown bright object gets their attention. And bang! You've a grand photograph.

# A Discussion of Type

As breeders, we all talk of type. Without type, our breeds would begin to resemble one another more and more, tending toward a mean. Thus, type is important in breeding. The problem that arises, however, is that everyone seems to have his or her own idea of what proper type is. Depending on who you learn from or what strikes your eye as attractive, you will fall into the ranks of supporters of one type or another.

Type combines many factors to create a whole dog that will closely resemble other dogs of the same type. Such things as amount of angulation, topline and head structure are characteristics that may be viewed differently among different breeders. A breeder decides what combination of characteristics he finds correct, in terms of what he believes the breed should be, and breeds accordingly.

No matter what type we feel is correct, we can all appreciate that kennel whose dogs can be identified by the type alone. "That must be a So-and-so dog!" It is enviable when a breeder can consistently produce his ideal dog, even if we don't personally agree with that ideal.

Why do we choose a certain type of dog? Since there is only one standard, theoretically we should all agree upon

one type. Unfortunately, there are as many ways of interpreting that one standard as there are people viewing the dogs. It is also true that some have stretched the standard to allow for traits that are attractive but not specifically referred to by the standards. Others have decided parts of the standard are simply wrong and have chosen to move in their own direction.

Judges are instrumental in establishing type, and so have a responsibility to the breeds they judge. A type that consistently wins will, without doubt, become the popular type to breed. A judge's opinion is considered to be based on experience and education, and it is therefore a legitimate base on which we establish our early ideas of breed type. If judges fall into the trap of picking winners from an incorrect, yet popular, type just to ensure themselves of future assignments, they do an injustice to the breed.

Breeders, likewise, are tempted to adopt the current winning type as the ultimate in correctness to ensure their success in the ring. Breeders are the breed, as they exhibit what people outside the breed will view as correct type. Many breeders, having finally overcome kennel-blindness, still suffer from type-blindness; that is, they cannot even consider the possibility that


another type of dog may have something to offer. While a breeder should not hop between types of dogs, jumbling them together into an inconsistent group of progeny, neither should he completely close his eyes to other interpretations of the standard.

When developing your own idea of type, you must keep in mind several things. First, type is meaningless if it does not include soundness. No matter how beautiful the dog or how closely it fits the standard, an unsound dog can never be considered correct in type, as no standard allows for unsoundness! Physical and mental soundness should always be the first consideration in type.

Second, fads are common and even contribute to the picture of a breed at times. But most fads pass, leaving only an embarrassing photographic record of those who fell completely into them without regard for the past or future of a breed. If you enter into a breed at the height of a fad, such as for angulation, you may see this as the only correct dog, since it is what will be winning. It is important to know the history of your breed – what the dogs were bred for, what they looked like in the past and why they have changed. All breeds change through the years, and whether they have improved or declined is a point strongly argued among breeders. Keep the overall welfare of the breed in mind when evaluating any new trends in type.

Finally, when choosing the traits you want to be part of the type of dog you will breed, always evaluate each trait in relation to the standard. Standards are the cumulative result of the experience of many people over many years. To insinuate that the standard is simply mistaken is extremely egotistical. Do not ignore parts of the standard because you feel that other parts are more important. The total dog must always be considered.

The standard does allow for some individual interpretation and also for



individual preference. One person may prefer one color of dog, another a different color. If the standard allows either as equally acceptable, the difference from one kennel to the next is perfectly acceptable. However, I think anyone would agree that it would not be acceptable to prefer and breed unstable, spooky dogs.

Type is the single most important factor in the preservation of an individual breed. It is not the most important factor in dog breeding. Physical and mental soundness take over there. But once we have considered soundness, we are obligated to intelligently decide upon the type of dog we wish to breed, as the type produced by serious breed-

ers makes a more lasting impression on the breed than anything else – even soundness. Unsound dogs will eventually disappear, either through death or the fact that a breeder producing them will simply not be able to continue his pursuit for any great length of time. A type that is accepted in the show ring, however, has the potential to influence entire breeding programs and hundreds of litters.

Type has many meanings in many minds. To some, a typey dog is one that wins. To others, its one (that) displays its Group characteristics. We all hope one day our own idea of type will elicit the comment, "Yes, that has to be a So-and-so dog!" But have we looked

ahead to the impact such a day will have on the breed? Are we willing to have that type become part of the history of the breed? If not, we must quickly reevaluate what we produce in terms of what the breed should be. □

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## How long is 11 inches?

My involvement in Scotties and Sealyhams has led to a point that is impossible for me to resolve. After thirty years in dogs, I thought that there were certain points in all breeds that help to establish type. Some of these are the moderately short neck and back of the Scot and the longer neck and back of the Sealy, which fairly accurately are borne out by the weight difference in the breeds; 19-22 pounds vs. 23-24 pounds respectively. The height of the dogs I have are fairly similar and so is the bone, but when I pick them up it is very apparent which breed is heavier and longer backed.

Now the Sealyham has been described in the English and Canadian Standards as having an oblong general outline, not square, yet the height to length of back as measured from the wither to the set on of the tail is the same distance: 10 1/2 inches.

For the Scottish Terrier the English Standard calls for "Back proportionately short", the previous American and the current Canadian Standards "Body : Moderately short". All three countries ask for a dog that is 10 inches at the wither and the English add the range of an additional inch in height.

But enter in this picture the new Scottish Terrier Standard, effective

November of 1993. Under the section; Neck, Topline, Body "the neck is moderately short" and later in the same paragraph "the body is moderately short". So far so good, except that in an earlier section of this same standard; Size, Proportion, Substance we have "The principal objective must be symmetry and balance without exaggeration."... "Height at withers for either sex should be about 10 inches. The length of back from withers to set-on of tail should be approximately 11 inches."

The insertion of this apparently harmless dimension "11 inches" will then yield a dog that is 10% longer in back than in height and if you accept that the Sealyham Terrier is an oblong animal whose measurements are equal what then has become of the Scottish Terrier?

I have carried on discussions with several longtime terrier-men, including Peter Green and Ric Chashodian, and with judges of the breed like Desmond Murphy, who grew up at the Stalter's Barberry Knowe Kennel, which had both Scotties and Sealys, and Phyllis Haage, whose first experience was in a kennel with Wires and Scots and Lynn Weaver, a longtime and highly respected breeder judge of Scotties. Each and every one of them laughed at my first





approach when I questioned them as to the which breed was longer : the Sealyham or the Scottie? My next step was to put before them the two Standards and ask them to read them and then say which was longer. Their concensus was that the dimension must have been a typographical error or that the measurement should have been from the point of the shoulder rather than from the wither because in their collective years of breeding, exhibiting and/or judging it is a well known fact that what distinguishes the above two breeds in type is the compactness of the Scottish Terrier over its lengthier compatriot, the Sealy.

Is this still true? □

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
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# Rx For Scottie Blahs...

## And Couch Potato Syndrome

On August 7th, the Connecticut Terrier Club is having a Tracking and Locating Terrier Field Trial open to all terriers to test their natural instincts to follow a scented trail and locate the quarry. Originally called a Long Legged Terrier Field Trial to distinguish this type of event from the AW-TA Go-to-Ground type terrier field trial, the name has recently been changed to Tracking and Locating Terrier Field Trial to reflect the fact that many short legged terrier breeds (especially Scotties) do quite well in this type of event.

But what specifically is a Tracking and Locating Terrier Field Trial? Typically, entries are divided into two trails, beginners and advanced. The advanced trail runs under very specified rules based on Coonhound field trial rules modified to reflect the differences between how hounds and terriers hunt. The beginners trails are much more free form, designed to be a learning experience for both the dog and handler.

### Beginners Trail

Several trails are run to gradually develop the tracking instinct in the terrier. First, the dogs are introduced to the caged quarry to spark their interest and show them the relationship between the scent and the quarry. Then, in full sight of the dogs, a scented lure is dragged to a nearby tree where the caged quarry is raised up to a level above their jumping height (approximately 10 feet). The dogs are released and encouraged to follow the scent to the tree and "work" the quarry. Since this trail is laid in their sight, it is usually more of a sight trail than a scent trail, but it introduces them to the concept of "working"



a quarry. After mastering this aspect of a trial, a simple scent trail is laid, starting off in view, but disappearing from view and continuing for a short distance to the treed quarry. Again, the dogs are released and encouraged to follow the trail to the quarry. One or two trails are run for this portion of the trial. If two trails are run, the first one is usually straight or on a well defined path with no turnoffs. The second trail would have a well marked turnoff to the quarry, allowing the dog to overrun the trail and recover. The final trail is longer (up to one quarter mile) with several turns, but no significant obstacles. While the earlier runs are typically run on lead, the handler is encouraged, but not required, to allow the dog to run the final trail off lead. There is no scoring for the beginners trail but the dogs are evaluated by the leader and the handler for natural instinct and developed trailing skills to determine if and when the dog will be ready to move up to the advanced trail.

### Advanced Trail

The Airedale Club of New England has established a format for the advanced trail designed to test and evaluate the natural tracking instinct of a terrier. While the same end result is desired for a terrier as for a hound, a terrier has a different set of instincts. Specifically, giving voice upon locating the scent and recognition of that voice by the handler are not part of the terrier trial.

The advanced trail is laid before each run out of sight of the dogs, starting at a point some distance away from the release point for the dogs. Dogs in each run are chosen by random drawing of all the entrants with the proviso that no run has more than four dogs and that no run has two or more dogs with the same owner or handler. The trail is at least one-half mile in length with turns, and possibly

obstacles, water crossings, etc. incorporated to challenge the dog's instincts and acquired tracking skills. As in the beginners trail, the dogs are introduced to the caged quarry or scented lure, but now to establish what scent they are to follow. All dogs in a run are released at the same time at the release point with the first challenge being to find the scented trail. Once found, the trail is to be followed to the quarry. Two lines cross the trail approximately 40 and 20 yards from the quarry, with flags set approximately 20 yards apart on each line. A 50 foot circle is drawn around the tree with the quarry. Line and Circle Judges observe the lines and circle to record the first dog of each run to cross the lines between the flags and the first dog to cross the circle and "work" the quarry. After being released, each run has 15 minutes to cross the second line and five additional minutes to cross the circle and work the quarry. Points are given for being the first dog to cross the lines and the circle for each preliminary run, with each of these winners running in the finals. Additional points are given for winning the line and circle competition in the finals.

There are further refinements relating to Novice and Open classes in the advance trail and progression from one to the other which we will not go into now. More important is the answer to the question, "How do Scotties fare in this type of competition?" "Actually, surprisingly well!" is the answer. The Scottie would never win if speed were the sole criteria for doing well. However, since winning requires following a scent to a location, the slow, methodical nature of the Scottie seems to bring him to the line with little or no wasted effort. Many of the other breeds possess more enthusiasm than tracking instinct and often miss the turns or lose the scent through the obstacles and lose time recovering from significant over-

runs. Many of them never do find the line on their own. The Scottie tracks with his (or her) nose down, much like a silent hound, moving from release point to line in a steady progression which often gets him there ahead of the fleetest of foot breeds. And they do "work" the quarry, not with the wild abandonment of a Jack Russell, but with a firm announcement of their intention to do serious bodily harm to the quarry if only it would come down to defend its honor. Had she been entered for competition at our first Annual Trial, our Audacious would have won. For the second Annual Trial, our Briggs ran after the official entries and was the only dog to complete the course and cross the lines. Both Scotties seemed to understand the objective and quickly settled into following the trail. Time will tell how Rosemary fares this year.

A proposed variation of this competition would have the quarry located in a den rather than in a tree. Because of the differences in working styles of the various terrier breeds, locating rather than entering the den would be the cri-

teria for satisfactory completion of the trail.

Another form of terrier competition is the Go-to-Ground. Previous articles have covered the specifics of the AW-TA Go-to-Ground and the AKC's Proposed Den Test competition. Our experience with Scotties in dig competition has shown the conservative nature of the breed with cautious investigation being the norm. We do not practice our Scots, so this is truly a test of instinct and not of conditioning. Some have shown no inclination to enter the earth. Hunting instinct above ground is no predictor of a willingness to go to ground. Those who do enter the earth do so with steady progress toward the quarry rather than foolhardy, pell-mell rushing into the den. This approach does not yield low times and, in fact, sometimes produces a failure to qualify for a certificate. Upon reaching the quarry, the attitude may be one of aggressively attempting to get at the rats or it may be a "go ahead and make your move" challenge, which is usually unanswered (another nonqualifying re-

sult). Any practice should be designed to develop latent instincts and not conditioned response to insure acquisition of a certificate.

Terrier field trials are designed to give our terriers a chance to get out and be terriers, using their inborn instincts to do what should come naturally. The dogs have a great time and so do their owners. Because natural hunting experiences are limited or nonexistent for most of us, consider attending or, if necessary, starting a field trail of either type in your area. You will not regret the effort. □



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# Learning About Brucellosis

Brucellosis, a not-too-publicized disease of cattle and dogs, was once thought to be transmitted only through the breeding of infected animals. Let the letter below, which was sent to the kennel clubs in Texas Region, shatter the myth for you regarding this heretofore unmentioned disaster -waiting-to-happen.

Dear Board Members:

As concerned members of the dog fancy, we hope you'll find the contents of this letter worthy of your concerted effort to work toward remedying the situation described below.

Do you know there is a devastating and incurable canine disease, the particulars of which many show people are still not aware, lurking in the pastures and cattle barns which many kennel clubs use as show sites?

Although this disease, known as "Brucellosis," is primarily thought of as a cattle disease which is transmitted only through breeding, it can actually be contracted from cattle by dogs when they are shown on grounds which have recently had infected cattle on them. Particularly grounds which are moist and soggy from seasonally heavy rains, as the Brucellosis organism thrives in a damp environment. Dogs need not actually ingest infected cow manure. They can contract the disease from simply sniffing manure or a moist, soggy spot where manure or urine of an infected cow had recently been. And "recently" can mean up to two years under appropriate environmental conditions. In dogs, Brucellosis causes a bitch to abort her litter when well into pregnancy, renders males sterile, or causes "fading" puppies if the litter manages to come to term.

We bring this information to your attention because we just experienced the heartbreak Brucellosis can cause when we discovered our

nationally-ranked Ch. Samoyed bitch had this dreaded disease.

Recently we, as all responsible breeders should, took our bitch in for a routine blood test in anticipation of sending her out of state to be bred. We couldn't believe the results of the first blood test, so we had the test performed again, this time by Texas A & M Veterinary College. The results came out the same. We were astonished - our bitch had not been bred in over two years, and then only to our own Ch. male (who has never been bred to another bitch). We immediately had our male and two other "spayed" bitches tested. They all tested negative! When we asked about a possible cure we were told by our veterinarian that the specialists at Texas A & M checked further with other small animal reproduction specialists in California, who had recently tried to cure infected dogs, and both groups of vets concurred we should immediately spay and/or neuter all our dogs. When we inquired as to how our bitch could have contracted this disease, we were provided with the information we've shared with you above.

The tragedy of this situation is that there are so many uninformed people in the dog world, people who are unaware (as we were) of Brucellosis and the ease in which it can be contracted at some of our show sites.

This disease can also be transmitted to humans from our beloved pets. All it takes is for an infected dog to lick itself and then lick a human in a spot where the organism can enter the body through mucus membranes. Once contracted, the disease in humans can take from 3 to 5 years to cure depending on when it is diagnosed.

Thinking of the many small children and elderly people who attend our dog shows, wouldn't you agree that as responsible members of the dog fancy we all have a moral obligation to look out for the safety and health of our beloved animals and the people who come to

see them?

The damage to our breeding program has already been done - but it's not too late to save other breeders' animals. We ask you to think long and hard about the show site you are currently using. If it is a combination pasture and cattle barn with or without dirt floors, you should seriously consider the potential health hazards that may exist in such an environment.

Sincerely,

Well, that is the long and short of it. Neither our Ch. El Sol's Crystal River Prynces or Ch. Amberlane' Lord Bearnwolf will grace the conformation ring again. Hopefully next year we can put them into the obedience ring and continue going to dog shows to see the wonderful people we've met over the past 8 years. But it will be a long time before we decide to get another conformation dog. We now have three spayed bitches and one neutered male at home, and four house dogs is enough to contend with for a while.

However, the bright side is that all our dogs are alive, and happy to be with us. I, for one, am very thankful this is not a disease that requires immediate euthanasia. Life without Crystal, Dakota, Dancer and Puff would be very difficult to cope with.

Please take heed of this story, dog owners, and pay attention to where you exhibit your dogs. Cleaning your dogs' feet and noses with a clorox-water solution prior to returning it to its crate can help somewhat. But, if it's a show site such as the one described in the above letter, TAKE CARE! And for goodness sake, DON'T do any breeding unless both the dog and bitch have had a recent negative test. Even then, be aware that it can take up to 6 months before the infection shows up in a blood test. Take all the precautions you can, or you could be facing what we at Bearnwolf Samoyeds did, the loss of your breeding stock. Good luck. □

## Evelyn Sanders

Evelyn Sanders was born October 15, 1918 in Coolidge, TX. She graduated from Texas Christian University with a degree in chemistry and went to work in Fort Worth for Globe Labs. She worked in the production of veterinary vaccines and that work eventually brought her to Michigan State University in 1942. Evelyn earned her Phd while studying brucellosis. During this time, she met Lucille Portwood and Alice Exworthy, fellow researchers, each of whom was an important influence on Evelyn's future as a Scottie breeder.

Evelyn's co-workers included a number of dog fanciers but it was Alice who took Evelyn to a dog show in Ohio and brought her home with her first Scottish Terrier, Erb's Magnificent. Nifty, as she was called, became Evelyn's first champion, finishing owner-handled in 1955.

Around this time, George Ward spoke to Alice and told her about a Scottie bitch he had recently seen. Her name was Eng. Ch. Glendoune Gaytime and she was, in the opinion of many, one of the best bitches in England. Alice told Lucille, who began to plan a generous surprise for Evelyn. After some negotiations with the breeder of "Marie", as the bitch was called, Lucille bought her as a surprise gift for Evelyn.

"Marie" was already four and a half years old when she came to Michigan. She had finished her English title at 13 months and produced 2 English champions from three litters. She arrived just a few weeks before she was due to whelp her fourth litter. Two months after producing a litter of five puppies, Marie embarked on her American show career. Although Evelyn had already finished one champion and was showing her first homebred dogs, she felt that Marie should go to a top handler. Shown by George and Louise Ward, Marie finished her American title in just eight shows, going Winners Bitch and Best of Opposite Sex at the Chicago Specialty and Best of Winners and Best of Opposite Sex the following day at International.

Marie produced her fourth litter in the Spring of 1958. She seemed to get better each year so, in the fall of 1960, Evelyn took her eight and a half year old show girl to Canada. Marie finished quickly, winning two Group I's and becoming one of the small number of Scottie bitches with championships in England, the U. S. and Canada. Marie was enjoying the show ring more than ever so Evelyn decided to take her out as a special. She went to seven shows

winning Best of Breed at six of them, including the Scottish Terrier Club of Northern Ohio, and winning one Group I, two Group II's and one Group III.

Evelyn started teaching immunology at Michigan State University in 1965. Her busy teaching schedule, combined with worsening osteoporosis, limited her ability to breed and show her dogs. In the early 70's, she and Dick Hensel imported Reanda Red Sunset, a daughter of the great Eng. Ch. Reanda Ringold. Evelyn's Sandbark Scotties appear in many Dunbar pedigrees and are behind a number of midwestern Scottish Terriers. Evelyn retired from teaching in 1982 and kept track of her beloved breed through the "Bagpiper". She passed away on April 28, 1994.

## "Bunny"

Bunny and Harvey Cederstrom bred and showed Scotties under the Cederbrae prefix in the 1960's and 1970's. They co-owned the "Cinderella Scottie" Ch. Revran Reprise, who went Best In Show from the open class at Beverly Hills K. C. in 1967 over 3,221 dogs and was the top Scottie bitch in 1967 and 1968 (Ch. Bardene Bingo was the No. 1 Scottie overall). There were a dozen or more Cederbrae champions altogether. Bunny was aptly nicknamed by Harvey - a petite sprite

(under 5 feet) with inexhaustible energy and a ready smile. Scotties have been an important part of their lives. They lost their last one, "The Brewster" - Cederbrae Sorceress Wight, earlier this year. Harvey can be reached at 3611 74th Avenue S. E., Olympia, WA 98501.

As an aside - What is a breeder?

I bought a "pet" Scottie bitch from the Cederstroms in 1973. Looking back 21 years later, I received a healthy, quality-laden foundation bitch who lived 16 1/2 years, owner support and a wonderful friendship. Did I get my money's worth? I got the deal of the century!

### Minutes of the Health Meeting

June 18, 1994

A special meeting to discuss controlling genetic disorders in purebred dogs was scheduled for June 18, in Kenosha, Wisconsin.

Unfortunately, the speaker, Dr. George Padgett entered the date incorrectly in his calendar and was not present.

The meeting was attended by 22 members. Gail Gaines, chairperson of the Health Committee and Jane Phelan apologized for the speaker. Ms. Gaines and Ms. Phelan suggested the meeting be used as a brainstorming session on health issues. The majority of the discussions focused on past and present health concerns. The group attempted to compile a list of diseases they thought the health committee should address. 1. Cancer 2. Seizures 3. Endocrine Diseases (ie. Cushing's) 4. Immune disorders 5. CMO 6.

Many thanks for those who came, participated and suggested. I wish I had time to write each of you a special note of thanks.

I do particularly wish to thank Diane Murray, President of the Chicago club, Tom & Sandy Eckhart for their help in local arrangements and to Richard Corenchuck who was set up to do the video.


