ALIFORNIA, which became the Die-Chard Capital of the U.S. last year when the entry at the Scottish Terrier Club of California specialty topped that at both the Scottish Terrier Club of America, the 1947 Westminster and Morris & Essex, has further increased its lead.

The S.T.C.C. ran up an entry of 61 at this year's specialty, held as part of the Los Angeles Kennel Club show, April 24 and 25—9 more than the S.T.C.A. winter specialty and 16 more than at the Garden. The California Club had a total of 52 present—5 points in both sex— compared with 39 at the Winter specialty ---3 points in dogs and 5 in bitches---and 31 present at Westminster---3 points in dogs and 4 in bitches.

The new point ratings also reflect this


Mrs. Martha Cleveland's Laddie Mac won Open A with 181 at the Saw Mill River Kennel Club obedience class.




