He placed every dog in the various classes, whether there were two or twenty entered. He did this even in the "Specials Only" class. It was the first time I had ever seen this done and it was tremendously interesting. Incidentally it took a lot of courage especially in the "Specials Only"

particularly in the East, and let's hope the Midwest shakes off its lethargy, gets busy conditioning its good dogs and sees to it that the Midwest shows do not lag in entries.

The annual meeting of the Scottish Terrier Club of America was held at the Hotel McAlpin in New York on Saturday evening after the Specialty. It was one of the nicest dinners and meetings I have ever attended. Everyone seemed very enthusiastic over the quality of dogs that had been shown that day and all were high in their praise of the job Mr. Singleton had done. A resolution was passed by the Club ordering the Secretary to write a letter to the American Kennel Club, advising them of the painstaking and efficient job of judging Mr. Singleton had done.

Important news comes from Strathkirk Kennels owned by Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Koch of Baton Rouge, La. The Kochs purchased several outstanding dogs when Relgalf discontinued breeding. Among them is Ch. Relgalf Rebel Dictator, a famous winner and the sire of six champions. Dictator joins several of his former kennel mates including the coming young dog, Relgalf Resolution, an outstanding bitch, Relgalf Reel, and Ch. Relgalf Roulette, top bitch which did considerable winning a few years ago. Strathkirk Kennels are located on a five acre tract just outside of Baton Rouge. The kennel is extremely modern and inasmuch as it is located in a grove of shade trees the dogs are not affected in the least by the summers. The Kochs moved to Baton Rouge a few years ago from the North, bringing with them at that time a few good specimens. With

the acquisition of the new stock plus the result of their own previous careful breeding they now feel they are in a position to make their mark in the show ring and they plan to exhibit extensively. Baton Rouge has very excellent air facilities and as a consequence breeders will encounter little difficulty in shipping bitches for breeding to Strathkirk studs.

Congratulations are due Mrs. A. E. Reeg of the Blanart Kennels, Wantagh, L. I. Blanart Barcarolle completed her championship at the West Orange event and is awaiting confirmation. Barcarolle will be remembered as the Stud Dog Futurity winner at last spring's Specialty. The Scottish Terrier Coat

Dr. Merritt N. Pope, Berwyn, Maryland.

THE makers of the Standard emphasized the importance of coat by giving it a rating of 15 points—equaled only by the number assigned to "Body." Today, mediocre or poor coats are the rule. However, the average is improving. There are increasing numbers of brindles being shown and a few of the best dogs have really good coats.

Because of so many poor or mediocre coats, owners are reduced to expedients for giving the appearance of a good jacket. Some seem actually to prefer a poor one. "You can do more with it!" I once heard a man, who should have known better, say that he wanted a soft one. Of course, a soft coat can be trimmed to hide body and leg defects and, under some judges, even a poor gait. If a poor coat is sufficiently short and is treated with gum acacia or weak syrup to stiffen and build it up, it can be made to feel like a fair one. Then by adding a touch of lampblack, we have a "pretty picture"—from the ringside. Of course, the dog may win, but he surely is not a good one without a good coat.

The Standard says of coat: "Rather short, about 2 inches, dense undercoat and an outer coat intensely hard and wiry." The ideal coat is a weather resisting jacket warm, due to the dense

undercoat, and rain-shedding because of the straight, wiry outercoat, lying flat to the body. I have seen a good-coated Scot come indoors from a downpour of rain, shake himself and show very little moisture outside and none next to the skin.

If the coat is straight, hard and close-fitting (as it should be) a 2-inch coat is ideal, and the Standard infers that a shorter one should be penalized. If the undercoat is lacking, 7/8 points should be cut off immediately as a matter of course. Then anything short of an outercoat which is "intensely hard and wiry" should be penalized in proportion to its softness. In passing I would say that nothing is said in the Standard about "furnishings," except by implication under "Penalties" where soft coat is mentioned. Furnishings are usually much softer than the hair of the back.

Shortening the coat, or "topping" makes it softer in texture. The shaft of a hair from the outer coat is not of equal diameter throughout its length. The very end is sharp pointed, but rapidly increases in diameter, reaching a maximum between 3/4 inch and 1 1/2 inch from the tip. Then the hair decreases in diameter until the basal half of a mature hair is thin and soft. This results in a new coat, just growing out, feeling so much stiffer than it later becomes. When topped, this hardest and most wiry portion of the hair is cut off, leaving the relatively soft basal end.

All this brings me to the point of my story: A good friend of mine has a promising young dog in which I am much interested. As a puppy, he was exhibited at a number of shows by a handler, after which he was returned to his owner. On his arrival, he had plenty of "furnishings" but examination showed an outer coat over the back which was unnaturally short, with no visible undercoat at all. A possible 15 points for coat was sacrificed to give a nice top-line. "General Appearance" includes much beside top-line and counts for but 10 points.

When the dog grows an entirely new coat, he may justify the winning we expect him to do.

"Dear Dr. Rogers:

"Thank you very much for your nice letter. We were so very glad to have the pleasure of meeting you in New York and we too regret we could not have more time together. However we are looking forward to the next time—we dare to hope there will be a next time as this our first visit to America is something we shall never forget. The reception and so many kindnesses extended to us by all the people we have been privileged to meet has been just overwhelming. It has been grand to find the Scottish fraternity over here such a happy and enthusiastic crowd and so long as this spirit prevails the breed should certainly prosper especially having regard to the high quality of the many exhibits I have seen. I thought the "Specials only" class at the Specialty show was a great class and it was a joy and a privilege to have the opportunity of judging it.

"As is the case in England at most shows the earlier dog classes were somewhat weak but improved by the time Open was reached. The bitch classes were really strong and must have given much satisfaction to American breeders.

"It appears that the entry was the best for about 10 years and I felt this was a distinct compliment and much appreciated.

"In this respect it should be borne in mind that we are visiting America as the guests of Mrs. John G. Winant who had very sportingly withheld her entries—otherwise the entry would have been even larger.

"The ringside both at the Specialty and the Garden was both large and enthusiastic and speaks volumes for the popularity the breed still maintains.

"Trimming and the method of handling in the ring are very similar to those employed in Britain. I particularly liked your "Specials only" class—we do not have this in our country and in my opinion it has much to commend it—particularly as a means of keeping the leading dogs and bitches in the public eye.

"I liked the Winner's Dog, Barberry Knowe Amber owned by Mr. & Mrs. Charles C. Stalter. He should not be long in making his title.

"The winner's Bitch too is a very good Scottie. She is Marlu Sheila coming from the well known kennels of Mr. & Mrs. Maurice Pollak.

"The Specials only class gave me much pleasure to judge and it resolved itself into a close and exciting tussle between Ch. Independent Ben and Ch. Marlu Red Seal, eventually placed as written.

"My wife and I felt distinctly privileged to attend the club dinner after the show and to have the opportunity of meeting so many Scottish Terrier breeders who gave us such a grand welcome.

"I was glad to be able to watch Mr. Stalter judging the breed at the Garden the following day when most of the exhibits of the previous day appeared and perhaps I may be allowed a personal note and say how delighted I was to see International Ch. Walsing Winning Trick, presented in immaculate form by Phill Prentice win Best of Breed and later placed second in one of the strongest Terrier Groups it has been my pleasure to see.

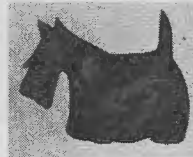

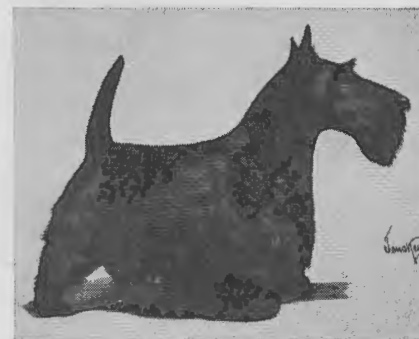
